BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

(FINANCIAL MATTERS.)

Minutes of Meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment Held in Room 16, City Hall, on Monday, October 31, 1910.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment. Present-William J. Gaynor, Mayor; William A. Prendergast, Comptroller; John Purroy Mitchel, President, Board of Aldermen; George McAneny, President, Borough of Manhattan.

The Mayor, Hon. William J. Gaynor, presided.

On motion of the President of the Board of Aldermen the Board adjourned to meet at 4 o'clock in the afternoon of this day.

October 31, 1910, 4 o'clock p. m.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment. Present-William J. Gaynor, Mayor; William A. Prendergast, Comptroller; John Purroy Mitchel, President, Board of Aldermen; George McAneny, President, Borough of Manhattan; Alfred E. Steers, President, Borough of Brooklyn; Cyrus C. Miller, President, Borough of The Bronx; Walter H. Bunn, Acting President, Borough of Queens; George Cromwell, President, Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. William J. Gaynor, presided.

The Board resolved itself into executive session. At 5.25 p. m. the Board reconvened in public session. All of the members as above noted were present. The Mayor, Hon. William J. Gaynor, presided.

Hon. John J. White, Alderman, Third District, addressed the Board and urged that a sufficient sum be included in the Budget to pay the Laborers in the employ of the City \$3 per diem.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan offered the following:

Whereas, The budgetary requests of the several Departments of the City Government have each year contained proposals for increases of salaries aggregating hundreds of thousands of dollars, the allowance of which would materially increase the cost of government of The City of New York; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment has for several years declined to consider increases of salaries in voting the appropriations of the departments;

Whereas. The Board is satisfied that many postitions throughout the Departments of the City Government are underpaid and that for many others compensation is provided disproportionate to the character of service required; and

Whereas, The efficiency of the several departments and the well being of the employees will be promoted by a thorough and careful regulation of salaries, in accordance with the character, responsibility and skill of work to be required, be it

Resolved, That this Board appoint a committee of three of its members, with power to associate with it representatives of the several departments and experts within and without the City Government, and to employ such staff of assistants, clerical and otherwise, as may be necessary to secure adequate information upon which to base its recommendations; and that said committee study and report upon the following matters at such time and in such order as it may find feasible:

1. To study the work performed by the various classes and individuals in the various branches of service of The City of New York, with a view to determining the adequacy, justness and propriety of compensation paid for such service, with reference to responsibility, skill, kind, character and volume of work, and to provide plans and measures for regulating the character of service rendered in accordance with compensation paid.

2. To study and ascertain the rates of compensation paid in efficiently organized private enterprises for work of a character similar to that performed by the employees of The City of New York.

To prepare plan and recommendations for the equalization of salaries for like work in each of the respective departments and of one such department with another. 4. To inquire into and prepare recommendations upon the feasibility of providing a means for the retirement of superannuated employees on the basis of length of

service rendered. 5. To devise and recommend measures for registering, recording and analyzing the character, quantity and value of work performed by the employees of the several departments of the City Government.

6. To inquire into and devise methods and measures for reflecting and recording the efficiency of the employees.

7. To inquire into and devise methods and measures for departmental and interdepartmental promotion of employees of the City departments, in order to provide a plan and basis for increased compensation in accordance with length and efficiency of

8. To inquire into the bearing and effect of civil service rules upon the efficiency and administrative conduct of the several departments to which such rules relate, with a view to recommending such changes as such inquiry may indicate to be desirable, -and be it further

Resolved, That for the purposes of this inquiry, the Board include an appropriation of \$35,000 in the Budget of The City of New York for the year 1911.

Which was adpoted by the following vote: Affirmative-The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx and Richmond and the Acting President of the Borough of Queens-16.

