## BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

(FINANCIAL MATTERS.)

MINUTES OF MEETING OF BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK,  
HELD IN ROOM 16, CITY HALL, FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 21, 1906.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Herman A. Metz, Comptroller; Elias Goodman, Acting President of the Board of Aldermen; John F. Ahearn, President of the Borough of Manhattan; Bird S. Coler, President of the Borough of Brooklyn; Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx; Joseph Bermel, President of the Borough of Queens; George Cromwell, President of the Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. George B. McClellan, presided.

After disposing of the Public Improvement calendar the following financial matters were considered by unanimous consent:

The Comptroller presented the following communication transmitting statements showing the uncollected taxes and deficiencies at January 1, 1905, to be funded by the issue of Corporate Stock, pursuant to chapter 208, Laws of 1906, together with a report thereon made to him by the Chief Accountant and Bookkeeper of the Department of Finance:

September 17, 1906.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I transmit herewith statements showing the uncollected taxes and deficiencies as at January 1, 1905, and June 1, 1906, together with a report thereon, made to me by the Chief Accountant and Bookkeeper of this Department, for the guidance of your Honorable Board in complying with the provisions of chapter 208, Laws of 1906, which reads as follows:

"The board of estimate and apportionment of the city of New York shall on or before the first day of October, nineteen hundred and six, authorize corporate stock of the city of New York to be issued to an amount equal to so much of the deficiency, on the first day of January, nineteen hundred and five, in the product of taxes theretofore levied and deemed by the board to be uncollectible, as shall not have been provided for in prior tax levies or by the issue of corporate stock of the city of New York. Such corporate stock shall be authorized to be issued by the board of estimate and apportionment without the concurrence or approval of any other board or public body."

SIR—In order to comply with the provisions of chapter 208, Laws of 1906, which reads as follows:

"The board of estimate and apportionment of the city of New York shall on or before the first day of October, nineteen hundred and six, authorize corporate stock of the city of New York to be issued to an amount equal to so much of the deficiency, on the first day of January, nineteen hundred and five, in the product of taxes theretofore levied and deemed by the board to be uncollectible, as shall not have been provided for in prior tax levies or by the issue of corporate stock of the city of New York. Such corporate stock shall be authorized to be issued by the board of estimate and apportionment without the concurrence or approval of any other board or public body."

—I have prepared and transmit herewith a statement showing the amount of taxes uncollected as at January 1, 1905. The amounts representing the uncollected taxes levied for the years 1882 to 1898 in the former City of New York are balances stated on the books of the Receiver of Taxes, which presumptively represent uncollected personal taxes. As no audit was ever made of the tax rolls for the years 1882 to 1898, it may be possible that the said tax rolls contain items of real estate which the Receiver has not yet transmitted to the Collector of Assessments and Arrears, and which cannot be revealed until the accounts are audited, or until after periodical searches are made by the several title companies. Furthermore, they evidently contain over and double payments credited to the several tax accounts, as reflected on the ledger, thereby reducing the ledger balances to the extent of the amount of the over and double payments made and not refunded. In other words, the total amount of uncollected items, as shown on the tax rolls, is not in agreement with the balances as stated on the books of the Receiver of Taxes. Subsequent to 1898, however, the Receiver of Taxes proved and audited the tax rolls, so that the amount representing the uncollected personal taxes for the years 1899 to 1904, inclusive, as stated upon his books, is actually established.

The uncollected amounts for the years 1899 to 1904, inclusive, are now in the hands of the Assistant Corporation Counsel, in charge of the Bureau for the Collection of Personal Taxes, for collection, but as no system of accounting prevails in that Bureau it is difficult to determine, without a time-consuming examination of the records, as to what extent the uncollected personal taxes have been disposed of, and concerning which the Receiver of Taxes has no knowledge.

It may be advisable, for the purpose of complying with the provisions of chapter 208, Laws of 1906, to consider the balances of personal taxes for the years 1899 to 1904, inclusive, as stated upon the books of the Receiver of Taxes as being uncollectible, because it is doubtful if any of them will be collected in the future.

Your attention is directed to an amount, viz., \$1,305,145.66, which is deducted from the total amount of outstanding and uncollected taxes for the years 1882 to 1898, inclusive. It appears, from a report made by Isaac Barrett, General Bookkeeper of this Department (copy of which is transmitted herewith), that provisions were made, in the sum of \$4,183,000, for certain deficiencies in taxes, which amount now appears to the credit of an account entitled Adjustment Account.

In Mr. Barrett's report he calls attention to the fact that this amount, viz., \$4,183,000, should be transferred to the credit of an account now known on the general ledger as Deficiencies in Taxes, Manhattan and The Bronx.

Following Mr. Barrett's suggestion, and taking this amount, viz., \$4,183,000 00

—as a basis, I have deducted therefrom the following items properly chargeable thereto:

Debit balance as at December 31, 1904, of the account known as Deficiencies in Taxes, Manhattan and The Bronx .....	\$2,083,347.44

—which would leave a balance of..... \$1,305,145.66 to the credit of Deficiencies in Taxes, Manhattan and The Bronx, which would appear to be applicable to the reduction of deficiencies in the product of taxes levied for the years 1898 and prior.

Your attention is further directed to the Special Franchise Taxes for the years 1900, 1901 and 1902. It appears that the Special Franchise Tax Law requires the State Board of Tax Commissioners to assess special franchises at their full value, while other real estate was not assessed as the law directs. When proceedings were brought before Judge Earle to set aside the assessments as unconstitutional, the State Tax Commissioners testified that they had assessed special franchises at full value, and evidence was introduced to the effect that the real estate in The City of New York was assessed at about two-thirds of full value. Judge Earle in his opinion said that "These assessments will have to be reduced at least so much as will equalize them

with the other assessments in the same localities." Hence the loss on account of Special Franchise Taxes for those years will amount to about one-third of the levy less the amount already canceled.

Your attention is further directed to the taxes levied on property owned by the City and now appearing as a lien thereon. These taxes might be included in this statement, but in the absence of any complete statement showing the exact amount of taxes now a lien on City property, I anticipated including an approximate amount, and to that end this Department appealed to the Corporation Counsel for his advice as to the advisability of so doing.

Under date of July 24, 1906, the Corporation Counsel replied to questions submitted by this Department, viz.:

First—Does the law contemplate that arrears of taxes on property owned by the City shall be included as uncollectible?

Second—If so, may an approximate sum be arbitrarily used in the absence of a correct statement of such arrears?

—in the following manner:

"In my opinion arrears of taxes on property owned by the City should be treated as other arrears of taxes. If such taxes are for any reason deemed by the Board of Estimate to be uncollectible provision for the deficiency should be made by the issue of Corporate Stock.

"It may be impossible to determine precisely the amount of uncollectible taxes in arrears on January 1, 1905, but the difficulty will be greater in the case of other arrears than in the case of arrears on City property. The statute leaves the determination to the judgment of the Board of Estimate, and the judgment of the Board must be founded on the best attainable evidence. No sum should be arbitrarily used. The amount deemed uncollectible may in any event be only approximate, but it should be as precise as the nature of the word will permit."

From the foregoing opinion it appears that it would be inadvisable to include an arbitrary amount to provide for taxes levied on City property and now appearing as a lien thereon, but taking into consideration the provisions of chapter 209, Laws of 1906, which reads as follows:

"Section 1. Section two hundred and forty-eight of the Greater New York Charter, as re-enacted by chapter four hundred and sixty-six of the laws of nineteen hundred and one, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 248. Deficiencies: amount of to be included in annual estimate.

"The board of estimate and apportionment shall, in addition to such other amounts as it is required by law to provide and as in its discretion it provides for public purposes in the city of New York and the several counties wholly contained in its territorial limits, annually include in its final estimate the following sum, which shall annually be raised and appropriated. A sum equal to so much of the deficiency, on the preceding first day of January, in the product of taxes theretofore levied and deemed by the board to be uncollectible, as shall not have been provided for in prior tax levies or by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, or by such Corporate Stock duly authorized by said board to be issued."

It would appear that instead of including in the Budget each year a sum averaging something over \$1,600,000, it will be necessary to include something over \$4,000,000, representing the uncollectible personal taxes of each year's levy, together with the cancellations and remissions authorized by the Court's Tax Commissioners or the Comptroller, and the discount allowed, which would amount to, on an average, \$1,000,000, making a net increase in the Budget each year of something over \$3,400,000.

It is also highly probable that there are latent deficiencies incident to the taxes levied by the former municipalities consolidated at January 1, 1898, but inasmuch as no audit or adjustment has been made which would develop the extent of such deficiency, it is impossible at this date to determine the amount even approximately, and for that reason such possible deficiency has been excluded in the preparation of these statements, and no specific disposition can accordingly be made of said deficiencies until such time as adequate measures are taken to review the accounts for such purpose, when they may be disposed of in the manner provided by chapter 209, Laws of 1906.

In view of these facts, and for the purpose of providing for all deficiencies prior to January 1, 1905 (as near as can be determined or estimated), and owing to our inability (because of limited time) to absolutely determine the exact amount of taxes levied on City property and remaining unpaid, an amount which, in the judgment of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is conservative, could be added to the amount as shown on the attached statement, and if, upon future investigation, it appears that that amount is too large and a surplus results (if all the bonds are issued), the said surplus could be transferred to the General Fund and made a part of the amount which is yearly applied to the reduction of taxation.

I have also prepared and transmit herewith a statement showing the amount uncollected as at June 1, 1906, which is compiled on the same basis as the statement showing the amount uncollected as at January 1, 1905.

It appears from the attached statements that the total amount of uncollected items, together with deficiencies, as at January 1, 1905, is \$35,724,764.05, and as at June 1, 1906, is \$36,034,828.99—an increase of something over \$300,000 during a period of seventeen months. In view of the condition of the accounts as heretofore explained, I would respectfully recommend that in order to comply with the provisions of chapter 208, Laws of 1906, bonds be authorized to be issued to the amount of \$36,000,000, to which may be added whatever sum the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may deem adequate to provide for such latent deficiencies as are not included in this statement, said bonds to be issued in such amounts as are required from time to time.

MR. BARRETT'S REPORT.

When Andrew H. Green was made Comptroller of The City of New York on September 16, 1871, he found the treasury practically empty, the City flooded with debts, and judgments against the City pouring in from every side.

The tax levy for the year 1871 was \$17,556,363.03, and against this levy Revenue Bonds had been issued as follows:

On City Account (general ledger, folio 824) .....	\$12,566,400 00
On County Account (County ledger, folio 54) .....	4,639,800 00
	<u>\$17,206,200 00</u>

The books were opened for the collection of taxes of 1871 on October 4, but the receipts therefrom were barely sufficient to meet the immediately maturing Revenue Bonds and current expenses. On January 1, 1872, there remained outstanding Revenue Bonds of 1871 on City Account \$5,479,100, and on County Account \$890,000, a total of \$6,369,100, together with the interest thereon due January 15.

The Legislature, which convened at Albany on January 1, 1872, recognized the situation and passed its first bill January 10, known as chapter 1, Laws of 1872, authorizing the Comptroller

—"to issue revenue bonds of the city and county of New York (not exceeding the amount of the said bonds so falling due and interest) in such form and manner as he may prescribe \* \* \* payable in two years from the date thereof; and it shall be lawful for said comptroller, and he is hereby authorized to apply toward the redemption of said bonds falling due during the month of January aforesaid such portion of the collection of taxes heretofore levied in said county as he may deem proper."

Pursuant to the above act of the Legislature, and under the power conferred thereby, the Comptroller issued on City Account, Revenue Bonds of 1874 (general ledger, folio 698) to the amount of \$4,727,497.55; and County Revenue Bonds of 1874 (County ledger, folio 55) to the amount of \$890,000.

From the arrears of taxes of 1871, collected in 1872 and 1873, the Comptroller redeemed certain of the foregoing Revenue Bonds, so that at maturity, January 15, 1874, there remained of the City Revenue Bonds \$3,390,497.55, and of County Revenue Bonds, \$820,000, for the redemption of which taxes were not collected nor collectible.



By a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted at a meeting held on Tuesday, December 16, 1873 (printed minutes, 1873, pages 228-30), the Comptroller was

—“authorized, empowered, and directed to create and issue from time to time as may be required ‘Consolidated Stock of The City of New York’ and ‘Consolidated Stock of the County of New York,’ in conformity with the provisions of chapters 322 and 323 of the Laws of 1871, and under the authority of the laws of the State of New York hereinafter referred to.”

—etc., etc., to wit,  
“Consolidated Stock of The City of New York, as provided by section 4 of chapter 444 of the Laws of 1872, and section 2 of chapter 756 of the Laws of 1873, to provide the means to pay \* \* \* such of the Revenue Bonds of The City of New York, issued under and by virtue of chapter 1 of the Laws of 1872, as may be unpaid at the time of the issue of the bonds hereby authorized \* \* \*,”

—and  
“Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, as provided in section 4 of chapter 444 of the Laws of 1872,”

—etc., as above,  
—“to provide the means to pay Revenue Bonds of the County of New York \* \* \* issued under and by virtue of chapter 1 of the Laws of 1872,”

—etc., etc., as above.  
Pursuant to the above resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and under the Laws of the State of New York, there was issued for the redemption of said Revenue Bonds:

Consolidated Stock of The City of New York (1896)..... \$3,390,497 55  
Consolidated Stock of the County of New York (1896)..... 820,000 00

The Consolidated Stock thus authorized was slightly reduced by the payment from the arrears of taxes of Revenue Bonds of The City to the amount of \$12,997.55, and of County Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$14,500, so that Consolidated Stock was issued for only \$3,377,500 for the redemption of Revenue Bonds of the City, and \$805,500 for the redemption of County Revenue Bonds.

