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MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Headquarters New York City Fire Department, }
June 30, 1904.

Stated meeting of the Municipal Explosives Commission, held Thursday, June 30, 1904.

Present—Commissioners Montgomery, Piser and Sherry.

Deputy Commissioner Churchill in the chair.

Mr. F. J. Britt and Mr. H. C. Gumbleton were present by invitation.

The following report of Inspector Murray, endorsed by Chief of Department Croker, on the conditions existing in the wholesale drug store of Britt, Loeffler & Weil, read and ordered filed:

"June 30, 1904.

"Hon. THOMAS W. CHURCHILL, Deputy Fire Commissioner and Chairman of the Municipal Explosives Commission:

"Dear Sir—I visited the drug house of Britt, Loeffler & Weil, No. 37 Bowery, on June 29 and found it of brick walls and mill construction.

"The applicant occupies the store floor, basement and sub-cellar.

"On the first floor there is a general stock of drugs, and packing room with offices in the rear.

"In the basement there are three vaults under the sidewalk. The south vault contains ether and collodion. The middle vault contains chlorate of potash, there being an 18-inch wall dividing the vault from the main building and an 8-inch or 12-inch wall dividing the first vault from the second.

"In the sub-cellar the saltpetre is stored about 50 feet from the front of the house, the sulphur about 75 feet further on and the acids are in the areaway between the rear of the building and a stone retaining wall.

"In the sub-cellar and basement dry herbs are kept with patent medicines.

"It is the ordinary wholesale drug house and is kept in a cleanly condition.

"For a fire risk I consider it first class. The only defect which I find, and consider a serious one, is a floor light reaching from the ceiling of the store to the floor of the lodging house upstairs. It is a one and one-quarter inch rough glass set in iron frames, and should a fire occur it would allow the flames to extend upstairs. That should be remedied.

"In the storage of drugs, etc., I find no cause for fault, they being in such places that fire could not reach them and the danger of explosion thereby minimized.

"The within communication from George E. Murray, Inspector of Combustibles, under date of the 30th ult., relative to the premises No. 37 Bowery, is respectfully forwarded and approved. I would also recommend that wire glass be placed in dead light, set in metal frame so as to prevent any fire which may originate in the cellar to extend through the plain glass now in use.

Mr. Britt assured the Commission that all the requirements of the Fire Department would be complied with.

On motion by Commissioner Piser, seconded by Commissioner Montgomery, it was

Resolved, That section 15, Part 6, of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 15. No permit shall be issued for a wholesale drug store to be located in

a building to be occupied in part as a lodging house, tenement house, or apartment house.

Carried; all present voting in favor thereof.

On motion, duly made and seconded, the Commission then adjourned to 9.30 A. M. Wednesday, July 6, 1904.

The regulations covering sale and use of fireworks and of black powder were considered at some length; and

On motion of Commissioner McKenna, it was

Resolved, That the Fire Commissioner be requested to communicate with the Board of Trustees of the Bellevue and the Allied Hospitals and with the Board of Health, requesting information and statistics as to the number and character of cases treated for injuries caused by fireworks, black powder, blank cartridges, other explosives, and naphtha, gasoline and benzine.

Meeting adjourned to 9.30 A. M., Wednesday, July 13, 1904.

MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Meeting of the Municipal Explosives Commission, held at the Headquarters of the New York City Fire Department, Wednesday, July 13, 1904.

Deputy Fire Commissioner Churchill in the chair.

Present—Commissioners Piser, Sherry and Montgomery.

The Chair announced that full minutes should be taken at all public hearings and he would see that hereafter a stenographer would be present for that purpose.

The portion of the regulations concerning the use of chemicals and dangerous materials in technical establishments was taken up and discussed at some length in reference to the quantities of acids and high combustibles allowed in tenement houses and all classes of buildings without a permit from the Fire Department, under Schedule D, pages 91 and 92 of the Regulations. Laid over for further consideration.

Commissioner Sherry was appointed a Committee to report an amendment of the Fireworks Display Regulations, prohibiting the careless discharge of roman candles.

On motion of Commissioner Piser, seconded by Commissioner Montgomery, it was Resolved, That the Police Commissioner be requested to issue a general order, accompanied with a circular containing an epitome of the Fireworks Display Regulations, directing a strict enforcement of the provisions for safety in all public displays.

Meeting then adjourned to 10 A. M. Thursday, July 14, 1904.

MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Meeting of the Municipal Explosives Commission, held at the Headquarters of the New York City Fire Department, Thursday, July 14, 1904.

Deputy Fire Commissioner Churchill in the chair.

Present—Commissioners Piser, Montgomery and Sherry.

Commissioner Sherry reported the following resolution which was seconded by Commissioner Piser:

Resolved, That Part V. of the Municipal Explosive Commission's Regulations be amended by the adding thereto of two new sections to be known as Sections 58(b) and 58(c), and to read as follows:

58(b) No roman candles shall be fired anywhere in the City except from a box or frame or other contrivance, arranged so as to hold the candle or candles firmly in an upright position so that the discharge will be straight up in a line perpendicular to the plane of the horizon.

58(c) No contrivance, frame or box for firing roman candles and no mortar shall be placed under any elevated structure or under any overhead wires, or in any place where an elevated structure or any overhead wires would be in the line of fire.

Carried—Commissioners Piser, Sherry and Montgomery voting aye.

Commissioner Montgomery introduced an amendment striking out the words "within the fire limits" in the second line of section 57, Part V. of the Regulations, with a view of thus prohibiting unauthorized display of fireworks throughout the entire City. Laid over.

Commissioner Piser presented a resolution amending the regulations in relation to the storage of gasoline and naphthas in automobile storage stations. Laid over.

Adjourned for two weeks.

LAYING OUT PARK BETWEEN WEST TWENTY-SEVENTH AND WEST TWENTY-EIGHTH STREETS, MANHATTAN

In the matter of laying out a park on the block bounded by West Twenty-seventh and West Twenty-eighth streets, Ninth and Tenth avenues, in the Borough of Manhattan, affidavit of publication was presented showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

The following protest was placed on file:

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I have lived in what is known as the Eleventh Assembly District and Twentieth Ward of New York City since 1864, and it may be presumed that I know something of this section of the City. I have practised medicine here since 1861, largely along tenement house dwellers and the business people of this district, and for this reason it may be presumed that I know at least something of the populace of this district. I mention these facts in deference to your right to know who it is that protests in any matter concerning the welfare of the City, and also in justification of the protest I am about to make against the choice of a park site on the block Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth streets and Ninth and Tenth avenues.

There can be no rational, nor hygienic, nor aesthetic opposition to the existence of many parks in a large city, but their location must be determined by the measure of utility to the people of particular localities, and the means at the disposal of the City to furnish parks. When means are limited such sites should be chosen for parks which will serve as such the greatest number of people for the longest period of time. For

these reasons the Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth street and Ninth and Tenth avenue site is not the best one that can be chosen for immediate realization on the middle-west side of the City. A site anywhere between Thirty-fifth and Forty-fifth streets and Eighth avenue and the Hudson river would be the better choice.

Advocates of the Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth street site lay much stress on the benefits which would accrue to the school located on that block. All that is claimed in this regard is true enough, but, aside from the aesthetic inadaptability of the school as an isolated building in a little park, the school is doomed to be removed within a period of ten years on account of the shifting of tenantry of the district, which is continuously going on, and the change of character which the neighborhood is rapidly assuming from that of a tenement quarter to that of a factory, store-house and railroad centre.

The district between Thirty-fifth and Forty-fifth streets, west of Eighth avenue to the Hudson river, will be for many years to come a densely packed tenement district, and this is the district which calls for a park or "lung" space, for here a park will serve all the purposes of a "small park" for the longest time for the greatest number of people. Confident that these considerations will be given the consideration they deserve, I am

Hon. JOHN H. MOONEY, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

We the undersigned property-owners and residents of Seventy-third street, are heartily in favor of the proposition to regrade our street, but not on proposed plan.

