ACQUIRING PARK AT FULTON AND CHAUNCEY STREETS, BROOKLYN.

"Whereas, It appears to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, from the surveys made and information furnished to it that there are buildings upon the lands that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending said public park; and

"Whereas, The said Board has received written notice from the Corporation Counsel that Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment have been appointed by the Supreme Court, in proceedings to acquire title to said public park, and that the oaths of said Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were duly filed as required by law, on the 11th day of December, 1903; therefore be it

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 990 of the Greater New York Charter, directs that upon the 15th day of July, 1904, the title to each any every piece or parcel of land lying within the lines of said public park bounded by Fulton street, Chauncey street, Lewis avenue and Stuyvesant avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, so required, shall be vested in The City of New York."

DEAR SIR—In reply to letter of inquiry relative to the laying out of the "extension of West One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street, from Amsterdam avenue to the new avenue west of High Bridge Park."

West One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street as it now exists from Amsterdam avenue westward is 80 feet wide, laid out by the Commissioners of the Central Park in the year 1869. In answer to the petition, I laid out a street 60 feet in width from Amsterdam avenue eastward to the new avenue about 250 feet in length. As the street could not be of great travel, I considered the 60 feet width as best suited for the neighborhood and the cost of the City in after years keeping it in repair. The owner of about 600 feet of frontage on Amsterdam avenue through which the new street will run objected to a street less than 80 feet wide, giving as a reason that the new part should agree with the lines of the old street. I inclose a copy of the diagram of the layout as sent to the Local Board.

SIR—The accompanying resolution of the Local Board of the Morrisania District, Borough of The Bronx, adopted on April 21, 1904, recommends that the map or plan of The City of New York be amended by changing the lines of East Two Hundred and Thirteenth street, between Jerome avenue and the Woodlawn road.

This change affects a length of two blocks of East Two Hundred and Thirteenth street, the same comprising the entire length of the street as now laid out, and extending from Van Cortlandt Park to Woodlawn Cemetery. PARK AT FIRST AVENUE AND THE BAY, BROOKLYN.

The following report from the Park Commissioner and communications were presented to the Board:

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—In compliance with the request of your Honorable Body for my opinion as to the advisability of acquiring the territory bounded by First avenue, the Shore road, Wakeman place, New York Bay and Bay Ridge avenue, I have the honor to report as follows:

The greater portion of the land proposed to be acquired for park purposes is locally known as "Owl's Head," and is owned by the Bliss estate. The agitation for the purchase of this site has been continuous for quite a number of years. Last year the matter was laid before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the purchase of the property was very strongly advocated by my predecessor, Hon. Richard Young.

There is no question but what the elevated portion of the Bliss property would make a very useful park. It would not be necessary to spend any money for the laying out and beautifying of this plot, except some repairs to the slopes facing the bay which were seriously damaged last October. The land under water I consider absolutely necessary for the preservation and protection of the Bay Ridge parkway and Shore road, the junction of which is in front of this property. If the land is not taken by the City it is likely to be disposed of in such a way as to be very objectionable, and in that case the Bay Ridge parkway as an approach to the Shore road would become useless and might as well be abandoned. A large amount of money has already been expended upon these approaches and work is going on there at the present time. In the interest of the preservation of the Shore road and the improvements contemplated under the plan of Olmstead, Olmstead & Elliott, I consider it of almost vital importance that this land be taken by the City.

CLOSING LITTLE WEST ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-FIFTH STREET, MANHATTAN.

The following communication from the Corporation Counsel was presented:

NEW YORK, May 13, 1904.

JOHN H. MOONEY, Esq., Assistant Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—I am in receipt of your communication of April 12, 1904, in which you say that there is before your Board for consideration a resolution of the Washington Heights Local Board of the Borough of Manhattan, asking for a change in the City map by closing a portion of Little West One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, and laying out a new street, to be a continuation of West One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street to the Hudson river.

You inclose a copy of a report from the Engineer of your Board, in which it is stated that the City has acquired title to the portion of the street proposed to be closed, and that the Institution for the Deaf and Dumb, the petitioner, for the alteration of the map or plan of The City of New York, owns the property which will be required for the proposed new street.

