

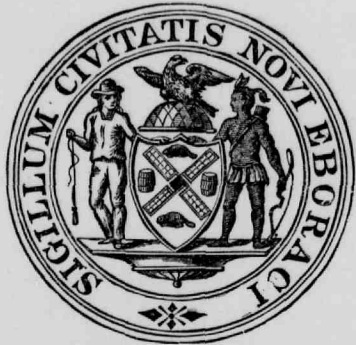

The weekly reports of Assistant Sanitary Engineers on the plumbing and drainage of new houses, were received and ordered on file.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending April 15, 1882 :

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,810, as follows, viz. : 2 public buildings, 648 tenement-houses, 91 private dwellings, 52 other dwellings, 10 manufactories and workshops, 15 stores and warehouses, 47 stables, 45 slaughter-houses, 4 lodging-houses, 1 public sewer, 1 gas-main, 2 stock yards, 1 stream, 13 sunken and vacant lots, 103 yards, courts, and areas, 126 cellars and basements, 211 waste-pipes and drains, 329 privies and water-closets, 74 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 10 dangerous stairways, 3 smoky chimneys, 2 cesspools, 10 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 519.

During the past week 153 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 94 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

172 permits were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 294 premises where contagious diseases were found and have disinfected and fumigated 264 houses, 264 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

27 cases of contagious diseases were removed to the Hospital, and 1 dead body to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 476 births, 37 still-births, 179 marriages, and 820 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, April 15, 1882 ; this shows a decrease of 37 births and 28 still-births, and an increase of 15 marriages and 58 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was an increase of 90 births, 54 marriages, and 31 deaths, and a decrease of 10 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 3 ; diphtheria, 5 ; croup, 9 ; typhus fever, 4 ; inanition, 1 ; alcoholism, 5 ; heart diseases, 8 ; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1 ; meningitis and encephalitis, 8 ; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5 ; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1 ; while the deaths from measles increased 4 ; scarlatina, 11 ; whooping cough, 5 ; erysipelas, 4 ; typhoid fever, 2 ; cerebro-spinal fever, 3 ; malarial fevers, 1 ; diarrhoeal diseases, 6 ; cancer, 1 ; phthisis pulmonalis, 4 ; bronchitis, 17 ; pneumonia, 16 ; aneurism, 1 ; convulsions, 2 ; apoplexy, 2 ; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 2 ; Bright's disease and nephritis, 2 ; cyanosis and aetecasis, 2 ; premature and pretermatural births, 4 ; surgical operations, 2 ; suicides, 5 ; and drowning, 2. The number of deaths from rheumatism and gout and marasmus, tabes-mesenterica, and scrofula, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 155 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 250 under two years, 359 under five years, and 58 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 36 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 43.78 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 162 were in institutions, 418 in tenement-houses, 205 in houses containing three families or less, 19 in hotels and boarding-houses, 14 in rivers, streets, boats, etc. ; 14 were on the basement floor, 154 on the first, 208 on the second, 155 on the third, 81 on the fourth, 25 on the fifth, 5 on the sixth. 808 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 12 non-residents ; 93 were stated to be single, 182 married, 70 widowed, and the condition of 475 was not stated ; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz. : City deaths, 820 ; still-births, 35 ; bodies in transitu, 31 ; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 86 were upon certificates received from the Coroners ; 476 births ; 179 marriages ; 35 still-births ; 820 deaths ; 31 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 115 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 20 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 56 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending April 15, 1882, was 40.4 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.766, the mean humidity was 69, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,591, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.26 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held April 26, 1882.

Present—William R. Grace, Mayor; Allan Campbell, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Chamberlain; and John McClave, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller submitted the following reports, viz.:

I.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, }
April 17, 1882.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—On the 28th ultimo, a resolution was passed authorizing the leasing of the premises on Broadway, Forty-fourth and Forty-fifth streets, as an armory and drill-rooms for the Twelfth Regiment and Battery "E," for the term of one year from May 1, 1882, at the yearly rent of \$20,000.

It was said the battery needed more room for storing and handling its guns. A large increase of rent was demanded for additional space, and the term of the lease was therefore limited to one year at the yearly rent of \$20,000, for the premises, without additional space.

The owner of the property has now consented to give the room required by the battery, on a lease for five years, for the same rent, the city to be at the expense of making necessary alterations, and at the end of the term leave the premises without cost to the city for restoring them to their present condition.

Taking the character of the accommodations for the regiment and battery, and the locality into consideration, with the terms offered, I consider the rent on a lease of five years, fair and reasonable, and recommend that it be taken.