The difference of elevation between First avenue and Second avenue, amounting to 37 feet, is to be accomplished in an abrupt grade, rising 23 feet in 250 feet from First avenue; the balance of the street has a gentle rise of 14 feet in the 350 feet to Second avenue.

Glad that the Department is endeavoring to remedy the evil that has caused the deplorable condition of this street, we ask the following:

That the Department consider a plan where this difference of elevation of First avenue and Second avenue is accomplished by a uniform grade, making the travel more comfortable by vehicle and by foot, and effectually preventing the deposit of earth at First avenue and Seventy-third street and consequent flooding at the junction of Narrows avenue and Seventy-third street after every heavy storm.

NEW YORK, September 29, 1904.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—We, the undersigned property owners of West Morrisania, in the Borough of The Bronx and in the immediate vicinity of Bonner place, herewith file a protest to the proposed extension of Bonner place, from its present terminus to College avenue.

We oppose this proposed extension for the following reason:

The only persons who would benefit by said extension are the owners of the six lots and two houses forming Bonner place at present, but even a large percentage of those owners are against the extension.

In order to cut through the proposed extension a distance of 100 feet only, three houses will have to be condemned. The price of these three houses and the usual fees for Commissioners of Street Openings will cost more than all lots of Bonner place are valued to-day. It would make a very high assessment and an unjust burden to the owners of the surrounding property, which, in return, would receive no benefit from it whatsoever.

When some eight years ago the block of which Bonner place forms a part was laid out in the lots and sold at auction, the Bonner place lots only brought one-third to one-quarter as much of a price as the other lots of the same block sold at that time, for the reason that they were on the line of this small Bonner place, little over half a block long, and not fronting on any street or avenue.

It therefore is unjust to assess the owners of the surrounding property to have Bonner place extended at partly their expense. If the property owners of Bonner place want this extension and thereby improve their property, and surely only theirs, why not let them buy this property needed for this extension in a private business way, and pay for it themselves, and not have their neighbors to pay for it? As we, the undersigned property owners, own the biggest part of the surrounding property, we hope to be duly considered in the above matter and have the proposed extension of Bonner place laid aside.

I beg to inform your Board that it is not authorized to direct that title shall vest to these lands, as provided in the foregoing resolution, as the Supreme Court has vacated the proceedings instituted to acquire title to the lands required for the above-named avenue, because notice of the intention to lay out the same had not been given to the Long Island Railroad Company, pursuant to section 61 of the Railroad Law.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is submitted a communication from the Corporation Counsel, under date of August 31, stating that the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 22, 1904, directing that title to the land lying within the lines of Fourth avenue, between the southerly side of Jackson avenue and the southerly side of Graham avenue, in the Borough of Queens, should be vested in The City of New York on September 1, 1904, is not a proper resolution, and that the title to these lands cannot vest in the City owing to the fact that the proceedings to open Fourth avenue have been vacated by the Supreme Court for the reason that notice of the intention to open the street was not given to the Long Island Railroad Company, pursuant to the provisions of section 61 of the Railroad Law. No reference is made in this connection to the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of June 17, 1904, when, in connection with a resolution of the Local Board providing for the building of a sewer in Fourth avenue, between Broadway and Graham avenues, a resolution was adopted providing that title between the limits covered by the proposed sewer should vest in The City of New York on July 15, 1904. If the resolution of July 22 was improper, that of June 17 must also have been improper.

Proceedings to open Fourth avenue, under the name of Rapelje street, between Thomson and Riker avenues, were instituted by the Board of Public Improvements on March 15, 1899, and the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were filed on January 28, 1902, nearly three years after the institution of the proceedings. Information as to the date of the filing of these oaths was secured from the Street Opening Bureau of the Corporation Counsel's office on May 2, 1904. Nothing was then said about the vacating of the proceedings by the Supreme Court. Possibly this action had not then been taken, the date of the order of the Court not being given in the letter of the Corporation Counsel.

As to the two resolutions authorizing improvements in Fourth avenue, which have already been adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, I believe that the resolution of June 17, which provided for a sewer, can properly be allowed to stand, as there is quite a complete dedication of this part of the street; at any rate, a sufficient dedication to permit of sewer construction. While the dedication between Washington and Graham avenues, the regulating and grading of which was authorized on July 22, is not quite as complete, this improvement will cover the entire width of the street, but I believe that this resolution also can be allowed to stand, although I have requested the Borough President to send me, for filing with the other papers, a certificate from his Topographical Bureau showing that the street is unobstructed and has been dedicated to public use.

There is now in this office a resolution of the Local Board of the Newtown District, adopted on May 18, 1904, providing for building a sewer in Fourth avenue, from Jackson avenue to a point 359 feet north of Washington avenue. A report has already been prepared recommending the authorization of this sewer, on the ground that title had already been vested through resolutions heretofore adopted; but, inasmuch as there are several fences built across the street between these limits, no dedication can be shown, and it will not be possible to report this sewer resolution.

It is recommended that the President of the Borough of Queens be requested to lay the matter before the Local Board of the Newtown District in order that new proceedings may be instituted, in connection with which the proper notice may be given the Long Island Railroad Company.

It is further recommended that the resolutions of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted on June 17, 1904, and on July 22, 1904, providing for vesting title to portions of Fourth avenue, or Rapelje street, in The City of New York, be rescinded.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Washington Heights District, Borough of Manhattan, adopted on July 5, 1904, recommending a change in the grade of West One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, between Amsterdam avenue and Edgecombe road, and in the grade of Jumel place, between West One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street and Edgecombe road.

As originally laid out, it was the intention to carry West One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street across what has recently been laid out as an extension to High Bridge Park, giving it an outlet on the lowland near the river. To accomplish this, and at the same time to secure connection with Edgecombe road, a ramp was to be built through the block to the north. This plan resulted in making the elevation of the intersection of West One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street with Jumel place over seven feet below the elevation of Amsterdam avenue, about fourteen feet below the elevation of Edgecombe road at West One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, and about twenty-nine feet below the elevation of Edgecombe road at Jumel place. The project for a low-level outlet has been abandoned, and the street now has its easterly terminus at Edgecombe road. This change naturally results in raising the intersection of Jumel place with West One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, which change has already been partially carried out upon the ground, a large amount of filling having been done. Under the change proposed the grade at the intersection of Jumel place and West One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, will be raised about eleven feet above that legally fixed, and the same will be about three feet above the present surface at the intersection. Under the change the grades providing for a low-level outlet of West One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street will also be dispensed with.

A few inexpensive buildings have been erected upon the line of West One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, although the street is unshaped and ungraded. These buildings will be somewhat damaged by raising the grade, but they would also be damaged if the official grade be adhered to. Under the change proposed the streets will receive proper drainage, and, in my judgment, the changes are desirable ones. A resolution is now before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment providing for grading West One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, but the same has not yet been acted upon, for the reason that the grade must first be determined upon.

It is recommended that a public hearing be given, for which purpose a map and technical description are herewith submitted.

CHANGE OF GRADE OF SIDEWALKS ON OVINGTON AVENUE, BROOKLYN.

The following petition and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

SIRS—We, the undersigned, all being property owners of a certain street known as Ovington avenue, situate in Bay Ridge, Borough of Brooklyn, City and State of New York, hereby petition your Honorable Board to change the grade of the sidewalks from the fence line to the line of the curb upon that portion of the above named Ovington avenue lying between Fourth and Fifth avenues, in the following described manner:

North Sidewalk.

