#### Communications Received.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: During the week ending May 12, 49 operations were performed at Bellevue, 9 at Gouverneur, 6 at Harlem and 4 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending surgeons were present.

Authority is requested to prepare a form of certificate for members of the staff serving one year.

At the request of the United States Immigration authorities a patient was admitted to the Psychopathic Ward on April 30 and remained until May 4. As the steamship company is willing to pay for her care while here, it is recommended that the charge per day be fixed by the Board of Trustees.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That authority be given the General Medical Superintendent to prepare a form of certificate for members of the house staff serving one year, said certificate to have the approval of the Executive Committee.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the charge for non-resident patients in the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals be fixed at \$1.50 a day.

#### Communications.

A communication was received from Dr. Joseph B. Bissell, Secretary of the Executive Committee of the Bellevue Hospital Medical Board, transmitting the minutes of the Committee for the meeting held on May 9.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, these minutes were placed on file and the matter of providing a conveyance for the attending physicians and surgeons called in emergency cases at night was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for further investigation.

A communication dated May 9 was received from Dr. Le Roy J. Smith applying for the position of Admitting Physician to Bellevue Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That this communication be placed on file.

A communication dated May 15 was received from Messrs. John R. Sheehan & Co. concerning the work at Gouverneur Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, A dispute has arisen between the architect and the contractors for Gouverneur Hospital, which dispute has given rise to delay in the payment of bills submitted by the contractors; and

Whereas, Said contractors (Messrs. John R. Sheehan & Co.) have suggested to the Board of Trustees that a representative of the Department of Finance be appointed to examine the building with the architect and the contractors; therefore be it

Resolved, That this course be authorized by the Board of Trustees for the purpose of making an examination of the work and reporting upon the same to this Board; and further

Resolved, That this decision of the Board be communicated to the architect and that he be requested to ask the co-operation of the Department of Finance.

A communication dated May 3 was received from Mr. Raymond F. Almirall concerning the specifications for the Vacuum sweeping systems.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That, whereas the Board of Trustees is informed by the architect, Mr. Raymond F. Almirall, that the cleaning systems advertised for are not patented, an advertisement be inserted in the CITY RECORD immediately calling for bids on the installation of the vacuum cleaning system in Gouverneur Hospital only.

A communication dated May 2 was received from Dr. Louis M. Kommel applying for a position in the Fordham Out-Patient Department.

On motion, duly seconded, this communication was placed on file.

A communication was received from Dr. A. F. Brugman, Secretary of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital, transmitting the minutes of the Board for the meeting held on April 30, 1906.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, Dr. Bertram S. Bickelhaupt, No. 630 East One Hundred and Sixty-second street, and Dr. L. J. Placek, No. 1849 First avenue, were appointed to the house staff of Fordham Hospital, their terms of service beginning respectively July 1, 1906, and January 1, 1907, upon the recommendation of the Examination Committee and the endorsement of the Fordham Hospital Medical Board.

#### Reports of Committees.

Mr. Tierney, of the Committee on Buildings, presented a letter from Mr. J. H. Freedlander, consulting architect of Harlem Hospital, with plans for the fence and lay out of the grounds at the new Harlem Hospital. He submitted also draft of a reply in which he called attention to the inadvisability of using soil in the preparation of the tennis court, and recommended that the fence be 6 feet in height instead of 7½ as planned by the architect.

On motion, duly seconded, the letter of Mr. Tierney was endorsed by the Board of Trustees.

Mr. Robbins, of the Committee on Rules, reported that the Committee had held one meeting to consider the question of the method by which names of applicants for medical appointments should be presented to the Conference Committee, and would consider the question further.

#### Unfinished Business.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the rules presented by a sub-committee of the Executive Committee on anaesthesia in the Out-Patient Department of Bellevue Hospital, having been endorsed by the Executive Committee and the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital, were approved by the Board of Trustees and the Superintendent was directed to post copies in the various rooms of the Out-Patient Department.

#### New Business.

Mr. Robbins gave notice of a motion to be made by him at the next meeting that rules 3 and 4 in the order of business of the Board of Trustees be reversed, making the reports of committees take precedence of communications.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, Mr. Robbins was elected Secretary pro tem. of the Board of Trustees to act during the absence of Mr. Paulding.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

Reports and resolutions were awarded as follows:

Ratifying and confirming the action of the Committee on Finance in assigning Mr. Joseph E. Savage to work in connection with the new statistical plan, at a salary of thirteen hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,350) per annum, to take effect March 27, 1906, and suspending all by-laws and parts of by-laws inconsistent herewith for the purposes of this resolution.

Appropriating the sum of twenty-eight thousand six hundred and seventy-three dollars and eighty cents (\$28,673.80) from the proceeds of Corporate Stock, to be issued by the Comptroller pursuant to sections 47 and 169 of the Revised Charter, application for the issue of which is hereby made; said sum to be applied to the purchase of the lands and premises on Evergreen avenue and Grove street, Borough of Brooklyn, adjoining Public School 75.

Requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize a renewal of the lease of the double parlors on the first floor of the premises No. 28 Macdougall street, Borough of Manhattan, occupied as an annex to Public School 8, for a period of one year from May 1, 1906, at an annual rental of \$420, and on the same terms and conditions as contained in the heretofore existing lease. Owners, Richmond Hill House, Incorporated; Seymour L. Cromwell, No. 36 Broad street, New York City, Treasurer.

