Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, Dec. 18, 1917, at 3:30 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Robbins, O'Keefe, Farley and Stern, Trustees. Excused—Mr. Sachs and Mr. Paulding, Trustees, and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities.

Dr. O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

Dr. Rutledge, Admitting Physician at Bellevue, has tendered his resignation, to take effect December 31st.

Dr. Burstan, appointed at the last meeting as Admitting Physician to Gouverneur, has been called to military service, and the position is now vacant.

Dr. Mundkittrick, who was appointed Instructor in Anaesthesia at Fordham Hospital, has reported for duty.

James Munsey, driver at Bellevue for a period of eight years, died on the 10th instant following an operation on his stomach.

During the last few days the hospital has suffered from the extreme cold, the temperature of the wards at various times ranging from 40 to 70 degrees. The engineer and firemen are working overtime shoveling in the coal, but there seems to be no heat in it. The recent changes in our power house, together with the grade of coal burned, has been disastrous, and it would seem very desirable to have a survey of this situation made and some effort made to remedy the present conditions. On account of the extreme cold we have also experienced great difficulty in getting food supplies from the kitchen to the wards.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent, as follows:

The resignation of Dr. Rutledge, effective Dec. 31, was accepted.

The appointment of Dr. Malcolm Mundkittrick as Instructor in Anaesthesia was approved.

The Trustees note with regret the death of James Munsey, an old employee of the department, and after discussing the welfare of his family instructed the General Medical Superintendent to make an investigation and report as to what could be done to provide for the family, particularly the children.

After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to request the Building Committee to make a full and comprehensive survey regarding the boiler plant problem at Bellevue and its allied hospitals and to present such recommendations as it may see fit to make to relieve the present conditions.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Dr. Brannan presented a tabulation of bids received at the office of the Central Purchase Committee on December 10th for (a) meats and poultry; (b) milk and cream; (c) eggs; (d) flour; (e) potatoes, and on Dec. 13 for (a) butter, cheese, bread and rolls, and (b) fresh fish, oysters, clams and coffee. After consideration, the bids on eggs were rejected on account of the high price and lack of competition and ordered readvertised. Action on all the other items was deferred until the next meeting.

On the recommendation of the Building Committee an extension of thirty days' time was granted to M. Osserman, contractor for the alterations to the boat "John H. Huddleston." This additional time was granted on account of the delay in obtaining materials and labor conditions prevailing at the present time, as set forth in a letter from the contractor under date of Dec. 7.

Mr. Stern, on behalf of the Conference Committee of Gouverneur Hospital, presented the following recommendations, which were approved and the appointments made accordingly: Gertrude Greenstein as Assistant Physician to Out Patients, Tuberculosis Clinic; the creation of the position of Assistant Visiting Pediatric

and the appointment of Leslie Brown to the place. The appointments are for the remainder of the year 1917 and for the year 1918.

Mr. O'Keefe, on behalf of the Conference Committee of Harlem Hospital, presented the following nominations, which were approved and appointments made accordingly, for the remainder of the year 1917 and for the year 1918: Anibal Zelaya, Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, Gynaecology; David Swick, Assistant Physician to Out Patients, Pediatrics.

After consideration it was moved, seconded and carried to request the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to renew, for one year, with the privilege of renewal, the lease of rooms Nos. 226 to 238, inclusive, on the premises at 426 E. 26th st., occupied by this department as living quarters for nurses; the present lease expires on March 1, 1918.

Dr. Brannan referred to a communication from Dr. Henderson of the Yale School of Medicine in regard to work at Bellevue Hospital undertaken at the suggestion of the Surgeon General's Office through Colonel Frederick F. Russell, chief of the medical section, concerning the study of accident cases, fractures, burns, crushed limbs, etc., which work could be done without cost to the hospital and without interfering with the routine work and subject to the approval of the medical staff. After discussion it was moved, seconded and carried to approve this request.

