

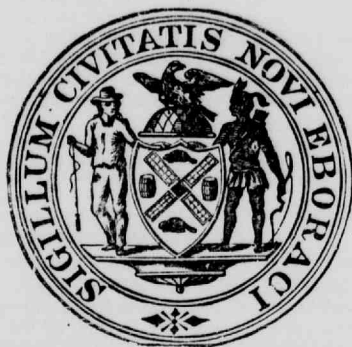

### ASSESSMENT COMMISSION.

MAYOR'S OFFICE—CITY HALL,  
WEDNESDAY, November 10, 1880—2 o'clock P. M.

The Commission created by chapter 550 of the Laws of 1880, to revise, vacate, or modify assessments for local improvements in the City of New York, met pursuant to adjournment.

Present—Commissioners Edward Cooper (Chairman), John Kelly, Allan Campbell, George H. Andrews, and Daniel Lord, Jr.

The minutes of the meeting held November 4, 1880, were read and approved.

The notice of the present meeting, as published in the CITY RECORD and "Daily Register," on the 9th and 10th of November, 1880, were read by the Clerk.

Commissioner Lord called up for consideration the Rules reported by the Committee on Rules at the last meeting.

After some amendment, the Rules were adopted, as follows:

#### ASSESSMENT COMMISSION RULES.

##### I. CHAIRMAN.

The Chairman shall preside at all meetings of the Commission, and shall have control of the calendar of cases prepared by the Clerk, and shall, in respect to business before the Commission, have the same powers and duties as a presiding justice of a General Term of the Supreme Court. In the event of his absence at any meeting the Commission may select a Chairman pro tempore, who shall have the same duties and powers as the permanent Chairman.

The Chairman shall also have power to issue subpoenas and other process.

##### II. CLERK.

The Clerk shall prepare a list of all the notices filed with the Comptroller and Corporation Counsel under the provisions of the act, which list shall state the name of the petitioner, the particular assessment in relation to which relief is sought, the date of its confirmation, and the name of the attorneys representing the petitioner. Such list shall at all times be open for inspection. The Clerk shall, from such list, prepare for the use of the Commission a calendar of the cases, on which such number of cases as the Chairman shall designate shall be placed according to the dates upon which the notices have been filed.

The Clerk shall keep the minutes of the Commission and attend to the printing of the same. He shall be present at all meetings and shall give the necessary publication to both notices of meeting and to the minutes, and shall perform such other duties as shall be required of him by the Commission in relation to the business thereof.

##### III. STENOGRAPHER.

The Stenographer shall attend at all meetings of the Commission, and shall report the proceedings thereof and all testimony taken, and shall furnish to the Clerk a transcript of his notes, for use in preparing the minutes. He shall also furnish, on request, to either the Corporation Counsel or the attorney for any petitioner a transcript of such minutes upon the same terms as the same are to be furnished by the Stenographers of the superior city Courts.

##### IV. NOTICE OF HEARING.

A notice of at least eight days shall be given in writing to the Counsel to the Corporation, in the form usually known as a notice of trial, specifying a day on which it is proposed to take testimony or to make argument in relation to any particular assessment, and no objection to any assessment will be considered by the Commission, or any evidence taken in reference to any assessment or any argument heard, except by special order of the Commission, until proof of service of such notice shall have been filed with the Clerk, and proof of service of such notice shall be so filed with the Clerk at least two days before the proposed hearing.

##### V. HEARING.

The Commission will make such disposition of the cases before it as will facilitate the dispatch of business, and will place on a special calendar all cases involving the same assessments or similar principles, or in which the evidence will be identical or nearly so. Any case so placed on such special calendar and set down for hearing must be completed within such time as the Commission shall designate, and will not be postponed without excuse satisfactory to the Commission.

##### VI. EVIDENCE.

The Commission will, with the consent of the Counsel to the Corporation and the opposing counsel, receive as evidence any testimony heretofore taken in relation to any assessment as to which a proceeding is or has been pending in any court, provided, however, that either party may recall any witness or witnesses whose testimony is so received, for farther examination in relation to new evidence or for farther cross-examination as to evidence so taken.

