Sir—In compliance with the Charter, the Art Commission begs to submit its report for the year 1905.

The membership of the Commission, in accordance with the provisions of the Charter, consisted throughout the year of George B. McClellan (Mayor), J. Pierpont Morgan (President of the Metropolitan Museum of Art), A. Augustus Healy (President of the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences), John Bigelow (President of the New York Public Library), J. Carroll Beckwith (painter), Walter Cook (architect), A. Phimister Proctor (sculptor), Robert W. de Forest (layman), John D. Crimmins (layman) and Loyall Farragut (layman).

At the first meeting of the Commission, held January 10, 1905, the Commission organized by electing the following officers:

Robert W. de Forest, President; A. Augustus Healy, Vice-President and Loyall Farragut, Secretary.

Powers and Duties of the Commission.

Under the Charter, the Commission has jurisdiction over:

(a) All works of art to be acquired by The City of New York by purchase, gift or otherwise.

(b) The removal, relocation or alteration in any way of all works of art already possessed by the City.

(c) All designs of municipal buildings, bridges, approaches, gates, fences, lamps or other structures erected or to be erected upon land belonging to the City; the lines, grades, plotting of public ways and grounds; arches, bridges, structures and approaches which are the property of any corporation or private individual and which shall extend over or upon any street, park or public place belonging to the City, provided they are referred to the Commission by the Mayor or the Board of Aldermen.

(d) All structures, as mentioned in (c) above, to be erected or contracted for at an expense exceeding \$1,000,000.

(e) The selection of art productions, costing not to exceed \$50,000 in any one year, when such appropriation has been made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Works of art, as above defined, include all paintings, mural decorations, stained glass, statues, bas reliefs or other sculptures, monuments, fountains, arches, or other structures of a permanent character, intended for ornament or commemoration.

The Charter further provides that no work of art shall become the property of the City unless such work of art, or a design, together with a statement of the proposed location, shall have been submitted to and approved by the Art Commission. Until so approved, it may not be erected or placed in, upon or over any building, street, park or public place belonging to the City.

Further, no existing work of art may be removed, relocated or altered in any way unless the plan for such removal, relocation or alteration shall have been submitted to and approved by the Commission.

Matters Submitted in 1905.

The matters submitted to the Commission under these provisions during 1905 numbered 101; four others were presented in 1904, but not disposed of before January 1st of this year, making a total of 105 considered during the current year. The total amount of money involved approximated \$18,600,000.

The number of submissions made during 1905 of designs for "works of art"—see (a) above—was 23, including:

Botanical Park Fountain—A bronze fountain in the Botanical Garden in Bronx Park.

Brownson Memorial—A bronze bust of the late Orestes Augustus Brownson, LL. D. Proposed location, Riverside Park, foot of West Ninety-first street. To be presented to the City by friends of the deceased.

De Witt Clinton High School Mural Decorations—Two mural paintings to be placed in the auditorium of the De Witt Clinton High School.

Hall of Records Sculptures—(Seven submissions.)

Hamilton Drinking Fountain—Granite drinking fountain for horses in Riverside Park at the foot of West Seventy-sixth street. Presented to the City under a bequest of Robert Ray Hamilton.

Macomb's Dam Park Drinking Fountain—A drinking fountain for man and beast, to be placed at Jerome avenue and East One Hundred and Sixty-second street, Macomb's Dam Park.

Ornamental Pillars, Prospect Park South—Twenty-four ornamental pillars, to be placed at street intersections in Prospect Park South.

Prison Ship Martyrs' Monument—A monument in memory of the Prison Ship Martyrs, to be placed in Fort Greene Park. To be erected from funds contributed by the United States Government, the State of New York, The City of New York and private contributions. (Two submissions.)

Skene Monument—A monument in memory of the late Dr. Alexander J. C. Skene, to be placed at the north end of the Prospect Park Circle. Presented to the City by friends of the deceased. (Two submissions.)

Speyer Drinking Fountain—A granite drinking fountain for horses and dogs, to be placed at the northern end of Times Square. Presented to the City by Mrs. James Speyer. (Two submissions.)

