No. 113.

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and hereby is requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to paying the bills of the Citizens' Water Supply Company and the Bowery Bay Improvement Company for water supplied in the First Ward of the Borough of Queens, during the months of October, November and December, 1907.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 25, 1908.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, March 10, 1908, without his approval or disapproval thereof; therefore, as provided in section 40 of the Greater New York Charter, the same took effect as if he had approved it.

No. 114.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond be and he is hereby respectfully requested to modify the regulations affecting the use of the Speedway, from One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street to the level, during the continuance of snow, by permitting, during certain restricted hours, and governed by precautionary measures against accident, the use of the incline for bobsleds, a concession, necessarily temporary in its nature, which would be greatly appreciated by all lovers of winter sports in the vicinity of the Speedway.

No. 120.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$25,000, for the purpose of providing means for the erection of a wire fence (under the direction of the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of The Bronx) to enclose the forest lands immediately adjacent to the eastern boundary of that portion of the Bronx Park known as the Zoological Gardens, from Bronxdale south to West Farms road.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment January 24, 1908, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to an amount not exceeding twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), for the purpose of providing means for the erection of a wire fence (under the direction of the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of The Bronx), to inclose the forest lands immediately adjacent to the eastern boundary of that portion of the Bronx Park known as the Zoological Gardens, from Bronxdale south to West Farms road, and when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 160 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

No. 121.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with the concurrence of the Board of Aldermen, has provided in the Budget for 1908 certain sums of money for Memorial Day observances in the various boroughs, in accordance with the provisions of law; and

Whereas, It is deemed necessary that said sums of money be advanced to the Memorial and Executive Committees of the Grand Army of the Republic and kindred organizations in the various boroughs for the purpose of defraying expenses as they may arise; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to pay to each of the treasurers of the Memorial and Executive Committees of the Grand Army of the Republic and kindred organizations in the various boroughs, upon his requisition, countersigned by the chairman and secretary of each of the various committees, the sum of money provided in the said Budget, as follows:

No. 122.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: The Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to enter into an agreement for the leasing of the second floor of the building known and designated as No. 391 Fulton street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for the use as Chambers of the Justices of the Supreme Court of the Second Judicial District, the Chambers of said Justices in the County Court House having recently been destroyed by fire; said lease to run from month to month at a monthly rental of five hundred and fifty dollars (\$550), payable at the end of each month.

This ordinance is passed in pursuance of section 31 of the Code of Civil Procedure and of the Charter of The City of New York.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Trustees of the Normal College of The City of New York be and hereby are authorized and empowered to procure such text books, stationery and other supplies as may be required during the year 1908 for the purposes of the Normal College, the High School Department and the Training Department, at an expense not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), without entering into advertised contracts therefor.

Resolved, That for the purpose of defraying any minor or incidental expenses in the Sanatorium for the Care and Treatment of Persons Living in The City of New York, suffering with tuberculosis, located at Otisville, Town of Mount Hope, Orange County, N. Y., contingent to the Department of Health, the Hospital Physician in charge of the said sanatorium may, by requisition, draw upon the Comptroller for a sum not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500); the said Hospital Physician may, in like manner, renew the drafts as often as the Board of Health may deem it necessary, to the extent of the appropriation set apart for contingencies of the Department of Health;

but no such renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for to the Comptroller, by the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers, certified by the Commissioners of the Board of Health, covering the expenditures of money paid thereon.

Whereas, The Commissioner of Street Cleaning desires to purchase for the use of his Department, without public letting, an automobile at a cost not to exceed three thousand five hundred dollars;

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen, under the authority of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, hereby orders that the Commissioner of Street Cleaning may purchase for the use of the Department of Street Cleaning an automobile, without resort to public letting; provided that the cost of such automobile shall not exceed the sum or price of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500).

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment February 28, 1908, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes specified therein.

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000), to provide means for improvements and additions, and for the construction of additional stories to the Kings County Court House, Borough of Brooklyn; and when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

Dear Sir—In compliance with instructions I hand you herewith a report of the work done and in course of construction under my supervision, for the quarter ending December 31, 1907:

Statement No. 1 contains a report of the financial transactions during the quarter. Statement No. 2 is the report of Chief Engineer, Mr. Horace Loomis, which is a detailed and complete statement of work done and in course of construction, and work completed during the quarter, etc.

Statement No. 3 shows the amount of work done and materials used by the laboring force in the cleaning and repairing of sewers and basins during the quarter.

The present total length of the sewerage system in the Borough of Manhattan is 2,730,967 linear feet or 517.22 miles with 6,259 receiving basins, making the amount completed of new sewer during the quarter, 5,688 linear feet of sewer and 28 receiving basins.

The following sewers have been completed during the quarter:

Sewer and appurtenances in Fletcher street, between South and Front streets. Sewer in Tenth avenue, between Two Hundred and Eleventh and Two Hundred and Thirteenth streets, and in Two Hundred and Thirteenth street, between Tenth avenue and Broadway.

Sewer and appurtenances in Tenth avenue, between Two Hundred and Ninth and Two Hundred and Eleventh streets and between Two Hundred and Thirteenth and Two Hundred and Sixteenth streets.

Outlet sewer and appurtenances in West Two Hundred and Eleventh street, between the Harlem River and Broadway.

Sewer and appurtenances in Two Hundred and Fourteenth street, between Tenth avenue and Broadway.

Reconstruction of outlet sewer at the foot of Seventy-fourth street, East River.

Reconstruction of sewer under Pier 61, North River, and in Marginal street, east side, between Eighteenth and Twenty-first streets.

