Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 O'Clock A. M., on Thursday, March 16, 1916.

The minutes of the meeting held March 8, 1916, were approved as printed.

### Dock Department—New Plan for Improvement of the Waterfront Between Canal Street and Grant Street, Borough of Richmond.

The Chair called for a continuation of the public hearing adjourned at the last meeting in the matter of the request of the Commissioner of Docks for approval of the proposed new plan for improvement of the water-front and harbor of The City of New York, between Canal Street and Grant Street, Borough of Richmond, adopted by the Commissioner of Docks in accordance with law, January 21, 1916.

Sir—I transmit herewith print and tracing, together with technical description of proposed new plan for the improvement of the harbor and water-front of the City of New York between Canal Street and Grant Street, Borough of Richmond.

This new plan has this day been adopted by me and is respectfully submitted with the request that it be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Technical Description for the Alteration and Amendment to the New Plan for Improving the Water-front and Harbor of The City of New York, Between Canal Street and Grant Street, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond.

The proposed alteration and amendment to the New Plan for improving the water-front and harbor of The City of New York, between Canal Street and Grant Street, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, consists in:

First—The abolishment of the "land under water to be used for ferry improvements" between Canal and Water Streets, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, as adopted by the Commissioner of Docks November 4th, 1903, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund November 18th, 1903.

Second—The establishment of a bulkhead line described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the southerly side of the pier at the foot of Canal Street, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, said point being distant 500 feet east of the easterly side of Front Street, extending thence northerly and parallel with the easterly side of Front Street and 500 feet therefrom, a distance of 1,725 feet; thence still northerly and deflecting to the right to a point distant 677 feet from the westerly side of Bay Street, measured along a line making an angle on the southerly side of same of 111 degrees 30 minutes with the westerly side of Bay Street, from a point in said westerly side of Bay Street distant 102 feet north of the northerly side of Grant Street.

Third—The establishment of five piers 125 feet in width at right angles to the proposed bulkhead line and one pier 150 feet in width parallel to the aforesaid piers extending from the proposed bulkhead line outshore to the established pierhead line with slip room of 275 feet between said piers.

Mr. Patrick E. Calahan, of Calahan & Hagerty, attorneys for Brady Bros., was heard in opposition to the proposed plan. Mr. Louis L. Tribus, representing the Staten Island Chamber of Commerce, stated that the Chamber of Commerce was in favor of the proposed plan. The Secretary of the Staten Island Civil League appeared and stated that the association which he represented was also in favor of the plan. The Commissioner of Docks was interrogated by the Chair in regard to the matter. Discussion followed.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller then presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

February 14, 1916.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On January 21st, 1916, the Commissioner of Docks requested approval of and consent to a new plan for the improvement of the harbor and water-front of the City of New York, between Canal Street and Grant Street, Borough of Richmond. The new plan consists in:



First—The abolishment of the "land under water to be used for ferry improvements" between Canal and Water Streets, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, as adopted by the Commissioner of Docks November 4th, 1903, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund November 18th, 1903.

Second—The establishment of a bulkhead line generally 500 feet east of Front Street for a distance of 2,350 feet.

Third—The establishment of five piers each 125 feet in width and approximately 1,300 feet long and one pier 150 feet wide and approximately 1,250 feet long, with 275 feet of slip room between piers.

If reasons to the contrary are not advanced at the public hearing I believe the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly approve the new plan submitted by the Commissioner of Docks.

If the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the new plan at the public hearing to be held pursuant to chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907, I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution approving the request.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, in a communication to your Board under date of February 1, 1916, requests a renewal of the lease of the premises occupied by the Bureau of Public Buildings, and Offices as a storehouse, in the building No. 237 Duffield Street, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of five years from May 1, 1916, at a rental of \$1,500 a year.

The premises in question consist of the third, fourth and fifth lofts, and contain approximately 4,674 square feet, which at a rental of \$1,500, is at the rate of a trifle more than 32 cents per square foot, and includes passenger and freight elevator service, steam heat and water supply.

Agent, George William Rasch, Room 6, Offerman Building, Fulton and Duffield Streets, Borough of Brooklyn.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute a renewal of the lease to the City, of the third, fourth and fifth floors of premises, No. 237 Duffield Street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, for a term of five years from May 1, 1916, at an annual rental of Fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, furnish steam heat, passenger and elevator service; the lessee to furnish light and janitor service, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease; lessors, C. Henry Offerman, Lena Maria Rasch, Anna C. Schmidt, John Offer, and Theodore Offerman; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

**Public Service Commission—Offer of, to Transfer to the Dock Department the Montague and Joralemon Street Properties in the Borough of Brooklyn.**

At a meeting held March 8, 1916, a communication was received from the Public Service Commission offering to agree upon the transfer to the Dock Department certain property at the foot of Montague and Joralemon Streets in the Borough of Brooklyn, which was referred to the Comptroller.