Sullivan Memorial Fountain—A granite drinking fountain for man and beast, in memory of the late Algernon Sydney Sullivan, to be placed in Van Cortlandt Park. Presented to the City by friends of the deceased.

Tompkins Square Memorial Fountain—A drinking fountain in memory of the victims of the "Slocum" disaster to be placed in Tompkins square. To be presented to the City by the Sympathy Society of German Ladies.

Washington Equestrian Statue, Brooklyn—An equestrian statue of General Washington to be placed in the plaza of the Williamsburg Bridge, Brooklyn. Presented to the City by Hon. James R. Howe.

Block House Tablet, Central Park—A bronze tablet to be placed upon the Block House in Central Park near One Hundred and Tenth street. Presented to the City by the Women's Auxiliary to the American Scenic and Historic Preservation Society.

Action Upon Submissions.

In each one of the one hundred and one submissions acted upon during the past year, from one to twenty-four plans have been examined and passed upon. In seventy-three submissions the designs were approved as submitted, and in twenty-two instances

the Commission disapproved in whole or in part. These twenty-two submissions dealt with eighteen different matters, and for thirteen of these amended plans were prepared and again submitted to the Commission. In four instances these amended plans were disapproved. New plans for five structures are now being perfected. The new designs have generally shown marked improvement, and the Commission feels, therefore, that its work has been successful in securing a higher aesthetic standard for public structures.

The requirements of the Charter, that approval must be secured before structures may be erected, and the knowledge upon the part of the designers that plans would not be approved by the Commission which did not possess artistic merit, have also had an indirect effect, for those intending to submit designs to the Commission have naturally been desirous that their plans should be of such merit as to command immediate approval. Consequently, greater care has been taken in the preparation of these designs than otherwise would be or has been the case.

In six instances submissions were temporarily withdrawn, because further consideration and criticism were considered necessary before approval of the Commission was asked.

Four submissions remained unacted upon at the close of the year, owing to the fact that sufficient time had not been had within which to examine the plans and make report.

As each submission is immediately referred to a special committee to be examined and reported upon before it is considered by the full Commission, it is in committee work, of which no record is kept, that are found the more engrossing duties of Commissioners.

Of the full Commission there have been called thirteen meetings, at each of which a quorum has appeared.

The work of the Commission has brought it into official relation with nearly every department of the Greater City and the boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx. Most helpful co-operation has been had from all. There seems to be an increasing appreciation of the functions of the Art Commission, and also a desire that all plans be submitted to it for approval.

The following summary of the submissions presented to and acted upon by the Art Commission during the eight years of its existence indicates the general trend of the work of the Commission, the increase since January 1, 1902, being particularly noticeable. More submissions were made upon request of the Mayor during 1905 than during any previous year. Practically every structure of any importance was referred to the Commission. The method of regularly noting and reporting for consideration by the Mayor of proposed structures that, judging from experience, the Art Commission might expect to be referred to it, has been continued during the past year. This procedure, which has been developed as experience has justified, has proved not only satisfactory and convenient to the Mayor and the Art Commission, but has been invoked in certain instances by architects and heads of departments who have specifically requested that their plans be submitted to the Art Commission for approval before contracts were made.

* The provision requiring all structures exceeding in cost \$1,000,000 to be approved by the Commission did not become part of the Charter until January 1, 1902.

The Commission's collection of books, pamphlets, periodicals, photographs and prints on civic art in Europe and America has been considerably added to and extended during the current year. At this date it contains 275 bound volumes, 101 maps separately mounted and catalogued, several hundred unbound pamphlets, and between 2,300 and 2,400 photographs and prints, relating to about 100 cities—making it one of the best collections upon this subject in the United States. A thorough card catalogue has been prepared, through which it is possible to secure in a moment all of the material upon a given subject. The library has been consulted not only by members of the Commission, City officials, architects, contractors and other citizens interested in City improvement, but to a steadily increasing extent by visitors from other cities as far west as the Pacific coast, who have learned of its value and comprehensive scope.

