Mr. M. J. Rickard, the Acting Superintendent, reported as follows:
From August 23 to September 5, inclusive, 84 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 9 at Gouverneur Hospital, 23 at Harlem Hospital, and 24 at Fordham Hospital, all of which the attending Surgeons or their Assistants were present.

Fire drills have been held at all of the institutions in accordance with the regulations of the Board of Trustees.

The reports of the attendance of the visiting Physicians and Surgeons during the month of August are herewith submitted.

Five bids have been received on the labor and material required in converting two rooms on the sixth floor of Bellevue Hospital into an additional operating room, and it is recommended that the lowest bid be accepted.

Five bids have been received for screens at Fordham Hospital, five for screens at Harlem Hospital, four for screens at Gouverneur Hospital, four for the Marquand Pavilion at Bellevue Hospital.

As many of the questions are duplicated on the present transfer slips, a revised slip is herewith submitted for your approval.

A petition from the house staff of Bellevue Hospital regarding the food is herewith presented.

There does not seem to be any objection to the proposed transfer of the position of Stoker from the non-competitive to the labor class, and the Civil Service Board has been so informed.

Authority is requested for the employment of a Stenographer for three days, at a salary of \$3 a day.

Two bids have been received on the work of enlarging the shed in the grounds of Bellevue Hospital used for storing the wagons; one from J. D. Fowler, at \$192.80 (\$12 additional for sliding doors on overhead tracks) and one from the William Horne Company at \$210. On account of the lack of room at the present time two of the wagons are left in the grounds unprotected and are being damaged. It is therefore recommended that the lower of the two bids be accepted.

A communication has been received from Dr. M. S. Gregory, the Resident Alienist at this institution, who requests that Dr. M. L. Fleming, his second Assistant, be granted the privilege of living outside of the hospital building on such days in the week as he is off duty. The Physicians in this service alternate, so that each has two or three nights on and off duty each week. Dr. Fleming proposes to live near the hospital and to have a telephone in his home, and it is therefore recommended that this privilege be granted Dr. Fleming.

The resignation of Miss Edna M. Cutler, the Dietitian of this institution, dating from September 30, has been received. This position is in the competitive class, and the Civil Service Commission has been requested to supply a list of such persons as are eligible for appointment to the vacancy.

Various articles of furniture, as they are accepted by the Storekeeper, for Pavilions A and B, are now being placed on the fifth and sixth floors of the new building, and an Elevatorman has been employed for a period of a week (it may be that his services will not be required for the entire week), at a salary of \$3 a day. Permission for the employment of this man has been requested from the Civil Service Commission, in accordance with the rules of that Department.

The list of instruments required for the Dental Department has been presented by Dr. Herbert Wheeler. The approximate cost will be from \$250 to \$300, and it is recommended that they be purchased.
