The minutes of the meeting held January 10, 1893, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented the following :

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT,

#### To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

At the request of the Mayor, I have had a report made by Mr. Samuel W. Cooper, Engineer of the Finance Department, of the list of streets recommended for repavement by the Commissioner of Public Works, under chapter 35 of the Laws of 1892.

The Engineer reports that with few exceptions the streets recommended to be repaved with asphalt are declared to be well chosen, especially those through the tenement district on the east side of the city.

Attention is called to the fact that with the amount recommended to be expended this year on the extension of the asphalt on the Boulevard, something over \$518,000 will have been expended for the repavement of that thoroughfare, running from Fifty-ninth to One Hundred and Sixteenth street. In view of the fact that but few improvements have been made thus far on that portion of the Boulevard which it is proposed to repave this year, I am of the opinion that the sum of \$218,600, which it is proposed to expend on the pavement from Ninety-second to One Hundred and Sixteenth street, and that a portion thereof might be better expended on streets running through thickly populated portions of the city. I therefore recommend that the Boulevard be repaved with asphalt, from Ninety-second to One Hundred and Twenty-second street, and that the amount saved by not paving from One Hundred and Second to One Hundred and Sixteenth street be expended either in the tenement districts, south of Twenty-third street and east of Third avenue and the Bowery, or in the area between Fourth and Sixth avenues, from Thirty-fourth to Sixty-sixth street, or partly in both of those sections.

The Engineer calls my attention to the manner in which a practical monopoly of asphalt paving is secured to the Sicilian Asphalt Pavement Company and the Barber Asphalt Pavement Company. It is of the utmost importance that a public work of this magnitude should be open to free competition; and the specifications as now framed are not calculated to make such competition feasible. Some of the asphalt pavements heretofore laid down by companies other than the two above mentioned have been equal to those laid down by said companies, and I therefore recommend, as per report of the Engineer of the Finance Department, that the specifications be made sufficiently broad to admit of free competition among all reputable and responsible bidders.

Hon. THOMAS F. GILROY, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

DEAR SIR—The list of streets transmitted to your Board under date of 3d instant, for repavements to be made under the legislative repavement appropriation for 1893, includes Fifty-fifth street, from Lexington to Fourth avenue, for asphalt repavement on the present square-block pavement. I now respectfully recommend that the block of Fifty-fifth street from Third to Lexington avenue, be added thereto for such repavement, the present pavement being in the same condition as that on the same street between Lexington and Fourth avenues, viz.: old square trap blocks laid about the year 1875, and now in poor condition. The additional area to be so repaved is 1,500 square yards, and the estimated cost \$6,000.

On motion, the recommendation of the Commissioner of Public Works to add to the list of streets and avenues to be repaved with asphalt the block of Fifty-fifth street from Third to Lexington avenue was adopted.

A communication from James H. Benedict, dated January 14, 1893, requesting the repaving of East Seventieth street, between Fifth and Madison avenues, with asphalt, was received and referred to the Commissioner of Public Works.

The Comptroller presented a communication from J. H. Thompson, M. D., representing property-owners on Thirtieth street, between Madison and Lexington avenues, dated January 20, 1893, protesting against the repaving of the said street with asphalt, and moved that Thirtieth street, between Madison and Lexington avenues, be excluded from the list of streets and avenues recommended by the Commissioner of Public Works to be repaved with asphalt.

Which was adopted.

The Mayor called attention to the proposition to extend the elevated railroad system on the Boulevard, and, pending the consideration of that subject, moved that the proposition as contained in the recommendation of the Commissioner of Public Works, to pave the Boulevard with asphalt, from Ninety-second street to One Hundred and Sixteenth street, be laid over.

So ordered.

The Mayor moved that the lists of streets and avenues recommended by the Commissioner of Public Works, as amended this day, be adopted.