Sewer in West Two Hundred and Fifteenth street, between the Harlem River and Ninth avenue.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in First avenue, between Eighty-first and Eighty-fourth streets, and in Eighty-second street, between First and Second avenues, to curves in Eighty-first and Eighty-third streets at First avenue.

Receiving basins and extension to sewer and appurtenances on the north and south sides of East Seventy-second street at retaining wall of Exterior street, and on the southwest corner of One Hundred and Twentieth street and St. Nicholas avenue, and on the southwest corner of One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street and Seventh avenue and on the northwest corner of One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street and Lenox avenue, and extension of sewer in Ninety-seventh street, between Madison and Park avenues.

There are now in active progress seven (7) contracts payable from Street Improvement Fund, amounting to \$57,863.02. There are also four (4) reconstruction contracts now in progress, payable from the Reconstruction of Sewers Bond Accounts, amounting to \$125,571. A detailed statement of the above works appears in schedule annexed.

The following contracts are prepared for advertising and are in the hands of the Commissioner of Public Works. When the City's financial condition is such as will allow of these works going forward they will be advertised in the CITY RECORD and corporation papers, after which the work will be prosecuted:

Reconstruction of sewer in Fourth street, between Avenues A and C.

Reconstruction of sewer in Fifth street, between Avenues A and C.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in Columbus avenue, between Ninety-seventh and Ninety-eighth streets.

Extension of sewer in One Hundred and Forty-first street, between Harlem River and end of present sewer.

Sewer in Ninth avenue, between Two Hundred and Tenth and Two Hundred and Fifteenth streets, and between Two Hundred and Eighteenth street and Broadway.

The following sewers have been petitioned for by property owners, and preliminary steps have been taken toward building the same:

Alteration and improvement to sewer in Columbus avenue, between Ninety-seventh and Ninety-eighth streets.

Receiving basins on the northeast corner of Forty-sixth street and First avenue and on the north side of Forty-sixth street, half-way between First avenue and East River.

Sewer in Post avenue, between Dyckman street and Tenth avenue, not already sewered.

Sewer in One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, between Eighth avenue and Harlem River.

Sewer in One Hundred and Seventieth street, between Fort Washington and Haven avenues.

Receiving basins on the west side of Exterior street, between Sixty-fourth and Eighty-first streets, East River.

Sewer in Bennett avenue, between Broadway and One Hundred and Eighty-first street.

Sewer in Broadway, both sides, from Two Hundred and Fourteenth street to Ship Canal Bridge.

Sewers in Ninth avenue, between Two Hundred and Tenth and Two Hundred and Fifteenth streets and between Two Hundred and Eighteenth street and Broadway.

Sewer in Two Hundred and Twelfth street, between Harlem River and Broadway.

Sewer in Scammel street, between Water and Cherry streets.

Extension of sewer in One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street and Harlem River.

Extension of sewer in One Hundred and Eleventh street, between Eighth and Manhattan avenues.

Extension of sewer in One Hundred and Twentieth street, at East River.

Receiving basin on northeast corner Avenue A and Twenty-second street.

West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street (Depot lane), Haven avenue to Riverside drive.

Sewer in Seaman avenue, between Academy and Emerson streets.

One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, between Audubon and St. Nicholas avenues.

Basin south side One Hundred and Eighteenth street, between Lenox and Fifth avenues.

Reconstruction of outlet sewer under Pier (new) 15, East River, and in South street, between Maiden lane and Burling slip.

Reconstruction of outlet sewer at the foot of Seventy-ninth street, East River.

Outlet sewer in Harlem river, between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, and in Park avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets.

Reconstruction of outlet sewer at the foot of Market street, East River.

Reconstruction of sewer at Hudson street and Albany street.

Rebuilding of sewer in Twenty-sixth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues.

Rebuilding of sewer in Liberty street, Greenwich to West street.

Rebuilding of sewer in Liberty street, Nassau street and Maiden lane.

Rebuilding of sewer in John street, Broadway to Pearl street.

Rebuilding of sewer in Cedar street, between Broadway and Nassau street.

Rebuilding of sewer in First avenue, between Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets, and in Twenty-ninth street, from First avenue to East river.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in Columbus avenue, between Ninety-seventh and Ninety-eighth streets.

Sewer in Avenue A, between Eleventh and Twelfth streets.

Receiving basin, Manhattan street, west of Twelfth avenue.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in Ninety-second street, between Park and Second avenues.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in Two Hundred and Eleventh street, between Third and Lexington avenues.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street, between Broadway and Fort Washington avenue.

Most of the work done during the quarter consisted of sewers built in the extreme upper end of the island and of sewers made necessary by the important water front improvements in the Chelsea district; in both of these districts work on some contracts is still under way.

One of the important works outside of these is the sewer and overflow being constructed at the foot of West Forty-second street, and its completion will do away with what was long a nuisance and an eyesore at that point.

The Bureau has an appropriation for the reconstruction of a number of outlets in the lower end of the City for which plans and contracts will be prepared as soon as there is any prospect of relief in the City finances.

This work is always difficult in consequence of the congested condition of the lower part of the City, and requires great care during its construction.

I again desire to call attention to the condition of the system caused by the present and proposed systems of subways and other underground structures, and repeat that a definite policy looking to permanence of the sewers should be adopted. Some of the changes now being made are in my opinion hazardous experiments and may involve both the sewer system and the subways in serious trouble.

REPORT OF THE ACTING SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices,
New York, February 10, 1908. }

Hon. HENRY S. THOMPSON, Commissioner of Public Works:

Sir—In compliance with your instructions I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending December 31, 1907:

Hall of Records Building.