The statute referred to requires and provides that

The board of estimate and apportionment shall * * * annually include in its final estimate the following sum, which shall annually be raised and appropriated: A sum equal to so much of the deficiency, on the preceding first day of January, in the product of taxes theretofore levied and deemed by the board to be uncollectible as shall not have been provided for in prior tax levies or by the issue of corporate stock of the City of New York, or by such corporate stock duly authorized by said Board to be issued."

Second-That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an office, Bureau or Department in the City or County Governments in the schedules of "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees;" "Salaries, Temporary Employees;" "Wages, Regular Employees;" "Wages, Tempórary Employees;" "Compensation, Temporary Employees," herein contained, except (a) when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and (b) in the case of schedules under the title of "Salaries" or "Salaries, Regular Employees," or "Wages. - (b) That each and every payroll shall be accompanied by a recapitulation showing the exact amount expended to and including said payroll for every item appearing on the schedules supporting any of the appropriations against which all or any part of the moneys involved in said payroll is to be charged, and that this recapitulation shall contain the full schedules supporting any such appropriation or in case these schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportion ment, the full schedules as changed.
- (c) That each payroll of any Department, in addition to any other departmental number, shall be numbered during the year serially beginning with number one for each specific account, and such payroll shall bear a certificate signed by a person cognizant of the facts, stating that the recapitulation attached thereto is the correct recapitulation for the payroll bearing said
- (d) That in all instances where changes in schedule items have been made by twelve votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, all sums which have been expended against such schedule items as are changed shall be apportioned against the new lines in the same ratio as the new totals of the schedule items bear to the old totals.
- (e) That on all payrolls against schedules entitled "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees," and "Wages, Regular Employees," there shall be set forth the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules, or in case the items on such schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules as changed.
- (f) That there shall be affixed to all payrolls a certificate made by the person preparing such payrolls to the effect that there is a time record on file in said Board, office, Bureau or Department, certified by the person or persons having knowledge of the facts, showing the character of service and the exact time of employment of such person or persons on said payrolls, and that the distribution or division of the time of such person or persons as shown on such payrolls is in accordance with such time record.

tion and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Depart-
ment of Finance, and at all proper times the Department of Public Chari-
ties shall have access to the record of inmates.

4. All institutions receiving public moneys shall, not later than March 31 of each year, submit to the Comptroller an annual report covering the period of the preceding calendar year, showing receipts from all sources and expenditures for all purposes in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller.

5. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an apportionment has been made, he shall, in his discretion, suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and, upon the determination of said Board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.

6. Where apportionments are made upon a per capita basis for inmates of private charitable institutions, there will be no payments unless the inmates shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as proper charges against the City; and except in emergency cases the Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support, or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public hospitals.

In determining the acceptance of patients in private hospitals as proper charges, the Commissioner of Charities shall first consider the nature of the services actually rendered to the patients by the hospitals. The records of the institutions and the bed-card notes showing the treatment given shall be received as the essential evidence in deciding acceptances or rejections. The City shall not be liable for any payment to charitable institutions in excess of the apportionment which may have been made to such institutions, notwithstanding the acceptances of the Commissioner of Charities or any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

7. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

8. No money shall be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers.

9. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions for five (5) hours daily for a period equal to the public school year, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of five years of age and over during ten months in the year, except that for abnormal or atypical children a special ruling may be made by the Comptroller. Institutions receiving money under this section shall be under the general supervision of the Board of Education, as required by the general conditions relating to institutions receiving corporate school money, as provided in section 1154.

10. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City, and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities and has been placed in this Budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This order has no relation to the class of children of such mental and physical condition as those cared for in the City institution at Randalls Island.

11. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows: Provided that where the Comptroller finds, after proper investigation, that the per capita rates hereinafter provided are too high, he is hereby authorized, on the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to reduce such per capita rate or rates for any or all institutions.