Whereupon the Comptroller offered the following :

Resolved, That, in pursuance of chapter 35 of the Laws of 1892, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby authorizes and determines that the following-named streets and avenues be repaved with granite-block pavement, on concrete foundation, and with crosswalks of North river blue stone or granite at the intersecting and abutting streets where necessary, viz. :

And the Commissioner of Public Works is hereby authorized, in his discretion, to provide in the advertisements for proposals for these repavements, and in the contracts and specifications for the same, either that the old paving-blocks to be taken up from the said streets shall become the property of the contractors to whom the contracts shall be awarded as provided by law, or that the said contractors shall deliver such paving-blocks at convenient places of storage to be designated by him.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of chapter 35 of the Laws of 1892, the Commissioner of Public Works is hereby authorized to employ during the year 1892, in the work of making surveys and measurements, giving lines and grades, and supervising the work of repaving streets and avenues to be designated by this Board for repavement under the provisions of said act, one Consulting Engineer, one Assistant Engineer, one Draughtsman, two Transimen, two Levelers, four Rodmen, four Axemen and two Skilled Laborers, at salaries to be paid from the proceeds of stock or bonds to be issued under the provisions of said act, not exceeding the sums designated, as follows :

Together with amount required for the necessary inspectors and expenses of transportation, and that the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to employ one Engineer at a salary not exceeding three thousand dollars (\$3,000) per annum, for the supervision and inspection of the work of repaving streets and avenues to be designated by this Board for repavement, under the provisions of said act, to be paid from the proceeds of stock or bonds to be issued under said act.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

The Comptroller offered the following :

Whereas, Pursuant to the provisions of chapter 35 of the Laws of 1892, this Board has this day adopted resolutions authorizing the repaving of certain streets and avenues in the City of New York, as designated, leaving certain other contemplated streets and avenues, to be hereafter designated, and also providing for the payment of the necessary expenses connected therewith, the whole cost of which for repaving and expenses shall not exceed one million five hundred thousand dollars ; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to issue from time to time, as may be required, bonds or stock of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City, as authorized by chapter 35, Laws of 1892, and in accordance with section 132 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, to an amount of one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000), payable from taxation, which bonds or stock shall be redeemable in not less than ten nor more than thirty years from the date of issue, as the Comptroller shall determine, bearing interest at a rate to be fixed by the Comptroller, not exceeding three per centum per annum, the proceeds of which bonds or stock shall be applied to the payment of the expense to be incurred in repaving such streets and avenues as have been or may be designated for repavement under the provisions of said chapter 35, Laws of 1892.

Hon. THOMAS F. GILROY, Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

SIR—Under date of September 9, a communication was sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment from the Board of Excise, requesting that a transfer of \$500 be made from the appropriation for the Board of Excise for the year ending April 30, 1892, from "Inspection" account to "Contingency" account. I am informed that such transfer has not been made.

There was an unexpended balance of the appropriation for the Board of Excise for the year ending April 30, 1892, of more than \$2,000. That balance was, however, to the credit of "Inspection" account.

There was a deficiency in the "Contingency" account, amounting to \$331.55, as shown by the books in this office, made up of several items, the bills for which were approved and charged to the "Contingency" account, but have not been paid because of the deficiency.

Upon this explanation I hope it may be deemed proper to make the transfer as requested.

The Finance Committee, to which was referred the communication from the School Trustees of the Nineteenth Ward, requesting an appropriation of thirty-nine hundred and twenty dollars (\$3,920) for new furniture, Part I, for new building on northwest corner of Fifty-first street and First avenue, in said ward, respectfully reports :

That under the authority of the resolution attached to the report of the Committee on Buildings of November 16, 1892 (Journal 1892, pages 1229, 1258), and in reply to the usual advertisement inserted for two weeks in the CITY RECORD, inviting estimates and proposals for this work, the following bids were received, viz. :

Your Committee approves the award and submits for adoption the following resolution :

Resolved, That the sum of thirty-nine hundred and twenty dollars (\$3,920), as follows :

Item 1, nine hundred and eighty-seven dollars ;

Item 2, three hundred and sixty-three dollars ;

Item 3, twenty-five hundred and seventy dollars, be and the same is hereby appropriated from the proceeds of bonds to be issued by the Comptroller, with the approval of a majority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York, pursuant to chapter 264 of the Laws of 1891, application for the issue of which is hereby made ; said sum to be applied in payment of the contract to be entered into by the School Trustees of the Nineteenth Ward, with the Favorite Desk and Seating Company, for new furniture, Part I, item 1 ; with Behning & Sons, for new furniture, Part I, item 2 ; with Favorite Desk and Seating Company, for new furniture, Part I, item 3 ; new building, northwest corner Fifty-first street and First avenue, in said ward, requisition for which sum out of the proceeds of said bonds, when issued, is hereby made upon said Comptroller.