The Deputy Comptroller called attention to the fact that the offer of the Public Service Commission, as outlined in its communication, was not in such shape that it could be readily understood and intelligently acted upon and a discussion followed as to just what procedure should be followed.

It was the sense of the Board that the Commissioner of Docks, the Corporation Counsel and the Public Service Commission should get together and formulate precise terms for the transfer of the property to the Dock Department, and transmit same to this Board for approval.

**Union Ferry Company—Communication from the Attorneys for the Ferry Company Calling Attention to the Bill Known as Senate Introductory No. 840, Prescribing the Schedule of Fares for the Union Ferry Company.**

The following communication was received:

March 9, 1916.

Hon. WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller, Municipal Building, New York City: Dear Sir—I learn this morning that Senator Walker has introduced a bill known as Senate Introductory No. 840, prescribing the schedule of fares for the Union Ferry Company, which bill was referred to the Public Service Committee of the Senate, of which Senator George F. Thompson is Chairman.

Of course you will remember that under our lease with the City it was agreed that the rates of fare then charged were to be continued but not increased, and that if the rates are reduced by any authority whatever, the ferry company can stop running.

Having been approached by a party some time ago who insinuated that unless certain things were done that a move of this kind would be made, I believe that Senator Walker is introducing this bill merely by request and that he does not know the motive of the one preparing it.

However that may be, it is necessary to oppose the bill, and I ask the City, in view of the terms of the lease, to join with us in asking for a hearing.

Under the Charter the City has the power to regulate the rates, etc., as it has already done, and certainly there should be no interference by the Legislature in a matter which is purely a local City matter.

I would say also that I was in Albany yesterday and saw Senator Thompson, Chairman of the Investigating Committee, and he told me that he was very strongly in favor of bringing all public utilities, including municipal ferries, under the Public Service Commission, but that this was only his personal view.

He also said that he was going to try and have the full committee meet here in New York on Friday and take up the question of submitting bills now to the Legislature amending the Public Service Law. Very sincerely yours,

**New York Connecting Railway Company—In the Matter of the Payments to be Made by, for Use of Certain Property on Wards and Randall's Islands for Railroad Construction Purposes.**

The Comptroller presented the following report:

March 10, 1916.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on June 23, 1915, authorized and approved of an amended agreement between the City and the New York Connecting Railroad Company, for the use of certain City property on Wards and Randall's Islands for railroad and constructional purposes.

Pursuant to said resolution the Comptroller of The City of New York is authorized to accept a deduction in rental from time to time for the property used temporarily for constructional purposes in proportion to the area released by the Company and to advise the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of said deduction in rent.

I hereby notify the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that deductions in rental have been accepted for lands on Wards and Randall's Islands, which have been released by the company as follows:

The first release as of February 1, 1915, reduced the area temporarily occupied by the Company from 425,751 square feet (the area mentioned in the original agreement), to 292,302 square feet.

A further release as of January 1, 1916, reduced the area temporarily occupied by 90,668 square feet, which at the rental price of 5 cents per square foot equals an annual rental of \$4,533.40.

With the above deductions, the temporarily occupied area remaining, 201,634 square feet, at 5 cents per square foot, will give an annual rental of \$10,081.70.

**Application of the Gettysburg Committee (Lincoln Loyal Legion) for Permission to Exhibit a Picture of the Battle of Gettysburg in the Hall of Records.**

The Secretary reported that the premises applied for were assigned by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the Register of New York County, who was about to take possession, and the chairman of the Gettysburg Committee, when informed of this fact, requested that permission be granted to use a room in the northeast corner of the basement of the City Hall.

The Chairman of the Committee appeared before the Board and was informed by the President of the Board of Aldermen that the Board of Aldermen and the Mayor had exclusive jurisdiction over space in the City Hall and that the application could not be granted.

It was then suggested to the Chairman of the Committee that she apply to the Armory Board for use of one of its armories.

