DEAR SIR—Application is hereby made to amend the arrangement of the heating and ventilating apparatus of the Seventh District Court-house on West Fifty-third and Fifty-fourth streets, between Eighth and Columbus avenues, in accordance with the accompanying drawing and the following statement:

First—That a separate connection be made for air supply to each group of heating coils, instead of in general one connection to two groups.

This change will insure a much more satisfactory distribution of the air supply to the vertical flues.

Second—That the form of the tempering coil at the fan inlet be changed so that it will be more compact, and to insure an even flow of the incoming air over the entire heating surface.

Third—That an independent pump governor may be used in connection with the two boiler feed pumps, in place of the combined pump and receiver.

This change is necessitated by the location of the boiler plant with reference to the general cellar of the building. With the combination pump and receiver located on boiler room floor, a water line cannot be maintained in the returns in the general cellar of building.

This change we consider necessary for the noiseless operation of the apparatus.

Fourth—That the high pressure pipe for kitchen be run through the laundry instead of coal vault.

This change is suggested in order to provide a convenient outlet in high pressure pipe in laundry, in case such outlet should at some future time be desired.

Fifth—That slight changes in the location of the reducing valve, grease extractor, back pressure valve, etc., be made as shown on plan.

In particular the location of the back pressure valve, as its present position would preclude the successful operation of the apparatus.

The granting of permission for making the above changes will neither make any changes in cost of apparatus, nor in any way affect the guarantee for the operation of the apparatus or the heating of the building, as per original contract.

DEAR SIR—By letter of October 16, 1895, I submitted to your Board, for approval and authorization, the form of a contract supplementary to the contract for a court building in West Fifty-third street and West Fifty-fourth street, authorized by chapter 43, Laws of 1892, providing for a change of boilers from the Babcock & Wilcox boilers, called for in the original contract, to

horizontal tubular boilers, together with such changes and additional work on flues, smoke-stack, etc., as were involved thereby.

The change was rendered necessary by the unforeseen necessity of laying a very thick cement floor in the cellar and boiler-room, to keep out sub-soil water, which was unexpectedly encountered. This diminished the space between floor and ceiling so as not to leave sufficient room for the Babcock & Wilcox boilers, and the horizontal tubular boilers proposed in the supplementary contract were found to be the very best possible substitute. The Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies has reported to me that, for heating purposes, they are superior to the Babcock & Wilcox boilers.

Your Board has deferred action in the matter in consequence of a report by the Comptroller that the cost of the substituted boilers is \$1,399 less than the cost of the Babcock & Wilcox boilers, and that a corresponding allowance or reduction should be made in the contract price for the building. The fact of such diminished cost is verified by information which I obtained on investigation.

The contractor for the building, however, has declined to make or accept any reduction, and the Counsel to the Corporation has given me his opinion, dated the 23d instant (copy inclosed), that the contractor is entitled to the full lump sum of his contract, if the change is duly ordered, notwithstanding any difference in the cost of the boilers.

I would respectfully impress upon your Board the necessity of its immediate action on the proposed supplementary contract, in order that the completion of the building may not be retarded by further delay.

LAW DEPARTMENT, OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION, NEW YORK, January 23, 1895. Hon. CHARLES H. T. COLLIS, Commissioner of Public Works:

SIR—I have received a letter from yourself, dated the 16th inst., stating that in the course of the construction of the court building on West Fifty-third street it was found necessary to make a change in the style and pattern of the steam boilers from the upright Babcock boilers, called for in the original contract for the entire building, to horizontal tubular boilers, because the available space in the cellar between the floor and ceiling was not sufficient to admit the Babcock boilers; that by direction of Commissioner Brookfield the architect prepared the specifications for the change, and, with letter of October 16, 1895, there was submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for approval, the form of a supplementary contract and specifications stating that the change would involve no additional cost and that the contractor and his sureties had given their consent thereto. The subject was referred to the Comptroller, who subsequently submitted a report that the new boilers would cost \$1,399 less than the Babcock boilers, and that allowance should be made in the supplementary contract for the reduction in cost.

The contractor insists that with or without the change in boilers he is entitled to the full amount of his contract, and that the change involves other and additional work for him in construction of flues, etc., for which he was not to be otherwise compensated.

You inclose letter of December 14 to the architect from the contractor, that you speak of as a letter from the architect, and a letter from the architect of December 16. Also a letter from Baker, Smith & Co., with reference to the relative cost of Babcock & Wilcox boilers and horizontal tubular boilers; also letters from Mr. Graham, Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies, of December 19 and January 13.

