### COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following Departmental Estimates:

To the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Sirs—I am in receipt of circular letters from his Honor the Mayor, dated January 6, 1902, and from the Comptroller dated January 15, 1902, requesting the head of each department to send in his departmental estimate for the year 1902.

In compliance with the resolution of the Board of Estimate dated January 6, 1902, I transmit herewith a copy of a letter addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment containing the information requested in those two letters.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—In compliance with your resolution of January 6, 1902, and the instructions of the Mayor and Comptroller, I respectfully submit herewith an estimate of expenditure for the Law Department for the year 1902.

Comparative statements of salaries and appropriations are also submitted herewith, marked Schedules A and B.

The following summary shows the total amount deemed necessary, as compared with the amount already appropriated by your predecessors for this Department for the current year:

#### 1. Salary of Corporation Counsel.

The first item, the salary of the Corporation Counsel, is fixed by section 255 of the Greater New York Charter.

#### Salaries of Assistants, Clerks, etc.

In the Mayor's letter I am directed to assume that the working force of the Department as it stood on the 31st day of December, 1898, represents theoretically the outside force that is appropriated for this Department, and I am asked to give the reasons why an enlargement of the force is necessary.

The reasons may be stated to be:

A. Growth of the business of the Department.

B. Inability of the Department, as now organized, to cope with the work.

C. Changes in the organization of the city government.

A. Schedule C, submitted herewith, exhibits, in tabulated form, the growth of the business of the Department during the past four years.

As illustrations I note the following comparisons:

Such statistics are not conclusive or entirely fair, but they do show beyond any doubt the great increase in the work, and this is fully borne out by the statements of the most experienced officials in the Department.

B. The statistics contained in Schedule C show that there is a constantly increasing mass of pending litigation. The following are the figures.

Here, again, statistics alone do not give a perfectly trustworthy means of estimating the accumulations of unfinished business. Part of the increase is due to the fact that a great number of separate actions have been brought by city employees to recover amounts asserted to be due them; and part is probably due to the inability of the Courts to dispose of cases as fast as they could be tried. Nevertheless, it is unquestionably the fact that the mass of unfinished business of this Department has increased and is increasing because of the absolute inability of the Department, as at present organized, to handle it.

An illustration will be found in the tax certiorari cases. These are cases where citizens who are dissatisfied with the rulings of the Tax Commissioners apply to the Courts for relief from what they assert to be excessive valuations of their property. It is just to taxpayers that such cases should be promptly heard; and it is also very much to the city's interest. But in spite of the fact that the work has been in the charge of zealous and capable assistants, the office force has been too small to keep pace with it, as appears from the following:

C. The changes made by the recent revision of the Charter and the tenement-house legislation necessitate an increase in the force of this Department.

The Charter provides in section 257 as follows:

"Section 257. In addition to the main office of the Corporation Counsel, which shall be located in the Borough of Manhattan, he shall have an office in the Borough of Brooklyn, and, in his discretion, may maintain an office in the Borough of The Bronx, the Borough of Queens and the Borough of Richmond, or either of them."

During the past four years the Brooklyn office has been maintained as required in this section, as well as an office for the Borough of Queens. In view of the increased powers of the Borough Presidents, and especially in view of the fact that the Building Department has been divided and placed under their jurisdiction, it has been necessary to strengthen the Queens Borough office and to establish offices in The Bronx and Richmond. Another reason for the existence of such branch offices is found in the recent amendment of section 262, which, in effect, allows suits against the City to be brought in the Municipal Courts.

These branch offices will, it is believed, enable the Department to enforce far more effectually than hitherto the penalties provided by law for violations of the Health and Building Laws and the city ordinances. The Tenement House Commission of 1900, in their report to the Legislature, stated that out of some 11,000 proceedings begun to recover penalties for violations of the Building Laws, judgments

had been recovered in only four cases and collected in none. Similar facts might be stated in regard to other penalty proceedings. Such a record alone condemns the system which permitted it to exist.

The Tenement House Department was organized for the purpose, largely, of securing a more vigorous enforcement of the law. This cannot be done unless the Law Department is ready to co-operate. The Law Department cannot efficiently co-operate without an increase of force. I have in this particular consulted with and been assisted by the Tenement House Commissioner, who unites with me in thinking the establishment of a branch office of the Law Department in connection with his work absolutely essential—at least at first.

As the result of a very careful inquiry, begun before entering upon the duties of my present office, and continued since, I have arranged for a readjustment of the force of this Department, which, I believe, will result in securing much greater efficiency at very moderate increase of expense. The details of the proposed organization appear in Schedule D, submitted herewith.

It has been customary heretofore to appropriate under four separate heads for salaries in this Department, the appropriation already made for 1902 being as follows:

The salaries for the Queens Borough offices, and for the Assistants detailed to the Health and Building Departments, were included in the salaries for the main office.

I regard this practice as fundamentally mistaken. Each office or bureau is a part of the Department as much as any other, and, in the event of any unusual pressure of work, I ought to be at liberty to transfer employees freely from one branch to another.

I have therefore prepared the estimate for this Department without reference to its division into separate offices and bureaus.

The following statement shows the total number of persons on the pay roll, with the total amount of their salaries for the years mentioned, and my recommendations for the current year. It should be observed that the sums mentioned for 1898 and 1901 are the amounts actually paid, which are necessarily less than the amounts appropriated:

The schedules hereto annexed show clearly the proposed distribution of the assistants, clerks and other employees among the various offices and bureaus of the department (excluding, always, the Bureau of Street Openings, as to which a separate report is this day submitted). From these schedules certain facts will appear, to which I think proper to call special attention, as explaining the directions in which the proposed increase of expenditure for salaries will operate.

In the first place, it should be noted that the total amount of salaries asked for the year 1902 is practically the same as the provisional estimate for the year already made, if the Tenement House Branch Office is excluded from consideration; so that the entire increase of expense is accounted for by the creation of this branch office.

The provisional estimate was based on the employment of 132 persons at aggregate salaries of.....

The present estimate is based on the employment of 145 persons whose salaries aggregate.....

The Tenement House branch proposes the employment of 14 persons at aggregate salaries of.....

I have recommended very considerable increases both in the number of persons employed and in the total salaries for the Bureau for the Recovery of Penalties and for the Bureau for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes.

The work of the Bureau for the Collection of Penalties is of great importance in many directions, and has never (so far as I can learn) been efficiently performed, especially in the boroughs other than Manhattan and The Bronx. The work of the Bureau for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes, I am sure, has never been properly done. Of late years the work has been much neglected, the books have not been written up, the methods are antiquated, and the entire bureau has been made the subject of severe criticism by the Commissioners of Accounts. Already, by the introduction of more business-like methods, the results have been greatly improved. Since the 1st of January upwards of \$85,000 has been collected, as against an average of less than \$50,000 a year for the past four years. I believe that with proper equipment of the office it will be possible to collect \$200,000 a year, and the office force which I recommend will only cost in salaries \$11,000, or 5½ per cent. on the amounts to be collected.

I desire also to call your attention to the fact that the reductions I have made are recommended principally in the larger salaries paid to assistants. In the clerical force I have recommended a few reductions, and these small in amount, believing that the clerical salaries paid in this Department are by no means excessive.

#### General Contingencies.

The amount disbursed by this Department for general contingencies has steadily increased during the last four years, as follows:

The last amount mentioned does not include the sum of \$18,567.92, which represents the amount of unpaid bills against that appropriation. It appears, therefore, that the amount which was actually expended, or for which an indebtedness was incurred in 1901, was \$88,223.74; the provisional amount allowed by the Board of Estimate for the year 1902 is \$50,000.

The steady increase in the amount disbursed for general contingencies in this Department is explained by the fact that the business transacted by the Department has increased greatly, and that in a great many of these cases it is necessary to employ expert witnesses.

The following statement shows the principal items of expenditure under the appropriation for the year 1901 and the amounts which (as far as it is now possible to predict) will be needed for like purposes for 1902:

It will be seen by the foregoing statement that I have asked for \$80,000 for General Contingencies for the current year, which is \$8,223.74 less than the amount. The amount specified for expert witnesses may seem large, but it must be borne actually expended in or incurred for last year.

The only item in the above schedule which I have materially increased is the allowance for cleaning, repairs and supplies for the Department. Under the new Charter, it will be necessary to purchase from this appropriation all furniture, typewriters, office files and other supplies which were formerly obtained through the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting, and Supplies; and as I have decided to open branch offices in the Boroughs of The Bronx, Queens and Richmond, this increase will be absolutely necessary. In mind that in many of the cases tried, such as contract and negligence cases, and cases involving the water supply of the city, it is absolutely necessary to employ these experts both to prepare for trial and also to offset the testimony offered by other experts hired by the plaintiff.

In the cases tried during the past few months in which these experts have been employed, the recoveries have been small, and I am sure that it is wise economy to employ the very best experts in these trials and pay them whatever their services are reasonably worth. Parsimony in such cases might easily cost the City in large verdicts many times over what the experts' fees would come to. Obviously, this is so in the large and important class of litigation which may be grouped under the head of personal injury cases. Unless the Department can secure the best medical advice and assistance, The City would be at the mercy of enterprising, and often unscrupulous litigants. The same thing is true in a very marked degree of the water cases arising in the neighborhood of Brooklyn, where claims by owners of agricultural land have been made, amounting to many hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Not only is this Department compelled to pay current expenses, but it is obliged to pay the deficiencies for the past years which have accumulated, so far as I can see, largely because of the mistaken policy of making inadequate appropriations for the service. The result has been a policy of putting off payment, and an ever lengthening list of unpaid bills. The result of delays in payment has already proved most embarrassing to me.

I attach to this report a list of unpaid bills or expenditures incurred by my predecessor during the last year of his term of office, for general contingencies (marked Schedule E) amounting to the sum of \$18,567.92. These claims have all been audited in this office and re-examined by me, and (so far as I can perceive) are proper charges against The City, and it is only fair to the persons holding the claims, and due to the public service that they should be promptly paid. I am informed that there are other bills outstanding which have not been received as yet, and that the total amount of this deficiency will be over \$20,000. I ask that the sum last mentioned be appropriated in addition to what is deemed necessary for the current year, making it all \$100,000.

