BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met at the Mayor's office on Friday, January 15, 1897, at 11 o'clock A. M., pursuant to notice.

The roll was called, and all the members were present and answered to their names. The minutes of the meeting of January 8, 1897, were read and approved.

The Board then took up the subject of the petitions, presented at the last meeting, asking that the resolutions adopted on the 6th March, 1896, for the opening and extending of Riverdale avenue, be rescinded.

Whereupon Messrs. S. D. Babcock, Lewis L. Delafield, Thomas N. Cuthbert, Charles E. Miller and others addressed the Board in favor of the petitions. Mr. George W. Stevens spoke in opposition thereto.

At the conclusion of the hearing, the President of the Board of Aldermen offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Board does hereby reconsider its action, taken on the 6th of March, 1896, in relation to the opening and extending of Riverdale avenue.

This was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards—5.

Negative—The President of the Department of Public Parks—1.

The Comptroller then offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the resolutions adopted by this Board on the 6th of March, 1896, relating to the opening and extending of Riverdale avenue, be and the same are hereby rescinded.

This was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards—5.

Negative—The President of the Department of Public Parks—1.

The matter of the proposed map or plan of the area bounded by Kingsbridge road, East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, East One Hundred and Eighty-first street and the Boulevard Lafayette, submitted at a former meeting of the Board, was then taken up for consideration. Many petitions from property-owners were presented, and Mr. Abner C. Thomas spoke at length, in favor of the adoption of the map.

On motion, the further consideration of the matter was laid over to a special meeting of the Board appointed for Friday January 29, at 11 o'clock A. M.

The following communication from the Department of Public Works, was presented and read:

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, NEW YORK, December 14, 1896. Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Mayor, and Chairman, Board of Street Opening and Improvement:

DEAR SIR—In accordance with the request contained in a letter, dated 9th instant, from the Secretary to the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, I transmit herewith plan and profiles of new streets within the area bounded by the land of the estate of Susan B. Ward, deceased.

Very respectfully, HOWARD PAYSON WILDS, Deputy and Acting Commissioner of Public Works.

Whereupon the Commissioner of Public works offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York, deeming it for the public interest so to do, propose to alter the map or plan of the City of New York by laying out and extending the following new streets: One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, between Eleventh avenue and Fort Washington avenue; One Hundred and Seventieth and One Hundred and Seventy-first streets, between Kingsbridge road and a new avenue to be known as Haven avenue; and a new avenue to be known as Haven avenue, between One Hundred and Seventieth and a distance 464.31 feet northerly, all in the Twelfth Ward of the City of New York, and more particularly described as follows:

ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-NINTH STREET.

Beginning at a point in the westerly line of Eleventh avenue distant 3,730.91 feet northerly from the southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street; thence westerly and parallel with said street distant 731.10 feet to the easterly line of Fort Washington avenue; thence northerly along said line distance 61.38 feet; thence easterly distance 744.06 feet to the easterly line of Eleventh avenue; thence southerly along said line distance 60 feet to the point or place of beginning.

Said street to be 60 feet wide between the lines of Eleventh avenue and Fort Washington avenue.

ONE HUNDRED AND SEVENTIETH STREET.

Beginning at a point in the westerly line of the Kingsbridge road distant 178.30 feet northerly from the intersection of Kingsbridge road and Eleventh avenue and also distant 3,967.50 feet northerly from the southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street; thence westerly and parallel to said street distance 680.95 feet to the easterly line of Fort Washington avenue; thence northerly along said line distance 80.8 feet; thence easterly distance 748.85 feet to the westerly line of Kingsbridge road; thence southerly along said line distance 88.78 feet to the point or place of beginning.

Also, beginning at a point in the westerly line of Fort Washington avenue distant 3,987.50 feet northerly from the southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street; thence westerly and parallel to said line distance 260.10 feet to the easterly line a new avenue to be known as Haven avenue, produced; thence northerly along said line distance 61.98 feet; thence easterly 278.36 feet to the westerly line of Fort Washington avenue; thence southerly along said line distance 60.60 feet to the point or place of beginning.