The amount of Consolidated Stock so issued for the redemption of Revenue Bonds of the City and County of New York, when said stock was redeemed in December, 1896, was offset by a credit to Deficiencies in Taxes (journal 3 to general ledger 3, folio 25).

On folio 324 of the same journal this entry is reversed as being “erroneous.” The reversing entry is erroneous, and the original entry crediting Deficiencies in Taxes is correct, as must appear from the foregoing statement and history of the cause and issue of the bonds.

The following resolution was offered by the Comptroller:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 208 of the Laws of 1906, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby authorizes the Comptroller to issue from time to time in the manner provided by section 169 of the Revised Greater New York Charter, Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to the amount of \$36,000,000, to provide for the deficiency on the first day of January, 1905, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to be uncollectible and not provided for in prior tax levies, or by the issues of Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The Comptroller presented the following communication transmitting statements, showing the deficiency in the product of the tax levy of 1905, as at January 1, 1906, and as at September 1, 1906, respectively, together with a report thereon made to him by the Chief Accountant and Bookkeeper of the Department of Finance, which was ordered printed in the minutes and laid over for consideration with the Budget of 1907.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I transmit herewith statement showing the deficiency in the product of the Tax Levy of 1905, as at January 1, 1906, and as at September 1, 1906, respectively, together with a report thereon, made to me by the Chief Accountant and Bookkeeper of the Department for the guidance of your Honorable Board in complying with the provisions of section 248 of chapter 209, Laws of 1906, which reads as follows:

"Sec. 248. Deficiencies; amount of to be included in annual estimate.

"The board of estimate and apportionment shall, in addition to such other amounts as it is required by law to provide and as in its discretion it provides for public purposes in the city of New York and the several counties wholly contained in its territorial limits, annually include in its final estimate the following sum, which shall annually be raised and appropriated. Under date of September 13, 1906, I transmitted to you several statements showing the deficiencies in the product of taxes for the year 1904 and prior years as at January 1, 1905, and as at June 1, 1906, respectively, together with a recommendation that bonds amounting to \$36,000,000 be authorized to be issued for the purpose of providing for the said deficiencies.

While chapter 208, Laws of 1906, provides that bonds should be authorized for deficiencies existing as at January 1, 1905, still I am of the opinion that inasmuch as the records show an additional deficiency since that date, it would be advisable to consider the deficiency existing as at June 1, 1906, as the amount uncollectible as at January 1, 1905. In view therefore of the fact that the deficiencies of the taxes of 1904 and prior years were fully treated of in the statements submitted under date of September 13, I am merely treating in the statements herewith submitted of the tax of 1905.

The first statement shows the apparent deficiency as at January 1, 1906, and the second statement shows the apparent deficiency as at September 1, 1906. The latter could be used for the purpose of complying with the provisions of chapter 209, Laws

of 1906, and I would therefore respectfully recommend that the sum of \$4,500,000 be included in the Budget for the year 1907.

#### BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

MINUTES, MEETING OF THE BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, HELD IN ROOM 16, CITY HALL, FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 28, 1906.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Herman A. Metz, Comptroller, Elias Goodman, Acting President of the Board of Aldermen; John F. Ahearn, President of the Borough of Manhattan; Bird S. Coler, President of the Borough of Brooklyn; Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx; Joseph Bermel, President of the Borough of Queens; George Cromwell, President of the Borough of Richmond.  
Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, presided.

#### Fort George Street Railway Company.

The public hearing on the application of the Fort George Street Railway Company for a franchise to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway upon and along St. Nicholas avenue (Eleventh avenue), West One Hundred and Ninetieth street, Audubon avenue and West One Hundred and Ninety-third street, in the Borough of Manhattan, as fixed for this day, by resolution duly adopted July 6, 1906, was opened.

No one appeared in opposition to the proposed grant.

A. Leo Everett, counsel for the company, appeared in favor.

No one else desiring to be heard, the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The matter was laid over pending investigation and suggestions from the Bureau of Franchises, to whom this application was referred on July 6.

#### New York City Interborough Railway Company.

The public hearing on the application of the New York City Interborough Railway Company for a change of the line of its route upon and along certain streets and avenues in the Borough of The Bronx, and to substitute therefor a route beginning at the intersection of Ogden avenue and East One Hundred and Sixty-first street and running thence upon and along Ogden avenue to its intersection with Aqueduct avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, as fixed for this day by resolution duly adopted July 6, 1906, was opened.

No one appeared in opposition to the proposed grant.

Alfred A. Gardner, of counsel for the company, appeared in favor.

No one else desiring to be heard, the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The matter was then referred back to the Bureau of Franchises for further consideration and investigation.

#### New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company and the New York and Harlem Railroad Company.

A communication was received from the Mayor's office, transmitting, duly approved by the Mayor, resolution adopted September 14, 1906, fixing September 28, 1906, as the date for public hearing on the application of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, for itself and as lessee of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, for a franchise, and designating the "Sun" and "Times" as the newspapers in which notice of such hearing should be published.

Which was ordered filed.

The public hearing on the application of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, for itself and as lessee of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, for a franchise for the construction of ducts or subways through certain streets and avenues in the Borough of The Bronx, to transmit electricity for the purpose of electrifying the lines of the companies, in conformity with chapter 425 of the Laws of 1903, as fixed for this day by resolution duly adopted September 14, 1906, was opened.

Julius H. Haas appeared in opposition to the proposed grant.

J. H. Uhl, of counsel for the company, appeared in favor.

No one else desiring to be heard, the Chair declared the hearing closed.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,  
BUREAU OF FRANCHISES, ROOM 79, NO. 280 BROADWAY,  
September 24, 1906.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company (hereinafter called the New York Central Company), for itself and as lessee of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, on June 8, 1906, presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a verified petition, dated May 25, 1906, and signed by William J. Wilgus, Vice-President, asking for a franchise for the construction of ducts or subways through certain streets in the Borough of The Bronx. Owing to technical errors in the original petition, an amended petition dated September 10, 1906, was submitted in place thereof. The petition was referred to this Bureau for investigation and suggestions.

The route of such subway is as follows:

Beginning at a point in Webster avenue where East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street, if prolonged southeasterly, would intersect the right of way of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company; thence northwesterly across Webster avenue to East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street, and thence northwesterly through East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street to a point between Valentine avenue and the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, at the intersection of East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street and Kingsbridge road; thence in a general northwesterly direction through Kingsbridge road to a point where said Kingsbridge road intersects the right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company.

Also beginning at a point on the westerly side of the right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company on the easterly side of Exterior street, about 300 feet south from West One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street; thence westerly across said Exterior street to and along private property of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company.

Between the above mentioned points at Kingsbridge road and the New York Central Company's right of way, and the point on the northerly side of Exterior street, the subway is on said company's right of way.

The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company is a corporation formed by the consolidation, on the first day of November, 1869, of the railroads known as the New York Central Railroad and the Hudson River Railroad.

The Hudson River Railroad was chartered by chapter 216 of the Laws of 1846, and the New York and Harlem Railroad Company was chartered by chapter 263 of the Laws of 1831, and on April 1, 1873, was leased to the New York Central Company for a term of 401 years.

By chapter 425 of the Laws of 1903, which became a law May 7, 1903, it is provided in section 4 thereof that after the expiration of five years from the passage of said act, it should not be lawful, except in case of necessity arising from the temporary failure of such other motive power as may be adopted, for any railroad corporation to operate trains by steam locomotives in Park avenue, south of the Harlem river. This section further provided that the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, and its lessee, the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, so long as it remains such lessee, and the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, so long as it has any contract or other rights to operate its trains in Park avenue, south of the Harlem river, and such other railroad companies as may hereafter obtain permission therefor, be authorized to run their trains by electricity, compressed air, or any motive power other than steam, and which does not involve combustion in the motors themselves.

The primary object of this law was to compel the several railroads operating in Park avenue to abandon the use of steam power in the Park avenue tunnel, extending from Fifty-ninth street to Ninety-sixth street.

In pursuance of this provision the New York Central Company is about to substitute electricity for steam, and instead of confining the transmission of its trains by this power to Park avenue, south of the Harlem river, as provided in the above-mentioned act, is to operate by electricity over the entire zone covered by its suburban traffic. The construction of the proposed subway is made necessary by reason of this change of motive power.

Two generating stations or power houses, one at Port Morris and the other at Yonkers, have been built by the New York Central Company. Each of these generating stations normally delivers current to four adjacent substations, from which in turn power is supplied to the third rail.

The Port Morris generating station supplies power to the four substations located at Fiftyth street in the new terminal yards, at Mott Haven in the present railroad yards, at Bronx Park and at Scarsdale on the Harlem Division.

The Yonkers generating station feeds the substations located at Kingsbridge, Glenwood, Irvington and Ossining, on the main line of the New York Central Company.

These two generating stations have been connected by one power transmission system following the company's right of way along the Hudson River Division from Mott Haven to Kingsbridge, and plans have been made by the New York Central Company for a duplicate system to follow the railroad company's right of way over the Putnam Division to the point at or near Kingsbridge where the Putnam and Hudson River Divisions join, and thence through Kingsbridge road and West One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street to the substation at Bronx Park.

The capacity of the two generating stations is such that in case of accident to either of them the other is able to do the work performed by the two under normal conditions and supply current not only to the substations adjacent to itself, but also to those fed by the crippled station. For example, should the Yonkers generating station become disabled, the Port Morris station, in addition to supplying current to the four substations on the Harlem Division, as indicated above, would, by means of the transmission line connecting the substations at Mott Haven and Kingsbridge, be able to supply power to the four substations on the Hudson River Division.

The object of this duplicate connection is to guard against interruption of train service which may occur in case of accident to either one of the generating stations. In order to carry out this plan, the company has made the petition for the right to construct a subway in Kingsbridge road and West One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street, that being the portion of the route of the duplicate system which lies within the public streets.

The current is to be generated at the two power stations and thence transmitted by cables through the proposed subway at 11,000 volts. Before transmission from the substations to the third rail the current is reduced to 660 volts.

The total length of subway to be constructed in and under the streets of the City along the proposed route is 6,370 feet. The width of the subway is 2 feet 11 inches, and its height about 3 feet 3 inches. It will thus be seen that the subway is to occupy much more of the subsurface of the streets than the ordinary construction of this character.

A trench of these dimensions would hold about fifty single ducts laid in the usual manner, for the purpose of carrying low tension wires. The subway to be constructed by the New York Central Company is to be built with 6-inch concrete walls on the four sides, leaving an interior space of approximately 2 feet by 2 feet 3 inches. Through the centre of this space a concrete wall 1 foot thick is to be built, thus dividing the subway into two portions, in each of which five ducts to carry the cables will be placed. This heavy construction is due to the high voltage to be carried and the desire of the company to guard in every way possible against interruption to train service by reason of burnouts. Hence the wall through the centre of the subway is to be built as an extra precaution against danger from this source.

In addition, splicing chambers or manholes of a particular type and construction are to be built at eighteen points in the streets. These splicing chambers are likewise to be divided into two parts by a concrete wall through the centre, and will occupy a space in the subsurface of the streets of approximately 110 square feet each. Entrance to these splicing chambers is effected by means of chimneys extending from the top of the chamber to the surface of the street, so that it will be necessary on account of the construction of the splicing chambers to have two of these chimneys for each chamber, and consequently two covers on the surface of the street.

This application is the first grant of this character that the Board has been called upon to make. One unusual feature presented is that of the high voltage to be carried. The highest voltage carried by companies in the City in subways are those of the New York Edison Company, the Interborough Railway Company, and the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, each of which carry 6,600 volts.

The Commission on Municipal Electric Lighting in its report proposed about this same voltage between generating and substations for the system designed for lighting the streets and public buildings.

In carrying high voltage current in an insulated cable the source of trouble is in the breakdown of the insulation, and it is questionable whether, from the City's standpoint, this is a source of danger if the cables are laid in a subway properly constructed.

Electric power lines of constantly increasing voltage are being constructed and operated with success, and as high voltage is, from an economical standpoint, usually more desirable, I believe it is unwise to even limit by the terms of the franchise the voltage which may be used in such a subway.

This matter of voltage and method of construction to prevent danger from that source should, however, receive some attention by the City, and I would suggest that the plans for the subway be approved by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity before the same is constructed, and that the work of construction be done under his supervision, and if any higher than 11,000 volts be contemplated by the New York Central Company during the term of the franchise, that company should obtain permission from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. This latter provision would be covered by the clause suggested by that Commissioner in a communication under date of July 20, 1906, in a reply to a letter of inquiry from this office.

Maps should be filed with the several departments which should be made from measurements after the subway is constructed, showing the location of the subway, the manholes with reference to the side lines of the streets, curbs, etc.

Conditions have been discussed and suggested in previous reports of this Bureau upon application for franchises which require the construction of conduit or pipes in the street. Many of these conditions are applicable to the New York Central Company, and I will therefore recommend that they be inserted in the contract to that company without further discussion. They are:

Term of grant, 25 years, with privilege of renewal for a further term of 25 years upon revaluation and appraisal; the rights granted are subject to the right, title or interest of abutting property owners in and to the streets; all work to be done under the supervision of the President of the Borough and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and all expense incurred for inspection of the work of construction to be borne by the company. The company shall keep in repair that portion of the surface of the street immediately over and above the subway and for a distance of five feet on either side thereof, and for a distance of five feet in all directions around the covers of the splicing chambers; the company to maintain and care for all underground and overground structures interfered with by the construction of the subway; alterations in the sewerage or drainage system of the City made necessary by the construction of the subway to be made at the expense of the company; if the space occupied by the subway is required by the City for any public improvement, the company shall, at its own expense, alter and rebuild the subway as directed by the proper officials.