Your question is as to whether or not Contractor Murphy can be compelled to allow a reduction on the contract price for the building in consequence of the change from Babcock & Wilcox boilers to horizontal tubular boilers, which would involve a difference in cost in favor of the horizontal tubular boilers of some \$1,399.

I have examined the contract with reference to this work, and find that the contractor is entitled to a lump sum as a consideration of the contract.

If the change from the Babcock boiler to the horizontal boiler is ordered by the City, through the architect, and he complies with the order, he is entitled to his full compensation, notwithstanding any difference in the cost. I am yours respectfully,

The undersigned respectfully represents that, by virtue of chapter 866 of the Laws of 1895, your Honorable Body is authorized and directed, in your discretion, to audit and allow to him the amount you may deem to be justly due to him for services rendered up to the time that such audit is made, as Secretary of the Greater New York Commission. Provided, however, 1st, that his compensation shall not exceed the rate of twelve hundred dollars per annum; 2d, that the total sum to be allowed shall not exceed the sum of three thousand dollars; 3d, that such services were rendered under an appointment by said Commission; and 4th, that in equity they should be paid; that by resolution of said Commission he was duly elected its Secretary on March 27, 1891, and by resolution of April 2, 1891, his salary was fixed at twelve hundred dollars per annum, certified copies of said resolutions being on file in the office of the Comptroller, attached to Voucher No. 1, dated 1891; that he has uninterruptedly continued to be and to act as such Secretary since his said appointment, and has fully and at all times performed the duties of his office; that, by reason of an insufficiency of appropriation, he has received no salary for services rendered, as such Secretary, from July 1, 1893, to the present time; that his duties as Secretary were not of a perfunctory or routine character, but required close and constant study, attendance at hearings before Legislative Committees at Albany, assisting in the drafting of Legislative bills and documents, and furnishing information upon the progress of the consolidation movement to the press and the public in general; that the importance of the work in hand required expenditures that were not provided for, and he met these expenses out of his own funds.

Thus when in 1894 the question of consolidation was submitted to a vote of the people, he made a canvass throughout the Greater New York territory, explaining the subject at mass meetings and published circulars on the question, and thereafter published an "Historical Sketch of the Greater New York." The gathering of data, the purchase of books and pamphlets, and traveling, printing and other expenses incurred this way, he estimates at nearly one thousand dollars; and while he does not ask to be reimbursed for these expenses, he refers to them as another and important reason why his salary should not remain unpaid.

He deems it proper to mention that he is a member of the bar and has been an assistant to the Counsel to the Corporation, and thus brought to his duties an experience and study that could not have been otherwise than of special benefit to the labors of the Commission, and would make a compensation of \$1,200 per annum appear exceedingly moderate for the services rendered.

Wherefore he requests your Honorable Body to audit and allow to him his unpaid salary as such Secretary in the manner and to the extent authorized by said act.

SIR—The Commissioner of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, in communication of 2d December, 1895, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requests an appropriation of \$9,575 to enable him to regulate and repave the intersections of Melrose avenue, from One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to One Hundred and Sixty-third street, which he has determined to do under the authority of chapter 112 of the Laws of 1895, deeming the said work necessary.

Melrose avenue, a new avenue, is being paved between the above streets, but the intersecting streets have been heretofore paved and paid for by assessment, including the intersections. These intersections not being in good condition, and Melrose avenue, which is a continuation of Willis Avenue, being an important avenue, the Commissioner is desirous that the work should not be marred by the imperfections of these old intersections.

It appears to me that the action of the Commissioner to regulate and repave these intersections is judicious, and that the appropriation can be properly made as he requests.

LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION, NEW YORK, January 24, 1896. *To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:*

GENTLEMEN—I have received, under date of January 15, a petition of property-owners on One Hundred and Thirtieth street, between Lexington and Park avenues, requesting consent and approval for the Commissioner of Public Works to acquire title to a strip of land on the northerly side of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, for the purpose of widening the approach to the new Third Avenue Bridge.

Chapter 413 of the Laws of 1892, providing for the construction of a drawbridge over the Harlem river, in the City of New York, in its fifth section, provides as follows:

"With the consent and approval of the board of estimate and apportionment first had and obtained, the commissioner of public works, for and on behalf of the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, is hereby authorized to acquire title in fee to any land which he may deem necessary for the purpose of the construction of the said bridge and approaches with the necessary abutments or arches aforesaid, and to that end the said commissioner may make application to the supreme court in the first judicial district for the appointment of commissioners of estimate and apportionment, specifying in the said application the lands sought to be acquired for the purpose aforesaid. The provisions of law relating to the taking of private property for public streets or places in the said city are hereby made applicable, so far as may be necessary, to the acquiring of the said land as aforesaid."

