

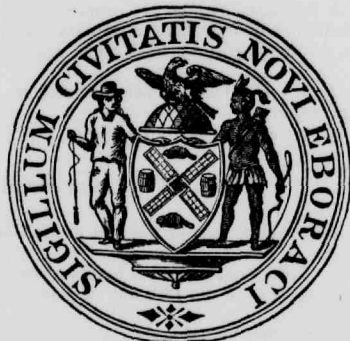

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COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held June 23, 1879.

Present—Hon. Edward Cooper, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John K. Hackett, Recorder; Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Nicholas Haughton, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the bill of John T. Boyd for services as auctioneer in case of sale at foreclosure, submitted the following report :

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT,
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, June 18, 1879.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the annexed bill of John T. Boyd, for \$25 for services as auctioneer in the foreclosure case of the Mayor, etc., against Herman Polye and others, would

REPORT :

That such service was rendered in the sale of premises at the southeast corner of Fourth avenue and Seventy-ninth street. These premises were covered by a mortgage for \$4,130, made by Herman Polye in 1866, upon which the interest had not been paid and judgment of foreclosure and sale was obtained, in a suit brought by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York. Pursuant thereto such premises were sold by John T. Boyd, at public auction, on March 25, 1879, and brought \$6,900. The purchaser refused to complete, because a question existed as to the title of the city to a gore fronting on Seventy-ninth street, running the whole length of the lot, and the ten per cent. paid by him has been returned to him by the referee, by order of the court—this question relative to the gore being now at issue in an action which has been brought by the heirs of Alpheus Sherman :

The sale on the foreclosure proceedings having been made at the request of the city, and the amount charged the customary rate at foreclosure sales, it would seem proper that Mr. Boyd should be paid such bill, and a resolution to that effect is herewith presented for adoption.

The report was approved and the resolution submitted with the report was, on motion, adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay the annexed bill of \$25 to John T. Boyd, expense incurred for auctioneer's services in the matter of the foreclosure of the bond and mortgage given by Herman Polye to the city, from the appropriation for "Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, Expenses of."

A communication was received from the Counsel to the Corporation, relative to the purchase of premises No. 115 Christopher street, on sale at foreclosure of the mortgage made to the city by Thomas D. Bazley, to take place on June 26, 1879, whereupon the Comptroller submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was unanimously adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be authorized to buy in, on behalf of the City of New York, at a valuation not to exceed ten thousand nine hundred and twenty-five dollars, the premises No. 115 Christopher street, advertised to be sold at auction upon the foreclosure of a mortgage made by Thomas D. Bazley to the city of New York.

The Comptroller submitted the following report, relative to bonds due and payable July 1, 1879.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :

Bonds payable from taxation under the statutes authorizing their issue fall due on July 1, 1879, amounting to \$3,043,825, as follows :

Bonds for liquidation of claims and judgments, chapter 756, Laws of 1873..... \$276,825 00
Tax Relief Bonds, chapter 876, Laws of 1869..... 2,767,000 00

Total..... \$3,043,825 00

Under the authority of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, provision has been made for the payment and redemption of bonds and stocks which fall due in 1879, and are payable from taxation under the statutes authorizing their issue. The means provided for this purpose are the accumulations in the Sinking Fund for the redemption of the city debt, and the sum of \$1,000,000, to be raised by tax in 1879, and paid into the Sinking Fund. The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution on October 22, 1878, certifying to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the amount to be raised by tax in 1879, and applied to this purpose, should be \$1,000,000, and this sum was so appropriated and included in the final estimate.

On July 1, 1879, the cash accumulations in the Sinking Fund, together with the above sum of \$1,000,000 included in the Final Estimate for 1879, will be amply sufficient for the payment of the bonds which fall due at that date, to be applied to that purpose as provided by law, without in any way impairing the preferred claims thereon.

The following statement shows the amount of securities and cash in the Sinking Fund on June 1, 1879, and the amount of bonds and stocks which form a preferred charge on said fund :

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby authorize and direct the payment from the Sinking Fund for the redemption of the city debt of the following bonds of the City of New York, which fall due on July 1, 1879, to wit.:

The Comptroller, in response to the resolution of this Board, adopted April 18, 1879, submitted the following report :

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :

In compliance with a resolution adopted by this Board on the 18th of April last, I have the honor to report :—

I. That the amount of moneys in the Treasury of the City on June 3, 1878, theretofore collected and received in payment or on account of assessments made and confirmed for local improvements completed prior to that date, was \$625,371.99, as shown by the following detailed statement of accounts :

NOTE.—Of this balance, June 3, 1878, the sum of \$500,000 has been transferred to the Sinking Fund for redemption of the city debt, pursuant to section 3, chapter 383, Laws of 1878.