In view of these circumstances, it has been suggested that The City of New York cede its property in the street to be closed in exchange for the property of the petitioner, which will be required for the proposed new street, and therefore your Board, before acting upon the question of closing one street and laying out the other, desires my opinion as to the authority of the City to make such exchange.

It is also stated that your Board is in receipt of a communication from the Secretary of the New York Institution for the Deaf and Dumb, the petitioner in this case, expressing willingness on behalf of that institution to make the exchange proposed.

After duly altering the map or plan of The City of New York by closing and discontinuing that portion of Little West One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street proposed to be closed, and laying out a continuation of West One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street westerly to its proposed junction with that portion of Little West One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street not discontinued or closed, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would undoubtedly have authority to exchange the City's property in the closed street for the property required from the petitioner for the purpose of the new or altered street.

By section 16 of chapter 1006 of the Laws of 1895, entitled "An act to provide for discontinuing and closing streets, avenues, roads, highways, alleys, lanes and thoroughfares in cities of more than 1,250,000 inhabitants," which act is applicable to The City of New York, it is provided among other things that:

"It shall be lawful for the local authorities either before or after the appointment of said commissioners of estimate and assessment to agree with the owners, lessees, parties and persons entitled unto or interested in the lands, tenements, hereditaments and premises that either will be benefited or affected by said closing, for and about the cession to such city of other lands, tenements, hereditaments and premises included within the boundaries of any established street, avenue, road, public square or place shown on the permanent plan of streets of such city, in lieu of the lands comprised within the lands of the street, avenue, road, highway, alley, lane or thoroughfare as aforesaid, or any part thereof; * * *

These provisions of law confer upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which are the local authorities referred to, the power to exchange by cession the lands in the portion of the street proposed to be closed in this instance, for the lands of the petitioner which will be required for the proposed new street.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Newtown District, Borough of Queens, adopted on April 27, 1904, initiating proceedings for grading, curbing and flagging Third avenue (Lathrop street), between Washington and Graham avenues, in the First Ward.

Proceedings for opening Third avenue (Lathrop street), between Broadway and Jackson avenue, were authorized by the Board of Public Improvements on December 5, 1900, and the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were filed on January 28, 1902. The roadway is in use through the two blocks for which this improvement is proposed, but it has not been shaped; about a dozen houses have been erected upon each of the blocks, most of the same being small frame buildings. I see no reason why the improvement proposed under this resolution should not be authorized, and would recommend such action, the work to be done comprising the following:

6,000 cubic yards excavation.

2,586 linear feet curbing.

12,500 square feet flagging.

The estimated cost of construction is \$11,300, and the assessed valuation of the property to be benefited is \$50,850.

I would recommend that title to Third avenue (Lathrop street), between the northerly line of Graham avenue and the southerly line of Washington avenue, be vested in the City on August 1, 1904.

SIR—The accompanying resolution, adopted by the Local Board of the Staten Island District, Borough of Richmond, on April 19, 1904, initiates proceedings for the regulating and grading of Lincoln avenue, from the South Side Boulevard to a point near mean high water in the Fourth Ward of the Borough of Richmond, and for the paving of the roadway for a width of 16 feet with macadam pavement, including construction of the necessary approaches and culverts and other incidental work.

Lincoln avenue was laid down upon the map of the City by a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted on April 27, 1904, and the plans were submitted for filing, in accordance with the Charter provisions, on May 3, 1904. Title to the street thus laid down was acquired by the former town of Southfield on March 4, 1890, a consideration of one hundred dollars (\$100) having been paid for the fee. This deed is recorded, and I am advised that the Department of Docks and Ferries collects rentals for the use of the bulkhead at the foot of the street.

The improvement will cover a distance of 4,600 feet. The street is 50 feet in width. About 1,500 feet at the westerly end is now occupied as a highway, as was stated in the report submitted at the time the street was laid down upon the map. The proposed improvement would furnish an outlet for the property at Midland Beach, and would lead to the bulkhead, for the use of which, as above stated, the City is collecting rent.

No subsurface improvements have been provided, nor will any be required for some years to come. The proposed improvement consists simply in macadamizing a strip 16 feet in width in the centre of the street. This may be considered a temporary and inexpensive improvement, and if the property-owners along this street were to be exempt from all future assessments for paving as a result of this improvement, I would be reluctant to recommend it. The Borough of Richmond, however, is sorely in need of important roads connecting the centres of population and the beaches. The building of such roads will stimulate the development of other property, and for these reasons it is recommended that the resolution of the Local Board be approved.