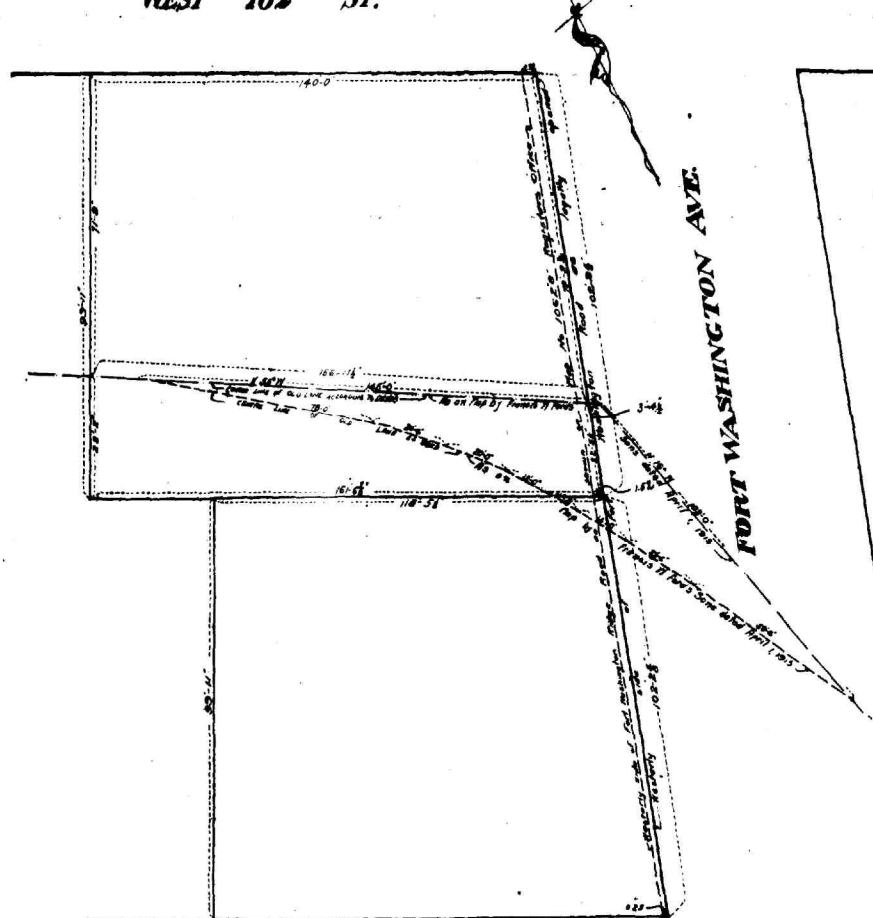

In connection therewith the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolutions:

March 10, 1916.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—I am in receipt of a petition to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund from Friedman Construction Company and Anne Ide Cockran, stating that they are the owners of the block front on the westerly side of Fort Washington Avenue, extending from the northerly side of 161st Street to the southerly side of 162nd Street, Borough of Manhattan, having derived title thereto through mesne conveyances from J. Romaine Brown and Alexander P. W. Kinnan, as executors of the Last Will and Testament of Loyal L. Smith, deceased.

On November 27, 1912, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorized a release to J. Romaine Brown and Alexander P. W. Kinnan of that portion of Fort Washington Avenue, lying between the northerly line of 160th Street and the southerly line of 163rd Street, in consideration of the sum of \$10,262.50. One of the conditions contained in this release was that the grantees were the owners of the land

Gentlemen—The Commissioners of the Department of Bridges, in a communication to your Board under date of March 14, 1916, states the owner of the building at 125-131 Canal Street, Manhattan, does not desire to renew the lease of the room on the second floor now occupied by the Department of Bridges, but wishes to have the department occupy a room on the fifth floor at the same rental of \$60 per month.

A room can be secured at the southwest corner of the fifth floor of the building at No. 121 Canal Street, at a rental of \$35 per month, which will result in a saving to the City of \$25 per month, and the proposed change has been approved by the Department of Bridges.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sir—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held December 8, 1915, a resolution was adopted recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding \$465,000, the proceeds to the par value thereof to be used by this Department for the construction of a shed on the pier at the foot of West 46th street, North River, Borough of Manhattan.

On January 7, 1916, resolution was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorizing the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding \$465,000, the proceeds thereof to the amount of the par value of the stock to be used by this Department for the construction of shed on the pier at the foot of West 46th street, North River, Borough of Manhattan.

At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held January 28, 1916, resolution was adopted as follows:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to its resolution of July 11, 1912, hereby approves the form of contract No. 1488, the specifications, as amended, the plans and estimate of cost in the sum of five hundred and twenty-eight thousand four hundred dollars (\$528,400) for building a freight shed, with appurtenances, on the pier at the foot of West Forty-sixth street, North River, Borough of Manhattan, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries, the contract to be divided into three parts as follows:

Classes 1 and 2, General Construction (a) Freight shed and appurtenances (b) asphalt pavement for lower deck.....	\$510,600 00
Class 3, Plumbing, installation of water supply.....	16,000 00
Class 4, Installation of steam piping.....	1,800 00
	\$528,400 00

"—said cost to be paid to the extent of four hundred and sixty-five thousand dollars (\$465,000) from the corporate stock fund entitled 'C.D.D.—42, Department of Docks and Ferries, Construction of Sheds on Pier at Foot of West 46th Street,' and the balance, estimated at sixty-three thousand four hundred dollars (\$63,400) to be paid from the corporate stock fund entitled 'C.D.D.—4-K, Department of Docks and Ferries, Construction of New Pier at Foot of West 46th Street and Slips Adjacent,' and be it further

"Resolved, That in the event that the aggregate sum of the lowest bids received for the three items is equal to or less than the aggregate sum of the three items herein approved (although the amount of the lowest bid for one or more items may exceed the amount approved for said item or items) then the awards for the three items, provided all are awarded, may be made without further approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; and be it further

"Resolved, That in the event that the aggregate sum of the lowest bids received for the three items exceeds the aggregate sum of the three items herein approved, no award for either item shall be made and the amount of such estimated cost upon the bids so received may be reconsidered in its discretion by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or by any official designated by the Board, provided that the aggregate of the bids is within the amount authorized and available for said work."

