POLICE DEPARTMENT.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING MARCH 31, 1906.

Police Department of The City of New York,
No. 300 Mulberry Street,
New York City, May 11, 1906.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, New York City:

Sir—Supplementary to the report made to you on April 5, 1906, of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending March 31, 1906, there is forwarded to you herewith the statistics, etc., covering the same quarter, which it has been customary to report, in accordance with section 1544, chapter 466, Laws of 1901.

Numerical Strength of Force.

On March 31, 1906, the number of members of the force of all ranks (including those on probation) was 8,819.

Sick Time.

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received, for the quarter, and the details thereof, will be found in the schedule annexed, marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 22,946½ days, the sick time paid was 11,473¼ days, and the sick time unpaid was 11,473¼ days. The total number of days full time of the force was 790,048; per cent. of sick to full time, 2.90, and for preceding quarter, 2.52.

Arrests.

The total number of arrests by the Police force during the quarter was: Males, 37,447; female, 7,675. Total, 45,122. Details are given in schedule annexed, marked "B."

Lost Children.

Males, 244; females, 94. Total, 338. Restored to parents or guardians, 326; other dispositions, 12. Of this number there were disposed of from Central Office 199. See schedule marked "C."

PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD, HELD IN NO. 320 BROADWAY, ON THURSDAY, MAY 17, 1906,

There were present—Alexander E. Orr, President, presiding; John H. Starin, Vice-President; Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor; Comptroller Herman A. Metz, and Commissioners Woodbury Langdon and Morris K. Jesup.

George L. Rives and Albert B. Boardman, Counsel, and George S. Rice, Chief Engineer, also were present.

On opening the meeting President Orr called attention to the fact that there had been not a little misapprehension by newspapers and by the public as to the attitude of the Board. He said that the Board purposed proceeding as rapidly as possible in the preliminary work of laying out the proposed additional routes, and the advertising of the same for bidding. The Mayor thereupon addressed the Board, giving a statement of the financial condition of the City, with respect to the borrowing capacity. He submitted the following statement:

Starting with this amount (\$45,953,695.41) as the margin at January 1, 1906, there may be added thereto as additional borrowing capacity, developing and available throughout the year, the following items:

This amount, added to the margin of \$45,953,695.41 at the beginning of the year, produces together \$132,968,368.28, which will be available for further indebtedness throughout the year 1906.

The Mayor inquired at what date it was expected the work on Contract No. 2 would be completed, especially the section under the river.

The Mayor asked Mr. Rice if it were not true that there is a deformation in the tunnel under the East river; that the contractor had consulted Mr. SooySmith and Mr. Lindenthal about the deformation and that Engineer Charles N. Jacobs had stated that about 1,200 feet of the tunnel would have to be rebuilt; if the clearance in the tunnel was sufficient to run cars through it; if Mr. Pegram, Chief Engineer of the Interborough Company, had not estimated that it would take perhaps sixteen months and Mr. Jacobs that it would take two and one-half years to complete the work?

Mr. Rice explained that there had undoubtedly been considerable difficulty with the work of construction, principally growing out of the fact that the New York Tunnel Company, sub-contractor, had incompetent men in charge of the work. He said he had reported to the Board some time before that he had advised the Interborough Company to discharge a man who had been superintendent, and that they had done so. Notwithstanding the statements of these engineers, he insisted that the work could be finished, with due diligence, so that trains could be running by the first of January.

On motion of the Mayor, the Chief Engineer was directed to prepare and submit to the Board at its next meeting a report on the condition of the work of the Brooklyn subway.

Report of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company was presented as follows and referred to the Committee for its investigation:

DEAR SIR—Replying further to your letter of March 23, transmitting a copy of the report of the committee of your Board, appointed to investigate the frequency and efficiency of the subway service, I have had the matter up with our Transportation Department, and, after a thorough investigation, we have reached the following conclusions with reference to the committee's various suggestions:

That passengers do not properly distribute themselves throughout the trains has been apparent to us for some time, and we are endeavoring to overcome the difficulty by directing them to board the trains at the ends of the platforms, but in this we have only been partially successful.

With reference to the Sunday train service, we find that, while it is necessary at times for a few passengers to stand in the five-car trains, it is owing principally to the irregularity of travel rather than insufficient service. As to starting the express trains earlier on Sunday, so as to accommodate the church people, this we have arranged in accordance with your suggestion, and the trains now begin running at 10.30 a. m. instead of 11.30 a. m., as heretofore. The local Sunday service we believe to be quite adequate. There are, of course, times when passengers are obliged to stand in the West Farms trains, but the travel fluctuates to such a degree that our present service is more than is required on some Sundays to give each passenger a seat.

