Ordered, That any and all dogs loose Whereas, Many dogs are at large and or at large in any of the public streets, unmuzzled in the Borough of Richmond avenues, highways or other public places in the said Eorough of Richmond, City of New York, unless held by a leash or chain or muzzled in such manner as to protect persons from being bitten, shall

be destroyed as directed by the Commissioner of Health. It is further
Ordered, That this order and regulation shall take effect on the 1st day of August, 1912, and remain in force and effect until the 1st day of November, 1912, and that this order be printed in the CITY RECORD for five days in succession beginning July 22, 1912. A true copy.

Sec. 134. It shall be the duty of the Commissioners or managers or the principal, superintendent, or physician, of each and every hospital, public institution or dispensary, in this city, to report to the Department of Health, in writing, the full name, age and address of any person suffering from any one of the infectious diseases included in the list appended, with the name of the disease, within twenty-four hours of the time when the case is first seen:

A-Communicable: Typhoid fever, influenza, lobar pneumonia, broncho-pneumonia, infectious diseases of the gastro-intestinal canal (dysen-tery, cholera morbus, cholera infantum, summer diarrhoeas of infants).

B-Parasitic diseases of the skin: tinea tonsurans, impetigo (contagious), favus.

Note—In this list of diseases reporting is required by the Department of Health in order that data may be obtained for general and special investigation of the modes and sources of infection and as to the prevalence and distribution of these diseases. The Department of Health does not purpose to exercise a sanitary surveillance in these cases, but desires information with a view to the ultimate removal or im-provement in the conditions which now foster them. Notification is required in certain of these diseases because of the liability to their extension among the children in schools.