The approximate amount of work involved is as follows:

500 cubic yards of excavation.

8,500 cubic yards filling.

8,300 square yards of macadam pavement.

120 linear feet of culverts.

The total estimated cost is \$17,500 and the assessed value of the property within the probable area of assessment is \$118,900.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Morrisania District, Borough of The Bronx, adopted on April 21, 1904, initiating proceedings for regulating, grading, curbing and flagging Walton avenue, between East One Hundred and Seventy-second street and Fordham road.

Title to the eighteen blocks included within the limits of this improvement has been vested in the City under opening proceedings, confirmed in two sections, one in 1892 and the other in 1896. A rough, narrow roadway is in use through the four northerly blocks from Cameron place to Fordham road, and a few houses have been erected upon the abutting property. SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on April 7, 1904, initiating proceedings for the construction of a sewer in East Twenty-eighth street, between Clarendon road and Newkirk avenue, and an outlet sewer in Avenue D, between East Twenty-eighth and East Twenty-ninth streets.

Proceedings to open Avenue D, between Rogers avenue and East Thirty-fourth street, were authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 20, 1903, and the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were filed on December 11 following. Title to East Twenty-eighth street has never been acquired under formal proceedings, but the resolution is accompanied by the affidavits of two property-owners, setting forth that the street through the two blocks for which the sewer is desired has been dedicated to public use.

An examination shows that the roadway of Avenue D is not in use, and the lines of the street are not marked in any way upon the ground.

The roadway is in use through East Twenty-eighth street, shade trees have been planted, a portion of the flagging has been laid, and the street is lit with gas. About twenty houses have been erected upon the abutting property. I believe that the dedication of East Twenty-eighth street is sufficiently well marked to warrant the assumption of the title necessary for the purpose of building the sewer.

The remaining outlet sewers have been constructed, and the approval of the resolution now submitted is recommended, the work to be done comprising the following:

- 1,075 linear feet 12-inch pipe sewer.
- 50 linear feet 15-inch pipe sewer.
- 260 linear feet 30-inch brick sewer.
- 4 receiving-basins.

The estimated cost of construction is \$8,900, and the assessed valuation of the property to be benefited is \$69,600.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on April 14, 1904, initiating proceedings for the construction of a sewer in East Twenty-ninth street, between Canarsie lane and Avenue

F (Farragut road), with outlet sewers in Avenue D, between East Twenty-ninth street and Nostrand avenue, and in Newkirk avenue, between East Twenty-ninth street and Nostrand avenue.

A report is now before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in connection with another improvement for Avenue D, recommending that title to this street be vested in the City on August 1, 1904, under opening proceedings yet pending.

Title has not been acquired to either East Twenty-ninth street or to Newkirk avenue. The resolution is accompanied by affidavits of two property-owners, certifying that East Twenty-ninth street has been dedicated to public use between the limits named in this resolution for more than eight years.

An examination of the ground shows that, with the exception of the extreme north-east end where it meets Canarsie lane, the roadway is shaped throughout the entire length for which the improvement is proposed, the same comprising five blocks. At the exception named the roadway is in use, but is not shaped. A part of the water-main has been laid and a portion of the street is lit by gas. The property abutting upon this street has been in sections very largely improved and at least a few dwellings have been erected upon each block.

No affidavits appear to show the dedication of Newkirk avenue, but the Engineer of Highways reports that the street is in use and has been curbed and flagged, and that water and gas mains have been laid. The outlet sewers required have been constructed, and the evidences of dedication for Newkirk avenue and East Twenty-ninth street being in my judgment sufficient, the approval of this resolution is recommended.

The work to be done comprises the following:

2,800 linear feet 12-inch pipe sewer.

150 linear feet 15-inch pipe sewer.

265 linear feet 18-inch pipe sewer.

215 linear feet 36-inch brick sewer.

35 manholes.

10 receiving-basins.

The estimated cost of construction is \$20,600 and the assessed valuation of the property to be benefited is \$502,365.

SIR—The accompanying resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on April 25, 1904, provides for paving East Eighteenth street, between Flatbush avenue and Beverley road, with macadam. On the same date there was adopted a resolution providing for regulating, grading and curbing this street, between the same limits, and upon this resolution a report has already been submitted, recommending the authorization of the work.

