

SIR—There were 639 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, May 28, 1881, which is a decrease of 54, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 44 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1880. The actual mortality for the week ending May 21, 1881, was 649, which is 162.8 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.23 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,238,493.

# ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPART-MENT.

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 521 OF THE LAWS of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit: "In making the reduction herein required, every head " of department may abolish and consolidate offices and " bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same " department."