#### 4. Contingent Counsel Fees.

The amount appropriated for this purpose for the year 1901 was \$30,000, and the amount actually disbursed was \$28,651.77. The provisional amount allowed by the Board of Estimate for the year 1902 is the sum of \$25,000. This sum I consider as probably enough to pay counsel fees for the current year, including minor amounts due for services rendered in past years. I find, however, that there are two large bills for services of counsel, which were left unpaid by the previous administration.

One of these is a bill of Mr. John R. Bennett for services rendered in the case of Brickill vs. the Mayor, for the sum of \$30,000. This is an action to recover on a patent connected with fire engines, in which the plaintiff recovered judgment in the Circuit Court of the United States for \$1,036,666.47. The record is exceedingly voluminous. Mr. Bennett, who was retained many years ago, argued the case in the Circuit Court of Appeals and secured a reversal of that judgment.

The other is a bill of Mr. William L. Turner, for the sum of \$10,000 for professional services rendered in tax certiorari proceedings brought by the Manhattan Railway Company, the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, and the Twenty-third Street Railway Company, to review assessments of their property. The cases involve very large sums of money, and the services were rendered at various times between January 1, 1898, and January 1, 1901.

It is perfectly apparent, with respect to each of these bills, that there is a large

fee due to counsel; but whether it is as much as these gentlemen claim, I am as yet unable to say. I have not attempted to adjust these claims, because I have had no funds from which to pay them; but if enough is appropriated to pay these bills, as well as to meet the other necessary demands of the Department, I shall at once take them up and endeavor to arrive at a settlement which shall be just both to counsel and the City.

#### 5. General Conclusions.

The average of salaries to be paid in this Department is proposed to be somewhat reduced. I do not believe it possible to get efficient service for less.

The number of employees is proposed to be increased. The reasons for that increase are fully stated above.

The amounts asked to be appropriated for counsel fees and contingent expenses generally are largely increased. This is because of the necessity of incurring large expenses if the Department is to show favorable results, and also because of the importance of paying overdue bills promptly, if we are to get good service.

As to such expenses, it is impossible to foresee or limit them by appropriations. Many cases absolutely require special kinds of expenditures if we are to succeed in them at all; but until these cases arise there is no telling (except by general experience of past years) what will be needed. An important patent case may require special counsel. An important accident case may require several medical experts. So if an appeal is to be taken, Court Stenographers must be paid or the case on appeal cannot be made.

There is no economy whatever in trying to limit such expenditures. They are as indispensable to the conduct of The City's business as paper and ink; and the only limitation that can be found is in the vigilance of the head of this Department and of the auditing officers of the Finance Department. Any other limitation is false economy, first, because it discourages the use of the best means of dealing with litigation, second, because it makes prices higher if persons employed by The City find they are not promptly paid.

In regard to the unpaid claims for General Contingencies and Contingent Counsel Fees, it must be borne in mind that they all appear to be valid claims against The City, and unless they are paid from such appropriations as I have asked for, actions will be brought against The City and the amounts recovered from the Judgment Fund, with costs and interest. Some of the persons interested have already filed claims against The City, and have stated that they are about to commence action. As The City could probably interpose no defense in these actions, the amount will eventually have to be paid out of the Judgment Fund; and it will save a large amount of interest and costs if they are paid from appropriations made, as I have suggested, directly to this Department.

I realize that if these requests are granted, it will appear in the new budget that this Department is receiving a greatly increased appropriation; but, as I have stated before, bills for expenses incurred by a Department should be paid, and paid promptly, by an appropriation made to that Department direct, rather than from funds appropriated ostensibly for other purposes.

I find that during the year 1901 transfers were made to the Law Department from funds which had been previously set aside for the following purposes:

It will be seen, therefore, that the Law Department last year actually disbursed \$40,678.18, which had been appropriated for other Departments and purposes.

As I regard such a system as improper and misleading to the public, I respectfully request that the full amounts mentioned at the beginning of this communication be appropriated for this Department for the current year, in order that the budget may honestly show the amount actually to be expended.

I desire to assure your Board of my purpose to see that the utmost economy shall be practiced, and that the affairs of this Department are so ordered, and the appropriations so expended, that at the close of the year there will be no deficit to be provided for in next year's budget.

But, in reference to section 230, item 24, of the Charter of Greater New York, we believe to be entitled to some assistance from the city for 31 destitute poor inmates (the institution cares, supports, maintains and educates them), who otherwise would become a burden to the city. The rest of our inmates, 60 in all, are supported supported by private funds.

We earnestly appeal to the honorable Board to help us along in our work by appropriating a certain amount of money to our institution.

To the Honorable Municipal Assembly of Greater New York:

Honorable Gentlemen—We, the undersigned, Sisters of Misericorde, maintaining an institution known as the "New York Mothers' Home," incorporated under the laws of the State of New York, November, 1888, an institution for the care of destitute mothers and children, respectfully submit to you this, our estimate for the year 1902.

Not to take up too much of your time, we shall be as concise as possible. Our daily census, last year, shows an average of 70 destitute mothers under our care, relying upon us for support. The number of infants and children according to our records, of last year, averaged about 75. Since the beginning of 1902 the daily census of both destitute mothers and children shows an increase, which, however, does not enter into our estimate for 1902, but which indicates that our expenses this year will exceed those of last year, upon which we estimate the expenses for the coming year.

We personally receive nothing, nor do we wish to receive anything for our services to these poor mothers and children. We work for them and among them "gratis"; but there are expenses to meet for food, clothing, medicines, heating, lighting, physicians, which compel us to appeal to The City of New York, through you, for financial aid.

To provide the above mentioned items for each destitute mother has cost us



about twelve dollars (\$12) per month, which for 70 destitute mothers will amount to \$10,080 annually.

To provide in like manner for the infants and children at thirty-eight (38) cents per day, averaging seventy-five (75) children daily, will amount to \$10,402.50 annually. These sums respectively make a grand total of \$20,482.50.

Concluding, we will say that persons of any religion, color or nationality, are admitted to our institution, no discrimination being made in favor of any special one, as we accept any needy and worthy case. We respectfully ask for an appropriation of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), being less than one-half our expenses, for the coming year, to help us continue with our charity toward these poor, destitute and unfortunate mothers and little ones.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Pursuant to communication of the Mayor of the 6th ultimo, I beg to submit herewith a classification of the working force in the Department of Bridges, in which is specified in detail the salary proper to be paid to every officer and employee of the Department, so far as I have been able at this date to determine the same.

In addition to the officers named therein, I desire to be authorized to employ hereafter, as occasion may arise, the services of a Consulting Architect, and possibly of one or two Consulting Engineers. At this time I am unable to state what their compensation should be.

The clerical force in this Department is not large, and is divided into classes on the basis of Rule 13 of the United States Civil Service Regulations.

The statements as to the employees of the Department outside of the Main Office have been made by the Assistant Engineers in charge of the respective divisions of the Department. Their comments, in detail, as to the men under their jurisdiction, are included in the classification.

I beg leave to call attention to the fact that the changes already made in the organization of the Department have resulted in a decrease of expenses in the Department as follows:

Making a net saving of \$81,253 50—exclusive of the amount saved to the city by the abolition of the New East River Bridge Commission, whose duties have devolved upon the Commissioner of Bridges, which is \$18,000 more.

The officers and employees of the Department of Bridges named in the accompanying classification, whose names do not appear in the estimate of expenditure of the Department of Bridges for the year 1902, on this day transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, are paid out of moneys provided by bond issues and sales of stock for various bridges now under construction by this Department.

I recommend that the salary of Mr. Archibald McLean, Assistant Engineer, be increased from \$3,000 to \$3,500 per year. Mr. McLean is now in responsible charge, under the Chief Engineer of the Department, of the maintenance of the Brooklyn Bridge. His duties have been greatly increased since the first of January, and his compensation should not be less than that of the two Resident Engineers on the New East River Bridge.

I also recommend that the salary of Mr. J. S. Langthorn, Assistant Engineer, be increased from \$2,500 to \$3,000 per year. Mr. Langthorn has been put in charge of all the bridges of this Department in the boroughs of Brooklyn and Richmond. His duties have been increased by taking over those formerly performed by the Deputy Commissioner of Bridges in the Borough of Brooklyn and by the Superintendent of Bridges in the Borough of Richmond. The Assistant Engineers in charge of bridges belonging to this Department in the boroughs of The Bronx and of Queens receive \$3,000 each. Mr. Langthorn's duties are of the same character, and his compensation should be the same as theirs.

I also intend hereafter to recommend for promotion other members of the engineering corps, as their fitness may be demonstrated to my satisfaction.

December 31, 1898, there were employed on this bridge: 1 Steam Engineer in charge at \$1,140 per annum, 2 Steam Engineers at \$1,080, 3 Firemen at \$840, 4 Bridge Tenders at \$730.

The increase in pay of Steam Engineer in charge from \$1,140 to \$1,368.75, Steam Engineers from \$1,080 to \$1,277.50, Firemen from \$840 to \$912.50, was made in compliance with the act of Legislature obliging the city to pay the same rates of wages as those prevailing in the locality in similar occupations.

Two additional Bridge Tenders have been detailed to this bridge, because it was considered that public convenience would be better served by furnishing a full crew of two men on each shift during the twenty-four hours. Their pay was increased from \$730 to \$900 per annum, because, as they worked every day in the year, \$730 per year was \$2 per day, or Laborer's pay, and as these men are of a more intelligent class than Laborers, have to buy a more expensive uniform and come more in contact with the public, it was considered proper that they should get more than Laborer's pay.

These remarks apply to all Steam Engineers in charge, Steam Engineers, Firemen and Bridge Tenders on the following list of Harlem river employees:

Prout, the Foreman, has charge of all the Bridge Tenders, and after February 15 all the men on maintenance and repairs will be in his care.