Beginning at the northeast corner of Fourth avenue and Ovington avenue, the elevation to correspond with the curb elevation;

Thence easterly to a point 44.5 feet distant from the easterly building line of Fourth avenue, the elevation to be 1.0 foot above the curb;

Thence easterly 94 feet to a point 1.2 feet above the curb;

Thence easterly 50 feet along a vertical curve to a point 1.0 foot above the curb;

Thence easterly 50 feet along a vertical curve to a point 1.0 foot above the curb;

Thence easterly 135 feet to a point 1.0 foot above the curb;

Thence easterly 100 feet to a point corresponding with the curb elevation;

Thence to Fifth avenue along the present legal grade.

South Sidewalk.

Beginning at the southeast corner of Fourth avenue and Ovington avenue, the elevation to correspond with the curb elevation;

Thence easterly to a point 30 feet distant from the easterly building line of Fourth avenue, the elevation to be 1.4 feet above the curb;

Thence easterly 94 feet to a point 0.8 feet above the curb;

Thence easterly along a vertical curve 50 feet to a point 0.8 feet above the curb;

Thence easterly 70 feet to a point 2 feet above the curb;

Thence easterly 130 feet to a point 1.3 feet above the curb;

Thence easterly 60 feet to a point corresponding with the curb elevation;

Thence to Fifth avenue along the present legal grade.

It is further submitted that the work of bringing the roadway of the aforesaid Ovington avenue to the grade as recently established is now under way and in process of completion.

That sometime prior to the date of this petition it was discovered that many fine old trees must necessarily be destroyed, if that part of the sidewalk between Fourth and Fifth avenues be brought to the line of the grade as established.

Ovington avenue has long been regarded as one of the most beautiful streets in South Brooklyn. Long rows of trees stand upon both sides of the road, and to remove them at this time would not only cause distress to long-time residents of Ovington avenue, but would result in positive depreciation in value of abutting property.

The undersigned therefore respectfully urge that this petition be granted, for the reasons above set forth.

REPORT No. 2326.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The accompanying petition, which is addressed directly to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by eleven property-owners on Ovington avenue, between Fourth and Fifth avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn, asks the Board to initiate a change in the grade of the sidewalks of the said Ovington avenue on the southerly end of the block referred to.

The action which the Board is asked to take is an unusual one, and is designed to affect the grade of the sidewalk only, without changing the grade of the roadway. On November 14, 1902, the former Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved of a change of the grade of Ovington avenue, between Fifth and Third avenues, in order that the improvement of the street by paving with asphalt, a contract for which was authorized on May 1 last, might be accomplished without a radical departure from the existing surface, in accordance with which many improvements have been made, and a change from which would destroy a number of fine shade trees. The profile submitted with the resolution appeared to have been carefully prepared, two vertical curves having been introduced to make the variation in grade as inconspicuous as possible. In carrying out the work according to this profile, it has been found that a number of trees will be fatally injured, and it was proposed that in order to save them the sidewalk be left somewhat above the curb grade. The borough officials consulted the Corporation

Counsel as to their right to place the sidewalks at an elevation higher than that legally fixed for the street, and were advised that they had no such right, but that it would be proper to fix a grade for the walks which might be higher than that of the roadway, and in accordance with this advice the accompanying petition is presented.

Beginning at Fourth avenue, it is proposed to raise the sidewalks about one foot above the curb line in the first forty feet, and to carry them from one to two feet above curb grade for a distance of between three and four hundred feet, when they would again slope down to their original position with respect to the curb.

While no communication from the borough authorities is attached to the petition, the Commissioner of Public Works has assured me that the proposed change seems the best that can be done under the circumstances, and urges that the petition presented by the property-owners be granted.

As already stated, the grade for the street has already been fixed by competent authority, and it is now asked that a different grade be established for the sidewalks. The destruction of the shade trees would greatly detract from the appearance of the street, which is a very attractive one, and it is recommended that the petition be granted after the public hearing required by law.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Bushwick District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on September 28, 1903, recommending an alteration in the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grade of Stewart street, between Bushwick avenue and Evergreen Cemetery.

This resolution is one of those which were returned to the Borough President early in 1904, and it has again been returned by him, but without comment to indicate the attitude of the present borough officials in the matter of the proposed improvement.

This street was paved last year, and the object of the resolution is to legalize a change made in carrying out the work when the established grade was raised, to make the street better conform with improvements already made on the abutting property.

This change, in my judgment, is a desirable one, and its authorization is hereby recommended. A map and technical description and a form of resolution fixing the date for a public hearing are herewith submitted.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on June 30, 1904, recommending a change in the grade of Midwood street, between Rogers and Nostrand avenues.

Midwood street has recently been graded, curbed and flagged. On July 11, 1902, the grade of Nostrand avenue was changed at Midwood street, but the required change in the grade of Midwood street was not provided for under the resolution. The change

now proposed is for the purpose of supplying this omission, and also to legalize the summit which was constructed in the centre of the block when the grading improvement was made. Under the changes the established grade will be raised about two feet at the Nostrand avenue end, making the grade conform much closer with the street surface which previously existed and with improvements made upon the abutting property than did the grade heretofore established.

Favorable action upon the resolution is recommended. A map and technical description showing the change proposed are herewith presented.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The accompanying resolution of the Local Board of the Jamaica District, Borough of Queens, which was adopted on February 24, 1904, provides for the laying out and establishing of a public park about one mile west of Rockaway Park and extending westerly 7,000 feet, reaching from the Atlantic ocean on the south to Jamaica Bay on the north.

This resolution was prompted by a petition signed by John Jameson, William J. Curtis, George S. Lambert, Henry Osborne "and many others."

There has been for some time an agitation in favor of the establishment of a great seaside park in The City of New York, and this part of Rockaway is one of the places which has been suggested. It is urged especially because it is entirely free from improvements of any kind. The tract described contains approximately 400 acres, fronting directly on the ocean, where there is an excellent beach affording surf bathing, while the northerly side is bounded by the still water of Jamaica Bay. The strip has an average width of about 2,400 feet, the central portion of which is covered by sand dunes and low bushes; aside from the latter there is no vegetation of any kind, and from its exposed position it is doubtful if trees, shrubs or grass could be maintained except with great care and expense. It's one attraction is the fine ocean beach. It is at present difficult of access, the end of the Rockaway Beach branch of the Long Island Railroad being about a mile and a quarter distant from the easterly boundary of the proposed park site. I am advised that an extension of this line would be strongly opposed by the Rockaway Park Association. This association has laid out a large tract, extending from the ocean to Jamaica Bay, and a number of cottages have already been built. I am advised that lots 20 feet by 100 feet are held at from \$500 to \$600. Several of the streets have been paved; they are well lighted, have water and a sewerage system of their own, and one of the streets is occupied by a surface railroad. Access could be had to the proposed park by water if a proper pier were built on the Jamaica Bay side. The entire tract is said to be owned by Edward Hatch, and it is at present assessed for taxes at \$70,000. The land lying immediately west of this tract, which includes Rockaway Point, also has a fine ocean beach, and would be somewhat more readily accessible by water, but still less so by land. This land is owned by the Huntington estate, and is assessed at \$75,000.

It is recommended that a public hearing be given on the proposition to lay out a park on this tract.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on July 6, 1903, initiating proceedings for opening Avenue V, between Ocean parkway and Ocean avenue, and between Stillwell avenue and Eighty-sixth street.

This resolution is one of those which were returned to the President of the Borough early in the present year, and it has again been presented by him, but without comment to indicate the attitude of the present borough officials in the matter of the proposed improvement.

The former of these sections comprises a length of fourteen short blocks, and the latter a length of four short blocks. The proceedings appear to have been initiated for the purpose of securing title to the section adjacent to Stillwell avenue, where a sewer is required. The roadway is in use through six of the blocks near Ocean avenue, and a few houses have been erected upon the abutting property. The line of the street crosses the Manhattan Beach and Brighton Beach Railroads, and after advising the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company and the Long Island Railroad Company of the proposed proceeding, to acquire title to this street, as required under the provisions of the Railroad Law, I would recommend the approval of the resolution.