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are satisfied that it will be for the interest of the city that a lease be made of the armory and drill-rooms occupied by the Twelfth Regiment and Battery "E," and that the rent thereof is fair and reasonable;

Resolved, That a resolution adopted March 28, 1882, authorizing a lease of the premises occupied as an armory and drill-rooms by the Twelfth Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., and Battery "E," on Broadway, Forty-fourth and Forty-fifth streets, for the term of one year from May 1, 1882, be and the same is hereby revoked and annulled, and that, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 461, Laws of 1880, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to take for the purpose a lease of the said premises, with additional space for the use of Battery "E," for the term of five years, from May 1, 1882, at the yearly rent of \$20,000, and that the Counsel to the Corporation be requested to prepare a lease to the city accordingly, containing the usual covenants and conditions and such as are contained in the present lease, with special conditions that the city will pay its pro rata or fair proportion of the water tax, and that at the expiration of the lease the premises will be accepted by the lessor without cost to the city for restoring them to their present condition; and the Comptroller is hereby authorized to enter into and execute such lease when prepared and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, and upon compliance with all the requirements of the law applicable to the leasing of property for the use of the National Guard, State of New York.

The report was accepted, and, on motion, the resolution was adopted.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, }

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—The Comptroller, to whom was referred at the last meeting of the Board, a communication from the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, requesting that a lease be taken of premises in the Staats Zeitung building, for the use of their Department, respectfully

REPORTS:

That, as stated by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, and also by the Receiver of Taxes in a communication from him herewith submitted, the space occupied by them in the same building is insufficient for the accommodation of their offices.

The Receiver of Taxes states that: "The space now allotted for the accommodation of the taxpayers, is so utterly inadequate that many of them are compelled to stand in the park and in the street for hours, and at a time when stormy weather is very frequent."

"During the last two years the ladies' line extended out upon Chambers street, and during the first days after the tax books were opened last year, the crush in the Bill Department, down stairs, was so great that I had to call in the assistance of the police, and actually close the doors to prevent injury from excessive crowding."

He also states that: "The increased room afforded by the removal of the offices of the Tax Commissioners will not wholly prevent crowding * * * but, in the busy season, will remove the necessity of waiting for hours on the line, and will further afford to numerous taxpayers a respectable waiting-room, and other facilities for business greatly needed."

The inconvenience is said, also, to be constantly increasing by the yearly increase in the numbers of the taxpayers, by the subdivision of large parcels of property in the upper part of the city, and particularly in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, with the rapid increase of population.

The space now occupied by the offices of the Receiver of Taxes is found to be insufficient for the accommodation of the clerks and the dispatch of business required for the public interests.

The removal of the office of the Tax Commissioners from the building occupied by the Receiver of Taxes to the Staats Zeitung building has been objected to, because it would, as alleged, give the tax-payers much additional trouble to go to the office of the Commissioners of Taxes for the examination of the Ward Maps and ascertain the correct ward numbers of their real estate.

This objection is of little consequence compared with the advantages gained by the tax-payers.

It is said that not more than one per cent. of the tax-payers refer to the Ward Maps for the ward numbers, as they generally know what are the ward numbers of their property.

An estimate of the cost of fitting up the offices in the Staats Zeitung building, for the use of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, has been made by the Superintendent of Repairs in the Department of Public Works, amounting to \$4,760, herewith submitted.

Mr. Ottendorfer offers to lease the whole second floor of the Staats Zeitung building for the term of five years at an annual rent of \$8,000, and he further agrees to pay \$1,000 towards the expense of alteration of the offices for the Tax Commissioners in the Staats Zeitung building, and put in a new elevator with improved light at entrance.

The premises will give the Tax Commissioners nearly one-fourth more space for their offices than they have at present, and afford them much needed accommodation for the business of the Department, while the room they vacate may be advantageously appropriated for the use of the Receiver of Taxes.

This statement is submitted for the consideration of the Board with a resolution to authorize a lease to be taken of the premises for adoption if approved.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 461, Laws of 1880, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to lease the second story of the building on Chatham street and Tryon row, known as the Staats Zeitung building, for the use of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, for the term of five years from May 1, 1882, at the yearly rent of \$8,000, which sum is deemed fair and reasonable, and the Counsel to the Corporation is requested to prepare a lease to the city of said premises accordingly, containing the usual covenants and such other covenants and conditions as have been agreed upon with the owner, as stated in the report of the Comptroller, who is hereby authorized to execute such lease when prepared and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation.

The report was accepted, and, on motion, the resolution was adopted.