But no part of said appropriation authorized by this resolution is to be paid until the School Trustees of the Nineteenth Ward shall have filed the contracts to be entered into by them with the contractors above named, to whom the awards are made, said contracts to be in such form and with such security for the faithful performance of the same as shall be satisfactory to the Finance Committee, the rules of this Board in regard thereto and as to payments to be made on account thereof to be complied with.

The President put the question whether the Board would adopt the resolution attached to the report of the Finance Committee and it was decided unanimously in the affirmative.

On the 4th of November, 1891, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution authorizing the issue of School-house Bonds to the amount of \$9,116 under the provisions of chapter 253, Laws of 1889, to meet the expenditures to be incurred on a contract to be entered into between the School Trustees of the Nineteenth Ward and D. F. Gibb, for improving the premises Nos. 210 and 212 East Eighteenth street, adjoining Grammar School No. 53 (Journal, November 18, 1891, pages 1120 and 1121), which said work is no longer required owing to the erection of the addition to the school building contemplated by the award. A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day at the office of the Mayor.  
Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Works and Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was dispensed with.  
Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald, to whom was referred the application of the First Naval Battalion for an armory, made a verbal report that the ship "St. Mary's," which had been suggested for that purpose, was too small, having only accommodations for about one hundred men, whereas the "New Hampshire," which was named as suitable quarters in the application of the Commandant, was much larger and better suited to the requirements of the battalion; that in compliance with a request from the Governor of the State, the "New Hampshire" had already been assigned to the use of the Naval Battalion, by Secretary Tracy, for the term of one year, and that the application of Commandant Miller for the acceptance of the vessel, and providing for the repairs and maintenance of same was reasonable, and offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to secure from the Dock Department a proper assignment of a pier at which to moor the ship "New Hampshire," to be used as an armory for the First Naval Battalion.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Works and Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald.

The following communication was received from Captain Roe, relative to the proposed alterations to the specifications to architects for a plan for an armory for Troop "A":



TROOP "A," No. 136 WEST FIFTY-SIXTH STREET,  
NEW YORK, December 17, 1892.

*To the Armory Board:*

SIRS—I have learned that the troop of cavalry that was forming at Durland's Riding School, and recently made application to the Governor of the State for recognition (which was refused), has entirely disbanded, and, in the opinion of Mr. Durland, never amounted to anything, as there were only about eight or ten young men interested in it at any time. The Adjutant-General of the State has also informed me that "the Governor will not authorize any increase of the National Guard, and has returned all applications, such as Staten Island Artillery Company, etc." And furthermore, "that in his (the Adjutant-General's) opinion, there will not be, in all probability, another troop of cavalry authorized in this city at any time under the present administration."

In view of the above facts, and also, that if an armory is built which provides for an organization which is not in existence, it will be a constant inducement for cavalry organizations to spring into life. I have the honor to request that the armory for Troop "A" may be built as originally contemplated.

If the Armory Board deem it best to construct an armory for a squadron of cavalry, it will require an addition of ten thousand dollars to the amount already allotted, making in all one hundred and fifty thousand dollars. The specifications for the increased armory herewith.

Whereupon the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments presented the following form of specification, which had been amended by striking from the one as originally presented, "Room for dismounted drills, independent of dirt ring":

*To Architects:*

A general invitation is hereby extended to architects to furnish competitive designs and plans for an armory building for the use of Troop "A" of the National Guard of the State of New York.

The building to be erected on the ground, 200 x 100 feet, in the rear of the Eighth Regiment Armory, between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, and fronting on Madison avenue. The building to be of brick, with stone trimmings, and provided with a roof of glass, slate, tile or other durable material, and in design should harmonize as near as possible with the Eighth Regiment Armory adjoining.

The excavation for the building to be over the whole area of 200 x 100 feet, and to give a depth that will insure 9 feet clear from the floor of the cellar to the ceiling above.

The cellar to contain a target range, markers' pit, large saddle-room, armorer's room, boiler-room, and a runway for horses to the floor above.

The remainder of the cellar to be left unfinished, and to be used as a stable, and to be fitted up by the Troop at their own expense, and not to be provided for in the present plans or estimates.

The main floor on street level is to be occupied with a ring of tan-bark or dirt (similar to riding-school rings) of the largest possible dimensions. This floor to be supported on columns and arches.

The plans to show accommodation in the building for Troop meeting-room.

Captain's room.

Lieutenant's room.

First Sergeant's room.

Quartermaster-Sergeant's room.

Janitor's apartments.

Kitchen, with range, etc.