Appreciating the necessity of a complete catalogue of the works of art belonging to the City, the Commission began the preparation of such a catalogue in 1903. In the last annual report a tentative list for the Borough of Manhattan was published as an appendix. During the past year the work was extended to Brooklyn, but as in Manhattan, the absence of accurate records and complete data made it slow and difficult. Many works of art were practically unknown to the public, and had almost been lost sight of by the City authorities themselves. It was necessary, therefore, to canvass the public buildings, parks and open spaces in addition to the examination of the records belonging to the various departments. It is not expected that the tentative list which appears in an appendix to this report is complete and accurate in every respect, and it is hoped that the persons into whose hands it may come will assist the Commission by supplying the deficiencies and by correcting such errors as may unavoidably have crept in.

The continuing demand for the tentative list for the Borough of Manhattan shows that it has evoked general interest and it is intended to include the other boroughs of the City as rapidly as possible. A revised list in the form of a complete catalogue for the whole City will then be published.

Herewith appended are the minutes of the Commission for the year just closed, which show in detail the action taken by the Commission on every matter coming within its jurisdiction.

Resolved, That the appointment of Mrs. Henry Parsons to the position of Director of Children's School Farms, in the Department of Parks, boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, be and the same is hereby approved under the authority of Civil Service Rule XII., paragraph 5; it appearing that the position of Director of Children's School Farms, in the Department of Parks, boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, demands peculiar and exceptional qualifications of an educational character, which, in the opinion of the Commission, could not be ascertained, through competitive examination; and Mrs. Parsons being a woman of high and recognized attainments in such qualities.

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to the fact that when the receipt of applications was advertised for the examination for Topographical Draughtsman, the eligible list resulting from which was established on March 1, 1906, it was stated in the advertisement that the salary attached to the position would be restricted to \$1,200 per annum, and requested instructions as to the method of certifying from same, in view of the fact that requests have been made upon him for certifications of eligibles for appointment at \$1,350 per annum and \$1,500 per annum. After a consideration of the matter, it was

Resolved, That the limit of salary stated in the advertisement of the examination for Topographical Draughtsman be and the same is hereby removed, and the Secretary is instructed to certify from the list for appointment at any salary for which he is unable to obtain eligibles from the old list for Topographical Draughtsman, established in May, 1905.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is instructed to direct the Chief Examiner to proceed with a new open competitive examination for the position of Topographical Draughtsman.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to request the Chief Examiner to proceed with an open competitive examination for the position of Oculist, at the earliest possible date, and pending the establishment of the eligible list the Department of Health is hereby authorized to employ Daniel H. Weisner, M. D., as an Oculist, under the provisions of Civil Service Rule XII., paragraph 3.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated March 6, stating that the appeal of Frank L. H. Geist, a candidate for Prison Keeper, had no merit, as no attempt was made by the candidate to point out any error or mistake in marking. The appeal was denied.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated March 6, with reference to the appeal of Abraham Rickman, candidate for Examiner, Department of Finance, for a rerating of his papers, together with the reports of Examiners Murray and Kavanagh and Mrs. Evans, who rated the same. It appeared from Examiner Murray's report that after an examination of the candidate's special paper, he could see no reason for changing his original ratings. Examiners Kavanagh and Mrs. Evans reported that upon a re-examination of the candidate's arithmetic paper they were of the opinion that the candidate was entitled to a rating of 66 per cent. for arithmetic, and recommended that he receive such a rating on that paper. It appeared that with the increased rating on arithmetic the candidate's rating on the entire examination would be 65 per cent. The recommendation was adopted.

A communication was presented from Egbert V. Lawrence, Transitman in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated March 6, transmitting a statement of his experience in civil engineering, and requesting that the Commission note upon the eligible list for promotion to Assistant Engineer in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, upon which list his name appears, that such experience has covered a period of ten years. After going into the matter very carefully, the Secretary was instructed to inform Mr. Lawrence that in the opinion of the Commission his experience in civil engineering cannot be construed to have covered a period of ten years and, therefore, he is ineligible at the present time for appointment as an Assistant Engineer in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated March 7, forwarding a report of Examiner Rafferty on the case of Henry H. Weinberger, candidate for Junior Clerk. It appeared that there had been some question as to the genuineness of the signatures of two of the vouchers on the candidate's application, and that he had been requested to call at the office of the Commission with reference to the matter, which he had failed to do. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Weinberger and inform him that his name would not be certified for appointment until the matter had been satisfactorily adjusted, and that in the event of his failing to comply with this request, his name would be taken from the eligible list.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated March 6, stating that the appeal of Daniel J. Carey, candidate for promotion to Sergeant of Police, did not appear to have any merit, as he had compared the ratings of the different examiners on the several questions of which the candidate made mention, and found them to be so close together as to preclude any idea of error. The appeal was denied.

