Carpenter's Work.

At Second District Prison (by prison labor)—Erection of a new door to entrance for vehicles.

At Third District Prison (by paid labor)—Cutting out of window of prison office and putting there a wooden door; also an iron graded door and fanlight.

At Fourth District Prison—Putting in seven new window frames, glazed, in cells of windows of male prison; one new window frame, glazed, put in female prison; material used, eight new window frames, 10 inches by 22 inches; sixteen 2½-inch hinges, eight dozen of 1¼-inch screws, two lights of glass, 14 inches by 20 inches; two pounds of putty.

At Fifth District Prison—Glazing twelve panes of glass, 15 inches by 16 inches, put in windows of male prison; six panes of glass, 15 inches by 16 inches, put in windows of female prison; five pounds putty; making shelves in matron's room, three pieces of white pine and three pounds of nails.

At Sixth District Prison—Making of new platform for office and partitions for toilets; material used, 600 feet of tongue and grooved ceiling boards, 18 pieces of 2-inch by 3-inch joist, ten pounds finishing nails.

Plumbing and Tinsmithing.

At Second District Prison—Testing boiler No. 1-2341, certificate No. 7890, by Police Department, Boiler Inspection; by paid labor, installing two washbasins in Keeper's toilet room and one water closet bowl; furnished and put up two new basin cocks and two low down compression basin cocks with name plate; five hours' labor, plumber and helper; repairing water tank, 15 pounds of iron cement; time, 1¼ days, plumber and helper; repairs to elevator, lining out piston valves, facing reversing valves, straightening reversing lever, filing bearings, renewing brake blocks, operating cable and shipping rack and overhauling safety; time, four days' work; repairing steam valves and radiator, three days' work; put in "Duparquet" range, 6 feet; one set of lining and one set of rines and covers.

At Third District Prison (by paid labor)—New toilets, pipes, etc., installed on both male and female sides of prison and a new water supply from main in street was added; the tank on roof was repaired and placed in such a condition as to be used in case of emergency; new wash basins put in Keeper's office; material used, one 12-inch basin, four nickel-plated, self-closing faucets; two composition cocks, two nickel-plated basin cocks, two nickel-plated chain stays, one ball cock complete, four feet of galvanized pipe, one 1½-inch union, one galvanized "T" 2 inches by 2½ inches; one 1½-inch bushing, one 1½-inch nipple, five pounds 1½-inch lead pipe, three pounds solder, acid glycerine; nine days' time, Plumber and Helper.

At Fourth District Prison (by paid labor)—The entire old plumbing removed and new plumbing installed, new toilets, wash basins, shower baths, three new four-light gas fixtures put up, a new sanitary floor laid in male prison and the prison put in first class condition (by unpaid labor)—faucets in sink of prison kitchen and Keeper's quarters were replaced with new ones, put on three new locks on male prison, two new stoves put up, furnishing the necessary pipes and elbows thereto; material used, three ¾-inch brass faucets, twenty-seven lengths of 6-inch stovepipe.

At Fifth District Prison (by paid labor)—The entire new plumbing work and additional water supply, with the necessary fixtures in each cell, such as basins, closets;

sanitary floors have been duly completed and the entire work was done according to contract and specifications, and was executed in a satisfactory manner; locating gas leaks, repairing and testing gas pipes under concrete floor and replacing same; furnishing and putting up complete one new 63-gallon galvanized hot water boiler, 16 inches by 6 feet, for Mott's Defiance Range No. 9, and connecting thereto new pipes to boiler.

At Seventh District Prison (by paid labor)—In course of construction the installing of an entire new plumbing system and additional water supply.

Painters' Work.

At Third District Prison—Painting iron casings and bars inserted in windows of prison, the double van door at entrance painted two coats, the outside dado of prison wall 2 feet high was retouched, painted prison office and dado, varnished windows and furniture; material used, 100 pounds of white lead, ten gallons raw oil, ten gallons turpentine, five gallons liquid dryers, ten pounds chrome green, five pounds yellow ochre, five pounds raw sienna, twenty-five pounds burnt umber, and for pointing stone flagging on ground tier, used one-half barrel of Portland cement.

At Fourth District Prison—Ceiling of twenty-five cells whitewashed; used one-quarter barrel lime, three pounds ultramarine blue, two pounds calcined glue and two whitewash brushes.

At Fifth District Prison—Renovating and painting the interior of prison; material used, 500 pounds white lead, twenty gallons raw oil, twenty gallons turpentine, ten pounds drop black, five gallons asphaltum, five gallons liquid dryers, ten pounds chrome green, twenty-five pounds chrome yellow, twenty-five pounds burnt sienna, twenty-five pounds burnt umber, five gallons of patent enamel, two gallons of furniture varnish, four gallons benzine, one gallon shellac.