Butler was formerly an Inspector of Masonry, and has been retained to guard the city's interests until the completion of the masonry at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street Bridge over the Mott Haven Canal, as there is no money available for an Inspector's wages on that job.

Rice and Ryan are Laborers who are sent from bridge to bridge making small repairs, but at present they are detailed in place of two Bridge Tenders who are on the sick list.

Breidenbach is detailed to assist the Bridge Tenders at Westchester Avenue Temporary Bridge. Two men are required to turn this bridge, and Breidenbach works on two tours of four hours each per day at high water, at which time the majority of vessels come up the river.

These matters were treated in detail in my report to the Chief Engineer, dated January 22, 1902.

It will be seen from these lists that the number of men on three old bridges that were in use on December 31, 1898, has been increased threefold and that the wages of men have risen from \$600 per year to \$730 per year. The first change was made under the provisions of the "Labor Law," which prohibits the employment of men on our bridges for a longer tour than eight hours per day. All three of these bridges are busy principally at high tide and on that account three shifts of one man each are required to cover the varying time of high water.

City Island Bridge is a new structure and was not in existence on December 31, 1898. Three men are required at present to turn it, hence the appointment of the nine men on the list in three tours of eight hours each.

The increase in wages was made in pursuance of the "prevailing rate of wages" law. The present salary amounts to \$2 per day, as the men work 365 days in the year. I believe that it would be unjust to reduce this rate, which is a laborer's wages. The majority of the men are of a higher intelligence than laborers and fully deserve a higher pay. They are, moreover, required to buy a rather expensive uniform, and in some cases must pay thirty cents per day for carfare.

L. L. BUCK, Esq., Chief Engineer of Bridges:

Sir—Attached hereto is a list of the Engineers, office staff and employees of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge.

This list includes the names of all employees who will—after formal transfer has been made on the rolls of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, the "City Record" and Comptroller's Office—form the general repairing forces, and thus be chargeable to the appropriation made therefor. At present these employees are charged to the New York and Brooklyn Bridge, and all wages and salaries are paid out of the revenues of said bridge.

The shops and repairing forces—which had been established under the administration of the Board of Trustees of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge, for the general maintenance and repair of the bridge, its approaches and property adjoining said bridge—have, during the four years past, been also employed to make general repairs to all bridges in care of the Department of Bridges. Bills for all work done, except that of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge, are charged against the borough appropriation which was provided for the maintenance and repair of the particular bridge on which the repairs are made, and repayment made to the funds of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge.

The forces requisite for the routine care and maintenance of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge form the larger proportion of the men employed, and this has permitted the steady employment of a force of thoroughly experienced men in their respective classes of work, which could be freely drawn upon at short notice for repairs on other bridges under the care of this Department.

When arrangements have been made for the formation of the Repair Department men can be detailed from that Department to attend to the routine repairs to the New York and Brooklyn Bridge, under the supervision of the Assistant Engineer in Charge of Maintenance, thus permitting the free use of such detailed men when required on other bridges in care of the Department of Bridges.

The increase in the salaries of the Bridge Tenders—from \$730 to \$839.50—is due to the fact that these men are much superior to the ordinary laborer, who is paid \$2 per day; they are obliged to purchase more expensive uniforms and they necessarily come in contact with the public; they must also be men of some judgment.

The increase in the salary of two Engineers—one on the Carroll Street Bridge and one on the Washington Avenue Bridge—was made to conform to the prevailing rate of wages law.

Edward A. Byrne, Assistant Engineer, was promoted from grade of Transitman at \$1,500 per annum to Assistant Engineer at \$2,000 per annum in March, 1898, succeeding Mr. Martin Gay (whose salary was \$3,000), in the supervision of the construction of the Third avenue and Willis avenue bridges. This salary was increased to \$2,500 on July 1, 1899, and to \$3,000 on June 1, 1901.

The above force will not be sufficient to look after construction when it will have commenced, and would recommend the services of a Transitman who has had experience in this kind of construction and thoroughly competent to look after the work in my absence on tours of inspection of the bridges in this district, and in fact at any time I may be called away.

The office used by me at present is only a temporary one furnished by the contractor, during construction of this Bridge. Authority has been given to lease an office at No. 85 Borden avenue, Long Island City, which will become the headquarters of the Department of Bridges for this district after March 1, 1902.

There will be required at this office the services of a clerk, whose duties will be to keep the books, answer inquiries, etc.

The telephone now at Vernon Avenue Bridge will be located at this office.

If the above meets with your approval I would suggest that perhaps it would be advisable to detail a man to make visits to the different bridges daily, or as frequently as possible, to look after necessary supplies and repairs, but more especially the conduct and punctuality of the bridge tenders. There are at present fifty-four men employed in the maintenance of bridges in this district, which will be further increased on the completion of the Grand Street Bridge.

Gentlemen—In response to the circular letter of the Comptroller, dated January 16, 1902, the Hospital and Dispensary of the Town of Flushing submits the annexed estimate of the amount required for the care and support of its inmates for the year 1902.

By chapter 754 of the Laws of 1895 and section 230 of the Greater New York Charter the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is authorized to appropriate moneys for the benefit of the Hospital, payments to be made thereout only for such inmates as are received and retained in the Hospital pursuant to the rules established by the State Board of Charities.

Gentlemen—I enclose herewith an estimate for supplies other than stationery, etc., for the Municipal Courts of The City of New York for the year 1902. I have sent in this estimate under an opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated February 15, 1902, in which he states: "In my opinion the Board of Justices of the Municipal Courts is to be deemed and treated as the 'head of a Department' within the meaning of those words as used in section 3 of the Charter, in regard to the power to purchase supplies. It will be necessary, therefore, for the Board of Justices to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a transfer to the Board for supplies from the appropriations in the budget for 1902, made to the Presidents of the several Boroughs, under the head of 'Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices,' for 'supplies and repairs.' See Budget, pages 61-63, 64-65 and 66."

This opinion has been confirmed by a later opinion of the Corporation Counsel, a copy of which I send herewith and which is dated the 18th inst.

As soon as I received this last mentioned communication of the Corporation Counsel I called a meeting of the Justices of the various courts, and from the statements made by them it would seem that each court required \$600 for supplies, divided up as follows: \$250 for law books, \$300 for furniture, which includes carpets, linoleum, etc., and \$50 for shelving, etc., for the storing of records, and some require appropriations for coal and wood, without which they cannot carry on the business of the courts.

This matter is, of course, entirely new to us, as we have never heretofore been asked for any estimates for the support of the courts and have only made out requisitions upon the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies as supplies were required.

Dear Sir—I spoke to Mr. Rives in regard to modifying his opinion, dated February 15, 1902, and which you called to see me about on the 17th.

#### EXPLANATORY STATEMENT.

##### Stenographers.

The salary of a Stenographer in a City Magistrate's Court in the Borough of Brooklyn is the same at this time as when the position was created in the Police Courts of the former City of Brooklyn fifteen years since, notwithstanding the increased labor and more exacting demands for competency and general ability.

The demands upon a Stenographer are not limited to hours spent in court. The making of transcripts (for which there is no remuneration whatever in Brooklyn) calls for more time out of court frequently than is spent in the taking of testimony.

The salary of a Stenographer in a City Magistrate's Court in the Borough of Brooklyn is \$1,800 per annum. In the Borough of Manhattan, for an identical position, the salary is \$2,000 per year. In the Borough of Manhattan a Stenographer is not required to take testimony unless counsel or the City or County Attorney shall call for him to do so. In the Borough of Brooklyn, in every instance in which a witness is placed on the stand, from a case of intoxication to the most serious felony, the testimony of all the witnesses is taken by the Stenographer. In the Borough of Manhattan should the District Attorney or other official prosecutor require a transcript of the testimony requisition is made by him on the Stenographer for same, and the latter is paid the legal rate per folio for his work from the Contingent Fund of the District Attorney or other official prosecuting officer. In the Borough of Brooklyn, in every case of felony in which the defendant is held to await the action of the Grand Jury, the Stenographer taking the testimony is compelled to transcribe it in full and furnish a copy for the use of the District Attorney, for which he receives no compensation whatever. This extraordinary custom does not elsewhere prevail.

The net result is that the Stenographer in a City Magistrate's Court in the Borough of Manhattan receives two hundred dollars more per year in salary, and in addition compensation for transcript to a greater amount, although his labors are not nearly so arduous as those of the holder of an identical position in the Borough of Brooklyn. The inequality in salary was recognized by the makers of the city Charter now in force. They put the Stenographers in the two boroughs on the same plane by providing in section 1396 that "the salaries of Stenographers in the City Magistrates' Courts in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn shall not exceed \$2,000 a year."

The State Legislature of 1901 took cognizance of the prevailing injustice by passing a bill making the salary of a Stenographer in a City Magistrate's Court in the Borough of Brooklyn \$2,000 per year, the same as in the Borough of Manhattan. This act failed of consummation, however, owing to its non-acceptance by the then Mayor of the city.

##### Assistant Clerks.

In some respects the explanations in the foregoing apply to the Assistant Clerks in the City Magistrates' Courts in the Borough of Brooklyn. They now receive the same salary as was paid to holders of the positions many years ago, when the labors were considerably less. The duties of the position are such as to require the attendance of these men 365 days every year. Sundays and holidays are included in the time they are called upon to spend in Court, which is not true of other clerical positions under the City Government. The opening of the Courts at 9 a. m. calls for the attendance of the Assistant Clerks at least an hour earlier, which is not required of occupants of similar positions under the Government. Their presence in Court every day until the closing hour is a demand of the Charter.

The discrimination in the matter of salary is even greater than in the case of the Stenographers. In the Borough of Manhattan an Assistant Clerk receives \$2,000 per annum, while in the Borough of Brooklyn the compensation is \$1,500. The Charter also recognizes this inequality by providing in section 1396a that the salary shall not exceed \$2,000 per year, the same as paid for similar services in the Borough of Manhattan. The hours of service of all attaches of the City Magistrates' Courts is the same in both boroughs.