On February 11, 1916, bids were opened on this contract, the low bids on Classes 3 and 4 being as follows:

Class 3 for plumbing, John J. Kenney Co.....	\$10,369 00
Class 4, for installation of steam piping, William Young Plumbing Co.....	1,335 00

Deeming it to be for the best interests of the City so to do, I rejected the bids received February 11, 1916, on Classes 1 and 2 for the construction of the shed proper and for the laying of the asphalt deck on the pier, and ordered the re-advertising of these two classes.

At the opening of bids to-day on Classes 1 and 2, the lowest bid received was from Post & McCord, at \$573,450.

The total contract cost for the construction of the shed on the pier at West 46th street, North River, as detailed above, is as follows:

## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

### Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, January 12, 1916, at 10:30 o'Clock A. M.

Present—Commissioners Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh; Commissioner James presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Non-Competitive Class, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Public Charities, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below:

"1. By changing the line 'Special Officer (not more than four (4) incumbents), \$720 per annum,' (with maintenance), to read 'Special Officer (not more than three (3) incumbents, \$720 per annum,' (with maintenance), and by changing the line 'Special Officer (not more than one (1), incumbent), \$960 per annum,' (without maintenance), to read 'Special Officer (not more than two incumbents), \$960 per annum,' (without maintenance).

"2. By increasing the compensation attached to the position of Watchman from \$600 per annum, without maintenance, to \$720 per annum, without maintenance."

Clifford J. Gordon, Clerk in the Department of Public Charities, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances, and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meeting held December 29 were approved.

The proposed increase in the compensation attached to the position of Watchman in the Non-Competitive Class of the Department of Public Charities was disapproved, and, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification of positions in the Non-Competitive Class, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Public Charities, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below," be and the same hereby is amended as follows:

1. By changing the line "Special Officer (not more than four (4) incumbents), \$720 per annum," under the sub-heading "With Maintenance," to read "Special Officer (not more than three (3) incumbents), \$720 per annum."

2. By changing the line "Special Officer (not more than one (1) incumbent), \$960 per annum," under the sub-heading "Without Maintenance" to read "Special Officer (not more than two (2) incumbents), \$960 per annum."

Clifford M. Pinckney, Principal Assistant Engineer in the Bureau of Highways Borough of Manhattan, appeared in connection with the request of the President of the Borough of Manhattan for authority to employ R. Ernest Beaty as Expert Inspector on the manufacture of wood block pavement under the provisions of clause 6 of Rule XII. On motion, it was

Resolved, That, under authority of clause 6a of Rule XII, of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, R. Ernest Beaty be and he hereby is excepted from examination, to be employed as Expert Inspector on the manufacture of wood block pavement in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, from time to time during the year 1916, with compensation at the rate of \$10 per day; provided, however, that his total compensation shall not exceed the sum of \$750.

Upon the recommendation of the Committee on Appeals the Commission directed that Joseph Reilly, of Engine Co. 202, be given an opportunity to take the practical test for Engineer of Steamer, Fire Department, it appearing that his failure to appear at the time prescribed for same had been due to an error on the part of the Lieutenant in the Fire Department, who had notified him to appear at 12 noon on the day of the test instead of at 10 a. m.

The Commission approved the action of the Committee on Provisional Appointments in adopting the recommendation of the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation that Edward D. Kelly, of 123 East 90th Street, Manhattan, be marked "Qualified" for employment as Instructor of Industry in the Department of Correction, under the provisions of clause 3 of Rule XII.

The Commission approved the recommendation of the Committee on Provisional Appointments that Florence Krauss of 1514 Pacific Street, Brooklyn, be marked "Qualified" on the list for employment as School Farm Attendant in the Department of Parks, Brooklyn, under the provisions of clause 3 of Rule XII and directed that her payroll for services rendered up to September 26, 1915, be passed, under the provisions of said clause and rule.

A memorandum dated Jan. 11 was presented from the Secretary of the Commission relative to the date of original appointment of George Hopey, a candidate on the preferred list of Rodman. The Secretary was instructed to amend the records by noting on said preferred list that the candidate had been appointed an Axeman in the office of the Aqueduct Commission on June 8, 1887, and that on Sept. 21, 1887, he had been appointed an Inspector of Masonry in the same department.

A memorandum dated January 7, was presented from the Secretary of the Commission with reference to the assignment of Joseph Kennedy, a Second Grade Clerk in the Department of Bridges, acting temporarily as Storekeeper. The Secretary recommended that the Commissioner of Bridges be informed that the assignment should be corrected by making provision in the budget for the position of Storekeeper and that after a reasonable time allowance to secure such change the payroll of the said employee would not be approved. The recommendation was adopted.

