#### Public Hearing by the Committee on Transit.

Establishing a route and general plan of construction for a new rapid transit railroad in the Borough of Brooklyn, known as "Modification of the Fourteenth Street-Eastern Line."

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT the Committee on Transit of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will hold a Public Hearing on MONDAY, MARCH 11, 1918, at 9.30 o'clock a. m., in the Office of the President of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, on a resolution adopted by the Public Service Commission for the First District, determining and establishing a route and general plan of construction for a new rapid transit railroad in the Borough of Brooklyn, known as "Modification of the Fourteenth Street-Eastern Line," so as to permit a relocation of a part of the Fourteenth Street-Eastern Line between Bushwick avenue and Bogart street. The line leaves Bushwick avenue, near Meserole street, and passes under private property and the tracks of the Long Island Railroad, extends generally in a direction parallel to and south of Montrose avenue to Bogart street. As proposed to be relocated the portion of this line will leave Bushwick avenue, near Johnson avenue, and extend thence to Bogart street through private property in the blocks between Johnson avenue and Boerum street.

## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York  
Held Thursday, Jan. 11, 1918, at 10:30 A. M.

Present—James E. MacBride, President; Morris Cukor and William Drennan, Commissioners. The President presided.

George O'Hanlon, General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, appeared in connection with the rejection of the application of William Mudrack, an enemy alien, for employment as Chef at the Harlem Hospital under the provisions of clause 11 of Rule XVIII. The Secretary was instructed to accept the application pending the appointment of a person who is not an enemy alien.

A communication dated Jan. 10 was presented from the Secretary to the Mayor directing that the Commission continue the practice of appointing or promoting the first man or woman on civil service eligible lists. The communication was ordered filed.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That James E. MacBride, President, be and he is hereby designated as a member of the Board of Review of the Commission.

The Commission again took up the proposed amendment of paragraph 3 of Rule X of the rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission as follows:

"3. The term of an eligible list shall be not less than one year nor more than four years from the date of its establishment. An eligible list that has been in force for one year, except for the position of temporary clerk, shall terminate whenever a new list is established under the same title, and, in case of a graded position, for the same grade or grades.

"Persons whose names appear on a list about to be terminated shall be notified of the new examination, in the same manner that applicants therefor are notified, and shall be informed that, upon the establishment of the new list, their original eligibility shall cease."

—to read:

"3. The term of an eligible list shall be not less than one year nor more than four years from the date of its establishment. An eligible list that has been in force for one year, except for the position of temporary clerk, shall terminate whenever a new list is established under the same title, and, in case of a graded position, for the same grade or grades, except that where persons are eligible for certification and are unable to accept appointment by reason of enlistment for or a call to military or naval service in time of war, the names of such persons shall be continued on a separate eligible list, which shall be certified before certification is made from any other subsequent eligible list for the same position resulting from an open competitive examination. The eligibility of the persons whose names appear upon such list shall continue for a period of four years from the date of the establishment of the original list. If more than one eligible list is established as a result of these provisions, certification will be made in accordance with the priority of the establishment of such lists.

"Persons whose names appear on a list about to be terminated shall be notified of the new examination, in the same manner that applicants therefor are notified, and shall be informed that, upon the establishment of the new list, their original eligibility shall cease."

The matter was laid over pending an opinion from the Corporation Counsel as to the legality of the amendment.

The Commission referred to the President the matter of securing legislation to extend the age limit for the position of Patrolman.

The Commission then considered requests from various departments for approval of the promotion of certain employees under the provisions of clauses 3 and 4 of Rule XII pending the establishment of promotion eligible lists, and on motion, it was

Resolved, That no increases in salary beyond the grade in the same position shall be approved under the provisions of clauses 3 and 4 of Rule XII pending the result of a promotion examination, except that in cases where, on account of change of title, a payroll will not be passed by the Department of Finance under a former title, the Commission shall authorize provisional promotions pending the result of promotion examinations.

A communication dated Jan. 3 was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission enclosing copy of a letter from the Attorney General stating that the employees of the Municipal Court of the City of New York were in the municipal and not in the state service. The communications were ordered filed.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the compensation of John J. McBenett, Investigator in the office of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, be and the same is hereby fixed at \$1,620 per annum, effective Jan. 1, 1918.

