COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Police Commissioner:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Gentlemen—By virtue of a decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court of this State has decided that Inspector Adam Cross was illegally dismissed from the office of Inspector of Police and has ordered his reinstatement. I am confronted, therefore, with the following difficulties:

The law already provides for sixteen Inspectors of Police and the reinstatement of Inspector Cross makes the number seventeen. An examination of the records here shows that it would be very difficult to say which Inspector was appointed to take the place of Inspector Cross when the latter was dismissed by the decision of the Commissioner; and, in the meantime, there is no appropriation out of which the salary of Inspector Cross can be paid.

I therefore write to your Honorable Board requesting that you increase the number of Inspectors of Police to seventeen; first, in order to avoid the difficulties of a selection, which undoubtedly would be followed by long litigation in the courts on the part of the one selected and which in any equitable sense would be unjust to those who are already Inspectors; and second, because of the fact that I can utilize the services of an additional Inspector, more especially in connection with the increase of the force which your Honorable Body was good enough to provide for some time ago.

I beg to ask therefore that, if this matter meets with favorable consideration, prompt action be had thereon, in order to relieve the Department of the difficulties and embarrassments which this case presents and in the best interests of the efficiency and discipline of the Police Force.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

Sir—Hon. Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx, in communication dated October 14, 1904, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$10,000, to carry on the work of preparing maps, etc., and for the making of drainage and sewerage district plans of the Borough of The Bronx, I would report that it would seem that the original request was made on March 12, 1904.

The proposition at that time was to form a new surveying party, of the composition and at the salaries as shown in the accompanying schedule of Mr. Charles R. Graham, Engineer in Charge of Sewers, to which party should be assigned the following work, viz:

The field work necessary to locate on the ground the actual location of the different streets in the district east of the Bronx river, as at present shown on the tentative maps of that section.

To take elevations along such street lines, determine drainage areas and obtain data for determining the proper locations, directions, rates of fall, points of outlets, etc., of such contemplated sewers as would be necessary in the formation of a complete sewerage system for the district noted.

The draughting of the system devised upon maps and plans suitable for filing and final establishing.

As the maps showing the location of streets, avenues, etc., in this district are at present only tentative, certain changes will undoubtedly occur in a final revision of the same, entailing modifications in any sewerage system that can at present be devised.

That this is an undertaking of great importance and extremely necessary cannot be doubted, but various facts in connection with the request for an appropriation of \$10,000 may be noted.

In the statement of Mr. Graham it would appear that this \$10,000 is to be expended almost entirely in salaries, and on a basis of one year only.

I am not able to obtain any opinion as to whether this work could be completed in one year, but do not believe it possible.

In addition, noting the future probable changes in the present maps of the whole Borough of The Bronx, the final completion of this work is entirely uncertain. There will therefore be need of further appropriations for this purpose, and it may be understood that \$10,000 is not sufficient to fully complete this work.

Therefore, I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of \$10,000 to provide for the preparation of maps, etc., of the drainage and sewerage districts of the Borough of The Bronx.

Sirs—On behalf of the Art Commission, and in accord with the unanimous vote taken by the Commission, I request your Honorable Body to authorize an increase in the salary of the Clerk and Stenographer to the Art Commission, from the present amount of \$900 to \$1,050 per annum. In support of this request, I beg to submit the following facts:

When the present salary was fixed, nearly four years ago, it was considered adequate, the duties of the position being comparatively simple, though onerous. Since that time the work of the Commission has increased many fold, but without any increase in the office staff or the salaries paid. It has become necessary to require the Clerk to take charge of the official records of the Commission, and to see that they are properly inscribed and filed. The Clerk has also been required to report verbatim the meetings of the full Commission, of its numerous committees and of such public hearings as are held from time to time—all of this work in addition to the general stenographic duties of the office.

The present Clerk and Stenographer has proved herself thoroughly competent and deserving of promotion. Her original examination by the Municipal Civil Service Commission entitled her to a considerably higher salary than she at present receives, or than she will receive when the increase is granted. Because of her increased efficiency the contingent expenditures of the Commission will not be as great as they otherwise would be, and the granting of the increased salary will not involve an increase in the Commission's appropriation.