The attention of your Honorable Board is respectfully directed to the annexed unanimous opinions of the Brooklyn press on this subject when it was last under discussion.

*Editorials from Brooklyn papers in reference to equalization of salaries of Assistant Clerks and Stenographers throughout Greater New York.*

(Brooklyn Daily Eagle Editorial, March 15, 1900.)

Senate bill 947 has passed the Legislature and is now before the Mayor. It provides for Clerks, Assistants and Stenographers in City Magistrates' Courts in Brooklyn the same pay as that received by those employees in Manhattan and The Bronx. Inasmuch as such employees here perform more work than the like employees across the river, and perform it quite as well, their pay should be at least the same. The bill only equalizes the pay of the same class of employees and brings to an end a system of inequality and injustice. It is, therefore, a just measure. Averse as the Mayor and the Legislature are to any increase of salaries, the exceptional character of this case should overcome their aversion, for it is a measure of fairness and really of government honesty toward government servants.

The objection to equalizing these salaries is that the Clerks' Assistants and Stenographers in the Boroughs of Richmond and Queens of the Second Division are not entitled to have their salaries equalized, for the reason that they do not have the same amount of work to do as the same officials in the First Division. To meet that objection this bill was prepared. There can be no dispute as to the justness and fairness of the bill. No one can deny the fact that the Clerks' Assistants and Stenographers in the Borough of Brooklyn are required to have as much technical knowledge of the Penal Code, the Code of Criminal Procedure and the practice in City Magistrates' Courts as those in the First Division. They have the same responsibilities and the same duties to perform, and work the same hours. Equity, justice and fair play to the Clerks' Assistants and Stenographers in the City Magistrates' Courts of Brooklyn is all that the bill calls for, and that should be conceded by all. Certainly, if these officials in The Bronx were entitled to the increase, to equalize salaries, no Brooklynite at least will deny the same right to Brooklyn employees.



The salaries of Assistant Clerks in the Municipal or Civil Courts of Brooklyn have been fixed at \$3,000 per annum by law. The bill affects fifteen Assistant Clerks and eight Stenographers in Brooklyn, and the total increase of salaries is but \$9,100. The Charter provides that only the City Magistrates in the Second Division shall be in constant attendance from 9 a. m. until 4 p. m., and all the courts required to be open every day in the year, without exception. The measure should be approved by the Mayor.

(Editorial Brooklyn Standard Union, March 16, 1900.)

Among the bills to come before Mayor Van Wyck for action in the course of a week is one which fixes the salaries of the Assistant Clerks and Stenographers in the City Magistrates' Courts in Brooklyn at \$2,000 per year each, the same as is paid to city employees in similar positions in Manhattan and The Bronx. The effect of the bill is to equalize salaries. At present the Brooklyn Clerks and Stenographers receive \$1,500 and \$1,800 respectively. The courts here are open every day in the year, and on all but Sundays and holidays, from 9 a. m. until 4 p. m. Owing to existing arrangements the Clerks in Brooklyn are called upon to perform at least as much work as those in Manhattan, and a great deal more than those in The Bronx. Facts demonstrate that the Stenographers here do more than three times as much as those in the other boroughs. Besides receiving less salary, they are also called upon to furnish transcripts in all felony cases, receiving no remuneration therefor, while their brethren in the other boroughs are paid for all testimony written out.

The Brooklyn men declare that for the same kind of services they should receive the same salary as those in the other boroughs, especially as they give the city more return than those in Manhattan and The Bronx. They rest their claim on the justice of it, which they say is not disputed in any quarter.

Fair dealing toward Brooklyn men pleads for the prompt approval of the bill by Mayor Van Wyck.

(Editorial Brooklyn Daily Times, March 17, 1900.)

No fair-minded citizen, being in possession of the facts concerning it, will object to the bill regulating the salaries of Assistant Clerks and Stenographers in the City Magistrates' Courts in Brooklyn, which has been passed by the Legislature, and is now before the Mayor. It differs widely from the average salary bill, in that it does justice to those it affects by abolishing an inequality. The Assistant Clerks and Stenographers are the busy men in these courts. There are no drones among them. The Clerks in Brooklyn do as much work as those in Manhattan, and more than those in The Bronx. The Stenographers here perform many times as much service as those in either of the other boroughs, owing to a difference in prevailing customs. For the same kind and quality of work, and more of it, lower salaries are paid in Brooklyn than in Manhattan and The Bronx. This ought not to be. The bill calls for equalization, by giving the Brooklyn men \$2,000 a year each. They deserve it. Mayor Van Wyck and Governor Roosevelt, by approving the measure, will do justice to a faithful set of public servants.

At the close of the year 1901, \$1,500 was transferred from the Sheriff's office by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to meet the deficiency of expenses in this Department.

I cannot too strongly urge that the salary of the Chief Clerk be advanced to \$1,800. He receives but \$1,000. He is a practicing attorney and efficient criminal lawyer. The Civil Service regulations provide that this position shall be held by a practicing attorney, in order that it be non-competitive. Myself and one assistant are all, without the help of a lawyer clerk, to conduct examinations in three Magistrate Courts a wide distance apart; in the Court of Special Sessions; in the County and Supreme Courts for trial; in inquisitions before Coroners and before the Grand Jury.

Without additional assistance it is simply impossible for this office to be conducted by two attorneys; there can be no question about this. It has frequently happened that all three of us have been in different courts at the same time. Unless this office can be properly represented in the Magistrate Courts and before the Coroners we are likely to lose many vantage points in the forming of cases. The bar of criminal lawyers in this county is fairly strong, and it is important that our third representative, the Chief Clerk, should be an attorney of legal strength in coping with that share of the work which may of necessity be assigned him. I respectfully submit that \$1,000 is a wholly inadequate compensation in order to secure and keep a qualified attorney. He does not even receive as much salary as the County Detective or the police detective attached to the office nor as much as an ordinary clerk in the several departments of the city, particularly in this borough, whose duties require no professional training or practice.

I urge the allowance of \$1,200 for a stenographer. This is the only office in the borough that is not provided with one by appointment. The stenographic and typewriting work of this office is of necessity voluminous, and it has been paid for out of the expense account and has been allowed by the State Civil Service Commission. It is simply incongruous that the office of District Attorney in a county like Queens should not be allowed a Stenographer upon salary, and I lay the matter before you in the hope that you will view it in the same light. The expense of stenographic work during the coming year will be, at a fair estimate, \$1,200.

By reason of the necessity for absolutely correct stenographic work it is impossible to get a well-trained law Stenographer at a less salary than \$1,200. This is recognized by the allowances of salaries in that minimum amount to Stenographers in District Attorneys' offices in other parts of the city. In this, the only position of Stenographer in this office, must be combined the qualities of speed, accuracy, training and confidence. Our office force is so small that these qualities must be vouchsafed to the volume of work that is to be done.

Gentlemen—Herewith please find submitted an estimate of the amount of money required to properly maintain and conduct the Queens Borough Library for the current year.

Heretofore the Trustees have been very seriously hampered in conducting the affairs of the Library and extending branches into the various sections of the borough by the insufficiency of the appropriations allotted them.

There are now eight branches in operation throughout the borough, which circulated nearly 150,000 books during the past year. At least six new branches should be established at once in order to supply the needs of the borough, and the sum requested for this purpose, \$18,000, is a very moderate one, since \$3,000 is scarcely sufficient to properly establish, equip and maintain a branch for a year, in accordance with Regents' requirements.

Heretofore, also, the salaries of our employees have compared so unfavorably with those of other library employees that we have had much difficulty in procuring and retaining persons with the necessary education, culture, aptitude and other qualifications.

It may interest you to know that the Brooklyn Public Library with twenty-six branches was allotted \$173,000 by the former Board of Estimate and has asked for \$208,000 for the present year, while Queens, with eight branches, was allotted only \$20,000. Therefore, it would appear that the request for \$57,000 for the maintenance of fourteen (14) branches during the present year is a very moderate one.

The amount requested for salaries for the current year is on the present basis under appropriations granted as per resolution of your honorable Board of the 28th ultimo. It has been a rule of your Board to appropriate annually \$7,500, and additional amounts whenever required, for "Fees for the Clerk of the Court of General Sessions for furnishing certified copies of indictments and other records." I believe there is no necessity for having copies of indictments, etc., certified, but that uncertified copies answer the purposes of this office just as well, and upon my request your honorable Board recently transferred the amount appropriated to that account to the credit of the Salary Account, and this action enabled me to provide for the then newly established "Complaint and Preparation Bureau" in this office.

While the creation of this Bureau has entailed much additional labor upon this office, it being necessary to appoint two Deputy Assistant District Attorneys and other employees to keep abreast of the important duties devolving upon that Bureau, it has proven to be very valuable to the public service, and the same is maintained without additional cost to the county by reason of the large saving effected in dispensing with the use of certified copies of indictments, etc.

It is customary for your honorable Board to appropriate from time to time for "contingencies," including arrearages, whatever might be estimated as necessary. The amount requested for contingencies, including arrearages, in the provisional estimate for the year 1902 is \$30,000. This amount is insufficient to meet the charges ordinarily arising against this account. The expenditures for contingent expenses, including arrearages, during the year 1901 at present amount to \$52,000. While the sum of \$50,000 is now requested for contingencies, including arrearages, for the current year, it is estimated that at least \$5,000 of that amount will be disbursed as "arrearages" for contingent expenses incurred by the previous administration, consequently the contingent expenses for the year 1901 will have amounted in reality to \$57,000 instead of \$52,000, and since the arrearages for 1901 will be payable out of our contingencies for 1902, this will leave us actually but \$45,000 available to said account for this year.

