Biass, should not be renewed, this Board respectfully recommend to his Honor the Mayor, that licenses as scavengers be granted to the above named parties for one year from February 1, 1878.

Resolved, That the attorney be and is hereby directed to adjourn suits 4206 and 4207, against premises No. 22 Cherry street, until the application for a permit to occupy the same as a human habitation has been reported on by the Sanitary Superintendent.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 23, 1878. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,549, as follows, viz.:

3 public buildings, 668 tenement-houses, 174 private dwellings, 106 other dwellings, 16 manufactories and workshops, 22 stores and warehouses, 30 stables, 40 slaughter-houses, 1

manufactories and workshops, 22 stores and warehouses, 30 stables, 40 slaughter-houses, 1 manufactories and yards, 2 public sewers, 3 garbage dumps, 1 dangerous bridge, 14 sunken and vacant lots, 39 yards, courts, and areas, 64 cellars and basements, 216 waste-pipes and drains, 82 privies and water-closets, 7 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 5 dangerous chimneys, 1 smoky chimney, 4 other nuisances, together with 49 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 494.

During the past week 109 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 32 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

39 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect received.

39 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.
The Disinfecting Corps have visited 53 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 50 houses, 50 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.
One case of scarlet fever was removed to hospital by Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending February 23, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 524 burial permits for city deaths, 20 for bodies in transitu, and 59 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 524 deaths, 121 marriages, 400 births, 59 still-births, 20 applications for transit permits, and 54 returns from coroners. There were 18 searches of the registers of births, mar riages, and deaths, and 1 transcript of marriage record, and 17 of death were issued from this Bureau.

SIR—In accordance with your instructions, I have carefully inspected the dwellings in Forty-second street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues, with the view of ascertaining the source of the foul odors of which the occupants complain, and respectfully report: That the dwellings on the block named are constantly, and for a long time past, have been subjected to an influx of gas from a defective gas-main in Forty-second street. The odor of carbureted hydrogen escaping from some of the waste-pipes of the buildings was quite perceptible, and left no doubt as to its source. The leakage complained of from the gas-main is of long standing, and has saturated the soil below the street pavement to such an extent that the gas is escaping therefrom into the street sewer, thence by means of the house-sewers into the dwellings. There being three gas-mains in this street owned by separate companies, I was unable to determine positively from which pipe the leakage proceeded. As, however, the nuisance is complained of by different families in the block, and the life and health of many persons is endangered by it, I would respectfully recommend that measures be taken for the abatement of the same, without delay.

SIR—During the week ending February 23, 1878, 524 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city. This is a decrease of 9 as compared with the preceding week, and 77 more than were reported during the corresponding week of 1877.

The actual mortality for the week ending February 16 was 488, which is 49.2 below the average for the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.54 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,078,145.

The 9 most prominent causes of death during the past week were the following: phthisis pulmonalis, 90; pneumonia, 62; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 41; bronchitis, 36; scarlatina, 22; diphtheria, 21; membranous croup, 19; and diseases of the heart and Bright's disease, 18 each.

The greatest increase of deaths over the corresponding week of 1877, was as follows: measles, 11; diphtheria, 7; pneumonia, 12; Bright's disease, 5; typhoid fever, 5, and bronchitis, 4. Compared with the preceding week there was a decrease of 5 deaths from scarlatina; 11 from diphtheria; 2 from typhoid fever; 3 from malarial fevers; 1 from puerperal diseases; 4 from diarrheea; 2 from alchoholism; 7 from cancer; 10 from phthisis pulmonalis; 2 from pneumonia; 4 from diseases of the heart; 3 from aneurism, and 3 from enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis. Measles increased 5; croup, 6; whooping cough, 5; erysipelas, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; inanition, 1; rheumatism and gout, 2; bronchitis, 11; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4.

The deaths of children under five years of age, increased 17, making a percentage of the following contents.

and gout, 2; bronchitis, 11; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4.

The deaths of children under five years of age increased 17, making a percentage of 45.80 to the total mortality, against 41.84 for the preceding week, and the deaths of persons 70 years and over showed an increase of 38.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 70 were in institutions, 287 in tenement-houses, 151 in houses containing three families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 121 on the first, 149 on the second, 110 on the third, 49 on the fourth, 9 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 523 were stated to be residents of New York City and 1 non-resident, 55 were stated to be single, 122 married, 67 widowed, and the condition of 280 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 530 deaths and still-births, or 90.90 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 16; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 218; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 69; Greenwood (undenominational), 53; Lutheran (undenominational), 85; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 18; Evergreen (undenominational), 29; Woodlawn (undenominational), 17; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 7; Union (Methodist Protestant), 1; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 5; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 4; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 4; Washington (undenominational), 4.

The actual mortality for the week ending February 16, 1878, was 488, which is 13.2 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.54 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,078,145.

Abstract of Proceedings for the two weeks ending February 23, 1878.

MEETING WEDNESDAY, February 13.