The avenue is laid out upon the map of the City to have a width of 80 feet, and, under the rule of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of July 25, 1902, 8 per cent. of the costs should be assessed upon the City at large and the remainder upon the property to be benefited.

Lacking a survey, it is not possible to make a definite statement concerning the location of buildings upon the land to which title is to be acquired, but I am of the opinion that buildings encroach upon the street in the vicinity of Stillwell avenue.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 970 of the Greater New York Charter, deems it for the public interest that the title to the lands and premises required for the opening and extending of the public park bounded by Broadway, West One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Hamilton place, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, should be acquired by The City of New York.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby requests the Corporation Counsel to make application to a Special Term of the Supreme Court, for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, and to take the necessary proceedings, in the name of The City of New York, to acquire title, wherever the same has not heretofore been acquired, for the use of the public, to the lands, tenements and hereditaments that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending the public park bounded by Broadway, West One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Hamilton place, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

Resolved, That the cost and expense of said proceedings shall be borne and paid by The City of New York.

Resolved, That nothing in this resolution contained shall be construed as preventing the Comptroller of The City of New York from entering into contracts for the acquisition of any portion of the above-described property at private sale, subject to the approval of this Board.

Petition of Property-owners Proposed to be Assessed in Connection with the (so-called) Opening and Widening of Exterior Street, Borough of The Bronx, from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street to Cheever Place, to Serve as Bridge Approaches for the New Madison Avenue Bridge.

SEPTEMBER 27, 1904.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Honorable GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York, and Chairman of the Board:

The undersigned owners of property on and near Exterior street, in the Twenty-third Ward, Borough of The Bronx, lying within the area of assessment, and who have been assessed in the preliminary assessment made by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the matter of "opening and widening Exterior street, from East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street to Cheever place," respectfully petition your Honorable Board and show:

That this proceeding was begun by a resolution adopted October 9, 1896, by the then existing "Board of Street Opening and Improvement." At that time said "Board of Street Opening and Improvement," having the power to amend its resolutions in relation to such matters, were accustomed to, and in this case did, utilize a printed blank or form which contained a formal clause providing that the entire cost of the proceeding should be borne by the property which it might be deemed was benefited thereby.

The contemplated improvement being at that time only a future necessity as the growth of the City progressed, no Commissioners were appointed until September 16, 1898, and the formal order appointing Commissioners was not entered until the 8th day of May, 1899. The first meeting of the Commission was held on the 17th day of July, 1899. The matter remained quiescent for a long time and was finally taken up with a view to its being progressed to a termination during the past twelve months or so, the needs of the City at large and the Borough of The Bronx having reached a point where the contemplated widening would be desirable. In the meanwhile plans were adopted by The City of New York for the removal of the present bridge across the Harlem river, known as the Madison Avenue Bridge, extending from the foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to the head of Madison avenue, and the construction of a new bridge, the present bridge being totally inadequate. In that connection proceedings have been taken to condemn the lands for approaches for this bridge on the New York side, in which proceedings a resolution has been adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the entire cost be borne by the City. Likewise on The Bronx side a further widening of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street (already 100 feet in width) has been provided for to constitute one of the three approaches to the bridge on that side of the river; this widening starting at Mott avenue, at a width of 32.6 feet, increases steadily to a width of 52.6 feet at the Harlem river, and the cost is to be wholly borne by the City.

While these matters have been pending, a petition was presented to your Honorable Board by those whose lands were being taken for this widening of Exterior street, south of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, that the width of the proposed widening south of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street be reduced from 100 feet to 80 feet. After a full hearing, it was granted by your Honorable Board on the ground that East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street (with which that portion of Exterior street lying south of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street connects at or near Park avenue) was itself a street only 80 feet in width, and that that width, continued up to the new bridge, would be sufficient. Subsequently a petition for the diminution of the proposed widening of Exterior street north of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, was presented by those owning land proposed to be taken in that section, the request being also that the widening be diminished from 100 feet to 80 feet. That petition came on for hearing before your Honorable Board as recently as the 17th day of June this year, and the petition was refused on the ground that this portion of Exterior street not only constituted the approach from the north to the new Madison Avenue Bridge, but also would connect at One Hundred and Forty-fourth street with the approach to the new One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street Bridge, which has already been taken by the City for that purpose, and which is 100 feet wide.

Your petitioners venture to represent to your Honorable Board that under these circumstances we have a contemplated new bridge having five approaches, two in Manhattan and three on The Bronx side; that of the five approaches the entire cost of the

two on the Manhattan side and of one of the three on The Bronx side, are, by resolution of your Board, to be borne by The City of New York, while as the two remaining approaches on The Bronx side, owing to the original resolution adopted in 1896, still standing upon record, the entire cost, it at present appears, must be borne by the adjacent property owners.

Your petitioners further call to the attention of your Honorable Board as further evidence of the facts hereinabove set forth, that on the City Map for the approaches to the new Madison Avenue Bridge, which bears date on the 14th of May, 1903, this widening of Exterior street is marked both on the north and on the south, respectively, of the new bridge, and the change of grades necessitated thereby (which reach a maximum of increase of 5 feet at the intersection of Exterior street and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street) are also indicated on said map; such increase of grade (from 13 feet to 18 feet) at the indicated point is also shown on the map of the One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street approach on The Bronx side to the new bridge which has been prepared by the City and bears date of July 30, 1903, and is certified by the Secretary of this Honorable Board on September 23, 1903.

Your petitioners further show that under the provisions of the Charter your Honorable Board succeeded to all the powers of the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement, including the right and power to change the resolutions of said Board, and that equitable dealing in this case suggests that the cost of these two, as well as the other three, of the five bridge approaches should not be left to fall upon the adjacent property, but like the other three should be borne by the City.

Your petitioners further show that this proceeding has been: First, a taking of a strip of land 60 feet wide, which was used as a highway and called Gerard avenue, and secondly, an increase of the width thereof from 60 to 80 feet below One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and from 60 to 100 feet above One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, and that it has been customary in cases where streets were opened exceeding 60 feet in width that a certain proportion of the cost and expense of the widening should be borne by The City of New York.

Finally, your petitioners show that no local needs require either an 80 foot street south of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street or a 100 foot street north of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street at this point. That the lands in the vicinity are, to the east, docks, used for lumber and similar heavy material, and to the west consist almost wholly of lumber and coal yards and storage places for stone, drain-pipes, heavy building material and articles of that nature. Also that the entire length of Exterior street and East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street from the Madison Avenue Bridge is only about ten or eleven blocks to the Third Avenue Bridge, and similarly on the north it is only about ten or eleven blocks from the Madison Avenue Bridge to One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, where the new One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street Bridge has been constructed. That so far as local uses are concerned the street therefore need only be wide enough to support such traffic as will arise within four or five blocks, and that the widening of Exterior street in this proceeding has been entirely with a view to the general development of the City and not for local purposes. In this connection your petitioners respectfully point out that application has been made and is pending for the right to lay trolley-car tracks on the northerly approach to the Madison Avenue Bridge along Exterior street, connecting with the trolley tracks which now cross that bridge and reaching to and connecting with the trolley tracks at One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, and which cross or are to cross the One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street Bridge. The purpose or necessity therefore being that the Union Railway Company may have opportunity in the event of either bridge being temporarily out of repair or closed for any other reason of utilizing the remaining bridge for access to Manhattan by both portions of its system of railways. That such use is in no wise a local use or in any wise a necessity for local purposes, but is a matter necessitated by the general public need in counter distinction to the local need.