A memorandum dated Jan. 10 was presented from the Secretary of the Commission with reference to the request of the Commissioner of Public Charities, under date of Jan. 5 for the classification of certain titles. The Secretary stated that he had been informally advised that of the titles mentioned only the title of Supervising Institutional Mechanic would be retained and the other titles would be changed in the budget.

The commission directed that, pending action in the matter of the titles, the payrolls of the persons affected be passed under a special certificate setting forth the facts, and that the matter of the classification of the position of Supervising Institutional Mechanic be referred to the Examining Division for a report.

A memorandum dated Jan. 6 was presented from the Chief Clerk relative to the payrolls of Dr. Henry P. DeForest and Dr. Joseph A. Kene, Medical Examiners in the office of the Commission. The Commission directed that the payrolls of the said employees be passed under clause 4 of Rule XII pending a modification of the salary schedule of the Commission.

A communication dated Jan. 7 was presented from the Chief Examiner submitting a statement of examinations held during the month of Dec., 1915. The communication was ordered filed.

A report dated Jan. 6 was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner transmitting a communication from the Secretary of the Department of Health to the effect that the budget for the year 1916 provided for changing the titles of various Engineers (probably Stationary Engineers) in the Competitive Class to "Power Plant Operator,"

"General Plant Operator" and "Supervising Institutional Mechanic" and of several Firemen in the Labor Class to "General Plant Operator (Part IV)," "Assistant General Plant Operator (Parts I and IV)" and "Assistant Power Plant Operator (Part IV)," for which reason it was requested that the new position be classified. The Secretary was instructed to inform the department that as it had not been suggested that there would be any change in the duties of the incumbents the Commission was of the opinion that the present titles of Stationary Engineer and Fireman should remain unchanged and to request the department to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a revision of the budget schedules of the department to show the former titles of the positions, and the Commission directed that pending action in the matter the payrolls of the persons affected be passed under a special certificate setting forth the facts.

The following reports were presented from the Acting Chief Examiner:

Report dated Jan. 7 recommending certification of the eligible list of Foreman of Mechanics, Grade 3, as an appropriate list from which to fill a vacancy in the position of Foreman of Mechanics, Grade 2, in the Department of Public Charities in the absence of an eligible list for the latter position.

Report dated Jan. 7 recommending certification of the eligible list of Inspector of Elevators, Grade 3, to the Commissioner of Public Charities from which to appoint an Elevator Mechanic at \$1,200 per annum in the absence of an eligible list for the latter position.

Report dated Jan. 4 recommending that the Commission deny the request of the Fire Commissioner for an examination for promotion from Typewriting Copyist, Second Grade, to Clerk, Second Grade, in the Bureau of Fire Alarm Telegraph.

Report dated Jan. 7 recommending that an examination be ordered for promotion to the position of Clerk, Second Grade, in the office of the Mayor, there being no promotion list for the latter position, and that the examination be open to all Clerks, First Grade, eligible.

Report dated Jan. 10 recommending that the Commission deny request of the Department of Taxes and Assessments that the Borough of Manhattan Division of his department be excluded from the examination for promotion to Clerk, Third Grade, for the reason that if the request were granted there would be no list for that position in the Borough of Manhattan after May 3, 1916.

Report dated Jan. 7 recommending that an examination be ordered for promotion to the position of Marine Engineer in the Fire Department, to be open to all Stokers serving not less than three years and holding the necessary Marine Engineer's license.

Report dated Jan. 6 recommending that an examination be ordered for promotion to the position of Plan Examiner, Grade C, in the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of Brooklyn, to be open to all Inspectors of Carpentry and Masonry, Grade 2; Inspectors of Plumbing, Grade 2, and Inspectors of Elevators, Grade 2, eligible, and an examination for the same bureau for promotion to the position of Plan Examiner, Grade D, to be open to all Inspectors of Carpentry and Masonry, Grade 3, Inspectors of Plumbing Grade 3, and Inspectors of Elevators, Grade 3, eligible.

Report dated Jan. 10 recommending that the Commission deny for lack of power the request of the Department of Public Charities for approval of the promotion of Regina N. Curtin, a Stenographer and Typewriter, from \$900 to \$1,200 per annum, under the provisions of clause 23 of Rule XV, for the reason that the examination in which she qualified for appointment did not cover in its scope a compensation of \$1,200 per annum.

The recommendations were adopted.

A report dated Jan. 6 was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner, recommending that an examination be ordered for promotion to the position of Janitor in the Department of Education, to be open to all persons serving in positions in the Labor Class in the Bureau "Care of Buildings" eligible under clause 17 of Rule XV, and that the following subjects and weights be used in the examination:

"Record and Seniority, 50 per cent; mental examination, 50 per cent. The mental examination to consist of a written examination on Duties, covering the general work of Janitors in public school buildings, not requiring the services of a licensed engineer, including care, cleaning, heating and ventilating, and the provisions of the regulations of the Department applicable to Janitors."

