# Notice of Public Hearing.

# Building Districts and Restrictions.

In the Matter of the Adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of Resolutions:

(1) Regulating and limiting throughout the City of New York the heights and bulk of buildings hereafter erected and regulating and determining the area of yards, courts and other open spaces, and dividing the City into districts to carry out the purposes of said regulations, pursuant to the provisions of Section 242a of the Greater New York Charter, and

(2) Regulating and restricting throughout the City of New York the location of trades and industries and the location of buildings designed for specified uses, and dividing the City into districts to carry out the purposes of said regulations pursuant to the provisions of Section 242b of the Greater New York Charter.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to all persons interested in the above entitled matters, and to the owners, lessees and occupants of all buildings and lots, and improved and unimproved lands within the City of New York, and to all others whom it may concern, to wit:

First—The Commission duly appointed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of Sections 242a and 242b of the Greater New York Charter, have filed with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment their FINAL RE-PORT containing, among other matters, a proposed resolution designed to provide the above described regulations. This report will be open to the inspection of the public during office hours, in the office of the Secretary of the Committee on City Plan of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Room 501, Municipal Building, until June 19, 1916.

Second—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment will hold a public hearing on the FINAL REPORT AND PLANS submitted by said Commission, at 10:30 a.m. on JUNE 19, 1916, in Room 16 of the City Hall, at which time and place an opportunity to be heard will be afforded to all persons interested.

Contracts.

The total number of contracts executed and registered during the quarter was 33. There were 27 contracts completed during the quarter, aggregating \$1,104,111.35, and work is going on in connection with 45 contracts, aggregating \$1,091,432.36, on which \$327,723.93 in payments have been made. There are five contracts, representing an estimated cost of \$121,951.45, awarded, but not registered.

Twenty-three assessment lists were forwarded to the Board of Assessors.

Bureau of Highways.

The total mileage of pavement in the Borough on June 30, 1915, was 185.182 miles, of which 0.282 miles were Medina block, 47.308 miles granite block, 54.022 miles of sheet asphalt, 59.168 asphalt block, 4.376 miles wood block, 0.039 miles brick, 1.545 miles iron slag pavement, 0.077 miles trap, 18.365 miles bituminous pavement.

The total amount of pavement laid during the quarter was 2.874 miles, as follows: Sheet asphalt, 1.033 miles; granite block, 0.476 miles; bituminous concrete, 1.365 miles—2.874 miles; asphalt block decrease, 0.192; net increase during quarter, 2.682 miles.

Bureau of Sewers.

During the quarter there were built 3,117.0 feet, equalling 0.59 miles of vitrified pipe sewers from 12-inch to 30-inch in diameter; 5,714.25 linear feet, equalling 1.08 miles, of concrete sewers, from 29 inches by 40 inches to 11 feet 3 inches by 6 feet 6 inches; making a total of 8,831.25 linear feet, or 1.67 miles, thus making the total mileage of the sewerage system 347.23 miles.

Twenty basins were built, making a total of 3,861 basins connected with the sewerage system.

Bureau of Sewers and Highways-Maintenance.

Maintenance of Sewers—Sewers examined, 35,128 linear feet; manholes examined, 572; sewers cleaned, 161,701 linear feet; receiving basins cleaned, 1,428; manholes cleaned, 12; pipe, stone and box drains cleaned, 10,452 linear feet; open drains or ditches cleaned, 27,841 linear feet; sewers repaired, 1,180 linear feet; receiving basins repaired, 24; manholes repaired, 58; pipe, stone and box drains or culverts built, 1,040 linear feet; open drains or ditches repaired, 837; flush tanks cleaned, 2; open drains or ditches built, 126 linear feet; sewer alterations, 135 cubic feet; deposit removed from sewers by hired carts, 856 loads; deposits removed from receiving basins by hired carts, 1,245 loads; buckets of deposit removed from receiving basins by auto truck, 1,589; sheathing and shoring driven and drawn in connection with repairs to sewers, 433 linear feet; concrete cut out and relaid in connection with repairs to sewers, 297 cubic feet; excavating and filling in in connection with repairs to sewers, 55,144 cubic feet; concrete mixed and laid in connection with repairs to sewers, 81 cubic feet; bulkheads built in connection with fepairs to sewers, 2.

