Recommending that a gangway be cut on the northerly side of Pier, old 42, North river, for the accommodation of the steamers "Wyckoff" and "Holmdel," and that the gangway on the southerly side of said pier be closed and floored over, the cost of said work to be collected from the owners of said boats. Recommendation adopted.

No. 18156. Recommending that permission be granted the Consolidated Canal and Lake Company to maintain tally-house on the Pier foot of West Fifty-fourth street, and two engines, two boiler-houses and platform derrick on the crib bulkhead at Sherman's Creek, Harlem river.

On motion, the recommendation of the Engineer-in-Chief was adopted, the structures to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board, and the compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the New York and College Point Ferry Company to immediately transfer its ferry racks at the foot of East Ninety-ninth street to the new location designated therefor, in order that the work of building the bulkhead wall thereat may be proceeded with without delay.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request the Corporation Counsel to take the necessary steps to compel the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey to discontinue the operation of the ferry from the foot of Whitehall street to Communipaw, New Jersey, until such time as a franchise is obtained therefor.

Bidders will state in their estimates a price for the whole of the work to be done, in conformity with the approved form of agreement and the specifications therein set forth, by which price the bids will be tested. This price is to cover all expenses of every kind involved in or incidental to the fulfillment of the contract, including any claim that may arise through delay, from any cause, in the performing of the work thereunder. Bidders are required to state in their estimates their names and places of residence, the names of all persons interested with them therein, and if no other person be so interested the estimate shall distinctly state the fact; also that the estimate is made without any consultation, connection or agreement with, and the amount thereof has not been disclosed to, any other person or persons making an estimate for the same purpose, and is not higher than the lowest regular market price for the same kind of labor or material, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; that no combination or pool exists of which the bidder is a member, or in which the bidder is directly or indirectly interested, or of which the bidder has knowledge, either personal or otherwise, to bid a certain price, or not less than a certain price, for said labor or material, or to keep others from bidding thereon; and also that no member of the Municipal Assembly, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy employee of The City of New York, or any of its departments, is directly or indirectly interested in this estimate or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof, and has not been given, offered or promised, either directly or indirectly, any pecuniary or other consideration by the bidder, or anyone in his behalf, with a view to influencing the action or judgment of such officer or employee in this or any other transaction heretofore had with this Department, which estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. *Where more than one person is interested it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed to by all the parties interested.*

In case a bid shall be submitted by or in behalf of any corporation, it must be signed in the name of such corporation by some duly authorized officer or agent thereof, who shall also subscribe his own name and office. If practicable, the seal of the corporation should also be affixed.
