DEPARTMENT OF PLANT AND STRUCTURES.

Report for the Quarter Ended September 30, 1916.

QUEENSBORO BRIDGE.

During the quarter rapid progress was made in the reconstruction of the pavement of the Queensboro Bridge, new work being confined to the south half of the roadway; the north half remaining open for traffic and being temporarily repaired as required. A large force was maintained on this work in order that one-half of the pavement on the main span might be completed before cold weather rendered progress impossible.

On Aug. 10 the surface car service of the New York and Queens County Railway Company was transferred from the inner tracks on the roadway to the tracks on the outside brackets. Thereafter the tracks on the South Roadway were removed in accordance with the repavement plans.

Service on the elevators at the Queens Anchor Pier, providing accommodation for passengers using surface cars on the bridge, increased very greatly during the quarter, the passenger increase being 412,109, as compared with the corresponding three months for the year previous.

In the Municipal Building the installation of door and car interlocking devices for elevators was practically completed. Incidental repairs in connection therewith are being continued.

Pneumatic carrier system between the Stock and Bond Division of the Finance Department and the Chamberlain's Office on the 7th and 8th floors, completed.

The Art Metal Construction Co., contractors for Furnishing and Installing Metal Railings, Screens and Counters, completed work under its contract and a 100 per cent. payment was made. The contract provides that a guarantee fund of \$6,000 shall be retained for one year from the date of the 100 per cent. certificate.

The Edward Schroeder Lamp Works, contractors for Furnishing and Installing Lighting Fixtures in the Municipal Building, completed work under the contract and a 100 per cent. certificate was issued. This contract provides for a guarantee fund of \$4,000 to cover the work for one year, dating from the issuance of this certificate.

The Pullman Automatic Ventilator Mfg. Co., contractor for Furnishing and Setting Window Ventilators in the Municipal Building, completed work under this contract and a 100 per cent. certificate was issued, a guarantee fund of \$200 being maintained for a period of one year.

Contracts for the interior finish of the tower and kitchen and dining room quarters in the Municipal Building were advertised and bids received, and the bids referred to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

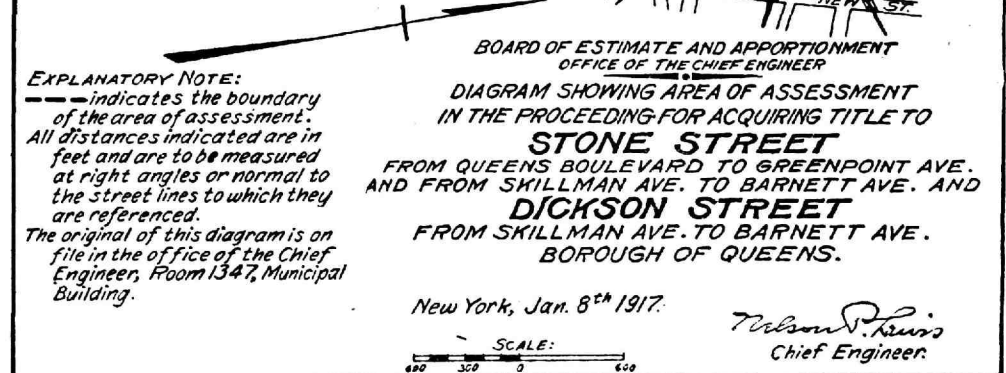