The macadamizing of East Eighteenth street was before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on several occasions last year. On December 23, 1902, it was considered by the Board and it was decided that, inasmuch as the property was able to pay for a more permanent pavement than macadam, the matter be referred back to the President of the Borough. The petitioners, however, were insistent upon the use of macadam as their decided preference, several of them having even stated that they would prefer macadam to asphalt at the same price. Again on July 1, 1903, it was up for consideration, the Local Board having meanwhile declined to substitute any other pavement for macadam. Again it was referred back to the President of the Borough.

It is quite evident that the property-owners on this street, which covers two blocks, prefer macadam to any other pavement. It is devoted exclusively to residences. Beverley road, which would bound the improvement on the south, is macadamized, and is one of the principal thoroughfares of the Flatbush section. Church avenue, bounding it on the north, is not improved and is occupied by a double-track railroad. Albemarle road, which divides the improvement into two blocks, is paved with asphalt. The grade is not such as to render a sheet asphalt pavement at all objectionable. The property-owners have been most persistent in expressing their preference, and it does not appear that it is a question with them of the cost of the improvement, but as to the kind of street surface which they prefer.

The resolution is submitted to the Board for its determination as to whether the macadam pavement shall be authorized.

The approximate amount of work involved is the laying of

4,990 square yards of macadam pavement.

760 square yards of vitrified brick gutter.

The total estimated cost of \$5,200 and the assessed value of the property within the probable area of assessment is \$85,000.

SIR—Herewith is submitted a joint resolution of the Local Boards of the Bay Ridge and Flatbush Districts, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on April 25, 1904, initiating proceedings for regulating and grading Coney Island avenue, from a point 170 feet south of the Plaza at Fort Hamilton avenue to Kings Highway.

This improvement is petitioned for by the Manor Realty Company and ten others, several of them representing development companies owning a large amount of property. There is also attached a copy of a resolution adopted by the West Side Taxpayers' Association strongly urging the improvement.

Proceedings to regulate and grade this street were instituted by the same Local Boards a year ago. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, however, took no action upon the resolution, as the location of a double-track railroad along one side of this street made it well-nigh impossible to improve the street unless these tracks could be moved to the centre of the street and rails of a different type substituted.

Coney Island avenue has been legally open at a width of 100 feet. It is occupied by the tracks of the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company, which occupy the westerly side of the roadway. This railroad was built as a steam road, and now has tee rails, which render it impossible for vehicles to cross or drive along the tracks, except where they are plankd at such intersecting streets as are in general use. The railroad company claim that they own the fee in the street, having purchased it from an old plank road company, and that the legal opening of the street at a width of 100 feet consisted in adding a sufficient strip to the street to provide a carriageway. On May 15, 1903, the Commissioner of Public Works of the Borough of Brooklyn wrote the Corporation Counsel asking to be advised whether or not the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad owned the fee in the strip of land occupied by their tracks, and whether or not the President of the Borough could insist upon their moving these tracks to the centre of the street and laying rails which are adapted to ordinary street use. The information asked for seems never to have been given, as on several occasions during the year inquiries were made as to whether an opinion had been rendered, and on December 8 the Commissioner of Public Works wrote me that he had not yet received the advice asked for in his letter of May 15.

The presence of these railroad tracks makes it difficult to carry out the regulating and grading which the resolution of the Local Board contemplates, but it seems somewhat unfair to the property-owners along this street and to those who have already improved their property to hold back this improvement on account of the failure of the railroad company to substitute the modern street railroad track in the centre of the street for the present steam railroad track on one side of the roadway.

A resolution has also been adopted by the Local Board, providing for paving that portion of the street between a point 170 feet south of the Plaza and the summit in the grade between Avenues G and H.

The paving improvement manifestly cannot be carried out until the question as to the railroad tracks has been settled, but I would recommend that the regulating and grading of the street be authorized without further delay.

The approximate amount of work involved is as follows:

30,000 cubic yards grading.

31,500 linear feet curbing.

146,000 square feet cement sidewalk.

500 square feet bluestone flagging relaid.

The total estimated cost of construction is \$68,300, and the assessed valuation of the property within the probable area of assessment is \$450,000.