City to have the right to grant a similar privilege on the same or other terms to any person or corporation. Company to assume all liability by reason of the construction and operation of the subway. The subway to be used only by the company and for no other purpose than the transmission of electrical power. A penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) daily for failure to maintain the structures of the company in good condition. Security deposit of \$10,000.

#### Compensation.

The privilege asked for, though for the use of a public service corporation, should be, in my opinion, considered only as an indirect benefit to the public. Not in the same sense as a conduit carrying telephone or electric lighting wires with which the abutting property owners could make connection, but in that it is to be used in case of emergency or break down, and hence be of benefit to the travelling public by lessening the chance of delay in certain emergencies which may possibly arise. Although it is unlikely that the duct or subway under discussion will ever be used by the New York Central Company as a source of income, still the privilege applied for is of considerable value to the applicant in enabling it to economically and efficiently operate its railroad, and I believe that the company should pay the City a substantial annual sum for the right in line with the rates heretofore established by the Board.

These rates apply to pipes 16 inches in diameter, or less, viz.: \$2 per foot for the first 100 feet and decreasing by regular steps to \$1 per foot for 600 feet and over.

Although this conduit is over twice the area of a 16-inch pipe, in view of the fact that it is to be used by a public service corporation and not by a private individual for exclusive benefit and profit, I considered that a proper charge per annum would be the regular charge for a pipe 16 inches or less, with an additional charge of \$25 per annum for each splicing chamber or manhole constructed, and the omission of the customary initial payment. This would amount to an annual payment of \$7,150.

I took this matter up with Mr. George A. Harwood, Terminal Engineer, and Mr. Edwin B. Katte, Electrical Engineer, for the New York Central Company, and they emphatically objected to any such price. They argued that this application to the City was, on the part of the New York Central Company merely a business transaction and that the franchise was worth to the railroad only an amount representing the difference in cost between the proposed subway if constructed by them, and the rental they would have to pay a subway company, or about \$3,000 per annum.

In support of this, the representatives of the New York Central Company maintained that it was not necessary for them to ask the City for this franchise, and that they could obtain the desired service from the New York Edison Company, who have a franchise to operate electrical conductors. There is no subway in the street at present, but as the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company, a company authorized to construct subways, is controlled by the New York Edison Company, the representatives of the New York Central Company inform me that there will not be trouble in securing the construction of the subway and the service required.

This method would, however, not give to the New York Central Company the exclusive use and control of the subway, as the subway company would probably build not only for the New York Central Company, but would construct a conduit of sufficient size to permit of its use by others. The exclusive use of such a subway by the railroad company will be, in my opinion, of immense advantage to the company, and its pecuniary value I consider to be material and should be considered in fixing the compensation.

While the price I originally proposed to the representatives of the railroad I do not consider to be in any manner excessive for the space which the proposed subway will occupy in the street, still I am of the opinion that the City should facilitate this work and meet the company part way, and I would therefore propose that the compensation be fixed at the sum of \$6,000 per annum. It has usually been the custom to raise the compensation of all grants after the first ten years, by from 50 to 100 per cent., but as this case presents some features different from a company deriving revenue directly from the grant, I would recommend, as a further concession, that the sum of \$6,000 be made a flat rate for the entire term of twenty-five years.

#### Duct Space for City.

On September 14, 1906, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That in investigating the application of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, the Bureau of Franchises be instructed to consider the question of reserving to the City space in any conduit constructed by the company."

It has been the custom to reserve at least two ducts for the use of the City in cases where the franchise applied for is of such a nature that ducts are necessary for operation.

As already pointed out, this conduit is an exceptionally massive structure, the intention being to construct a subway particularly adapted to very high voltage wires. The expense of construction therefore is large.

In discussing with the representatives of the company the question of the reservation of two ducts for the use of the City they stated that while the company, if required to do so, would be willing to permit the use of two ducts out of the ten proposed, that the compensation to be paid should in such an event be reduced by an amount representing the interest on the proportional cost of the construction of such ducts, to wit: one-fifth of the total cost. This subway is necessary to the railroad company for the reasons before pointed out. Although it is to contain ten ducts, of which four only are to be used immediately by the company, I do not think that the value of the two reserved ducts to the City can, in fairness, be estimated at one-fifth the total cost. The cost of this subway is estimated by the company to be \$100,000. It will therefore be seen that the amount the company claims should be deducted from the



compensation would be the interest on \$20,000, or \$1,000 per annum, should the City elect to use the ducts.

The Board has never before been called upon to consider the reservation of duct space in a conduit or subway as an offset to the compensation to be paid, and has always regarded it as a right belonging to the City and in no way connected with the amount to be paid for the use and occupation of the streets. The use which the City can make of any space in this subway is at present problematical. Placing signal wires in the same subway with high voltage lines or electric light wires has been deemed impracticable by engineers, and inasmuch as the voltage to be used by the New York Central Company is 11,000, the City would be unable to use any ducts reserved for signal wire purposes.

There is a possibility that the City may in time require the use of subways for other than signal wires, that is, for municipal electric lighting. I believe, however, that subways even for this purpose will not be required for some years in the street in which the franchise is asked. The system devised for lighting by the Commission on Electric Lighting for The City of New York, as set forth in its report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 14, 1905, requires no higher voltage than 3,500 in this portion of the Borough of The Bronx. As this voltage is much lower than that contemplated by the New York Central Company, it would seem that a less expensive subway is required for municipal lighting purposes.

The situation as it appears to me is that the City will be unable to use this subway for the purpose of placing therein signal wires, and if a subway is required for municipal electric lighting a less expensive one will answer the purpose just as well, if any such allowance as proposed by the company should be made.

The precedent of reserving two ducts in grants for all subways should, however, in my opinion, be maintained.

I have embodied all the foregoing terms and conditions in a tentative form of contract, which is appended.

Pursuant to law, the Board has fixed September 28 for a public hearing, and notices of such hearing were directed to be published in the "Sun" and "Times," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and also in the CITY RECORD. After such hearing, I would suggest that the Board modify the proposed contract as it sees fit, and that the contract be then sent to the Corporation Counsel for examination and for such suggestions as he may deem it advisable to make, in order that the City's interests may be fully protected.

When approved by the Corporation Counsel, the contract should be returned to the Board, and if it is then the intention of the Board to grant the franchise a resolution should be adopted approving of the proposed terms and conditions, and ordering the same entered in full upon the minutes, and advertised for twenty days in the CITY RECORD and twice in two daily newspapers, and a day set for a public hearing, after which final action may be taken.

**PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.**

This Contract, made this \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 190\_\_\_\_, by and between THE CITY OF NEW YORK, party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, and the NEW YORK CENTRAL AND HUDSON RIVER RAILROAD COMPANY, for itself, and as lessee of the NEW YORK AND HARLEM RAILROAD COMPANY, a domestic corporation of the State of New York, hereinafter called the Company, party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City of New York hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the franchise, right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a subway not to exceed two feet and eleven inches in width, with the necessary splicing chambers, for the sole purpose of transmitting power for the operation of its trains by electricity, as required by chapter 425 of the Laws of 1903, said subway to be beneath the surface of the following named streets, avenues and highways between the points described as follows, all situate in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, to wit:

Beginning at a point in Webster avenue where East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street, if prolonged southeasterly, would intersect the right of way of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company; thence northwesterly across Webster avenue to East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street, and thence northwesterly through East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street to a point between Valentine avenue and the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, at the intersection of East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street and Kingsbridge road; thence in a general northwesterly direction through Kingsbridge road to a point where said Kingsbridge road intersects the right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company.

Also beginning at a point on the westerly side of the right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company on the easterly side of Exterior street, about 300 feet south from West One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street; thence westerly across said Exterior street to and along private property of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company;

—the said right of way and the location of the said splicing chambers being shown on a map entitled:

"N. Y. C. & H. R. R. R. Leased and Operated Lines. Electrification of Lines. Location Plan—Cable Ducts. Kingsbridge Road and 194th Street, New York City."

—dated October 30, 1905, signed by W. J. Wilgus, Vice-President, copy of which is annexed hereto and made a part of this grant.

Sec. 2. The grant of this franchise, right and privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—The said franchise, right and privilege to lay one subway in each of the streets, avenues or highways, and between the limits as hereinbefore described, and the franchise, right and privilege to maintain and operate the same shall be held and enjoyed by the said Company, its lessees or successors, for a term of twenty-five years from the date of the signing of this contract, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for a further period of twenty-five years, upon a fair revaluation of said franchise, right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal, it shall make application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, or to any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the said Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this grant. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient, if agreed to in writing by the Company and by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or by such other authority in its place. If the Company and the Board, or such other authority in its place for the City, shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this grant, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board or by such other authority in its place) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with such other, fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable; and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by in-

quiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last year of this original grant. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this grant, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—Upon the termination of this contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, all subways and appurtenances thereto, constructed pursuant to this contract, shall be and become the property of The City of New York, without compensation therefor, and the same may be used by the City for any purpose whatsoever. If, however, at the termination of this grant, as above, the City by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, shall so order by resolution, the said Company shall remove, at its own expense, said subway and all appurtenances thereto, and shall restore the streets and pavements to their original condition.

Third—The Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay to The City of New York for this privilege an annual sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000). Such sum shall be paid into the treasury of The City of New York on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the annual amount due to September 30 next preceding; provided, however, that the first payment shall be only for that proportion of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) as the time of signing of this contract by the Mayor before September 30 next preceding shall bear to the whole of one year.

Any and all payments made by the terms of this franchise to The City of New York by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of The City of New York or by any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of the privilege hereby granted, whether original or renewal, as hereinbefore provided, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company, providing for payments of subway rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this grant, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant. Nothing herein contained shall apply to any mortgagee or mere lienor, but shall apply to any purchaser upon foreclosure or under or by virtue of any provision of a mortgage or lien.

Fifth—The rights and privileges granted hereby shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, its successor or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents. This provision, however, shall not apply to the making of a mortgage, but shall apply to a sale under foreclosure.

Sixth—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets, avenues and highways on the route heretofore described.

Seventh—The company shall commence construction of the subway herein authorized, within two months after the signing of this contract, and shall complete the construction of the same within five months from the same date, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine, and all sums paid or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided, however, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may in its discretion extend such time for a period not exceeding one year, but such extension shall not be made unless the reasons given by the grantee for non-fulfillment are in the opinion of the Board, for causes over which the grantee had no control and was in no wise responsible.

Eighth—The operation of electrical conduits, conductors and devices are subject to such rules and regulations as the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity shall from time to time have adopted for the installation of apparatus of this character, in and through the streets of this City, and no work shall be done under this franchise until and unless the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity shall have issued a permit for its construction.

Ninth—All construction which shall be made under this grant shall be done in a manner solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be imposed by the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or their respective successors in authority. The said Company shall submit a working plan of construction to the said President and to the said Commissioner, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said subway, connections, splicing chambers or manholes and other appurtenances, and the mode of protection of all subsurface construction under the streets, avenues and highways described in the routes.

Tenth—The company shall give notice to the President of the Borough of The Bronx and to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in writing, of its intention to begin construction of the work hereby authorized, at least forty-eight hours before such construction commences. The company shall also give notice to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in writing, of the date on which work is commenced and also the date on which the same is completed.

Eleventh—As long as the said subway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street, avenue or highway, the company shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street, avenue or highway in which said subway is constructed immediately over and above the said subway, and for a distance of five feet on either side thereof, and for a distance of five feet in all directions around the cover or covers of each and every splicing chamber, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe, and the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street, avenue or highway, and in that event the company, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twelfth—The Company shall, in the course of construction of the subway, maintain and care for all underground and overground structures in its route, or directly interfered with by its construction, and any necessary interference shall be subject to reasonable regulation by the Department of the government of the City under control or charge thereof.

Thirteenth—Any alteration which may be required in the sewerage or drainage system of the City, or to any subsurface structures laid in the streets, avenues and highways along the route of the subway, on account of the construction or operation of the same, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Fourteenth—The Company shall furnish free, for the use of the City, two ducts the entire length of the subway hereby authorized, which shall not be less than three inches in diameter.

Fifteenth—Any alteration in the subway and its appurtenances which shall be made necessary shall, after due notice of the said alteration has been served upon the Company by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, be made at the sole



cost of the Company and in such manner as the City officials having authority and jurisdiction may prescribe.

Sixteenth—Should the City require, for any public improvement, the space occupied by the subway in the streets, avenues or highways for which permission is herein granted, the Company shall, at its own expense, alter the position of and rebuild said subway as directed by the proper City officials.

Seventeenth—All plans for the drainage of the subway and splicing chambers shall be submitted to and approved by the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Eighteenth—The said Company shall bear the expense of inspection, which may be required by the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, of all the work of construction required, or removal of the said subway, which shall be done under this grant.

Nineteenth—Correct maps shall be furnished to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Comptroller, President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, by the Company, showing the exact location of the subway, the splicing chambers or other appurtenances constructed, with reference to the curb lines of the streets and the street surface, and the same shall be furnished to the said several departments or officials within sixty days after the completion of the work authorized by this grant.