The appropriations in this Budget are made subject to the following onditions, and acceptance of moneys by an institution shall be an acceptnce of such conditions:

1. The accounts and records of all charitable institutions receiving ublic moneys shall be so kept as to show receipts from all sources, all xpenditures, population, addresses of parents, guardian or nearest relaives of inmates, and such other information as shall be designed to faciliate inquiry into their financial inability to make provision for dependents n the institution, and shall be in such form as shall be satisfactory to the

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such nstitutions for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and main-

3. All institutions receiving public moneys and all their books of ecord and accounts relating to all funds and from whatsoever source eceived shall at all reasonable times be open to the visitation, inspection nd examination of duly authorized representatives of the Department of inance and at all proper times the Department of Public Charities shall ave access to the record of inmates.

4. All institutions receiving public moneys shall not later than March 1 of each year submit to the Comptroller an annual report covering the eriod of the preceding calendar year showing receipts from all sources nd expenditures for all purposes in such form as shall be satisfactory to ne Comptroller.

5. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it rould be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable istitution for which an apportionment has been made, he shall in his disretion suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of is intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for uthority to cease making further payments, and upon the determination f said Board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such istitution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall there-

6. Where apportionments are made upon a per capita basis for imates of private charitable institutions, there will be no payments unless 1e inmates shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Deartment of Public Charities as proper charges against the City; and xcept in emergency cases, the Commissioner of Charities shall not accept 3 proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support, or

or whose care adequate provision can be made in public hospitals. In determining the acceptance of patients, in priavte hospitals as roper charges, the Commissioner of Charities shall first consider the ature of the services actually rendered to the patients by the hospitals. he records of the institutions and the bed-card notes showing the treatent given shall be received as the essential evidence in deciding acceptnces or rejections. The City shall not be liable for any payment to chariible institutions in excess of the apportionment which may have been ade to such institutions, notwithstanding the acceptances of the Comissioner of Charities or any per capita rates of payment that may have

2en fixed for the inmates thereof.
7. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to ate specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in

reir printed annual reports.

8. No money shall be paid to any private charitable institution hich pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any nd, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures pods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee : member of its Board of Managers.

9. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the udget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not laring in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving teachers and

school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions for five (5) hours daily for a period equal to the public school year, shall be paid a per capita of seven cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of five years of age and over during ten months in the year, except that for abnormal or atypical children a special ruling may be made by the Comptroller. Institutions receiving money under this section shall be under the general supervision of the Board of Education as required by the general conditions relating to institutions receiving corporate school money, as provided in section 1154.

10. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a

proper charge upon the City and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities, and has been placed in this Budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This order has no relation to the class of children of such mental and physical condition as those cared for in the City Institution at Ran-

dalls Island.

11. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:. * Institutions shall be paid \$18 for the care of the mother and child during fifteen days of her confinement, and for services thereafter shall be paid at the rate of 45 cents per day for the support of the child, and also \$12 per month for the maintenance of the mother, if she remain in the institution nursing infant after the expiration of the fifteen days.

Whereas, Said Williamsbridge and Westchester Traction Company was, on May 12, 1904, consoli-dated with other street surface railway companies to form the Bronx Traction Company; and Whereas, Said Bronx Traction Company; and after constructed and operated a street surface railway upon portions of the shove described route, including the old White Plains road and

Bear Swamp road, from Olin avenue (now Gun Hill road) to Morris Park avenue; and Whereas, Proceedings for opening White Plains road, between Morris Park avenue and the City line, as it is now laid out and exists, were instituted by the Board of Estimate and Ap-

portionment September 20, 1899, and said street has since been opened, regulated and graded and otherwise improved, and is now in use; and Whereas, The lines of said new White Plains road did not include that portion of Bear Swamp road between Morris Park avenue and said new road, and did not in all instances include all por-tions of the old White Plains road between said Bear Swamp road and Olin avenue, or Gun Hill road; and

Whereas, The Bronx Traction Company did, during the grading of said new White Platns road, construct, and has since maintained and operated a street surface railway upon said new White Plains road, between Morris Park avenue and Gun Hill road, claimed by The City of New York to be without proper authority; and