Orders were issued for the completion of the removing of the various departments now occupying this building. The usual Janitor's and Engineer's supplies were furnished. Confirmatory orders were issued for installing new valves on blow-off to water column and vent line to No. 2 boiler. The leaks on the pump governor were repaired and steam gauge to pressure line in elevator pump reinstalled and connected. Pressure regulating valve was also installed on ice machine pump. A high pressure steam trap was installed in the pump room. New globe valves on steam supply to pumps, steam syphon and discharge pipe in elevator pit boiler room and pipe for air pressure cleaner to motors in attic were installed. The lubricators to feed pumps were properly connected, also the lubricators to return pumps from the indirect heating system, also the lubricators to air pumps were connected. Connection was made for the steam and return pipes to the oil filter in the elevator room. The flange joints on the high pressure and heating lines throughout basement were repaired. Repairs were also made to the steam supply to pump. New valve pipe and fittings were installed on main heating line in the pump room, under the direction of the Chief Engineer. The cut-off rope on No. 2 elevator was renewed and the lifting cables on No. 6 elevator were shortened and new automatic cut-off cable furnished.

The governor belts on engines Nos. 1, 2 and 3 were shortened and new leather belt for electric house pump furnished, together with one piece of $\frac{1}{8}$ -inch thick belt leather, 6 by 24 inches. One 3-inch valve was installed on the connection to the steam-heating riser in the cellar. Eight toilet fixtures on the second floor were repaired. The furnace door arch piers of boilers Nos. 1, 2 and 5 were rebuilt. Panel partition dividing the offices of the Armory Board was erected and the interior divided to suit the requirements of said Board. A 7-foot revolving door, constructed of birch, stained mahogany, with all necessary hardware and appurtenances complete, was furnished and erected in the middle doorway. Counters and desks, similar in design and construction to the original work in the offices of the Personal Bureau, Department of Taxes and Assessments, were erected in accordance with specifications. The wood used was selected African mahogany, with Florentine glass, and a base of the best quality Italian marble. Shelving and record cases were furnished and erected in Room 5 for the storage of documents. The railings in the various rooms in this building were repaired, adjusted and braced. About 10 linear feet of railing was furnished and set to match the general design of the building. The railing and gates in the Surrogate's offices were all repaired and properly braced. A railing and gate were installed in the storeroom in the basement, also repairs were made to the bronze gate in the office of the Corporation Counsel, sixth floor. The broken glass in the building was removed and replaced with new. The window shades throughout the building were repaired and new parts furnished where required. The necessary signs, indicating offices, etc., were lettered. Necessary labor required to open safe was furnished for the Surrogate's Court, and domestic, plain green linoleum was furnished in Room 9 in this court. Two Wilton rugs were also furnished. Two 60-inch mahogany roll-top desks, having plain mahogany bases, and one chair were furnished for the use of Surrogate Beckett. Cork carpet was laid in the various rooms of the Department of Taxes and Assessments as required. Supplies of hardware to the various courts and offices in this building, together with brass door stops, were furnished as required. One 24-light steel safe was furnished for the use of Judge Beckett.

Criminal Courts Building.

The usual supplies for cleaning purposes and for the Engineer were furnished during the quarter. The cut-off of No. 2 elevator was repaired, the circulating pipe on No. 1 elevator was taken down and leaks repaired, the operating cables on elevators Nos. 4 and 5 were shortened, the pistons, operating valves and pilot valves of elevators Nos. 1 and 2 were repacked, elevator pipes were repaired and defective parts renewed on elevators Nos. 3 and 6, elevators Nos. 1 and 2 were repacked and defective valves and piping on all of the elevators in this building were renewed throughout. The two 9 by 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ by 10 Worthington pumps were repaired and all defective parts replaced with new. The leaks in the feed water pipe and main steam pipe, also the drip pipe of elevator pump, were repaired. Repairs were made to the hot water tank connection, reducing valve, safety valve and steam main. A new railing for the attic room connected with the District Attorney's office was erected to make an enclosed space for a storeroom. The gates of the building were repaired and new spring hinges furnished. About 78 feet of grill railing was furnished and erected in the Criminal Branch of the Supreme Court. Two 5-light and two 3-light electric fixtures were furnished and erected for the Court of Special Sessions. An electrical annunciator system was installed in the District Attorney's office. The position of the volt meter was changed, the same repaired and rewired. The walls, ceilings and woodwork of the Criminal Branch of the Supreme Court and the private hall and corridor leading from General Sessions, Parts III. and IV., were painted. The position of the lights in the Clerk's room in Judge Foster's chambers was changed and new lighting fixtures installed. Changes were made in the chambers of Justice Foster, as directed by the architects supervising the contract work. The door trim and the hardware on the door leading from the Judge's chambers to the District Attorney's office was replaced. One oak standing desk, 16 feet long and 3 feet wide, containing 8 drawers, 3 compartments 24 inches wide, with doors and a section 10 by 11 inches, with pigeonholes erected on top of desk and running the full length of same, was furnished for the use of the District Attorney's office. One 10-foot by 30-inch table and one 5-foot by 28-inch table, quartered oak, were furnished for the Criminal Branch of the Supreme Court, and for Justice Foster's chambers one quartered oak, flat top desk, 5 feet long, and one quartered oak, leather revolving chair and one flat desk were furnished. One Bigelow Wilton carpet rug, 23 feet by 19 feet 6 inches, with $\frac{5}{8}$ -inch border, and one Bigelow Lancaster Wilton carpet rug, 21 feet 7 inches by 10 feet 6 inches and $\frac{5}{8}$ -inch border, were furnished for Judge Foster. Four quartered roll top desks, 5 feet long, four revolving office chairs, one revolving bookstand, one 6-foot flat top, quartered oak desk, one revolving oak office chair and one small quartered oak table, 24 by 24 inches, were furnished for the District Attorney's office. Fifteen Kinsman desk lights were furnished for roll top desks and one Kinsman light for flat top desk.

