BOROUGHS OF BROOKLYN AND QUEENS.

Report for the Quarter ending September 30, 1904.

Office of the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, Litchfield Mansion, Prospect Park, Brooklyn, October 1, 1904.

STATEMENT OF WORK PERFORMED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PARKS OF THE BOROUGHS OF BROOKLYN AND QUEENS, DURING THE THREE MONTHS FROM JULY 1 TO SEPTEMBER 30, 1904.

Prospect Park.

The general work of maintaining, cleaning and improving this park inaugurated during the preceding quarter, has been carried on vigorously and is to-day showing very good and practical results. The work of building the paths to the south of Willink entrance has gone steadily forward and is at present close to completion. The work of rebuilding and resurfacing the drives has been completed, leaving the drives in the park in a very serviceable and presentable condition. A contract has been let to resurface, rebuild and reconstruct the asphalt walks in Prospect Park. When this contract shall have been carried out all of the walks throughout the park will be in first-class condition. The work of building the shelter house on the South Lake drive is completed, and designs for seats for same are now under way. The work of building the entrance at Ocean avenue, though somewhat delayed through the inability of the contractor to obtain stone, is at present within two or three weeks of final completion. On the lower terrace of the Flower Garden extensive improvements have been inaugurated; parts of the lawns that have in recent years settled and become worn out have been lifted and the grade made higher. The work of rebuilding the shore line around the lake has been started and the result so far in every way justifies the improvement. The work of improving and enlarging the animal quarters has gone steadily forward, and with gratifying results. A new bear cage, one of the finest in the country, is now practically completed and awaiting occupancy by the animals. The elk paddock has been improved and made larger. The sheep enclosure has been improved and a cement floor laid throughout its entire area. A contract has been let for the laying of sidewalks at the Ninth avenue and Fifteenth street entrance to this park, and is at present under way, and gives promise of being completed at an early date. During the last quarter bids were opened for the cleaning of the lake, and it is my best judgment that this work can be better done and more economically so by park labor and under park auspices. The work of regrading the slopes east of the Quaker Cemetery is practically completed. The work of regrading, harrowing and trimming the bridle paths has been completed. During the month of September a violent wind and rain storm destroyed many of the large trees of this park. The work of removing these trees and making good the damage done by their destruction has been completed.

Sunset Park.

The work of carrying out the original design of this park has been vigorously prosecuted. The recent additions to the park consisting of two blocks, bounded by Seventh avenue, Fifth avenue, Forty-third street and Forty-fourth street, has enabled me to proceed with the carrying out of the walk system of this park. Contracts have been let for the necessary sewer-pipe fittings and brick and supplies to build the drainage system for this park. I have also let a contract for the necessary materials to install and complete an irrigation system for this park. The slopes bordering on Forty-first street have been made and planted. The work of making the slopes and walks bordering on the Seventh avenue side is now under way, and I have hopes that before the arrival of the winter months they will have been completed.

Forest Park.

In this park large improvements have been begun. Two greenhouses, capable of taking care of the present needs of the Department, are now nearing completion. The work of building driveways through this park has practically been completed, and the work of building the gutters along the entire length of these drives has been started. It is the intention of the Department to establish in this park, and in fact the work of establishing a nursery has been begun. In this nursery there will be grown all the young trees and shrubs required for departmental work in the future. The work of laying out new golf links to the south of the drives has been started and is at present in very satisfactory state of progress.

Highland Park.

This park has received careful attention during the past three months. The work of grading the slopes and sodding them has progressed favorably. The slopes running down to the lake have been formed and sodded, and to-day present a very attractive appearance. The work of grading the embankment north of the lake is now being carried forward, and will be completed prior to the coming of winter. The roadways have been carefully looked after and repaired where necessary, and are to-day in a very satisfactory and commendable condition. During the concert season it was found impossible to accommodate all the people in the near vicinity of the music stand. To obviate this difficulty it was found necessary to extend the plateau in a southerly direction and on a level with the base of the music stand. To do this is required about five or six thousand cubic yards of fill and considerable labor. The walks around the lake have been built and screenings spread thereon. The storms of September played havoc with some of the large and old trees, and the work of removing these trees and making good the damage caused by their destruction has been completed. The park to-day is in a very presentable condition.

Carroll Park.

A contract was let to lay cement sidewalks on all four sides of this park. The work is now under way, and I am sure will be completed within two or three weeks. Designs have been prepared and the contract is now under preparation for a new shelter house for this park. The work of maintaining the grounds, trees and shrubbery and removing all dead trees and branches has been carefully looked after.

Institute Park.

At this park work has been started on a new walk from Flatbush avenue, bordering the reservoir. This walk is intended as an access from Flatbush avenue to the Institute grounds, and when completed will be the last walk to be built under the original design for this park. The large plateau in the rear of the Institute building has been regraded and screenings spread thereon, and the slopes and sides have been made and covered with top soil. The work of seeding and sodding these slopes is now being pushed forward.

Small Parks.

The small parks under the jurisdiction of this Department have received the usual care and attention in the way of maintenance and improvement. The trees and shrubs have been pruned and sprayed with a poisonous solution to prevent the ravages of caterpillars and other insects.

Playgrounds.

The playgrounds in Williamsburg Park and the playground under the Williamsburg Bridge and at New Lots Playground have been kept in very fine condition during the preceding three months. Screenings have been spread over the entire surface of these playgrounds, and attendants and apparatus have been in constant demand.

Parkways.

Highland Boulevard—Along this boulevard a contract has been let to lay cement sidewalks, starting at the viaduct across Vermont street and running in a northerly direction along the boulevard and up Bushwick avenue as far as the sidewalk in front of Evergreen Cemetery. This work has been completed and is a material improvement to the locality.

Ocean Parkway—Along the traffic road on the west side of this parkway the entire area of the roadway has been rebuilt and resurfaced from the Plaza to Twenty-second avenue. The drive itself has been kept in excellent condition, repairs here and there being found necessary after each heavy rainstorm. The work of taking care of the bridle paths and improving its condition was started at the Plaza and is being carried out along its entire length. The Bureau of Sewers, through its contractor, tore up the bicycle path for a great distance, necessitating the abandonment of this path for bicycle use. The work of building the sewer is now completed and the contractor has been notified, and the work of clearing up and restoring the bicycle path must be vigorously prosecuted.

The Speedway has been kept in excellent condition by spreading loam over its surface, raking and harrowing same daily. The trees along this fine boulevard have been carefully looked after. Dead trees and branches have been removed and new trees set out in their place.

Glenmore Avenue—On Glenmore avenue, from Fountain avenue to Eldert street, I have reconstructed the entire macadam roadway.

Pitkin Avenue—The work of keeping in repair this macadam road has been constantly looked after; large holes and depressions have been filled and the road kept sprinkled and cleaned.

Eastern Parkway—On the Eastern parkway the macadam road has been reconstructed from Utica avenue to New York avenue, consisting of five blocks. This work is now nearing completion, and when completed this roadway will be in fairly good condition with the exception of some slight holes and depressions in the westerly end.

Eastern Parkway Extension—The work of rebuilding the macadam roadway of this drive from Fulton street to Bushwick avenue, begun in the preceding quarter, was carried to completion in the last three months. This drive is now in excellent condition and is being daily sprinkled and cleaned.

Shore Road—During the last three months contracts have been let to widen this important roadway in several places. To Robertson & Gerehart was let the contract for widening the Shore road in places between Bay Ridge avenue and Eighty-ninth street. The work has been begun on the section lying near Seventy-fifth street, and is fairly under way. It will not, however, be completed this year, owing to the near approach of the winter months. This work when completed will completely obviate the danger of collision and accidents at this point, and is a very important piece of work.

The work of protecting the banks at the foot of Fourth avenue has been let to the Cranford Construction Company, and they are now actively engaged in carrying out this work. The roadbed and roads over its entire length has been carefully cleaned and sprinkled and is in a thoroughly satisfactory condition.

The Bay Ridge Parkway, from Fourth avenue to First avenue, has been carefully looked after. Sewer basins have been rebuilt, tops have been reset and all washouts occasioned by storms have been promptly looked after and repaired. This parkway also is in very fine and creditable condition.

Fourth Avenue and all similar streets under the jurisdiction of this Department have been carefully looked after, sprinkled and cleaned. The trees along these

streets have been well cared for. All decayed and damaged trees have been removed and replaced.

Music.

The concert season closed on September 25, with a grand concert by the United German Singers of Brooklyn, assisted by the Twenty-third Regiment Band. During the season thirty-three concerts were given in Prospect Park and thirty-four in the smaller parks, making a total of sixty-seven. It is estimated that over one million people attended the concerts and that they were thoroughly enjoyed by the residents of this Borough was fully attested by the large crowds.

Revenue From Parks and Parkways.

During the three months from July 1 to September 30, inclusive, the sum of four thousand six hundred dollars and four cents (\$4,600.04) was received from rents of houses and revenue from park privileges, which amount was turned over to Hon. Patrick Keenan, City Chamberlain, for deposit to the credit of the "Revenue Fund."

Section 31a. Every licensed manufacturer and wholesale dealer in fireworks, in signals, in paper caps or in torpedoes, whose place of business is located without the city, shall render to the Fire Commissioner each week a statement verified as to its correctness by an affidavit covering sales and deliveries of fireworks, signals, paper caps and torpedoes for the preceding week within the city.

Every manufacturer of caps and torpedoes within the city shall render to the Fire Commissioner each week a statement, verified as to its correctness by an affidavit covering sales and deliveries of paper caps and torpedoes for the preceding week within the city.

Such report shall be in detail as follows:

(a) Date of delivery.

(b) Name of buyer.

(c) Where delivered.

(d) Quantity and kind of goods delivered.

Resolved, That section 42, Part 5, be and is hereby amended to read as follows: Section 42. No retail permits will be granted for the sale or keeping of fireworks, other than approved firecrackers, in any building or premises,

(a) Where cigars or cigarettes are kept for sale.

(b) Where paints, oils or varnishes are manufactured or kept for use or sale.

(c) Where drygoods of any kind, or other light material of a combustible nature, excepting flags, paper lanterns, paper balloons or decorations, are kept for sale.

(d) In carpenter shops or drug stores; in buildings where kerosene or other product of petroleum is licensed to be sold, or any building in which gunpowder, blasting powder, gun cotton, nitro-glycerine, petroleum, or any of its products, coal oil, camphene, burning fluid, or other products or compounds containing any of said substances, are kept or sold; where matches or cartridges (unless such cartridges are kept in a fire-proof safe or vault) are kept or sold.

(e) Any building or place where tar, pitch, rosin, turpentine, hay, cotton, or hemp is manufactured, stored or kept for sale.

Resolved, That sections 6 and 8 of Part 8 of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations be and are hereby repealed; and be it further

Resolved, That sections 5 and 9 of Part 8 be amended to read as follows:

Section 5. No permit shall be required for the keeping of fifty (50) matchman's gross, or less, of licensed matches for retail sale to consumers.

Section 9. Retail stores may carry not more than fifty matchman's gross of matches, which must be kept in some readily accessible open space in said stores. Cases shall not be placed under the counters or shelving, nor shall they be covered with any inflammable or combustible material. All goods other than in original packages must be placed in a closed case.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Adjourned Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, on Thursday, September 8, 1904, at 2 P. M.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis, and Chief Engineer Smith.

Minutes of September 1, 1904, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of estimates contained in Vouchers Nos. 16342 to 16351, inclusive, amounting to \$335,380.12, which were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

The Construction Committee ordered returned to the Commissioners communication from William J. Flanagan, dated June 28, 1904, asking an extension of time to January 1, 1905, in which to complete his contract for highways, bridge piers, etc., in the Croton River Division, with the recommendation that the request be declined, and that the President be directed to notify the contractor to hasten the work, and that any question of damages will be considered at the conclusion of the contract, according to its terms.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits, thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
