COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Mayor's Office, at 11 o'clock A. M., on Thursday, March 5, 1896.

Present—William L. Strong, Mayor; Ashbel P. Fitch, Comptroller; Anson G. McCook, Chamberlain, and William M. K. Olcott, Chairman Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meetings held on January 22, 1896, February 5, 1896, February 11, 1896, February 13, 1896, and February 17, 1896, were read and approved.

The Mayor presented the following application of the Volunteer Firemen's Association for new quarters:

NEW YORK, March 4, 1896.

Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Mayor of the City of New York.

DEAR SIR—The Volunteer Firemen's Association of the City of New York have been notified by the Comptroller that the Board of Education want the building known as the Essex Market, for school purposes, and have notified the association to vacate.

Under chapter 95, Laws of 1888, our association has the right to occupy the rooms we are now in possession of "so long as the same is occupied for such purposes and no longer."

We have been in possession of our present quarters since the passage of the above act. The association is willing to surrender its occupancy so soon as other quarters are provided, and respectfully petition the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to take immediate steps or action in the matter, and provide the association with other suitable quarters.

We respectfully ask your Honor to bring this matter up before the Board at its next meeting.

Resolved, That the property located at Spuyten Duyvil in the Twenty-fourth Ward, heretofore occupied by Primary School No. 46, be and the same is hereby transferred to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the sale of the same, under the provisions of section 1, chapter 89, Laws of 1881, said property being no longer required for school purposes.

DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS, February 26, 1896.

Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Chairman, Sinking Fund:

DEAR SIR—In answer to letter of February 24, from Hon. Ashbel P. Fitch, Comptroller, in re arranging for branch office of this Department, would say that I sent up to-day and had examined No. 366 Alexander avenue for use as branch office. Said building is located between One Hundred and Forty-second and One Hundred and Forty-third streets, East, and is owned by Mr. Smith Williamson, whose office is at No. 364 Alexander avenue. The first floor of this building has been offered at \$40 per month.

Location being good, also the light, and rent seeming reasonable, and as it is of the utmost importance that this department should have a branch office in this section, you will greatly oblige me by taking such steps as will aid me in this matter. I would like, if possible, to take immediate possession of this office but do not wish to have the office rented for more than a year, from May 1, reserving however the privilege of renewal at the end of that time.

If this office can be opened in a short time, it will not only greatly facilitate the working of the department, the business of citizens requiring intercourse with the department, and the saving of time of inspectors and employees in reporting at this office, but also enabling me to give a far better guarantee of efficient and reliable work being done by the department.

DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION, March 5, 1896.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—On account of limited room in the building corner of Eleventh street and Third avenue, appropriated for my office, becomes necessary for me to arrange for other accommodations.

I have made investigations and find that the house No. 148 East Twentieth street will answer my purpose. These premises belong to James Slater, and he will agree to lease the same to the City for a period of five years at the annual rent of \$2,000, the City to make all repairs.

I think this is a very fair rent to pay for the premises.

For the payment of this rent it is necessary for me to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a transfer of \$1,500 from the item of "Supplies" to an appropriation to be entitled "Office Rent for 1896."

The following communication was received from the Counsel to the Corporation, in the matter of the petition of the executors of estate of Bernard Mooney and next of kin of John Connor, deceased:

LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION, NEW YORK, February 11, 1896.

RICHARD A. STORRS, Esq., Deputy Comptroller:

SIR—I have received your letter of January 21, inclosing the petition of the executors of the estate of Bernard Mooney and next of kin of John Connor, deceased, for a quit-claim deed from the City of a certain strip of land on the northerly side of Ninety-ninth street.

The petition shows that a certain brick building erected on the lands of the petitioner encroaches upon adjoining land belonging to the City the space of one inch upon the front, and three inches on the rear, extending ninety-six feet in depth, for which strip the petitioners ask a quit-claim deed from the City.

Since the power of sale conferred upon the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by section 170 of the Consolidation Act requires that all sales of City property must be after public advertisement at auction or by sealed bids, I am of the opinion that the quit-claim proposed would not be legal.

It seems to me, however, that under the circumstances, a license or permission to occupy the space covered by the encroachment during the continuance of the present building may be legally granted by the resolution of the Board.

DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING, February 25, 1896.

Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, *Mayor, Chairman, Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund*:

SIR—I desire the consent and approval of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to lease from Matthew Thompson, as agent, for a term of two years, commencing March 1, 1896, and ending March 1, 1898, of the store No. 174 West Broadway, in this city, at a rental of \$480 per annum, payable monthly. Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 705 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 368 of the Laws of 1894, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning be and hereby is authorized to enter into a lease with Matthew Thompson, as agent of the store No. 174 West Broadway, for the term of two years, from March 1, 1896, at a rental of four hundred and eighty dollars (\$480) per annum, payable monthly at the end of each month, and the Counsel to the Corporation is hereby requested to prepare said lease and indorse it with his approval as to form.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, for lease of lot at Thirteenth avenue and Twelfth street:

DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING, February 27, 1896.

Hon. ASHBEL P. FITCH, *Comptroller*:

DEAR SIR—We have not yet succeeded in getting a place for our carts near the West Twelfth street stable. A building which we hoped to be able to use is not available, because the Building Department will not allow the removal of certain supporting posts.