Dr. Brannan presented a letter, dated Dec. 7, signed by Drs. Neff, Luckett and Connors, regarding their work in hospital unit "F." After discussion it was moved, seconded and carried to instruct the Secretary to convey to these men the feeling of pride of the Trustees that Harlem Hospital should be so well represented in such important work, and appreciate the spirit shown by them in their letter in fulfilling the duties assigned to them by the government, and that their suggestion regarding Captain Thomas F. Martin, senior medical officer, will be referred to the Conference Committee.

Mr. O'Keefe reported that the Social Service Bureau at Harlem Hospital had informed him that their funds for the payment of the nurse to carry on the work in the cardiac clinic are about to be exhausted. After discussion it was moved, seconded and carried to instruct the General Medical Superintendent to make an investigation and present a report regarding the desirability of asking for revenue bonds to pay the salary for this place or to provide some other means, as funds for this position were denied in the budget for 1918.

COMMUNICATIONS.

Two letters, dated Dec. 9 and 10, were presented from Herbert L. Wheeler, Director of the Dental Service, recommending the following appointments, which were approved: T. A. Langan, Dental Intern to Gouverneur, for one year; J. Daniel Phillips, Dental Intern to Fordham Hospital, for one year from July 1, 1917; William Landsman and Philip Zahn, Assistant Visiting Dentists, Fordham, for the remainder of the year 1917 and for the year 1918.

A letter, dated Dec. 10, was presented from Maurice Packard, Physician to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician at Gouverneur Hospital, asking to be relieved from his duties in the Out Patient Department. After discussion, action on this request was deferred pending the receipt of further information from Dr. Packard regarding his request.

A letter, dated Dec. 10, was presented from W. H. Knipe, Secretary of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital, and one from L. J. Ladinski, dated Dec. 13, in regard to examinations held at Gouverneur Hospital for appointments to the house staff, setting forth the need of selecting four extra men in addition to the regular staff to take the place of the men called into military service, which accounts for the arrangement to appoint seven men for one year at this time. After discussion it was moved, seconded and carried to inform the Committee that the Trustees agree with it that the house staff will require adjustment from time to time as military duty calls the men, which condition must be met at irregular times. The Trustees are not disposed to change to a one-year service, but, as they do not wish to change the arrangement made by the Examining Committee, they will let the plan stand for the present and called the attention of the Medical Board to the fact that if any change is to be made in the future, in the nature of the service, the length of time, or the number of men, it should first be brought to the attention of the Trustees.

The Minutes of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital for Nov. 10 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the report regarding the Trustees' request to obtain, if possible, autopsies of patients dying under anaesthesia and the suggestion that the Trustees adopt a rule that in every case admitted to the hospital the patient be requested to sign a

printed form giving consent to a possible autopsy was discussed and disapproved. The creation of the place of third Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeon on the Second Surgical Division and the appointment of Samuel W. Boorstein to the place were approved.

A letter, dated Dec. 17, was presented from John A. McCollum, Acting Chief of the Bureau of Franchises of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transmitting a form of agreement required under the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on Dec. 6 granting the Trustees permission to maintain and use a bridge across Gouverneur Slip, from the hospital to the new building, for the Out Patient Department. After discussion it was moved, seconded and carried to authorize the President and the Secretary to execute this agreement.

A letter, dated Dec. 1, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment regarding the amendment of the 1918 budget so that the unexpended balances of the wage schedule of Bellevue

and Allied Hospitals may be transferred to the fund for Salary and Wage Accruals, and setting forth that this action is not feasible and suggesting that the Trustees make application to the Board of Estimate for funds for the estimated requirements at the beginning of the year 1918. On motion, duly seconded and carried, action on this communication was deferred until the first meeting in January, 1918.

A communication, dated Dec. 14, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a copy of a resolution adopted by that Board on Dec. 7 appropriating \$1,800 for alterations in the basement of pavilions I and K, Bellevue, to provide a dining room for employees. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to adjourn the meeting until Friday, Dec. 28, 1917.