Twentieth—The grant of this privilege shall not affect in any way the right of The City of New York to grant a similar privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions to any other person or corporation.

Twenty-first—The Company shall assume all liability by reason of the construction and operation of the subway and the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property by reason of its construction.

As a condition of this grant the Company, its successor or assigns, hereby agrees to repay to the City any damages which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company, its successor or assigns. Due notice of any such demand shall be given to the Company.

Twenty-second—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited or avoided by The City of New York by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten days to the said Company.

Twenty-third—The subway hereby authorized shall be used only by the Company, and for no other purpose than transmitting electrical power for the operation of its trains.

Twenty-fourth—If the said Company, its successors or assigns, shall fail to maintain its structures in good condition throughout the full term of its occupancy of such streets, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York may give written notice to the said Company specifying any default on the part of said Company, and requiring said Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time, and upon the failure of the Company to remedy said default within a reasonable time, said Company shall for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to The City of New York a sum of fifty dollars (\$50) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the said City, in case such structures which may affect the surface of the streets, shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the said Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinbefore provided.

Twenty-fifth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty days after the execution of this contract and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of the terms and conditions of this grant, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege and the penalties herein provided, and in case of default in the performance by said Company of such terms and conditions, The City of New York shall have the right, after due notice, to collect the same from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same, with interest, from said fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said Company. In case of any drafts so made upon this security fund, the said Company shall, upon thirty days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), and in default thereof the grant hereby made may be canceled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Twenty-sixth—The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

Which was referred to the Committee of the Whole, under the rule.

#### Atlantic Telephone Company.

A communication was received from E. W. Bloomingdale, Honorary President, Retail Dry Goods Association, favoring the grant of a franchise to the Atlantic Telephone Company and requesting an opportunity to appear before the Board and present the views of his association.

A communication was received from D. A. Reynolds, Treasurer of the New York Electric Lines Company, in reference to the application of the Atlantic Telephone Company and relative to subway construction by the New York Electric Lines Company.

A communication was received from John M. Shaw, President of the Atlantic Telephone Company, discussing the proposition submitted by the New York Telephone Company, and requesting action on the proposed grant to the Atlantic Telephone Company.

Which were referred to the Committee of the Whole.

A communication was received from the Mayor's office, transmitting, duly approved by the Mayor, resolutions as follows:

Granting to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company permission to construct a temporary track across Western avenue, Borough of Richmond;

Granting to the Traders' Hygiene Ice Company an extension of time in which to complete the construction of a pipe under East One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, Manhattan;

Granting to James S. Maher permission to change the location and an extension of time in which to complete the construction of three tunnels under Brook avenue, Borough of The Bronx; and

Granting to the Seaboard Refrigeration Company an extension of time in which to make the payment of \$5,000 in cash and a deposit of like amount, as required by the contract granting a franchise to the company.

Which was ordered filed.

#### New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company.

The communication from the Law Department, relative to the right of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to maintain and operate certain tracks on Twelfth avenue, between Fifty-eighth and Sixtieth streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, together with a report from the Bureau of Franchises, which were presented to the Board at its meeting of September 14, 1906, and laid over to this day, were, at the request of the Corporation Counsel, laid over for two weeks.

—and the Secretary be authorized to fill the vacancy caused by Miss Schmidt's promotion.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby accepts the resignation of Miss Mary K. Wendelcke, from the position of Stenographer and Typewriter at \$1,200 per annum, in the Bureau of Franchises, to take effect September 30, 1906; and be it further

Resolved, That the vacancy caused by the aforesaid resignation be filled by the promotion of Miss Lillian G. Keefe from \$900 to \$1,050, and the vacancy caused by the promotion of Miss Keefe be filled by the promotion of Miss Josephine E. A. Schmidt from \$750 to \$900, to take effect October 1, 1906; and the Secretary be and he hereby is authorized and directed to employ a Stenographer and Typewriter at a salary not exceeding \$750 per annum to fill the vacancy caused by the promotion of Miss Schmidt.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

#### New York City Interborough Railway Company.

The petition of the New York City Interborough Railway Company for an extension of time to June 1, 1907, in which to complete the construction of twenty-four miles of double track railway, as provided by the ordinance of March 31, 1903, granting a franchise to this company, was laid over pending consideration of the applications of this company for extensions to, changes in its route and new routes.

#### New York and Queens County Railway Company.

A communication was received from John H. Innes, the owner of certain property on both sides of the Shell road, in the Borough of Queens, protesting against the proposed construction of a street surface railway on the aforesaid road.

Which was referred to the Bureau of Franchises.

#### Abraham & Straus.

The Secretary presented the following:

September 21, 1906.

To the Mayor, New York City:

SIR—As a taxpayer and an interested property owner, I beg to enter my protest against the continuance of the franchise for a tunnel in Livingston street, granted the firm of Abraham & Straus by the Board of Estimate on December 15, 1905.

As a taxpayer:

First—That the City admits the claim of the firm of Abraham & Straus to ownership of the street itself. This claim would be of great value in case the City should need this street for subway or other purposes.

Second—That the rental to be paid is inadequate. The space involved amounts to between 30,000 and 40,000 square feet in the most valuable block in Brooklyn, and the rental for this great space is to be about \$1,200 per year.

As a property owner:

In that the City has seized upon the easements appertaining to the lots other than those owned by the firm of Abraham & Straus, and without any consideration have handed them over to said firm for its sole use and benefit.

Legal advice which I have taken is to the effect that my position in the matter is sound, but to take it into court myself would involve me in very expensive litigation which I should not be called upon to stand. I am, therefore, constrained to present my protest in this matter so as to bring the franchise before the Board of Estimate for reconsideration.

If any further particulars are desired, I would be pleased to call on you at your convenience.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—In a petition dated December 4, 1905, the firm of Abraham & Straus requested permission to construct, maintain and operate a structure under and across the widened portion of Livingston street, between Gallatin place and Hoyt street, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

In a communication dated December 5, 1905, the Corporation Counsel was requested to advise the Board whether or not it had the power to make such grant, and this being so, to approve a resolution which was transmitted therewith. The Corporation Counsel, in an opinion dated January 25, 1906, advised that

"the right to grant the privilege of a tunnel in the widened portion of Livingston street rests with the proper City authorities, assuming always that the carrying out of such an improvement would not interfere with the street purposes for which the property was acquired."

On December 15, 1905, the Board adopted a resolution granting its consent to the construction of the tunnel as aforesaid, and this resolution was approved by the Mayor January 30, 1906.

Mr. W. L. Cameron, in a communication dated September 21, 1906, protests against the continuance of the permit granted to the aforesaid firm to maintain the tunnel in Livingston street, on the ground that the City admits the claim of the firm



of Abraham & Straus to ownership of the street itself, that the rental is inadequate and that the City has seized upon the easements appertaining to the lots other than those owned by the firm of Abraham & Straus.

In view of the contention of Mr. Cameron, I am of the opinion that the matter should be again referred to the Corporation Counsel, with the request that he advise the Board whether or not the points raised by Mr. Cameron are well taken and could be legally upheld.

#### Loop Between Williamsburg and Brooklyn Bridges.

The Secretary presented the following:

DEPARTMENT OF BRIDGES—CITY OF NEW YORK,

NEW YORK, September 22, 1906.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—In compliance with your request of July 19 last, I submit a preliminary plan and estimate for the alteration of the Manhattan end of the Brooklyn Bridge so as to permit the trains of the Brooklyn Elevated Railroad, now operated upon the bridge, to connect with the proposed Subway Route No. 9-o.

The bridge must be widened to the full width of the right of way as far south as Franklin square, to permit the removal of the trolley tracks, so that the subway connection may be built between these tracks and the existing tracks of the bridge railway.

North William street must be closed and William street must be lowered about sixteen feet under the bridge, in order to retain it as a public street.

It is estimated that the physical work covered by the plan can be executed in eighteen months after the letting of the contract, at a cost of about \$600,000, exclusive of cost of land damages, etc.

It will be impossible to make this connection until the Staats-Zeitung property has been secured and the lease-holds of property under the bridge terminals have been terminated, and legal proceedings have been completed for the closing of North William street and the depression of William street. The period that would be required for these legal proceedings can be estimated properly only by the Law Department.

As the construction of the subway connection proposed would seriously interfere with traffic on the Brooklyn Bridge, and as it is necessary to maintain traffic at the full capacity of the bridge, the construction of such a subway cannot be undertaken until other means of crossing the East river are provided; that is, the completion of the Manhattan Bridge. The period of eighteen months referred to herein refers, therefore, to a date beginning at the completion of the Manhattan Bridge.

If it should be desired to carry trains of the weight now operated in the Manhattan and Bronx Subway across the Brooklyn Bridge, it would be necessary to wait until the bridge is reconstructed, which will be about two years after the completion of the Manhattan Bridge.

#### New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company.

At the meeting of July 6, 1906, a report was presented from the Bureau of Franchises, calling attention to section 5 of the ordinance granting a franchise to the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, and the matter was referred to the Comptroller and to the President of the Borough of The Bronx for consultation with the Comptroller, with the request that the matter be investigated and report made to the Board on September 28.

The Comptroller moved that the matter be laid over for one week.

There being no objection, it was so ordered.

A communication was received from H. G. Schneider, Secretary, Rapid Transit Committee, West Side Taxpayers' Association, and Chairman, Residents' Committee, protesting against the running of long trains and stalling of same on Eleventh avenue from Forty-seventh to Fifty-third streets, by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company.

Which was referred to the Bureau of Franchises.

#### Seaboard Refrigeration Company.

A communication was received from the Law Department, transmitting, duly approved by the Corporation Counsel as to form, the form of agreement to be executed by the Seaboard Refrigeration Company, accepting the extension of time granted by resolution duly adopted by the Board September 14, 1906, approved by the Mayor September 19, 1906, in which to make certain payments as provided by the franchise granted to this company.

Which was ordered filed.

The Comptroller presented the following:

LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE CORPORATION COUNSEL,  
NEW YORK, September 21, 1906.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—On May 17, 1906, you wrote to me as follows:

"As you are aware, there are pending before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment applications for franchises by certain telephone companies. I desire to be advised whether it is your opinion that the City would legally have the power to enforce, under the terms of a franchise granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the rates which the said company shall charge for its service to the public, provided the same was made a condition of the franchise."

On May 21, 1906, I wrote the Board of Estimate and Apportionment asking to be informed what applications for franchises by telephone companies were pending, and in what manner it was proposed to regulate the rates of the applicant companies for the services rendered to the City and to the public.

In reply I received a communication from said Board inclosing a report of the Bureau of Franchises, dated May 29, 1906, from which it appears there is but one application pending, to wit, that of the Atlantic Telephone Company; that two other companies, the Commonwealth Telephone Company and the Star Telephone Company, made applications for similar rights to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, but at a meeting held April 27, 1906, both applications were denied. A copy of the second report of the Bureau of Franchises upon the application of the Atlantic Telephone Company and the proposed contract to be entered into with that company also accompanied such communication.

There can be no doubt as to the power of the State to regulate the rates public utilities corporations shall charge to the public. This right is not confined to a regulation at the time of granting the charter, nor need the State in granting a charter specifically reserve to itself the right to regulate such rates in the future. A long line of cases in the United States Supreme Court have held such power to be inherent in the State, and that rates at any time may be regulated, provided such rates so prescribed are not confiscatory. In *Georgia Banking Co. vs. Smith*, 128 U. S. 174, the Court said at page 181:

"It is conceded that a railroad corporation is a private corporation though its uses are public, and that a contract embodied in terms in its provisions

or necessarily implied by them, is within the constitutional clause prohibiting legislation impairing the obligation of contracts. If the charter in this way provides that the charges which the company may make for its services in the transportation of persons and property shall be subject only to its own control up to the limit designated, exemption from legislative interference within that limit will be maintained, but to effect this result the exemption must appear by such clear and unmistakable language that it cannot be reasonably construed consistently with the reservation of the power by the State."

The Courts thus recognize that a binding contract may be entered into by the State, provided it was evident that such was the intention of the Legislature.

It is equally well recognized that what the State may do regarding the granting of franchise, it may delegate to a municipality to do. That the power to regulate rates may be delegated has been favorably passed upon in a long line of decisions throughout the United States. See

*Rohr vs. Beardstown*, 32 Ill. App. 407;

*Hudson County Freeholders vs. State and N. J. R. & T. Co.*, 24 N. J. L., 718;

*Mobile vs. Yuille*, 3 Alabama, 137, 36 Am. Dec. 441; 72 Fed. Rep. 829;

*Macon vs. Macon R. Co.*, 7 Ga. 221;

*Peo. ex rel. Jackson vs. Suburban R. R. Co.*, 49 L. R. A. 650, 178 Ill. 594.

The only limitation is that the power to fix rates must be clearly designated by the Legislature, either by express grant or by necessary implication.

Thus in *Sternberg vs. State of Nebraska*, 19 L. R. A. 570, the power was given the City "to fix and determine the rate charged," and this was sustained by the Courts as a sufficient delegation by the State of its powers to the municipality.

In *City of St. Louis vs. Bell Telephone Company of Missouri*, 2 L. R. A. 278, where a city ordinance had provided that "the annual charge for the use of the telephone in the City of St. Louis shall not exceed \$50," it was held that the City had no power to pass the ordinance in question for lack of charter authority, but the Court said:

"We shall take it for granted that the State has the power to fix and prescribe a maximum rate for telephone service. That this power could be delegated to municipal corporations is equally clear. The ordinances of the City of St. Louis must not be in conflict with the general laws of the State. If the City has had this power to fix rates conferred upon it then an ordinance which fixes reasonable maximum rates would not be in conflict with the law under and by virtue of which the defendant is organized and which law constitutes its charter."

