Gentlemen—In the matter of a communication from the Secretary, Permanent Census Board, requesting the establishment of sundry new grades of positions in this Board, which was referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held April 1, 1910, we would report as follows:

The estimate for the Permanent Census Board for the current year, which was prepared prior to the appointment of a secretary and the subsequent outlining of definite plans for the proposed work of establishing a permanent census of the school children of the city, requested provision for a Secretary, a Stenographer and 20 Clerks, at an aggregate cost of \$26,050, as follows:

The Budget schedule conforms with the estimate, but it is now claimed that the clerical force provided for therein is inadequate. It is therefore proposed to decrease the number of Clerks with salaries ranging from \$900 to \$1,200 per annum and thereby provide for increasing the size of the staff to 30 by making additions thereto at salaries ranging from \$330 to \$750 per annum, and also to provide for an Assistant Secretary at \$1,800 per annum, as indicated below:

Of the 10 additional Clerks, 4 are to be stationed at Ellis Island to obtain the names of immigrant children, 2 at the Health Department to keep a record of birth, and the remainder to assist in the main office at Fifty-ninth street and Park avenue.

The proposed new grades include one at \$390 per annum and one at \$330 per annum, neither of which is included in the official list of salaries for first grade Clerks, as prescribed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for all City Departments. It is, however, feasible to substitute 4 Clerks at \$480 per annum, 9 at \$420 and 3 at \$300 for 3 at \$480, 6 at \$420, 6 at \$390 and 1 at \$330, and still keep within the appropriation, which arrangement is satisfactory to the Secretary of the Census Board.

It appears necessary to have a larger clerical force than was originally provided for in order to do the work of the Board, and practicable to employ Clerks at lower salaries to operate the counting and adding machines and so keep within the appropriation. We would therefore recommend the establishment of new grades as proposed, according to the resolution submitted herewith.

The request of the Police Commissioner, if granted, will result in a net annual increase of \$8,100 in the expenditures for salaries in the Police Department. On March 22, 1907, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution requesting the Board of Aldermen to establish the positions of Deputy Police Com-

missioners at an increased salary rate. The Aldermen concurred with the resolution in so far as it related to the First Deputy Police Commissioner, whose salary was thereby fixed at \$6,000 per annum. No action was taken on that part of the resolution increasing the salaries of the other Deputy Police Commissioners. The result is that the First Deputy Police Commissioner is receiving \$2,000 more per annum than the Second, Third and Fourth Deputy Police Commissioners.

Duties of the Deputy Police Commissioners.

The duties of the Deputy Police Commissioners whose salaries it is proposed to increase from \$4,000 to \$6,000 per annum each are summed up as follows:

Second Deputy Commissioner—He acts as executive officer to the Police Commissioner; has direct cognizance of and control over the administration and discipline of the Department and entire force; is especially charged with the enforcement of the laws and ordinances in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond; holds trials in any of the Boroughs when assigned thereto. Has supervision over the Chief Inspector's office and the entire uniformed force, the Police Surgeons, the Bureau of Electrical Service, the regulation of traffic, pistol permits, parade permits, School of Instruction, Special Policemen, and records, shields and funds of same.

Third Deputy Commissioner—He presides at trials in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond; has supervision over the offices of the Property Clerk, the Boiler Inspectors and the Complaint Clerk. He is also intrusted with the approval of charges preferred against all members of the force. He is responsible for the legality of all blanks and forms used by the Department, and the legality of all contracts and other documents involving the expenditure of money. His duties also include supervision over the Pension Bureau and the investigation of pension claims, and the granting of licenses for masquerade balls, theatres, concert halls, steamboat and railroad runners and immigrant boarding houses.

Fourth Deputy Commissioner—He has supervision over the Detective Bureau, the Photograph Gallery, the Bureau of Information, the Bureau of Repairs and Supplies, the Stationery Bureau and the certification of the payrolls.

Secretary to the Commissioner.

Thomas Carroll, Secretary to the Commissioner, whose salary it is proposed to increase from \$3,000 to \$3,500, was appointed Secretary to the Deputy Chief of Police in February, 1898, at \$1,500 per annum. He served for several years as Acting Secretary to the First Deputy Police Commissioner. On July 7, 1909, he was appointed to his present position. The duties devolving upon him are as follows: He is a confidential staff officer, reports directly to the Commissioner, and takes instructions from him only. He is authorized and expected to make recommendations to the Commissioner on all points connected with the Police Department, both of policy and administration. He is authorized to act as the personal representative of the Commissioner in interviews with all callers and transact such business with them as may be possible, the object being to bring to the attention of the Commissioner only such matters of importance as require the Commissioner's personal attention.