The Comptroller submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller, in accordance with subdivision 11 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, be and he is hereby authorized and directed to prepare and issue, from time to time, as he may deem necessary to meet the requirements of the Department of Docks, "Dock Bonds of the City of New York," amounting to two hundred and fifty thousand dollars, for the purpose of raising moneys necessary to carry out the provisions of said act, relating to said Department, its powers and duties, on account of requisition of the Dock Department, dated December 21, 1881, for seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

The Comptroller submitted the application of A. C. Downing for the return of \$74.38, overpaid on account of street vault;—Whereupon, the Comptroller submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That a warrant for \$74.38, payable from the Sinking Fund for Redemption of the City Debt, be drawn in favor of A. C. Downing, refunding him this amount overpaid on account of street vault in front of Nos. 48, 50, and 52 Ann street, as per certificates, affidavit, etc., herewith.

RULES AND REGULATIONS ESTABLISHED for the government and proper care of piers, bulkheads, slips, and other wharf property, under the provisions of subdivision 7 of section 6 of chapter 572 of the Laws of 1871, by the Board of the Department of Docks, and published, to take effect on and after

MAY 1, 1882.

The said subdivision 7, among other things, provides as follows:

"The violation of or disobedience to any rule, regulation, or order of said Board shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, on complaint of said Board."

And every person guilty of a violation of or disobedience to any of the following rules or regulations, in addition to the penalties thereby fixed and imposed, to be recovered in civil actions, is liable to be prosecuted for a misdemeanor and to be punished by such fine and imprisonment, or by both.

No. 1.—No piles shall be driven, nor shall any platform be erected, nor shall any filling-in of any kind be made on any part of the water-front of the city, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars, for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant of any pier or bulkhead, or of any water-front property or right, who shall cause or permit any such work to be done upon his premises before such permit therefor has been obtained, and under the further penalty of fifty dollars for each and every day which shall elapse before any piles so driven, or platform so erected, or material so filled-in, without such permit being first obtained, shall be removed, after the expiration of the time which may be allowed for such removal, by a notice served upon such owner, lessee, or occupant, by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, to be also recovered from such owner, lessee, or occupant.

No. 2.—No shed, building, office, tally-house, or other structure shall be erected, nor shall any derrick, hoisting-mast, coal-hopper, sign, or advertising device, or other erection or obstruction of any kind be placed or maintained upon any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, nor upon any reclaimed land, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board; and if the owner, lessee, or occupant of any such premises, or the owner, lessee, or agent, of any such structure, erections, or obstructions, shall fail to comply with a notice served by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district to remove any such structure, erection, or obstruction, after the expiration of the time allowed by such notice for the removal, such owner, lessee, occupant or agent, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each and every day, which shall elapse before any such structure, erection or obstruction, shall be removed, after the expiration of the time for the removal thereof specified in said notice.

No. 3.—No cargo shall be discharged from any vessel upon any bulkhead or wharf structure, at which such vessel is being unloaded, after service by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, upon the owner, consignee, master, or other officer, or stevedore, of such vessel, of a notice that such bulkhead or structure will be endangered by the placing of additional cargo thereon, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars for every such offense, and a further penalty equal in amount to the damages of every description which shall be caused by the further discharging of cargo upon such bulkhead or wharf structure, after the service of the said notice, both of such penalties to be recovered from such owner, consignee, master, or other officer or stevedore, severally and respectively.

No. 4.—All goods, merchandise, and materials of every kind, landed or placed on any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, or upon reclaimed land, must be removed therefrom without unnecessary delay, and within twenty-four hours after the Corporation Wharfinger for the district shall have served upon the owner, shipper, or consignee, of such cargo, a notice to remove the same, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day for each and every day, during which any part of said cargo shall remain upon such pier, bulkhead, structure, or land, after the expiration of the said twenty-four hours, to be recovered from such owner, shipper, or consignee, severally and respectively.

No. 5.—All goods, merchandise and materials of every kind encumbering any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, or reclaimed land, after the time designated for the removal thereof shall have expired, will be liable to be removed by the Board to any warehouse or yard, at the sole risk and expense of the owner of any such property, and all expense incurred for such removal and storage or otherwise, shall be and become a lien thereon, and such goods, merchandise and materials will not be delivered to the owner until the expense of such removal and storage has been paid.

No. 6.—No person shall construct or maintain any engine-house, tally-house, or other small structure, under a permit of the Board, on any unshaded pier, or other wharf structure, unless the same be placed on wheels so as to admit of easy removal thereupon when required, and to prevent the accumulation of dirt or refuse thereunder, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each and every day which may elapse before the discontinuance of such offense.