In the case of *Nebraska Telephone Company against State of Nebraska ex rel. Yeiser*, 45 L. R. A. 113, 55 Nebraska 627, a delegation of power to regulate the rates a telephone company might charge was upheld. The Court said:

"And it is evident that the Legislature has acted upon the theory that this power to fix the compensation of public service corporations is one vested in it by the Constitution. This is evident from its creation by the Board of Transportation and the powers conferred upon that Board; and as late as 1897 the Legislature conferred authority upon the Mayor and Councils of cities of the metropolitan class to fix and determine by ordinance what compensation telephone companies doing business within such cities might charge and exact for services rendered or to be rendered by them."

In *People ex rel. The West Side Street Railway Co. vs. Bernard*, 110 N. Y., 548, a statute required the sale of a street railway franchise to the highest bidder, and the Common Council of the City of Buffalo inserted a condition that the purchaser should charge no more than a five-cent fare for one continuous passage over a certain route. The action of the Common Council was sustained by the Court, which said:

"If it should turn out that it could not comply with the terms of the grant in respect mentioned, the result would simply be that it would be exposed to the forfeiture of its franchise and rights."

Since such power of regulating rates may be delegated, it follows that the City may execute a binding contract prescribing a scale of rates, and such contracts have been sustained by the Courts.

In *Detroit vs. Detroit City Railroad Co.*, 184 U. S., 388, by authority of the Legislature the city had passed an ordinance giving a railroad company certain rights and providing "that the rate of fare for any distance shall not exceed five cents." The ordinance was held to be an agreement, the Court saying, at page 389:

"It is a contract which gives the company the right to charge a rate of fare up to the sum of five cents for a single passenger, and leaves no power with the city to reduce it without the consent of the company."

The nature and purpose of such a contract is well stated in the case of *Pond vs. New Rochelle Water Co.*, 183 N. Y., 330, where the Court said, on page 338:

"In the case before us we have a municipality entering into a contract for the benefit of its inhabitants, the object being to supply them with pure and wholesome water at reasonable rates. While there is not presented a domestic relation like that of father and child, or husband and wife, yet it cannot be said that this contract was made for the benefit of a stranger. In the case before us the municipality sought to protect its inhabitants, who were at the time of the execution of the contract consumers of water, and those who might thereafter become so, from extortion by a corporation having granted to it a valuable franchise extending over a long period of time."

In *State ex rel. St. Louis vs. Laclede Gas Light Co.*, 102 Missouri, 472, where an ordinance had been accepted by a gas company fixing the maximum price of gas, it was held to be a contract which was protected against the attempt of the city to reduce the price of gas, and that the right to regulate was not such a police power that it could not be bargained away.

In *Charles Simons' Sons Co. vs. Maryland Telephone and Telegraph Co.*, 63 L. R. A., 727, a telephone company had applied to the City of Baltimore for permission to construct and maintain wires in the public streets, and the city, in the ordinance granting such permission, fixed the rates that might be charged, the telephone company accepting the ordinance in question. Apparently the only power delegated to the municipality under which it enacted such ordinance was in these words:

"The Mayor and City Council of Baltimore shall have power to regulate the use of the streets, lanes and alleys of said city by railway or other tracks, gas or other pipes, telegraph, telephone, electric light or other wires and poles, in, under, over or upon the same, and may require all such wires to be placed underground after such reasonable notice as they may prescribe."

And the Court said:

"Now, when the ordinance in question was passed by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore and accepted by the appellee corporation, the latter had its charter and was subject in making its contracts only to the limitations which the law imposed. Within these limitations it was free to contract. In passing the ordinance the municipality made no attempt to interfere with the charter rights of the appellee or to abridge its chartered powers. It did not attempt of its own authority and right to impose upon the appellee *in invitum* the rates of charge for telephone service specified in the ordinance. The appellee had at the time of the passage of the ordinance the right to refuse to accept its terms. In accepting these it was acting within its chartered powers and in the exercise of its chartered rights. All of the obligations imposed by the ordinance were imposed by the appellee upon itself by its own voluntary action in accepting the ordinance."

"The law gives to the municipality the right to regulate the use of its streets and requires of a public service corporation that it shall obtain from the municipality the requisite authority to use the streets and highways thereof where such use is desired for its corporate purposes. It cannot be the duty of the municipal authorities to grant such use for the mere advantage of the corporation, while it is their duty in granting the same to secure the largest measure of advantage to the general public with a just regard for the rights of the corporation. It would seem to be but a reasonable incident to and exercise of the power to regulate the use of the streets and highways which has been conferred by the provisions of law we are here considering, that, where a public service corporation gets permission to use such streets and highways for its corporate purposes, and such purposes consist in making contracts with the citizens of the municipality to which the power is entrusted and exacting from them compensation for a service, that for urgent



reasons of convenience or the necessities of business conditions they must avail of, the permission can be granted under such regulations as to rates of charges as will protect the community against extortionate exactions, and secure fair and reasonable terms in availing of the facilities which the corporation furnishes."

The only question to be determined, therefore, is whether the State has delegated the necessary powers to The City of New York.

In this State, telephone companies are incorporated under the Transportation Corporations Law, and there is nothing in Article VIII. of said Law applying to telephone and telegraph companies, requiring the consent of the municipal authorities to the vesting of a franchise.

Since, however, the passage of the Greater New York Charter, it has been evident that the consent of the City is necessary before a franchise to the use of the streets of the City can vest in a telephone company. This point has been authoritatively settled in the recent case of *People ex rel. Independent Telephone Company vs. Monroe* (30 N. Y. L. J., 488), where it was held by Mr. Justice Clarke that the relator had not under the Transportation Corporations Law "acquired an undoubted legal right to the use of the streets by virtue of its incorporation, but that right can only be granted in accordance with the provisions of the Charter." The application for a mandamus was denied. The order was affirmed by the Appellate Division, 91 A. D., 611, and the appeal from this order was dismissed without any opinion by the Court of Appeals, 179 N. Y., 521.

The body which had the power to grant such consent was definitely determined in the case of *West Side Electric Company against Consolidated Telegraph and Telephone Company*, 110 A. D., 171. Although that case involved a discussion as to the procedure to be followed by an electric company organized under a law which required the consent of the municipal authorities, the decision unequivocally held that in 1896, that is, before the Charter went into effect, the Board of Aldermen, and not the Board of Electrical Control, was the municipal body whose consent was necessary to the vesting of the franchise.

By the amended Charter, the franchise granting power is now vested in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

By the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, the State has clearly delegated to the municipality the power not only to grant franchises, but to prescribe the terms and conditions on which such franchises shall be taken, and among such delegated powers is that of prescribing the rates which shall be charged by public service corporations obtaining such franchises. This is evident from the terms of the Charter itself:

"Section 73. Limitations and Conditions as to Grant of Franchises. \* \* \* Every grant shall make adequate provision, by way of forfeiture of the grant or otherwise, to secure efficiency of public service at reasonable rates and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the full term of the grant. \* \* \*

"Section 74. Proceedings Prior to Grant of Franchise. Before any grant of franchise or right to use any street \* \* \* shall be made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the proposed specific grant embodied in the form of a contract, with all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges \* \* \* shall be published \* \* \*"

At the public hearing upon the application of the Atlantic Telephone Company, counsel for the New York Telephone Company stated that the power of the City to fix rates had not yet been passed upon, by the Courts, but that in other States the courts had uniformly held that the municipal authorities could not make such restrictions as are attempted to be made in the proposed contract with the Atlantic Telephone Company. In support of this proposition, such counsel have since cited the case of *Wright vs. Glen Telephone Company*, which was decided in the Appellate Division, Third Department, of this State, in May of this year.

I have examined this case thoroughly and do not find it in any way controlling, as the facts show plainly that the municipal authorities of the city of Gloversville did not possess the broad powers conferred on the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Greater New York Charter as amended, but were only given the right "to regulate the setting and stringing of telegraph, telephone, electric light and power and other poles and wires in said city."

The Court said:

"The power of the municipality is simply a police power to be exercised for the protection of the citizens. It cannot use that power for the purpose of forcing a contract with a telephone company for benefits to itself or to the citizens."

I am, therefore, of the opinion, and so advise you, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has the power to fix and regulate the rates which a telephone company shall charge for its service to the public as a condition of the granting by said Board of a franchise, and further that the City would legally have the power to enforce the rates so prescribed.

Brannan, President, Board of Trustees, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$30,000 for furniture, fittings, apparatus, etc., for the new Harlem Hospital.

I have looked up the matter and I beg to report that this hospital is nearly ready for occupancy; the ambulance station and power station, including laundry, nurses' quarters, etc., will soon be ready.

In the hospital proper there will be 140 beds for patients, with all necessary operating, service and toilet rooms; rooms for officers, administrative service, reception of visitors, etc. The hospital force will consist of about 120 people who must be accommodated on the premises.

I have looked over the detailed list of furnishings which it is proposed to buy with this money, and I find nothing extravagant in price nor anything which does not seem to have a fitting and proper place in the furnishing and equipment of a hospital.

I would therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Comptroller to issue, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, Corporate Stock to the amount of \$30,000 for furnishing and equipping for service the new Harlem Hospital.

DEAR SIR—I beg respectfully to call to the attention of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment chapters 568 and 569 of the Laws of 1906. These laws give the Board of Estimate and Apportionment discretionary power to examine into and pay the claims arising out of certain accidents, one of them fatal, occurring to two of Staten Island's former volunteer firemen.

Chapter 568 relates to the claim of the minor daughter of Joseph Parker, who was a member of Granite Hook and Ladder Company 2, who, while holding the nozzle of a hose at the Nordlinger-Charlton fire on December 2, 1904, at Graniteville, was struck in the eye by a skyrocket, receiving injuries which caused his death within two or three days thereafter. Parker's daughter is now about fifteen years of age.

Chapter 569 relates to the claim of Richard Davis, who was run over by the truck of Richmond Hook and Ladder Company 4 on July 4, 1904, while responding to an alarm of fire. His right arm was crushed, and is now practically useless.

Both of these cases, I am informed, have been investigated by the Fire Department and reports made thereon, to which I refer for the information of the Board.

Similar cases to those referred to above, occurring among the volunteer firemen in the Borough of Queens, have, I am informed, received favorable action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

LAWS OF NEW YORK—BY AUTHORITY.

[Every law, unless a different time shall be prescribed therein, shall not take effect until the twentieth day after it shall have become a law. Section 43, article II, chapter 8, General Laws.]

Chapter 568.

An Act for the relief of the minor daughter of Joseph Parker, a volunteer fireman, whose death resulted from injuries received by him while in the actual performance of his duties, and while a member of Granite Hook and Ladder Company Number Two, a volunteer fire company of the city of New York.

Became a law, May 23, 1906, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, three-fifths being present.

Accepted by the city.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The board of estimate and apportionment of the city of New York is hereby authorized and empowered in its discretion to examine into the claim of the minor daughter of Joseph Parker, a member of Granite hook and ladder company number two, of Port Richmond, Richmond borough, New York, whose death resulted from injuries received by him while in the actual performance of his duties as a volunteer fireman in and for the city of New York, and upon whom his minor daughter was wholly dependent for support and maintenance, and to make such award, if any, as in its discretion may be just and proper, and the said board of estimate and apportionment in its discretion is hereby authorized to audit and allow as a charge against the city of New York, the amount of said claim or any part thereof, as the said board of estimate and apportionment shall deem just and proper, and a certificate of such award shall be filed in the office of the comptroller of the city of New York.

Sec. 2. Upon such audit and allowance being made, the comptroller of the city of New York is hereby authorized and directed to thereupon pay to said minor daughter of said Joseph Parker, or to her legal representative or guardian, the amount of the award so made by the said board of estimate and apportionment, such payment or payments to be made from any funds available therefor, or in the event of there being no such fund, the comptroller is hereby authorized to issue special revenue bonds under the provisions of section one hundred and eighty-eight of chapter four hundred and sixty-six of the laws of nineteen hundred and one, being one to provide for such payment.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

SIR—I am in receipt of a communication signed by N. Taylor Phillips, Esq., Deputy Comptroller, dated August 29, 1906, transmitting the report of Jeremiah T. Mahoney, Esq., Auditor of Accounts, in the matter of a claim filed in the Department of Finance by the minor daughter of Joseph Parker, a member of the Volunteer Fire Department of the Borough of Richmond, who lost his life in the performance of his duties.

On or about October 10, 1905, claim No. 46,861 was filed by one Thomas Parker, as administrator, etc., of the estate of Joseph Parker, deceased, for \$500, under the provisions of chapter 615 of the Laws of 1895, and since my communication to you of January 9, 1906, recommending the disallowance of said claim, said Thomas Parker, as such administrator, commenced a suit thereon in the Supreme Court, Richmond County, and after a trial had before Hon. Garrett J. Garrettsen, on May 23, 1906, judgment was rendered in favor of the plaintiff and against the defendant for the



sum of \$500, besides interest and costs, which judgment amounting in the aggregate to \$600.22 has since been paid. A copy of said judgment, together with a copy of the pleadings in said action were transmitted to you with the transcript of said judgment.

