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COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock a. m., on Monday, September 11, 1905.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Patrick Keenan, Chamberlain, and Charles V. Fornes, President, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held July 14, 1905, were approved as printed.

On motion of the Deputy Comptroller, John Korb, Jr., was elected Secretary pro tem.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, requesting authority to make and serve upon the owners of the land lying between Fourth and Fifth street, East river, an offer to purchase the same for \$25,500:

NEW YORK, July 13, 1905.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—On December 28, 1904, a resolution was adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorizing the service of an offer of \$15,000 upon the owners for the purchase of the bulkhead rights and appurtenances between the north side of Fourth street and the south side of Fifth street, on the East river, 193 feet more or less, that being the assessed valuation of the property.

The offer of \$15,000 per annum was duly served upon the owners, who failed to either accept or reject the same; the matter was then forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to acquire the property by condemnation.

When the request of this Department was taken up by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the owners of the property appeared before that Board, and later the matter was referred back to me as to the question of including, in addition to the bulkhead rights, the upland lying within the lines of the proposed marginal street at that point.

In this connection, I am of the opinion that it would be wise to now acquire the upland not now owned by the City within the lines of the marginal street, between Fourth and Fifth streets, East river, and would therefore respectfully request that you authorize me to make and serve upon the owners an offer of \$25,500 for the property which is described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the northerly line of East Fourth street where the westerly line of the marginal street, wharf or place, established in 1888, intersects the same, said point being distant easterly from the easterly line of Lewis street 482.92 feet, measured along the northerly line of East Fourth street, and running thence northerly and along the westerly line of the said marginal street, wharf or place 207.71 feet to a point in the southerly line of East Fifth street, distant 420.44 feet easterly from the easterly line of Lewis street, measured along said southerly line of East Fifth street and running thence easterly and along the easterly prolongation of the southerly line of East Fifth street 75 feet to the present crib bulkhead or line of solid filling.

Thence southerly and along said crib bulkhead 194.18 feet to the northerly line of East Fourth street.

Thence westerly and along said northerly line of East Fourth street 24.31 feet to the point or place of beginning, the herein described area containing about 9,538 square feet.

The offer of \$15,000, as authorized December 28, 1904, covers the bulkhead rights between the north side of Fourth street and the south side of Fifth street, East river, 193 feet more or less, and necessarily includes any and all land under water, or appurtenances, outshore of the present bulkhead and not now owned by The City of New York.

The Department of Taxes and Assessments states that the upland property is known on the records of that Department as Vol 1, Section 2, Block 359, Lots Nos. 21 and 22, \$5,000 each, and part of Lots Nos. 20, 23, 27, 28 and 29, assessed at \$15,500 as apportioned.

A map showing the property sought to be acquired by the City is transmitted herewith.

—an offer to purchase the same for the sum of twenty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$25,500), and in the event of said offer not being accepted, the Commissioner of Docks is hereby authorized to direct the Corporation Counsel to take legal proceedings to acquire the property, as further provided in said section.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Bridges relative to a renewal of the lease of premises at No. 36 Jackson avenue, Long Island City, Borough of Queens:

SIR—The lease made between William Richensteen and The City of New York for the entire second floor, consisting of one room having an area of 535 square feet, of the two-story brick building, known as No. 36 Jackson avenue, Long Island City, will expire on August 31.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held July 14, 1905, adopted three resolutions authorizing the leases of certain premises in the Borough of Queens, in order to establish a paid fire department in that borough.

In regard to the lease from the Oceanus Hook and Ladder Company 1, in the description of the property, the avenue upon which the premises are located appears to be "Benjamin avenue," while the correct name should be "Bayview avenue."

The company also desires to have inserted in the lease that the City should make interior repairs, which, in my opinion, is only a fair request, in view of the fact that the Fire Department will have the jurisdiction over the entire building.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the resolution in regard to the lease of the premises from the Oceanus Hook and Ladder Company 1 be amended by inserting the words "Bayview avenue," instead of "Benjamin avenue," and by inserting the clause: "The City to make all of the interior repairs."

In regard to the lease from the Seaside Hose and Engine Company 1, from the lease it appears that there is a two-story building used as an extension, while I am informed from the company that in reality there is only a one-story extension building. This company also desires the City to make interior repairs.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the resolution adopted for the lease of the premises from the Seaside Hose and Engine Company 1 be amended by inserting "together with the one-story building used as a feed house extension," instead of "together with the two-story building used as a feed house extension"; and further that the resolution be amended by inserting the clause that "the City should make all of the interior repairs."