First Deputy Clerk.

Arthur Blot, First Deputy Clerk, whose salary it is proposed to increase from \$3,000 to \$3,500, was appointed Stenographer and Secretary to the Chief Clerk February 10, 1897, at \$1,500. His salary was increased to \$2,500 on April 1, 1898. He was promoted to his present position June 14, 1905. He acts as Chief Clerk in the absence of the Chief Clerk. Subject to the Chief Clerk, he is the executive officer responsible for the conduct and efficiency of the Deputy Clerks, and is accountable for the proper keeping of the records of the Department. He prepares, under the direction of the Chief Clerk, annual, quarterly and occasional reports, and such other statements as are from time to time required. He examines and certifies to the Commissioner all payrolls. Under the direction of the Commissioner, he has entire charge of the clerical work in connection with primaries, registration and elections. This includes the preparation of orders, handling of correspondence between the Police Department and the Board of Elections and the State Superintendent of Elections. This particular work, covering at least two months every year, must be carried on at the same time as his regular routine work. He also keeps the important confidential records and documents of the Department.

Assistant Bookkeeper.

George W. Hawthorne, Assistant Bookkeeper, whose salary it is proposed to increase from \$2,700 to \$3,000, was appointed Deputy Clerk July 24, 1899, at a salary of \$1,200. He was appointed Assistant Bookkeeper December 16, 1903, after receiving several promotions for efficiency. Under the direction of the Chief Bookkeeper, he has charge of the accounts of the Police Pension Fund. His disbursements in cash amount to \$140,000 monthly. He prepares the annual report of the Police Pension Fund, showing in detail the receipts and disbursements of said fund. His report includes the name and residence of each beneficiary and the amount paid in each individual case. In the absence of the Chief Bookkeeper he is also responsible for all payments made from the Contingent Fund.

Complaint Clerk.

Robert B. Saul, Complaint Clerk, whose salary it is proposed to increase from \$2,000 to \$2,500, was appointed to his present position February 11, 1904. He keeps the official, legal and judicial records of all members of the force and prepares and causes to be served all copies of complaints made against them. He also keeps a record of all such complaints, causes all witnesses to be subpoenaed, attends all trials, prepares all trial calendars, keeps records of judgments and punishment on all members of the force, furnishes to the Commissioner and Deputy Commissioner and Chief Clerk copies of official, legal and judicial records of members of the force, reports all trials and prepares all returns to writs of certiorari.

Messenger.

William W. Spencer, Messenger, whose salary it is proposed to increase from \$900 to \$1,200, was appointed to his present position December 22, 1897. He has received no increase in his salary since his appointment. His duties are: Drawing checks on Contingent Fund to pay the expenses of officers, sending out notices that checks for the same are ready and receiving receipts in duplicate. He has complete charge of files containing vouchers for supplies sent to the Comptroller for payment. He checks up the payrolls of the force for each month, folds and files them in numerical order. He also assists in the payment of pensions. As Messenger he carries large sums of money to different banks for deposit.

Your Committee, after due examination, is of the opinion that the request of the Police Commissioner for the establishment of new grades of positions which will permit an increase in the salaries of the Second, Third and Fourth Deputy Commissioners, the Secretary to the Police Commissioner, the First Deputy Clerk, the Assistant Bookkeeper, the Complaint Clerk and the Messenger, in the Police Department, is deserving of approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The description of the duties and the work rendered by the subordinates of the Police Department whose salaries it is proposed to increase, which description is contained in this report, shows that they occupy important and responsible positions and are justly entitled to remuneration at a higher rate of pay than they are at present receiving. We would therefore recommend favorable consideration of the resolution hereto appended.

To the Honorable the President and Members of the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—The National Association of Comptrollers and Accounting Officers, which was organized at Washington, D. C., in 1905, will hold its next annual convention in The City of New York, beginning Thursday, June 9, 1910.

The prime purpose of this Association is "the consideration of improved methods of public finance and the extension of the movement for the installation of a uniform system of municipal and state accounting and reporting throughout the United States, and the promotion of legislation toward these ends."

