BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

IN BOARD OF EXAMINERS, JANUARY 3, 1901.

The Board of Examiners met this day at 3.25 P. M.
 Present—John A. Dooner, Superintendent and Acting Commissioner of Buildings for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (in the chair), and Messrs. Dobbs, Conover, O'Reilly, D'Oench, Croker, Fryer and Moore.
 Absent—Commissioner Brady and Mr. McMillan.
 The minutes of December 27, 1900, were read, and, on motion, approved.
 Petitions were then submitted for approval as follows:
 Fireproof shutters—Petition for exemption from fireproof shutters on rear windows of the four upper stories of building, for reasons as stated in petition; No. 40 West Twenty-eighth street. Petitioners, Buchanan & Fox. Petition granted on recommendation of Mr. Conover.
 Petition for exemption from fireproof shutters on windows of the second, third and fourth stories on front of building, for reasons as stated in petition; No. 95 Pine street. Petitioner, Marie Carrull. Petition granted on recommendation of Mr. Croker.
 Petition for exemption from fireproof shutters on windows of second to twenty-fifth stories on light courts of building, for reasons as stated in petition; Nos. 13 to 21 Park row. Petitioners, Park Row Construction Co. Fireproof shutters not required on Park row and Ann street fronts. Fireproof shutters required in the light shafts on east and south sides of building on all windows for at least five stories higher than the roofs of the buildings, the rear of which abut close to the shafts. Fireproof shutters required on Theatre alley side on windows at least three stories higher than at present equipped, on recommendation of Mr. Croker.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, December 21, 1900, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—The full Board.

L. Hugh Harrison appeared in response to the order directing him to show cause why he should not be discharged for neglect of duty and violation of the rules and regulations of the Department in not reporting the dumping of cellar dirt, without permit, at Pier 28, East river. E. J. Freedman was present as attorney for the City; Louis F. Doyle, representing Mr. Harrison. After hearing the various witnesses in the case and Mr. Harrison having been heard in his own behalf, decision was reserved.

The minutes of the meeting, held December 14, 1900, were approved.

The following communications were referred to the Treasurer:

From the Pennsylvania Railroad Company—Requesting permission to use exclusively the north half of Pier, old 59, North river, during the winter season.

From Charles W. Davis—Requesting permission to use and occupy a berth for the steamer "Mary E. Gordon" at the Pier foot of Pike street, East river, and to cut gangway thereat.

From Patterson & Elder—Requesting a lease of 200 feet of the bulkhead on the easterly side of Clinton avenue, at the Wallabout basin, with the privilege of erecting an ice bridge thereat.

The communication from James O'Neill, offering to furnish copies of bills introduced in the State Legislature during the session of 1901, for the sum of \$300, was referred to the Secretary, with power.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

Frank J. Lina, to maintain a watchman's shanty on the bulkhead between Jackson and Corleais streets, East river, the consent of the owner having been obtained.

H. L. Herbert & Co., to maintain two portable steam hoisters on the south side of the Pier foot of East Twentieth street.

Columbia College Boat Club, to erect and maintain a boat-house and float between Fourth and Lexington avenues, Harlem river, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

Frederick Jung, to erect four small boat houses on Hurland's Dock, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, and in accordance with plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by him.

New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, to make general repairs to the water front property used and occupied by said company, from time to time to and including March 31, 1901; all work to be kept within existing lines and at least twenty-four hours' notice to be given the Engineer-in-Chief before the commencement of any such repairs.

New York Horse Manure Company, to make general repairs to the Pier at the foot of West Forty-fifth street, from time to time, to and including June 30, 1901; all work to be kept within existing lines, and at least twenty-four hours' notice to be given the Engineer-in-Chief before the commencement of any such repairs.

J. Lott Nestrud, to replank the face of the bulkhead at the foot of Twentieth avenue, Bath Beach, Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Charles R. Seaton, to reconstruct the breakwater at his property at Huguenot Beach on the south shore of Staten Island, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted as amended.

J. H. Alexandre, to repair his dock at Fort Wadsworth, Staten Island, the work to be kept within existing lines.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Requesting information in relation to the claim of this Department for the cost of repairing Pier, new 31, North river, and the shed thereon, where damaged by the steamship "Breiten." Action of the Secretary in furnishing the desired information approved.

2d. Transmitting approved form of agreement in the matter of the assignment of the lease of the Pier foot of Eleventh street, North river.