Locker-rooms, with lockers to be provided for one hundred and five men.

Suitable water-closets, bath-rooms, etc.

As much gallery and seating accommodation as possible.

Building to be lighted by electricity and gas; heated by steam. Ample provisions made for drainage.

Plans to be submitted to be drawn scale one-eighth inch equal to one foot, with a perspective drawing rendered in black and white.

The entire cost of building, as called for in these specifications, shall not exceed \$140,000.

The Armory Board reserves the right to reject any or all plans which may be offered, if, for any reason, they deem it best to do so, and in case any plan is accepted as presented or with alterations or suggestions of the Armory Board, and it is subsequently found that a contract satisfactory to the Armory Board, can be made for the complete erection of the building as herein called for, for a sum, including the architect's fees, which shall not exceed the appropriation for the work, the architect presenting such plans shall be engaged for the work and his compensation for plans and superintendence shall be four per cent. of the amount of such contract.

The plans must be prepared with the view of inviting proposals for the erection of the building for a gross sum, and must be presented to the Committee on Plans, at this office, on or before

A map showing the site is on file in this office, and must be consulted by architects for such information as they may need in that respect.

Whereupon, the Commissioner of Public Works offered the following:

Resolved, That the amended specifications as this day presented, be adopted, and architects be invited to offer competitive designs for an armory building in conformity therewith.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Works and Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald.

**BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS CONSTITUTED BY  
CHAPTER 299, LAWS OF 1890, AS AMENDED BY  
CHAPTER 414, LAWS OF 1892, TO SELECT AND  
LOCATE A SITE FOR, AND TO ERECT  
THEREON, A NEW MUNICIPAL BUILDING, IN  
THE CITY HALL PARK, OR ON THE LAND  
ADJACENT THERETO.**

At the call of the Mayor, the Board met at the Mayor's Office, at 1 o'clock P.M., on Wednesday, January 11, 1893.

Present—Thomas F. Gilroy, Mayor; Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller; John H. Campbell, Deputy Chamberlain; and Nicholas T. Brown, Chairman Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen—Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; and Henry D. Purroy, County Clerk; Ferdinand Levy, Register, and Frank T. Fitzgerald, Additional Surrogate.

The minutes of the meeting held February 20, 1892, were read and approved.

On motion of the Comptroller, the Mayor was appointed Chairman of the Board.

On motion of the County Clerk, Richard A. Storrs, Deputy Comptroller, was appointed Secretary.

The Comptroller offered the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, Section 2 of chapter 299 of the Laws of 1890, entitled "An Act to amend chapter three hundred and twenty-three of the Laws of 1888," entitled "An Act to provide for the erection of a building for certain purposes relating to the public interests in the City of New York," provides as follows:

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the said board of commissioners and they are hereby authorized and empowered to select and locate a site conveniently situated in the neighborhood of the county court-house building in said city, but not in the City Hall Park, upon which to erect a building as nearly fire-proof as can be practically secured, sufficient to provide suitable accommodation for the office and use of the register of the city and county of New York; and for the office and use of the clerk of the city and county of New York; and for the offices and court and for the use of the surrogate of the city and county of New York, being the various offices in which the records affecting public interests are required by law to be kept in said city and county, and also sufficient to afford suitable accommodation for the offices and use of such of the several departments of the said municipality the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York,

and of such bureaus, officers and commissioners as do not belong to any department, and of such county officers as the said board of commissioners shall designate and appoint; and the said board of commissioners is hereby authorized and empowered to designate and appoint what departments, officers and commissioners in addition to the aforesaid register, county clerk and surrogate shall have and occupy offices in said building when completed, and to designate the offices or portions of such building to be occupied and used by each of said departments, officers and commissioners, and from time to time to change such designation and appointment. The site so selected and located shall be and hereby is set apart and appropriated for the purposes of the building by this act provided for.

Whereas, chapter 414 of the Laws of 1892 amends said section 2 of chapter 299 of the Laws of 1890, as follows:

CHAPTER 414.

AN ACT to amend section two of chapter two hundred and ninety-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety, entitled "An Act to provide for the erection of a building for certain purposes relating to the public interest in the city of New York, amending chapter three hundred and twenty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-eight."