In regard to the lease from the Atlantic Engine Company 1, this company desires that the City make the interior repairs, which request I deem reasonable, as heretofore stated. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the resolution adopted authorizing the lease of the premises from the Atlantic Engine Company 1 be amended by inserting the clause, "the City to make all of the interior repairs."

This is for the Central Union Gas Company.

SIR—The Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in a communication under date of July 7, 1905, requests the authority to lease, for the purpose of providing photometric stations for the testing of the illuminating quality of gas, the following premises:

1. Premises third floor of No. 407 Richmond terrace, New Brighton. Owner, James E. Mulligan, No. 407 Richmond terrace, New Brighton. Agent, Augustus Acker, New Brighton. Rent, \$400 per annum, including heat and janitorial service.

2. Premises second floor of No. 3261 Third avenue. Owner, H. Ruhl, No. 842 East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street. Agent, John C. Borgstede, of No. 3273 Third avenue. Rent, \$40 per month, without heat.

I have had an examination made of these premises and beg to report as follows:

No. 1 consists of the third floor of the three-story brick building No. 407 Richmond terrace, New Brighton, Staten Island, the lower portions of the building being occupied by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company. The rent asked, \$400 per annum, including heat and janitor service, while full value, is not excessive. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of the third floor of the building No. 407 Richmond terrace, New Brighton, Staten Island, for a period of one year from the date of occupation, at an annual rental of \$400, payable quarterly, lessor to furnish heat and janitor service. Lessor, James E. Mulligan.

No. 2 consists of the second floor of the premises No. 3261 Third avenue, Borough of The Bronx. This is a two-story building and the lower portion is occupied by a grocer. The rent asked is \$40 per month, without heat, which while full value is not excessive. The President of the Board of Education transmits a list of halls which will be used for the free lecture system during the lecture season from October, 1905, to May, 1906, and requests that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing the Board of Education to engage the halls scheduled in his communication, at the rates mentioned.

The Deputy Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a sale of the City's interest in the Tax Sale Certificate No. 7533 for the non-payment of taxes on Lot No. 156, old Block 76, new Block 40, in the Twenty-fifth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn:

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The City of New York, at a tax sale held on the 22d day of July, 1903, purchased premises known as Lot No. 156 in old Block 76, new Block 40, in the Twenty-fifth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, for the sum of \$472.87, that price being the amount of the Board of Assessors' decision, dated May 9, 1885, for \$148.50, and the interest on said amount from said date to the day of the sale, at 12 per cent. per annum. There is due and unpaid also against said lot the sum of \$356.60 for taxes and assessments, from the year 1883 to date.

Lot No. 156 is an interior lot, being part of the old Brooklyn and Jamaica road, which is situated in the middle of the block bounded by Bainbridge street, Chauncey street, Ralph avenue and Patchen avenue, and does not touch the street in any way.

Recently a request for a release of the City's interest to a portion of this property was presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for action thereon. The petitioner showed that he owned a piece of property fronting on Chauncey street, extending back to the centre line of the Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike, and his predecessor in the title had acquired a deed from the old City of Brooklyn to that portion of the Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike lying south of the said centre line of the road in the rear of his lot fronting on Chauncey street.

The purchaser of the property from the City neglected to pay the taxes then due on the property, and that parcel, with others, was put up and sold, and The City of New York again purchased, as above stated.

It is impossible now to apportion this property since it has become a tax sale, and the petitioner has agreed to purchase the entire certificate at a fair market price. I am of the opinion that if the City receives the sum of \$300 for its right, title and interest in the certificate, which is equivalent to the amount of the Board of Assessors' decision, with interest thereon at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum to date, that the City's interest will be protected, and it will receive fair compensation.

I therefore respectfully recommend, in accordance with section 221 of the Greater New York Charter, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a sale of its right, title and interest in certificate registered in the office of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears, in the Borough of Brooklyn, by the number 7533, in Volume 9, Liber 83, which was delivered to The City of New York July 22, 1903, being for the sale of the non-payment of taxes, and being known as Lot No. 156, in old Block 76, new Block 40, in the Twenty-fifth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, for the sum of \$300, upon the following terms and conditions:

The purchaser at sale shall pay the full amount at the time of the sale when the certificate, duly assigned by the proper officer, shall be immediately ready for delivery; that said certificate shall be assigned and be taken by the purchaser without recourse.

I would report that it is planned to erect the extension to the armory on the plot of ground recently acquired under resolution of the Armory Board, dated December 29, 1904, and concurred in by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at their meeting of January 11, 1905, appropriating \$100,000 for the purchase of a plot of ground at the rear of the present Armory Building, said plot being like the site of the present armory, the full width of the block, between Jefferson and Putnam avenues, and adding to the present site a depth of 100 feet along Putnam avenue, and 108 feet along Jefferson avenue.

