ris, and should it be your pleasure to promote him the Civil Service Commission would undoubtedly give a promotion examination.

The daily average census at the various hospitals during the month of July was as follows: 1918—Bellevue, 1,196; Gouverneur, 168; Harlem, 249; Fordham, 227; Neponsit, 116. 1917—1,344; 172; 289; 214; 96.

Mr. Cowley, Engineer at Fordham Hospital, reports that he is having great difficulty with the boilers at the Fordham Hospital, and if the portable wards asked for are allowed an additional boiler will be needed. One of the Examiners for the Board of Estimate, at present making a survey at Fordham, advises Mr. Cowley to request the installation of four boilers at a cost of approximately \$45,000. This would involve a request for corporate stock.

I would urge that we renew our request to the Board of Estimate for additional laundry machinery, for which there is an appropriation of \$12,000. This request has been submitted two or three times during the last three years, but has been deferred, and recently was again placed on file by the Board of Estimate. Our present equipment, aside from being inadequate, is overloaded, and the linen returned to the wards is both insufficient and unsatisfactory.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

It was resolved to extend the sincere sympathy of the Trustees to the family of Major M. J. Karpas, who died in service in France.

It was further resolved to adopt appropriate resolutions in memory of the men from Bellevue and Allied Hospitals who died while serving their country.

The Trustees authorized the General Medical Superintendent to take appropriate steps to obtain a sufficient number of employees, and authorized such modification of salary schedules for presentation to the Board of Estimate as may be necessary with this end in view.

The resignation of Miss Malmgren, Assistant Superintendent of Fordham Hospital, was accepted, with regret, and the Secretary was requested to take this occasion to extend the sincere appreciation of the Trustees of the work that she has done while in charge of Fordham Hospital and her untiring devotion to its interests.

The Sinking Fund Commission was requested to authorize a lease for one year, with the privilege of renewal, of at least twenty additional rooms at an annual rental of \$4,548, in Osborn Hall.

The appointment of Dr. Symmers as Director of Laboratories, was considered. On motion, duly seconded and carried, action thereon was deferred until the next meeting, in order that the department may obtain a full record of his education, experience and report of the medical articles which he has written. In the meantime a request has been made of the Mayor for permission to fill the place.

After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize an issue of corporate stock in the sum of \$45,000, for the installation of three new boilers at Fordham Hospital.

After discussion, it was resolved to renew the request to the Board of Estimate for the approval of the plans and specifications for the additional laundry machinery required at Bellevue Hospital and to call attention to the urgency of this request.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Dr. Brannan presented tabulations of bids received at the office of the Central Purchase Committee on August 1st, 5th and 13th for (a) paints, oils, etc., (b) milk and cream (August); (c) drugs and chemicals; (d) butter, cheese and eggs; (e) bread and rolls; (f) meat and poultry; (g) stock fruits and vegetables; (h) milk and cream (September). After consideration, on the recommendation of the Committee on Supplies, contracts were awarded to the low formal bidders on all lines, except as hereinafter noted. On line No. 24, linseed oil, and lines Nos. 29, 30, 31 and 32, turpentine, bids were rejected on account of the high prices; on white lead, line No. 54, bids were rejected as this item was included in error and the department has sufficient white lead for the remainder of the year. Drugs, chemicals, etc., item No. 2, was rejected, as the bid was on a different article than which the department needs. Crinoline, item No. 49, bids were rejected, on account of the prices. As no bids were received for milk and cream readvertisement was authorized.

Reference was made to a communication dated July 19, from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, returning to the Trustees a report by the Committee on Finance and Budget relative to Bellevue's request for (a) an appropriation of \$1,000,000 for the construction of pavilions F and G, and (b) for the acquisition of additional property on the water-front be-

tween 29th and 30th sts., which reports were transmitted with a communication from the Commissioner of Health to the Mayor regarding this request. The subject was considered and discussed at length and it was moved, seconded and carried to take no further action, in view of the fact that the department has presented to the Board of Estimate a formal request, under date of May 15, 1918, for \$1,500,000 for pavilions F and G.

Attention was called to a communication dated July 19, from the Commissioner of the Department of Docks and Ferries, setting forth that he believes that the Trustees should apply for revenue bonds to meet the cost of a bill amounting to \$1,706.63 for providing a berth for the camp boat "Hudson." After discussion it was moved, seconded and carried to request the Board of Aldermen to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds to meet this bill.