County Court House.

Supplies of all kinds have been furnished for cleaning purposes to the Janitor, also supplies to the Engineer, as required, during the quarter. All additional supplies required to complete the contract work for the alterations of the old Justices' Chambers in the above building were furnished under order. In addition to contract work, which consisted in enlarging the various offices of the Justices to suit the requirements, tapestry panels were hung in the chambers under the direction of the Architect in charge of the contract work. The electrical work was reinstalled where disturbed by the alterations. Confirmatory orders were issued for the installation of all of the electrical work required to provide lighting systems in the offices and chambers of the new Justices of the Supreme Court. All of this work was inspected by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and certificates issued by them thereon. Orders confirming extra work for plastering in the Janitor's apartments, Justices' dining-room, erecting shelving in Justice Truax's room and for repairing flooring and changing partitions, were given. The wall of rotunda in front of Part III., room in Janitor's apartment, room occupied by Captain of Court Officers, were painted, sign for County Clerk's office was lettered also, the glass on the doors of the ladies' toilets and walls and ceilings of same were painted with three coats of paint. All lettering required to change the sign boards of the Supreme Court was done. Confirmatory orders for erecting quartered oak panel partition, moulded on both sides, also for clothes closet for additional office in the new chambers on ground floor, for erecting sliding quartered oak doors in Justice Goff's office, for erecting oak gate in Part V., Special Term, for connecting chairs in rows in Part III., Special Term, for erecting oak clothes closet in Justices' chambers and for erecting Judges' stand and desk and repairing clothes closets in Part II., Special Term, were issued. Two joints in the main steam line were repaired, also leaks in the plumbing system and two flat radiators under each window in Judge Leventritt's room, were installed, and the radiator under west window was removed, and all work done to provide proper heating facilities in this room. The four large water tanks in the attic of building were thoroughly cleaned, scraped and given two coats of princess metallic paint. All required repairs were made to the plumbing and steam system during the quarter. Extra closet was furnished and built in the stationery room. The railing in Special Term, Part III., that was in a defective condition was properly fastened and repairs were made to vault lights where required. For the use of Justice Blanchard one sectional bookcase with sliding doors was furnished. Confirmatory orders were also issued for the furniture and linoleum that was furnished for the equipment of the new court rooms and offices, for which the special appropriation was not sufficient. One special mahogany desk was furnished for Justice Goff's room and one silk draw curtain, with rods for Justice Blanchard's room. One selected sectional bookcase was furnished for Justice Newberger's room, and for the Calendar Clerk one Underwood typewriter No. 5, with card attachment, was furnished. One Howard clock with twelve-inch dial was furnished for the Supreme Court, also one mahogany bulletin board, made to order, was furnished and set outside of Special Term, Part III. In the north chambers six one-inch brass poles, with fittings and rings, for private rooms, also one two-inch brass pole, with fittings and rings for entrance to the judges' private chambers, were furnished and put up. In the northeast private room, Justices' chambers, new carpet was furnished and laid. The safe and steel filing case was removed from the second to the first floor, as directed. One new improved French Imperial cooking range, with all necessary equipment, was furnished and connected for the Judges' dining room. In the Judges' chambers, thirteen Kinsman roll-top desk lamps, two Kinsman flat top desk lamps, with fuses and sockets, were furnished.

City Hall.

The usual cleaning supplies for the Janitor and supplies for the steam plant were furnished. The necessary electrical work required to remove the fire hazards existing upon the building was performed. New push buttons were connected in the office of the President of the Borough. All of the leaks in the plumbing system were repaired, and all the alterations required were made. Defective glass throughout building was removed and replaced. About forty-eight shades were repaired and reversed. Thirteen new window shades and eight new tin spring rollers were furnished. The tiling in front of the Governors' room was repaired and one perforated mat, 5 feet 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches by 3 feet $\frac{3}{4}$ inches, lettered, and wool mat unlettered, 5 feet 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches by 34 inches, were furnished for this room.

President, Borough of Manhattan—One new City directory for the year 1907, together with a supply of toilet soap for granulators, were furnished.

Board of Aldermen—Repairs were made to one (1) cabinet and the same refinished in mahogany.

Brownstone Building.

The customary cleaning and engineer's supplies were furnished, as usual. The stop cable on No. 1 elevator was secured and properly reset, the cable shortened and gearing adjusted. All required repairs were made to the toilet fixtures throughout building. Defective valves on the steam apparatus were repaired and new parts furnished as required. Door checks throughout building were repaired and new ones furnished where needed.

West Fifty-fourth Street Court House.

Janitor's and Engineer's supplies were furnished as needed. All of the changes, alterations and repairs required to keep the plumbing system in perfect running order were performed, and required repairs were made to the steam plant, the boiler relined and bridge walls rebuilt.

Harlem Court House.

Supplies for the Janitor and Engineer were delivered during the quarter. The public toilet on the second floor of the building was put in proper repair, also basin in Clerks' toilet, second floor. The toilets and urinals in the various Justices', Clerks' rooms, etc., were kept in proper repair and regulated. Defective mantles throughout building were replaced with new Welsbach lights, as required. Two telephone brackets were furnished for the use of the Court, together with a supply of ice.

Children's Court.

Cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished during the quarter. The roof of the above building, together with the gutter and leader, were properly repaired, in accordance with specifications. One new horizontal tubular boiler, three feet in diameter by ten feet long, made of 5-16-inch steel, with manhole in top of shell and handhole in each head, having cast-iron lugs, riveted to each side of shell, with new cast-iron arch plates, was furnished and connected to present piping. The old and defective material was disconnected and carted away from the premises. One new double swinging gate was furnished and erected in the court room. Necessary gas heaters were furnished for additional heating purposes in the court room. Repairs were made to the plumbing system as required. Twelve sections of document files, made of oak, twelve inches high, seven files to each case, matching those at present in use, were furnished, with tops.

Seventh District Court House.

Cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished as usual, and the boiler was relined with No. 1 fire brick, the ash box rebuilt with North River hard brick and the arch around boiler was also rebuilt. Repairs were made to the leaders and gutters in accordance with specifications. Defective gas mantles were removed and replaced with new. For the Magistrate's Court, domestic green cork carpet was furnished and laid.

Thirteenth District Municipal Court.

The usual cleaning supplies for the Janitor and supplies for the Engineer were furnished. An order was issued for the erection of Justice's desk, Clerk's desk and panel railing with gates, base, cappings and mouldings. Necessary alterations were made to suit the requirements of the Jury box, and the plumbing system was kept in perfect repair.

Third District Court House.

Janitor's and Engineer's supplies were furnished as needed. Repairs were made to the cathedral glass in the Court. Repairs were also made to the plumbing system, sewer and leader lines and the plumbing system where removed was properly replaced. Defective mantles throughout building were replaced with new Welsbach lights. For the use of the Magistrate's Court, one high revolving desk stool was furnished.

Essex Market Court House.

Defective mantles were removed and replaced with new Welsbach lights as required, also Engineer's and Janitor's supplies furnished.

First District Municipal Court.

The Janitor and Engineer were supplied with such articles as were necessary. Defective mantles were replaced with new Welsbach lights.

Second District Municipal Court.

Janitor's supplies were furnished and three telephone brackets were installed.

Fifth District Municipal Court.

Janitor's supplies were furnished as required, also two telephone arms, and the defective Welsbach lights were replaced.

Under an opinion of the Corporation Counsel, the New York County Jail was declared to be under the jurisdiction of the Sheriff's office, and we, therefore, have no charges for maintenance as heretofore. Previous to the opinion above mentioned, the grate was put in proper repair and thoroughly cleaned.

The Markets.

Cleaning supplies were furnished for the various markets as required.

Washington Market—One globe fixture was installed at the corner of Fulton and West streets. Defective leader at stand No. 126 was replaced with new; also other repairs made to leader and Croton pipes.

West Washington Market—Two new steel rolling shutters were furnished and properly set in position at stand occupied by Adams Bros. in above market. Repairs were also made to two steel shutters and one new shutter furnished at stand No. 15 Gansevoort avenue. Repairs were also made to steel shutters at Nos. 34, 36 and 38 Bloomfield street.

Public Baths.

Necessary cleaning supplies and supplies for the Engineers of the various baths were delivered as needed.

Rivington Street Bath—Needed repairs were made to the steam plant, also 11 Gagenstrom heads were furnished with one dozen new tube bundles. The furnaces were properly relined and the bottom of ash pits cemented. Defective steam pipes and fittings were removed and replaced with new, also defective hot and cold water pipes, together with valves, connections, etc. The floor drains were altered on the second floor and the same installed in the hanging ceiling. The defective hot water lines, extending from the hot water heater to the rising lines supplying the upper floors, were replaced. New flanges at headers back of boiler were put in, 4-inch valve taken out, 2 extra bleeders to steam main installed and leaks repaired in flanges. Defective pipes and fittings were removed and replaced with new as required. One 4-inch trident water meter, with all necessary connections, was installed.

Allen Street Bath—Showers and mixing valves were thoroughly repaired and put in satisfactory working order, also the wastes to the tubs and Croton pipes. It was necessary in order to make the repairs to remove the marble slabs and properly replace same. Return steam pipes in the cellar, also the coils and radiators were repaired and put in working order. A complete set of circular grate bars were furnished and installed under the boiler.

East Eleventh Street Bath—The water heaters were removed from rear of cellar to pump room, the feed water heater disconnected, repairs made to flange joints, hot water tank connected to heaters and all necessary valves, etc., furnished complete. Two new 3/4-inch globe valves and nipples on water gauge were installed, 3/4-inch drip connection from steam exhaust at pumps were put in and connected with sump pit. Hangers were put on exhaust line and emptying pipe from Clow heaters to sump pit, repairs made at suction tank and pressure tanks, as directed by the Engineer; also two new No. 2 Clow automatic water heaters, with all necessary parts, were furnished. A 2-inch connection was installed from the pressure, as directed by the Engineer.

New Public Bath, Twenty-third Street and Avenue A—This public bath is nearing completion and the following additional orders were issued: One (1) single rung ladder was installed, 18 inches in width and 7 feet 6 inches in height, with 3/4-inch hand rails on each side; and platform supported on brackets and set between storage room and toilet room. The glass surfaces provided under the contract, which were installed, were found unsuitable for the purposes of the plunge, owing to atmospheric conditions, and, upon the recommendations of the architects, an extra order was issued for the removal of said surfaces and the installation of ceramic tiling on the sides and bottom of the plunge. All necessary water-proofing in conjunction with this work was performed complete in accordance with the directions and supervision of the architects on the contract work. The fixtures at the front entrance and exit doors were altered as required. Necessary supplies for the equipment of this bath were furnished ready for the opening of the same.

West Forty-first Street Bath—The injector for the steam boiler was repaired and reset, also the hot and cold water supply to bath tubs and mixing valve and shower ring. The floors in the bath were removed, also the marble slabs, for the purpose of installing new sections of supply pipe to showers, and the same properly reset after repairs were completed. New headers and valves were installed to properly control the water supply to the building. All necessary piping, globe valves, unions, etc., needed to make a complete job were furnished. Necessary repairs were made to leaks in return main, also to grate bars of boiler No. 2.