It is absolutely essential that the sum of \$50,000 be appropriated for contingencies, including arrearages, for the year 1902. This is due to the fact that during the current year the demands on this account will be exceptionally heavy owing to the many important criminal cases that have arisen, including many homicide and other trials now under way and in course of preparation, some of which have attracted general public notice; the necessity for employment of experts in medicine, chemistry, handwriting, etc.; autopsies and chemical analyses of difficult and expensive character; the attendance of necessary and material witnesses from all parts of the country and the maintenance of such witnesses while attending the trials; the investigations in regard to the police and other departments, especially that in connection with the Police Department, where it is found necessary to employ a staff of private detectives and provide for the board and lodging of important witnesses whom it is deemed necessary to keep under constant surveillance; expensive extradition proceedings incurred in extraditing prisoners in this and other States and foreign countries, etc.

Such contingencies can never be estimated for with any degree of certainty, because the District Attorney can never know in advance what crimes may be committed which will entail great expense on the county in the due administration of criminal justice.

It may be observed that despite the most rigid economy the great increase in our population brings increased labor upon this office, and from year to year makes it necessary to increase its working force and add to its expenditures; nevertheless, the appropriations, instead of showing a corresponding increase, have been greatly diminished.

The following summary shows the appropriations granted for the year 1901, as per resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of October 30, 1900, and the amounts requested for the current year:

Gentlemen—In accord with section 226 of the Charter, the Art Commission for The City of New York submits this, its duplicate, of its departmental estimate, made and sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the matter of expenditure by it during the current year ending December 31, 1902, viz.:

In accord with section 226 of the Charter, the Art Commission for The City of New York submits this, its departmental estimate, of the amount of expenditure by it during the current year ending December 31, 1902, specifying in detail the objects thereof, and including a statement of each of the proposed salaries of its officers, clerks, employees and subordinates, viz.:

We have no officers except the President, Vice-president and Secretary, elected by the Commission itself from its own number, each serving without compensation—all as provided by section 635 of the Charter.

The Commission does not believe it necessary now to provide for any further officers, clerks, employees and subordinates than a Stenographer and Assistant Secretary, provision for whose compensation is above asked.

The scope of this Commission's duties having been greatly broadened by the law under which it is now acting, and which took effect January 1st ult., this Commission has no experience which enables it to specify in greater detail than above set forth the objects of the expenditure which will be required by it during the current year. We, however, submit annexed hereto, as "Memorandum" hereof, sundry data which may make more clear the character and necessary extent of the expenditure which should be provided for.

#### Memorandum A—As to the Duties of the Commission.

These are set forth by section 637 of the Charter:

(a) "Hereafter no work of art shall become the property of New York City by purchase, gift or otherwise, unless such work of art or a design of the same, together with a statement of the proposed location of such work of art, shall first have been submitted to and approved by the commission; nor shall such work of art until so approved be erected or placed in or upon, or allowed to extend over or upon any street, avenue, square, common, park, municipal building, or other public place belonging to the city. The commission may, when they deem proper, also require a complete model of the proposed work of art to be submitted. The term 'work of art' as used in this title shall apply to and include all paintings, mural decorations, stained glass, statues, bas-reliefs or other sculptures, monuments, fountains, arches or other structures of a permanent character intended for ornament or commemoration."

(b) No existing work of art in possession of the city shall be removed, re-located or altered in any way without the similar approval of the commission, except as provided in section 639 of this act."

(c) "When so requested by the Mayor or the Board of Aldermen the commission shall act in a similar capacity, with similar powers, in respect to the designs of municipal buildings, bridges, approaches, gates, fences, lamps or other structures erected or to be erected upon land belonging to the city, and in respect to the lines, grades and plotting of public highways and grounds, and in respect of arches, bridges, structures and approaches which are the property of any corporation or private individual, and which shall extend over or upon any street, avenue, highway, park or public place belonging to the city." \* \*

(d) "And said Commission shall so act and its approval shall be required for every such structure which shall hereafter be erected or contracted for at an expense exceeding \$1,000,000."

Under "(c)" alone the time of this Commission might be continuously occupied, and quarters required for the proper filing, exhibition and study of plans or details of the structures referred to, and for care and storage of models and sketches in each of the several lines of art referred to, and a working library with files of photographs, engravings, plans, etc.

We have assumed, however, that we shall not be called upon as to matters in contracts which have been closed before January 1, ult.; and hence that our work, the room necessary for our offices, and the amount necessarily expended by us, will be comparatively limited at first; and, in view of this, our estimates have been made smaller than may be required for another year.

(2) As to the necessity for the Stenographer and Assistant Secretary.

(a) As to Stenographer: This employee will be needed to facilitate the business at our meetings and for our large and growing correspondence, as well as to attend to other items of our work.

(b) As to the Assistant Secretary: The highly important, varied, and, to some extent, technical knowledge required are somewhat suggested by the extract above quoted from section 637 of the Charter. The intent of the Legislature may be inferred from its requirement, section 635: That the Secretary shall be elected from its number—that is, be a gentleman well qualified to represent the Commission.

As the Secretary is, by law, to serve without compensation, he is presumably entitled to such competent assistance, while leaving him still in charge, as shall relieve him from such of his duties as can be performed by an assistant, and aid him in the remainder. That is, the Assistant Secretary should be one qualified in every way to assist the Secretary and properly represent both him and the Commission at the Commission's office. That is, should be as well posted as may be, not merely upon the routine work of a public commission and its relations to the city government, but upon the several factors of city embellishment with which the Commission has to deal. It will be hard to find a competent man. He must probably be developed rather than found, so that the salary of \$250 per month, now proposed, is probably sufficient for the purpose.

Our estimates must be largely tentative, and the convenience of the Commission would be greatly served by the utmost latitude in the use of the total appropriation for our expenses that your Board shall make.

We therefore request that you make our appropriation for the current year six thousand dollars (\$6,000) in gross; and, in case salaries or positions be specified, that this be done, for example, as follows:

"Including the salary of Stenographer at not to exceed \$..... per month; and of an Assistant Secretary at not to exceed \$..... per month."

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, No. 280 Broadway, New York City:

Gentlemen—Complying with the request of the Hon. Edward M. Grout, Comptroller, contained in the circular letter of January 15, 1902, I send you herewith an estimate of expenditures for the year 1902 of the Tenement House Department, with this prefatory word in relation to the form of the estimate:

The Tenement House Department is an entirely new department, created for the first time by the new Charter. There is, therefore, no possible comparison of the expenditures of the Department for the present year with those of any previous year. Moreover, the organization of the Department, except so far as it is actually controlled by the Charter, must necessarily be tentative. It will be a question of performing the duties devolving upon the Department in the most efficient and economical manner. Whether their performance will require a smaller or greater number of employees, or employees at a greater or less salary, to secure the best and most economical results, must necessarily be a matter of experiment and experience. The Department is yet only partially organized and its complete organization awaits the preparation of eligible lists as the result of examinations held by the Civil Service Commission.

Under these circumstances it is manifestly impossible to give all the information properly required by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment from the City Departments which have been in operation for many years and the organization of which is complete.

The appropriation made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 30, 1901, for the Tenement House Department aggregated \$403,840. It was separated into sixteen (16) different items, making a division between General Administration and the offices of the Department in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx and in the boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, and making a



division in each group of boroughs between Administration and the three Bureaus of the Department, viz.: New Building Bureau, Bureau of Inspection and the Bureau of Records. It was evidently based upon the hypothesis that there would be no separate or branch bureau in The Bronx, in which respect it does not conform to the plans of the Department. It made no allowance for the expense of furnishing and equipping the offices of the new Department.

In my opinion, there need be no change in the total estimate of \$403,840 made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 30, 1901, with the exception of adding thereto for furniture, office fittings, etc., in the three offices of the Department, in the boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx, the sum of \$15,000. The classification, however, should be changed so as to be for "salaries," "rents" and "contingencies," without any subdivision as to boroughs and without any subdivision between different bureaus.

It is impossible for me to determine just at the moment what force should be employed in each Bureau, nor is it possible for me to foretell with certainty what division of that force between separate offices in boroughs may be needed.

I intend to open a separate branch office in the Borough of The Bronx, and it may possibly be necessary to make similar arrangements in Queens and Richmond. Therefore it is not possible for me at the moment to determine just what force may be required for the different Bureaus of the Department in the various boroughs in which offices may be opened. To make any such attempt as a basis for action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in detail, would presumably involve an application to the Board for a change at almost every meeting during the year, to the great inconvenience of the Board and embarrassment of the Department.

Under these circumstances I request that the budget for the year 1902 remain fixed at \$403,840, with the addition of \$15,000 for furniture, office fittings, etc., for which no provision was made in the original estimate, and that the classification of this appropriation be as follows:

This information was intended to indicate the aggregate amount needed; there was no intention, however, to suggest that the appropriation should be so minutely classified. Sir—In conformity with the circular letter of Hon. Edward M. Grout, Comptroller of The City of New York, we hereby request an appropriation of \$1,500 for conducting the work of the Northern Dispensary in and for the year 1902.

The Northern Dispensary was founded in 1827 and incorporated in 1828, and since that time has furnished free medical attendance to the needy sick poor residing in that portion of the city bounded on the north by West Twenty-third street, on the east by Broadway, on the south by Spring street, and on the west by the North river.

During the year ending December 31, 1901, 12,298 patients were treated, 23,651 visits were made, and 18,723 prescriptions dispensed.

The disbursements in the year 1901 were \$7,357.39, of which \$976.56 was received from The City of New York, the balance being the proceeds of voluntary contributions by friends of the institution. The only salaries paid are to the physicians and employees of the Dispensary, the officers serving gratuitously.

The Dispensary was erected by private subscription, on land donated by the city for the purpose, at the intersection of Christopher street and Waverley place.

Gentlemen—Pursuant to the request contained in the circular letters of his Honor the Mayor, and the Comptroller of The City of New York, I have the honor to submit the enclosed Departmental Estimate for the year 1902, covering the expenses of salaries of the employees in the armory of this command for the year 1902.