As stated by your committee, it is, we consider, almost impossible to greatly improve the service during the morning and evening rush hours, although we have this constantly in view and are doing all we can to accomplish it. The intervals at which express trains are operated during the middle of the day and in the evening, we believe, provide a good service. In regard to operating these trains up to 1 o'clock in the morning, our experience has proven that the business does not require it, and we find also that it is impossible to make certain track repairs with any degree of safety to our employees while express trains are being operated, hence the interval during which the service is suspended is utilized for this purpose.

With reference to increased local service during rush hours, it would be impracticable to increase the running time, and to inject additional trains beyond the capacity of the Ninety-sixth street junction switches would, we believe, impair rather than improve the service.

Referring to your suggestion for posting notices at the express stations when express trains are not running, this we are arranging to do.

As you probably know, the subway business fluctuates about twenty per cent. Taking this fact into consideration, and the further fact that your committee based its conclusions wholly on four days' observation, one of which was the maximum for a single day up to that time, we believe that with the adoption of such of the suggestions made by your committee as we are able to put into effect, and with such slight improvements from time to time as we can make, the service will meet the present requirements of the traveling public as nearly as it is possible to meet them under the existing conditions.

The Secretary reported that on the 20th of April the Board of Estimate and Apportionment had adopted a resolution laying out Westchester avenue as a direct thoroughfare, from Main street, Westchester Village, to Eastern Boulevard, in the vicinity of Pelham Bay Park.

The following resolution was moved:

AMENDED ROUTE NO. 19.

Southern Boulevard and Westchester Avenue.

Whereas, This Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York did on the first day of June, 1905, adopt certain resolutions, determining and establishing the route or routes of a certain proposed rapid transit railway or railways in East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, the Southern Boulevard and Westchester avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, and establishing the general plan of construction thereof; and

Whereas, This Board has considered the said route and general plan of construction, and after having duly made thereon the inquest and investigation necessary in the premises, has duly considered and determined that it is for the interest of the public and of The City of New York to rescind the said route and general plan of construction so adopted, and to adopt another and different route or routes and plan of construction for such railway or railways, so that the routes and general plan of construction shall be as hereinafter provided; and

Whereas, This Board has determined that a rapid transit railway for the convenience and transportation of persons and property in addition to those already existing, authorized or proposed is necessary for the interest of the public and The City of New York, and should be established as hereinafter provided.

Now, therefore, this Board does hereby rescind and revoke the said resolutions adopted on the first day of June, 1905, for the said railway along East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, the Southern Boulevard and Westchester avenue, and does hereby adopt the following route for a rapid transit railway in The City of New York, and does hereby determine and establish the said route thereof as follows, and does hereby adopt a general plan of construction of the said railway, the route of which is herein provided, and does in such general plan hereby adopted show the general mode of operation and such details as to manner of construction as may be necessary to show the extent to which any street, avenue or other public place is to be encroached upon and the property abutting thereon affected.

This Board in adopting the said route and general plans expressly reserves all the powers in relation to the construction of the said road which are conferred upon it by section 34 of the Rapid Transit Act. In particular it reserves the right to con-

tract for the construction of the whole road, provided for in the following plans in a single contract; or by separate contracts, executed from time to time, to provide for the construction of parts of said road or for the construction at first of two or more tracks over a part or parts of such road, and afterwards of one or more additional tracks over a part or parts of such road, as the necessities of The City of New York and the increase of its population may in the judgment of this Board require; or to provide in a contract for any part of such railroad that, at a future time, upon the requirement of this Board, the contractor shall construct the remainder or any part of the remainder of said road as the growth of the population or the interests of the City may in the judgment of this Board require.

Route.

A route lying wholly within the Borough of The Bronx and beginning at a point in East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street about three hundred feet easterly from the easterly side of Lincoln avenue, at which point a connection can conveniently be made with a spur from a subway to be hereafter constructed under Lincoln avenue and Morris avenue; and running thence easterly under and along East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to a point near the intersection of the easterly side of Cypress avenue with the centre line of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, at which point the route herein described shall begin to emerge from the ground and shall thence continue in an open cut and upon an embankment and viaduct; and then curving into the Southern Boulevard shall continue upon a viaduct or elevated structure over and along the Southern Boulevard northeasterly to the intersection of the Southern Boulevard with the southerly side of Westchester avenue; there curving easterly, and running thence over and along Westchester avenue or Westchester turnpike upon a viaduct or elevated structure through the former village of Westchester, and over and along the extension of Westchester avenue as the same has been laid out by law, to a point where the said extension of Westchester avenue intersects the westerly side of the Eastern Boulevard.

