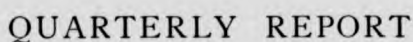

SIR—I herewith respectfully submit a report of the operations of this Bureau for the three months ending December 31, 1874.

UNSAFE BUILDINGS.

The whole number of unsafe buildings, walls, chimneys, etc., reported as being in an unsafe or dangerous condition, by the several Inspectors, from October 1 to December 31, 1874, was two hundred and seventy-five (275). Of this number seven (7) have been taken down and entirely removed, and one hundred and sixty-four (164) have been made safe and secure, leaving one hundred and four (104) in process of removal or repair. Of the number of cases remaining undisposed of, on September 30 last, four (4) have been taken down and entirely removed, one hundred and forty-eight (148) have been made safe and secure, and forty-nine (49) are in process of removal or being secured. It will thus be seen that, since October 1, 1874, eleven (11) unsafe buildings have been taken down entirely, and three hundred and twelve (312) have been made safe and secure, leaving in process of removal or repair one hundred and fifty-three (153).

Twenty-six thousand nine hundred and thirty dollars (\$26,930) were expended in securing and repairing the foregoing buildings.

In consequence of the neglect or refusal of the proper parties to comply with the orders of the Department within the time prescribed, it has been necessary to order and hold legal surveys in four (4) cases. Five hundred and eighty-five (585) notices of unsafe buildings, consisting of “cautionary or first notices,” “second notices,” “notices and summonses,” etc., were served during the last three months. The location and disposition of the unsafe buildings reported may be seen by reference to Exhibit “H,” appended.

VIOLATIONS.

The number of violations of the various provisions of the law, reported by the Inspectors during the last three months, was two hundred and ninety-seven (297), and the requirements of the law have been complied with in one hundred and five (105) cases, leaving a balance of one hundred and ninety-two (192) in process of disposal.

Of the number of cases of this nature remaining undisposed of on September 30, last, the law has been complied with in one hundred and thirteen (113) cases, leaving a balance of ninety-six (96).

Not disposed of and making a sum total of two hundred and eighteen (218) cases of this class removed since October 1, last, and leaving a balance of two hundred and eighty-eight (288) cases in process of removal.

Fifty-three (53) cases of violations have been sent to the attorney for prosecution during the last three months. Of the two hundred and eighty-eight (288) cases not removed, eighty (80) are in the hands of the attorney.

The number of notices served in the foregoing cases was five hundred and four (504).

COMPLAINTS.

Eighty-seven (87) complaints have been received from the public during the last three months, and upon examination, no cause for complaint existed in thirty-two (32) cases; six (6) were removed on verbal notification given by the Inspectors; thirty-five (35) proved unsafe buildings; and fourteen (14) violations, of which the proper parties were notified.

BUREAU OF FIRE ESCAPES AND IRON WORK.

Superintendent of Buildings:

SIR—I herewith respectfully submit a report of the operations of this Bureau, for the three months ending December 31, 1874.

The number of buildings reported as requiring fire-escapes was one hundred and ninety-five (195); of these eighty-five were made to conform to the law upon notice, and one hundred and ten are now under process.

The number of cases of this class reported prior to October 1, 1874, and since removed, is seven hundred and nine (709).

During the quarter, sixty-two (62) cases have been sent to the attorney for prosecution, and thirteen hundred and thirteen (1313) notices issued. The excess of notices issued over the number of cases reported may be accounted for by the fact that in many cases the agent or lessee, in addition to the owner, have to be notified, and where the proper parties are not found or are non-residents, notices are mailed to their address if known, and copies posted on the buildings.

By referring to Exhibit "I," it will be noticed that there are eight hundred and sixty-eight (868) cases still in progress of removal. Most of these are cases for which contracts are out and fire-escapes being made, and also cases which require painting and repairing. A large number are also yet in litigation.

During the quarter, five thousand two hundred and ninety-five (5,295) buildings have been examined by the Inspectors of this Bureau, and except those reported, have been found to be provided with fire-escapes or not requiring any additional means of escape in case of fire.