Maintenance of Highways—Bridges, viaducts and steps, having a surface area of 53,919 square yards, were cleaned daily. Macadamized streets to the extent of 123 miles in length and an average width of 20 feet were cleaned and kept sanitary where necessary. Earth roads to the extent of 144.50 miles in length and an average of 30 feet in width were cleaned, repaired when necessary and kept in the best possible condition for use. Crosswalks on all important thoroughfares were kept clean.

Miscellaneous Repairs-Planking of bridges repaired, 18,064 square feet; iron slag pavement (surface and base) repaired, 16 square yards; granite pavement (surface only), grout joints repaired, 55 square yards; granite pavement (surface and base), grout joints repaired, 47 square yards; granite pavement on sand repaired, 8,902 square yards; granite pavement (surface only), tar and gravel, 1,469 square yards; granite pavement (surface and base), tar and gravel, 699 square yards; asphalt block pavement (surface only) repaired, 272 square yards; wood block pavement (surface and base), repaired, 328 square yards; asphalt block pavement (surface and base) repaired, 12 square yards; concrete pavement repaired, 2 square yards; granite block gutters repaired, 5,814 square feet; concrete curb repaired, 5 linear feet; bluestone or granite curb reset on concrete, 469 linear feet; bluestone or granite curb reset on sand, 4,220 linear feet; bluestone flagging repaired, 4,518 square feet; crosswalks reset, 21,581 square feet; macadam roads resurfaced with screenings, 1,091 square yards; macadam roads repaired, 9,953 square yards; macadam roads resurfaced, 3,173 square yards; macadam roads (Telford), covered with broken asphalt, 726 square yards; macadam roads repaired with tarvia "A," 20,783 square yards; native stone curb laid, 3,154 linear feet; earth roads treated with asphalt road oil, 883,563 square yards; macadam roads treated with tarvia "B," and grits, 252,652 square yards; macadam roads, temporary repairs with tarvia "A," trap rock and grits, 157 square yards; ash sidewalks laid and repaired, 18,285 square yards; guard rail repaired, 2,464 linear feet.

Administration-Executive: Communications answered, including statements, 1,358; sidewalk and guard rail notices sent, 844; complaints received and disposed of

1,555; reports of investigations by Inspectors disposed of, 1,474. Street Signs-Street signs replaced and erected, 685; sign posts painted, 107 street signs painted, 339; street sign posts erected, 81; opal glass for stencil street signs placed, 368.

Live Stock Service-The stable, including carriages, wagons and harness, has been maintained and kept in repair to meet the service required.

Motor Vehicle Service-The garage, including 12 automobiles and 3 auto trucks and repair shop, has been maintained and repaired to meet the service required. Stores Service-The storeroom and yard have been maintained at full efficiency to meet the service required.

Equipment Service-The repair shop, rolling stock, steam rollers, hand imple ments and tools have been maintained and kept in repair to meet the service required. Division of Subsurface Structures and Permits.

During the quarter, a Topographical Survey, including the location of curb lines, car tracks, sewer manholes, hydrants, elevated railroad columns, gas drips, water gate boxes and other surface evidence of subsurface structures has been made as

A survey of 25 sheets of Section 14 was made covering 7.2 miles of streets included in 170 acres.

Examinations of the various subsurface structures have been made in the territory covered by 251.6 acres.

These investigations consist in the opening of all sewer manholes, receiving basins, water gate boxes, subway manholes, etc., measuring interiors of structures and noting size and depths of all pipes entering same.

