

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 6 of chapter XLIV. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, entitled "Of provisions concerning dogs.'

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

SECTION I. Section 6 of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended and shall read as follows :

δ 6. It shall not be lawful for any person to own or keep upon his or her premises any dog or other animal whose barking, howling, or other offensive noise in any out-house, yard, or in the street, may be annoying, disagreeable, or injurious to any person or persons residing in the vicinity, under a penalty of five dollars for every such offense, to be imposed by any Police Magistrate; provided, however, that it be made to appear before such magistrate that a written notice was, as a condition precedent to the imposition of such penalty, first served upon the owner or keeper of such dog or other animal, re-quiring him to abate or discontinue the nuisance in such notice particularly stated and set forth. Such Police Magistrate may order the removal from within the city limite or the billion of such penalty. Police Magistrate may order the removal from within the city limits, or the killing of any such animal, upon complaint being made before him by any two or more reputable citizens or householders, that they are seriously annoyed or injured, or that such noise is injurious or annoying to any sick person or persons convalescent resident in the vicinity as aforesaid.

SEC. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SEC. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