This improvement covers a length of four blocks of Bay Fifteenth street, which was formerly designated as Seventeenth avenue. Title to the block between Bath and Cropsey avenues has been legally acquired, and opening proceedings are now in progress for the remainder of the street, the same extending from the Flatbush line to Bath avenue, having been authorized by the Board of Public Improvements on July 19, 1899, and the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment having been filed on April 10, 1900. A roadway is already in use along the line of this street, and the same has been neatly shaped.

SIR—The accompanying resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, on June 2, 1904, provides for the construction of a sewer in Rogers avenue, east side, between Linden avenue and Martense street.

BOARD OF REVISION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision of Assessments was held in the Council Chamber, City Hall, on Thursday, May 26, 1904, at 11.10 o'clock A. M.

Present—N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; George L. Sterling, Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel.

The reading of the minutes of the meetings of March 2 and 30, 1904, was dispensed with.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The assessment list for sewer in Exchange place, between Broad and William streets, and objections of Darius Ogden Mills and the Broad Exchange Company, filed by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of April 8, 1904.

No one appearing in opposition, after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed to the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Subsequently, upon the request of Mr. Joseph A. Flannery, attorney, who stated that he was unaware that the case had been called, and desired to be heard in said matter, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the motion of confirmation was reconsidered and annulled, and the assessment list was laid over for consideration at the next meeting of the Board, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in Quarry road, from East One Hundred and Eighty-second street to the summit west of Oak Tree place, and objections of Home for Incurables, filed by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of May 20, 1904.

No one appearing in opposition, after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Subsequently, upon the request of Mr. Joseph A. Flannery, attorney, who stated that he was unaware that the case had been called, and who desired to be heard in the matter, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the motion of confirmation was reconsidered and annulled, and the assessment list was laid over for further consideration at the next meeting of the Board, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for laying cement sidewalk on the east side of Washington avenue, between St. John's place and Degraw street, and on the north side of Degraw street, between Washington and Classon avenues, and objections of George A. Domminey and Martha I. Goss, received from the Board of Assessors, under date of April 27, 1904.

No one appearing in opposition, after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel the objections filed in said matter were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for flagging sidewalk on the south side of Clay street, between Manhattan avenue and Oakland street, and west side of Oakland street, between Clay and Dupont streets, and objections of Thomas G. Pringle, received from the Board of Assessors, under date of May 14, 1904.

No one appearing in opposition, after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curbstones, flagging the sidewalks, laying crosswalks and placing fences in Washington avenue, from Third avenue at One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street to Pelham avenue, with objections, and applications for awards for damages, referred back to the Board of Assessors, at meeting of March 30, 1904, for further consideration, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by the said Board under date of April 11, 1904.

The following attorneys, who had filed objections in said matter, were heard in opposition to the assessment, viz.:

Truman H. Baldwin, John C. Shaw, A. C. Hottenroth and W. Stebbins Smith, the grounds, principally being that the expenses and the amount of the assessments are excessive; that a portion of the curbing, flagging, etc., amounting to \$41,581.68, had been previously done and paid for by the property owners, and should be assumed by the City; that the awards, amounting to \$70,000, for damages are assessed pro rata, whereas the change is no benefit, but a damage to the property of their clients, as evidenced by the awards made in some instances to their property for damages; also, that in many cases no awards have been made, and where made that they are entirely inadequate for the damages sustained by the property.

Mrs. Margaret F. McMahon appeared and objected to the excessive amount of the assessment charged against her property for the improvement.

After consideration, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the said assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to make a pro rata reduction of 15 per cent. in the amount of the present assessment, and that the assessment as so reduced be confirmed by the Board of Assessors, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curbstones, flagging the sidewalks, laying crosswalks, constructing drains and building fences where required, in Napier, Oneida, Kepler and Katonah avenues, from Two Hundred and Thirty-third street to Mount Vernon avenue; Martha avenue, from Two Hundred and Thirty-fifth street to City line; Vireo avenue, from Two Hundred and Thirty-third street to City line; Two Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, from Two Hundred and Thirty-third street to Bronx river; Two Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, from Mount Vernon avenue to Bronx river; Two Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, from Mount Vernon avenue to Bronx river; Two Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, from Napier avenue to Vireo avenue; Two Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, from Mount Vernon avenue to Vireo avenue; Two Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, from Mount Vernon avenue to Vireo avenue; Two Hundred and Fortieth street, from Mount Vernon avenue to City line; Two Hundred and Forty-first street, from Mount Vernon avenue to City line, with objections, and claims for awards for damages by the changes in the grades, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of March 30, 1904, for further consideration, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by the said Board under date of April 11, 1904.