In connection with the authorization of proposed public improvements, eighteen reports have been made as to the existing surface and subsurface structures. During the quarter the street openings for water taps and repairs, sewer connec-

tions, gas services and repairs, new mains, etc., have been examined and the information relative to the subsurface structures exposed therein has been recorded and filed. The territory surveyed prior to April 1, 1915, was 2,449.2 acres; surveyed during the quarter ended June 30, 1915, 170.0 acres; total territory surveyed, 2,619.2 acres.

Locations of the following new mains were made and recorded during the quarter: Water mains, 3,730 linear feet; gas mains. 8,590 linear feet; duct lines, 10,620

All information obtained from the examination of street openings is recorded on the maps, and the finished ones are thus kept up to date.

The work in the drafting room during the quarter consisted in plotting the topographical survey, including the layout of 5 sheets, covering thirty-four acres.

The total number of sheets on which all information was plotted, including that obtained from the records of the various departments and offices of public service corporations and from street openings was: Prior to April 1, 1915, 276; plotted during quarter, 64; total sheets plotted to date, 340.

The total number of sheets colored prior to April 1, 1915, was 108; colored during quarter ending June 30, 1915, 9; total completed and colored to date, 117. The total length of streets shown on completed sheets prior to April 1, 1915, was

164,690 feet; on sheets completed during quarter ending June 30, 1915, 13,650 feet; total to date, 178,340, or 33.8 miles.

The following statement shows the character and number of permits, also the number of sewer inspections and complaints relating to permits:

Street openings for sewer connections. 258; street openings for sewer repairs, 40 street openings for Croton connections, 342; street openings for Croton repairs, 227; street openings for gas mains, 67; street openings for gas service pipes, 267; street openings for repairs to gas mains, 90; street openings for repairs to gas service, 166; street openings for constructing subways, 29; street openings for constructing vaults, 8; for occupying the street with building material, 154; for crossing the sidewalk with teams, 147; for moving house on public highway, 6; for miscellaneous permits, 1,338; for erecting temporary sidewalk shed, 2; total, 3,141.

Sewer inspections, 904; complaints relating to permits, 183; permits renewed, 789; permits revoked, 59; total, 5,076.

Topographical Bureau.

Work Pone-11 maps showing street changes (grades and lines) were forwarded for adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; 6 maps showing street changes (grades and lines) in triplicate were forwarded for filing by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; 9 maps showing street changes (sewerage districts, etc.) were filed in the vault of the Topographical Bureau relative to the Borough of The Bronx.

39 orders for examining and setting monuments in connection with street improvements were attended to. 96 concrete monuments were made. 238 monuments were set. 73 monuments were reset. 2 rule maps, in triplicate, for 6 streets were made. 2 draft damage maps, in triplicate, for 4 streets, comprising 45 plots covering 153,507.73 square feet, or 61.403 city lots, were made. 3 benefit maps, covering 2,065 plots, were made. 378 final copies of damage and benefit maps were made.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

The attendance at the Interior Public Bath, 156th st. and Elton ave., was 49,870 males and 8,396 females.

Local Boards.

Seventy-two petitions were received as follows: For laying out new streets, avenues, etc., 4; for laying out a change of grade, 2; for laying out a change of lines and grades, 3; for laying out a change of lines, 1; for locating, laying out and for discontinuing, 1; for reduction of width, 1; for reduction of width, change of lines and grades, 1; for widening, 3; for acquiring title, 7; for regulating, grading, setting curbstones, flagging sidewalks, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary, together with all work incidental thereto, 9; for regulating and laying sidewalks where necessary, together with all work incidental thereto, 1; for regulating, grading and regrading, setting and resetting curb, laying and relaying sidewalks and crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary, together with all work incidental thereto, 1; for paving with bituminous concrete on a cement concrete foundation (preliminary pavement), adjusting curb where necessary, together with all work incidental thereto, 6; for paving with granite blocks on a sand foundation (preliminary pavement), setting curb where necessary, together with all work incidental thereto, 1; for paving with granite blocks on a concrete foundation (permanent pavement) where the gradients are over 3 per cent., and with sheet asphalt on a concrete foundation (permanent pavement) where the gradients are 3 per cent. or less, 1; for constructing sewers and appurtenances, together with all work incidental thereto, 15; for constructing receiving basins and appurtenances, together with all work incidental thereto, in accordance with section 435 of Greater New York Charter, as amended, 1; for filling in sunken lots, 1; for excavating material, erecting guard rails, flagging or reflagging sidewalks, 13. Of the petitions considered there were adopted 17, laid over 20, denied 5, rescinded 2, filed 11, amended 10, recommended 3, reaffirmed 1, referred 1, laid on table, 1, and 1 withdrawn.