##### VII. MEETINGS.

The Commission will hold meetings on Tuesday of each week, at 2 o'clock P. M. The Chairman shall have power to call special meetings in his discretion, and shall call a special meeting when requested so to do by any two members of the Commission.

Notice of all meetings shall be given by publication in the CITY RECORD and "Daily Register," as required by the Act.

#### VIII. SUSPENSION OF RULES.

These rules may be suspended, modified, or altered at any meeting at which all the Commissioners are present by a majority vote, and may be suspended, modified, or altered at any meeting, provided written notice of the intention to move such suspension, modification, or alteration shall be given to each Commissioner at least two days prior to the meeting at which it is intended to make such motion.

Commissioner Lord moved the suspension of the seventh rule, for the purpose of adopting a resolution that when the Commission adjourn, it do so to meet on Tuesday, December 7, 1880, at 2 o'clock P. M.

This motion was adopted.

Commissioner Lord then moved that when the Commission adjourns, it do so to meet on Tuesday, December 7, 1880, at 2 o'clock P. M., at the Mayor's Office, City Hall.

Which was adopted.

On motion of Commissioner Kelly, the Commission then adjourned.

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Board of Police, held this day, it was Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to transfer the sum of one thousand dollars from the appropriation made to the Police Department for the year 1879, entitled "Alteration, Fitting-up, Additions to, and Repair of Station-houses," which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the appropriation made to the same Department for the year 1880, entitled "Police Fund—Salaries of Patrolmen," which is insufficient to enable the Board of Police to pay James Byrnes arrears of salary from January 1 to November 1, said Byrnes having been reinstated to his position as patrolman by order of the Supreme Court, dated October 15, 1880.

NEW YORK, November 6, 1880.

Hon. EDWARD COOPER, Mayor, Chairman of Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—After my estimate of the sum required to carry on the work of this Department for the year 1881 was presented to your Board, my attention was called by the officers of the 69th Regiment of the National Guard to the condition of their armory and rooms over the Tompkins Market, and to the necessity for certain repairs and improvements therein. With the Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies I made an examination of the premises and came to the conclusion that these improvements were necessary for the proper accommodation of the regiment, and for the better protection and maintenance of the building, which is the property of the city. I brought the matter verbally before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the day of October, and estimated the cost of the proposed repairs and improvements at \$15,000.

The principal part of this sum, viz., \$9,000, will be expended on the proposed steam-heating apparatus. The rooms are now heated by twenty-two stoves. I think there will be less danger from fire by warming with steam than by the present mode.

The floors of several of the rooms are worn and splintered, and require renewal with best Georgia pine. The original floors were laid with inferior wood. During the fire which occurred in this building a few years since the walls were injured. They should be properly repaired and repainted. The water-closets and plumbing also require certain alterations. The estimate of the whole work is as follows:

Steam-heating apparatus complete, including chimney.....	\$9,000 00
Carpenter work.....	4,000 00
Painting.....	2,200 00
Total.....	\$15,200 00

If steam for heating the building could be supplied by either of the companies recently authorized to lay down pipes in the streets for such purposes, a large saving could be made, but I cannot learn that these companies are making any progress in carrying out the work for which they have received a grant. Could heat be furnished from the street pipes, the above estimate could be reduced to \$9,000.

SIR—I am instructed by the Board of Police to acknowledge your letter of the 19th instant, requesting the assent of the Board of Police to the transfer by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the sum of fifteen thousand dollars of unexpended balances, etc., and to inform you that the Board of Police have this day complied with the request, by assenting to the transfer of (\$15,818.89) fifteen thousand eight hundred and eighteen dollars and eighty-nine cents, for the purposes mentioned in your letter.

I herewith transmit copies of two resolutions adopted by the Board, assenting to the transfers, from which details of the sums and amounts to be transferred, and from what accounts.

Resolved, That the Board of Police hereby give its consent to the transfer by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the sum of twelve thousand eight hundred and eighteen 89-100 dollars from appropriations made to the Police Department for the year 1879, account entitled "Cleaning Streets under the Police Department—Removing Ice and Snow," which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to any other purposes and objects for which the appropriations are insufficient for the year 1880, and which require the same, the said sum (unexpended balance) still remaining in the custody of the Finance Department.