Undoubtedly chapter 568 of the Laws of 1906 was passed for the purpose of affording relief in case the action brought by the administrator under chapter 615 of the Laws of 1895, should have terminated adversely to him. While the act of 1906 refers only to the minor daughter of Joseph Parker, deceased, and the judgment heretofore obtained enures to the benefit of all the next of kin of said deceased, including said minor daughter, I am of the opinion that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under the circumstances, should take no further steps with a view to determine what amount should be paid to said minor child under said act, inasmuch as she will receive her share of said judgment, and thus the object of said act will be attained.

SIR—Under date of June 12, 1906, in a communication to the Comptroller, you stated that at a meeting of the Board held on that date a communication was presented to the President of the Borough of Richmond requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to examine into and pay the claim of the minor daughter of Joseph Parker, a member of the Volunteer Fire Department of the Borough of Richmond, who lost his life in the performance of his duties. You also stated that the relief was demanded under chapter 568 of the Laws of 1906, and that the entire matter was referred to the Comptroller for consideration and report. The claim was thereupon investigated by this Department and a report thereon was transmitted to the Corporation Counsel for his consideration and advice as to the advisability of making any payments under the relief act known as chapter 568 of the Laws of 1906.

Under date of September 8, 1906, in a communication to the Comptroller the Corporation Counsel stated that on October 10, 1905, Claim No. 46861 was filed by one Thomas Parker as administrator of the estate of Joseph Parker, deceased, for \$500 under the provisions of chapter 615 of the Laws of 1895; that on January 9, 1906, he wrote to the Comptroller recommending the disallowance of the claim; that since said date Thomas Parker, as such administrator, commenced a suit in the Supreme Court, Richmond County, and after a trial had before the Hon. Garrett J. Garrettsen, on May 23, 1906, judgment was rendered in favor of the plaintiff and against the defendant for the sum of \$500 besides interest and costs; that undoubtedly chapter 568 of the Laws of 1906 was passed for the purpose of affording relief in case the action brought by the administrator under chapter 615 of the Laws of 1895, should have terminated adversely to him.

The Corporation Counsel also stated that while the act of 1906 refers only to the minor daughter of Joseph Parker, deceased, and the judgment heretofore obtained enures to the benefit of all the next of kin of said deceased, including the said minor daughter, he is of the opinion that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under the circumstances, should take no further steps with a view to determine what amount should be paid to said minor child under said act, inasmuch as she will receive her share of said judgment, and thus the object of said act will be attained.

In view, therefore, of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, it would seem that no further action should be taken either by the Comptroller or the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under chapter 568 of the Laws of 1906.

"My immediate predecessor in office requested in his annual estimate for 1906, submitted under date of August 31, 1905, an appropriation of \$4,500, under the head of contingencies, to pay for the cost of the removal of the records now at No. 116 Nassau street, to the new Hall of Records, which sum he stated was slightly less than the sum appropriated for removal from the old Hall of Records to the present temporary office at No. 116 Nassau street.

"This appropriation of \$4,500 was not granted.

"In view of the architects' statement that the Hall of Records will be ready for occupancy by the Register by October 1, I hereby request an appropriation of \$4,500 to pay for the cost of removal, having no fund at my disposal to meet said cost.

At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on September 14, 1906, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of and concurs in the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted July 2, 1906, providing for an appropriation of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) to meet a deficiency in the appropriations for the Register of the County of New York during 1906, and that for the purpose of providing means therefor the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8, of section 188, of the Greater New York Charter, to issue Special Revenue Bonds of The City of New York to the amount of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000), redeemable from the tax levy of the year succeeding the year of their issue, of which amount a sum not to exceed four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500) may be used to defray the expenses of the removal of the records of said office from their present location to the Hall of Records."

As it appears from the above that the appropriation asked for by the Register of the County of New York has been already provided for in the issue of Special Revenue Bonds, authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on September 14, 1906, therefore no further action in this matter by the said Board appears to be necessary.

Whereas, All public buildings belonging to the Greater City of New York—exclusive of the public schools—are carefully guarded by day and night Watchmen; and

Whereas, There are five hundred and sixty-two (562) public schools in said City that have no protection whatever beyond what little attention is given to them by the Janitor thereof. The school property of this City is worth millions upon millions of dollars, and proper officials should be appointed to carefully protect and look after the same at all times; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it hereby is requested to set aside an amount of money sufficient to meet the salaries of such Night Watchmen as may be appointed to guard and look after the public schools of the City. There will be two Watchmen in each school. Their terms of duty will begin at 4 p. m. until 12 midnight, and from 12 midnight until 8 p. m., and their salaries be the same as in all other municipal buildings. Time clocks should be placed in the buildings.

SIR—Examination has been made in the Division of Municipal Investigation and Statistics relating to the matter of a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen July 31, 1906, "requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to set aside an amount of money sufficient to meet the salaries of such Night Watchmen as may be appointed to guard and look after the public schools of the City," said request having been referred by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, September 14, 1906, to the Comptroller for consideration and report.

A representative of the Department of Finance has conferred with Messrs. Thomas J. Higgins and Mitchell May, of the Committee on the Care of Buildings of the Board of Education respecting this matter. Both of these gentlemen agree that there exists no special need for the employment of Watchmen to guard the public school buildings, as suggested.

The proposition, it appears, has been discussed by the various members of the Committee and the unanimous sentiment seems to be in opposition to it.

Mr. Thomas J. Higgins, who is the Chairman of the Committee on the Care of Buildings, states that the reported losses and damage to public school property of a character which might be prevented by the employment of watchmen does not exceed \$500 a year, and that he is of the opinion that the addition of such a large force as would be necessary to guard the 562 school buildings of the City is not in any sense justifiable by the present conditions. The cost, estimated on a basis of \$2 per diem for 1,124 Watchmen, which would provide for two tours for duty beginning at 4 p. m. and ending at 8 a. m., as suggested in the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, would be close on to a million dollars per year.

Mr. Higgins also expresses the opinion that it would be difficult, under the present operation of Civil Service regulation, to secure the employment of a sufficient number of men of the character desired to act as Watchmen, and that it is altogether doubtful whether any greater degree of safety would be guaranteed for the City property than under the present conditions.

In view of the statements made by the representatives of the Board of Education, under whose jurisdiction the matter of employing Janitors and other help in the public schools must come, I would recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be asked to not approve the resolution of the Board of Aldermen.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the President, Borough of The Bronx, requesting an additional appropriation of \$6,500 to meet the salaries of the Bureau of Buildings for the year 1906; resolution of the Board of Aldermen and report of the Investigations Division, Department of Finance, approved by the Comptroller, to whom, on July 6, 1906, was referred said resolution of the Board of Aldermen relative thereto:

JOSEPH HAAG, Esq., Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—I respectfully request that an additional appropriation of \$6,500 be provided by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for salaries in the Bureau of Buildings for the year 1906. In the last Budget for this Bureau, which was represented in the sum of \$116,500 there was allowed only the sum of \$110,000.

The amounts of \$116,000 were appropriated for the year 1905. From statements made to me by Superintendent Reville of the Bureau of Buildings, it appears to be absolutely necessary that this additional amount be provided for this Bureau. Unless it be provided a decrease in the force will be necessary. This would be unfortunate, as it would result in delays in transacting the business of the Bureau and in inadequate inspection of building construction, diminishing the protection of the public and in the end proving more costly than the sufficient appropriation for a continued efficient organization of the Building Bureau.

Since 1903 the cost of building operations covered by the business devolving upon the Bureau has increased more than 500 per cent., while during the same time the force of employees has increased only eleven (11) in a total of seventy-five (75), and the appropriation for salaries has grown only from \$89,000 to \$110,000 allowed and \$116,500 asked.

There were 795 new buildings constructed in 1903 at an estimated cost of \$6,792,884, while 2,278 new buildings were constructed in 1905 at an estimated cost of \$38,313,495, and the operations for the first quarter of 1906 indicate that the business for the current year will be as great as the year 1905. Indeed there is a material increase in the number of new buildings for which plans were filed during the first three months of 1906 over the corresponding period of 1905.

The new liquor tax law imposes an additional task upon the inspectors and office force of the Bureau which requires an exhaustive examination and report on each application for a hotel certificate within the borough.

The present force is just about sufficient for the examination of building plans and proper inspection of construction. For an area of 26,800 acres, nearly twice the area of Manhattan Island, there are twenty-six Inspectors of general construction and fourteen Inspectors of plumbing, on 1,400 buildings in course of simultaneous construction all the time in the borough.

It is only just, therefore, to the men employed in the Bureau of Buildings as well as for the protection of the public that a sufficient force of employees should be continued, and this additional amount asked for be appropriated for their compensation.

—which was referred by you to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics for examination, I beg to report as follows:

The Budget appropriation for 1905 for salaries for the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of The Bronx, was \$96,000. This allowance was supplemented on March 16, 1905, by an issue of Special Revenue Bonds of \$20,000, making the total amount available for 1905 \$116,000. Examination of the records of the Finance Department shows the disbursements for 1905 to have been \$103,820.96.

It should be noted that the issue of Special Revenue Bonds of \$20,000, authorized on March 16, 1905, did not become available until July, 1905, at which time the Bureau of Buildings was reorganized, and additional force employed to meet the increased business of the Bureau.

In his departmental estimate for 1906, the President of the Borough of The Bronx asked for an allowance of \$116,500 for Salaries, Bureau of Buildings, said estimate being based upon the pay-roll of July, 1905, which indicated an annual expenditure of \$110,500, and \$6,450 for increases in the force. The amount allowed in the Budget for 1906 was \$110,000, or \$6,500 less than was available for 1905.

Superintendent P. J. Reville states that the present force connected with the Bureau of Buildings is inadequate to meet the demands made upon the Bureau through the great increase in building operations in the Borough of The Bronx, and that the force should be increased by the employment of the following additional employees:

It would appear from the examination made by your representative of the expenditures up to September 1, 1906, that the Budget appropriation for 1906 will not be sufficient to meet the salary expense of the present force, as is shown by the following figures:

The territory covered by the operations of the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of The Bronx, is a very large one, and the increase in building operations during the last few years has been notable, calling for additional work in the line of inspection, examination of plans, etc. The work of the Bureau has also been increased by the provisions of the Prentice Liquor Tax Law, which requires inspection to be made of all hotels within the borough. In view of the increased work of the Bureau, the request for additional help, with annual salaries amounting to \$9,450, seems to be a reasonable one. As such additional employees during the present year will only be employed in October, November and December, the amount required for their salaries for 1906 will be only \$2,362.50.

In view of the facts stated, I would respectfully recommend the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$3,786.61, said amount being made up as follows:

The property described in the above resolution is a strip of land lying between the present school site, new Cromwell avenue and Garretson avenue, in the Borough of Richmond, and is part of a plot of 19.68 acres, assessed in the name of George Cromwell.

The property is now owned by the Dongan Hills Realty Company, of which Borough President Cromwell is President and a large stockholder, and therefore can not be acquired by the City at private sale, but must be taken by condemnation proceedings. I am informed, however, by Mr. Arthur Man, of No. 52 Broadway, Secretary and Treasurer of the company, that the matter of acquiring the title by the City by such proceedings can be amicably arranged.

The Dongan Hills Realty Company, Mr. Man states, is willing to enter into a stipulation with the City for an amicable condemnation proceeding of the three parcels at a fixed price of \$7,714.47. This price has been reached in this way: The City to pay for the two strips one-half the actual cost of the improvements of the two thoroughfares fronting thereon, and for Parcel C, a price of \$600 a lot, which is the regular price now charged by the Realty Company for similar property in the immediate vicinity. The street improvements include regulating, grading, curbing, guttering, asphalt sidewalks five feet in width, water mains and 12-inch sewers, with the right of connection and the planting of trees along the streets.

Mr. Man states that the actual measurements of the present school site (as in possession) are as follows:

169.50 feet on Jefferson street by 224.40 feet on Cromwell avenue by 178.35 feet by 223.98 feet on Garretson avenue. That the actual measurements of the site, as shown by the deed of record, are 175 feet on Jefferson street by 224 feet on Cromwell avenue by 184 feet by 224 feet on Garretson avenue.

As none of these properties, under the provisions of the Charter, can be acquired other than by condemnation proceedings, I would respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of the action of the Board of Education and authorize the acquisition of the property described in the resolution by condemnation proceedings.

I have had an examination made of the property and find that Public School No. 136 is located on the northerly side of Fourth avenue, between Fortieth and Forty-first streets. The present site measures 200 feet 4 inches by 160 feet. Back of this is a vacant plot 200 feet 4 inches by 150 feet. The Forty-first street front, size 150 feet by 100 feet 2 inches, is owned by Robert W. Drummond and has on it a hill of earth and gravel which is at least twenty feet high at the highest part and will average ten feet over the entire plot. The Fortieth street front, size 150 feet by 100 feet 2 inches, is owned by Dr. D. Boris De Waltoff. The Forty-first street front, because of the large quantity of excavation necessary, is assessed for the year 1906 at \$2,800; the Fortieth street front at \$6,000.

In the resolution adopted by the Board of Education on June 27, 1906, the size of the plot taken is 80 feet by 100 feet 2 inches on each street, and both of the owners objected to this in view of the fact that it would cut their plot and leave the balance unfit for building operations under the present law. This office agreed with them and thought that if condemnation proceedings were resorted to that they would receive considerable consequential damages if the balance of only 70 feet were left, while if 75 feet were to remain two 37 feet 6 inch apartment houses could be built to advantage in accordance with the tenement house law.