Bureau of Highways.

Contracts amounting to \$207,403.20, chargeable to appropriations, Corporate Stock and the Street Improvement Fund, were entered into by this bureau during the quarter. Contracts chargeable to budget appropriations were for paving blocks of various kinds, lumber, trap rock and trap rock screenings, used in the care and maintenance of highways. Those chargeable to other funds were for paving and repaying streets.

Two assessment lists, in duplicate, for original improvements, were completed. aggregating in value \$12,792.36, and sent to the Board of Assessors. One profile was transmitted to the Board of Assessors. Fifty-one plans for new work were made, of which number 36 were for paving, twelve for repaving and three for side-

walks; there were also prepared 52 sets of specifications, five copies of each.

Of reports for original improvements initiated in the Local Board upon petition of property owners, 227 were made, giving the estimated quantities of materials required, estimated cost, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment, according to the last preceding tax roll. Of this number nine were for paving, seven for regulating and paving combined, ten for regulating, grading, curbing and sidewalks only, three for fencing lots and 198 for sidewalk repairs. During this period 36 surveys were made for the Law Department.

Macadam repairs, 2,488 square yards; macadam cleaned, 948 square yards; dirt roads repaired (hand), 49,637 square yards; ash sidewalks, 17,007 square yards; miscellaneous gutters paved, 4 square yards; paved gutters cleaned, 1,615 square yards; dirt sidewalks built, 156 square yards; cesspools cleaned or repaired, 11; cesspools built, 4; wooden drains

In addition there was considerable miscellaneous work, consisting of bridge repairs, drainage, miscellaneous trucking, repairing tools and equipment, filling washouts and removing incumbrances.

Municipal Asphalt Plant-The total plant product was: 2,298 boxes of wearing surface mixture, 21,601.2 cubic feet; 738 boxes of binder mixture, 7,195.5 cubic feet, Work performed by gangs: 8,206.2 cubic feet wearing surface mixture laid; 3,185.8 cubic feet binder surface; plant repairs, inspections, etc.

Chemical Testing Laboratory-Portland cements, 70 samples; asphalt surface mixtures, 91 samples; miscellaneous samples, 280.

Division of Incumbrances. The total number of complaints received from all sources during the quarter was 1,470, divided as follows: Mail, 304; office, 227, inspectors, 629; police, 309; Street

Incumbrances removed by the bureau: Boulders, 670; trees, etc., 224; posts, poles. etc., 191; miscellaneous (loads of earth dumped), 810; wagon (demolished), 1; household furniture, 5 loads; tool house, 1; pushcarts, 3; signs, 54; excavations made safe.

4; bootblack stand, 1; galvanized iron pipe, 15 lengths. The total number of permits given to the various corporations to make openings in streets amounted to 3,082. Of this number 1,344 were granted to the gas companies to lay mains and make repairs to gas services; 1,342 to the Edison Electric Illuminating Company to lay conduits, make repairs, etc.; 145 to the railroad com-

panies and 251 were miscellaneous permits. The Bureau of Highways collected during the quarter from plumbers and public service corporations, for permits to open pavements, \$7,086.76; inspections, \$1,357.05; extra paving, \$630.45; special paving, \$14,375.70; electric lights, \$13,052.01; gas, \$22. 368.58; service corporations for repaying in railroad areas, \$21.821.86; for vault permits, \$627.56; for redemption of incumbrances, \$35.34; special security deposits for the removal of building material, etc., from the streets, \$5.300; for telephone permits, \$6,357.18; for work done by bureau labor, \$752.56, making a grand total of

Bureau of Sewers.