Pursuant to the provisions of this act the Commissioner of Public Works, with the consent and approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, has taken proceedings to acquire title in fee to certain land which he has deemed necessary for the purpose of constructing the said bridge and its approaches, and has not included in said land the strip referred to in the petition of said property-owners.

In my opinion it will not be legally possible to now amend their proceeding by including in the land to be acquired therein the strip of land referred to, or any other land not specified in the map and petition which constituted the base of said proceeding, without express legislative authority for that purpose.

The strip might be acquired by the City under the general laws authorizing the acquisition of land for street purposes, but this would require an assessment of the cost thereof upon adjoining property, which is probably not what the petitioners desire.

If, therefore, it shall be necessary and desirable, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Public Works and of your Board, that the strip in question should be acquired as additional lands for the approach to said bridge, to be paid for in the manner provided for in the said Act of 1892, I think it will be necessary first to acquire legislative authority for such inclusion.

There is now pending in the Legislature a bill amending the Act of 1892, and if your Board should desire it, a provision could be inserted in that bill, giving authority for the acquisition of the strip in question.

The roll was called, and all the members were present and answered to their names.

The minutes of the meetings of February 7 and 18, 1896, were read and approved.

The matter of locating a public park on the west side of the city, between Twentieth and Thirtieth streets and west of Ninth avenue, was then taken up.

Dean Hoffman and others spoke in favor of the block between Twentieth and Twenty-first streets, Tenth and Eleventh avenues.

Mr. Lynch opposed the selection of this block, and presented a petition from residents asking "that a site be selected that shall be east of Eleventh avenue, and as near the Ninth avenue, consistent with economy."

Mr. Spurgeon again spoke in favor of the block between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth streets, Ninth and Tenth avenues.

Mr. Tyler advocated a site on the river front, as did also Mr. McCaul.

Mr. Ira Place, on behalf of the New York Central Railroad Company, protested against the taking of any land occupied by the railroad company.

After some further discussion, the matter was laid over to the next regular meeting of the Board, and, on motion of the Comptroller, the Counsel to the Corporation was requested to inform the Board, at his earliest convenience, as to what amount of money is authorized, under existing laws, to be expended in any one year for the laying out and opening of public parks in the City of New York.

The following communication from the Counsel to the Corporation, relating to the area of assessment for the opening of Prospect avenue, was presented and read :

LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION, NEW YORK, January 17, 1896. V. B. LIVINGSTON, Esq., Secretary of Board of Street Opening and Improvement.

SIR—I have received your communication of January 7, 1896, requesting me to communicate with the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the matter of opening Prospect avenue, from Westchester avenue to Boston road, and to request them to so enlarge their area of assessment that the entire cost and expense of the proceeding may be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited.

The area of assessment as at present determined upon by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment is bounded on the north by Crotona Park, on the east by a line midway between Stebbins and Intervale avenues, on the south by Dawson street, and on the west by a line midway

between Tinton and Union avenues. To extend the area northwardly would only embrace a larger portion of Crotona Park than is now within the area of assessment; to extend it eastwardly would extend it beyond Intervale avenue, which is an avenue one hundred feet in width, towards the opening of which the property on Prospect avenue did not contribute; to extend it south of Dawson street along Prospect avenue, now an opened and improved thoroughfare, would likewise embrace property towards the improvement of which the property on Prospect avenue, north of Westchester avenue, did not contribute; to carry it westwardly would embrace property nearer the Boston road, on which the improvements are now completed, and to which Prospect avenue affords no means of access.

I find, on examining the report of the Commissioners, that the amount assessed on the abutting property directly benefited by the improvement is about \$106,000, and that the amount assessed on property not abutting and indirectly benefited is about \$87,000; that is, about forty-eight per cent. of the cost of the improvement is assessed upon the property directly benefited and about thirty-eight per cent. on the property indirectly benefited, leaving a deficiency of about fourteen per cent.

To extend the area of assessment and add to the property indirectly benefited the sum of the deficiency, about \$31,000, would increase the assessment on the property indirectly benefited to about fifty-two per cent., with the result that the property indirectly benefited would pay more than the property directly benefited.