The recommendations were adopted.

A report dated Jan. 7 was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner recommending that the Board of Parole be included in the organization of city departments adopted by the Commission at its meeting of June 20, 1912, and that an examination be ordered for promotion to the position of Chief Parole Officer, to be open to all Parole Officers at \$1,400 per annum, serving not less than one year, and otherwise eligible for examination. The recommendations were adopted.

A report dated Jan. 5 was presented from the First Assistant and Acting Chief Examiner relative to the request of the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, for an examination for promotion to the position of District Park Foreman, to be open to Park Foremen at \$1,200 per annum, and Gardeners, at \$3.50 per day. The Examiner recommended that the request be denied in so far as it referred to the admission of gardeners to the examination, and that the examination be ordered under the title of General Foreman, Grade 2 (District Park Foreman), under Rule VI, clause 6, to be open to all Park Foremen serving one year. The recommendations were adopted.

It appeared that no records of the efficiency of the said employee had been kept prior to Jan. 1, 1914, for the reason that he was not under the jurisdiction of any one Borough. The Examiner recommended that the ratings given the employee for the quarterly periods since Jan. 1, 1914, be considered as his rating for average general efficiency since Jan. 1, 1910, when the present system of efficiency records became effective. The recommendation was adopted.

A report dated Jan. 6 was presented from the First Assistant and Acting Chief Examiner forwarding a report (K-1049), dated Jan. 5, from Leonhard Felix Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner, relative to the assignments of various employees in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The Commission ruled that the assignments were proper except in the cases of John McKay, Stationary Engineer, and Henry Leavy, Laborer, and the Secretary was instructed to take up the matter of the assignments of the said McKay and Leavy with the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

A report dated Jan. 6 was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner transmitting a report (K-1036), dated Dec. 31, 1915, from Leonhard Felix Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner, relative to the assignments of various Laborers in the Department of Docks and Ferries. The Commission ruled that the assignments were proper except in the cases of Michael Redican and John J. Caniff, and the Secretary was instructed to take up with the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries the assignments of the two persons mentioned.

A report (K-1053), dated Jan. 7, was presented from Leonhard Felix Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner, to the effect that John Redmond, a Laborer in the Department of Health, was performing duties inappropriate to his title. The Secretary was instructed to take up the matter with the Commissioner of the Department of Health.

A report (K-1052), dated Jan. 7, was presented from Leonhard Felix Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner, to the effect that Elizabeth O'well, Jean Cochran and Alice M. Weinberg, Nurses in the Department of Health, were inappropriately assigned. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Commissioner of Health in the matter.

A report (K-1051), dated Jan. 7, was presented from Leonhard Felix Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner, relative to the alleged improper assignments of Laborers in the Department of Docks and Ferries, stating that John J. McManus and James Bergen, Laborers, and eleven other Laborers were inappropriately assigned. The Secretary was instructed to take up the matter with the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries.

A report (K-1045), dated Jan. 4, was presented from Leonhard Felix Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner, to the effect that Emanuel Schwartz, James Ginerty, James Walsh, Gertrude Hutchinson, Madelain Bacon and Sadie Naftalen, Gynasium Attendants, in the Department of Parks, Borough of Manhattan, were performing the duties of Head School Farm Attendants. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Commissioner of Parks, Manhattan and Richmond, in the matter.

A report (K-1050), dated Jan. 6 was presented from Leonhard Felix Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner, relative to the assignments of Claude R. Link, a First Grade Clerk, and Eugene F. Hughes, a Second Grade Clerk, both in the office of the Commissioners of Accounts. The Commission ruled that Claude R. Link was not improperly assigned and that Eugene F. Hughes was performing duties inappropriate to his title, and instructed the Secretary to take up the matter of the assignment of the last-mentioned employee with the Commissioner of Accounts.



A report (K-1058), dated Jan. 8, was presented from Leonhard Felix Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner, to the effect that Canio Russo, a Cleaner in the Department of Education, was not performing duties appropriate to his title. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the department in the matter.

The following reports were presented from Leonhard Felix Fuld, to the effect that the efficiency records of the departments specified had been prepared in accordance with the rules: Reports (R-145, W-67 and V-112), dated Jan. 10, Board of Water Supply, for the second, third and fourth quarters of 1915, respectively. Reports (V-103 and W-60), dated Jan. 3, office of the Coroner, Richmond, for the second and third quarters of 1915. Reports (V-104 and W-63), dated Jan. 5, Park Board, for the second and third quarters of 1915. Reports (V-110 and W-64), dated Jan. 6, Department of Parks, Manhattan and Richmond, for the second and third quarters of 1915. Report (X-1), dated Jan. 6, Examining Board of Plumbers, for the fourth quarter of 1915. The efficiency reports were approved.