The prisons were cleansed of roaches and waterbugs by the services rendered by the P. M. Frank Disinfectant Company.

The usual amount of cooking, laundrying, cleaning and other general work done in all prisons by unpaid prison help.

Dear Sir—I herewith submit the labor report for Riker's Island Branch Workhouse for the quarter ending December 31, 1906:

Blacksmith repaired fifty cot frames, made one new hook, one pair ice tongs and shod four horses, using the following material, viz: one ton blacksmith coal, three hundred feet iron.

Carpenters repaired all windows and doors in Dormitories Nos. 1 and 2, and placed new hand railing on stoop at office; new sill in entrance to No. 1 dormitory.

Tinsmith repaired roofs of the following buildings, viz: Dormitories Nos. 1 and 2, mess hall, church, hospital and extension roof on stable.

Repaired one hundred pans and made one-half dozen 6-gallon water cans for prisoners' mess hall.

The following material was used: twelve boxes tin, fifty pounds solder, fifteen bags of charcoal.

Harnessmaker repaired fifteen sets harness.

Steamfitter repaired the boiler in Keeper's quarters, and also repaired boiler in Dormitory No. 2, and put in a new set of grates complete.

Painters painted Keepers' quarters, hospital, ice house, storehouse, mess hall and dark cell buildings outside.

The roads on the island have received careful attention, and are in good condition for the traffic of the island.

The inmates incapable of very active work have been regularly employed in the stone shed, or in trimming the grounds adjacent to the buildings.

The female prisoners have been employed in the laundry or in the cleaning up of the various buildings.

The following work in concrete, carpentry and painting was accomplished during the past quarter ending December 31, 1906, by the inmates of the Reformatory:

Finished laying basement floor under shop, 2,905 square feet.
Excavated ground in rear of shop in trench form to depth of seven feet in which a sewer pipe 9 inches in diameter was laid and connected with the main sewer pipe, 81 feet long.

Excavated ground in rear of shop to depth of 15 inches and graded the same for the purpose of laying concrete sidewalk. Ashes were put in to a thickness of 8 inches, after which the sidewalk was laid. It covered ground to a total of 641 square feet.

Excavated ground, graded and laid ashes for a sidewalk leading from rear of shop to main road, after which a sidewalk of concrete was laid to total of 368 square feet.

Laid a concrete engine bed foundation in engine room, using six loads of broken stone, four loads of sand and thirty-five barrels of Portland cement. The depth was 4 feet, width 11 feet, breadth 13 feet, making a total of 572 cubic feet.

Whitewashed basement under shop, using four barrels of lime.

Remodeled tables and made benches, using about 1,000 feet of lumber, for use in cement industry.

Painted benches, tables, window sashes and pipes in basement.

Consenting, in accordance with a request received from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning under date of December 29, 1906, to the transfer of Francis J. Norton, Clerk in the Bureau of Supplies, to the Department of Street Cleaning.

Amending the resolution adopted by the Board of Education on October 10, 1906 (see Journal, page 1671), selecting and determining as a site for school purposes lands and premises on Old Stone road, beginning about 1,421 feet south of Signs road, New Springville, Borough of Richmond.

Requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to amend the resolution adopted December 14, 1906, approving of the action of the Board of Education in the matter of the selection of said site and authorizing the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of title thereto, in accordance with the foregoing resolution.

The following preambles and resolutions were also adopted:

Whereas, Thomas A. Dillon, Chief Clerk of the Board of Education, was examined by the Municipal Civil Service Commission on November 2, 1906, for promotion to Fourteenth Grade Clerk (salary \$2,500 per annum), in order to qualify for the position of Chief Clerk, to which he was elected on August 2, 1906; and

Whereas, Said Thomas A. Dillon successfully passed the examination referred to above, with a rating of 99.40 per cent., and has since November 2, 1906, continuously served in the position of Chief Clerk; and

Whereas, No clerk in the office of the Secretary of the Board of Education is at present receiving a salary of \$2,400 or over, which would be a necessary qualification for entrance into an examination for promotion to the tenth grade (salary \$3,000 per annum), known in 1900 as the sixteenth grade; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Commission be, and it is hereby requested to consider the examination taken by Thomas A. Dillon on November 2, 1906, for promotion to Fourteenth Grade Clerk the same as if said examination were taken for promotion to what was then known as Sixteenth Grade Clerk (salary \$3,000 per annum or over), and is now known as Tenth Grade Clerk.