The City has now acquired title to all the eleven parcels comprising this plot, and the buildings thereon have been sold, the buyers agreeing to remove everything above the cellar floors.

The plans and specifications for the proposed addition to the armory, prepared by Walter E. Parfitt, architect, and transmitted to the Board with the above resolution, give a clear idea of the nature of the proposed addition.

The rear wall of the present drill hall is to be removed, and the drill hall, which is about 200 feet wide, is to be lengthened about 96 feet. Back of the new rear wall of the enlarged drill hall there are to be two low extensions to the building covering the remainder of the plot. The first extension is one story in height, 4 feet in width and 100 feet long, extending from the centre of the lot to Putnam avenue. This is occupied by chambers for the storage of combustibles. The second extension is three stories in height, 12 feet in width and 100 feet long, extending from the centre line of the plot to Jefferson avenue. This is to be used for storage of ordnance, etc. These two extensions being low, afford opportunity for lighting the drill hall by means of windows above them in the rear wall of the drill hall. They are to be of fireproof construction throughout, and the doors from the chambers of combustibles to the drill hall are to be metal covered.

The specifications provide for the erection of a temporary wooden wall to protect the end of the present drill hall when the present rear wall is removed and during the construction of this new addition. The new addition and extensions are of

brick, faced on the outside with a reddish brown face brick and trimmed with terra cotta to match the present building. The water table will be of bluestone. On the inside, the walls of the new portion of the drill hall are faced with a light buff vitrified brick to match the color of the interior of the present drill hall. The galleries along the side of the present drill hall are to be carried around the sides and end of the new addition and a second gallery built across the end, the construction being the same as the present galleries, with wrought iron railings, wooden beams and floors. It is permitted to take down the present gallery at the present rear wall of the drill hall, and to re-erect it at the new rear wall. The two rear galleries will be suspended from one of the roof trusses. The raised steps at the sides of the present drill hall will be extended along the sides of the new addition, but not across the rear.

Two of the old stairways will be removed and five new ones constructed of wrought and cast iron, with wooden treads.

The doors and trim of the additions are made generally of ash and to match the doors at present in the building. The windows of this new addition are to have wrought iron guards to match the windows of the present building.

The roof is to be supported on arched steel trusses; it is to be sheathed with wood and covered on the outside with composition felt. The roof is drained by copper leaders.

The specifications provide that the cellars of the old buildings on the site shall be filled in solidly with filling to the proper grade; into this stakes 20 inches long shall be driven every 24 inches, the tops being flush, with a 4-inch layer of good concrete laid on the earth. To the top of these stakes 3-inch by 3-inch locust sleepers are to be nailed and the space between them filled with concrete. This surface is to be coated with roofing cement or pitch and a double wooden floor, finished to match the present drill room floor, laid thereon.

The present boilers are deemed sufficient to heat the new addition, and the steam piping is to be extended to new radiators which are provided.

The gas piping is extended for the necessary lights.

The only plumbing called for is to provide the sewer outlets for the new leaders.

The design of this addition is as economical as the nature of the building will permit.

An appropriation of \$100,000 for this work appears to me reasonable and, in my opinion, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly concur in the resolution of the Armory Board of July 31, 1905, and authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of \$100,000, the proceeds to be used for the addition to the Thirteenth Regiment Armory in the Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with the plans and specifications submitted.

I would report that by resolution adopted by the Armory Board September 3, 1903, and concurred in by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at meeting held September 3, 1903, the contract for the erection of an Armory Building for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, located on the westerly side of First avenue, between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, Borough of Brooklyn, was awarded to James McFerran for \$342,000.

The plans and specifications of this contract on which work is proceeding, call for the interior of that portion of the armory known as the Administration Building to be plainly trimmed with cypress, with windows and doors of the same material.

It is planned by the Armory Board to order the omission of certain work, including all doors and trim, in the six division rooms and the reception room in the first story, and the ward room, lecture room, Captain's public and private office and lobby in the second story of the building, and make a proper deduction from the present contract for the work omitted. It is then the intention to advertise for bids and award a contract for the finishing of these rooms, as shown in plans and specifications prepared by the architects, Lord & Hewlett.

The work contemplated is as follows:

Division Rooms Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5, first floor, to have trim, wainscot, cornices and doors of oak, and book or trophy cases of oak, with oak backs and plate glass doors, with cupboards under. Glazed transoms over the doors to be provided. Platforms with oak rails to be built at end of each division room.