West Sixtieth Street Bath—Repairs were made to 5 steam traps and 21 flange joints in the boiler and engine room. Leaks in steam pipes were properly repaired and gauge glasses, etc., furnished. Necessary repairs at sink and waste pipes were also made, together with repairs to toilets and fixtures. Two steam traps, with all necessary connections, etc., were installed, defective material removed and the same replaced with new. Wire guards over front doors were furnished and installed. Supplies of alum for cleaning the water in the plunge were furnished as required.

East Seventy-sixth Street Bath—All excavation permits, etc., required for repairs to valves were furnished and work done. Drilling in the marble on bath seats was also done and repairs made to same and marble seats rebolted. New hot water heater, with piping, etc., was installed and connected in conjunction with the hot water boiler. The valves throughout the bath were thoroughly repaired, marble seats were reset and leaks in water service piping in the street were also repaired and the necessary excavation in order to perform the same was done under permit from the Highway Bureau. New hot water heater, with required connections, piping, etc., was furnished and installed in conjunction with the boiler: 31 showers on the men's side, mixer in Room 7, women's side, were repaired, together with two bath tubs and wash basins on the same side. Bath tub on men's side, second floor, was repaired, also the gutter and ceiling and the mixing valve in Room 17. Steam leaks were also properly repaired and the plant kept in good running order during the quarter.

East One Hundred and Ninth Street Bath—The drains to showers in the upper floor were cleared and repaired and new drain pipes set under concrete flooring. Leaks in pit behind boiler and at pump and feed water tank were repaired. Feed valve between two boilers was installed. Defective piping from the hot water pump to boiler was replaced and globe check valves and connections required to complete the job furnished. The marble work, cement flooring, etc., was removed where leaks appeared and the same repaired and cement and flooring restored properly. Steam leaks throughout building were given attention during the quarter and placed in repair.

Public Comfort Stations.

Cleaning supplies were furnished during the quarter as required. The heating plants in the various stations were repaired and put in working order.

Station, One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Street and Park Avenue—One fresh air inlet was installed.

Station, Greeley Square—Angle brackets, marble stalls, etc., were put in and the toilet fixtures cleared and repaired. Repairs were made to the marble steps, where defective.

Station, Long Acre Square—Obstruction in the water main in the men's section was removed. In order to make the repairs, it was necessary to excavate to the water main and replace the paving. Angle brackets were installed where required.

Station, City Hall Park—Defective Croton water pipes back of marble work were removed and replaced with new piping suspended from ceiling, urinal stalls and backs removed to allow steam pipes to be taken out and replaced, waste pipes of urinals cleared, and same with toilet fixtures properly repaired and new slop sink installed. The present cooling coil in this station was replaced with a new one, steam traps and meter disconnected and the necessary return and drip connections broken, all leaks repaired and the apparatus left in perfect working order.

Station, Sheriff and Delancey Streets—Repairs were made to the plumbing and two (2) water closets reset.

Station, Chatham Square—New switches installed at above station.

Station, Hanover Square—New switches were installed, motors rewound, repairs made to defective parts in automatic starter for the control of the motor plates and the field windings taken out and reinsulated. The motors were raised to prevent dampness.

Station, Battery Park—The sewer was cleared at the southwest corner of building and toilets repaired where required.

Free Floating Baths.

Tug boats, etc., were furnished for towing the fourteen free floating baths from the North and East Rivers to their winter quarters at the foot of Twenty-second street, South Brooklyn. Orders were also issued for the disconnection of the anchors and chains and for the storage of the baths.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Labor, trucks, etc., required were furnished, and all of the office belongings of the Board were moved from the Stewart Building to the fourteenth floor of the Broadway Chambers Building; also the appurtenances and furniture of the above Board, which were on the eighth floor, were removed to the fourteenth floor.

Finance Department.

Bureau of Assessments and Arrears—The furniture, books, records, etc., of the above Bureau were moved from the old offices in the Stewart Building to the new offices in the same building on the ground floor. Electric lighting equipment, desk lights, etc., were also put in. Two telephone brackets were installed.

Bureau of Law and Adjustment—One antique oak legal cap unit, with ends complete, was furnished, with one set of 150 subdivision guides.

Stock and Bond Division—One large steel filing case was removed from the basement in the County Court House to the office of this Division, and properly set in position, and the same was repaired, painted, varnished and lettered, and all trimmings renicked equal to new. The defective Welsbach lights in this office were replaced with new.

Charitable Institutions Division—The defective Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts, as required.

Bookkeeping and Awards Division—One bookkeeper's standing desk, about 12 feet long, was furnished for Room 3.

Deputy Comptroller's Office—Repairs were made to the window shades, as required; also one oak cabinet with interior lock furnished.

Welsbach lights in Rooms 18 to 24, 25 to 37 and 1 to 9 were repaired, and defective parts replaced with new.

City Paymaster—The gas piping was extended to give additional lighting facilities for Clerks, the shades were repaired and reversed and one chair furnished.

Offices Commissioners of Accounts.

Confirmatory orders were issued for the removal of all of the books, office furniture, records, documents, etc., including machinery, belonging to the Engineering Bureau

of the above office, from No. 280 Broadway, third floor, to the new offices at Nos. 127 and 129 Franklin street. All of the laboratory and testing apparatus was properly set in position and connected. One platform and partition, with glazed top, were furnished and erected in the rooms of the Engineering Division, and a supply of hardware furnished for the use of the Chief Engineer.

Municipal Civil Service Commission.