Resolved, That the sum of twelve thousand five hundred and fifty-six dollars and fifty-six cents be and the same is hereby transferred from the appropriation made to the Police Department for the year 1880, entitled "Police Fund—Salaries of Patrolmen," which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes or objects thereof, to the appropriation made to the same Department for the year 1880, entitled "Police Fund—Salaries of Clerks, Deputies, Stenographers, Superintendent of Telegraph, Telegraph Operators, Messengers, Cleaners, Steamboat and all other employees," which is insufficient.

Resolved, That the sum of eighteen hundred and eighty-four dollars and seventy-five cents be and the same is hereby transferred from the appropriation made to the Police Department for the year 1879, entitled "Supplies for Police," which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes or objects thereof, to the appropriation made to the same Department for the year 1879, entitled "Contingent Expenses," which is insufficient.

The Chairman moved that they be laid over.

Which was agreed to.

The Comptroller called up and offered the following preamble and resolution, laid over at meeting held October 27, 1880:

Whereas, By section 8 of chapter 565 of the Laws of 1880, the Comptroller is authorized and directed to create and issue stock to provide means for the improvement of Morningside Park, upon a requisition by resolution of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks; and

Whereas, The said Commissioners have made such requisition for the sum of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars; and therefore,

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to issue, from time to time as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding five per cent. per annum, stock for the improvement of Morningside Park, to the amount of \$150,000, as authorized by section 8 of chapter 565 of the Laws of 1880.

The Chairman moved that the requisition of the Department of Public Parks, dated October 9, 1880, referred to the Comptroller at meeting held October 13, 1880, requiring the issue of said bonds, be returned to the Department of Public Parks, with the request that requisition be modified.

Resolved, That the Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 30, 1880, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit: for the calendar year eighteen hundred and eighty-one (1881), be submitted to the Board of Aldermen, with the reasons for it in detail, as required by section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873.

#### REASONS FOR THE PROVISIONAL ESTIMATE FOR THE YEAR 1881.

The Provisional Estimate for the calendar year 1881, herewith submitted to the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, has been adopted and agreed on by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The amounts allowed are such as are prescribed or provided for by law, or such as conform to the Departmental Estimates and to the estimates of necessary expenditures other than those included in Departmental Estimates, except as to the amount of certain items, for which appropriations were asked for, that have been modified or disallowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in making such Provisional Estimate, in the manner and for the reasons stated in detail under the heads of appropriations respectively.

#### The Common Council.

The sum of \$64,250 is allowed and appropriated to pay the expenses of the Common Council for the year 1881, in conformity with the provisions of law.

The amount allowed for the salaries of the President and members of the Board of Aldermen is \$44,000 less than the amount allowed for the same purpose for the year 1880, in pursuance of chapter 521 of the Laws of 1880. No reduction, however, has been made in the aggregate sum to be paid for salaries and compensation of the Clerk and officers of the Common Council under the provision of said statute requiring that the amount shall be at least ten per centum less than the aggregate amount paid therefor during the present year 1880, for the reason that, in the opinion of the Counsel to the



Corporation, the said statute "does not comprehend the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen" as heads of Departments, to which the law providing for a reduction of salaries is restricted in its application.

It was stated by the President of the Board of Aldermen that the sum called for in the estimate for salaries of clerks would not be sufficient, and that a reduction had been made therein under the impression that it was required by chapter 521, Laws of 1880. The amount was increased by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by allowing the sum of \$18,000, instead of \$14,580, asked for in the estimate, for the reason that, in the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, the provisions of said statute requiring a reduction of ten per cent. on salaries does not apply to the Common Council.

The opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation on this question, by which the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has been governed in making the Provisional Estimate for the Common Council for the year 1881, and for other purposes and objects, is as follows:

SIR—I am in receipt of your letter of the 20th, communicating the request of the Mayor, for my opinion as to "whether section 3 of chapter 521 of the Laws of 1880, which provides for a reduction of salaries, is restricted in its application to heads of departments, and the departments under their control, and whether the Mayor is the head of a department, and the Board of Aldermen the head of a department, in view of this law."