A further examination of the Commissioners' report discloses that the deficiency is due to the unequal manner in which property is valued for taxation in this vicinity. The most glaring instance is that of the property of Jennie Allen Carew, situate between Freeman and Home streets. This property was assessed for the purpose of taxation, as follows : 1890, \$20,200; 1891, \$20,700; 1892, \$20,700; 1894, \$20,700; 1895, \$21,300.

During that period the following improvements have been made through that property : Home street, legally opened June 7, 1894; regulated and graded July 22, 1895.

East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, legally opened November 21, 1890; regulated and graded July 18, 1893; sewer commenced October 23, 1895.

Freeman street, legally opened October 26, 1892; regulated and graded June 1, 1894; sewer commenced October 20, 1895.

—and in that period the tax valuation has only been raised \$1,100.

The assessment against this property for the opening of Prospect avenue was estimated by the Commissioners as fair and equitable at \$18,055, whereas only \$8,161.51 could be actually assessed owing to the tax valuations of the parcels assessed, leaving a deficiency of \$9,894, or about 32 per cent. of the present estimated total deficiency on the entire street.

The tax valuations of this property have been raised for the year 1896 to \$38,000, or an increase of \$16,700.

Other less glaring instances of deficiencies by reason of the tax valuation occur in the lands of William Burrill, William Cauldwell, Hanford B. Kirk, Franklin A. Wilcox and Edward G. Williams.

It would not have been proper for me to have requested the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment to extend the area of assessment, and, in view of the facts above stated, I cannot even recommend them to take such a course.

The following report from the Counsel to the Corporation, relating to a protest against the widening of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, from Third to Gerard avenue, and against the assessment thereof, was presented and read :

LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION, NEW YORK, February 8, 1896. V. B. LIVINGSTON, Esq., Secretary of Board of Street Opening and Improvement:

SIR—I return herewith a protest against the widening of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, from Third avenue to Gerard avenue, and against the assessment thereof, transmitted to me by you on the 21st ultimo, by direction of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, for my opinion as to the proper action of the Board thereon.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards—6.

The following communication from the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, submitting resolutions for opening the several streets named, was presented:

CITY OF NEW YORK—COMMISSIONER OF STREET IMPROVEMENTS, February 20, 1896.

Board of Street Opening and Improvement:

GENTLEMEN—I submit herewith for your concurrence the following resolutions:

First—For the opening and extending of Broadway from the northerly end of the Kingsbridge road in the Twelfth Ward to the northern boundary of the City of New York.

Second—For the opening and extending of Riverdale avenue, from Johnson avenue to the northern boundary of the City of New York.

Third—For the opening and extending of Johnson avenue from the Spuyten Duyvil Parkway near the Spuyten Duyvil station, to the Spuyten Duyvil Parkway near its junction with Riverdale avenue; and

Fourth—For the opening and extending of West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, from Riverdale avenue to Broadway.

Resolved, That this Board directs that upon a date to be hereafter more fully specified, not less than six (6) months after the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment who may be appointed by the Supreme Court in proceedings for the acquisition of title to such street, that the title to any piece or parcel of land lying within the lines of such Broadway, from the northerly end of Kingsbridge road, in the Twelfth Ward, to the northern boundary of the City of New York, so required, shall be vested in the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York.

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby requests the Counsel to the Corporation to take the necessary proceedings in the name of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, to acquire title, wherever the same has not been heretofore acquired, for the use of the public to the lands, tenements and hereditaments that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending Broadway, from the northerly end of Kingsbridge road, in the Twelfth Ward, to the northern boundary of the City of New York.

Resolved, That the entire cost and expense of said proceedings shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

Which were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards—6.

The resolutions submitted for opening and extending Riverdale avenue, Johnson avenue and West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street were laid over to the next meeting of the Board.

The City Ordinance to which the above statute applies reads as follows:

"Section 66. Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or person having charge of any building or lot of ground in the city of New York shall, within eight hours after the fall of any snow, and within eight hours after the forming of any ice on the sidewalk or in the gutter in front of any such building or lot, remove, or cause the same to be removed, from such sidewalk or gutter, under the penalty of three dollars for every such neglect, to be paid by the said owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or person having charge severally and respectively; but where said snow falls or ice forms between the hours of eight o'clock in the evening and five o'clock in the morning, this ordinance will be complied with by removing, or causing the same to be removed, before nine o'clock of the morning succeeding its fall or formation."

It becomes my duty to give notice that the provisions of the foregoing statute will be rigidly enforced in all cases where the City Ordinance is not complied with.