The reason for asking the additional appropriation to pay for the salaries of two laborers and hostlers, one from April 1st, and one from May 1st, 1902, is that since sending in the estimate last year for the year 1902 this battery has been re-equipped and armed with new Colt Automatic Guns, which increased the number of carriages by six in the armament, and these six carriages require additional horses. There has recently been placed in the armory sixteen new stalls on account of this new equipment, making the number of stalls forty-one, and there are at present in the armory thirty horses. Horses will be continually purchased up to the number of forty by the organization, and these horses are to be used for military purposes in drills of instruction and parades of the battery, and are necessary for that purpose. It is contemplated that the full number of horses will be purchased and in the armory in use before the first day of May next. The provisions of the Military Code, known as chapter 16 of the General Laws of the State of New York, sections 139 and 140, provide for a Laborer and Hostler for every ten horses used by a military organization for military purposes, and the additional amount asked for is required to pay the per-diem allowance of men necessary to take care of these horses under the foregoing provisions until the end of the year 1902.

Previous to January 1, 1898, an annual appropriation of \$25,000 was made for the salaries and expenses of this office, and, in addition thereto, the Chamberlain was allowed to retain certain fees. Under chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897 the Chamberlain who took office on January 1, 1898, was required to turn over to the City Treasury and Sinking Funds all fees received by him. Such fees from that date to and including December 31, 1901, amounted to \$75,058.34, an average of \$18,764.58 per year.

The business of this office has steadily increased since January 1, 1898, in the City Treasury Department, in which are included the receipts and payments of all the public funds, comprising the banking of city moneys, the payment of jurors and witnesses and Richmond County Park Commission Fund. The work in this Department has more than trebled in the past four years.

The Equity Department, which includes, besides the care of Court and Trust Funds, Military, Warehouse and Criminal Bail Funds, has become a very important branch of this office. It is one of the most responsible in connection with the City Government, the Chamberlain by different acts of the Legislature having been designated the successor of the County Treasurers of Richmond, Queens and Kings Counties, in conjunction with his duties as County Treasurer of New York County. He has, therefore, the banking and investment of all Court and Trust Funds paid into the Courts of the four counties included in The City of New York.

On December 31, 1901, the Chamberlain had the following amounts of Court and Trust Funds invested and in Court Depositories:

I beg to inform you that I have abolished the office of Equity Bookkeeper for the Counties of Richmond and Queens (salary \$2,950 per annum) and have equalized the salaries of the Bank Messengers, fixing them at \$1,000 per annum each. Formerly one Messenger received \$1,000 and the other \$1,200.

I recommend that the salary of Chas. W. Dickerson, Assistant Bookkeeper, be reduced from \$2,000 to \$1,600 per annum, and that the salary of William M. McCaffry, Clerk, be increased from \$1,200 to \$1,500 per annum, and the salary of Levi Fox, Clerk, be increased from \$1,200 to \$1,300 per annum.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Dear Sir—Transmitted herewith please find Revised Estimate of expenses for the Department of Correction for the year 1902, including salaries, maintenance of institutions and money needed for improvements.

#### BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

##### Salaries.

The amount asked for salaries for the department in the Borough of Manhattan is \$250,000, which is \$10,000 less than appropriated by the former Board. Of this amount, \$244,385 is required for salaries of present employees. The remainder, \$5,615, is asked to increase the number of steamboat employees, as required by law, and also to pay teachers' salaries at Hart's Island, as mentioned under the heading of "Hart's Island."

This saving of \$10,000 is made by reduction of salaries and dispensing with unnecessary help.

##### Supplies.

The amount allowed for supplies for 1902 is \$305,000. This amount will be needed and expended as per statement attached hereto. Prices for 1902 are con-

siderably higher than those of 1901, the increase ranging from ten to twenty-five per cent. The coal contract for 1902 calls for 11,000 tons, costing \$44,140. I feel, however, that this amount may not be sufficient for the year, as the new wing of the Penitentiary and the new City Prison will require more coal than has been provided for. I would, therefore, respectfully suggest that your honorable board set aside the additional sum of \$10,000 for coal for the Department of Correction. This money, however, will not be used unless it is absolutely necessary.

#### Repairs to Buildings, Apparatus, Etc.

My predecessor asked for \$40,000 for a new steam plant and an addition to the boiler house at the Workhouse, Blackwell's Island, and \$12,000 for general repairs at the same building, making a total of \$52,000. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, however, granted only \$22,000. This sum is totally inadequate for these improvements and repairs. The Workhouse steam plant is in a very bad condition. It is over thirty years old, and has been repaired and patched up many times. It is almost useless for heating the building. The old boilers are liable to give out at any time. In making this request, I feel that I cannot too strongly urge upon your honorable board the absolute necessity for these improvements, and would, therefore, most earnestly ask that the \$52,000, originally requested, be granted.

#### District Prisons.

To the condition of the District Prisons I have given much attention. Five of these were found very much overcrowded and in a most unsanitary condition. This state of affairs I am endeavoring to overcome by making a portion of the necessary alterations and repairs, and would respectfully ask a special appropriation of \$12,000 to carry this work to completion.

#### Steamboats.

For general repairs to steamboats "Minnahanonck," "Thomas F. Gilroy" and "William L. Strong" \$10,000 was asked, but only \$7,000 was allowed. I respectfully request that the amount asked be granted, as this sum is required to make the necessary repairs. The steamer "Minnahanonck" needs new boilers, a thorough overhauling of the engine, hull and joiner work and painting throughout. This alone will cost at least \$7,500. The balance of the amount asked for—\$2,500—will be scarcely enough to put the "Thomas F. Gilroy" and the "William L. Strong" in good condition. A new steamer, the "John F. Carroll," was added to the department fleet toward the close of the past year. I do not apprehend that it will need any repairing during the current year.

#### Donations to Discharged Prisoners.

The money asked for and allowed by the former Board of Estimate and Apportionment was \$2,000. This is sufficient. This money will be returned to the city by the State at the end of the fiscal year, September 30, as provided by law.

For the transportation, maintenance and expenses of insane criminals \$500 was asked and allowed. This money is necessary and I think the amount quite sufficient.

#### Improvement of Riker's Island.

The sum of \$15,000, a special appropriation, was allowed for the improvement of Riker's Island. This money was intended for salaries and the purchase of stone, lumber, hardware, lime and cement used in building roads and for other improvements. For salaries alone \$12,680 was to be expended. This would leave only \$2,320 for the actual purchase of the above-mentioned materials. The salary roll has been reduced to \$6,910, thus effecting a saving of \$5,770, which will be used for the purchase of materials. I would, therefore, respectfully request the appropriation named to remain as fixed by the former board.

#### Hart's Island.

The pavilions on Hart's Island, which are to be used as a reformatory for boys, and also the hospital pavilions, are in a dilapidated condition. Plumbing, painting, repairs to roofs, etc., are absolutely necessary. For this purpose I would respectfully ask \$10,000 under an appropriation entitled "Repairs, Alterations and Additions to Pavilions, etc., on Hart's Island." Nothing has been allowed for, nor have any repairs been made to, the buildings since they came into possession of this Department after being vacated by the Manhattan State Hospital during the spring of 1898.

#### Reformatory School.

Besides the request for an appropriation of \$10,000 for repairing pavilions on Hart's Island in the first part of this letter an additional amount of \$5,615 was asked for salaries, making the total, as set forth, \$250,000. Of this amount a portion will be used to pay salaries of teachers for this school. The school has already been established, but it is now only somewhat tentative, and is being carried on by volunteer teachers under the direction of Mr. David Willard, who is well known for his interest in youthful prisoners. It is my desire, however, to place the school on a more substantial basis, believing that better results can be obtained on a paid system; consequently, I hope the additional salary appropriation will be allowed. The pavilions on this island are being put in condition for the accommodation of about one hundred boys.

The school has been established pursuant to section 698 of the Revised Charter, which is as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Commissioner to cause all the criminals and misdemeanants under his charge to be classified as far as practicable so that youthful and less hardened offenders shall not be rendered more depraved by the association with and evil example of older and more hardened offenders. The Commissioner may establish and maintain such schools or classes for the instruction and training of the inmates of the institutions under his charge as may be authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. And to this end the Commissioner may set apart one of the penal institutions for the custody of such youthful and less hardened offenders, and said Commissioner shall have the power, in his discretion, to transfer such offenders thereto from any other of the penal institutions of the city."

I desire to call the attention of your honorable board to the necessity of introducing electric lighting and a lavatory system, both in the Workhouse, Blackwell's Island, and in the Kings County Penitentiary. The improvements should be made for sanitary reasons, as at present the old bucket system is still in vogue in these institutions and oil lamps are used in the cells. For these improvements at least \$80,000 would be necessary.

I do not request this appropriation at the present time, but desire only to bring this matter to your attention, as I purpose making a formal request for the appropriation at a later date.

## BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

### Salaries.

The amount asked for salaries of employees of the Kings County Penitentiary is \$52,572.50, as against \$60,372.50, which was allowed by the former Board; thus showing a saving of \$7,800. This includes the salary, \$5,000, formerly paid to the Deputy Commissioner for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, but now abolished under the Revised Charter.

Supplies, Kings County Penitentiary.

For supplies for 1902 \$60,000 was asked and \$55,000 allowed. The actual cost of the supplies contracted for is \$63,000. A transfer of \$8,000 has been allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment from "Supplies for Manufacturing Purposes," decreasing that appropriation from \$50,000 to \$42,000, and increasing the appropriation for supplies from \$55,000 to \$63,000. The cost of supplies for the Kings County Penitentiary shows an increase of from ten to twenty-five per cent., the same as shown by the cost for the Borough of Manhattan. (See statement "Supplies," Kings County Penitentiary.)

## Repairs to Buildings and Apparatus.

For repairs \$10,000 was asked and \$5,000 allowed. My endeavor will be to make this amount answer, although many repairs seem to be necessary.

### Donations to Discharged Prisoners.

The amount asked for and allowed, \$2,000, is sufficient. The sum expended for this purpose will be returned by the State at the end of the fiscal year, as in Manhattan.