Rescinding so much of the report and resolution adopted December 10, 1902, as refers to awarding to Charles Wille a contract for improving premises at Public School 23, Borough of Queens, in the sum of \$3,500.

Rescinding and returning so much of the appropriation of one hundred and seventy-five thousand five hundred and fifty-two dollars (\$175,552) from the proceeds of Corporate Stock (Journal, 1902, pages 2776-77) as relates to a contract awarded to Charles Wille for improving premises of Public School 23, Borough of Queens, amounting to thirty-five hundred dollars (\$3,500), to the fund from which it was originally appropriated.

Discharging the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation from further consideration of the communication from the Interborough Association of Women Teachers.

Selecting and determining as a site for school purposes lands and premises on Orchard avenue, Fifth and Sixth streets, Elmhurst, in Local School Board District No. 42, Borough of Queens, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$5,250; and requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to take such action as may be necessary and proper for the acquisition of said lands.

Fining Joseph L. Pascal, a teacher in Public School 26, Borough of Manhattan, five days' pay for violation of the by-law prohibiting corporal punishment.

Deeming it inadvisable to grant the request in the communication dated May 2, 1906, of the Organization of the "General Slocum" Survivors.

Requesting the Board of Superintendents to arrange for the transfer of Miss Katherine R. Callahan, acting principal of Public School 115, Borough of Brooklyn, to some other school where she will have a better opportunity of displaying her capabilities; and requesting after a reasonable time that the Board of Examiners reconsider her application for a principal's license.

Granting the members of the clerical staff and like employees of the Board of Education leave of absence for thirty working days in each calendar year, said thirty days to cover the regular summer vacation and any and all other absence, including tardiness; and all additional absence and tardiness beyond said allowance of thirty working days shall be charged against and deducted proportionately from the salaries of persons thus absent, unless the appropriate committee shall excuse the same by reason of the existence of special and unusual circumstances; but nothing herein contained shall be deemed to permit of the absence of employees at any time unless with the permission of the appropriate committee or head of bureau and for satisfactory reasons.

Requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve the following transfers:

From the General School Fund for the year 1901, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, \$500, which fund is in excess of its requirements, to the General School Fund for the same year, Borough of Queens, which fund is insufficient for its purposes.

From the Special School Fund for the year 1900, and from the item contained therein entitled Incidental Expenses, \$500, Borough of Brooklyn, which item is in excess of its requirements, to the General School Fund for the same year, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, which fund is insufficient for its purposes.

Appropriating the sum of twenty-four hundred and seventy-two dollars and thirty cents (\$2,472.30) from premiums derived from the sale of Corporate Stock, heretofore issued by the Comptroller pursuant to sections 47 and 169 of the revised Charter; said sum to be applied in payment of bills to be incurred by the Committee on Buildings, for and on behalf of the Board of Education, with the Superintendent of State Prisons and the following named contractors for furniture, tanks, etc., as per our specifications and at prices fixed by the State Board of Classification, for the following schools:

Resolved, That the sum of eight hundred and forty-five dollars (\$845) be and the same is hereby appropriated from the proceeds of Corporate Stock, to be issued by the Comptroller, pursuant to sections 47 and 169 of the Revised Charter, application for the issue of which is hereby made; said sum to be applied in full payment for extra cost to Carke & Stowe and Thomas Cockerill & Son, contractors, for additional work in connection with their contracts as hereinbefore stated; requisition for said sum being hereby made upon the Comptroller.

Whereas, Different opinions exist as to the best method of regulating the heating and ventilating of the large buildings in this City; and

Whereas, It is desirable to get the best possible system for use in the public school buildings; and

Whereas, It may be helpful to the present Building Committee to have a special committee appointed to examine methods of ventilating and heating;

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed to investigate all heating plants in the large public buildings and schools, and report back through the Building Committee to this Board such suggestions or recommendations as may seem worthy of consideration and adoption.

Whereas, A request has been received from the President of the Borough of Manhattan for the transfer of Jacob Brilles, Cleaner in Public School 188, Borough of Manhattan; be it

Resolved, That consent is hereby given to the transfer of Jacob Brilles, Cleaner in Public School 188, Borough of Manhattan, to the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment has authorized the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of title to certain lands and premises on Eastern parkway and Herkimer street, Borough of Brooklyn, heretofore selected by the Board of Education as a site for school purposes; and

Whereas, The said lands and premises are urgently required for school purposes, and title thereto should be acquired by The City of New York at as early a date as possible; therefore be it

Davis as District Superintendent to fill the vacancy to be caused by the retirement of Mr. Arthur McMullin.

Adopted by unanimous vote.

The Secretary cast one ballot, as instructed.

The President thereupon announced that Mr. Albert Shiels had been duly elected a District Superintendent to fill the vacancy caused by the election of Mr. Gustave Straubenmuller as an Associate City Superintendent, and for the unexpired term of Mr. Straubenmuller, and that Mr. John W. Davis had been duly elected a District Superintendent for a full term of six years, to fill the vacancy which will be caused by the retirement of Mr. Arthur McMullin on September 1, 1906.

On motion, all absent members were excused for non-attendance at this meeting.



## GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