II. That the amount of moneys collected and received since June 3, 1878, in payment or on account of assessments confirmed for local improvements completed prior to that date up to June 1, 1879, is \$1,075,371.99, and the balance in the Treasury at the latter date was \$73,309.84, as shown by the following statement of the accounts :

Report accepted and ordered to be printed in the minutes.

The following resolution of the Common Council, approved by the Mayor June 16, 1879, was received, viz.:

Resolved, That the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, pursuant to the provisions of section 49 of chapter 335, Laws of 1873, hereby authorize and approve of the selection made by the Commissioners of Police of the piece or parcel of land belonging to the Corporation of the City of New York, and located on the west side of Elizabeth street, 100 feet south of Canal street, being 50 feet front and rear by 94 feet deep, as a site for the erection of a new station-house for the police force of the Sixth Precinct, hereby set apart, devote, and appropriate the said lots of land for the use and purpose of a site for a new station-house and prison for the contemplated new Sixth Precinct, and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are hereby authorized and requested to set apart and appropriate for the use and possession of the Police Department the said lots of land above described.

Whereupon the following resolution was unanimously adopted :

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby set apart and appropriate for the use and possession of the Police Department of the City of New York, the piece or parcel of land located on the west side of Elizabeth street, 100 feet south of Canal street, being 50 feet front and rear by 94 feet deep, as a site for the erection of a new station-house for the police force of the Sixth precinct.

The application of the officers of the Orphans' Home and Asylum of the Protestant Episcopal Church in New York, for renewal of lease of the plot of ground corner of Lexington avenue and Forty-ninth street, now occupied by said Home and Asylum, was received, and, on motion, referred to the Comptroller.

George P. Andrews, Assistant Counsel to the Corporation, submitted the following Terms and Conditions, as put in legal and appropriate language by the Counsel to the Corporation, in response to the resolution of this Board adopted at its last meeting :

Resolved, That the resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund relating to the terms, limitations, restrictions, and conditions upon which Francis B. Spinola and his associates may lay mains and pipes within the lines of the streets, avenues, and public places of the City of New York, adopted December 28, 1878, be and hereby is amended, so as to read as follows :

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby fix the terms, limitations, restrictions and conditions upon which Francis B. Spinola and his associates may lay mains and pipes within the lines of the streets, avenues, and public places in the City of New York, with such connections as may be necessary for the purpose of supplying steam under the Holly Combination

System to the city and its inhabitants, for heating, cooking, and all other domestic purposes, as well as for any and all uses for which steam can be employed, as follows:

1st. In all cases where the pavements are to be disturbed for the purpose of laying or repairing said pipes a permit therefor shall first be obtained from the Commissioner of Public Works, and the grantees, before taking out such permit, shall file with the Comptroller of the City and County of New York a bond for \$50,000, with sufficient and adequate security, to be approved by the Comptroller, to be renewed from time to time as the Comptroller may require, as a guarantee that the pavements of the streets and sidewalks shall be restored in as good condition as they were found at the time they were disturbed to lay said steam-pipes and entirely to the satisfaction, of the Commissioner of Public Works, and unless this be fully complied with, the proper authorities shall be fully empowered to commence legal proceedings against the signers of the bond for the amount which it may have cost the city to restore said pavements in good condition. The pipes shall be laid under such regulations as the Commissioner of Public Works may from time to time establish, and under such part of roadway or sidewalk as he may prescribe on the permit, and if at any time the Commissioner of Public Works shall direct any changes to be made in the location or arrangement of said steam-pipes, for the purpose of the laying, altering, or removing city water-pipes or sewers, or doing any other public work, such changes shall be made by the grantees at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, and in no case shall the city be liable for any injury or damage to the said steam-pipes; and in laying said steam-pipes the grantees shall in no wise interfere with any sewers, water-pipes, or other pipe theretofore laid, without the consent of the Commissioner of Public Works and the owners of said pipes.

2d. The grantees shall supply all the steam required by the city for any purpose in the streets, or the parts thereof, in which the steam-pipes are laid, or for heating any public building, now or hereafter located therein, at twenty-five per cent. less rates than steam is furnished by them to their most favored customer. And the grantees shall authorize the city to use for public purposes, without royalty, any patented appliances or apparatus for the use of the steam supplied by the grantees which the grantees shall authorize or license any person to use.

3d. Said Francis B. Spinola, for himself and his associates, whenever requested by the proper authorities having charge of such matters, shall furnish steam for the purpose of cleaning the principal streets, public places, and avenues from snow or ice, and also to supply steam for the use of the fire engines, at reasonable rates, wherever their mains and pipes shall be laid.