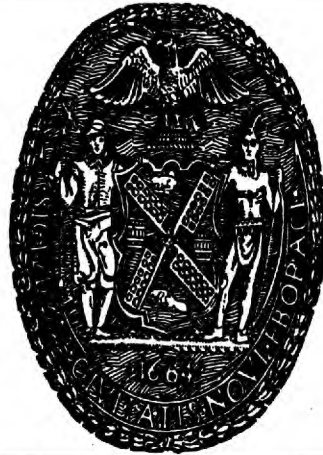

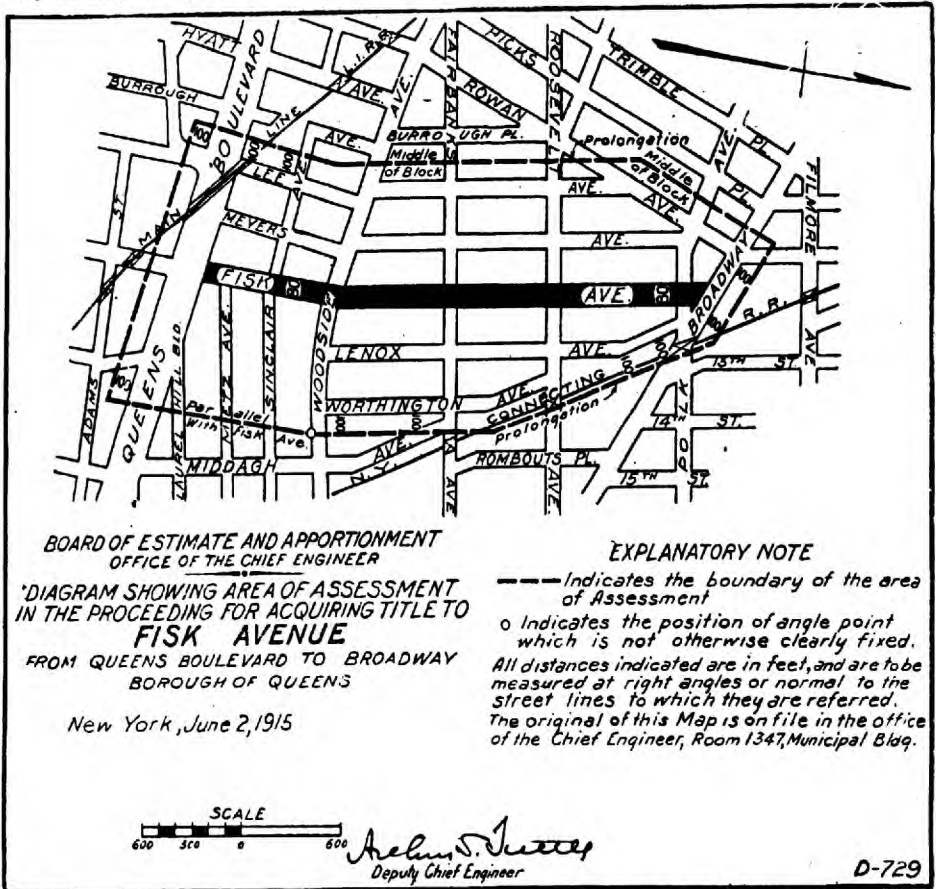

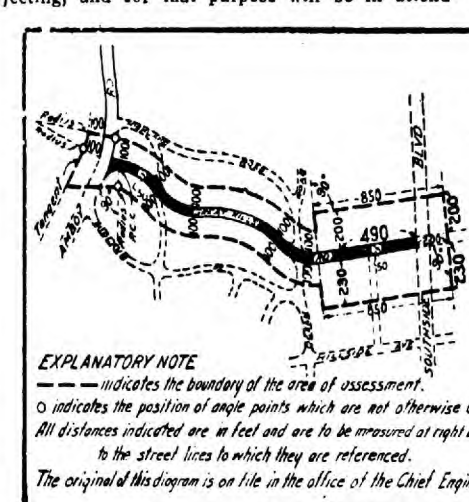

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of the City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivery possession to the purchaser. All the material of buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.