Dr. Brannan reported that under date of July 19, 1918, he wrote to Surgeon General Gorgas relative to providing a short course for the training of nurses' aides, to meet the war situation, and that he received a reply under date of July 26, 1918, from Brigadier General Robert E. Noble, and that subsequently he wrote to Mr. Davidson of the American Red Cross and that he received a reply signed by Miss Delano to the effect that they contemplated establishing a course of one month's duration for nurses' aides. After consideration and discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to authorize the President to further negotiate with the proper authorities to establish a course of training for nurses and nurses' aides, to supply the needs of military and civil hospitals created by war conditions, the Trustees approving a three or six months' course.

Dr. Brannan reported that he was in conference with Commissioner Coler in regard to the Trustees' request for permission to use as much of the \$40,000 appropriated for the additional roof ward of Fordham Hospital as may be required for the construction of portable ward buildings at Fordham Hospital, pending the issue of corporate stock for the construction of additional wings.

Dr. Brannan also referred to the need of obtaining a competent employee for the storeroom at the Neponsit Beach Hospital for Children. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to authorize the General Medical Superintendent to revise the salary schedules in order to obtain higher salaries so that a competent employee may be secured for the position of storekeeper at the Neponsit Beach Hospital.

COMMUNICATIONS.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for July 24 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the following nominations were approved: First Division—Bedford P. Hardin, as Intern for one year from July 1, 1918; Herman Ballon, as Assistant Physician to Out Patients, Tuberculosis service. Third Division—Benjamin Breakstone, as Intern for six months from July 1, 1918. Fourth Division—William B. Noyes, as Physician to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for August 14 were also presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the following nominations were approved: First Division—Anna Walsh, as Resident Physician, Children's Medical Service, from August 1 to September 30, 1918. Third Division—Louise Townsend, as Resident on the Obstetrical service, to date from July 1, 1918; R. E. Songstaken, as House Surgeon, from July 1, 1918, to Jan. 1, 1919, the appointment as Anaesthetist to be withdrawn; Joseph Heyman, for six months' service as Intern on the gynaecological division, from July 1, 1918; John L. Dies, 6 months' Intern, gynaecological service, from July 1, 1918; Irving F. Wallace, as substitute on the gynaecological service.

Reference was made to a letter from the Mayor's office, under date of July 22, in regard to furnishing a statement of the number of men and women in the department receiving more than \$1,200 a year. The information for this letter is now in course of preparation, and the President was requested to formulate a reply.

Reference was also made to a letter dated August 6, from the Mayor, requesting that punctuality and regularity in attendance be considered in making up the tentative estimate, and if the budget has already been filed, which is the case at Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, that the information be sent to his office relative to this recommendation. The information is now being compiled to be forwarded to the Mayor as soon as completed.

Dr. Brannan also referred to a letter from the Mayor, under date of August 2, regarding a complaint against Captain McHale, Night Superintendent. Dr. Brannan reported that he had made a thorough investigation of the matter and believes the

complaint is without foundation and has sent a report to the Mayor.

A communication, dated July 25, was presented from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting a certified copy of a resolution adopted on July 28, assigning to the Department of Public Charities one photograph burner, which communication was ordered placed on file.

A letter dated July 18 was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, enclosing a certified copy of a resolution adopted on July 12, approving transfer of funds to the City Fund for Salary and Wage Accruals, which communication was ordered placed on file.

A letter dated July 26 was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted on July 19, approving (a) issue of special revenue bonds in the deficits and (b) plans and specifications and estimate of cost for furnishing screens for pavilions I, K, L and M, which communication was ordered placed on file.

Dr. O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

Miss Malmgren, Assistant Superintendent at Fordham Hospital, left the service on August 31.

We continue to experience increasing difficulties in the matter of employees, particularly at Bellevue. The dining room in the nurses' residence has only four remaining of a staff of fourteen, so it has been necessary to introduce the cafeteria system. In pavilions A and B there are twenty-eight employees short; the census being rather light just now we have closed three of the wards.

The boat "Southfield" at Bellevue is very much out of repair. The engineer reports that the entire roof would have to be replaced and that in his opinion the repairs needed to make the boat habitable and safe are so extensive and would be so expensive it would be better to replace the boat if possible to do so.

