No. 214.

Resolved, That the names of Webster avenue, between Kingsbridge road and East One Hundred and Ninety-third street and the public place on the east side of said avenue, lying between said avenue and the New York and Harlem Railroad tracks, and the south side of Kingsbridge road, between Webster and Park avenues, in the Borough of The Bronx, be and they are hereby changed to Fordham square; be it further

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of The Bronx be and he is hereby authorized and requested to place suitable signs on said square, showing the name thereof, and to renumber the buildings facing thereon.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of eight hundred and twenty-one thousand two hundred and fifteen dollars (\$821,215), in addition to the amounts heretofore authorized, to provide means for the construction of the bridge and approaches thereto across the Harlem river at East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street (Fordham Heights), in the Borough of The Bronx, with West Two Hundred and Seventh street, in the Borough of Manhattan.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment February 10, 1905, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to an amount not exceeding eight hundred and twenty-one thousand two hundred and fifteen dollars (\$821,215), in addition to the amounts heretofore authorized, to provide means for the construction of the bridge and approaches thereto across the Harlem river at East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street (Fordham Heights), in the Borough of The Bronx, with West Two Hundred and Seventh street, in the Borough of Manhattan, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the

Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding eight hundred and twenty-one thousand two hundred and fifteen dollars (\$821,215), in addition to the amounts heretofore authorized, the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

Received by the President of the Board of Aldermen, February 11, 1905. Received in the Board of Aldermen, February 14, 1905, and referred to the Committee on Finance, March 14, 1905, by said Committee reported to the Board, recommending that the ordinance be rejected and said report adopted. Subsequently, by resolution, vote reconsidered and ordinance recommitted to the Committee on Finance.

March 27, 1905, the Board of Aldermen having failed to pass upon the proposition within six weeks after the same was received, either by an affirmative vote or by a failure of a majority of all the members of the Board of Aldermen to vote against the same, therefore, in accordance with the provisions of section 48 of the Greater New York Charter, the proposition is deemed to be passed.

No. 1. Proposed frame structure is unlawful within the fire limits. Section 143 of the Code.

The Code makes no direct provisions for such structures, the nearest reference thereto being for grain elevators on tide water or adjacent to the river front. That the rules and regulations of the President of the Borough and the provisions of the law do not apply. That the Superintendent of Buildings, in view of fact that the Code makes no direct provisions for such buildings, erred in rejecting the above cited application. That as to the mode, manner of construction and the materials to be used, the Superintendent of Buildings erred in rejecting the above cited application. The location of this coal pocket is in a place devoted wholly to manufacture and commerce, and is isolated from any residences. That it is to be located in close proximity to the East river, a waterway for handling of the coarser and heavier freights. That the construction of other than heavily timbered coal pockets is practically prohibitive by reason of excessive cost, and further by reason of the short-lived nature of such buildings. In this case the granting of this permit will operate to the interest of the public in that it will further the manufacture of a pure article of every-day use and will tend to break the grip of the ice trust upon the people of this City.

Mr. J. F. Swinnerton appeared before the Board.

Appeal 15—Alteration of 1905, premises south side of Willoughby avenue, 250 feet east of Sumner avenue, Borough of Brooklyn.

Appellants, Helmle, Huberty & Huddswell.

The floor in roof construction, he requires to be of fireproof material, whereas plans filed show floor beams in new stories and roof construction to be the same as the wood floor construction in old portion which is now erected.

The appellants contemplate adding two stories to an existing extension to the main building; this extension was erected since the erection of the main building and was constructed with a view of adding three additional stories at some future date and all wall thicknesses were constructed accordingly.

The two stories proposed to be added are intended to relieve the main building and provide roomy quarters in the old building. The floor will be open from end to end about thirty feet wide and eighty feet long and twelve feet high, as will more fully appear by reference to the plans.

The new stories will have fire-escapes and balconies all around same, and every window will open thereon. The balconies will connect with exterior fire-escapes, stairs and large new exterior fireproof staircase at the end of the extension will provide ample accommodation for exits in emergency and will greatly relieve stairs of the main building.

The Orphan Asylum Society are rightfully proud of the buildings at St. Joseph's Asylum. The buildings are substantially constructed and equipped with every facility for the little orphans placed in their care.

An inspection of the buildings would certainly commend this appeal to your favorable consideration.

Wood floor construction is used in that portion of the extension erected prior to this date.

As heretofore stated this extension was built with the view of having additional stories, walls, columns, etc., added and were made amply strong to allow this.