Gentlemen—The Trustees of the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals respectfully request that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommend to the Board of Aldermen that the salaries of the positions of Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent of the Department be fixed, respectively, at six thousand dollars (\$6,000) and three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) per annum. The salaries attached to these positions at present are, respectively, five thousand dollars (\$5,000) and two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) per annum.

During the past two years the duties and responsibilities of the Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent have been largely increased. The Superintendent is the executive head, not only of Bellevue Hospital, with its 900 to 1,000 patients, but also of the other hospitals of the Department, there being only supervising nurses in immediate charge of those institutions. During the year 1903 nearly 6,000 more patients were received and treated than during 1902, and the census of the present year shows an increase over that of 1903. Three new hospitals are in course of erection, and the plans of a fourth are being carefully studied. This work of new construction naturally makes constant demands upon the time and the attention of the Superintendent, in addition to the usual duties of the office. The Assistant Superintendent shares the responsibilities of the Superintendent, and in his absence is in sole charge of the Department.

For the above reasons we believe that the increases asked for in the salaries of these officials are not unreasonable.

Resolved, That section 108 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

"Sec. 108. It shall be the duty of every owner, tenant, lessee, occupant or person in charge of any and every building or place of business in the generally built up portions of The City of New York forthwith to provide, or cause to be provided, and at all times thereafter to keep and cause to be kept and provided, within such building or place of business, and for the exclusive use of such building or place of business, separate receptacles for receiving and holding, without leakage, all the ashes, garbage and liquid substances that may accumulate during thirty-six hours, from said building or place of business, or the portion thereof of which such person may be the owner, tenant, lessee, occupant, or in charge, and every such receptacle designed and used to hold ashes shall be made of or lined with some suitable metal.

"All such materials and substances shall be separated and put into their respective receptacles, and such receptacles shall not be filled to within four inches of the top thereof.

"Such receptacles, as well as any light refuse or rubbish to be removed, shall be kept within the premises until the proper time for removal, and shall then be placed in the area, or within the stoop line only, and there shall remain until such materials or substances are removed by the Department of Street Cleaning, but in no case shall such receptacles be placed where they shall be or become a nuisance.

"All light refuse or rubbish likely to be scattered or blown about shall, before being placed outside of any building or premises for removal, be properly bundled, packed or otherwise secured."

Resolved, by the Board of Aldermen, That in the event of the death of the last survivor of the War of 1812—Hiram Cronk—his remains lie in state in the City Hall, Manhattan Borough, New York City.

No. 1281.

By Alderman Ware—

AN ORDINANCE granting a franchise to the Manhattan and Bronx Electric Company, to lay, erect and construct suitable wires or other conductors, with the necessary poles, pipes or other fixtures, in, on, over and under the streets, avenues, public parks and places in the Borough of Manhattan of The City of New York, for conducting and distributing electricity.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. That consent, permission and authority are hereby given and granted to Manhattan and Bronx Electric Company, a corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of New York, to lay, erect and construct suitable wires or other conductors, with the necessary poles, pipes or other fixtures, in, on, over and under the streets, avenues, public parks and places in the Borough of Manhattan, of The City of New York, for conducting and distributing electricity, subject, however, to the laws of the State of New York and all ordinances and regulations of The City of New York.

Until the further action of this Board, the electrical wires, cables and conductors of the said company shall, except as hereinafter specified, be laid, erected and constructed in and through subways or ducts constructed or supplied by the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company, and space therein shall be leased to said Manhattan and Bronx Electric Company by Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company; or, if sufficient facilities therefor are not promptly furnished to said Manhattan and Bronx Electric Company by said Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company, then said wires, cables and conductors shall be laid, erected and constructed in such other subways or ducts as may be designated by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity or his successor or successors.

If adequate facilities are not provided as aforesaid for the wires, cables and conductors of said Manhattan and Bronx Electric Company, it may lay and construct

subways or ducts therefor in the streets, avenues, public parks and places in the Borough of Manhattan of The City of New York, subject, however, to the same rules, regulations and procedure as is or may be by law, ordinance or regulation provided in the case of subways or ducts laid or constructed by the said Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company, and said Manhattan and Bronx Electric Company may place its wires, cables and conductors in the subways or ducts so laid and constructed.

The franchise, consent and authority hereby granted shall exist for the term of twenty-five years from the passage of this ordinance, and the right to a further renewal of twenty-five years, on a fair revaluation, is hereby given to the grantee.

Such revaluation shall be made as follows: One year before the expiration of the first twenty-five years the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, or its successor or successors, shall appoint one appraiser, Manhattan and Bronx Electric Company shall appoint one appraiser, and the two so appointed shall appoint a third appraiser, and the revaluation made by a majority of said three appraisers shall be conclusive on both the City and the said company, and shall be the revaluation for the purposes of such renewal.

Efficient service shall be furnished at reasonable rates and the property of the said company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the full term of the grant and any renewal thereof, and, if any question shall arise under this provision, it shall, upon the request of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or his successor or successors, be determined by the majority of three arbitrators selected, one by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor or successors, one by Manhattan and Bronx Electric Company, and the third by the two so selected. The findings of such majority shall be conclusive upon the City and the said company, and, if the said company fails to, with due diligence, comply therewith, the franchise hereby granted shall be forfeited.

Said Manhattan and Bronx Electric Company shall, within thirty days after the first days of January and July in each year, file with the Comptroller of The City of New York, or his successor or successors, a statement of the gross earnings from its business arising from supplying electricity for light, heat or power for the six months next preceding said first days of January and July, which statement shall be sworn to by the President or Treasurer of said company, and, as a tax on the rights, privileges and franchises hereby granted, said company shall, at the times of filing the aforesaid statements of its gross earnings, pay to The City of New York, for the exclusive use of said City, an amount equal to three (3) per cent. of the gross earnings reported at that time.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolved, That the foregoing ordinance, granting to the Manhattan and Bronx Electric Company a franchise or right to lay, erect and construct suitable wires or other conductors, with the necessary poles, pipes or other fixtures in, on, over and under the streets, avenues, public parks and places in the Borough of Manhattan (presented herewith in duplicate) be and the same is hereby referred, as follows: One copy to the Committee on Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and one copy to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for the purpose of fixing the rate of compensation, as required by section 74 of the Greater New York Charter.

Nothing herein contained shall be construed as in any way affecting or impairing the powers now held by the Street Cleaning Department, the Health Department, the Police Department, or any other public authorities now having any jurisdiction in the premises.

Sec. 2. For each and every violation of any of the provisions of the foregoing section the person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and be fined,

upon conviction thereof, by any Magistrate, in a sum not less than two dollars (\$2) and not more than ten dollars (\$10).

Sec. 3. No person shall be licensed to peddle, vend or hawk in The City of New York except a resident therein and a citizen of the United States.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The work of laying said pipes to be done in a manner approved by and under the direction and to the satisfaction of the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

The permission hereby granted shall continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen, and anything hereinbefore contained to the contrary notwithstanding, it is hereby expressly stipulated that the permit hereinbefore provided for shall take effect only upon and after the payment by the licensee herein of any sum or sums provided by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as the first monthly, quarterly or annual payment to be paid in consideration of said permit. And also, it is expressly provided and stipulated that in the event the Board of Estimate and Apportionment determines that the licensee herein shall make certain monthly, quarterly or annual payments, the license herein provided for shall cease and determine, without any action on the part of the Board of Aldermen, at the expiration of ninety days after any default in making any one of said payments.

It shall be the duty of every owner, tenant, lessee, occupant or person in charge of any and every building, or place of business in the generally built-up portions of The City of New York, forthwith to provide, or cause to be provided, and at all times thereafter to keep and cause to be kept and provided, within such building or place of business, and for the exclusive use of such building or place of business, separate receptacles for receiving and holding, without leakage, all the ashes, garbage and liquid substances that may accumulate during thirty-six hours, from said building or place of business, or the portion thereof of which such person may be the owner, tenant, lessee, occupant, or in charge, and every such receptacle designed and used to hold ashes shall be made of or lined with some suitable material.

"All such materials and substances shall be separated and put into their respective receptacles, and such receptacles shall not be filled to within four inches of the top thereof.

"Such receptacles, as well as any light refuse or rubbish to be removed, shall be kept within the premises until the proper time for removal and shall then be placed in the area within the stoop-line only, and there shall remain until such materials or substances are removed by the Department of Street Cleaning, but in no case shall such receptacles be placed where they shall be or become a nuisance.

"All light refuse or rubbish likely to be scattered or blown about shall, before being placed outside of any building or premises for removal, be properly bundled, packed or otherwise secured."

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him herein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stock holder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits, thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