In answer, I advise you:

1st. That the provisions of the section cited apply only to the heads of departments, and prescribe their duty in making "the next Departmental Estimate of the amount required for the support of such department during the ensuing fiscal year."

2d. That the Mayor is not the head of any department constituted by the charter.

3d. That the Board of Aldermen is not the head of any department constituted by the charter.

In Jones v. The Mayor, 7 Robertson, 209, the question whether restrictive provisions of the charter relating to departments of the city government limited the power of the Common Council, was discussed, and the Court held that the Common Council was not subject to limitations prescribed by law applicable only to "departments."

I am therefore of the opinion that the statute in question does not comprehend the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen.

The Mayorality.

The sum of \$40,000 is allowed and appropriated for the Mayorality for the year 1881, being \$2,000 less for the salary of the Mayor than in 1880, under the provision of chapter 521 of the Laws of 1880, fixing the salary at \$10,000, in place of \$12,000, per annum; but no reduction has been made in the aggregate amount of salaries of clerks and subordinates of "The Mayorality," under the provision of said statute, for the reason that, in the foregoing opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, it does not apply to the Mayor, as the head of a department, and in accordance with the estimate submitted by the Mayor.

The Finance Department.

The sum of \$240,500 is allowed and appropriated for the Department of Finance for the year 1881, including the salary of the Comptroller of \$10,000 per annum, and the sum of \$30,000 to be paid to the Chamberlain, as provided by law, and deducting \$17,340 from the aggregate amount paid in the year 1880, for salaries and compensation of persons employed in and by the Department, other than the head thereof, and day laborers paid less than \$2 per day; and \$660 less than the amount of salaries paid to temporary Clerks employed in the Bureau for the Collection of Taxes, in pursuance of the provision of section 3 of chapter 521, Laws of 1880, and in accordance with the Departmental Estimate, submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

State Taxes, and Interest and Principal of the City Debt.

The State Taxes to be paid as the quota of the City and County of New York, to be raised by tax in 1881, including the salary of the Shore Inspector, fixed as provided by law, at \$4,270,760; the interest on the city debt payable from taxation in the year 1881, under the statutes authorizing the issue of the bonds and stocks upon which the interest will become due during said year, estimated at \$8,265,965.45; and the sum required to be paid during the year 1881, for the redemption of the principal of the city debt, amounting to \$569,996.75, and including \$52,395.69, on account of the bonded indebtedness of the towns annexed from the County of Westchester to the City of New York, have been severally allowed and appropriated at the sums mentioned, in conformity with the requirements of law.

Under the provisions of chapter 565, Laws of 1880, the sum of \$75,000 is included for the redemption of fund or stock for the improvement of Morningside Park, not embraced in the Departmental Estimate; also the sum of \$51,000 is included for redemption of revenue bonds under provisions of chapter 556, Laws of 1880, making the total amount \$186,198.52.

Rent of Armories and Drill-rooms, and Other Purposes.

The sum of \$61,500 is appropriated for the rent of Armories and Drill-rooms, and the sum of \$48,041.66 for rent of premises for other purposes estimated to be necessary under leases made and to be made, as stated in detail in the Departmental Estimates, and also items for Wages of Armorer's; Expenses of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; Real Estate Expenses; Seventh Regiment New Armory Fund, Trustees of; Claims payable under Acts of the Legislature, and Arrears for Advertising as stated in more full detail in the Departmental Estimate of the Comptroller.

Judgments.

The sum of \$350,000 is appropriated to pay judgments against the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, estimated to be required for that purpose in the year 1881.

The Law Department.

The sum of \$143,728 is appropriated for the Law Department, including salaries of the Bureau of the Corporation Attorney, \$11,178; the Public Administrator, \$7,200, and the Attorney for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes, \$5,850.

