The 925 deaths represent a death-rate of 25.60, against 23.87 for the previous week and 24.2 for the corresponding week of 1892.

Contagious and infectious diseases continue to decrease; the number of cases reported of diph theria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively 106, 180 149, 10, 14 and 12 against 93, 165, 190, 11, 15 and 6 for the previous week, a total of 471 against 480. Diphtheria increased markedly in the Eleventh, Twelfth, Sixteenth, Nineteenth, Twenty-first and Twenty-third Wards, and decreased in the Thirteenth, Seventeenth and Twenty-second Wards There was an increase of measles in the Fifth, Thirteenth, Twentieth and Twenty-fourth Wards and a decrease in the Sixteenth. There was a noticeable increase of scarlet fever in the Seventh Eighth and Twenty-first Wards, and a very marked decrease in the Sixteenth, Seventeenth, Nine teenth, Twenty-second and Twenty-third Wards. Four of the 10 cases of typhoid fever were between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, West, and 5 of the remainder were below Fourteenth street. Six of the 14 cases of typhus fever and 4 of the 12 cases of small-pox were above Four teenth street.

A TTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT A TTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1880), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonatty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, requirthe same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage; on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are derever released from all obligation under the grant in espect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in ront of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