## Transportation, Maintenance, Etc., Insane Criminals.

The amount, \$1,000, asked for and allowed is necessary and sufficient.

### Supplies for Manufacturing Purposes.

The amount asked for and allowed was \$50,000. Of this, \$8,000 was transferred to the Appropriation for Supplies, which was found necessary, on account of the increased cost of same, and also, by reason of considerable additions to the census of the institution. The transfer left \$42,000 for manufacturing purposes. This amount may not be sufficient, as the call for manufactured goods by City Departments may be increased so as to require a further appropriation. This, if made, would come from an "Emergency Appropriation" which the law has provided for.

In this connection, I beg to call your attention to the work performed at the Kings County Penitentiary, and the profit which the City derives therefrom. This profit, however, is not placed to the credit of the Department, but goes into the Sinking Fund, or the General Fund.

For the year 1900—The amount sent to the City Chamberlain from the Manufacturing Bureau was \$73,315.54, and for the board of prisoners from adjacent counties, \$36,501.03; from the sale of old material, \$201.89; a total of \$110,019.55.

For the year 1901—The Manufacturing Account, the Board Account, the clothing, goods and material on hand, and bills outstanding, show a total of \$134,636.06, making a grand total in two years of nearly \$250,000. If this money could be retained and

placed to its credit, the Penitentiary would in the course of time be self-supporting. (See Statement.)

The Blackwell's Island Penitentiary turned into the City Treasury for 1900, \$11,620.50; for 1901, \$15,876.00. This was for the board of prisoners from counties other than New York. This Penitentiary manufactures only for the Department of Correction and the Department of Public Charities, receiving no payment for such manufactures, and therefore showing no profits.

In regard to the increase in the number of employees for 1902, as against 1898, I beg to call your attention to the fact that the greatest increase is in the Steamboat squad, the increase in number of Engineers and Pilots being mandatory.

The duties of Stokers, Deckhands and Boatmen were formerly performed by Workhouse help. In 1898 the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was prevailed upon to allow the Department to employ paid help, which system has since been in force.

The employees on the Workhouse Roll, including the Branch Workhouse on Hart's and the Branch Workhouse on Riker's Island, numbered 97 in 1898; at the present time there are 89 employed, showing a decrease of 8.

For 1898 \$225,000 was allowed for salaries. The December roll of the same year, if carried out for twelve months, would have shown an expenditure of \$242,695.

You will also observe that if the Pay Roll for February, 1902, be taken as a basis for twelve months, the expenditure for salaries would be \$244,385, or an increase of only \$1,690 beyond that of 1898.

Difficulty has been experienced in making a classification of salaries in this Department, on account of the varied duties performed by the employees, many of whom are maintained and housed at the institutions.

Classification.

Class 6.—Department Secretary, General Bookkeeper and Auditor, Wardens of the City Prison, the New York County Blackwell's Island.

The Keepers throughout the Department I have classed in B, C, D and E, according to salaries. Head Keeper, in one or two instances, in Class I. Drivers are in Class C.

Clerks in Central Office

Clerks in Central Office are in Classes C, D, E and F. Employees whose salaries range from \$5 to \$50 per

Employees whose salaries range from \$5 to \$50 per month do not belong to any particular class. I have mentioned in Pay Roll margin—Laboring Class—as I find no classification for these salaries in Rule 13 of the United States Civil Service Regulations.

In conclusion, I would state that every item of the Estimate has been carefully considered, and the amounts asked for are, in my judgment, necessary to carry on successfully the work of the Department.

The "Administration" force, as given above, shows an increase of \$8,880, but a saving is effected in "labor, maintenance and supplies" of \$17,542; in the salary of Superintendent of Small Parks (now charged to "Aquarium" account), \$3,500; in the salary of Superintendent of Harlem River Driveway, \$1,500; making a net saving of \$13,662.

At the present time there are two superintendents classified in Schedule A by the Civil Service Board, one known as "Superintendent of Small Parks" (who has never performed the duties pertaining to that position), and the other as the "Superintendent of the Harlem River Driveway," while a gardener, detailed as "Landscape Gardener," has had charge of the artistic park features, and two General Foremen have had charge of the working force of the Department.

It is believed that there should be a Superintendent of Parks of high artistic repute, and two Assistant Superintendents, the one to have charge of the small parks below Fifty-ninth street, and the other to be the Superintendent of the Speedway and Parkways. It will be necessary, therefore, to have a reclassification by the Municipal Civil Service Commission, and economies have been effected in other quarters to allow for this change in the character of the administrative end of the parks.

No change has been made in the salary of Chief Engineer from the Departmental estimate passed in October, 1901, but attention is called to the fact that the salaries of chief engineers in the other departments range from \$5,000 to \$10,000 per annum.

##### Music.

Twenty-five thousand dollars, the amount asked for, has been allowed and expended for several years past. Probably no expenditure of its size receives better value or gives more appreciable pleasure and real comfort to the people than the summer nights' concerts in the parks throughout the city. They are largely attended by all classes, and in the down-town parks and crowded sections particularly are a boon to many who are unable to attend concerts or seek recreation elsewhere during the heated term.

The following estimates were prepared by the various heads of departments for the budget submitted in September, 1901, and approved by the Municipal Assembly in October, 1901, and are given as then made, believing that the various items asked for and the reasons appended cover all the information that can be given on these points.



## Contingencies.

The amount asked for this purpose, \$2,500, is \$500 less than the amount appropriated for the current year. It is used mostly for telephone service, which is now so systematized and installed as to admit of a reduction of that sum for the coming year.

## Surveys, Maps and Plans.

The amount asked for, \$2,000, was allowed for 1901. It is required for making surveys and maps of small new parks in Manhattan and Richmond, and also for making maps when called for by Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in proceedings for acquiring new parks and other similar work.

## Aquarium.

## Harlem River Driveway.

## Ambulance Service, Central Park.

There is no increase in this item. Twelve hundred dollars has been appropriated for several years past for this useful purpose.

## Care of Grant's Tomb.

Pursuant to chapter 670, Laws of 1897, the city entered into a contract with the Grant Monument Association for the care and preservation of the Tomb of General Grant on Riverside Park. This contract runs for twenty-one years, the association serves without compensation, and the city is required to pay the expenses, not exceeding \$5,000 per year.

## Cleaning the Central Park Lakes.

Five thousand dollars is a low estimate for this work, which should be undertaken this year at the latest. It is of great sanitary importance and should not be neglected. The removal of accumulations of silt and precipitate from the pools and ornamental waters of the Central Park become necessary every few years to keep them in healthful condition and guard against any possible menace to the health of the neighborhood or to public enjoyment of these attractive features of the park. I therefore urgently recommend that this appropriation be made.

## Union Square Walks.

The surface of the asphalt walks of this park, after many years of wear, has become badly worn, and the entire walk area should be repaved. Seventy-five thousand square feet of pavement will cost \$12,750.

## Walks Around Grant's Tomb.

The cement pavement of these walks, which was hastily laid in the winter of 1896-1897, is badly cracked and settled and in great need of repair. Some of the walls supporting the surrounding coping have settled badly and should be taken up and rebuilt, and most of the granite work in coping, steps, etc., should be repointed. The work required is as follows:

Fifty-two thousand four hundred square feet Portland cement sidewalks to be relaid and repairs to wall, masonry, pointing of granite, etc..... \$12,000

## Central Park Gutters.

The continued resurfacing of the drives has placed the gutters from six to twelve inches below the proper grade.

In 1900 and 1901 considerable portions of these gutters were paved with asphalt, and it is proposed to continue this work as fast as funds become available. It is a most desirable improvement, inasmuch as it has the effect of widening the drives at least six feet, by taking out the ridge or quarter space between the quarter and the gutter. Twenty-five thousand linear feet of this gutter work has been done, leaving about 76,000 feet remaining to be done at an estimated cost of \$55,000.

The sum of \$15,000 is asked for to continue this work.

## Central Park Drainage.

New drains and basins are required at Sixty-sixth street, on the west drive, from Bridge No. 26 up to and around the Circle to the block-house, Eighty-first street on the east drive and Ninety-sixth street on west drive. They will cost \$2,000. It is found that the sewage from several of the cottages and park buildings is carried directly into the lakes and pools. New systems of drainage to discharge into the city sewers should be established and the necessary cesspools should be constructed. The work is estimated to cost \$38,000.

## Central Park Water System.

At the time Central Park was constructed a cement water pipe was laid to supply water for general use and irrigating purposes. This pipe is badly worked and breaks continually, causing much trouble and lack of water. A new system should be laid. It would cost \$100,000, but might be done in sections and the cost distributed over several years. The sum of \$25,000 would enable the Department to make a very fair beginning of this important work during the coming year.

## Conservatory Lake.

This small lake or pool, laid out on geometrical lines near Fifth avenue and Seventy-second street, is used in summer for sailing miniature boats and in winter for the curling clubs. Its bottom is of earth or clay, and at different times of the year is full of weeds. It is proposed to construct a water-tight basin, with concrete bottom, rubble masonry surrounding walls and blue-stone coping, and to lay an asphalt walk pavement around the lake in place of the present dilapidated plank walk. Following are the quantities of work:

2,200 cubic yards excavation and removal mud bottom.
1,500 yards concrete base.
1,000 cubic yards coarse gravel for bottom.
410 cubic yards rubble masonry in walls.
1,225 linear feet bluestone coping.
9,800 square feet asphalt walk.
Estimated to cost \$22,000.

## Water Supply, Harlem River Driveway.

A water supply system for the driveway, including drinking fountains for man and beast, is greatly needed and should be constructed. It will cost \$15,000.

## Riverside Drive Wall.

The dry rubble retaining wall on the westerly side of Riverside Drive is bulged in places and settled in others. These defects should be remedied. The cost of taking down and re-erecting this wall at the points referred to, including the cost of restoring the pavement, sod, etc., is estimated at \$15,000.