We are now offered, for \$100 per month, by Christopher Foster, agent, a lot 95 by 60, on the corner of Thirteenth avenue and Twelfth street, with the exception of a space 25 by 25 in the southwesterly corner of the same, according to a sketch attached hereto.

Will you kindly ask your Engineer to investigate and report upon this property? Lease to run from April 15, 1896, to November 1, 1897. Very truly yours,

Whereupon the Comptroller offered the following:

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 705 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 368 of the Laws of 1894, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning be and hereby is authorized to lease the vacant lot on the corner of Thirteenth avenue and Twelfth street, sixty by ninety-five feet, excepting a space twenty-five feet square in the southwesterly corner of the said lot, for the term or period from April 15, 1896, to November 1, 1897, at a rental of one hundred dollars a month, payable monthly; and the Counsel to the Corporation is requested to prepare said lease and indorse it with his approval as to form.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller offered the following preamble and resolution exempting \$600,049.06 City stocks and bonds from taxation:

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by resolutions adopted February 20, 1896, authorized the issue of School-house Bonds to the amount of three hundred and fifty thousand six hundred and thirty dollars and ten cents (\$350,630.10), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1889 and chapter 88 of the Laws of 1895, and bonds to the amount of thirty thousand one hundred and fifty dollars (\$30,150), for the purchase in part of a site for a new building of the College of the City of New York, pursuant to chapter 168 of the Laws of 1895, and Fire-hydrant Stock of the City of New York to the amount of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 510 of the Laws of 1894, and Consolidated Stock of the City of New York to the amount of thirty-three thousand dollars (\$33,000), for the purchase of a Deltahydrant self-propelling dumping boat, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 368 of the Laws of 1894; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by resolutions adopted March 4, 1896, authorized the issue of School-house Bonds to the amount of one hundred and thirty-six thousand two hundred and sixty-eight dollars and ninety-six cents (\$136,268.96); therefore be it

Resolved, That the aforesaid stocks and bonds, amounting in the aggregate to six hundred thousand and forty-nine dollars and six cents (\$600,049.06), be and the same are hereby exempted from taxation by the City and County of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 137 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and an ordinance of the Common Council, approved by the Mayor, October 2, 1880.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and resolution for a confirmatory grant to Emily J. De Forest of lands under water on West Twelfth street:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, March 5, 1896.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—The petition of Emily J. De Forest has been received by me, praying for a confirmatory grant of certain lands under water on the south side of Troy or West Twelfth street, on account of the validity of the original grant being questioned as improperly executed by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, and insufficient in law and under the ordinances of the Common Council, by reason of the omission therefrom of the signature of the then Mayor of the City.

The records of this Department show that the original grant was not signed by the Mayor and in that respect may be defective, as alleged by the petitioner.

Pursuant to the advice of the Counsel to the Corporation in similar cases, I am satisfied that this application should be granted, and accordingly I submit for adoption the following resolution to authorize a confirmatory grant to the said petitioner, to be prepared by the Counsel to the Corporation and approved by him as to form, upon satisfactory proof of ownership by the petitioner.

Resolved, That the petition of Emily J. De Forest be and hereby is approved for a confirmatory grant of certain lands under water in the Hudson river, in the Ninth Ward of the City of New York, situated on the south side of Troy or West Twelfth street, a grant of which lands under water was made by a deed of the Corporation, dated June 20, 1864, to Robert Barker and Elizabeth B. Higginson, recorded in Liber I. of City Grants, page 275, in the Comptroller's office; the grant to said Barker and Higginson being defective in law, as alleged, by reason of the omission of the signature thereon of the then Mayor of the City, and the Counsel to the Corporation is requested to prepare such confirmatory grant, upon satisfactory proof of ownership by the petitioner, and the Mayor and Clerk of the Common Council hereby are authorized and directed to execute such confirmatory grant when approved by the Counsel to the Corporation; and the Comptroller is authorized to deliver the same to the petitioner or his attorney when executed and recorded in his office, upon payment of a reasonable amount to be fixed by him for the expenses attending the preparation and execution thereof.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller reported, orally, on the application of the Board of Docks for an issue of Dock Bonds for the amount of two million dollars (minutes, February 13, 1896, page 397); and offered the following:

Whereas, The Board of Commissioners of Docks adopted a resolution on August 2, 1894, requesting this Board to direct the Comptroller to prepare and issue Dock Bonds of the City of New York to the amount of three million dollars (\$3,000,000) for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks;

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 143 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to prepare and issue, from time to time, as may be desired, for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per cent. per annum, Dock Bonds of the City of New York to the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000), on account of the aforesaid requisition of the Commissioners of Docks for bonds to the amount of three million dollars (\$3,000,000); and

Resolved, That the said Dock Bonds of the City of New York to the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) be and are hereby exempted from taxation by the City and County of New York, pursuant to the provisions of section 137 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and an ordinance of the Common Council approved by the Mayor October 2, 1880.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following statement and resolution on fines payable to the New York Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children:

The following fines for cruelty to children were imposed and collected by the Courts of General and Special Sessions during the month of February, 1896, and deposited in the City Treasury to the credit of the Sinking Fund for the Payment of the Interest on the City Debt. The returns of the clerks of the said courts for the said month indicate that the cases were severally prosecuted by the officers of the New York Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children.

Pursuant to section 5, chapter 122, Laws of 1876, the amount of said fines is payable to the said society.