Plan of Construction.

The general plan of construction adopted for the route hereinabove described is as follows:

For the whole of the said route there shall be three tracks.

All of the tracks shall be substantially parallel to each other and on substantially the same level, except that wherever required by special necessities of surface or sub-surface structures or other special or local necessities, and for the purpose of avoiding grade crossings, any one or more of the tracks may be elevated above or depressed below the level of the other track or tracks to the extent of not more than 20 feet.

The tracks from the point of beginning along East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to the point between Cypress avenue and the Southern Boulevard where the route emerges from the ground, shall be in subway or tunnel; and easterly and northerly from the said point they shall be carried upon a viaduct or elevated structure over and along the above described route on the Southern Boulevard and Westchester avenue and the extension thereof. Near the said point of emergence, the railroad will be constructed partly in open cut and partly on an embankment. If and when all three tracks are constructed, the said open cut and embankment will occupy a space in East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street above forty-five feet in width, extending from Cypress avenue to the Southern Boulevard. The open cut portion will extend easterly from the easterly side of Cypress avenue about three hundred feet, and the embankment will extend easterly from the end of the open cut to the northwesterly side of the Southern Boulevard. The said open cut and embankment will therefore occupy all but about fifty-five feet in width of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, between Cypress avenue and the Southern Boulevard, cutting off passage across the said street in that neighborhood.

The tracks shall be placed in general under or over the central part of the longitudinal streets forming a portion of the route above described, so far as may be practicable and convenient; but wherever required by special or local necessities or for curves, the tracks or any one or more of them may be diverted as far as necessary to one side or the other of such streets or any of them. But no wall of the tunnel, nor the viaduct, nor any part thereof (except at stations, station approaches, curves and places of access to sub-surface structures as hereinafter provided) shall be within a distance of 5 feet of the exterior line or side of the longitudinal streets of the route.

Where the tracks change from tunnel to viaduct, the change shall be so made as to involve the use of the surface to the least possible extent consistent with the proper gradient for the tracks.

Wherever necessary for the proper support of the surface of a street, the roof of the tunnels shall be of iron or steel, with brick or concrete arches, supported when necessary by iron or steel or masonry columns and resting upon masonry walls; or the roof shall be a masonry structure; or the whole of the lining may be of metal.

The roof of the tunnel when under a street shall be as near the surface as street conditions and grades will conveniently permit.

The tunnel shall in no case be less than thirteen feet in height in the clear.

There shall be a width in the tunnel not exceeding fifteen feet for each track, in addition to the thickness of the supporting walls, except that at stations, switches, turnouts, curves and crossovers the width may be increased.

Viaducts shall be built with a width of twelve and one-half feet for each track, except on curves or where greater width is required for special construction, and with an additional width of 3 feet on each side for outside footways. Viaducts may be built of metal or of masonry or of both.

The tracks shall be of standard gauge; that is to say, of the width of 4 feet and 8½ inches between the rails.

Adjacent tracks shall be connected by necessary and suitable switches and connections and an additional track for siding accommodations may be constructed not to exceed in length one-quarter of a mile for each mile of roadway.

The tracks, wherever constructed below the surface, may at any point of the route be placed in the same tunnel; or there may be separate tunnels for one or more tracks, as shall be most convenient.

Stations and station approaches shall, in general, be at the intersection of streets and shall be built under or, if the position of the tracks so require, over the streets and immediately adjoining private abutting property, or through private property to be acquired for the purpose, or both under or over streets and through private property as aforesaid. The streets under which stations or station approaches shall be built may include cross streets, but no part of any cross street shall be used for a station approach at a distance greater than 75 feet from the exterior line or side of the longitudinal street of the route.

Wherever along any part of the routes above described it shall be necessary for the proper maintenance or accommodation of pipes, wires, sewers or other sub-surface structures, the removal, construction or reconstruction of which shall be rendered necessary by the construction of the railway, the width of any tunnel or subway may be enlarged on either or both sides by an additional width on each side of the route, not to exceed 15 feet on either side, provided always that the limits hereinbefore provided as to the longitudinal streets of the route shall be observed. All or any pipes, wires, sewers or other sub-surface structures may be placed in suitable galleries to be constructed within the additional widths hereinbefore permitted. At each cross street where accommodation for pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures shall be those provided within the tunnels or subways, such tunnels or subways, in order to provide convenient access to the same, may have, within the limits of the sides or exterior lines of such cross streets or such lines produced, an additional width on each side of the routes not to exceed 15 feet.

