

### BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's office on Thursday, March 4, 1886, at 2.35 o'clock P. M.
Present—Edward V. Loew, Comptroller; E. Henry Lacombe, Counsel to the Corporation; Frederick Smyth, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting held January 8, 1886, were read and approved.
The Comptroller presented the following assessment lists received from the Board of Assessors under date of January 28, 1886, viz.:

1. Ninth avenue sewers, between Eighty-first and Eighty-third streets.
2. Beekman place sewer, from one hundred and fifty feet to one hundred and seventy feet ten inches south of Fiftieth street.
3. Walton avenue sewer, from One Hundred and Fiftieth street to a point five hundred feet northerly therefrom.

4. Eighty-third street sewer, between Boulevard and West End avenue.

Abstract of Proceedings for the Week ending March 6, 1886.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 3, 1886. - STATED MEETING-10 A. M.

The Executive Committee, on all appointments to the grade of Skilled Laborers, Foremen and Assistant Foremen, were authorized to determine the compensation of such employee.

The Committee on Police were authorized, in all cases in which they shall find officers charged with offenses to be guilty of the same, to impose such penalties therefor other than dismissal as in their judgment may seem proper. Such action shall in all cases be reported to the Board at its next meeting.

3. It shall be his duty to visit each of the several institutions above named once in each week, or as often as may be necessary, to advise with the officers in charge thereof, and to inspect the wards, buildings, etc., and the patients confined therein.

4. He shall attend at the office of the Commissioners once in each week, or more often if required, and shall then make to them such reports and recommendations as he may see fit, for their action thereupon.

So All reports and communications from the various institutions, other than such as are matters of routine or provided for by orders from the Board, shall be made to it from the heads of the several institutions through the General Superintendent, and, as far as possible, in writing, at the time herein provided.