Two book-cases, as selected, two telephone arms, one rug, one mattress for gymnasium and one jump standard were furnished for the use of the above Commission.

Offices Commissioner of Public Works.

Six copies of Cosby's "Code of Ordinances, 1907," were furnished.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices—Necessary repairs were made to one Fay-Sholes and to one Columbia Barlock typewriter, and tabulator attached to the latter, also one card index drawer for Superintendent's desk, twenty-five maps of the Borough of Manhattan, twenty-five sets of blueprints of alterations for markets, one set blueprints of the West Fifty-fourth Street Court House, a supply of draughting materials, printed copies of specifications for public markets and baths, copies of rules and regulations for baths, and guide cards, were furnished.

Bureau of Sewers—Repairs were made to one Remington typewriter and one City Directory was furnished.

Bureau of Buildings, No. 220 Fourth Avenue—Defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new.

Bureau of Highways—One leather seat and one cane seat chair for Room 1628, one revolving chair for Room 1625 and one scorcher stove for the Fifty-sixth Street Yard were furnished.

Besides the work heretofore specifically enumerated cleaning supplies were furnished and delivered from the storeroom to the various public buildings and offices, as required. The windows and doors in the various public buildings were cleaned under contract, and the following supplies were distributed as needed: Coal and wood for heating, ice, brooms, pails, soap powder, waste paper baskets, sapolio, sponges, mop handles, feather dusters, scrub brushes, ash cans, etc. Among the many items of repairs in the various public buildings and offices not heretofore mentioned were plumbing, steamfitting, carpentering, roofing, painting and electric work, etc., performed by mechanics in the employ of the Bureau.

Owing to the lack of funds during the last quarter of this year I was unable to honor the large amount of requisitions made upon the Bureau for work of an urgent and necessary character, and it was necessary for me to exercise the strictest economy in the operation of the public buildings, and much necessary work had to be omitted. However, I hope to furnish all the supplies needed within a very short time under the new appropriation for the year 1908.

In conclusion I wish to record some general observations occurring to me since I actually assumed charge of this office on June 1, 1907.

In order to be understood it seems to me that there are three great divisions to be recognized in this Bureau; the first, that of employees; the second, that of supplies, and the third, that of repairs.

In the division of employees there has been made a radical change in the method of keeping and receiving the time of the employees. Previous to the system that is now in operation it was the custom to have both the weekly and monthly time handed in irregularly on time sheets, which simply contained the names of employees and the total number of days for which each was to be paid. In the case of the weekly time sheets these were usually handed in on a Thursday, although the week did not end until Saturday. The new system consists of a time sheet to be made out by the man in charge of each squad of employees, and said time sheet contains the name, address, title, each day of the week, rate of pay, total number of days and total earned for that week. These time sheets are handed in before 10 a. m. Monday following the week represented on the time sheet. By the old system it usually took between three and four days to get out the payrolls; by the new system the payrolls are usually gotten out in about five hours. Furthermore, it has been arranged to have these new time sheets sworn to by the man responsible for the time. Furthermore, an index card system of the employees has been established, whereby each employee's name is recorded on a card, which also contains his address, title, date of appointment and location of work. Any change of address or title is recorded on these cards, and any change in the location of work is also recorded, together with the respective dates of these changes.

Formerly there had accumulated large amounts of papers, books, mostly referring to employees, some of which papers and books were useful in connection with the routine work of the office and some of which were not useful, and were only referred to at rare times. The former I have had indexed and kept in the office under such a system as can be readily referred to; the latter I have had placed in storage boxes, labelled and sent for storage to the Rivington Street Corporation Yard. This has given more room in the offices occupied by this Bureau, and has greatly facilitated the handling of the business of the office, particularly in the matter of the employees' division.

All the above mentioned changes in reference to the employees' division are working satisfactorily, and we have more complete and satisfactory records than ever before.

In the division of supplies there has not been a uniform system of keeping records of same in the lines of purchasing or distribution, and furthermore, there has been a wide variety of supplies which I feel can be reduced in number by adopting a list of supplies which will be allowed to be used, particularly in the line of janitors' supplies. This division of supplies may be subdivided as follows: Janitors' supplies, Engineers' supplies, repair squad supplies and miscellaneous.

Janitors' supplies could be reduced from the wide variety that has been used to a more closely limited variety, similar to the Board of Education. This condition is being approached by a study of what is really required by the janitor service, and when the standards are fixed, confining Janitors to these particular standards.

In the matter of Engineers' supplies, these cannot be so closely limited, owing to the wide variety of makes of machinery which comes under the care of this Bureau, the different makes of machinery requiring different style of details; but a more closely limited variety may be reached in the matter of tools.

In the matter of repair squads' supplies, there are at present the following squads organized: Carpenter, paint and varnish, electric, roofing, awning and pipe covering and steamfitters, and it is hoped in the near future to organize a plumbing squad. As a result of the formation of these squads since I assumed this office, the amount of work done by outside contractors has been considerably reduced, but the amount of this class of supplies has been slightly increased owing to the Bureau purchasing supplies and tools itself, and not the contracting parties; furthermore, the prices for these supplies have been reduced, as we buy direct, and thus save the middleman's or contractor's profit.

Under the head of miscellaneous is included such matters as carpets, linoleums, furniture, furnishings, typewriters, filing cabinets, etc. There is such a wide variety of demand under this miscellaneous head it would need considerable study to develop a system for properly handling this feature, and as the other subdivisions can be systemized more readily and demand immediate attention, the miscellaneous subdivisions will have to be left until later on, when a rational study of same can be taken up.