Pipes, wires, sewers, street railway tracks, poles for electric wires and other surface and subsurface structures at any part of the said routes shall be removed or disturbed only when necessary for the construction and operation of the railway above referred to, and if removed or disturbed shall be placed over, upon or under the several streets in such manner and in such location that the use and service thereof shall not be impaired. All pipes, wires, sewers and other subsurface structures shall be left or shall be so arranged as to give free access for their repair or alteration, or for the placing with them, so far as there may be space, of new pipes, wires, sewers and other like structures, and for making connections between the same and abutting buildings at any time.

The manner of construction of subways shall be by tunneling or open excavation.

In parks, parkways and public places under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, all trees injured or destroyed in the course of construction shall be replaced under the direction and to the satisfaction of said Department.

Mode of Operation.

The general mode of operation of the route or routes above described shall be by electricity or some other power not requiring combustion within the tunnels, and the motors shall be capable of moving trains at a speed of not less than forty miles per hour for long distances, exclusive of stops.

Definitions.

The word "street" wherever used herein shall include an avenue, boulevard or public place.

The words "Rapid Transit Act" wherever used herein shall be taken and held to mean chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, as amended by chapter 752 of the Laws of 1894 and other acts of the Legislature.

Maps and Drawings.

It is further

Resolved, That the maps and drawings entitled "Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners of The City of New York—Routes and General Plan," one of the said drawings being marked "Key Map No. 1, Borough of Bronx," three of the said drawings being marked "Bronx No. 1," sheets Nos. 16, 17 and 18, and one of the said drawings being marked "Bronx No. 2, sheet No. 1," be and they are hereby adopted as showing the foregoing routes and general plans, for convenience merely, and that said maps and drawings are not to be deemed a part of the description of the routes or a part of the general plans for any purpose whatever.

(In voting, the Mayor stated that he reserved the right to act independently on the matter when it came before him as Mayor.)

At this point the Mayor withdrew from the meeting.

Communication of the Deputy Comptroller, with report of the Chief Engineer, as to claim of Mahony Brothers for \$1,860.50, alleged to be due for loss of rent, etc., for premises at the northwest corner of Elm and Prince streets, between the years 1900 and 1902, was presented, and the Secretary was instructed to forward copy of the Chief Engineer's report, with photographs, to the Department of Finance for its information.

The following minute was presented:

The Rapid Transit Board desire to place on record an official expression of their sincere regret occasioned by the resignation of their late associate, John Claffin. It would be difficult to overestimate the value to the Board and to the City of the services of Mr. Claffin. One of the original members of the Board named in the act of the Legislature which created it, he has served continuously upon it from the beginning, with the exception of a little more than two years. He was the Treasurer of the Board from its inception till 1899, when that office was discontinued, all the financial work being done from that time through the Comptroller's office.

During all the important early period of the Board, his prompt and mature judgment was of great assistance in the laying out of routes and the preparation of contracts, and subsequently during the time of construction of the railroads under Contracts Nos. 1 and 2, his wise counsel was never lacking when an important problem was to be solved.

More than this, aside from the feeling of official kinship which naturally grows out of the fact of having served together with him on the same Board in furthering the same great public work for so many years, each Commissioner has a personal feeling of loss at the retirement of a friend from a long-accustomed post of duty. For these reasons it is desired to place upon the record our great regret at Mr. Claffin's resignation from the Rapid Transit Commission.

The following correspondence on slot machines, under Contract No. 2, in lower Broadway, was presented as follows:

NEW YORK, May 7, 1906.

Hon. A. E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Board:

DEAR SIR—I report that the slot machines which were placed in the subway stations south of Ann street were removed this morning at a quarter after 11. There were 26 slot machines for the sale of chewing-gum and chocolate, and these machines are now in possession of the Rapid Transit Board at one of its offices.

When I found that these machines had been placed as they were yesterday, I called upon Division Engineer George Hallett Clark to see that they were removed, and he did this work with the engineering force under his charge. It was my intention to have the machines placed with the Bureau of Incumbrances, but they refused to accept them unless the Rapid Transit Board would assume responsibility for their condition, and for that reason the machines were placed in one of the Division offices.