From the Department of Parks—Requesting copy of plan showing soundings along the westerly side of the Harlem river, between One Hundred and Eleventh and One Hundred and Fourteenth streets. Action of the Secretary in furnishing same approved.

From the War Department—Requesting a lease of Pier 3, East river, when rebuilt and extended. Secretary directed to state that Pier 3, East river, has not yet been acquired by the City.

From the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted December 7, 1900, agreeing to lease to said company Pier, new 34, East river, with the bulkheads adjoining. Secretary directed to have a form of lease of said pier and bulkheads prepared and sent to the Corporation Counsel for approval, and the Commissioners authorized to execute same when approved by the Corporation Counsel as to form.

From the International Navigation Company—Stating that they do not desire to have Pier, new 14, North river, extended to the new pierhead-line, and requesting that repairs be made to the outer end of said pier. Action of the Secretary in replying that any repairs to said pier should, under the terms of the lease, be made by the lessee, approved.

From the Saugerties and New York Steamboat Company—Requesting that the permit for a berth on the south side of Pier, new 43, North river, be revoked. Permit revoked, to take effect immediately.

From Sheehan & Collin, attorneys for the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company—Requesting that dredging be ordered at the foot of Division avenue, at the foot of First street, Gowanus canal, and at the foot of Fifty-second street, Borough of Brooklyn; together with a report of the Engineer-in-Chief, stating that dredging is not necessary at any of said locations. Secretary directed to transmit to said attorneys a copy of the report of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From the House and Real Estate Owners' Association—Requesting that the construction of the exterior street and bulkhead-wall between Sixty-fourth and Eighty-first streets, East river, be completed as rapidly as possible.

On motion, the report of the Engineer-in-Chief stating that the construction of that portion of said exterior street which is under the jurisdiction of the Department of Highways is not dependent upon any work to be done thereat by the Department of Docks and Ferries was placed on file, and the Secretary directed to transmit a copy thereof to the Department of Highways and to notify said association that the construction of the bulkhead-wall on that portion of the exterior street which is under the jurisdiction of this Department will be proceeded with as speedily as possible.

From Brown & Fleming—Requesting permission to load stone at the bulkhead between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets, East river. Application denied.

From Alexander Crawford Chenoweth—Requesting permission to maintain dumping-boards at the bulkhead between Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets; at the foot of West Forty-sixth street, West Seventy-ninth street and West Ninety-sixth street, on the North river; and in the vicinity

of South Ferry, Moore street, and at the foot of East Twenty-ninth, East Thirty-eighth and East Sixty-first streets, on the East river. Application denied.

From Donovan Brothers—Requesting permission to construct a crib-bulkhead at the foot of Sharp avenue, Port Richmond, Staten Island. Application denied, and the Secretary directed to state that the proposed structure if built would interfere with the use of the pier thereat, in violation of chapter 763 of the Laws of 1857.

From William P. Baird—Requesting an extension of time on Contract No. 679.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of furnishing granite stones under Contract No. 679, William P. Baird, contractor, be and hereby is extended to and including December 28, 1900, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract be filed in this Department.

From the W. H. Beard Dredging Company, requesting an extension of time on Contract No. 695.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of dredging on the East and Harlem rivers, under Contract No. 695, W. H. Beard Dredging Company, contractor, be and hereby is extended to and including March 31, 1901, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract be filed in this Department.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the St. John's Guild for the berth at the pier foot of West Fifthth street be fixed at the rate of \$5 per year, payable in advance to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that permission be granted O'Brien Brothers to use and occupy a berth at the bulkhead between Eightieth and Eighty-first streets, North river, during the pleasure of the Board; compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$5 per day, Sundays excepted, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Manhattan Ice Company for the use and occupation of the bulkhead at the foot of Corleais street, East river, be fixed at the rate of \$6.40 per annum; and that permission be granted said company to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Board, 150 feet on the northerly side of the Pier foot of West Thirty-fifth street, at the rate of \$1,575 per annum, and 150 feet on the northerly side of the Pier foot of West Forty-seventh street, at the rate of \$1,575 per annum; the above rates to be payable in each case quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing January 1, 1901. Recommendation adopted, Commissioner Meyer voting in the negative.