Under date of September 12, 1906, the Board of Education adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Board of Education on June 27, 1906 (see Journal, page 1048), selecting and determining as a site for school purposes certain lands and premises on Fortieth and Forty-first streets, near Fourth avenue, adjoining Public School No. 136, in Local School Board District No. 37, Borough of Brooklyn, be and the same is hereby amended so as to make the description of said lands and premises contained therein read as follows:

It appears that over thirty parcels within the area of the block authorized to be acquired were purchased at private sale on resolutions of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. There is also a large public school on West Twenty-eighth street which is owned by The City of New York. The condition of almost all of the buildings within the area of the site has been condemned both by the Tenement House Department and the commission appointed by the Mayor under a resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to ameliorate the condition of property owned by The City of New York.

The Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal appointed in the proceeding have completed the taking of testimony as to the value of the property, and it is expected within a few months that they will make their report as they are now holding the executive sessions. If the title to the entire block were vested in the City at an early date, it would be possible to sell the buildings and begin the improvement of the property for park purposes so that by the spring and the summer of 1907 the property would be adaptable for that purpose.

The Secretary presented the following report of the Appraiser of Real Estate, Department of Finance, approved by the Comptroller, recommending that the Board of Estimate rescind the resolution adopted July 6, 1906, which authorized the condemnation of property for library purposes, located at St. Edwards street and Auburn place, Brooklyn, there being a slight discrepancy in the measurements of the property, and that a new resolution be adopted authorizing the condemnation of this property, said resolution to contain a clause directing that title shall vest in the City upon the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners:

Condemnation maps were prepared by Mr. Homer L. Bartlett, City Surveyor, and there appears to be a slight discrepancy in the measurements of the property and that a new resolution will have to be drawn. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment rescind the resolution adopted July 6, 1906, and adopt a new resolution, authorizing the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the hereinafter described property, said resolution to contain a clause directing that title shall vest in The City of New York upon the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners to be appointed, in accordance with the provisions of section 1437 of the Greater New York Charter, said property being bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the northerly side of Auburn place with the easterly side of St. Edwards street, running thence northerly along the easterly side of St. Edwards street 100 feet 5 inches, thence easterly 100 feet, thence southerly 105 feet 2½ inches to the northerly side of Auburn place; thence westerly along the northerly side of Auburn place 100 feet 1¼ inches to the point or place of beginning, said property being known as Lots Nos. 1, 68, 69 and 70, in Block 2039, on the land map of Kings County.

It appears that the original resolution adopted by the Board of Education on June 13, 1906, did not describe the property correctly, and the new resolution described heretofore was adopted, the matter having been referred to the Comptroller for consideration and report at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held September 14, 1906.

The property in question is part of Plot 14 in Block 4, Ward 24, and is assessed in bulk with other property as 121.16 acres, and is owned by Mr. William Waldorf Astor. After considerable negotiation with Mr. Charles A. Peabody, the attorney for Mr. Astor, he has offered to dispose of the property at \$1,000 per lot, and as the same contains approximately seventeen city lots, being situated on the southerly side of Randolph avenue between the easterly side of East One Hundred and Seventy-second street and the westerly side of East One Hundred and Seventy-third street, in the Borough of The Bronx, the price of \$17,000 is, in my opinion, not excessive. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt a resolution approving of the selection of the site heretofore described for school purposes, and authorize the acquisition of the same at private sale at a price not exceeding \$17,000.

SIR—Under date of June 28, 1906, I forwarded to you a communication in regard to the proposed purchase by the City of the Crystal Water Company of Staten Island. There was also inclosed a proposed form of agreement.

At its meeting held July 6, 1906, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment assented to and approved the proposed purchase, and authorized the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to enter into a contract for the purchase in a form to be approved by the Corporation Counsel.

Since then Mr. Bainbridge Colby, counsel for the Crystal Water Company, has suggested certain changes in the proposed agreement. These suggestions have been

examined by the President of the Borough of Richmond and by myself; we do not consider them as making any changes to which objection should be made in behalf of the City. The proposed form of agreement has therefore been modified so as to incorporate Mr. Colby's suggestions, and a new draft approved as to form by me, is inclosed herewith.

I would suggest that the Board take proper action so that the form of agreement now inclosed may be substituted for the one before the Board at its meeting held on July 6, 1906. The requirements of section 471 of the Charter should not be overlooked and the separate consent and approval required thereby of the Mayor and Comptroller should be signed as indicated at the end of the agreement.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 169 and 178 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of seven hundred and twenty-thousand five hundred and sixty-three dollars and forty-four cents (\$720,563.44), the proceeds thereof to be applied to the payment of the property and franchises of the Crystal Water Company.

#### CONTRACT WITH CRYSTAL WATER COMPANY.

This Agreement, made and entered into this — day of —, 1906, between The City of New York, by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, with the separate assent of the Mayor and Comptroller of The City of New York, and the Crystal Water Company of Staten Island, with the assent of two-thirds of its stockholders, pursuant to the provisions of the Greater New York Charter and the resolutions of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted on the — day of —, 1906, and the resolutions of the holders of two-thirds of the stock of the Crystal Water Company of Staten Island, adopted on the — day of September, 1906; witnesseth:

That the parties, each in consideration of the agreement on the part of the other herein contained, have agreed and hereby agree as follows:

That the Crystal Water Company of Staten Island will transfer and convey to The City of New York as of July 1, 1906, free and clear of every lien and incumbrance of any nature whatsoever, all of its plant and physical property, including its wells, pipe lines and all appurtenances used for the purpose of distributing water, together with all its contracts, rights, title and franchises of every description, reserving, however, its cash on hand as of July 1, 1906, including any and all sums due or to become due, whether accrued and collected or to accrue and to be collected, for the service of said company or arising from any other transaction prior to and including July 1, 1906. And said Crystal Water Company of Staten Island agrees to surrender possession of all the property agreed to be conveyed and transferred hereunder to The City of New York on September 30, 1906, and, furthermore, to perform any act necessary to complete the transfer of the legal title, as well as the transfer of actual possession, and will execute all deeds, assignments and other instruments necessary and proper to transfer title to The City of New York free and clear of every lien or incumbrance, and to save the City harmless and to protect it against the claims of creditors of the Crystal Water Company of Staten Island on any claims arising from any transaction, cause, matter or thing prior to July 1, 1906.

That The City of New York will pay to the Crystal Water Company of Staten Island as a consideration for the transfer in the manner herein provided of the property so to be conveyed and transferred as aforesaid, the sum of seven hundred and twenty thousand five hundred and sixty-three dollars and forty-four cents (\$720,563.44), less the amount of unpaid or contested taxes and other debts, if any, claimed against the Crystal Water Company of Staten Island by the City or State of New York. The validity of said taxes and other alleged debts, if any, is to be subsequently determined and adjusted with all convenient speed by litigation or agreement. The City will pay in addition to the sum of seven hundred and twenty thousand five hundred and sixty-three dollars and forty-four cents (\$720,563.44), the cost price of any addition or additions to the distribution system of the company which may be made by the Crystal Water Company of Staten Island or which may have been made between April 30, 1906, and September 30, 1906, together with the cost price of such pipe and appurtenances as the company may have on hand on September 30, 1906, which do not form part of its distribution system and which may be suitable for the use of the distribution system. The City also agrees to pay, on taking title to the property provided to be conveyed hereunder, any and all sums due from the City to said Crystal Water Company of Staten Island for water supplied to the City prior to July 1, 1906.

Upon the receipt of a direction or request from the Crystal Water Company of Staten Island at any time prior to September 30, 1906, that the payments herein provided for by The City of New York shall be made to the Equitable Trust Company of New York, trustee under a mortgage made by the Crystal Water Company of Staten Island to secure an issue of bonds, The City of New York will pay the sums so directed to be paid to said Equitable Trust Company of New York, on receipt, either directly from the Crystal Water Company of Staten Island or through the Equitable Trust Company of New York of due and proper instruments of conveyance and transfer as herein provided, covering the property to be conveyed and transferred as aforesaid, the payments herein provided to be made by the City shall be made simultaneously with and in exchange for the instruments of transfer herein provided and upon the satisfaction by the trustee of said mortgage.

The Crystal Water Company will operate its plant from July 1, 1906, to September 30, 1906, but title to the City shall be regarded as having been given, should the contemplated transfer and sale herein provided for be fully consummated, as of July 1, 1906, the company shall be entitled to reimbursement for all its just and reasonable expenses for operating and conducting the affairs of said company during said period from July 1, 1906, to September 30, 1906, but will derive no other revenue



from such operation or from the receipts therefor, but in lieu thereof shall receive, and the said City shall pay, interest at the rate of six (6) per cent. per annum upon the total sum paid as the purchase consideration for the property to be sold and transferred by the company and acquired by the City, as herein provided. The company will use its best endeavors for the prompt collection of assessed rates for its water service from July 1 to October 1, 1906, and will turn the same over to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, together with the other property to be so transferred and conveyed hereunder on September 30, 1906, less the deductions for operating and other expenses, as herein provided. The City will use its best endeavors to collect all unpaid bills for water service supplied by the company prior to July 1, 1906, and pay over the same to the company. The reading of the meters of the company on July 1, 1906, will be taken both by the company and by a representative of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

In witness whereof the Commissioner has hereunto set his hand and seal for and on behalf of The City of New York, and the President and Treasurer of the Crystal Water Company of Staten Island have set their hands and seals, and have affixed the corporate seal for and on behalf of the Crystal Water Company of Staten Island the day and year herein first above written, and the Commissioner and the Crystal Water Company of Staten Island have executed this agreement in triplicate, one part of which is to remain with the Commissioner, one to be filed with the Comptroller of the City, and the third to be delivered to the Crystal Water Company of Staten Island.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—On May 17, 1906, you wrote me as follows:

"As you are aware, there are pending before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment applications for franchises by certain telephone companies. I desire to be advised whether it is your opinion that the City would legally have the power to enforce, under the terms of a franchise granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the rates which the said company shall charge for its service to the public, provided the same was made a condition of the franchise."

On May 21, 1906, I wrote the Board of Estimate and Apportionment asking to be informed what applications for franchises by telephone companies were pending and in what manner it was proposed to regulate the rates of the applicant companies for the services rendered to the City and the public.

In reply I received a communication from said Board enclosing a report of the Bureau of Franchises, dated May 29, 1906, from which it appears there is but one application pending, to wit, that of the Atlantic Telephone Company; that two other companies, the Commonwealth Telephone Company and the Star Telephone Company, made applications for similar rights to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, but at a meeting held April 27, 1906, both applications were denied. A copy of the second report of the Bureau of Franchises upon the application of the Atlantic Telephone Company and the proposed contract to be entered into with that company also accompanied such communication.

There can be no doubt as to the power of the State to regulate the rates public utilities corporations shall charge to the public. This right is not confined to a regulation at the time of granting the charter, nor need the State in granting a charter specifically reserve to itself the right to regulate such rates in the future. A long line of cases in the United States Supreme Court have held such power to be inherent in the State and that rates at any time may be regulated, provided such rates so prescribed are not confiscatory. In *Georgia Banking Company vs. Smith*, 128 U. S., 174, the Court said, at page 181:

"It is conceded that a railroad corporation is a private corporation though its uses are public, and that a contract embodied in terms in its provisions or necessarily implied by them is within the constitutional clause prohibiting legislation impairing the obligation of contracts. If the charter in this way provides that the charges which the company may make for its service in the transportation of persons and property shall be subject only to its own control up to the limit designated, exemption from legislative interference within that limit will be maintained, but to effect this result the exemption must appear by such clear and unmistakable language that it cannot be reasonably construed consistently with the reservation of the power by the State."

The Courts thus recognize that a binding contract may be entered into by the State provided it was evident that such was the intention of the Legislature.

It is equally well recognized that what the State may do regarding the granting of franchises, it may delegate to a municipality to do. That the power to regulate rates may be delegated has been favorably passed upon in a long line of decisions throughout the United States. See

*Rohr vs. Beardstown*, 32 Ill. App., 407;

*Hudson County Freeholders vs. State and N. J. R. & T. Co.*, 24 N. J. L., 718;

*Mobile vs. Yuille*, 3 Ala., 137; 36 Am. Dec., 441; 72 Fed. Rep., 829;

*Macon vs. Macon R. Co.*, 7 Ga., 221;

*Peo. ex rel. Jackson vs. Suburban R. Co.*, 29 L. R. A., 650; 178 Ill., 594.

The only limitation is that the power to fix rates must be clearly designated by the Legislature, either by express grant or by necessary implication.

Thus, in *Sternberg vs. State of Nebraska*, 19 L. R. A., 570, the power was given the City "to fix and determine the rate charged," and this was sustained by the Courts as a sufficient delegation by the State of its powers to the municipality.

In *City of St. Louis vs. Bell Telephone Company of Missouri*, 2 L. R. A., 278, where a city ordinance had provided that "the annual charge for the use of the telephone in the City of St. Louis shall not exceed \$50," it was held that the City had no power to pass the ordinance in question for lack of charter authority, but the Court said:

"We shall take it for granted that the State has the power to fix and prescribe a maximum rate for telephone service. That this power could be delegated to municipal corporations is equally clear. The ordinance of the City of St. Louis must not be in conflict with the general laws of the State. If the city has had this power to fix rates conferred upon it, then an ordinance which fixes reasonable maximum rates would not be in conflict with the law under and by virtue of which the defendant is organized and which law constitutes its charter."