Whereas, The Committee on Buildings is in receipt of sundry estimates from contractors for additional work under their contracts, as follows:

Estimate of Blake & Williams, contractors, for installing heating and ventilating apparatus at Teachers' Training School, Brooklyn..... \$308 00

Whereas, The Superintendent of School Buildings reports that these estimates are reasonable and that the work is necessary; therefore be it

Resolved, That the sum of nine hundred and six dollars (\$906), be and the same is hereby appropriated from the proceeds of Corporate Stock, to be issued by the Comptroller pursuant to sections 47 and 169 of the revised charter, application for the issue of which is hereby made; said sum to be applied in full payment for extra cost to Blake & Williams and James Fay's Son, contractors, for additional work in connection with their contracts, as hereinbefore stated; requisition for said sum being hereby made upon the Comptroller.

The Committee on Finance respectfully reports that the Board of Education has financial ability to make the appropriation mentioned in the foregoing resolution.

Whereas, On October 24, 1906 (see Journal, page 1787), the Board of Education appointed Max Cohen as Inspector of Heating and Ventilating, said appointment being for a probationary period of three months; and

Whereas, It having been found that his services were not satisfactory, your Committee has notified him that his services will be dispensed with on and after February 1, 1907, the date of expiration of the said probationary period; therefore be it

Resolved, That the action of the Committee on Buildings in deciding to dispense with the services of Max Cohen, Inspector of Heating and Ventilating, on and after February 1, 1907, for the reason above stated, be and it is hereby approved and ratified.

"Whereas, All children in the State of New York have a right to public school education at the expense of the State; be it

"Resolved, That the Board of Education of The City of New York hereby accepts the proposition made by the Directors of the Crippled Children's East Side Free School, to wit:

"That the Board of Education of The City of New York shall provide Teachers and school supplies for the above-mentioned school now conducted at No. 29 Montgomery street, Manhattan; that such Teachers and the children during school hours shall be under the exclusive supervision of the Board of Education and its officers; and that the above-mentioned society shall provide at its expense the building known as No. 29 Montgomery street, or some other building suitable for the purpose, and shall transport the said crippled children from their homes to the school and from the school to their homes, and shall provide such suitable food and medical attendance as may be necessary for the children's welfare during school hours.

"Resolved, That the Board of Education of The City of New York may, at its pleasure, withdraw from this arrangement at any time on six months' notice."

The Board of Education and the officers of the school accepted the arrangement as proposed, and the school has been organized as one of the public schools since September 10, 1906.

As will be noted, the expense of rental, transportation and medical service is defrayed by the organization that formerly supported the school, while the expense of salaries and of books and supplies is defrayed by the Board of Education.

The arrangement is working very satisfactorily and the school is under excellent management, Teachers of experience, ability and sympathy with the work having been secured for the school. At present there are four Teachers and one hundred and one (101) pupils.

Early in the fall the trustees of the School for Crippled Children located at No. 2111 Madison avenue applied to have that school taken over by the Board of Education on the same terms as those which were formulated for the school on Montgomery street. After a careful inspection of the school their request was granted by the Board of Education on November 14, 1906 (see Journal, pages 1874-75), and the school was turned over to the Board of Education on December 3, 1906. There are in this school two Teachers and forty-three pupils. The Teachers selected have special qualifications for the work in which they are engaged.

There are at the present time several other schools for crippled children in the City supported wholly by private enterprise. It will undoubtedly be the policy of the Board of Education to assume charge of these schools whenever the boards of trustees express a wish for this, and when suitable arrangements can be made. The obstacle in the way is the fact that most of our school buildings are already crowded with children, and suitable rooms cannot be easily provided. The expense item is a large one, as these children must all be transported to and from school, and in the Montgomery street and Madison avenue school free lunches and medical treatment are afforded.

If the State is under obligation and considers it good policy to educate a normal child, much more is it under obligation to educate, as far as possible, unfortunate children who at best are a great burden upon their parents. The effort should be to make these children happy, helpful and self-supporting.

It is probable that the Board of Education must undertake, in the near future, the education of the deaf, dumb and blind children within the city borders. A request has already been made that one or more schools be established for the education of the deaf and dumb.

A careful canvass has been made of the section lying east of the Bowery and south of Eighth street, and the names and addresses of six hundred and seventy-two (672) deaf and dumb children have been found. It is probable that there may be 2,000 or more such unfortunate children in this City who are entitled to as much of an education as they are capable of receiving.

Your committee has made no investigation in reference to the blind children who ought to receive an education, as no request has been made to have this done.

Mr. Greene nominated Mr. Ingalls as a member of the Executive Committee.

The nomination was seconded by several members.

Mr. Kelley moved that the Secretary be instructed to cast one ballot for Mr. Ingalls as a member of the Executive Committee.

Adopted by a unanimous vote.

The Secretary cast one ballot, as instructed.

The President thereupon announced that Mr. Ingalls had been duly elected a member of the Executive Committee, to fill the vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of office of Mr. Dix.

On motion, all absent members were excused for non-attendance at this meeting.

On motion, the Board adjourned at 5.20 o'clock p. m.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