Its membership is composed of comptrollers, auditors and other accounting or fiscal officers of cities, counties and States throughout the United States. There are now some eighty States and cities represented in the Association, and whose accounting officials are members thereof, among these being many of the larger and progressive cities.

The first annual convention of the National Association of Comptrollers and Accounting Officers was held in Chicago during September, 1906. In 1908 it met at Louisville, Ky., and in 1909 at Detroit, Mich. On each of these occasions appropriations were made by the municipality for the suitable entertainment of the visiting officials attending the convention and a cordial and hospitable welcome extended to them.

The magnitude of the financial operations of this great metropolis, and the complexity and ramification of the administrative responsibilities, entering as they do into almost every activity of human endeavor, was the great attraction in determining The City of New York as the place for the Association's convention of 1910. Each and every comptroller, auditor and accounting officer who is a member of the National Association of Comptrollers and Accounting Officers appreciates the advantages to be gained by him in the carrying out of his own duties from a greater knowledge of the accounting procedure and the methods of financial administration pursued by The City of New York, in which every phase of municipal activity is reflected and where the transactions of a single department may require such an analysis of detail and constitute the centre of an accounting action as elaborate as the entire bookkeeping system of some of the smaller cities.

Consequently it was with a great deal of enthusiasm and the highest degree of interest that The City of New York was determined upon as the place in which to hold the Association's convention of 1910, and it would seem only becoming on the part of the legislative and administrative officials of this great City to make some provision for the suitable entertainment of the officials who will be in attendance at this forthcoming national convention, and thus give them an opportunity to see some of the beauties and some of the more interesting places of our great City.

To enable the carrying out of this purpose, I hereby respectfully request that your honorable body make an appropriation of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), to be used for the suitable entertainment of those visiting officials, who should be looked upon during their stay as being in a measure the City's guests.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Manhattan, New York:

Dear Sir—I respectfully request the Board of Aldermen by resolution to allow the issuance of special revenue bonds to create a fund of \$5,000 for the purpose of de-

fraying expenses in the matter of extraditing fugitive criminals from the County of Kings, said fund to be placed with the Comptroller of The City of New York to the credit of the Police Commissioner of The City of New York.

I have no contingent account for this purpose, and I am informed the Police Commissioner has no fund from which expenses of this character can be paid.

A separate fund for travelling expenses in extradition matters arising in this County is needed. I believe the fund should be placed with the Police Commissioner as the persons designated in the warrants are members of that Department. The Police Department has a well equipped Cashier's Bureau, and can control the actions of its men better than I can.

I have had a conference with the Police Commissioner and he has given his approval and consent to this course.

His Honor the Mayor recently wrote me concerning a man charged with forgery, who was under indictment in this county and is now on the Pacific coast. I wrote in reply that I had no fund from which to defray the travelling expenses, and that the Commissioner of Police was also without the necessary funds. Mayor Gaynor wrote me that such a fund should be provided, hence I respectfully request that a resolution for that purpose be introduced.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—In order to cover the expenditures in the account of Contingencies, Office of the City Clerk, 1910, I have to request that you authorize the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$800, resolution to cover which is herewith enclosed. The Budget allowance for this account has not varied since 1898, having been \$1,000 every year, but it has been necessary to secure transfers in the past to supplement this amount, owing to the increase in the business transacted by the City Clerk and the Board of Aldermen; for instance, transfers were obtained in 1907, \$450; 1908, \$500, and 1909, \$700. This system has now been prohibited by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, consequently this application. The Budget appropriation for 1910 has been used at the rate of \$150 per month, which would amount to \$1,800 in twelve months; the appropriation of \$1,000 being deducted, would leave \$800 deficit.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS RESUMED.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communications from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity,

JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Esq., President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—There are required by the Department for the proper supervision of its works, seven (7) automobiles. These machines will be used principally by the Engineers. The Department is responsible for the correct administration of a territory of about 850 square miles, and the only means of transportation over a large section of this area is by horses and wagons.

To illustrate the necessity for these cars I might mention the fact that on Long Island the Engineer who will be in charge of the pumping stations is required to visit about thirty (30) pumping stations located from Ridgewood to Massapequa, a distance of about twenty-three miles. This Engineer has to depend on train service and considerable delay is often caused in making connections.