On Dec. 31, 1915, there were 1,025.168 miles of sewers in the borough and during the quarter there were built 6,071.22 linear feet of all sizes of sewers, or an equiva-

lent of 1.150 miles, which makes the total mileage of sewers at the end of the quarter 1,026.318. The sizes of these different sewers constructed are as follows:

Vitrified pipe sewers, 8-inch to 20-inch (3,654.51 linear feet), 0.692 mile; brick sewers, 24-inch to 114-inch (1,147.71 linear feet), 0.217 mile; reinforced concrete sewers, 42-inch to 162-inch (1,269.50 linear feet), 0.241 mile; total, 6,071.22 linear teet, 1.150 miles.

The above mileage of sewers built is not increased by this amount, as 183 linear

feet, or 0.035 mile, were reconstructed, leaving a net increase of 1.115 miles.

There were built during the quarter 1,520.52 linear feet (0.288 miles) of 6-inch house connection drains; 1,313.42 linear feet (0.249 miles) of 8-inch house connection drains; making a total of 199.010 miles of 6-inch, 6.518 miles of 8-inch, and 0.008 miles of 10-inch house connection drains built under the jurisdiction of the bureau since this system was inaugurated, making a grand total of 205.536 miles of house connection drains so built on March 31, 1916.

The number of sewer basins built during the quarter was seven, which, added to the number previously connected with the sewerage system on Jan. 1, 1916 (12,922),

makes the total on March 31, 1916, 12,929. Eighty-two reports were made, 37 of which were for sewers to precede paving. Forty-two reports were for sewers petitioned for in the regular course, the estimated

cost being \$1,821,050. These reports cover a total of 15.86 miles of sewers. Assessment lists were prepared and forwarded to the Board of Assessors for four contracts, amounting to \$5,775.88; and twenty-two contracts, amounting to \$490,043.79, were completed and accepted, up to the close of the quarter, but had not been sent to the Board of Assessors.

The Bureau of Buildings received, cash, during the quarter: for unsafe building fund, \$50.50; signs, \$204; subpoena fees, \$24.60; total, \$279.10.

Division of Substructures. Surveys to the extent of 7.31 miles of thoroughfares were plotted during the quarter, in various sections of the borough. Fifteen miles of substructures were plotted in color, completing six record maps covering practically three miles of thoroughfares.

Detail topographical surveys and sub-surface surveys were plotted on five record maps, covering approximately 2.5 miles of thoroughfares.

A special survey was made of the abandoned railroad tunnel in Atlantic ave., extending from Court st. to Hicks st., a distance of 1,700 feet. Blue-prints, photographs and a complete report relative to the legal status of the tunnel, with recommendations as to the safeguarding of the street intersection at Court st. and Atlantic ave. and Hicks st. and Atlantic ave., were submitted.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

Supplies, materials and equipment, amounting to \$30,408.74, were purchased on open market orders, of which \$9,537.98 was charged to Revenue Bonds. Nine contracts were entered into at a cost of \$79,249.23.

There was received, during this period, from the public baths and comfort stations \$4,105.03, which was credited to the General Fund.

Topographical Bureau.

The work done by this bureau during the quarter was as follows: 619,000 feet of precise and approximate chaining; 65,000 feet precise line work; 16,688 feet for plans and profiles (original improvements) in eighteen streets; 682 precise angles measured; 16,088 feet profiles for regulating, grading, etc. (original improvement of streets); 7.480 feet line and grade stakes set (original improvement of streets); 1,277 feet of

damage profiles. A number of maps were completed and transmitted to this office affecting changes of established elevations of streets, reduction in width of streets, widening, locating and laying out, closing and discontinuing, etc., all requiring action by the

Board of Estimate and Apportionment. In addition, there was furnished considerable information in the preparation of statements of fact for submission to the Corporation Counsel for determination as to whether same were sufficient to authorize the City to commence public improvements without the need of condemnation proceedings.