The salary of the Counsel to the Corporation in the year 1881 is reduced from \$15,000 to \$12,000, and ten per centum is deducted from the salaries of assistants, clerks and messengers attached to this Department, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 521, Laws of 1880. The Provisional Estimate corresponds with the Departmental Estimate, except as to the items for salaries of clerks and subordinates in the Bureau of the Corporation Attorney, Public Administrator, and the Attorney for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes, which, on the suggestion of the Corporation Counsel, have been fixed at amounts ten per cent. less than those estimated in the Departmental Estimate of the Law Department, in order to make the reduction of salaries required by the statute above referred to.

The Department of Public Works.

The sum of \$2,409,450 is appropriated for all purposes to the Department of Public Works in the year 1881, as required by various statutes and needs of the public service, according to the Departmental Estimate; and a reduction of ten per centum has been made upon the aggregate sum of salaries and compensation of all persons, other than the head of the Department and day laborers paid less than \$2.00 per day.

The Department of Public Parks.

The sum of \$919,381.20 is appropriated to the Department of Public Parks, for the maintenance and government of parks and places, including various improvements in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, surveying, monumenting, erecting bridges over the Bronx river, etc., as set forth in the Departmental Estimate. The amount for the year 1881 is \$350,881.20 more than the total appropriation for 1880.

As provided by chapter 521, Laws of 1880, ten per centum reduction is made in salaries of all persons other than the heads of the Department and laborers paid less than \$2 per day.

The amounts appropriated are those asked for in the Departmental Estimate, except the item for Police, which was estimated at \$150,000, and for which the sum allowed was \$92,231.20, including \$10,000 for the purchase of uniforms and supplies for Park Police. The amount was arrived at by deducting ten per cent. from the amount allowed for the pay of the Police in 1880, as stated by Commissioner Lane, and adding the amount required for uniforms and supplies.

The Department of Public Charities and Correction.

The sum of \$1,517,416 is allowed and appropriated to the Department of Public Charities and Correction for all purposes in the year 1881, as required under the Departmental Estimate, and a reduction of ten per centum is made on the aggregate sum of salaries of subordinates employed in the Department, as provided by chapter 521, Laws of 1880. The total amount of appropriations is \$69,032.66 more than was appropriated for 1880. The amounts allowed correspond for the several purposes and objects with those in the Departmental Estimate, except that the appropriation for contingent expenses of the Department has been allowed at \$5,000 instead of \$30,000 asked for, the smaller amount being deemed sufficient, and except that certain items of appropriations asked for have been omitted as unnecessary during the year 1881.

The Health Department.

The sum of \$253,363.32 is allowed and appropriated for the expenses of the Health Department in 1881, against \$251,540 in 1880, a reduction of ten per centum on the aggregate sum of salaries of

subordinates being made, as provided by chapter 521, Laws of 1880. All the items are in accordance with the Departmental Estimate, except the item for transportation of persons with contagious diseases, for which the sum of \$5,500 was allowed as necessary to provide a proper steamboat and to pay the expenses of transportation.

The Police Department.

The sum of \$4,161,315 is appropriated for all purposes to the Police Department, including \$70,000 for a new steamboat for Harbor Police; \$700,000 for cleaning streets, and \$100,000 for purchase of steam tugs and scows and additional apparatus and new stock for the Street Cleaning Bureau, the whole amount of appropriations being \$53,575 more than was appropriated for all purposes in 1880. As provided by chapter 521, Laws of 1880, a deduction of ten per centum is made on the salaries of persons employed, other than the head, and the uniformed force of the Department, and day laborers paid less than \$2 per day. The items in each case correspond to those asked for in the Departmental Estimate, except that the amount allowed for the payment of captains, sergeants, patrolmen, and doormen are the same as the amounts allowed in the appropriations for the present year, with the addition of \$2,000, allowed for one additional captain, reinstated by order of court, after a successor had been appointed, which amounts were deemed sufficient, and except the amount of \$60,912, asked for in the Departmental Estimate for the payment of the salaries of the clerks, deputies, and other employees specified in the estimate, was reduced to \$54,000, in order to make a reduction of ten per cent. of the amount appropriated for the same purposes for the year 1880; and except that the item of Rents of Police Station-houses was increased \$2,500 to allow for the payment of rent of the station-house for the Eleventh Precinct; and except that the amount for street cleaning purposes has been modified so as to allow \$100,000 for salaries of inspectors, etc., as specified in the appropriation, instead of \$106,848 as asked for in the Departmental Estimate. The sum of \$600,000 was also allowed for wages of sweepers, etc., as specified in the Provisional Estimate, instead of the sum of \$877,795.50, as asked for in the Departmental Estimate, and the sum of \$100,000 was allowed for the purchase of steam tugs, scows, additional apparatus and new stock, instead of the sum of \$124,500, as asked for in the Departmental Estimate, the sums allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment being, in their opinion, sufficient for those purposes respectively. The amount for Election Expenses was allowed at the sum of \$154,150, being a reduction of \$700 (ten per cent. of the salaries of the Chief and Chief Clerk of the Bureau of Elections) from the Departmental Estimate.