After consideration of a communication dated Jan. 11, from the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation, the Commission approved the emergency appointment, under the provisions of clause 4 of Rule XII, of Vincent Brady as Investigator in the office of the Municipal Civil Service Commission for an additional period of fifteen days.

A communication dated Jan. 8 was presented from James A. Higgins, an Examiner in the office of the Commission, stating that he had enrolled as a yeoman in the United States Navy, and asking that the consent of the Mayor be obtained in order that he might receive compensation allowed city employees under the provisions of chapter 435 of the Laws of 1917. The Secretary was instructed to request the approval of the application by the Mayor.

On the recommendation of the Acting Chief Examiner in reports dated Jan. 4 and 7 (2) the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the following promotion eligible lists be and the same are hereby

promulgated: Taximeter Mechanician, Department of Licenses; Process Server, grade 2, Bureaus for the Recovery of Penalties, Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes, Main Office, Manhattan, Bronx, Richmond and Queens, and Main Office, Brooklyn, Law Department; Examiner, fifth grade, Bureau of Contract Supervision, Board of Estimate and Apportionment; Janitor, grade 2, Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Office of the President of the Borough of Richmond; Foreman Paver, Bureau of Highways, Office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn; Messenger, grade 2, Main office, Law Department, Boroughs of Manhattan, Bronx, Queens and Richmond.

Resolved, That the eligible list for the position of Mate be and the same is hereby promulgated, subject to future investigation of the candidates thereon.

A communication dated January 5 was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner submitting a statement of examinations held during the month of Dec., 1917. The communication was ordered filed.

A report dated Jan. 3 was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner recommending the granting of the request of the Secretary of the Department of Public Works, Manhattan, under date of Dec. 29, for the restoration to grade 2, at \$4.40 a day, effective Jan. 1, 1918, under the provisions of clause 24 of Rule XV of James E. Curran, Matthew Hogan and William J. Peer, Foremen grade 1, at \$3.50 a day. The recommendation was approved.

A report, dated Jan. 8, was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner with reference to a communication dated Dec. 28 from the Deputy and Acting Comptroller requesting the cancellation of examinations ordered by the Commission for promotion to the following positions: Auditor, fifth grade, Auditing Bureau, Division of Auditors and Examiners; Cashier, fourth grade, Bureau for the Collection of Taxes, Brooklyn; Accountant, fourth grade, Bureau of Accountancy; Examining Inspector, third grade, Auditing Bureau, Division of Inspections; Clerks, second grade, Division of Engineering, Auditing Bureau, Division of General Administration; Auditing Bureau, Division of Auditors and Examiners; Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears, Brooklyn; Stenographer and Typewriter, third grade, Division of Engineering; Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving, third grade, Division of Engineering; Assistant Engineer, grade D, Division of Engineering; Clerk, third grade, Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears, Richmond.

The matter was ordered continued on the calendar.

After consideration of a report dated Jan. 7, from the Acting Chief Examiner, relative to a communication from the Commissioner of Public Charities under date of Jan. 7, the Commission ordered an examination for promotion to Chief Physician (Field), grade 5, to be open to all third grade Physicians in the department who had served for not less than one year in the grade, and approved the provisional employment, under the provisions of clause 3 of Rule XII, of P. Joseph York, Physician at \$1,920 per annum, as Chief Physician (Field), grade 5, with compensation at the rate of \$3,500 per annum, pending the promulgation of the promotion eligible list.

A report dated Jan. 8 was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner with reference to the request of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller under date of Dec. 28 that the examination ordered on Dec. 5 for promotion from third to fourth grade Examining Inspector, Bureau of Law and Adjustment, be canceled, and that an examination be ordered for promotion from second to third grade Examining Inspector. The recommendations were adopted.

On the recommendation of Commissioner Drennan, to whom the matter had been referred at a previous meeting, the Commission approved the form submitted by the Advisory Board in a communication dated Dec. 28, for use in the Examining Division for the reporting of the daily progress of rating, to take the place of the book now in use.

A report (A-1065-a) dated Jan. 7 was presented from Assistant Chief Examiner Fuld, requesting permission to remain in the examination room on Friday, Jan. 18, and Saturday, Jan. 19, from the beginning to the close of the examination for the position of Clerk, second grade.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of clause 4 of Regulation III of the General Regulations of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, Mr. Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner, be and he is hereby designated to be in charge of the examination for Clerk, second grade, to be held on Friday, Jan. 18, and Saturday, Jan. 19, 1918, from the beginning to the close of the examination on each day, under the direction of the Acting Chief Examiner.