Communications were presented from the Chief Examiner, dated March 8 and 10, stating that the appeals of Thomas H. Barry, candidate for promotion to Sergeant of Police, and Charles M. Leahy, candidate for Chainman and Rodman, did not come within the provisions of Civil Service Rule IX., as no mistakes of marking or rating were pointed out. The appeals were denied.

A communication was presented from Examiner Rafferty, dated March 5, with reference to the age of John J. Roche, candidate for Junior Clerk. It appeared that the candidate had stated in his application that he was eighteen years of age, the minimum age for that examination; but that a "protest" had been received at the office of the Commission, signed "Former Employer," to the effect that the candidate is not eighteen years of age and consequently not entitled to certification for appointment to Junior Clerk. Mr. Rafferty stated that he had requested the candidate to produce some proof as to the correct date of his birth, but that up to the time of writing he had failed to do so. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Roche and inform him that it would be necessary for him to produce some proof satisfactory to the Commission as to the date of his birth, and in the event of his failing to do so his name would be removed from the list for Junior Clerk.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated March 12, stating that the examination held on January 30 for Overseer of Reformatory was completed on March 12, 1906.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the eligible list for Overseer of Reformatory, resulting from the examination held January 30, be and the same is hereby established by the Municipal Civil Service Commission, as of March 12, 1906, and the Secretary is hereby instructed to certify from the same in answer to requisitions for appointment to that position.

The following communication was presented from the Secretary to the State Civil Service Commission, dated March 13, 1906:

FRANK A. SPENCER, Esq., Secretary, Municipal Civil Service Commission, New York City:

Dear Sir—I have to advise you that the communications from your Commission dated January 8, February 1, 9, 21, and March 2, 1906, transmitting resolutions amending the Civil Service Rules and classification of your City, were considered at a meeting of the State Civil Service Commission held on the 8th inst. Action upon the resolutions was taken as follows:

1. Adding to the exempt class, Court of Special Sessions, Male Probation Officer, in the First Division, continued upon the calendar.
2. Adding to the labor class, Part 2, Climber and Pruner, continued on calendar.
3. Amending Rule XVII., paragraphs 3 and 4, relative to examinations for Police and Fire Departments, continued on calendar.

4. Adding to non-competitive class, Steam Roller Engineman, office of the Borough Presidents and Department of Parks, approved.

5. Including in the non-competitive class, Automobile or Locomobile Engineman, Fire and Police Departments and Department of Street Cleaning, approved.

6. With reference to the proposed classification in the non-competitive class of the position of Supervising Nurse, the Commission adopted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the following resolution adopted by the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York February 21, 1906, and approved by the Mayor February 27, 1906, be returned without approval, and that the Municipal Civil Service Commission be informed that the State Commission believes it would be better to fill the position of Supervising Nurse through open competitive examination if promotion examination fails to secure persons properly qualified for said position:

Resolved, That the classification of positions in the non-competitive class, as fixed by the Civil Service rules, be and the same is hereby amended by including therein, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Public Charities, the Department of Correction, the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, the New York and Brooklyn Truant Schools and the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training Schools," the following:

"Supervising Nurse, with compensation not exceeding one thousand dollars per annum, with maintenance."