4th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Peoples' Co-operative Ice Company for the use of the 150 feet of the southerly side of the Pier foot of East Sixty-first street, and for the 150 feet of the northerly side of the Pier foot of West Thirty-ninth street, with the privilege of erecting ice bridges thereat, be fixed at the rate of \$1,575 per annum in each case, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing January 1, 1901. Recommendation adopted, Commissioner Meyer voting in the negative.

5th. Recommending that permission be granted the Hecker Jones-Jewell Milling Company to run a condenser pipe through the bulkhead-wall and under Pier, new 32, East river, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Board, and the compensation therefor to be hereafter fixed by the Treasurer, any work to be done by this Department in connection with the laying of said pipe to be at the cost and expense of said company. Recommendation of the Treasurer adopted, Commissioner Meyer voting in the negative.

6th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged Kane & Wright for the privilege of berthing a manure scow on the north side of Pier 64, East river, be fixed at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

7th. Recommending that permission be granted A. W. Welch to use and occupy an additional 30 feet on the north side of Pier 62, at the foot of Stanton street, East river, the compensation for the entire space of 160 feet to be fixed at the rate of \$1,845 per annum, payable monthly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing January 1, 1901. Recommendation adopted.

1st. Report for the week ending December 15, 1900.

2d. Recommending that the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, lessees, be directed to make necessary repairs to the pier foot of Twenty-third street, North river. Recommendation adopted.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to include in the sale of old material, to be held January 7, 1901, the one-story iron shed on the northerly side of Pier 39, East river.

On motion, the order of the Board of November 4, 1900, directing the Engineer-in-Chief to extend the Pier at the foot of West Fifty-second street out to the existing pierhead-line, was rescinded, and the permit granted the Cornell Steamship Company to erect and maintain an office on said proposed extension, rescinded.

On motion, the Rules and Instructions for Dock Masters, as adopted January 13, 1899, was amended as set forth as follows:

"The following Rules and Instructions are issued for the guidance and observance of the several Dock Masters of the Department of Docks and Ferries:

"Section 1. The Dock Masters shall be on duty in their respective districts, unless excused by one or more Commissioners, in writing, from 6 A. M. until 4 P. M., and at such other times each day as the exigencies of the case may require or the public service demand.

"Sec. 2. Each Dock Master shall exercise a constant inspection and supervision of the condition of all piers, bulkheads, slips and wharf property, also all ferries and ferry property in his district, promptly reporting in writing to the Dock Superintendent, from time to time, such repairs and improvements required as he may deem necessary or proper for the safety and preservation thereof.

"Sec. 3. Each Dock Master shall promptly designate and assign, in the order in which application is made, suitable and convenient berths as far as practicable, within the limits of his district, for the use of such vessels and watercraft as may require the same for the reception or discharge of passengers, merchandise or other property therefrom, for the necessary repair or the safety of any vessel or watercraft.

"Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of each Dock Master to require and enforce the due observance of all regulations with respect to the National and State Laws, City Ordinances, and the rules, regulations and orders of the Department of Docks and Ferries as applicable to the use, care and custody of the wharf property and land property owned by the City of New York, promptly reporting to the Dock Superintendent all violations and evasion of such laws, ordinances, rules, regulations and orders.

"Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of each Dock Master, in the presence of the captain or person in charge of a vessel, to pass on and sign the wharfage tickets for wharfage due to the Corporation of The City of New York from all vessels and watercraft that may be received within the limits of his district, and to transmit said tickets to the Treasurer, unless otherwise ordered by him, to be paid to the vessel, giving the date, name, from port and description of the vessel, the name and address of owner, agent or consignee, if any, and the wharf, pier or bulkhead at which such vessel or watercraft is received, together with the date at which and vessel or watercraft arrived, and upon leaving, the name of the person, and shall submit together with a statement showing the amount of several wharfage, rack and crane. Ticket No. Two shall be retained by the Dock Master, and Ticket No. Three shall be delivered to the owner, agent or consignee, as representative thereof.

"Sec. 6. Each Dock Master shall make return as to Dock and Wharf Tuesday of each week, or at such other times as may be required by the Board, to the Treasurer, of all wharfage or damage collected by him during the previous week within the limits of his district, together with a statement of all wharfage and damage due the Corporation of The City of New York, which has accrued during the same period within the limits of his district, specifying the amount earned at each pierhead, wharf, pier or bulkhead.