The Fire Department.

The sum of \$1,568,959 is appropriated to the Fire Department for all purposes in the year 1881, including the Bureau for the Inspection of Buildings, and also special appropriations for three new engine-houses, two new houses for Hook and Ladder Companies, amounting to \$75,000, and \$26,250 for seven fourth-class fire engines, and also \$60,000 for one floating engine, asked for in the Departmental Estimate. The amount appropriated is \$260,899 more than the total appropriation for 1880.

A deduction of ten per centum has been made on salaries of subordinates and persons other than the heads of the Department and the uniformed force, and day laborers paid less than \$2 per day, as provided by chapter 521, Laws of 1880. The amounts allowed for each item are the same as those asked for in the Departmental Estimate.

The Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The sum of \$102,100 is appropriated for 1881, against \$107,800 appropriated for 1880, and including \$17,400 to the Board of Assessors, appointed by the Commissioners of Taxes.

A reduction of ten per centum is made upon the salaries of the clerks and employees of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, as provided by chapter 521, Laws of 1880. The Board of Assessors being an independent Board to which the statute requiring a reduction of ten per centum on the salaries of persons employed in Departments does not apply, the salaries of the Assessors and their clerks were fixed at the same amount as for the year 1880.

Except as to the salaries of the Assessors and their clerks each item in the Provisional Estimate corresponds with the amounts asked for in the Departmental Estimate.

The Board of Education.

The sum of \$3,620,095 is appropriated to the Board of Education, against \$3,500,000 in 1880, including \$100,000 for Corporate Schools, under special acts of the Legislature.

As provided by chapter 521, Laws of 1880, ten per centum is deducted from the salaries and compensation of janitors, clerks, and persons employed by the Board of Education, except teachers exempt under said statute. The amounts allowed in the Provisional Estimate are the amounts asked for by the Board of Education.

The College of the City of New York.

The sum of \$140,000 is appropriated to pay the salaries of officers and professors, supplies and other expense of the College in 1881, as provided by law, the same amount appropriated for 1880.

Advertising, Printing, etc.

The sum of \$152,200 is appropriated for these purposes in 1881, including the expenses of publishing the CITY RECORD and the salaries of the Supervisor and his subordinates, no reduction being made for salaries, as the office of the Supervisor does not belong to a department; and the amounts allowed in the Provisional Estimate are the amounts estimated as required by the Supervisor of the City Record.

Miscellaneous Purposes.

The amount allowed for Coroners—Salaries and Expenses, is \$46,000, being \$2,500 less than the amount asked for by the Board of Coroners, a reduction being made in their estimate of \$2,500 in the item for post-mortem examinations.

The Sheriff's estimate for sheriff's fees was \$50,000, and for Support of Prisoners in the County Jail, \$17,500. In the Provisional Estimate, \$40,000 have been allowed for sheriff's fees, and \$15,000 for the support of prisoners, which amounts are the same as were appropriated for 1880, and are deemed sufficient for these purposes.

The appropriation of \$10,000 for Commissioners of Accounts was allowed as necessary to pay the salaries of the Commissioners and the clerks required.

The appropriation for Jurors' Fees; Incumbrances in Harbor, Removal of; Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Expenses of; and the Salary of the Physician of the County Jail, are fixed at the amounts required for those purposes respectively, in the opinion of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The Judiciary.