The following attorneys who had filed objections against the assessment were again heard in the matter, viz.:

Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, in regard to the claims filed by him for awards for damages by reason of the change in the grades of Napier avenue and other streets in the Woodlawn Heights section of The Bronx, and to the excessive assessments and expenses of the work, and especially to the amount charged against lot, assessment No. 357.

Messrs. McCarty & Baldwin opposed the disallowance of the claims of their clients for awards for damages to their property by the change of grade of the streets, and also the proposed assessments against their property, as being in excess of the benefit derived by it, and to the excessive charges for inspection and surveying.

Mr. Truman H. Baldwin opposed the excessive assessments and the expenses connected with the work, and the amount included in the assessment for drains, on the ground that they are sewers, and therefore were built without proper authority.

Mr. Louis H. Moos, representative of Mr. John F. Foley, opposed the assessment on the ground that the property of his clients had been seriously damaged, while no awards for damages had been allowed, and also claimed that the apportionment of the assessment had been improperly made.

After consideration, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewer in Fort Washington avenue, between Broadway and One Hundred and Eighty-first street, and objections of Benjamin Altman, filed by Truman H. Baldwin, attorney, and of the New York Institution for the Blind and others, filed by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors under date of April 8, 1904.

Mr. Flannery, attorney, was heard in opposition to the assessment on the ground that only one-half of the cost of the improvement, under chapter 565 of the Laws of 1865, and chapter 114 of the Laws of 1892, can be legally assessed upon the property.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the said assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors with instructions to invite the opinion of the Corporation Counsel in regard to the questions raised in the objections, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment lists for paving with asphalt pavement One Hundred and Eighth street, from First to Second avenue, and One Hundred and Fortieth street, between Lenox and Seventh avenues, and objections of Mary G. Pinkney, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors, under date of April 8, 1904.

Mr. John C. Shaw, attorney, appeared in opposition to the assessments on the grounds that the curbing and recubing and concreting are not included in the resolutions authorizing the works, and that the curbing constitutes a repavement and cannot be legally assessed. Also that no petitions for the improvements were submitted by the property-owners on the line of the works.

After consideration, on motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the said assessment lists were referred back to the Board of Assessors with instructions to invite the opinion of the Corporation Counsel with reference to the questions raised in the objections filed against the assessments, and especially as to the requirements of law in regard to petitions for the initiation of local public improvements, and the persons who are authorized to make the same; and that copies of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, when rendered in the matter, be transmitted to the Presidents of the several boroughs for their information and guidance, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for paving with asphalt pavement One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, between Hamilton terrace and Convent avenue, and objections of Julia C. Geddes, the Germania Life Insurance Company and others, with transcript of testimony taken, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney; also communication of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, dated April 15, 1904, transmitting reply of the Commissioner of Public Works to the objections, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of April 27, 1904.

Mr. Shaw, attorney, was heard, and opposed the assessment on the ground that the street had been previously regulated, etc., and paved, and the expense therefor paid by the property abutting the improvement.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to invite the opinion of the Corporation Counsel upon the questions raised in the objections filed against the same, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following, viz.:

Resolved, That for the purpose of expediting the business of the Board of Revision of Assessments and preventing loss of interest to the City by reason of the Board meeting at indefinite periods, its meetings be held on Thursday of each week at 11 A. M., upon notice of the Chief Clerk.

Which was adopted, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewers in Waverley place, between Bank and Perry streets, and the objections of the Herter Realty Company and others, filed by Thomas W. Burke, attorney; Wm. C. Bates, by John C. Shaw, attorney, and brief in support thereof; Church of St. John the Evangelist (Wainwright Memorial), by Truax, Watson & Roberts, attorneys, received from the Board of Assessors under date of April 8, 1904.