No. 7.—No vessel of any kind shall be loaded or discharged by horse power, nor shall stones or similar cargo be discharged from any vessel, upon any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, unless proper plank-ing be provided to protect the surface of such pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure from injury consequent upon the travel of the horse, or the throwing of the stones or similar cargo thereupon, under a penalty of five dollars a day for each horse so employed, and of twenty-five dollars for each offense of discharging such stones or like cargo, upon such pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, to be recovered from the owner, consignee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered for using horses, or discharging stones or similar cargo, upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 8.—No sand shall be discharged from any vessel unless canvas or similar material be extended from the vessel's side to the bulkhead or wharf structure at which such vessel is being unloaded, to prevent the falling of the sand into the water, and if the surface of any such wharf structure is not sufficiently tight to prevent the sand dumped thereon from going through into the water, then no sand shall be discharged thereon from any vessel, unless canvas or similar material be first laid thereon to receive the sand, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, consignee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered on account of sand discharged upon wharf property belonging to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to the lessee thereof, but if such penalty be recovered on account of sand discharged upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 9.—The owners, lessees and occupants of every pier, wharf and bulkhead in the City of New York shall keep the same in good repair, and the slips adjacent thereto properly dredged; and whenever, in the judgment of the Board, it shall be necessary so to do, written notices, signed by the President or Secretary of said Board, shall be served upon the owners, lessees or occupants, or collector of wharfage of any such pier, wharf or bulkhead, or the slip adjoining the same, on or in which repairs or dredging are required by said Board, specifying the nature and extent of the repairs or dredging so required, and the time within which such repairs must be made, or such dredging done; and in case the owners, lessees or occupants so notified, fail to comply with the terms and requirements of such notice, they shall forfeit and pay a penalty of fifty dollars per day for every day which shall elapse before they comply with such notice.

No. 10.—No ashes, refuse, offal, fruit, vegetables or any other substances, shall be thrown into the waters surrounding or adjacent to any pier or bulkhead, or any other part of the water-front of the city, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant, severally and respectively, of any pier, bulkhead, wharf structure, or other property, from which any such substance shall be thrown, or from the person actually throwing the same; or if any such substance be thrown from any vessel lying in waters within the jurisdiction of the Department, whether berthed or not, then such penalty to be recovered from the owner, consignee, or master of such vessel, severally and respectively.

No. 11.—No snow or ice shall be dumped into the waters adjacent to the water-front of the city, except from the piers, bulkheads and other places designated from

time to time, by the Board, for such dumping, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee or occupant of any pier, bulkhead or other wharf property, from which any such snow and ice shall be dumped, or from the person actually dumping the same, severally and respectively.

No. 12.—All lumber, brick, or other material in bulk, discharged on any bulkhead not shedded, shall be at once removed, or, if not so removed, shall be placed at least twenty feet from the edge of the bulkhead, pending removal, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day, for each and every day such lumber, brick or other material shall remain on the bulkhead, to be recovered from the owner or consignee of such lumber, brick or other material, or from the person placing, or causing the same to be placed, on such bulkhead, severally and respectively.

No. 13.—The charges for wharfage and dockage of all vessels admitted to any of the piers or bulkheads constructed under the new plans adopted by the Department, shall be at the same rates as are now, or shall hereafter be, fixed and established by laws of this State, until otherwise ordered by the Board.

The award of the contract will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids.

Delivery will be required to be made from time to time, at such time and in such quantities as may be directed by the said Department; but the entire quantity will be required to be delivered on or before thirty (30) days after the date of the contract.

Any bidder for this contract must be known to be engaged in and well prepared for the business, and must have satisfactory testimonials to that effect; and the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to give security for the performance of the contract by his or their bond, with two sufficient sureties, in the penal amount of fifty (50) per cent. of the estimated amount of the contract.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect, that if the contract be awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, on its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they shall pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled on its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of this contract over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities, as bail, surety, or otherwise; and that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith and with the intention to execute the bond required by section 27 of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of the City of New York, if the contract shall be awarded to the person or persons for whom he consents to become surety. The adequacy and sufficiency of the security offered to be approved by the Comptroller of the City of New York.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the national banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the security required for the faithful performance of the contract. Bidders are informed that no deviation from the specifications will be allowed, unless under the written instruction of the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction.

The Department of Public Charities and Correction reserves the right to decline any and all bids or estimates if deemed to be for the public interest, and to accept any bid or estimate as a whole, or for any one or more articles included therein. No bid or estimate will be accepted from, or a contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