4th. Said Francis B. Spinola, for himself and his associates, shall pay into the Sinking Fund, for the benefit of the City of New York, the sum of three cents for each lineal foot of mains and pipes laid by them, beneath the carriage or roadway of any street, avenue, or public place in the city, until such payments shall have amounted to one hundred and fifty thousand dollars, after which the said payments shall cease and terminate. And in addition to said three cents for each lineal foot, in each year in which the company's earnings shall exceed ten per cent. on the amount invested, the next three per cent. earned in the same year, over ten per cent. on the amount invested, shall be paid into the city treasury to the credit of the Sinking Fund for the redemption of the city debt.

5th. Said Francis B. Spinola, for himself and his associates, are hereby authorized to lay mains or pipes within the district in the City of New York south of Canal street, in a direct line from the North to the East river; and after having laid the pipes in said district to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, then the said Francis B. Spinola and his associates are hereby granted permission to lay pipes in all the streets, lanes, alleys, and places in the city, under the terms, limitations, restrictions, and conditions hereby fixed.

6th. The right to lay steam-pipes shall cease and determine at the expiration of three years from this date, unless the grantees shall, within that time, have constructed the apparatus and laid the pipes necessary to supply steam in twenty-five miles of streets.

7th. Any action of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall not be final and conclusive until it shall have been approved by the Common Council.

The above resolution was indorsed as follows:

The within terms and conditions have been put in legal and appropriate language by me, pursuant to resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, adopted June 19, 1879.

The Mayor submitted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the action of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in respect to modifying the terms upon which Francis B. Spinola and associates may lay steam-pipes in the City of New York be reconsidered, so that the resolutions reported by the Counsel to the Corporation may be passed upon, irrespective of the preceding action of the Board, but this resolution not to apply to the resolution relating to this matter adopted December 28, 1878.

The Comptroller moved that this resolution be laid upon the table.

The motion to lay the resolution on the table was adopted; the Recorder, Comptroller, and Chamberlain voting in the affirmative, and the Mayor and Chairman of the Finance Committee Board of Aldermen in the negative.

The Comptroller moved to strike out the 7th condition in the resolution as submitted by the Counsel to the Corporation, viz.: "Any action of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall not be final and conclusive until it shall have been approved by the Common Council."

The motion to strike out was adopted, the Recorder, Comptroller, and Chamberlain voting in the affirmative, and the Mayor and Chairman Finance Committee Board of Aldermen in the negative.

The Mayor moved to amend the fourth condition of the resolution submitted by the Counsel to the Corporation, by inserting after the words "ten per cent." the words "one half of all earnings over thirteen per cent.," which was not adopted, the Recorder, Comptroller, and Chamberlain voting in the negative, and the Mayor and Chairman Finance Committee Board of Aldermen, in the affirmative.

On motion of the Comptroller, the resolution submitted by the Counsel to the Corporation (as modified by striking out the seventh condition) was adopted; the Recorder, Comptroller, Chamberlain, and Chairman of the Finance Committee Board of Aldermen voting in the affirmative, and the Mayor in the negative.

The Comptroller submitted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the resolution be sent to the Counsel to the Corporation, to have him draw a contract between Francis B. Spinola and associates and the City and County of New York, in accordance with said resolution, and submit the same to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

On motion, the resolution was adopted, the Recorder, Comptroller, Chamberlain, and Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, voting in the affirmative, and the Mayor in the negative.

From O. M. Arkenburgh, on behalf of property owners, protesting against the Elevated Railroad Company running through Fifty-ninth street and the "Circle," and calling upon the Department to aid in preventing the same being done.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the permission to erect a fountain on Madison square, as asked for by Mr. W. Wheeler Smith, be granted, and the donation accepted, with thanks. That the subject of the erection of the fountain be referred to the President, with power.

Whereas, This Department has learned with satisfaction of the heroic action of Gatekeeper Charles F. Ryan in saving the life of William Garner from drowning in the lake at the Central Park; and

Whereas, The Life Saving Benevolent Association of New York having learned of the action of Ryan, and as an appreciation of his conduct desire to present him with the sum of \$20; therefore

Resolved, That as an encouragement to the members of the Park force this Board does, with pleasure, grant permission to Gatekeeper Charles F. Ryan to receive the \$20 so kindly offered by the Life Saving Benevolent Association of New York.

Whereas, Provision is made by chapter 411 of the Laws of 1876, for the preparation of maps by this Department of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, for the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments; and

Whereas, An appropriation for that purpose has been made for the year 1879 by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of ten thousand dollars;

Resolved, That the Topographical Engineer be requested to report upon the proper means of carrying out such purpose, and the preparation of such maps.

Resolved, That the Superintending Architect be requested to report to this Board, without delay, the work necessary to be done to put East River Park, and the buildings thereon, in the proper condition, and the probable cost of the same.

SIR.—There were 441 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 14, 1879, which is a decrease of 51, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 21 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1878. The actual mortality for the week ending June 7, 1879, was 478, which is 7.2 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.67 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,096,621.