Wherefore your petitioners pray that, because the said widening of Exterior street constitutes in fact two out of the five approaches to the new Madison Avenue Bridge, your Honorable Board will pass a resolution that the cost of such widening be borne by the City as is the case in regard to the other three approaches to said bridge, and in the alternative for such other and further relief in the premises as may be just and equitable, and your petitioners show that their names and the amount at which their lands stand assessed at present by the preliminary estimate of assessment are given in the subjoined schedule. The total amount of such preliminary estimate of assessment being \$277,647.09.

And your petitioners will ever pray.

In the Matter of Opening Westchester Avenue, from the Bronx river to Main Street, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

The undersigned owners of property affected in proceedings brought by The City of New York to acquire title to Westchester avenue, from Bronx river to Main street, Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, for their petition to your Honorable Board, respectfully show:

That proceedings to acquire title to Westchester avenue were instituted by resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, and the Commissioners therein were duly appointed by order of the Supreme Court bearing date the 31st day of December, 1901, and duly entered in the office of the Clerk of the County of New York on the 17th day of January, 1902.

That by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the City became vested, on the 15th day of October, 1903, with the title to each and every piece and parcel of land, and the tenements and hereditaments required to be taken for the purpose of opening said Westchester avenue.

That interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum is charged and continues to accrue upon the awards herein from the said 15th day of October, 1903.

That the Commissioners so appointed have received and passed upon the evidence submitted to them both by the property owners and by the City, and are prepared to make their awards for the properties taken therein.

That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has authorized and directed the regulating and grading of said avenue, and that the contract for the same has been already let, and that the work of physical grading and regulating thereunder has already proceeded to an advanced stage of completion.

That to add to the deprivation of the title, as aforesaid, the very buildings or the portions thereof acquired in this proceeding were sold by the City at auction on or about the 3d day of May, 1904, and your petitioner and others owning the buildings or portions thereof within the lines of the said avenue and improvements were ordered by the City to remove the same forthwith, which has already been done, or is now being done by the owners of the property.

That some 86 pieces of property were thus affected by the said sale and order to remove and your petitioners were put to the immediate alternative of losing the same and with it their whole building or of buying in, removing and restoring the same.

That it was only by extraordinary efforts and by raising forced loans and by the sacrifice of other securities that they have been able to raise a portion of the funds necessary for the removal of the buildings; and for their restoration to at least a tenable condition; that the interest which will be paid by the City upon the awards will not compensate them for the loss so suffered.

That in addition to these hardships they are without funds to meet the interest charges on mortgages now due or soon to become due upon their property or upon that taken by the City, and the additional rent charge thereupon by the City; and are unable to obtain extensions of such mortgages or to replace the same by reason of the fact that they no longer own the premises or have lost title to the greater portion thereof.

That the Commissioners although prepared to make their report on awards are not able and will not for considerable time to come, be able to make their complete report, by reason of the fact that the benefit maps in the proceeding, covering a large area of properties, not yet officially surveyed, cannot for some time be prepared for them by the proper City department.

That the remaining property and interests of your petitioners should not be jeopardized and made to depreciate still further by a delay over which they have no control, and in no manner due to any action on their part.

That this Board has jurisdiction to authorize the Commissioners in the above-entitled proceeding to make a partial report of their awards; and that such partial report of awards would save your petitioners from great hardship, would result in the saving to the City of a considerable amount in interest charges and would tend to the more rapid development of the territory affected by the regulating of the street so acquired, thereby immediately increasing the tax value of the properties affected.

Wherefore your petitioners pray that a resolution be adopted by this Board authorizing and directing the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the above-entitled matter to prepare and file a partial report of the amounts for damages by reason of the above-entitled proceeding.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—With the accompanying communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, bearing date of July 18, 1904, there are transmitted two petitions, one addressed to the President of the Borough, and the other to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, both of which request that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize and direct the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the proceedings for opening Westchester avenue, between the Bronx river and Main street, to prepare and file a partial report of damages caused by the said proceeding.

The opening of Westchester avenue was authorized on February 6, 1901, and the oaths of the Commissioners were filed on January 17, 1902. On December 31, 1901, by a resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, 50 per cent. of the cost of this proceeding was placed upon the City at large. On August 18, 1903, the grading of the street was authorized, and at the same time a resolution was adopted providing for vesting title in the City on October 15, 1903.

The petition now submitted bears six signatures, and recites that the work of grading has been advanced, and that for the purpose of carrying out the same the buildings within the lines of the street have been sold, depriving the owners of the same of their use and necessitating the raising of money to buy them in and move them back from the street lines. It also recites that the petitioners have been called upon to pay interest charges on mortgages and rentals to the City, and are unable to obtain loans upon the property by reason of having been deprived of title to a portion of the same. These proceedings affect a length of over two miles of Westchester avenue, through practically all of which distance an old street was in use, the same having a width of from 50 to 70 feet, and probably averaging over 60 feet. Under the rule of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of July 25, 1902, it is probable that the City would have assumed a share of the expense approximately agreeing with that named in the resolution of the Board of Public Improvements already alluded to, the street having a width of 100 feet. Under the proceedings thirty-three (33) buildings are either wholly or partially taken, and I believe there can be no question as to the probability of a hardship having been inflicted upon the owners of the same.

Upon inquiry at the office of the Corporation Counsel I am advised that the Commissioners have not yet made up the awards, and probably will not do so before late in the coming fall.

In my judgment the circumstances detailed afford good reason for granting the relief desired.

REPORT No. 2318.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is submitted a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Morrisania District, Borough of The Bronx, on June 30, 1904, providing for changing the present established grade of Spuyten Duyvil road at the two overhead crossings of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, which are shown upon the plan accompanying the resolution. These changes are proposed for the reason that, in changing the line of the railroad by throwing out the curve at Kingsbridge, and in changing the motive power from steam to electricity, it has been found that a few inches more of head room are required at both of these bridges. Neither of these crossings were affected by the plan changing the location of the railroad and eliminating certain grade crossings, which was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 4, 1903, under the provisions of chapter 423 of the Laws of 1903. The changes are both slight, providing in the case of the easterly bridge that the bridge floor shall be raised 1.74 feet, and that the floor of the westerly bridge shall be raised 0.57 feet. This will in no way damage any of the abutting property, and it is recommended that the proposed changes be approved after the necessary public hearing.

Technical description and plan for such hearing are herewith submitted.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, deeming it for the public interest so to do, proposes to change the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grade of Spuyten Duyvil road at the two crossings of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, more particularly described as follows:

1. The grade of the floor of the bridge across the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad at the eastern crossing of Spuyten Duyvil road to be 26.74 feet above mean high-water datum, in place of 25 feet as on the filed map.

2. The grade of the floor of the bridge across the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad at the western crossing of Spuyten Duyvil road to be 25.57 feet above mean high-water datum, in place of 25 feet as on the filed map.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed change at a meeting of the Board to be held in the City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the 11th day of November, 1904, at 10.30 o'clock A. M.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions and a notice to all persons affected thereby that the proposed change will be considered at a meeting of the Board to be held at the aforesaid time and place, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 11th day of November, 1904.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

APPROACH TO BRIDGE AT PROSPECT AVENUE AND SEELEY STREET, BROOKLYN.

The following communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, report of the Chief Engineer and protest were presented:

SEPTEMBER 21, 1904.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—On June 17, 1904, there was adopted by your Honorable Board a resolution changing the map of the city by laying out as a park approach to the bridge at Prospect place and Seeley street, in the Twenty-ninth Ward, in this borough, property lying on the east and west sides of Prospect avenue, between Seeley street and Vanderbilt street, more particularly described in a technical description which was made part of the resolution.

The Seeley street bridge, which was made necessary because of the change of grade in Prospect avenue, is a handsome structure, and the approaches to it, provided for in your resolution of June 17, will really be small parks, and should therefore be paid for by the City, in accordance with the custom of your Board in these matters. I would therefore request that the Board adopt a resolution providing for the acquisition, according to the usual form, of these park approaches to the bridge, as described in the change of map resolution of June 17, 1904.

