Whereas, The imperative necessity for increased public school accommodations in the upper part of this city will be readily comprehended when it is known that in the Nineteenth Ward alone there are now temporarily crowded into its public schools 936 more scholars than is allowed by law, and that 1,600 children have been refused admittance, making in all 2,536 children in one ward alone who are practically excluded from participation in the benefits of our common school system. In most of the other up-town wards the attendance of scholars is largely in excess of the school accommodations, and large numbers of children, for this reason, have been refused admission to the public schools: and to the public schools; and

Whereas, In the lower wards, south of Grand street, there is enough vacant space in the public school buildings to accommodate more than one-third in excess of the number of children now in attendance, and as the population of the lower wards is constantly moving to the upper and central portions of the city for permanent residence, the number of children diminish in proportion, and to such an extent that in a very few years one-half the present school buildings will suffice to accom-

modate those remaining; and

Whereas, It is of primary importance that all the children in this city, whose parents so desire, should be afforded ample opportunity for attending the public schools nearest their respective residences; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Board of Education be and is hereby respectfully requested to cause buildings, suitable for temporary school-houses, to be leased, where needed, in the upper part of the city, particularly east of Second avenue, where the population is most dense, and the need of primary schools the most urgent; also west of Third avenue and east of Fifth avenue, as there are but two public schools, besides the Normal College and Training School, from Fifty-first street to the Harlem river; and to consolidate the schools in the lower part of the city, by closing every third one and transferring the teachers to the temporary schools up-town, until permanent locations are provided and buildings erected; and be it further

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,664, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 736 tenement-houses, 125 private dwellings, 33 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 15 stores and warehouses, 33 stables, 22 slaughter-houses, 1 gut-cleaning establishment, 1 public sewer, 1 dangerous building, 20 sunken and vacant lots, 59 yards, courts, and areas, 90 cellars and basements, 57 waste-pipes and drains, 310 privies and water-closets, 37 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 2 cesspools, 6 smoky chimneys, 64 other nuisances, together with 34 vicits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 1,151.

During the past week 117 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 101 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

275 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 41 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 35 houses, 35 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of fever was removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

# Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 493 births, 50 still-births, 219 marriages, and 501 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, September 20, 1879. This shows a decrease of 50 births, 6 still-births, and 42 deaths, and an increase of 69 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was a decrease of 89 births, and an increase of 18 still-births, and 37 marriages, while the number of deaths was the same as that reported for the past week. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased, 1; croup, 5; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 7; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhœal diseases, 30; cancer, 9; phthisis pulmonalis, 18; heart diseases, 6; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; premature and preternatural births, 3; Suicide 1; drowning, 1; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 2; whooping cough, 1; typus fever, 1; manition, 1; rheumatism and gout, 2; bronchitis, 6; pneumonia, 5; convulsions, 12; apoplexy, 6; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 24; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3. The deaths from diphtheria, erysipelas, alcoholism, aneurism, marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, cirrhosis and hepatitis, and cyanosis and atelectasis were the same as those reported for the past week.

SIR—There were 501 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 20, 1879, which is a decrease of 42, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 27 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1878. The actual mortality for the week ending September 13, 1879, was 520, which is 10.4 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.57 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,100,745.