Mr. John C. Shaw, attorney, was heard by representative in opposition to the charge for taking up and relaying water pipes and the expenses for inspection incident thereto, and also claimed that the sewer was built without the filing of formal written petitions by the property-owners.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to invite the opinion of the Corporation Counsel upon the questions raised in the objections, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing and flagging Kingsbridge avenue, from its intersection with Wicker place, North, to its intersection with Terrace View avenue, North, together with a list of awards for damages caused by a change of grade and objections of The New York City Church Extension and Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church and others, filed by McCarty & Baldwin, attorneys—and of Mary W. Sloat and others, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney—were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of May 20, 1904.

Mr. John C. Shaw, attorney, was heard by representative, and claimed that the work included in the assessment south of the intersection of Wicker place is unauthorized, not having been included in the ordinance. No others appearing in opposition, after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The assessment list for sewer in Nineteenth street, between high-water mark and bulkhead-line, and objections of South Brooklyn Sawmill Company, filed by Hubbard & Rushmore, attorneys—and of Mary A. Beard, filed by Edward Hinman, attorney—were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of April 16, 1904.

Mr. Hinman, attorney, was heard, and objected to the assessment for the reason that the sewer is an extension of the overflow sewer and does not benefit any part of the property of his client, and that it is wholly submerged at high water and no connection can be made with it to afford drainage to the property.

Mr. Hubbard, of Hubbard & Rushmore, attorneys for the South Brooklyn Sawmill Company, was heard in opposition to the assessment charged against the property of said company, for the reason that no benefit is derived by it, as the property fronts on Gowanus creek and therefore requires no sewer connection; that the sewer is entirely submerged at high water, and that the cost of the same should be made a public charge.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The assessment list for sewer in Exchange place, between Broad and William streets, with objections of Darius Ogden Mills and the Broad Exchange Company filed by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney, laid over at the last meeting, was taken up.

Mr. Tobias, attorney, representing Mr. J. A. Flannery, attorney, was heard, and opposed the assessment charged against the property of his clients on the ground that the sewer was constructed solely for the benefit and upon the petition of the Wall Street Exchange Buildings, owners of the property designated as Lot No. 26, Block 26, and that the property represented by him is fully served for sewer purposes by the sewer constructed and paid for in Broad street.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors with instructions to readvertise the same, after increasing the assessment on Map No. 4, Lot No. 26 to one-half of the total cost of constructing the sewer, and to reduce the assessment proportionally on the other property affected by the improvement; such action being in accordance with the precedent established by this Board in the case of Frederick Hollender in matter of the assessment for sewer in One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street, between Seventh avenue and summit west of Lenox avenue, confirmed August 5, 1903, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Hottenroth, attorney, in regard to the expenses for inspection and to the excessive charge on Lot No. 3.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed in said matter were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in Daly avenue, from East One Hundred and Seventy-sixth to East One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, and objections of G. On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed to the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Seventy-third street and Suburban place, from Boston road to Crotona Park, East, and in Crotona Park, East, from summit west of Suburban place to summit east of One Hundred and Seventy-third street, and objections of Samuel Boyd and others, filed by A. No others appearing after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the several objections filed were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street, from Prospect avenue to summit east of Prospect avenue, and objections of Elise Dienst and others, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, and of Mary A. McCormack and Julius B. Dnicke, filed by Charles V. Gabriel, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors under date of April 20, 1904.

Mr. Andrews, attorney, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, was heard in opposition to the excessive expenses for inspection and surveying.

After consideration, no others appearing in opposition, after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to reduce the assessment by 5 per cent. from the gross amount thereof, and that the assessment list as so reduced be confirmed by the Board of Assessors, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in Quarry road, from East One Hundred and Eighty-second street to the summit west of Oak Tree place, with objections of Home for Incurables, filed by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney, laid over at the last meeting of the Board for further consideration, was taken up.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to take testimony in the matter of the allegations set forth in the objections filed in behalf of the City Real Estate Company, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

At 12.40 o'clock P. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.

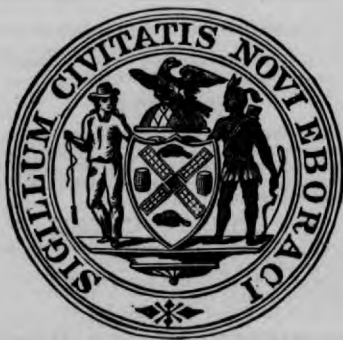

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 470 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
