

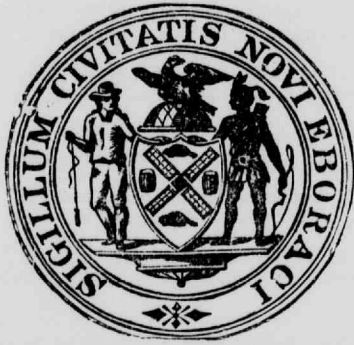

## BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY\* for the week ending December 9, 1882, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending December 2, 1882.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., *Sanitary Superintendent and Register:*

SIR—There were 578 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, December 9, 1882, which is a decrease of 6, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 102 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881. The actual mortality for the week ending December 2, 1882, was 603, which is 30.0 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.21 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,295,174.