In the case of *Nebraska Telephone Company against State of Nebraska ex rel. Yeiser*, 45 L. R. A., 113, 55 Neb., 627, a delegation of power to regulate the rates a telephone company might charge was upheld. The Court said:

"And it is evident that the Legislature has acted upon the theory that this power to fix the compensation of public service corporations is one vested in it by the Constitution. This is evident from its creation by the Board of Transportation and the powers conferred upon that Board; and as late as 1897 the Legislature conferred authority upon the Mayor and Councils of cities of the metropolitan class to fix and determine by ordinance what compensation telephone companies doing business within such cities might charge and exact for services rendered or to be rendered by them."

In *People ex rel. the West Side Street Railway Company vs. Barnard*, 110 N. Y., 548, a statute required the sale of a street railway franchise to the highest bidder, and the Common Council of the City of Buffalo inserted a condition that the purchaser should charge no more than a five cent fare for one continuous passage over a certain route. The action of the Common Council was sustained by the Court, which said:

"If it should turn out that it could not comply with the terms of the grant in respect mentioned, the result would simply be that it would be exposed to the forfeiture of its franchise and rights."

Since such power of regulating rates may be delegated, it follows that the City may execute a binding contract prescribing a scale of rates, and such contracts have been sustained by the Courts.

In *Detroit vs. Detroit City Railroad Company*, 184 U. S., 388, by authority of the Legislature the City had passed an ordinance giving a railroad company certain rights and providing "that the rate of fare for any distance shall not exceed five cents." The ordinance was held to be an agreement, the Court saying, at page 389:

"It is a contract which gives the company the right to charge a rate of fare up to the sum of five cents for a single passenger, and leaves no power with the city to reduce it without the consent of the company."

The nature and purpose of such a contract is well stated in the case of *Pond vs. New Rochelle Water Company*, 183 N. Y., 330, where the Court said, on page 338:

"In the case before us we have a municipality entering into a contract for the benefit of its inhabitants, the object being to supply them with pure and wholesome water at reasonable rates. While there is not presented a domestic relation like that of father and child, or husband and wife, yet it cannot be said that this contract was made for the benefit of a stranger. In the case before us the municipality sought to protect its inhabitants who were at the time of the execution of the contract consumers of water, and those who might thereafter become so, from extortion by a corporation having granted to it a valuable franchise extending over a long period of time."

In *State ex rel. St. Louis vs. Laclede Gas Light Company*, 102 Mo., 472, where an ordinance has been accepted by a gas company fixing the maximum price of gas, it was held to be a contract which was protected against the attempt of the city to reduce the price of gas, and that the right to regulate was not such a police power that it could not be bargained away.

In *Charles Simons' Sons Company vs. Mayland Telephone and Telegraph Company*, 63, L. R. A. 727, a telephone company had applied to the City of Baltimore for permission to construct and maintain wires in the public streets, and the city, in the ordinance granting such permission, fixed the rates that might be charged. The telephone company accepting the ordinance in question. Apparently the only power delegated to the municipality under which it enacted such ordinance was in these words:



"The Mayor and City Council of Baltimore shall have power to regulate the use of the streets, lanes and alleys of said city by railway or other tracks, gas or other pipes, telegraph, telephone, electric light or other wires and poles, in, under, over or upon the same, and may require all such wires to be placed underground after such reasonable notice as they may prescribe."

And the Court said:

"Now, when the ordinance in question was passed by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore and accepted by the appellee corporation, the latter had its charter, and was subject in making its contracts only to the limitations which the law imposed. Within these limitations it was free to contract. In passing the ordinance the municipality made no attempt to interfere with the charter rights of the appellee or to abridge its chartered powers. It did not attempt of its own authority and right to impose upon the appellee in invitum the rates of charge for telephone service specified in the ordinance. The appellee had at the time of the passage of the ordinance the right to refuse to accept its terms. In accepting these it was acting within its chartered powers and in the exercise of its chartered rights. All of the obligations imposed by the ordinance were imposed by the appellee upon itself by its own voluntary action in accepting the ordinance. \* \* \*

"The law gives to the municipality the right to regulate the use of its streets, and requires of a public service corporation that it shall obtain from the municipality the requisite authority to use the streets and highways thereof where such use is desired for its corporate purposes. It cannot be the duty of the municipal authorities to grant such use for the mere advantage of the corporation, while it is their duty in granting the same to secure the largest measure of advantage to the general public with a just regard for the rights of the corporation. It would seem to be but a reasonable incident to and exercise of the power to regulate the use of the streets and highways which has been conferred by the provisions of law we are here considering that where a public service corporation gets permission to use such streets and highways for its corporate purposes, and such purposes consist in making contracts with the citizens of the municipality to which the power is entrusted and exacting from them compensation for a service, that for urgent reasons of convenience or the necessities of business conditions they must avail of, the permission can be granted under such regulations as to rates of charges as will protect the community against extortionate exactions, and secure fair and reasonable terms in availing of the facilities which the corporation furnishes."

The only question to be determined, therefore, is whether the State has delegated the necessary powers to The City of New York.

In this State telephone companies are incorporated under the Transportation Corporations Law, and there is nothing in Article VIII. of said law applying to telephone and telegraph companies requiring the consent of the municipal authorities to the vesting of a franchise.

Since, however, the passage of the Greater New York Charter it has been evident that the consent of the City is necessary before a franchise to the use of the streets of the City can vest in a telephone company. This point has been authoritatively settled in the recent case of *People ex rel. Independent Telephone Company vs. Monroe* (30 N. Y. L. J., 488), where it was held by Mr. Justice Clarke that the relator had not under the Transportation Corporations Law "acquired an undoubted legal right to the use of the streets by virtue of its incorporation, but that right can only be granted in accordance with the provisions of the Charter." The application for a mandamus was denied. The order was affirmed by the Appellate Division, 1891, A. D. 611, and the appeal from this order was dismissed without any opinion by the Court of Appeals, 179 N. Y., 521.

The body which had the power to grant such consent was definitely determined in the case of *West Side Electric Company against Consolidated Telegraph and Telephone Company*, 110 A. D., 171. Although that case involved a discussion as to the procedure to be followed by an electric company organized under a law which required the consent of the municipal authorities, the decision unequivocally held that in 1896—that is, before the Charter went into effect—the Board of Aldermen and not the Board of Electrical Control was the municipal body whose consent was necessary to the vesting of the franchise.

By the amended Charter the franchise-granting power is now vested in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

By the provisions of the Greater New York Charter the State has clearly delegated to the municipality the power not only to grant franchises but to prescribe the terms and conditions on which such franchises shall be taken, and among such delegated powers is that of prescribing the rates which shall be charged by public service corporations obtaining such franchises. This is evident from the terms of the Charter itself:

"Section 73. Limitations and Conditions as to Grant of Franchises. \* \* \* Every grant shall make adequate provision by way of forfeiture of the grant or otherwise to secure efficiency of public service at reasonable rates and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the full term of the grant. \* \* \*

"Sec. 74. Proceedings prior to Grant of Franchise.—Before any grant of franchise or right to use any street \* \* \* shall be made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the proposed specific grant, embodied in the form of a contract, with all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges, \* \* \* shall be published \* \* \*

At the public hearing upon the application of the Atlantic Telephone Company counsel for the New York Telephone Company stated that the power of the City to fix rates had not yet been passed upon by the courts, but that in other States the courts had uniformly held that the municipal authorities could not make such restrictions as are attempted to be made in the proposed contract with the Atlantic Telephone Company. In support of this proposition such counsel have since cited the case of *Wright vs. Glen Telephone Company*, which was decided in the Appellate Division, Third Department, of this State, in May of this year.

I have examined this case thoroughly and do not find it in any way controlling, as the facts show plainly that the municipal authorities of the City of Gloversville did not possess the broad powers conferred on the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Greater New York Charter, as amended, but were only given the right "to regulate the setting and stringing of telegraph, telephone, electric light and power and other poles and wires in said city."

The Court said:

"The power of the municipality is simply a police power to be exercised for the protection of the citizens. It cannot use that power for the purpose of forcing a contract with a telephone company for benefits to itself or to the citizens."

I am, therefore, of the opinion, and so advise you, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has the power to fix and regulate the rates which a telephone company shall charge for its service to the public as a condition of the granting by said Board of a franchise, and further, that the City would legally have the power to enforce the rates so prescribed.

*In the Board of Aldermen.*

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the amended Greater New York Charter, to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), in addition to the amount heretofore authorized, the proceeds whereof to be applied to the account entitled, Salaries and Wages, Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen June 19, 1906, three-fourths of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

Received from his Honor the Acting Mayor, July 2, 1906, without his approval or disapproval thereof; therefore, as provided in section 40 of the Greater New York Charter, the same took effect as if he had approved it.

SIR—In the matter of a resolution of the Board of Aldermen adopted June 19, 1906, as follows:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the amended Greater New York Charter, to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), in addition to the amount heretofore authorized, the proceeds whereof to be applied to the account entitled, Salaries and Wages, Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York,"

—which resolution was referred to the Comptroller by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and by you to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics for examination, I beg to report as follows:

The amount asked for by the President of the Borough of The Bronx in the Departmental Estimate for 1906 for Salaries and Wages in the Bureau of Buildings and Offices in The Bronx was \$50,000, and for Salaries and Supplies, Bureau of Public Baths, \$10,000 was asked for. The amount allowed for the first mentioned account was \$45,000, while \$10,000, the amount asked for the second account, was granted.

The monthly proportion for the year on the \$45,000 item would be \$3,750, while the proportion for bath purposes would be about \$835.

In spite of that, the disbursements by months for salaries and wages charged against the Buildings and Offices appropriation and against the appropriation Salaries and Supplies, Bureau of Public Baths, since January 1 to and including August 31, 1906, were as follows:

If this rate of expenditure is kept up in the Buildings and Offices account, it will require approximately \$60,000 to finish out the year, which will be \$15,000 more than was originally appropriated.

The Bath account will have a balance after September 1 of approximately \$6,000, from which \$1,000 may have to be expended for the remaining four months of the year, leaving \$5,000 over. After deducting this expected excess from the deficiency in the Buildings and Offices account, there will still be a shortage of \$10,000, which it is desired to make up by the Special Revenue Bond issue now asked for.

The shortage in the appropriation for the Bureau of Buildings and Offices, it has been explained by the President of the Borough of The Bronx in a letter to the President of the Board of Aldermen, was caused by the fact that additional offices had to be leased for public purposes since the beginning of the year, viz.: Engineers' branch offices at No. 4179 Third avenue, at No. 1161 East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street and another on Macomb's Dam road, together with temporary court rooms on Washington avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-second street.

These make up, as was stated by the Borough President, 16 public offices within his jurisdiction, besides the Borough Hall, that require daily cleaning and frequent repairs, all of which must be paid through the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

It will therefore require, as heretofore stated, if the same rate of expenditure is kept up during the remainder of the year, the proceeds of the \$10,000 bond issue requested. I would therefore respectfully recommend your approval of the resolution attached hereto.

SIRS—In protecting the City's interests in cases tried before the Change of Grade Damage Commission for the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, it has been necessary for me to employ an expert builder and an expert real estate appraiser. I have certified bills presented by these experts for upwards of \$6,000, and during the ensuing six months it will be necessary for me to certify further bills of theirs amounting probably, with the ones above referred to, in the aggregate to about the sum of \$10,000, which expenses, by the acts creating the Commission, are chargeable out of funds to be provided by the sale of bonds or Corporate Stock, as therein provided, viz: Chapter 537 of the Laws of 1893, as amended by chapter 567 of the Laws of 1894.

I would therefore request that you take such steps as may be necessary to provide for the payment of the bills already contracted and those about to be contracted by me in the furtherance and protection of the interests of the City in cases already tried and about to be tried before the above named Commission.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—A request from Hon. G. L. Sterling, Acting Corporation Counsel, dated July 18, 1906, received by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and referred to the Comptroller for investigation and report September 14, 1906, for an issue of \$10,000 in Corporate Stock, pursuant to chapter 537 of the Laws of 1893, as amended, to provide funds to meet bills contracted and to be contracted in cases tried before the Change of Grade Damage Commission, has been the subject of examination of the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics.

I beg to report as follows:

Information obtained by a representative of this Bureau at the offices of the Law Department is to the effect that the Corporation Counsel has been required to employ an expert builder and an expert real estate appraiser to protect the City's interests in cases tried before the Change of Grade Damage Commission for the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and that corrected bills for the services of such experts, already presented and now awaiting audit and payment, amount to \$6,000.

The Corporation Counsel further states that during the ensuing six months it will be necessary to certify additional claims for the services of experts amounting probably to \$4,000.

It appears to be necessary for the City, in properly opposing claims for damages done to property by changes in the grade of streets in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, to use, first, an architect and a builder as a witness. This witness examines the property in question, making full reports as to dimensions, improvements, change of grade and, in cases where the question of area arises, he makes detailed drawings, maps, etc., and then testifies before the Commission. Second, a real estate expert is required to testify as to the depreciation in market value caused by the change of grade, if any.

The trials before this Commission will be resumed next week and will proceed at the rate of about five cases a week until the Christmas holidays. There are approximately nine hundred cases now on the calendar of the Commission ready for trial.

The expenses of the Law Department in defending these cases are not provided for in any Budget appropriation account, and the cost in previous years has been met by an issue of Corporate Stock as provided in chapter 537 of the Laws of 1893, as amended by chapter 567 of the Laws of 1894.

In view of the facts disclosed in this examination, I respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be asked to approve the request of the Corporation Counsel for an issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of \$10,000, said issue to be made pursuant to the provisions of chapter 537 of the Laws of 1893, as amended by chapter 567 of the Laws of 1894.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