The sum of \$1,205,125 is appropriated to pay the salaries of judges, clerks, officers, and attendants of the courts, including the Police and District Civil Courts, the offices of the County Clerk, the Surrogate, the District Attorney, and the Commissioner of Jurors. Chapter 521, Laws of 1880, provides for reductions in the salaries of persons elected or appointed after the passage of the act, and as no persons under these heads have been since elected or appointed, no changes have been made in their salaries for 1881.

The amounts allowed were arrived at by taking the estimates submitted from the various courts and offices comprised under this head, except as to the following items: The amount of \$67,600 was allowed for salaries of the District Attorney's office, being the amount allowed for 1880, instead of the sum of \$74,300 asked for; the sum of \$4,000 for contingencies of the District Attorney's office, being the amount allowed for 1880, was allowed instead of the sum of \$12,500 asked for; the sum of \$6,600 asked for by the Board of Police Justices for Court Attendants was not allowed; the items in the Estimates of the Civil Justices and the Marine Court for supplies were not allowed, as necessary supplies are furnished out of other appropriations.

The Supreme Court appropriation differs from the amounts asked for in that \$3,000 is added for compensation of judges from other districts, sitting in New York, and the sum of \$2,500 is deducted from the salaries of clerks, etc., the amount appropriated being the same as for 1880.

Asylums, Reformatories, and Charitable Institutions.

The sum of \$1,026,018.32 is appropriated as the estimated amount required for the support and maintenance of inmates of charitable institutions in the State and City of New York in the year 1881, payable from taxation as per capita allowances and specific sums to be paid under provisions of law. This amount is \$29,276.91 more than was appropriated for the same purposes in 1880. The increase is caused in part by acts of the last Legislature, chapters 597 and 598, providing for appropriations to the Five Points House of Industry and The Association for Befriending Children and Young Girls, respectively.

A printed statement of the Departmental and other estimates herein referred to, is herewith transmitted, and constitutes in part the statement of the reasons in detail for the Provisional Estimate which the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is required to transmit with such estimate to the Board of Aldermen.

## BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY\* for the week ending November 6, 1880, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending October 30, 1880.

SIR—There were 583 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 6, 1880, which is an increase of 39, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 91 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1879. The actual mortality for the week ending October 30, 1880, was 543, which is 102.2 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.11 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,221,714.

## PROPOSALS FOR LIGHTING THE PUBLIC LAMPS.

PROPOSALS FOR FURNISHING THE GAS OR other Illuminating Material for, and Lighting, Extinguishing, Cleaning, Repairing, and Maintaining the Public Lamps (and supplying Gas, etc., for new lamps when required) on the Streets, Avenues, Piers, Parks, and places in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of the City of New York, excepting that portion of the Twenty-fourth Ward formerly known as the Town of Kingsbridge, for the period of four months, commencing January 1, 1881, and ending April 30, 1881, both days inclusive.

Proposals for the above, made in accordance with sec. 73, chap. 335, Laws of 1872, and chap. 478 of the Laws of 1879, and the Revised Ordinances of the City of New York, chap. 8, article 2, and inclosed in a sealed envelope, indorsed, "Proposals for furnishing the illuminating material for, and lighting and extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, and maintaining the public lamps," with the name of the party making the same written thereon, will be received at the office of the Commissioner of Public Works, until 12 o'clock M. of Monday, November 29, 1880, at which place and hour they will be publicly opened by said Commissioner and read.

Bidders are required to state in their proposals their names and places of residence; the names of all persons interested with them, and, if no other person be so interested, they shall distinctly state the fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making any estimate for the same supplies and work; and that it is in all respects fair, and without collusion or fraud; and, also, that no member of the Common Council, head of a Department, Chief of a Bureau, Deputy thereof, or Clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof; which proposals must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each proposal shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders of the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person or persons making the bid or proposal, they will, on its being so awarded, become bound as his or their sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he or they shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he or they would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of security required for the completion of the contract, and stated in the proposals, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety, and otherwise; that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith, and with an intention to execute the bond required by section 27, article 2, chapter 8, of the Revised Ordinances of the City of New York, if the contract shall be awarded to the person or persons for whom he consents to become surety. The adequacy and sufficiency of the sureties offered to be determined by the Comptroller.