Southwest Division Room, Engineers, First Floor—Trim, wainscot, cornices and doors of oak; book or trophy cases of oak with plate glass doors. Glazed transoms over doors.

Reception Room, First Floor—High wainscot, doors, trim and cornice of oak; chimney to have limestone facing with limestone jambs and head. Limestone hearth for fireplace.

Ward Room, Second Floor—Trim and wainscot of oak; leather covered doors in south wall; oak doors in east wall and collapsible partition of eight leather covered doors between this and the lecture room. Limestone mantel and hearth, also jambs of fireplace of limestone.

Lecture Room, Second Floor—Oak doors, wainscot and trim.

Captain's Private Office, Second Floor—Oak wainscot and cornices. Veneered oak door.

Captain's Public Office—Oak door, wainscot and cornice. Color case with plate glass front. Oak mantel.

Lobby to Captain's Public Office—Oak trim wainscot and cornice. Ceiling lights overhead. The contractor is to provide a casement sash in the locker room, second story, and in Ordinance Officers' room, second story, with necessary hardware, also a small portable stair of oak.

Fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) is a suitable amount to appropriate for this work which is to be let by public competition, and the expenditure would appear to be necessary in order to make this building conform in style and finish with the other armories in the City.

In my opinion, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly concur in the resolution of the Armory Board of July 31, 1905, and authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of \$15,000, the proceeds to be applied to the alterations and improvements to the Armory Building of the second Battalion, Naval Militia, in accordance with the plans and specifications submitted.

IV.—That this petition is made in good faith and for the purpose of purchasing from The City of New York said portions of land herein stated.

Wherefore your petitioner prays that this matter be given immediate attention, and that his Honor Edward M. GROUT, Comptroller of The City of New York, cause all such steps and proceedings to be taken as may be necessary for the purpose of conveying said portions of the old Hunterfly road to your petitioner.