Upon the recommendation of Miss Upshaw, Assistant Chief Examiner, in a report dated Jan. 7, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is instructed to proceed with an open competitive examination for the position of Dietitian.

A report dated Jan. 7 was presented from Miss Upshaw, Assistant Chief Examiner, submitting a form of advertisement for the examination for Veterinarian, Department of Health, reading substantially as follows:

Applicants must be citizens of the United States and residents of the State of New York.

The subjects and weights of the examination are: Experience 3; Technical, 7; 75% required. 70% general average required.

A qualifying physical examination will be given.

Applications for this examination must be filed on a special blank, Form B.

Requirements: Candidates must present a license to practice veterinary science issued by the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York, at the time of filing their applications.

Duties: Veterinarians are required to render professional service and perform inspection work in connection with contagious diseases of animals and to make ante-mortem and post-mortem inspections of cattle at slaughter houses.

Candidates must be at least 21 years of age on the closing date for the receipt of applications.

The usual entrance salary is \$1,200 in the Bureau of Preventable Diseases, and \$1,320 in the Bureau of Food Inspection. The Bureau of Standards of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has recommended a salary of from \$1,800 to \$2,340 for this position. Vacancies occur from time to time.

The term of the eligibility of the list resulting from this examination is fixed at not less than one year nor more than four years.

The form of advertisement was approved.

Upon the recommendation of Miss Upshaw, Assistant Chief Examiner, in a report dated Dec. 31, 1915, it was

Resolved, That Dr. George M. Price of 1309 Carroll Street, Brooklyn, be and he hereby is appointed an Expert Examiner in the office of the Commission, under the provisions of clause 8 of Rule XII, in connection with the examination for Medical Inspector.

A memorandum, dated Jan. 7, was presented from Miss Upshaw, Assistant Chief Examiner, in connection with the request of the Commissioner of the Department of Health, under date of Dec. 15, that the certification to him from the eligible list of Physician, Clinic, on Dec. 9, 1915, from which to fill a vacancy in the position of Attending Physician at \$300 per annum, be withdrawn, and that the Commission promulgate a separate list for appointment to the position of Clinic Physician at salaries of \$300 and \$600 per annum. design is to be submitted to the Committee on this submission for verification.

Resolved: That the Art Commission hereby approves, but as preliminary drawings only, the designs for an addition to Public School 40, The Bronx, represented by Exhibits "490-I", "490-J", "490-K" and "490-L", of record in this matter.

**Submission 2112. Carrere Memorial.**  
The Chairman presented the submission of the John M. Carrere Memorial at Riverside Drive and 99th Street.

This matter was referred to a Committee consisting of Commissioners Boring, Chairman; MacNeil and Wheeler.

On motion the matter was immediately considered and the following resolution passed:

**Certificate 2019.**  
Resolved: That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and location for the John M. Carrere Memorial at Riverside Drive and Ninety-ninth Street, Manhattan, represented by Exhibits "883-H", "883-I", "883-J", "883-K", "883-L", "883-M" and "883-N", of record in this matter.

**Submission 2106. Police Headquarters Decorations.**  
The Committee reported that it was in a general way in hearty sympathy with the idea of mural decorations and desirous of encouraging it in every way but did not approve of a decoration of this character in this particular place and therefore recommended disapproval of the design for this location.

The report of the Committee was adopted and the following resolution passed:

**Certificate 2020.**  
Resolved: That the Art Commission hereby disapproves for the proposed locations on the walls of the staircases in the Police Headquarters the sketches for mural decorations, represented by Exhibits "108-BB", "108-BC", "108-BD", "108-BE", "108-BF" and "108-BG", of record in this matter.

In the cases in which preliminary approval was given the Assistant Secretary was directed to notify the proper authorities that when working drawings have been completed, they should be submitted to the Commission for final approval; also to transmit copies of the reports of the Committees to the proper authorities.

The Chairman presented a communication from J. A. Edgerton, Purchasing Agent of the Post Office Department, accompanied by a new design for the end of the letter boxes.

On motion the Assistant Secretary was directed to notify Mr. Edgerton that in the opinion of the Commission the ornamentation formerly submitted for the end of the box, consisting of an eagle, is satisfactory and very much to be preferred to the design now submitted consisting of a shield with the wing above it. The Commission, however, does not consider the latter design, provided some slight changes be made, so objectionable as to meet with its disapproval.

The Chairman presented a communication from Honorable Cabot Ward, Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, in which was quoted a letter from Colonel Henry W. Sackett with reference to the location of the Greeley Statue which now stands in front of the Tribune Building.

The Assistant Secretary was directed to notify Commissioner Ward that in the opinion of the Art Commission the most appropriate setting of this statue would be in the new entrance to the Tribune Building.

The Chairman presented a letter from the Fine Arts Federation, accompanied by resolutions adopted by the Federation, with reference to the pumping station in Morningside Park.

The letter was ordered placed on file.