Said street to be 80 feet wide between Kingsbridge road and Fort Washington avenue; and 60 feet wide between Fort Washington avenue and the new avenue to be known as Haven avenue.

ONE HUNDRED SEVENTY-FIRST STREET.

Beginning at a point in the westerly line of Kingsbridge road distant 4,242.50 feet northerly from the southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street; thence westerly and parallel with said street distance 536.21 feet to the easterly line of Fort Washington avenue; thence northerly along said line distance 6.31 feet; thence still along said easterly line and in a curved line to the left, radius 915 feet, distance 53.71 feet; thence easterly distance 512.04 feet to the westerly line of Kingsbridge road; thence southerly along said line distance 45.87 feet; thence still along said line and deflecting to the left 6 degrees 33 minutes and 34 seconds distance 18.49 feet to the point or place of beginning.

Also beginning at a point in the westerly line of Fort Washington avenue distant 4,242.50 feet northerly from the southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street; thence westerly and parallel to said line distance 337.71 feet to the easterly line of the new avenue to be known as Haven avenue; thence northerly along said line distance 61.98 feet; thence easterly distance 354.46 feet to the westerly line of Fort Washington avenue; thence southerly along said line and in a curved line to the right, radius 835 feet distance 50.9 feet; thence still along said westerly line and tangent to the curve distance 9.94 feet to the point or place of beginning.

NEW AVENUE TO BE KNOWN AS HAVEN AVENUE.

Beginning at a point in the southerly line of a new street to be known as One Hundred and Seventieth street, said point being distant 260.10 feet westerly from Fort Washington avenue as measured along said southerly line of One Hundred and Seventieth street and distant 3,987.50 feet northerly from the southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street; thence northerly and at an angle with said One Hundred and Seventieth street and deflecting to the left 104 degrees 31 minutes and 28 seconds distance 467 feet; thence westerly distance 60.86 feet; thence southerly and parallel with the first course and distant 60 feet westerly therefrom distance 461.64 feet to the southerly line of One Hundred and Seventieth street; thence easterly and along said line and parallel to One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street distance 61.98 feet to the point or place of beginning.

Said street to be 60 feet wide between the southerly line of One Hundred and Seventieth street and a point distant 467 and 461.64 feet northerly therefrom.

Resolved, That such proposed action of this Board be laid before the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, and that full notice of the same be published for ten days in the CITY RECORD.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board be and is hereby directed to transmit to the Board of Aldermen a copy of the foregoing resolution and to cause to be published the notice required by law.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks and the President of the Board of Aldermen—5.

The following communication from the Department of Public Works, relating to a proposed change of grade of Edgecombe road, was presented and read.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, NEW YORK, December, 1896. Hon. WM. L. STRONG, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement:

SIR—The Commissioner of Public Works, deeming it for the public interest, respectfully requests that the established grade of Edgecombe road may be altered where the said road crosses the Croton Aqueduct, between One Hundred and Fifty-fifth and One Hundred and Fifty-ninth streets, elevation 124 to 127 feet, so as to allow of sufficient covering over the top of the

Aqueduct for the protection of the structure, as shown upon the accompanying diagram marked in red lines and figures.

On motion, the matter was laid over to the special meeting of the Board, appointed for Friday, January 29, when a hearing will be given.

The following protest against the laying out and opening of a new street parallel to Amsterdam avenue, as proposed by the Board, was presented and read, and, on motion, was referred to the Commissioner of Public Works for his report thereon.

To the Honorable Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York:

Robert Bogardus respectfully protests against the proposed action of your Honorable Board under a resolution passed November 20, 1896, in laying out a new street east of Tenth avenue, from One Hundred and Eighty-first to One Hundred and Eighty-eighth street, so far as affecting lands and premises owned by him, upon the following grounds:

I. That he is the owner of a parcel of land bounded on the south by the Washington Bridge, on the north by a line parallel to said Washington Bridge, and 400 feet northerly therefrom being, the centre line of the block between One Hundred and Eighty-third and One Hundred and Eighty-fourth streets, on the east by the Harlem River Speedway, and on the west by a line parallel to Amsterdam avenue and 150 feet easterly therefrom.