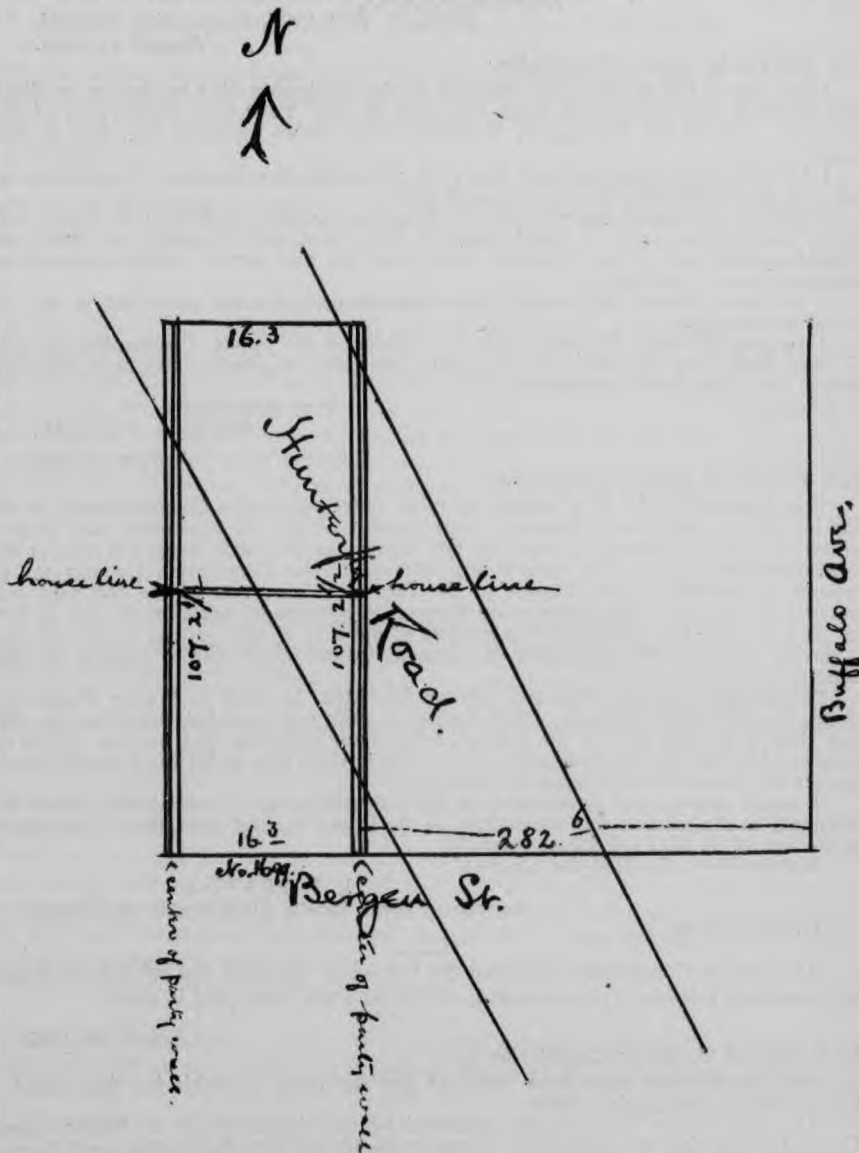

SIR—Sophia Pufahl, in a verified petition addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, requests a release of all that portion of the old Hunterfly road, long since closed, located within the area of property owned by her in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, City and State of New York, known as No. 1699 Bergen street, Borough of Brooklyn, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the northerly side of Bergen street, opposite the centre line of a party wall, distant 282 feet 6 inches westerly from the northwesterly corner of Bergen street and Buffalo avenue; running thence northerly parallel with Buffalo avenue and part of the distance through a party wall 107 feet 2½ inches; thence westerly parallel with Bergen street 16 feet 3 inches; thence southerly again parallel with Buffalo avenue and part of the distance through another party wall 107 feet 2½ inches to the northerly side of Bergen street, and thence easterly along the northerly side of Bergen street 16 feet 3 inches to the point of beginning.

It appears from an examination of the facts set forth in the petition that this application is in all respects similar to many which were granted by the former City of Brooklyn under resolutions of the Common Council of said City, and since consolidation by The City of New York under resolutions of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, for a nominal consideration, and is similar to a release granted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in a petition requested by Edmund H. Wright. (See Minutes Sinking Fund, 1904, page 348.)

I would respectfully recommend that this application be sent to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion as to whether the City's interest is material or a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner, and if he should certify that the City's interest is not material, then, pursuant to section 205 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly authorize a release or quit claim for a nominal consideration to Sophia Pufahl to all the right, title and interest of The City of New York in and to all that portion of the old Hunterfly road included within the lines of the premises heretofore described, upon the condition that the petitioner shall produce evidence that all the taxes, assessments and water rates now a lien upon said premises, or any portion thereof, or any sale for the non-payment of taxes, assessments and water rates upon said property, or any portion thereof, shall have been paid before receiving such release from the City.

I would further respectfully recommend that if the Corporation Counsel shall decide that the interest of the City is not material and purely a cloud upon the title, that the interest of the City be appraised at the nominal sum of \$1, and that the expenses of such release, examination, etc., be fixed at \$100, to be paid by said petitioner before the delivery of such release.

NEW YORK CENTRAL AND HUDSON RIVER RAILROAD IMPROVEMENTS.

DEAR SIR—In chapter 424 of the Laws of 1903, entitled "An Act to provide for the abolition, discontinuance and avoidance of certain grade crossings in the City of New York," among other things it is stated that "all sewers, water pipes, gas pipes, electric lines, wires, ducts or conduits which may be in, under or over any streets or avenues which cross the said Port Morris branch railroad shall be changed or relocated in such manner and to such an extent as may be necessary or reasonably required to carry into effect the provisions of this act, and any plans and profiles, and the provisions of any instrument authorized by this act; but all such changes and relocations shall be made in a manner approved by the board of estimate and apportionment."

At the request of this Department the Empire City Subway Company propose to change the location of their subway at the Port Morris branch of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company at Westchester avenue and German place, in order to permit of the depression of the railroad company's tracks. The proposed plan of construction is shown on the map hereto annexed and the same has received the approval of the Chief Engineer of this Department, I. M. de Varona. Your early and favorable consideration of the inclosed matter is respectfully requested.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The accompanying resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Riverside District, Borough of Manhattan, on June 6, 1905, provides for an extension of the sewer in West Seventy-fourth street, between Columbus avenue and Central Park, West.

The sewer in this block stops some distance short of Central Park, West, and owing to the fact that a large apartment house is now being built at the corner of Central Park, West, and the lack of sewer facilities was not discovered until construction on the building was well advanced, there is urgent necessity for the building of this sewer at as early a date as possible. The street was legally opened in 1883. The outlet sewer has been built, and the extension is shown upon the drainage plan.

It is recommended therefore that the improvement provided for by the resolution of the Local Board be authorized.

The amount of work involved is the construction of 40 feet of 2-foot 4-inch by 3-foot 6-inch brick sewer, and one (1) manhole. The estimated cost is \$750, and the assessed valuation of the property to be benefited is \$1,375,000.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