REPORT No. 2349.

SEPTEMBER 24, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—In the accompanying communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated September 21, 1904, he asks that the necessary steps be taken to acquire title to the small parks adjacent to the bridge over Prospect avenue, on the line of Seeley street, which parks were laid out by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 17, 1904, after a public hearing; and that, following the practice of the City in the purchase of small parks, the entire expense of their acquisition be borne by the City at large.

The two small parks referred to are triangular areas, one on each side of Prospect avenue, lying immediately south of the bridge, and they were laid out in order that the handsome concrete-steel structure recently erected at this point should not be entirely hidden, and that easy access might be had from Prospect avenue to Seeley street, the latter street crossing the former by this overhead bridge. One of these parcels is some 220 feet in length and the other about 160 feet, and they have a combined area of about 14,750 feet, or one-third of an acre, while their present assessed value is \$2,700.

In my report to the Board, recommending the laying out of these small park areas, I stated that "while the laying out of such an approach would be of general public benefit, it would also be very advantageous to the property in the immediate neighborhood, and it would, in my judgment, be a fair distribution of expense if the City were to bear one-half the cost and if the remaining half were to be assessed upon the property benefited. While the distribution of expense for acquiring such a bridge approach would not be determined until proceedings were begun for that purpose, I believe that the Board would desire to have in view some definite policy before acting upon the recommendation of the Local Board." Whether or not the Board was influenced by this statement and had in mind the following of such a course if the parks were laid out, I am unable to state. I consider that, in view of the fact that the bridge was very properly built without any assessment, and Seeley street was repaved also without assessment, and that the City adopted an unusual course in assuming a portion of the expense of paving Prospect avenue, all of which improvements have resulted in great benefit to this immediate neighborhood, it would not be unfair to ask the owners of the property so benefited to bear a portion of the expense of acquiring these small parks. In fact, when the project of laying them out was first suggested, it was definitely stated that the property-owners would be willing to assume a portion of the expense. It is true that it has been for some years the policy of the City to pay all of the expense of acquiring small parks, and the Board may conclude to adhere to that policy in this case, although it cannot be denied that the parks will be local in their benefit and are designed to add to the attractiveness of the bridge recently built, rather than to furnish a breathing space or playground for the general public.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—A few months ago the Local Board of the Borough of Brooklyn, for the Flatbush District, passed a resolution instituting proceedings for the taking of land for "a park approach" to the bridge spanning Seeley street and Prospect avenue in the Twenty-ninth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn.

At the hearing before the Local Board a strong opposition was made by the owners of land on the ground that land in that vicinity was under a number of very heavy assessments for street openings, grading, paving, flagging, sewer, etc., all of which had been imposed within the last twelve or fifteen months. Some of the property has been confiscated by the burden of these assessments. These facts were clearly brought to the attention of the Local Board at the time, and they passed a resolution instituting a proceeding on the distinct understanding that the entire expense was to be borne by the City. It is also the fact that the members of the Board, then in session, further made the announcement that they would not vote for it otherwise. We have just been informed indirectly that your Board had either passed or were about to pass a resolution putting one-half of the expense on the property-owners. Such action would unquestionably be in violation of good faith in the matter and would mean the imposing of additional burdens upon the owners of property in that vicinity, who are already assessed for more than they can bear.

The project should be entirely given up and abandoned unless it can be carried through at the expense of the City.

If there is any question in regard to the matter, an opportunity for a hearing should be had upon it, and the Board should rescind the resolution, and an opportunity should also be given us on the subject, of which hearing we should be pleased to have special notice.

ACQUIRING PARK AT WEST ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY-FIRST STREET AND AMSTERDAM AVENUE, MANHATTAN.

The following communication from the Finance Department, and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

SIR—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held on March 25, 1904 (Public Improvement Calendar) adopted a resolution laying out a park on Amsterdam avenue, West One Hundred and Fifty-first and One Hundred and Fifty-second streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, a part of said resolution reading as follows:

"The said park shall include that portion of the block bounded on the south by West One Hundred and Fifty-first street; on the west by Amsterdam avenue; on the north by West One Hundred and Fifty-second street, and on the east by the line between the property now owned by The City of New York, and Lot No. 62, Block 2066, as shown on the land map of The City of New York, and the prolongation of the southerly part of this boundary line until it intersects the northerly line of West One Hundred and Fifty-first street."

The City of New York is the owner of all the property within the area of the said park, with the exception of the piece shown green on the map which is hereto annexed. The property now owned by the City was acquired for aqueduct purposes, and was turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by said Board.

The owner of the irregular plot of land shown green on the map is one Timothy Donovan. Negotiations have been under way for the acquisition of this land at private sale, but we have been unable to agree with the owner as to the price, and I would respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt a resolution authorizing the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of all the property within the area of this new park site not now owned by The City of New York.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—In the accompanying communication addressed to the Comptroller by the Appraiser of Real Estate of the Department of Finance, it is stated that it has been found impossible to acquire at private sale the property not owned by the City which is included in the public park lying on the westerly side of Amsterdam avenue, between West One Hundred and Fifty-first and West One Hundred and Fifty-second streets, and it is recommended that condemnation proceedings be instituted.

The park referred to was laid out by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 25, 1904, after a public hearing. The greater part of the land included within this park is already owned by the City, and it was thought that the remaining portion could be purchased at private sale. This, however, appears to be impossible, and, acting upon the suggestion of the Appraiser of Real Estate of the Comptroller's office, it is recommended that proceedings be instituted to acquire title to as much of this public park as is not already owned by the City. The present assessed value of the parcel to be acquired is \$15,000.

CLOSING BRADLEY AVENUE, QUEENS.

The following petition was presented:

JUNE 30, 1904.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—The Trustees of St. Patrick's Cathedral, as Custodians of Calvary Cemetery, being desirous of improving, at as early a date as possible, the streets and avenues about the cemetery property, located in the Borough of Queens, respectfully petition your Board to adopt a resolution closing the road known as Bradley avenue, from a point located at the intersection of Howard street and said road, extending to its intersection with Review avenue, in the First Ward of the Borough of Queens. The Cemetery now owns all of the property lying on both sides of Bradley avenue, between the points to be closed.

The Cemetery also owns all the right and title to Bradley avenue, between such points, as shown by deeds now on record.

Neither the old Town of Newtown, nor Long Island City, nor The City of New York, has ever acquired legal title to the street.

Bradley avenue is now and has been for a long time impassable for wagons of any kind; and in fact were it made passable, graded and put in good condition, it would not be of any material benefit to the public at large, by reason of its peculiar location, and of the fact that a much shorter and easier route can be used.

As shown on the map, Review avenue is 60 feet wide, and if opened and graded would be the most direct route between Thirty-fourth street Ferry and Penny Bridge, these being the two points which Bradley avenue is supposed to reach.

In consideration of the closing of Bradley avenue the Cemetery hereby offers and will undertake and agree to open and grade Review avenue at its own expense between the points of Bradley avenue to be closed so as to make a direct means of communication between the Borough of Queens and the upper section of the Borough of Brooklyn.

JOSEPH RODMAN DRAKE PARK, THE BRONX.

The following report from the Chief Engineer was presented:
REPORT No. 2350.

SEPTEMBER 26, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on September 16 a public hearing was given on the proposition to lay out a small park to be known as the Joseph Rodman Drake Park, and a street adjacent thereto, in the Borough of The Bronx. No action was taken, but the matter was referred back to me with instructions to report to the Board some reasonable plan for the rearrangement of the street lines which would result in a park of moderate size, and at the same time preserve the cemetery.