Your communication of March 7, transmitting resolutions amending the classification of positions in the non-competitive class, under the heading "Department of Docks and Ferries," by adding thereto the position of Quartermaster, and amending the classification of positions in the exempt class in the Police Department, by adding thereto the position of executive clerk to the Commissioner, was not received five days prior to the meeting of the Commission and was ordered placed upon the calendar for the next meeting.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is instructed to direct the Chief Examiner to proceed with an examination for promotion to Supervising Nurse in the Department of Public Charities, for the purpose of filling a vacancy in the latter position at Randall's Island, such examination to be open to all Trained Nurses who have served in that capacity in the Department of Public Charities for a period of six months.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission, dated March 13, in answer to the request of the Commission for information as to whether or not the following-named employees of the Jamaica Training School for Teachers, recently taken over by the Board of Education, ever passed a Civil Service examination for appointment in the State service:

Samuel F. Bowen, Engineer.

Joseph Semona, Janitor.

Walter Hulce, Janitor's Assistant.

Mr. Birdseye stated in his communication that the said persons were found in the service when the present provision of the law requiring certification of all payrolls went into effect, and that the regularity of their employment had been recognized for several years. In view of the statement of the Secretary of the State Commission, the non-competitive examination of the candidates ordered by the Commission at a meeting held February 21, in order to qualify them for transfer to the service of The City of New York, was canceled, and the Secretary was instructed to pass the payrolls of the said persons when presented by the Board of Education.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated March 12, requesting authority to appoint Messrs. George S. Wilkins, of No. 2465 Broadway, and August W. Schlemmer, of No. 1060 East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, as Transitmen and Computers, pending the establishment of the eligible list for that position. The request was granted under the provisions of Civil Service Rule XII., paragraph 3, and the Secretary was directed to instruct the Chief Examiner to conduct a non-competitive examination of the candidates in accordance with that rule.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Fire Department, dated March 8, transmitting the application of Assistant Foreman James V. Madigan for a special examination for promotion to Foreman. It appeared that the candidate was dismissed from the Fire Department on August 26, 1902, for "violation of the provisions of section 277 of the Rules"; that he appealed to the courts for reinstatement and an order was issued by the Court reinstating him, which order the Corporation Counsel advised the Fire Commissioner to comply with, and that Mr. Madigan was reinstated in the Fire Department on January 20, 1906; that during his separation from the service an examination for promotion to Foreman was held in which he did not have an opportunity to compete, and he therefore requested the privilege of a special examination for such promotion. The request was denied.

A communication was presented from Mr. J. H. Greener, Assistant Chief Clerk of the Law Department, transmitting, in accordance with the request of the Commission, a copy of the letter sent by that Department to candidates for the position of Process Server, who had been certified to it for appointment. The matter was laid over.

A communication was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated March 3, requesting that the names of Jesse B. Snow and A. A. Northrup be restored to the list for Assistant Engineer, with salary at the rate of \$1,350 per annum. It appeared that the candidates declined appointment at that rate on February 8, but were now willing to accept the same; and that the Board of Water Supply desired to appoint the said persons if the Commission was willing to recertify their names. The Secretary was instructed to restore the names of Messrs. Snow and Northrup to the list.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Richmond, dated March 9, requesting that the provisional appointments of the Topographical Draughtsmen serving in that department under Civil Service Rule XII., paragraph 3, be extended until March 15, by which time permanent selections could be made from the new eligible list; also that the provisional appointments of the Axemen now serving in that department be extended by the Commission until the new eligible list for Axeman is promulgated, the sixty-day period for which they were appointed having expired, but it being necessary to continue their services until such time as permanent selections could be made from the new list. The requests were granted, and the Secretary was instructed to attach a special certificate to the pay-rolls of the aforesaid persons when presented.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Richmond, dated March 7, requesting approval of the increase in salary of Meyer Pundick, Clerk, to \$1,320 per annum, as of January 1, 1906. It appeared that President Cromwell notified the Commission on December 16 that such action had been taken, but as there was a number of eligibles higher on the list for promotion than Mr. Pundick the increase was not allowed. The Secretary stated that since then the "declinations" of such persons had been transmitted to the Commission. The request was granted.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Richmond, dated March 3, requesting authority to appoint the following named persons, provisionally, with salary at the rate of \$1,350 per annum, pending the establishment of the new list for Transitman:

The request was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to direct the Chief Examiner to conduct a non-competitive examination of the candidates to qualify them for employment under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 3.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Public Charities, dated March 6, requesting that an open competitive examination be held for Dietitian, and that one of the requirements in the examination be six months' experience as a Dietitian in some institution. The Secretary stated that an eligible list was established for the position on March 31, 1905, on which three names remain. It appearing that the Department of Public Charities had not considered these three names for appointment, the Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Borden and state that the Commission had not been apprised of the fact that the three persons whose names appear on the eligible list for Dietitian had been given an

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated March 10, requesting approval of the leave of absence, without pay, for a period of six months, granted Richard Reilly, Chemist. It appearing from a certificate signed by three Medical Inspectors of that department that Mr. Reilly is mentally unfit for duty at the present time, the leave of absence was approved.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated March 8, requesting approval of a leave of absence without pay, for six months from March 8, granted Frank G. Fowler, Topographical Draughtsman. It appearing from the certificate furnished that the said leave of absence was granted on account of illness, the same was approved.

A communication was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated March 3, requesting that the following open competitive examinations be held:

—and outlining the conditions and scope of said examinations. The matter was referred to the Chief Examiner for a report.

A communication was presented from Mr. O. Rockland Tyng, Secretary of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, dated March 8, with reference to a communication received by him from Mr. J. J. F. Doyle, of No. 86 Carroll street, Brooklyn, whose name was certified to that Department from the eligible list for Senior Clerk. It appeared that the Department originally notified the Commission that the candidate "failed to report" to the notice sent him, but that Mr. Tyng wished to amend that notification by stating that the candidate called upon him and informed him that he never received the notice to appear. The Secretary was instructed to restore Mr. Doyle's name to the list for Senior Clerk.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Rapid Transit Railroad Commission, dated March 3, submitting for the approval of the Commission, a new schedule of salaries for employees of that department who are compelled to work under pressure of compressed air. After a consideration of the matter, as the proposed new schedule applied to engineering positions only, which positions are ungraded as to salary, the Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Rapid Transit Railroad Commission and state that there was no objection to the adoption of the same so far as the Civil Service Rules were concerned.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Board of Education, dated March 8, transmitting a letter from Mr. Clarence E. Meleny, Associate City Superintendent, requesting that the name of John J. Shanahan be restored to the list for Attendance Officer. The Secretary stated that Mr. Shanahan declined appointment to that position on November 23, 1903. The request was denied.

A communication was presented from the Assistant Secretary of the Park Board, dated March 8, asking that the Commission certify the pay-roll of George N. Spitzer, architect, for services rendered in that department from November 27 to November 30, 1905, inclusive, and stating that a permanent appointment was made from the eligible list with all possible speed, but that it was impossible to dispense with Mr. Spitzer's services sooner. The Secretary stated that Mr. Spitzer was appointed in the Park Department under the provisions of Rule XII, paragraph 3, to serve until such time as an appointment could be made from the new eligible list; that the sixty days allowed by the rule expired, and his pay-roll was certified up to November 27 with a "special certificate"; but at that time the list having been promulgated, his name was dropped from the pay-roll. The Secretary was instructed to certify the pay-roll covering the additional four days' services, and transmit the same to the Department of Finance for audit.

The Secretary reported that he had investigated the request of Francis H. Collins, of No. 2911 West Twenty-first street, Brooklyn, that his name be placed upon the preferred list for Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving as of September 16, 1899, instead of March 16, 1903, and believed the same to be reasonable. It appeared that Mr. Collins was appointed an Inspector of Incumbrances in the Borough of Brooklyn on September 16, 1899; that his position was abolished on March 15, 1902, on account of reduction of force; that his name was placed on a preferred list for one year, which list terminated March 14, 1903; that he was appointed from a competitive eligible list for Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn on March 16, 1903; that, in view of the fact that two days had elapsed between the termination of the preferred list for Inspector of Incumbrances and Mr. Collins' appointment as Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving, the Certification Clerk had placed his name upon the preferred list for the latter position at the present time as of March 16, 1903. In view of the fact that Mr. Collins presented the original communication forwarded to him by the Chief Engineer in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn with reference to his appointment as Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving, and that the date of same was March 13, 1903, the Commission ruled that his service in the City had been continuous from the date of his original appointment—September 16, 1899—and instructed the Secretary to place his name on the preferred list for Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving as of that date.