One of the machines will also be used by the Superintendent of Ponds and Conduits, his duty requiring visits to all of the streams and ponds.

On the Croton watershed there is a considerable stretch of the City's property which must be inspected daily by the Engineer and his Assistants. The means of transportation across country is limited and it is often necessary for the Engineer to go down on the Harlem Railroad and come up on the Hudson River Railroad in order to visit the works under his charge.

One of the cars will be used by the Deputy Commissioner and myself and will replace an old car which is now of little service.

Six (6) of the automobiles which are credited to the Department I propose to sell at public auction.

I believe the Board recognizes that it is impracticable, if not impossible, to prepare specifications and contracts for the purchase of automobiles. Each part of these machines is covered by patents or special designs, I believe, and in the selection of any design one concern would naturally be favored and the Department could not consistently ask for competitive bids. I am satisfied that it would be a clear evasion of section 419 of the Charter, which provides that there should be free competition for the furnishing of supplies where the expense will exceed \$1,000.

To avoid these complications I would respectfully ask the Board's consideration to grant the necessary authority to purchase these machines without advertising for competitive bids or proposals.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Sir—In making up the Budget for 1910, the last administration practically cut off all the funds requested in certain Boroughs for additional lighting during the year 1910. This action leaves us in the Borough of Queens with none, and in Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond with almost no funds with which to put in additional lights. While all Boroughs are growing and need additional lighting to keep up with the population, the Borough of Queens is growing so fast that the lights now burning equal the entire appropriation for 1910.

In Manhattan and The Bronx, in order to add the minimum of lamps necessary to supply the demand, sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000) is required for additional arc lamps. The increase in gas and tungsten lamps can be taken care of by the number of these lamps replaced by arc lamps.

In the Borough of Manhattan the expenditures for high pressure fire service during the year 1909, were \$89,070. The amount allowed for 1910 is \$90,000.

For these reasons, therefore, I would request that revenue bonds to the following extent be issued for these Boroughs:

To the credit of account No. 513, Heat, Light and Power, Bureau of Lamps and Lighting, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx—Street and Park Lighting.....	\$16,000 00
To the credit of account No. 516, Heat, Light and Power, Bureau of Lamps and Lighting, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, High Pressure Fire Service, Reservation of Machinery and Current.....	2,500 00

In the Borough of Brooklyn three hundred (300) Municipal Art lamp-posts will be required to complete the work in Prospect Park on the same lines as in Central Park, Manhattan. The cost of these posts will not exceed \$20 per post delivered, a total of six thousand dollars (\$6,000).

Also in the Borough of Brooklyn the expenditures for High Pressure Fire Service Pumping Stations, Lamps and Lighting Division of this Department, for the year 1909 amounted to \$45,320.50. The appropriation for the year 1910 is \$45,000. The cost of these stations depends on the number of fires at which they are put in use. The Department has no way of telling this in advance. The stations seem to be increasing in use.

For these reasons, therefore, I would request that revenue bonds to the following extent be issued for this Borough:

To the credit of account No. 527, Heat, Light and Power, Bureau of Lamps and Lighting, Borough of Brooklyn—Street and Park Lighting.....	\$6,000 00
To the credit of account No. 530, Heat, Light and Power, Bureau of Lamps and Lighting, Borough of Brooklyn—High Pressure Fire Service, Reservation of Machinery and Current.....	2,500 00

In the Borough of Queens the requests for lighting on file which have been approved by the Local Board and by our own Department as necessary amount to about 2,000 lamps of various kinds. In addition, owing to the opening of new transportation lines scheduled for this year, there will be about 500 additional lamps required to provide for this. If these lamps are installed it will also require the setting of a number of lamp-posts, to be paid for at contract rates.

It is estimated that, averaging the installation on the date of October 1, there will be required for all the above purposes in Queens twenty-four thousand five hundred dollars (\$24,500), which would provide for 150 additional arc lamps, 1,750 additional incandescent tungsten lamps, 600 additional gas lamps—2,500 in all—as well as the change of 250 arc lamps from 325-watt type to the standard 450-watt type, with necessary lamp-post erections and repairs.