It will be seen upon reference to the final maps of the Borough of The Bronx that there are two public places already laid out in this immediate vicinity. One of these is bounded by the Eastern Boulevard, Hallock street and Hunt's Point road, and contains 54,318 square feet; the other is bounded by the Eastern Boulevard, Hunt's Point road, East Bay avenue and Whittier street, and contains 118,492 square feet. Both of these public places have a combined area of 3,967 acres, and form a rectangle, which is divided into two unequal parts by Hunt's Point road. The proposition before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was to lay out another small park separated from the larger of the two small parks above referred to by Whittier street, and bounded on the south by a new street which it was proposed to lay out for the purpose. This would only partly accomplish the object sought. It is true that it would preserve the grave of the poet Drake, but it would leave a large portion of the cemetery within the lines of Whittier street. The preservation of the cemetery in its entirety might be accomplished in another way. The smaller of the two parks above referred to, that is, the one bounded by the Eastern Boulevard, Hallock street and Hunt's Point road, could be discontinued. If, then, the entire rectangular block bounded by the Eastern Boulevard, Whittier street, East Bay avenue, and Longfellow street, were laid out as a public park and added to the larger of the two small parks now laid out, we would have an area of about 5,705 acres. This would mean an increase in the park area of 1.738 acres, and as there is another small park now laid out at the foot of Hunt's Point road, such an increase in park reservation seems uncalled for. It is therefore suggested that there be laid out between Longfellow street and Hunt's Point road a new street 50 feet in width and distant 100 feet northerly from East Bay avenue. The larger area, bounded by Eastern Boulevard, Hunt's Point road, East Bay avenue and Longfellow street would then be divided as follows:

2.489 acres in the proposed Joseph Rodman Drake Park, including the entire cemetery; 0.585 acres in the new street parallel with East Bay avenue; 2.631 acres to be left available for building.

The result of this change would be to reduce the park reservations now on the map of the Borough of The Bronx about 1.5 acres. The Board may feel that, instead of making this reduction, it would be better to omit the new street which is proposed

and leave the entire area bounded by Hunt's Point road, East Bay avenue, Longfellow street and Eastern Boulevard in a public park of 5,705 acres, an increase of 1¾ acres over the present park areas.

An alternative technical description for these two plans is herewith submitted, with the recommendation that a public hearing be given.

3. A new street to be laid out between Longfellow street and Hunt's Point road, the southerly side of such street to be parallel with East Bay avenue and distant 200 feet northerly therefrom, and the northerly side of the said street to be parallel with the southerly side and 50 feet northerly therefrom.

4. Whittier street, as laid out upon section 5 of the final maps of the Borough of The Bronx, to be discontinued and closed between the southerly side of Eastern Boulevard and the northerly side of East Bay avenue.

5. A public park to be laid out, bounded on the west by Longfellow street, on the north by the Eastern Boulevard, on the east by Hunt's Point road and on the south by the new street 50 feet in width above laid out.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed change at a meeting of the Board, to be held in the City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the 11th day of November, 1904, at 10.30 o'clock A. M.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions and a notice to all persons affected thereby that the proposed change will be considered at a meeting of the Board, to be held at the aforesaid time and place, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 11th day of November, 1904.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on July 30, 1903, initiating proceedings for filling to grade the lot located at the southwest corner of Ninety-first street and Third avenue, known as Lot No. 52, Block 1079, Thirtieth Ward Map.

This resolution is one of those which were returned to the Borough President early in the present year, and it has again been presented by him, but without comment to indicate the attitude of the present borough officials in the matter of the proposed improvement.

Ninety-first street is not in use, but Third avenue has been paved with asphalt. Some of the property in this section has been improved, but no buildings have been erected upon the lot referred to in the resolution, the surface of which ranges from street grade down to a point about ten feet lower; this condition results in the collection and pondage of surface water, which is objected to by 17 occupants of property in the immediate vicinity, whose petition accompanies the resolution. This lot has dimensions of 100 feet by 300 feet.

I believe there is no question but that the conditions described constitute a nuisance which may be justly objected to, and would recommend the authorization of the work proposed, the estimated cost of which is \$3,300. The assessed valuation of the property is \$7,000.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on October 1, 1903, initiating proceedings for grading Ninety-first street, between Second and Third avenues.

This resolution reached the Board of Estimate and Apportionment last year, but too late to secure consideration. It has again been presented by the President of the Borough, but without comment to indicate the attitude of the present borough officials in the matter.

Proceedings to open Ninety-first street, between First and Fifth avenues, were authorized by the Board of Public Improvements on December 19, 1900, and the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were filed on March 8, 1902. Title to the block between Fourth and Fifth avenues was vested in the City on May 1, 1903, and on May 20, 1904, a resolution was adopted providing for vesting title to that portion of it between Fourth avenue and the westerly side of Third avenue on July 1, 1904. The roadway is not in use, and at the Third avenue end the property is very much below the grade of the adjoining section. Another resolution has been adopted by the Local Board providing for grading the adjoining property on Third avenue, which is frequently flooded, to the annoyance of the population in the immediate vicinity.

Under the belief that the curbing has been omitted for the reason that the principal object of this resolution is to remove the nuisance by providing for a proper drainage of the street and the adjoining property, favorable action is recommended. The work to be done comprises 4,600 cubic yards of grading, at an estimated cost of \$1,800, while the assessed valuation of the property to be benefited is \$29,830.

I would recommend that title to Ninety-first street, between First avenue and the westerly side of Third avenue, be vested in the City on October 15, 1904.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Morrisania District, Borough of The Bronx, on June 30, 1904, initiating proceedings for regulating and flagging the easterly side of Walton avenue, between One Hundred and Fiftieth and One Hundred and Fifty-first streets, and both sides of the avenue, between One Hundred and Fifty-first street and the bridge over the Port Morris Railroad.

A similar resolution was adopted last year by the Local Board, but it reached the Board of Estimate and Apportionment too late to receive consideration. The names of One Hundred and Fiftieth and One Hundred and Fifty-first streets have been changed to East One Hundred and Fiftieth and East One Hundred and Fifty-first streets, but I believe there can be no possible misunderstanding as to the intention of this resolution.

Title to the street has been vested in the City under deed of cession. The roadway through that portion of the street comprised within the limits of this resolution has been curbed and paved with asphalt. The intention of this resolution is to provide sidewalks where the same are now lacking between East One Hundred and Fiftieth street and the railroad, and to grade the sidewalk space. The abutting property through a large part of the length has been thickly built up, and the authorization of this improvement, which, in my judgment, is a desirable one, is recommended.

The work to be done comprises the following:

270 cubic yards earth and rock excavation.

2,900 square feet of flagging.

The estimated cost of the improvement is \$1,200, and the assessed valuation of the property to be benefited is \$42,675.

This improvement, in my judgment, is a proper one, and its authorization is hereby recommended, the work to be done comprising the following:

31,000 cubic yards embankment.

5,100 linear feet curbing.

The estimated cost of construction is \$19,200 and the assessed valuation of the property to be benefited is \$59,000.

I would recommend that title to that portion of Sixth avenue (Bartow street), between the northerly side of Webster avenue and the southerly side of Graham avenue, be vested in the City on October 15, 1904.

Title to that part of the street between Broadway and Graham avenue was vested in the City on August 1, 1904, by a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 3, 1904, in connection with the regulating and grading of the street, which was authorized on that date. The way seems clear, therefore, to authorize the construction of the sewer, and it is recommended that the resolution of the Local Board be approved.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Morrisania District, Borough of The Bronx, adopted on June 30, 1904, initiating proceedings for grading Hunts Point Road from the Southern Boulevard to the East river, the portion between the Southern Boulevard and Bryant avenue to be improved for the full width of the street, 100 feet, and the portion between Bryant avenue and the East river to be improved for a width of 80 feet, or 40 feet on each side of the centre line.

A resolution providing for a similar improvement was presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 12, 1903, but was on that date referred back to the President of the Borough, for the reason that the improvement was not sufficiently described. At that time a protest was made against the improvement on the ground that it was premature. On July 31 following a resolution similar to one now offered was presented, but not acted upon.

The conditions were described in my report upon the original resolution bearing date of May 21, 1903, from which I quote the following:

"This proceeding includes the entire length of Hunt's Point road, which is about one and one-half miles. The road at present in use, and known as Hunt's Point road, is an old country lane, with stone walls on each side, but it does not correspond in its location with the street laid down upon the map of the City, and which it is proposed to improve, the latter not being indicated on the ground, except by an embankment over the sewer, which has already been built across the meadow land. With the exception of Lafayette avenue, none of the streets shown upon the adopted map of the locality has been graded or is in use, and the improvement now proposed would be an initial one for a large district."

I see no reason why the improvement should not be authorized, and would recommend such action, the work to be done comprising the following:

40,900 cubic yards earth and rock excavation.
174,700 cubic yards filling.

The estimated cost of construction is \$70,000, and the assessed valuation of the real estate to be benefited is \$183,944.

The Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Office of the Mayor, City of New York:

DEAR SIR—I have just been informed that a hearing is to be held on September 16 next in regard to the question of regulating and grading Hunt's Point road, between the Southern Boulevard and the East river.

As one of the largest property-owners (holding about 50 acres) affected by this proceeding, I beg to protest most strongly against this work being done at the present time.

The region through which Hunt's Point road passes is occupied entirely by country residences, farms and vacant fields and I am convinced that the time has not yet come when the value of these lands will be increased by the regulating and grading of this street at all in proportion to the enormous cost to the owners of such a work.

My judgment in this matter is confirmed, not only by experts in whom I have every confidence, but by the results shown when other streets in the neighborhood have been regulated and graded. The cost to property has been enormous and the value of the lands has scarcely appreciated at all; in fact, it is practically unsalable.

That my meaning may be perfectly clear, let me state that at the proper time I shall not in any way oppose this street opening, but at present I think it uncalled for by the needs of the people, an unnecessary expense to the property-owners, and one which will produce little or no increased value to the property itself.

What that district now requires to improve its land values is better streets rather than more of them.

CHANGE OF PLANS FOR BROADWAY SEWER, THE BRONX.

DEAR SIR—I inclose herewith, in the matter of the contract executed December 3, 1899, for constructing sewers and appurtenances in Broadway, from the City line to Riverdale avenue, thence to Exterior street, East One Hundred and Ninety-second street, and through East One Hundred and Ninety-second street to the Harlem river, a plan showing proposed modification of the plan of Broadway sewer at the crossing of the tracks of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Branch of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, providing for temporary and permanent connections between the northerly and southerly portions of said sewer, the temporary connections to remain until the railroad tracks are removed, under provisions of chapter 423 of the Laws of 1903, whereupon the permanent connections should be built.

I respectfully request that the matter be submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval, and inclose also a copy of the report made by Mr. Charles H. Graham, Engineer in Charge of Sewers, thereon.

REPORT No. 2320.

AUGUST 25, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—With the accompanying letter from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated August 2, there is submitted a plan showing proposed temporary connections between the sections of the large double sewer on Broadway, north of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Road, and south of the same. There is also submitted a report of the Engineer in charge of sewers, Borough of The Bronx, explaining the necessity for this modification of plan and describing it in detail.

The contract for the sewer was made on December 13, 1899, and the outlet and that portion of the sewer north of the railroad above referred to have been completed. The sewer is a very important one, being a double one, equivalent to two circular sewers 15 feet in diameter. When the contract was made there was no immediate prospect of the removal of the tracks of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad, and the contract provides for changing the section of the sewer under these tracks by substituting one very wide sewer of less depth, the roof being made of steel and concrete, to support the tracks. Under the provisions of chapter 423 of the Laws of 1903, these tracks are to be removed to a location along the northerly bank of the Harlem River Ship Canal. It will, therefore, be possible to carry the double 15-foot sewer across the space now occupied by the railroad tracks, a construction which will be much more satisfactory, will give a greater capacity and will be more readily maintained. This, however, cannot be done until the tracks shall have been first removed. Meanwhile the sewer has no outlet, is about half full of stagnant water and there are many complaints of the nuisance caused by this condition.

The Borough President proposes to build two bulkheads across each section of the sewer and connect them by 36-inch pipes. While these pipes will, of course, together have a capacity very much less than the sewer, it will answer for the house drainage now passing through the sewer, and the storm water will not be accommodated until after the completion of the sewer at its full size.

I know of no reason why the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should pass upon this detail, unless it may be owing to the fact that the contract for changing the location of the railroad was made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment pursuant to the law above referred to. The contract price for building the sewer is for a lump sum. The construction of the double tunnel will be less costly for the contractor than the original design of a very wide and shallow sewer with a steel and concrete roof under the railroad track. There is little doubt that the contractor will save enough money in the final construction to compensate him for the building of the temporary connections.

I know of no further action now required, unless it may be the formal approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the plan proposed by the Borough President, leaving the details to be arranged by himself. I would recommend that such approval be given.

For regulating and grading, setting curbstones and flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary in Villa avenue, between the Southern Boulevard and Van Cortlandt avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York.

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

REPORT No. 2191.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Morrisania District, Borough of The Bronx, adopted on June 30, 1904, initiating proceedings for grading, curbing and flagging Villa avenue, between the Southern Boulevard and Van Cortlandt avenue.

A similar resolution was adopted by the Local Board last year, but the same reached the Board of Estimate and Apportionment too late to receive consideration.

The improvement affects a length of three blocks of Villa avenue, title to which has been legally acquired. A rough, unshaped roadway is in use, which in places is about ten feet below the established grade. In sections, this roadway is almost impassable. The abutting property has been improved by the erection of a number of frame dwellings, in which there is housed a very large population, consisting principally of the laborers employed on the Jerome Park Reservoir.

This improvement is, in my judgment, a desirable one, and its authorization is recommended, the work to be done comprising the following:

5,500 cubic yards earth and rock excavation.

10,000 cubic yards filling.

3,100 linear feet curbing.

12,300 square feet flagging.

The estimated cost of construction is \$18,000 and the assessed valuation of the property to be benefited is \$188,440.

And this Board does hereby determine that no portion of the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but that the whole of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said local improvement.

Perforated Pipes in Cellars and Sub-cellars.
All perforated pipes are to be of wrought iron or steel, and capable of withstanding a pressure of 300 pounds to the square inch.

They shall be suspended with proper hangers, not less than 6 inches below the ceiling and parallel thereto, running full depth of building and placed 12½ feet apart on centres and 6 feet from side walls, to be securely fastened and properly braced to withstand vibration.

Pipe shall be 1½ inches internal diameter perforated with 1-16-inch holes; holes to be on the quarters 2 inches apart longitudinally and to be staggered, making 24 holes to the running foot of pipe. Holes must be drilled, not punched.

These 1½-inch pipes to be connected with a feed pipe 4 inches internal diameter, placed close to and parallel to front or side walls of building and connected by and with a 4-inch pipe terminating outside of said wall in a 3-inch Siamese connection, to be fitted with proper clapper valve or valves. One Siamese connection to furnish water to no more than a total of 400 feet of perforated pipe. No single line to be longer than 100 feet.

Sub-cellars require separate equipment.

Cast-iron fittings must not be used.
All unnecessary bends will be avoided, and where needed such bends or curves to be easy and of a radius not less than six times the diameter of the pipe.

A suitable iron plate on outside of building, with raised letters, must be fastened to the wall, or other approved place near cellar connection, to read: "THIS CONNECTION LEADS TO PERFORATED PIPES IN CELLAR."

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