Since June 1, 1907, the above mentioned supplies, in a very large majority of cases, have been purchased after competitive bidding. I am in favor wherever possible to do this purchasing under contract, but the first feature of a contract is the quantity to be dealt with. This quantity can only be arrived at after a systematic record has been kept, so that statistics may be derived therefrom. There has been no systematic records of supplies kept in the past, and I have been endeavoring to formulate a system of records whereby statistics could be arrived at on which to base contracts. At present there is being printed for this Bureau a loose leaf book, in which will be kept a systematic system of supplies, so that rational quantities can be derived therefrom on which to base contracts.

At this point there is another class of supplies or repairs which I wish to speak of in particular, and which is the following: Hardware supplies, electric supplies, paint, etc., supplies, locksmith work, glazing and furniture repairs. In these cases, where there is time enough, bids are obtained and the order is awarded to the lowest bidder; but where there is not time enough the following means have been adopted: An original order is issued to a conveniently located and reputable firm, which order states that supplies shall be delivered or repairs done to an amount not exceeding a specified sum, anywhere from \$50 to \$200, depending upon the anticipated demands.

Then when an emergency request is received, such as hardware or electric supplies, or paint supplies, a "check" order for such supplies is issued to the firm holding the original order, and these supplies or repairs in these particular lines can be obtained immediately, which is the object of the system. This is a similar system to that adopted by large corporations, such as the New York Central Railroad, the Pennsylvania Railroad, the Plaza Hotel, etc. It has worked very satisfactorily, and until a better system for such could be obtained I would recommend its retention.

The division of repairs covers a very wide field of great varieties; as can be imagined when it is considered that the Bureau has under its jurisdiction the care of sixty-two buildings, forty-five of which are owned by the City and seventeen of which are leased, or partly leased. The repairs cover everything, such as carpets, rugs, etc., furniture, etc., furnishings, etc., structural features, etc., mechanical equipment, electrical equipment, etc. These repairs are either done by the repair squads or by contractors. Repairs which can be done and feasibly handled by the repair squads are done by said squads after the Bureau has received a written request to have the work done. A written duplicate order is then issued to the foreman of the repair squad, and upon completion of the work the Foreman turns in one of the duplicate orders with the date of completion written thereon, and the other duplicate order remains in his possession as a matter of record for the Foreman. In time this system can be improved upon in the line of giving the details of costs on the finished order by charging on said order to each particular job the cost of labor and material; and by such records statistics may be arrived at showing the cost of repairs to each building and the average cost for each particular class of repairs. These repair squads have been formed with employees already attached to this Bureau, by placing in each particular squad such employees as were particularly equipped or titled to do the work of that particular squad, and each squad was assigned a shop for keeping its supplies and doing shop work.

Repairs which cannot be handled by the repair squads are done by outside contractors, and generally after competitive bidding. In emergency repairs, such as breaks in steam plants or plumbing, etc., a contractor is ordered to make the repairs, and that contractor is usually selected who is located nearest to the location where the repairs are needed, or otherwise the contractor is selected who can get on the job the quickest. In these emergency repairs the contractor is required to send his estimate of cost as soon as possible, so that a written order may be issued to him immediately and thus eliminate work being done on verbal orders.

After supplies have been furnished or repairs completed all the papers, such as the original request, specifications, estimates, etc., notes or correspondence, and bill in connection with each particular requisition and original order is filed away in a specially printed envelope under the number of that particular requisition, and these "finished order" envelopes are filed away in numerical order. In this way the supplies furnished or work done is easily referred to, and therein is found all the information in connection with that particular requisition or order. The reference number adopted is the requisition number, it being the number this Bureau has full control of; and the number assigned to each requisition is the number of the page of the "Requisition Copy Book" on which the requisition is copied.

The amount of repairs is very large and is mostly due to the fact that the buildings and equipment are old or that the original construction was unsatisfactory or poorly designed. I feel that the emergency repairs can be materially reduced in amount by having proper inspections made, and at the time of inspection, if it can be seen that a weakness or defect is threatening, then at that time arrange to have the work done after competitive bidding or done by the repair squads; in this way a great many emergencies would be forestalled.

This matter of inspection is one of the reasons why I recommended in my previous quarterly reports the establishment of an engineering staff in this Bureau and which I provided for in my 1908 budget. I feel that such a staff would be capable of making inspections and would then be able to draw plans and specifications for each particular job and have the work done after competitive bidding. Such a staff could be composed of an electrical engineer, a mechanical engineer, civil engineer and draughtsman. At the time of this writing we have two Draughtsmen who have aided very materially in preparing plans and specifications for alterations, etc., and, in fact, have drawn the plans and specifications for all the alterations and equipment in the matter of providing court rooms, etc., for the new Municipal Court Districts in the Borough of Manhattan. Furthermore, it is desirable to have plans of all the buildings under the jurisdiction of this Bureau and have them arranged under a system, with all the necessary data in connection therewith. This is a matter that can only be handled by an engineering staff. Since having charge of this Bureau I have been endeavoring to get plans of all the buildings and have made material progress; the data in connection therewith could be worked up by the engineering staff and draughtsmen. Very recently a Mechanical Engineer has been appointed in this Bureau.

The above mentioned changes and recommendations, if carried out successfully, and which can very readily be done, will result in a material benefit to the Bureau and to the City. In fact, as in all modern large organizations, the success depends upon system, and should be such a system that is up to date and is in keeping with the times. As a result of the progress that has been made since June 1, 1907, a much larger volume of business has been handled and handled more successfully than heretofore, as is shown by a comparative financial statement of the expenditures of the seven months running from June 1 to December 31, 1906, as compared with the seven months running from June 1 to December 31, 1907, which shows that the expenditures of the latter period was about \$90,000 less than the former period.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