For these reasons, therefore, I would request that revenue bonds to the following extent be issued for this Borough:

To the credit of account No. 540, Heat, Light and Power, Bureau of Lamps and Lighting, Borough of Queens—Street and Park Lighting.....	\$21,500 00
To the credit of account No. 533, Heat, Light and Power, Bureau of Lamps and Lighting, Borough of Queens—Repairs and Replacements by Contract or Open Order.....	3,000 00

In the Borough of Richmond there is an appropriation for Street and Park Lighting of \$192,573.10, as against a cost of \$190,000 in lamps now burning. For the same reasons as advanced in the Borough of Queens, I would request that this appropriation be increased by the issuance of revenue bonds to the extent of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), which with the slight balance in the appropriation will provide

for 50 additional arc lamps and 175 additional incandescent tungsten lamps, averaging on July 1 as the date of installation.

In the Borough of Richmond the expenditures during the year 1909 for Heat and Power for City Departments were \$3,275.10. The appropriation for the present year is \$1,550. The increase in 1909 was due largely to the power accounts taken over by this Department for the Department of Education in supplying power to schools in Richmond. It is necessary that an additional amount of two thousand two hundred dollars (\$2,200) be allowed to this account.

For these reasons, therefore, I would request that revenue bonds to the following extent be issued for this Borough:

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relating to the "Rules of the Road," particularly affecting "lights."

Be it ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

That the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York be amended by the insertion of a new section, to be known as section 458a, to follow section 458 of Part 1 of said Code, and to read as follows:

Sec. 458a. In addition to the lights required under the provisions of the preceding section, each and every motor vehicle, however propelled, except motor cycles, shall have affixed and displayed on the rear thereof, at least eighteen inches from the ground, during the hours between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise, of each day, the registration number assigned to it by the Secretary of State of the State of New York, within an illuminated frame, transparency or lamp, which said number shall consist of Arabic numerals, each not less than three inches in height, and each stroke to be of a width not less than one-half inch, and also the State letters N. Y. to be not less than one and one-half inch in height, with a stroke not less than one-quarter inch.

Such frame, transparency or lamp to carry a red bulls-eye in addition to the numbers and State letters to avoid the necessity of carrying more than one lamp on the rear of a motor vehicle.

Such frame, transparency or lamp to be illuminated from the rear of such registration number, by a light of at least six candle power, so placed, that it shall be distributed, as nearly as possible, equally upon all numerals and letters. Two distinct ways of lighting should be provided, in such frame, transparency or lamp.

This amendment to take effect ninety days after its approval by the Mayor of The City of New York.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to which was referred on March 1, 1910 (Minutes, page 676), the annexed ordinance in favor of requiring the name and address of the owner or owners of every building in The City of New York to be placed thereon, respectfully

REPORTS:

That, as an aid to the Police, fixing responsibility for proper use of premises, objectionable only to such persons as may be willing to profit by ill-doing, if such profit may be secured without notoriety, the Committee believes the ordinance to be admirably useful and recommends its adoption.

AN ORDINANCE requiring that a plate or sign with name and address of owner shall be placed in or on each building in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Every person, firm, association or corporation owning a building or buildings in The City of New York, shall place in conspicuous manner in the front entrance or vestibule of said building or buildings, or in the absence of a vestibule or entrance ready of access, some other place which will hold the same to public view, a plate or sign giving the name and address of such person, firm, association or corporation, which shall at all reasonable times be subject to the inspection of the public. In the event of a building or buildings being owned by one or a number of persons living a distance removed from the city and such building or buildings are in the hands of or managed by an agent or agents, the name or names of such agent or agents and address shall also be placed in like conspicuous manner and subject to inspection as in the case of the owner or owners.

Sec. 2. Any person, firm, association or corporation failing to comply with the requirements of section 1 of this ordinance, shall be subject to a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100) to be recoverable in an action to be brought by the Corporation Counsel in the name of The City of New York. Any caretaker, keeper, janitor or other person in charge of a building or buildings, the owner or owners of which have complied with the provisions of section 1 of this ordinance, who shall deny any reasonable demand for inspection of, or access to a plate or sign as herein provided, shall, upon conviction thereof, be subject to a fine of not less than five dollars (\$5), and not more than ten dollars (\$10) for each offense, and in default of payment thereof, may be committed to the City Prison for a term equal to one day for each one dollar of fine imposed and unpaid.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Whereas, The New York Transportation Company claims to be operating under a franchise which was originally passed in 1900, is now section 23 of the Transportation Corporations Law as amended, being chapter 219 of the Laws of 1909, chapter 63 of the Consolidated Laws, article 4, section 23, and as now in the law reads as follows:

23. Existing Routes and Extensions.—Any corporation incorporated under any law of this state heretofore enacted which owns and operates a lawfully established stage route which has been continuously operated by such company or its predecessors in title to such route for five years last past in any city or the first class, is hereby authorized and empowered to extend its existing routes at any time or times and to operate the same as extended with stages and omnibuses propelled by electricity or any other motive power, in and upon any streets and highways of such city, without further or other authority, proceeding or consent required under any act, general, public, private or local, provided, however, that such extensions shall not become valid until they shall have been first approved by the public service commission, which, on giving its approval, shall make a certificate of such extension or extensions of route as approved, which certificate shall be filed in the office of the secretary of state, and in the office of the clerk of the county in which such extension is located. Such company, on filing in said offices an acceptance of the extensions specified in such certificate and on operating such extensions, shall have the right to charge a fare not exceeding ten cents per passenger for a continuous ride over the whole or any part of the routes owned or operated by it, and shall pay a license fee to the city in which it operates equal to the charge now in force for licensing similar stages and omnibuses, and shall also pay to the comptroller or other chief fiscal officer of said city five per centum per annum of its gross receipts from the operation of said routes.

—and

Whereas, As will be seen from a reading of this act as it now stands, the New York Transportation Company, which is controlled by the Metropolitan Securities Company, the owners of the Metropolitan Street Railway system, is in a position to monopolize all the streets of the great City of New York by reason of the fact that they are the owners of the stock of the Fifth Avenue Stage Coach Company, which was the only company in The City of New York which had been in existence and operation for a period of five years at the time of the passage of section 23 on April 6, 1900, and as it would be impossible for any corporation to go back in its operation and existence for five years, this company by simply obtaining the approval of the Public Service Commission and filing the consent and operating a car, can claim any streets in The City of New York; and

Whereas, The New York Transportation Company has made practically no use of the valuable franchises granted to them by this act, but has simply prevented any other companies from coming into the field; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen respectfully recommend to the Legislature of the State of New York that an amendment to the section quoted above, in the following particulars, be adopted at an early date: That a bill be prepared to correct the evil before mentioned before all the principal thoroughfares of this great City are claimed by this New York Transportation Company, and putting the stage coach companies upon the same basis as any other street railroad company and providing that any franchises shall be sold at public auction as provided in section 93 of the Railroad Law, and further providing that the stage coach companies shall be under the jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission; and further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Governor of the State of New York for his information.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to which was referred on February 8, 1910 (Minutes, page 491), the annexed ordinance in favor of requiring street railroad companies to allay dust and particles of deleterious matter, respectfully

REPORTS:

That it believes the proposed ordinance to be greatly in the interest of the general health and comfort of the public and that it entails no hardship on the railroad companies. It therefore recommends that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE requiring street surface railroad companies to sprinkle streets or thoroughfares with oil or water, to allay dust and other matter which fill the air through the momentum and friction of cars operated thereon.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The several railroad companies operating cars on the surface of any of the streets or thoroughfares of The City of New York are hereby directed and required to sprinkle, with oil or water, the surface of the streets or thoroughfares upon which such cars are operated at least three times in every twenty-four hours, or oftener when necessary, between the tracks and for a distance two feet beyond the rails upon either side thereof, whenever the atmospheric conditions are such as to cause the air to be filled with particles of dust and other matter largely conducted by the momentum and friction of the cars so operated.

Sec. 2. Each and every railroad company which shall neglect or refuse to comply with the provisions of section one of this ordinance shall thereby incur a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100) for each such neglect or refusal, to be recoverable against the company so offending in an action to be brought by the Corporation Counsel in the name of The City of New York.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

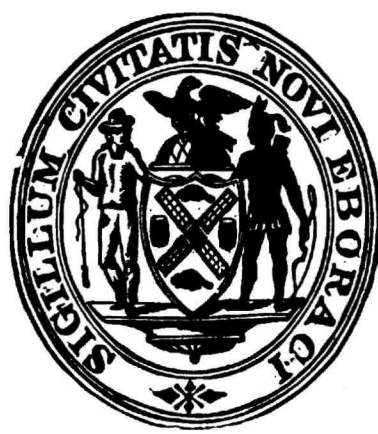

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