Approved by the Governor May 2, 1892. Passed, three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section two of chapter two hundred and ninety-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety, amending chapter three hundred and twenty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-eight, entitled "An act to provide for the erection of a building for certain purposes relating to the public interests of the city of New York," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the said board of commissioners and they are hereby authorized and empowered to select and locate a site upon which to erect a building as nearly fire-proof as can be practically secured, sufficient to provide suitable accommodation for the office and use of the register of the city and county of New York; and for the office and use of the clerk of the city and county of New York, and for the office and court and for the use of the surrogate of the city and county of New York, being the various offices in which the records affecting public interests are required by law to be kept in said city and county, and also sufficient to afford suitable accommodation for the offices and use of such of the several departments of the said municipality, the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, and of such bureaus, officers and commissioners as do not belong to any department, and of such county officers as the said board of commissioners shall designate and appoint, and the said board of commissioners is hereby authorized and empowered to designate and appoint what departments, officers and commissioners in addition to the aforesaid register, county clerk and surrogate shall have and occupy offices in said building when completed, and to designate the offices or portions of such building to be occupied and used by each of said departments, officers and commissioners, and from time to time to change such designation and appointment. The site so selected and located shall be and hereby is set apart and appropriated for the purposes of the building by this act provided for, said commissioners mentioned and described in the first section of the act hereby amended, or a majority of them, may, in their discretion, select and locate the site for said building in City Hall Park, or on the land adjacent thereto.

Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Whereas, At a meeting of the Board of Commissioners constituted by chapter 299, Laws of 1890, held on February 20, 1892, the following resolution was adopted, selecting and locating a site for the Municipal Building outside of the limits of the City Hall Park as therein provided, to wit:

Resolved, That we do hereby select and locate the site upon which to locate and erect a building, as provided by chapter 299 of the Laws of 1890, situate in the City of New York, viz:

The parcels or pieces of land which, taken together, are bounded by the following streets: Park Row, Duane street, Centre street and Tryon Row, including the Staats Zeitung building, the same being shown and delineated upon the map hereto annexed (Plan No. 4), and

Whereas, Chapter 414 of the Laws of 1892 authorizes said Board of Commissioners to select and locate a site for said building within the limits of the City Hall Park, in their discretion.

Resolved, That the said resolution adopted by the Board of Commissioners on February 20, 1892, selecting and locating a site for the new Municipal Building outside of the limits of the City Hall Park, hereby is repealed and declared to be null and void.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller offered the following:

Resolved, That the Board of Commissioners constituted by chapter 299 of the Laws of 1890, as amended by chapter 414 of the Laws of 1892, to select and locate a site for, and to erect thereon, a new Municipal Building, hereby selects and locates the site for said new Municipal Building in the City Hall Park, in that part of said park situated and lying south of the new County Court-house, west of Park Row and east of Broadway, said building to face southward, and to be erected upon said site as provided by the acts of the Legislature.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller offered the following:

Resolved, That the Chairman appoint a committee of three to make the necessary arrangements for preparing and for advertising for plans and specifications of a Municipal Building, to be erected as provided by chapter 299 of the Laws of 1890 and chapter 414 of the Laws of 1892, upon the site in the City Hall Park, selected and described in the foregoing resolution, and to submit a report to this Board, with recommendations as to exact lines of the site proposed to be occupied by said building, and other particulars in regard thereto.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Mayor appointed the Comptroller, the County Clerk and the Surrogate as such committee.

The Comptroller offered the following:

Resolved, That the committee on plans and specifications for a new Municipal Building, appointed this day, be and hereby is authorized to consult experts for professional advice in regard to plans for such building and the best means of inviting and securing designs for the same.

Which was unanimously adopted.

Communications were received from the following-named persons relative to the new Municipal Building:

Joseph A. Stark, Architect, with rough plot sketch.

William A. Udell, Counselor-at-law—To purchase the U. S. Post-office Building for municipal purposes, or to erect a new building on Chambers street, from Broadway to Centre street, utilizing the present Court-house in the plans.

D. A. McLaughlin—The transplacing and rebuilding of the present City Hall structure on the site of the Fifth Avenue Reservoir for the "Tilden Library."

Chadwick Civic Club—Approving the site selected in the City Hall Park, and rebuilding the present City Hall on Eighth avenue, facing Central Park, for the "New York Historical Society."

Edward T. Birdsall—Application for the position of Consulting Electrical Engineer.

Which were referred to the Special Committee.

A GENERAL INVITATION IS HEREBY extended to architects to furnish competitive designs and plans for an armory building for the use of Troop A, of the National Guard of the State of New York.

#### TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1890), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and

obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.