He shall keep a record in his office, provided for that purpose of all structures such as tallies, beams, watermen's boats, cranes, etc., for which permits have been granted by the Board, and shall require said permits to be posted in a conspicuous place in the interior of the structure authorized by him. He shall also keep in his office a record of all permits for repairs, painting, dredging, etc., also permits to remove and move building materials and other merchandise, and shall cause copies of such permits to be posted in a conspicuous place in the interior of the structure authorized by him, and he shall be on duty to enforce the same. It shall be his duty to report, without delay, any violation of the laws, ordinances, rules, regulations and orders of the Department of Docks and Ferries to the Board, as well as all violations or infractions, permits or infractions of every nature whatsoever.

He shall also report to the Dock Superintendent, without delay, the commencement of any work within a permit within the limits of his district, and any violation of the Rules and Regulations of the Department.

"Sec. 7. Each Dock Master is expressly prohibited, under penalty of immediate dismissal from his position, from receiving, accepting, directly or indirectly, any bribe, gratuity, compensation or reward of any kind for the performance of his duty, or for the exercise of any power or authority conferred upon him by the Board, or for the performance of any of the duties assigned to him by the Department.

"Sec. 8. The Dock Masters shall prevent any accumulation of vessels upon the pier, wharf, bulkhead and adjacent land in their respective districts, and whenever any pier, wharf, bulkhead or adjacent land in The City of New York shall be considered as abandoned or in danger of being so, by reason of its material or structural deterioration, or by any structure, installation or accumulation of vessels or material thereon, the Dock Master of the district in which such deterioration or accumulation is occurring is authorized to require the owner, agent, consignee or person in charge of the vessel or material to remove the same within a reasonable time, upon receiving such order, the owner, agent, consignee or person in charge of the vessel, merchandise, material, structure, installation or accumulation, at the risk of the loss of the same, and of the cost of damage, shall give a receipt in writing for the same, and in default thereof the Dock Master may remove such vessels, merchandise, material, structure, installation or accumulation by the use of any means, and the cost of such removal shall be paid by the owner, agent, consignee or person in charge, and the amount thereof shall be a lien upon the vessel, in favor of The City of New York.

"Sec. 9. Each Dock Master shall have immediate supervision of the Librarian of his Department assigned to his district, to keep the pier, bulkhead and adjacent wharf, and make to the Dock Superintendent an hourly report of the work as may be necessary.

"Sec. 10. The Librarian of Dock Masters shall consist of coast crew and transient, with Navy cap, all made to his satisfaction. The transient in the coast crew and cap shall be at least twenty years of age and of the Department and recommended by the Librarian of the Department of Docks and Ferries. On the first of the month of January, the Librarian of Dock Masters shall be a resident. Each Dock Master shall keep a record of all boats when on duty."

On motion, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, by section 842 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, the Board of Docks of The City of New York is authorized to acquire, in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of The City of New York, wharf property in said city, and all rights, terms, easements and privileges pertaining thereto, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and agree with the owners of any such property, rights, terms, easements or privileges upon a price for the same, and in case of failure to agree upon a price, to initiate legal proceedings to acquire the same for the improvement of the water front of said city; and

Whereas, the Board of Docks is desirous of acquiring, in the name and for the benefit of The City of New York, the following described premises, to wit:

Beginning at a point on the northerly side of West Forty-second street, distant 151.24 feet westward from the westerly line of Tenth avenue, running thence westerly along the northerly line of Eleventh street to the westerly line of Eleventh avenue; thence northerly along the said westerly line of Eleventh avenue about 47 feet to the northerly line of Eleventh street; thence easterly along the northerly line of Eleventh street to a point on said line distant 262.67 feet westerly from the westerly line of Tenth avenue; thence northerly along the westerly line of the marginal street, wharf or pier established by the Board of Docks January 14, 1898, last approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, March 11, 1898, distant 421.57 feet to the northerly side of Eleventh street, the point or place of beginning; together with the bulkhead on the westerly side of Eleventh street, opposite thereto, between the northerly line of Eleventh street and the northerly line of Eleventh avenue, extended a distance of 221.53 feet, together with all riparian wharfage, cranes, advantages, easements and appurtenances connected therewith; and

Whereas, it appears that the point in Eleventh Avenue is the route in the simple of the premises above described, with all its hereditaments including the riparian and wharfage rights;

Resolved, That this Board offers to purchase the above-described premises, with all its hereditaments, and to pay for a good and sufficient title thereto, free from all incumbrances, the sum of three hundred and fifty-five thousand (\$355,000) dollars, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.