II. That the proposed action of your Honorable Board in laying out said street will irreparably damage your petitioner, in that the lines of the street, so far as affecting your petitioner's property, will cut in two a parcel of land owned by him and remaining to him after the acquisition of the proposed Harlem River Driveway Park under chapter 876 of the Laws of 1895, now in process of condemnation; said parcel now being divided by said street into two strips, one east of said street and one west, by the plan proposed by your Honorable Board.

The strip west of said street will be 36 feet deep at its widest point and utterly impossible of improvement. The strip east of said street will be even narrower and also incapable of improvements, and will be a barrier between the proposed street and the proposed park and liable to become a nuisance by the erection of unsightly stables, sheds, or other buildings of this character.

III. Said proposed street may be changed, so far as affecting your petitioner's property, in accordance with the plans hereto annexed made by Cornelius J. Lynch, City Surveyor and Civil Engineer, and constructed upon a curve, as indicated thereon; which would leave your petitioner a small parcel intact, without in any way interfering with the practical construction of the new street, the curve therein being entirely feasible from an engineering standpoint.

Wherefore your petitioner prays that this petition be considered, and that the lines of said street be modified in accordance therewith.

SIR—In pursuance of a resolution adopted by your Board on the 9th day of October, 1896, I have to inform you that I have caused an application to be made to the Supreme Court of this State for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the matter of opening West One Hundred and Twentieth street, between Morningside avenue and Riverside avenue, in the Twelfth Ward of the City of New York.

On the 22d and 31st days of December, 1896, orders appointing Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in said proceeding were duly entered in the office of the Clerk of the City and County of New York. Wilber McBride, John Paul Bockock and Edward S. Kaufman, the Commissioners named in said orders, have duly qualified, and their oaths were filed in the office of the Clerk of the City and County of New York on the 6th day of January, 1897.

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement directs that, upon the 14th day of July, 1897, the title to each and every piece or parcel of land lying within the lines of said West One Hundred and Twentieth street, from Morningside avenue to Riverside avenue, so required, viz:

Beginning at a point in the easterly line of Amsterdam avenue distant 161 feet 10 inches northerly from the northerly line of One Hundred and Nineteenth street; thence easterly and parallel with said street distance 427 feet 3/8 inches to the westerly line of Morningside avenue, West; thence northerly along said line distance 40 feet 4 1/2 inches to the southerly line of old One Hundred and Twentieth street; thence westerly along said line distance 421 feet 9 1/2 inches to the easterly line of Amsterdam avenue; thence southerly along said line distance 40 feet to the point or place of beginning.

The following petition to lay out West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street was presented and read, and, on motion, was referred to the Commissioner of Public Works for his report thereon: To the Board of Street Opening and Improvement in the City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned property-owners respectfully request Your Honorable Board to place upon the map or plan of the City of New York a new street, to be called One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, from Amsterdam avenue to the Kingsbridge road, in the Twelfth Ward of the City of New York. It is suggested that this street be laid down upon the lines of One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, as shown upon the map of property belonging to the Bogardus estate, filed in the Register's Office of New York County as Map No. 201, by which map all the lots fronting on said street were sold at various times. Dated New York City, December 8, 1896.

The following petition to open St. John's avenue was presented and read, and, on motion, was referred to the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards for his report thereon:

NEW YORK, November 1, 1896. To the Honorable the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York:

We, the undersigned property-owners in the vicinity of St. John's avenue, respectfully petition your Honorable Board to institute the necessary legal proceedings for the laying out and opening of St. John's avenue in the Twenty-third Ward, from Prospect avenue to the East river, so that the residents of that neighborhood may have and uninterrupted access to the East river. The delay in opening St. John's avenue has been a source of great annoyance to them. The growth of that part of the country has been greatly retarded by the delay in completing the opening of same.

The individual property-owners have rights which should be considered in the laying out and opening of the streets.