## Repaving Walks in City Parks.

The walk pavements of Battery Park, City Hall Park, Tompkins Square, Madison Square, Washington Square, Mount Morris Park, East River extension, Jackson Square and some of the smaller squares and triangles have been worn, cracked and disintegrated, and should be repaired. The work will cost \$20,000.

## Sheepfold.

Located near Eighth avenue and Sixty-sixth street.

This structure was erected some thirty years ago, and during this time very little, if any, repairs have been made to it. About two-thirds of the building is occupied by the mounted police and their horses. There will be required new slate roofs, copper work, extended repairs to woodwork and masonry, asphalted yards, iron fences, etc., \$10,000.

Men's Toilet No. 31—Located south of Transverse Road No. 2. The cottage has no sewer for soil, and has in use what is known as dry closets, very objectionable and unsanitary. The building can be moved to a new location, north of Transverse Road and Swedish school-house. It can be made into a modern first-class toilet and all the sewerage empty into the new sewer just completed from the Swedish school-house for \$2,500.

Men's Toilet No. 21—Located north of Transverse Road No. 1, near the dairy; needs thorough overhauling, new plumbing, carpenter work, etc., \$800.

Women's Toilet No. 28—Located in Ramble. Has dry closets, but nothing can be done in the way of plumbing, as it is located where it is impossible to put in a soil pipe. The cottage needs general repairs, \$400.

Ball-house—Located south of Transverse Road No. 1. This house is used by croquet players and lawn parties. The building has fallen into such a bad and dangerous condition that last year all of the outside woodwork, including roof, was renewed. The work that remains to be done is the remodeling of the interior and putting in a woman's toilet in one of the new rooms. There is a pressing necessity for it, as there are at times great crowds of children on the ball grounds. The remaining carpentry work can be done by our own men. The plumbing and painting by contract, \$800.

Bridges—There are a number of wooden and iron bridges that need painting and the planking should be renewed, \$5,400.

New Fence, City Hall Park—It is proposed to remove the unsatisfactory and unsightly wire fences now in place and install new pipe rail fences. Estimated cost, \$4,380.

Viaduct at Ninety-sixth street and Riverside Park—As this work will be completed early in the spring, the grading and planting made necessary by the construction of the viaduct should not be delayed, and the work included in this estimate will complete the grading and planting of Riverside Park south of the Grant Tomb. \$8,500.

Removing Existing Park Enclosing Wall and Constructing Suitable Approaches to the East Wing of the Museum of Art—The easterly wing of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, fronting on Fifth avenue, will be dedicated to public use in the fall of 1902, and it is absolutely essential that an entrance to the building from Fifth avenue at Eighty-second street and suitable approaches be provided. \$7,500.

## Superintendent of Parks.

The late incumbent under this title was in reality a Purchasing Agent and Contract Clerk. He was paid at the rate of \$3,500 a year, but was afterward reduced to \$3,000 a year. The work of the Superintendent was done by Mr. John DeWolf, the Landscape Architect of the Department of Parks of The City of New York, whose salary was \$4,000 a year. The Landscape Architect will hereafter make his headquarters in the administrative offices in the Borough of Manhattan, and a Superintendent will be required to give his attention to the park system of the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

## Assistant Superintendents of Parks.

One of these is desired for supervision over the small parks and boulevards in the northern and eastern sections of the city.

The other Assistant Superintendent is desired to take charge of Prospect Park and the parks and boulevards lying south and west.

## Clerk.

It is found absolutely necessary to have a clerk who can do general bookkeeping, as it is my desire to organize this Department in the most thorough and businesslike manner possible, and I cannot do this without a competent bookkeeper.

Under the head of construction proper there are several matters that need immediate attention, and the most pressing are the following:

First—Dyking the river front of Macomb's Dam Bridge Park. This park lies at the junction of Jerome avenue, Harlem river and Cromwell's creek, and is subdivided by intersecting streets into twelve different parcels. The parcel bounding the creek and river is the largest, and was originally a salt marsh. Nearly one-half of this portion of the park has been filled to grade by contractors without expense to the city, and will be dressed down with top soil, seeded and planted with trees and shrubs during the coming season. The balance of this part of the park can also be filled without expense to the city if the water front is dyked. Otherwise the removal of this free filling at these points will have to cease on account of the damage to the channel from the outward pressure on the soft bottom from the weight of the filling above.

I beg to call attention also to the fact that a part of this front between the railroad and the river is occupied by several of the amateur boat clubs of the city who represent a large number of young men, and the dyking and filling of this section of the park would be a great benefit to these people, and do away in a large measure with the unhealthfulness of this section during hot weather, and it would further add a very picturesque feature to this park, which would be seen and appreciated daily by many thousands who pass through and alongside of it in the various lines of cars that intersect this park. At the present time this park is very unsightly and unsanitary, and I am informed that many complaints have been made against it by people living in the neighborhood, and they are sure to be repeated as soon as the warm weather approaches. The cost of this improvement according to the estimate made by the Chief Engineer will be as follows:

#### New Road in Van Cortlandt Park.

The construction of a telford macadam road from Mosholu avenue in Van Cortlandt Park to the northern boundary of this park to connect with Van Cortlandt Park avenue from Yonkers is necessary.

The construction of this roadway will open up a large section of the most beautiful and interesting part of Van Cortlandt Park, which section is now practically inaccessible. It will accommodate carriage driving in the direction of Yonkers and avoid using Broadway, which, for the present, is almost impassable on account of the sewer under construction therein, and also avoid the car tracks that will at all times monopolize Broadway. #### Improving the Western Slope of Cedar Park.

This park, situated at Mott avenue, One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street and Walton avenue, is located in a rapidly growing neighborhood. Its western boundary faces Walton avenue and is nearly fifty feet above the grade of the avenue. Its conformation is a steep slope and the material a running sand. After every heavy rain a mass of earth and sand is carried that covers the sidewalk and roadway to a depth, at times, of over two feet. This not only interferes with public travel, but does serious damage to that section of the park. It was first deemed necessary to construct a retaining wall, but the Engineer believes that a proper system of earth construction will remedy the evil.

#### Public Comforts of Modern Design.

At the present time there are no public comforts suitable for the necessities of women and children in any of the parks of the Borough of The Bronx. Old-fashioned earth closets, without water facilities, are the only means provided. There should be at least three of these public comfort stations of modern design, constructed during the coming year, in the parks that are most frequented, to wit: one in St. Mary's, one in Crotona and one in Bronx Park.

The estimated cost of the public comfort buildings has been given at \$4,000 each. This will require an appropriation of \$12,000.

#### Dutch Garden in Van Cortlandt Park.

In 1897 plans were prepared for the laying out in the southern end of Van Cortlandt Park, opposite the old Van Cortlandt Mansion, which is now occupied by the Colonial Dames as a Museum, a Dutch Garden, but nothing has been done toward this excepting a certain amount of preliminary fill. The crowds that visit this portion of the park would appreciate very much this improvement, if it were made, and the representatives of the Colonial Dames have most urgently requested this Department to have this Garden completed at an early day. It would add a novel feature to our park system, and be something entirely different from what we have in any of the other parks in the City.

#### Dredging and Cleaning Van Cortlandt Lake.

This lake is fed by a brook, springs, and the natural drainage of the neighboring slopes. It is being gradually filled by mud deposits, and it also contains a large amount of decayed vegetable matter.

It is a positive menace to the public health, and requires an immediate remedy. Large numbers visit the borders of this lake daily, during the summer, in connection with the golf links, and it is incumbent upon the city, so long as those golf links are maintained by the public, that the surroundings should be made as healthful as possible. The Chief Engineer of the Department prepared the following estimate of the cost of this work:

#### Maintenance of the Botanical Gardens.

I herewith resubmit a detailed estimate prepared by Dr. N. L. Britton, Director-in-Chief, under date of August 3, 1901, amounting to \$78,230. The late Board granted only \$65,000 of this amount. I have examined the work necessary to be done during the current year and the statement of expenses submitted by Dr. Britton, and I think that they should be given the full amount asked for for their maintenance during the current year, otherwise the good work being done by this institution will, to a certain degree, be crippled.

During the past year they have added some large conservatories and made additions to their roads and walks, all of which will require a large addition in their force of Gardeners and other Laborers. They will also require a considerable increase in fuel and other supplies over that used in 1901.

I most respectfully urge that this appropriation of \$78,230 be made.

#### Maintenance of Zoological Gardens.

I herewith submit a detailed estimate of W. T. Hornaday, Director of the Zoological Gardens, made to my predecessor under date of August 15, 1901, wherein he asks for the sum of \$92,500 for the current year. He was granted by the late board the sum of \$85,000. An examination of their detailed statement and also an inspection of the manner in which their funds are expended convinces me that their estimate is moderate and should be allowed in full. The salaries paid are lower than those in other departments of the park, and the increase in the amount of work occasioned by the opening of new buildings and the increase in walks and



drives and the necessary forestry work to be done to care for the park under their charge will require every dollar asked for.

Music.

The estimate for music, made and allowed for the current year, was \$12,480, being for twelve concerts in eight parks at a cost of \$130 each. After examination, I feel that some of these concerts were given at places either so remote from the thickly settled neighborhoods or in parks so small that they are not really required at the present time, and I think that six parks would be sufficient to cover and ask for three-quarters of that amount, to wit: \$9,360.

Contingencies.

The amount of the appropriation for contingencies made for the past three years has been \$1,500. This appropriation is designed to meet the cost of the telephone service of all our parks and the necessary petty cash disbursements under the head of petty cash that could not be expended under any other account. As the telephone service alone costs over one-half this amount, I submit that the sum of \$1,500 should be allowed for contingencies.

Surveys, Maps and Plans.

This is an appropriation that has been allowed for several years for surveying, monumenting and grading the outlying and larger parks of the borough; for the preparation of maps, plans and specifications for the important works of contracts to be inaugurated during the year; for the preparation of a complete set of topographical maps.

The amount allowed for the current year was the same as has been granted in previous years, and I respectfully ask for the same amount, to wit: \$10,000 for this item.