Before any disposition is made of these machines, I would respectfully call attention to the fact that the Board has been put to some expense in the hiring of trucks for their removal, and should the machines be left in our care for any length of time that a reasonable charge for storage should be added to this expense for truckage. The manner in which the machines were put into the subway stations, I think, entitles the Board to some reimbursement for the expense incurred. It therefore occurs to me that it might be better to have formal notification sent by the Board to Messrs. Ward & Gow that, if they want their machines, they will be surrendered on the payment of a proper sum, and to that end I could render you a statement of what expense we have been put to, if necessary.

Our association, many of the members of which reside in the locality around those stations, and some of whom are at present using the station facilities at One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street, feel strongly that, notwithstanding the somewhat adverse expression of your Chief Engineer, the needs of the locality will demand, entirely apart from any complication introduced by the present use of the ball grounds, the establishment of escalators at both stations. The One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street station is at present used by the residents in the entire district, from about One Hundred and Sixtieth street to One Hundred and Ninetieth street, and as the present growth of apartment houses is progressing with extraordinary rapidity, we feel that the service for residents alone will justify the convenience and security which escalators will afford.

Beyond this, we are to anticipate on the opening of the One Hundred and Eighty-first street station, the introduction of a large cross-town traffic by the new surface railroad over Washington Bridge.

We trust that this matter, which, in the judgment of many of our resident members making use of the stations, is of vital importance, and which, we understand, is to be seriously considered by the Interborough Railroad officials, may be enforced by the favorable action of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners.

DEAR SIR—Mr. McAdoo, president of the New York and Jersey Railroad Company, has submitted plans for a change of grade along the Sixth Avenue extension, as well as plans for some of the stations on this line, and I beg to report as follows:

The plan showing the modified grades along Sixth Avenue is only slightly different from the profiles of the grades as already passed upon by the Board, and these slight changes are established to accommodate the definite location of the stations on this line.

The plans of the stations submitted are very incomplete. They show a station to be located at Fourteenth street, while the present plan only shows the east platform of this station, which has entrances on private property at the southeast corner of Sixth Avenue and Fourteenth street. The station at Nineteenth street shows entrances on the east side as well as on the west side through private property; and the station at Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets shows only the east platform of same, which has an entrance on private property on the east side of Sixth Avenue, between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets. Plans for stations north of Twenty-third street have not yet been submitted.

The entrances to the station platforms are from the large stores along Sixth Avenue, which is very desirable from the standpoint of the general public, with exception that it will make ventilation of the subway more difficult; but this is a question that will have to be dealt with at a later date.

Although these plans are very incomplete, both in regard to detail as well as general layout, and although they do not indicate any arrangement for ventilating the stations, I think the general arrangement as far as it goes is a good one, and from an engineering standpoint I do not see any reason for objecting to the same.

2. Plan entitled "New York and Jersey Railroad—Sixth Avenue Extension—Fourteenth Street and Sixth Avenue," No. 2395, dated May 8, 1906, showing platform on the east side of Sixth Avenue at Fourteenth street, with approach through the private property known as the Fourteenth Street Store.

3. Plan entitled "New York and Jersey Railroad—Sixth Avenue Extension—Nineteenth Street and Sixth Avenue," No. 2316-A, dated April 14, 1906, showing platform on the east side of Sixth Avenue at Nineteenth street, with approach through the private property known as the Siegel-Cooper Company store, and platform on the west side of Sixth Avenue at Nineteenth street, showing approach through the private property known as the Simpson Crawford Company store.

4. Plan entitled "New York and Jersey Railroad—Sixth Avenue Extension—Twenty-third Street and Sixth Avenue," No. 2397, dated May 8, 1906, showing platform on the east side of Sixth Avenue at Twenty-third street, with approach through the private property known as the James McCreery & Co. store.

4½. Plan entitled "New York and Jersey Railroad—Sixth Avenue Extension—Plan of Hudson Street Station."

We have been unable up to the present time to make definite arrangements respecting the approaches for the station platforms on the west side of Sixth Avenue at

Fourteenth and Twenty-third streets, but we shall submit plans for these platforms and approaches as soon as possible. It is necessary, however, for the speedy prosecution of our work that we proceed at once with the construction of these platforms on the east side.

5. We also submit a cross-section of the proposed type of subway construction under Sixth avenue, entitled "New York and Jersey Railroad—Sixth Avenue Extension—Standard Cross-Section," No. 2206-A, dated January 27, 1906.