Bidders are required to state in their proposals the several streets or parts of streets in which they propose to perform the requirements herein contained, and also the illuminating or candle-power of the gas they propose to furnish, when tested at a distance of not less than one mile from the place of manufacture, and bidders proposing to furnish any illuminating material other than illuminating or coal gas, must state distinctly what kind of material they propose to furnish, and the illuminating power of the burner they propose to use for the same.

Bidders are also required to state the price for which they will furnish the gas (of not less than sixteen-candle power by photometrical test, at a distance of not less than one mile from the place of manufacture) or other illuminating material for each lamp, including the lighting, extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, and reglazing the lanterns, and replacing the cocks, tubes, burners, cross heads, lamp irons, and lanterns thereto, for the period from January 1, 1881, to April 30, 1881, both days inclusive, stating the price for the above named period of four months, for each lamp.

Bidders are also required to state a price for which they will repair lamp-posts, including straightening and reeading, and for each new lamp fitted up, as follows:

For each lamp-post straightened, stating the price per post.

For each column reelected, stating the price per post.

For each lamp-post removed, stating the price per post.

For each lamp-post reset, stating the price per post.

For each new lamp fitted up, stating the price per post.

The bidders are required to write out the amount of their bids in their estimates, in addition to inserting the same in figures.

The number of public lamps to be contracted for is about 2,950.

The burners for illuminating gas are to be of a capacity to burn three cubic feet of gas per hour under a pressure of one inch, and in case the illuminating material shall be other than illuminating gas, then the burners to be used for such illuminating material shall give a light (by photometrical test) equal to the light given by the gas-burners in use in the public lamps in the City of New York.

Should any alteration or attachment be required to any portion of the lamps for which proposals are made in consequence of the use of illuminating material other than gas, then such alteration shall be done and such attachment placed on the lamps without expense to the city.

The number of hours the lamps are to be kept burning during the contract is 1,383½.

The amount of security required is sixty per cent. of the total amount of the bid.

The award of the contract will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids.

Should the person or persons to whom the contract is so awarded neglect or refuse to accept to contract within forty-eight hours after written notice that the same has been awarded to his bid or proposal, or if he accept, but does not execute the contract and give the proper security, it may be readvertised and relet as provided by law and ordinance.

Bidders are informed that no deviation from the specifications will be allowed, unless a written permission shall have been previously obtained from the Mayor, Comptroller, and Commissioner of Public Works.

The right is reserved to assign and designate to any bidder, whose bid shall be accepted, the number and location of the lamps to be lighted by such bidder, in any portion of the city for which proposals are received, and to increase or diminish such number.

The right is reserved to determine and designate, after the proposals are opened, what illuminating material shall be used in the public lamps, or any number of them, during the period before mentioned; also to decline any or all proposals if deemed for the interests of the Corporation, and no proposal will be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to the Corporation, upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as security or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.

If the proposal of any bidder proposing to furnish illuminating gas shall include any lamps with which the pipes or mains of such bidder are not connected at the time of the making of the bid, and a contract for furnishing the gas for and lighting, extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, and maintaining any such lamps, shall be awarded to such bidder, in that case, thirty days from the date of the execution of such contract shall be allowed to such bidder in which to connect such pipes or mains with such lamps.

But no payment to such bidder, on account of any such lamps, will be made for the time so allowed, nor until the same shall have been connected with the mains of such bidder, nor except for the time during which all the requirements herein mentioned shall have been fully performed.

## CHAPTER 195.

AN ACT in relation to the payment of assessments for local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment, and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Sec. 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chapter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assessment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein prescribed.

Sec. 3. Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assessments not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore requiring the payment of any penalty or interest over the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assessment.

Sec. 4. No provision of this act hereinbefore contained shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assessment for the collection of which assessment the property has been sold.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

## CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The Comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over even per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the Comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