The request of Michael H. Harley, No. 86 Centre street, that he be preferred for appointment to the position of Fireman from the regular list for Firemen established, after open competitive examination, on March 27, 1905, on the ground that he is a veteran volunteer fireman, was denied.

The request of George D. Kellerman, of No. 526 East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, that his name be restored to the list for Laboratory Assistant, was granted upon the statement of the candidate that he reported to the Secretary of the Department of Health in answer to a notice sent him, and did not "fail to appear," as stated by that Department.

The request of Samuel Rosenblum, No. 1503 First avenue, that his name be retained on the list for Rodman, Board of Water Supply, until June 1, he being unable to accept an appointment at this time as he is finishing his third year at the New York University School of Applied Science, was then considered. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Rosenblum, and suggest that when he is in a position to accept an appointment he furnish the Commission with an affidavit setting forth the facts in his case, together with a request that his name be restored to the list, and the same would be given careful consideration.

The Secretary presented an affidavit of John F. Moen, candidate for Stenographer and Typewriter, to the effect that he never received a notice from the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School to report with reference to an appointment, and requesting that his name be restored to the list. It appeared that the candidate's name had been dropped upon the statement of that institution that he had failed to report in answer to a notice of appointment sent him. The request was granted.

A communication was presented from John A. Allen, No. 144 Eleventh street, Long Island City, dated February 26, declining appointment to the position of Topographical Draughtsman in the office of the President of the Borough of Richmond from a preferred list for that position, from which his name had been certified, but requesting that he be permitted to retain his right to appointment. The Secretary stated that the candidate was employed in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens up to February 16 at a salary of \$1,800 per annum, when he was laid off for lack of work, and that the certification to the Borough of Richmond was for appointment at \$1,350 only. He was instructed to retain the candidate's name on the preferred list for further certification for appointment at a salary of \$1,800 per annum.

The request of Jerome McNally, No. 151 East One Hundred and Seventh street, that his name be restored to the eligible list for Office Boy, was granted upon his state-

ment that he called at the Tenement House Department in answer to a notice sent him with reference to a possible appointment, and waited for two hours, but was unable to obtain any information regarding the same.

An affidavit was presented from Dennis McCarthy, No. 315 East Eighty-third street, to the effect that he was obliged to decline appointment as Watchman in the Department of Public Charities on February 21, 1906, on account of the illness of his mother, and requesting that his name be restored to the list for future certification. The request was granted.

The request of Alexander Rothenberg, No. 129 Rivington street, dated March 6, that his name be restored to the list for Gymnasium Attendant, was granted upon his statement that he is now in good health and able to accept an appointment. The candidate declined appointment from the said list on June 20, 1905, on account of illness, in substantiation of which fact he furnished a doctor's certificate.

The request of Henry J. Gleason, No. 209 West Seventeenth street, dated March 8, that his name be restored to the list for Automobile Engineman, was granted, he having declined appointment on January 30, 1906, on account of illness.

The request of Hans Tradelius, No. 143 West Fourth street, that he be permitted to enter the coming examination for Draughtsman's Helper was granted, it appearing that the candidate will have received his naturalization papers before the eligible list for the position is established.

The duplicate application of Catherine Degnan for the position of Attendant was accepted, it appearing that the candidate filed an application for that position before the closing date (March 6), but that the blank on which she presented her application for examination was that used for positions in the labor class instead of the form in use for competitive positions.

An affidavit was presented from Albion W. Falk, No. 1068 Jackson avenue, setting forth the facts that his father was naturalized in the year 1871 in Chicago, Ill., but that subsequent to his death, in 1884, his naturalization papers were lost; that he had applied for his own naturalization papers, and requesting permission to enter the coming examination for Architectural Draughtsman. In view of the difficulty experienced by the Commission in obtaining candidates for the said examination, the requirement of citizenship was waived, and the candidate's application accepted.

The application of George J. Baurle, No. 118 Eckford street, Brooklyn, for the position of Draughtsman's Helper was accepted, it appearing that the candidate would be eighteen (18) years of age (minimum age) on May 10, 1906, before the eligible list for that position could be established.



The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