The Chairman presented a communication from Honorable John B. Pine calling attention to the fact that the designs for the pumping station in Morningside Park, as well as the designs for certain elevated structures and subway kiosks, had not been submitted to the Art Commission and urging that the Commission call the attention of the proper authorities to these facts.

The Assistant Secretary was directed to call the attention of the Chairman of the Public Service Commission to the situation in regard to elevated and subway structures.

The Committee on Bolivar Statue, Central Park, reported that its work was completed and it was, thereupon, discharged.

### BOARD OF WATER SUPPLY.



to be known as the Creedmoor-Flushing Branch, across certain streets, avenues or highways in the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York:  
The Long Island Railroad Company, the petitioner herein, alleges as follows:

I. That it is a domestic railroad corporation organized and existing under and pursuant to the provision of Chapter 178 of the Laws of 1834, the acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, and the Railroad Law of the State of New York.

II. That on April 29th, 1839, an act to amend the Charter of The Long Island Railroad Company was passed by the legislature of the State of New York and subsequently became Chapter 277 of the Laws of 1839. That the third section of said act reads as follows:

"Section 3. The said corporation are hereby authorized to construct such branch railroads in any part of Long Island as they may deem expedient and necessary in cases where the landholders may offer the land required for those purposes, free of expense; but no branch road shall be constructed at the expense of the said corporation until they shall have completed and ready to put into operation the main track of their said road."

III. That on April 21st, 1862, an act to amend said Chapter 277 of the Laws of 1839 was passed by the legislature of the State of New York and subsequently became Chapter 413 of the Laws of 1862. That said act reads as follows:

"Section 1. The third section of the act entitled 'An Act to Amend the Charter of the Long Island Railroad Company,' passed April twenty-ninth, eighteen hundred and thirty-nine, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"The said corporation are hereby authorized to construct such branch railroad in any part of Long Island, except the County of Kings, as they may deem expedient and necessary, subject to the provisions of the general railroad law, provided that no such branch railroad be constructed west of the eastern boundary of the village of Jamaica."

"Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately."

III. That on January 27th, 1916, the Public Service Commission of the State of New York for the First District made an order dated on that day granting to The Long Island Railroad Company the permission and approval of said Commission to the construction of a branch line of railroad from the end of its tracks at Creedmoor to a point west of Lawrence Street, Flushing, all within The City of New York, and to the exercise of such franchise or right as it may possess under the provisions of Section 3 of Chapter 277 of the Laws of 1839 as amended by Chapter 413 of the Laws of 1862. By the terms of said order such permission and approval was conditioned upon and was not to take effect until the said Railroad Company should have obtained from The City of New York the franchise or right to cross certain existing streets, avenues or highways hereinafter named. That the terms of said order, a copy of which is attached hereto, marked "Schedule A," were accepted by the said The Long Island Railroad Company.

IV. That on January 31st, 1916, the Public Service Commission of the State of New York for the First District made an order, dated on that day, by the terms of which it determined the manner in which the aforesaid proposed Creedmoor-Flushing Branch of the Long Island Railroad should cross the said streets, avenues or highways within The City of New York above mentioned and hereinafter enumerated. That the terms of said order, a copy of which is attached hereto, marked "Schedule B," are acceptable to The Long Island Railroad Company.

V. That the petitioner herein, The Long Island Railroad Company, desires to construct and operate the aforesaid proposed Creedmoor-Flushing Branch of its railroad in accordance with the authority conferred upon it by its charter as amended by the acts hereinabove specifically enumerated, as well as the Railroad Law of the State of New York, and in accordance with the provisions of the aforesaid orders of the Public Service Commission of the State of New York for the First District, dated respectively January 27th and January 31st, 1916. That the streets, avenues or highways within The City of New York required to be crossed by said branch railroad are Springfield Boulevard (Rocky Hill Road), Black Stump Road, Queens Road, North Hempstead Turnpike, Lawrence Road, Fresh Meadow Road, Underhill Avenue (Jamaica Avenue), Jagger Avenue (Rosen Road), Hammett Avenue (Hillside Drive) and Lawrence Street. 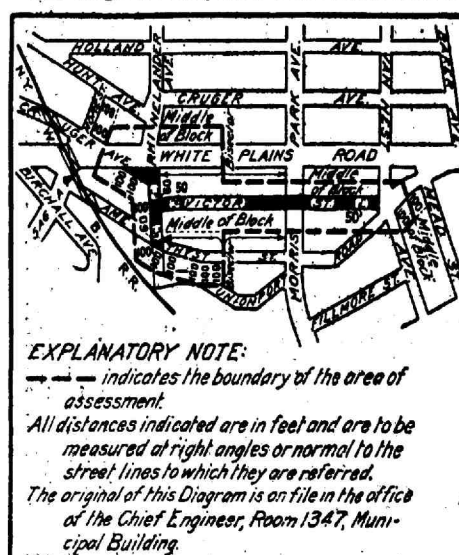

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions shall in any case be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

#### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

##### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City; a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