The franchise provides that the uppermost part of the tunnel shall not approach nearer than three feet to the surface of Sixth avenue, but in Sixth avenue the roof of the tunnel shall be as near the surface of the street as street conditions and grades will permit.

6. We hand you herewith a plan entitled "New York and Jersey Railroad—Profile of Sixth Avenue Extension," which shows the profile of the tunnel, the same being located under Sixth avenue, as required by the franchise, as near the surface thereof as street conditions and grades will permit.

DEAR SIR—As the Interborough Rapid Transit Company have concluded not to use the entrance from the basement of the Empire Building at Rector street for an entrance to the Wall street station, I wrote on April 6 to the president of the company requesting him to "direct that the wall of the station be built across the foot of the stairway put in by the company connecting the station platform with our basement hall, thus restoring to us the portion of the vault under the sidewalk which the company will not need, and also to restore the wall and doors at the top of said stairway to the condition they were in before the same were removed by the company."

On April 13 the president of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company wrote in reply: "The entrance to the Wall street station from the Empire Building was constructed under the direction of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners. If you desire to close it up, this company has no objection to your doing so, provided you do not encroach beyond the line of the present partition or interfere in any manner with the cleanliness of the station."

The connection with our building was not made at our request, and was made under your direction. Owing to the unwillingness of the company to make an equitable agreement as to the care of the portion of our premises involved in the connection, for a year our hallway has been separated from the station by an unsafe and unsightly board partition put up by the parties who removed our wall. We, therefore, request your Board to order the proper party to restore to us the portion of the vault belonging to us which the subway company does not need or intend to use, and also to restore the wall of our basement hall to the condition it was in before its removal by parties acting under your authority.

Report of the Chief Engineer as to the necessity for drip pans under elevated structures was presented as follows, and referred to the Chief Engineer to confer with the Interborough Company on the subject:

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, No. 320 Broadway, New York City:

DEAR SIR—I have had referred to me a copy of the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, dated February 14, 1906, requesting the Interborough Rapid Transit Company to place drip pans on the elevated structure over the crosswalks at Southern Boulevard and Westchester avenue.

In reference to this matter, I desire to report as follows:

It seems desirable that drip pans should be placed at the following points:

First—Under the uptown track at the southeast corner of Third and Westchester avenues, where the structure runs over the sidewalks, and also over the walk crossing Westchester avenue on the east side of Third avenue. Besides being a transfer point for the Union Railway, there is considerable traffic at this point.

Second—Under the subway connection at Brook and Westchester avenues, where the structure is very low, and has many openings in it. At this point also it runs over the sidewalk.

Third—Under the downtown and middle tracks at the corner of Westchester avenue and Southern Boulevard, where the structure is over the sidewalk. This is also a transfer point for the Union Railway Company.

Fourth—Under the turnouts to One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street terminal yard, where the structure is over the sidewalk for a distance of 150 to 200 feet.

Fifth—Over the walks crossing Boston road at One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, where there is a great deal of traffic. This is a transfer point for the Union Railway Company.

Sixth—Over all crosswalks under the stations. At these points the structure, including station platforms, covers the whole width of the street.

Hon. A. E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Board:

DEAR SIR—At the meeting of the Board held on April 5 a report from counsel was submitted on the proposition of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company for a connection between the feed wires of the subway and those of a street railway, and it was referred to me for a report as to the facts in the matter.

I beg leave to report that the Interborough Rapid Transit Company have laid ducts from a manhole located near the center of St. Nicholas avenue, where this intersects the north curb line of One Hundred and Eighty-first street produced; this duct line running east on One Hundred and Eighty-first street about two feet below the surface of same, and consisting of 2-4 way and 1-2 way ducts. The length of this duct line, from the manhole to the extended east building line of St. Nicholas avenue is 44 feet, and has been built by the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company. The probable intention is to carry cables through these ducts and supply the new street surface line on One Hundred and Eighty-first street with power from the Rapid Transit substation No. 17, near the north portal of Fort George tunnel.

I inclose herewith one print of drawing marked S-115, made by the New York City Interborough Railway Company, showing the location in a general way of the duct line referred to above.

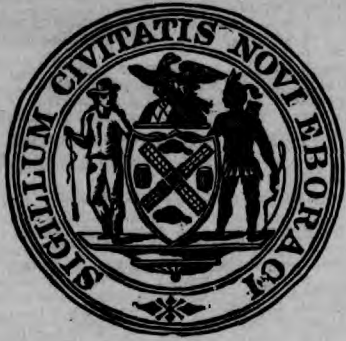