York to be without proper authority; and Whereas, The Bronx Traction Company did, upon the commencement of operation of its care over the said new White Plains road, between Morris Park avenue and Gun Hill road, abandon the operation of its cars on Bear Swamp road, between Morris Park avenue and White Plains tween Morris Park avenue and White Plains road, and upon those portions of the old White Plains road not included within the lines of the new White Plains road; and

Whereas, The Bronx Traction Company has, by a petition dated January 7, 1910, presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at its meeting held January 21, 1910, made application to said Board for the right or franchise to operate and maintain a street surface railway as an extension to its existing system upon and along White Plains road, from Morris Park avenue to Gun Hill road, in the Borough of The Bronx, in order that the title of said Company to operate over such route may be perfected and legalized; now therefore In consideration of the mutual covenants and

agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows: Section I. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double track extension to its present street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying passengers only in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New

York, upon the following route, to wit: Beginning at and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company at the intersection of Morris Park avenue and White Plains road; thence northerly in, upon and along said White Plains road to and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company at the intersection of Olin avenue, or Gun Hill road, with White Plains road.

And to cross such other streets and avenues named and unnamed as may be encountered in said route.

During the remaining term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than six thousand two hundred dollars (\$6,200) and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent, of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of six thousand two hundred dollars (\$6,200).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation within the limits of the City. sary any subsequent consent or consents. The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision, and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. Tenth—Said railway may be operated by over-

head electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of The Bronx, or by any other motive power except locomotive steam-power or horse-power, which may be ap-proved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Eleventh—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on its road, or on any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control, to any other point thereof, or of any connecting branch thereof, within the limits of the City. The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are

in full uniform. Twelfth-No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger

cars and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway.

Thirteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as a real power of features. and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the

at intervals of not more than thirty (30) min-utes, both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may re-quire, or as may be directed by the Board. Provided, however, that the Company during the first five (5) years of this contract shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of one (1) o'clock a. m. and five (5) o'clock a. m. each day unless the Board shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public con-venience requires the operation of cars during said hours.

Seventeenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the atreets and avenues in which said railway shall be constructed, shall cause to be watered at least three (3) times every twenty-four (24) hours, when the temperature is above thirty-five (35) degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets and avenues, except when the width of such streets and avenues shall exceed sixty (60) feet between curblines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only sixty (60) feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Eighteenth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets and avenues upon which the sate railway is constructed, between its tracks, this rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) leet beyond the rails on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and show; provided, however, that the Company shall at the option of the Company shall at the content of Street Cleaning, enter into an affectment for each winter season, or part there-

of, to clean an equivalent amount of street sur-

Nineteenth—The Company shall cause to be paved that portion of the street between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, upon and along the streets, avenues and highways of the route hereby authorized which are now either unpaved or paved with macadam. The work of such paving shall be done under the supervision of the municipal authorities having jurisdiction in such matters, and such authorities shall designate the character of the pavement to be laid.

Twentieth-As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street or avenue in which the said railway is con-structed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the super-vision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the pro-vision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-first-Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structure in the streets required on account of the construction or operation of the railway shall be made at the sole cost of the Company and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-second-It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface rail-way shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction way in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public

Twenty-third—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the railway is hereby authorized be changed at any time after the railway has been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improveupon said street the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Twenty-fourth-The Company shall, within ninety (90) days from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, take the necessary legal proceedings for the abandonment of that portion of its former route granted by the Town Board of the former Town of Westchester June 7, 1892, described as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Olin avenue or Gun Hill road and White Plains road, thence outherly along said White Plains road to the Bear Swamp road at Bronxdale; thence along said Bear Swamp road to its intersection with

Morris Park avenue.

A certified copy of the certificate of abandonment shall be filed with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment within ten (10) days from the date on which the same is obtained by the

Twenty-sixth-The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:
