Resolved, That, for the purpose of defraying any minor or incidental expenses contingent to the Department of Finance, the Comptroller may, by a requisition, draw upon the Comptroller for a sum not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500). The Comptroller may, in like manner, renew the draft as often as may be deemed necessary, to the extent of the appropriation set apart for the contingencies of the Department of Finance, but no such renewal shall be made until the moneys paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for by the Comptroller by the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers certified to by the heads of the bureau of the department covering the expenditure of money paid thereon.

DEAR SIR—Since the request was made by your Board that the Interborough Rapid Transit Company cause to be resumed their service by the elevated trains along Westchester avenue, Southern Boulevard and Boston road, nothing appears to have been done to bring about the results desired.

I especially urge that you again call the attention of the Interborough Railroad Company to the needed necessity of complying with your request, and do so by reason of the constant complaints made to me of the lack of proper service to the property owners and residents along lines of previous railroad accommodation.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Commission, New York City:

DEAR SIR—Acknowledging receipt of the resolution passed by your Board on September 7, transmitted to President Belmont by your Secretary on September 8, recommending the operation of certain trains on the Westchester branch of the subway over the Manhattan elevated road, from One Hundred and Forty-ninth street south, we are to-day in receipt of a letter from the Secretary of the Commission advising that you would be pleased to have a report on behalf of this company with regard to this resolution.

Owing to the illness of President Belmont this report has been delayed. The Manhattan line, from the One Hundred and Fiftieth street junction to and including the Harlem River Bridge, is a two-track railroad, and is at the present time, during the rush hours, operated to its full maximum capacity. In order that you may clearly see the situation as it at present exists, we inclose drawing No. 4734, on which we have had plotted the trains now operated during the rush hours from the south end of the Harlem River Bridge to One Hundred and Sixty-third street and Third avenue.



The trains shown on this drawing, which are now being operated over the structure on these two tracks, if it were possible in operation to have them accurately spaced, would be in the precise position shown on this drawing.

Practically the trains occupying these two tracks are almost daily even closer than shown on the drawing. There are enough trains on this section to more than occupy half of the length of the track. To be exact there is less than a train length between trains, which necessarily makes the train movement very slow.

If we are to undertake to operate more trains in either direction over this piece of double track, it would very seriously impair and diminish the rapid transit service via Manhattan or subway for the entire Bronx section.

The population north of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street on the Manhattan division, which far exceeds the population on the subway division north of that point, would be subjected to a loss of trains equal to the number injected from the subway division on to the Manhattan division at the One Hundred and Forty-ninth street junction.

During the past year, and at the present time, the building industry north of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, on the Manhattan branch, is very apparent to any person riding on trains. There have been a large number of new five and six-story flat and apartment houses constructed within a few blocks of the stations on that line. If the change called for by this resolution were made, and the trains withdrawn from the Manhattan division north of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, which would have to be withdrawn, we fear that a much greater complaint would arise from people along that portion of the line than is at present being heard, for diverting subway trains to this division.

The Westchester viaduct structure from One Hundred and Forty-ninth street junction to One Hundred and Eightieth street and Bronx Park, is being operated as an integral part of the Rapid Transit Commission subway design. The territory served by this Westchester branch is rapidly growing, and at the present time the train service needed and operated on this branch is of frequent interval during the rush hours.

The growth of this territory, with the thickly populated territory on Lenox avenue, and the trains which will soon be necessary to supply that traffic morning and evening, will practically fill two operating tracks on the Lenox avenue line. The proposition to divert these trains from subway to Manhattan really means to draw from a line which should have good facilities in order to build it up and add the trains withdrawn to a line already congested to its fullest capacity.

The completion of the additional tracks of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad to Willis avenue within a year, and completion of the Boston and Westchester road to West Farms, will add further to the present congestion, unless additional tracks can be provided for the operation of additional trains.

We would therefore respectfully advise that, in our judgment, it is not feasible nor advisable to change the present operation of subway trains on that division, and, with these facts before your Commission, we feel sure our position in this matter will be fully indorsed, so long as the present facilities remain as they are.

GENTLEMEN—On July 27, 1904, your Secretary addressed a letter to our client, Mrs. Jane T. Jones, the owner of the building at the northeast corner of Bridge and Fulton streets, Brooklyn, relative to the subject of locating a station there with entrances through her building rather than from the sidewalk.

Our client at that time was absent from the City, but as soon as the letter reached her, on or about August 10, she replied thereto, saying that as at present advised, she would be inclined to favor such a project, though she would naturally like to know the detail of the plan before taking any formal action.

Shortly after that we called upon Mr. William B. Parsons, your then Chief Engineer, and the question of the station was the subject of a number of conferences between us, which were later taken up by Mr. Rice, the present Chief Engineer. The result of all these conferences was that we retained an architect and prepared plans and submitted them to your Engineering Department, by which they were eventually approved. All this negotiation was based upon the original statement by Mr. Parsons that, in consideration of our acquiescence in your suggestions, we should have the privilege of using that portion of the property which abutted on your station for window space, and that we should also have an entrance from the station into our building.



At a conference held with Mr. Rice recently, he suggested that we make a formal application to your Board for a confirmation of our plans, which had been submitted as above referred to.

We beg that you will regard this letter as such formal application and, if you desire it, we will be very glad to attend before you at any time that you name with our architect to explain the plans as proposed, if anything therein contained requires explanation.

By the sale and conveyance above referred to, all of the easement property intended to be sold has been disposed of and the proceeds of sale have been received by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company. There remains near the junction of Hillside and Eleventh avenues a triangular plot of land in part covered by Sub-power Station No. 17, in part by the platforms of the railroad station, in part by the tracks of the railroad and in part it is vacant. There are some questions still to be settled with respect to the disposition that should be made of this triangular plot, but in the absence of Mr. Wickersham, General Counsel of the Interborough Company, the matter has remained in abeyance, to be reported on later by Counsel.

The following communication was presented, and the Secretary was directed to inform the writer that it has been the usual practice of the Board not to express any opinion upon proposed legislation unless specially requested to by the Legislature:

GENTLEMEN—I am requested by the Board of Managers of the National Temperance Society to write your Honorable Board, asking what, if any, objections, so far as the work of your Commission is concerned, would there be to our society preparing and presenting a bill before the next Legislature of the State of New York in January, 1906; said bill prohibiting the making of openings in the walls of subways at any of its stations, said openings to connect saloons, cafes, rathskellers and restaurants where intoxicating liquors are sold as beverages; and

Second. If said bill is prepared and presented can the society depend on your support in its action?

In the proposed action the society has only two objects in view, viz.: The best interests and safety of our citizens who use the subways in traveling to and fro in our City. And, secondly, to save your Honorable Board from annoyance by any other applicants to connect their saloons, cafes, rathskellers and restaurants with the platforms of the subway stations in any part of our City.

The society would be very glad if you would revoke the permit of Joseph Schmitt at the Fourteenth street station, and close the opening now existing.

I shall be very glad at any time to appear before your Honorable Board and answer any questions you may desire to ask on behalf of the society.

DEAR SIR—A portion of the rapid transit railroad under construction, pursuant to the contract between this company and The City of New York, dated July 21, 1902, viz.: the line from City Hall to and including the South Ferry station, is now being operated by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company in connection with the road included in Contract No. 1, pursuant to permission granted by resolutions of your Board adopted June 29, 1905.

It has always been in contemplation that the lease part of that contract, including the obligation to provide the equipment, should be assigned to the Interborough Rapid Transit Company—Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company being only a business corporation and designed as a contracting company, not as an operating company. I, therefore, hand you a form of assignment from Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company to Interborough Rapid Transit Company, and also the form of agreement between The City of New York (acting by your Board), Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company and Interborough Rapid Transit Company, which instruments are intended to accomplish the assignment of such leasing part of Contract No. 2, including the obligation to provide equipment. These instruments are in the same form which was adopted in transferring the lease part of the McDonald contract to Interborough Rapid Transit Company and which had the approval of your Board.

I beg to request that your Board will authorize these agreements to be executed, and upon being advised of the adoption of a resolution to that effect by your Honorable Board these companies will execute the same.

The following resolution was adopted:

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the nature and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from, or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