A communication dated Jan. 3 was presented from the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation with reference to three candidates on the eligible list of Civil Service Examiner. The Secretary was instructed to mark the candidates named in the report "qualified," except James P. Conway, whom he was instructed to mark "not qualified," until further notice.

Communications dated Dec. 31, Jan. 4 (3), Jan. 5 and Jan. 7, were presented from the Certification Clerk, requesting approval of his certification, without investigation, as follows:

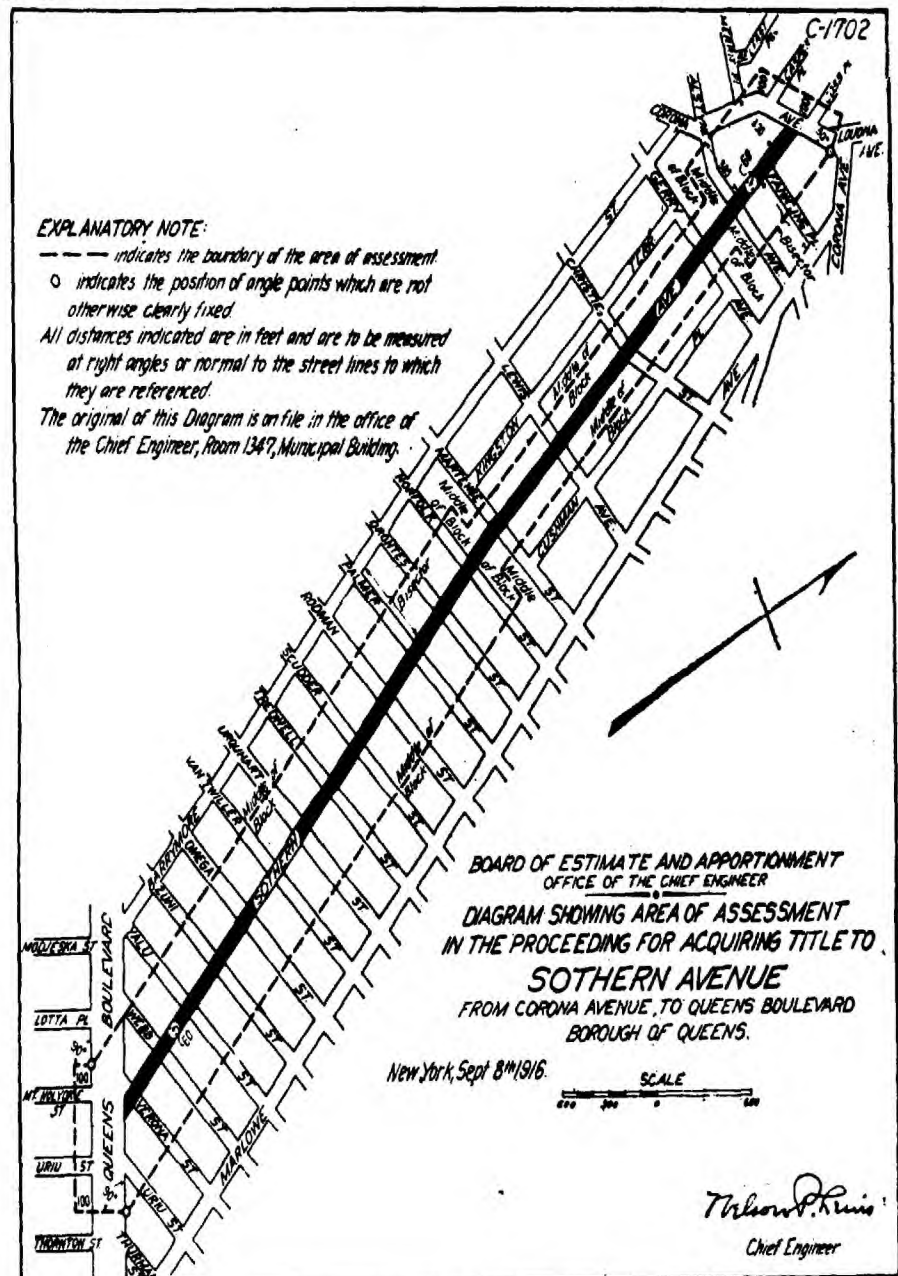

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not leave, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or her name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, or the party or parties making the bid, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