After discussion, the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to obtain estimates of the cost of repairs required on the boat "Southfield" and present them at the next meeting.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Dr. Brannan presented a tabulation of bids received at the office of the Central Purchase Committee on Tuesday, September 3, for furnishing and delivering milk and cream to Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. After consideration, on the recommendation of the Committee on Supplies, contracts were awarded to the low formal bidders on each class. As no bids were received for milk and cream for delivery at the Neponsit Beach Hospital the Trustees authorized the purchase of these supplies for September for this hospital in the open market. In considering the above mentioned bids for milk and cream the Trustees resolved to request the General Medical Superintendent that they would like to know, if it is possible to find out, why the larger milk dealers do not bid on supplies of milk and cream to the hospitals of the department.

Dr. Brannan reported that since the last meeting he had been at Washington in conference with representatives from the office of Surgeon General Gorgas regarding establishing a three or six months' course for the training of nurses' aides and found that the Army surgeons, particularly Colonel Kiefer, while conceding that the plan is a good one, do not consider it necessary for furnishing the required personnel for the nursing service in the hospitals of that department. After discussion, the report from the President was accepted.

Dr. Brannan also reported that he had conferred with representatives from the office of Provost Marshal Crowder in regard to the classification of employees under the new man-power regulation so that the hospitals of the City of New York would be able to retain employees in their service, free from military obligation, and reported that he was assured that the hospitals would be classified as among essential occupations, and that it was necessary for the individual subject to the Selective Service Law to make his claim for exemption or deferred classification. After consideration and discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to instruct the President to send a letter to each Draft Board in the city setting forth the vital necessity for the health of the community to continue the maintenance and operation of the hospitals and exempt from military service the employees required in the hospital.

It was also resolved to call attention to the work done by the hospitals of the department in instructing army surgeons in military surgery and re-orthopedics. Dr. Brannan referred to a letter received from the Mayor, under date of August 30, in regard to alleged delays on the part of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals in the matter of executing contracts, and that the hospitals are receiving an inferior quality of meat. Dr. Brannan presented a tabulation showing the time contracts are received and returned, and that there are no

delays on the part of the department, and also reported that the meat received in the hospitals is uniformly of excellent quality, and presented a draft of a letter to be sent to the Mayor. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, to approve the transmission to the Mayor of the letter presented by the President.

The President presented a letter from the Mayor, dated August 22, requesting the department to transmit to the Central Purchase Committee requisitions of supplies required and the taking of an inventory on Jan. 1, 1919, which letter was answered under date of September 6, a copy of which was given to each Trustee, and approved.

A letter, dated August 6, was presented from the Mayor in regard to a suggestion from the Tenement House Commission relative to the punctuality and attendance of employees who are recommended for increases in the budget for 1919, which was answered by the President under date of August 27, and copy sent to each Trustee, and approved.

Reference was made to the following letters from the Mayor, dated August 21, requesting that employees of the department pay no attention to blanks and communications sent out by the Bureau of Municipal Research, asking for information regarding salaries and salary increases. This was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for compliance.

A letter, dated August 17, transmitting a communication from the Department of the Interior, regarding correspondence from Switzerland relative to a patient on which a report was sent to the Mayor by Dr. Brannan on August 21. Reference was made to a letter received from Commissioner Coler, dated August 19, stating that in the hospitals of the Department of Public Charities the rate charged for medical cases is \$1.50 a day and for surgical cases \$2.25 a day, in so far as relates to cases under the Workmen's Compensation Law, and suggesting, for the sake of uniformity, that the charge for treating patients in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals be made the same. After consideration, the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to adopt the new rates at once.

After Consideration and discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to authorize the appointment of Douglas Symmers as Director of Laboratories, which appointment is made subject to the rules of the Civil Service Commission and the Board of Estimate. On the recommendation of the Building Committee the plans and specifications for the installation of wood shelving, lockers, etc., in the store-room of the laundry extension at Bellevue Hospital, at an estimated cost of \$3,000, for which provision was made in the budget in 1918, was approved, and their presentation to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was authorized. The plans and specifications for the alterations to the electric equipment in the X-ray department of Fordham Hospital, for which there is an allowance in the budget for 1918 in the sum of \$1,000, was accepted and transmission to the Board of Estimate for approval was authorized. On the recommendation of the Building Committee payment was authorized of the retained 5 per cent. on the contract of the E. Rutzler Company for the installation of steam hoisting work and ventilating work in the Out Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital. After consideration, on the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, to accept the work under the contract of the Eclipse Light Company for the installation of lighting fixtures in the new building for the Out Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital. A communication, dated July 25, was presented from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting a certified copy of a resolution adopted on July 28, assigning to the Department of Public Charities one photograph burner, which communication was ordered placed on file. A letter dated July 18 was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, enclosing a certified copy of a resolution adopted on July 12, approving transfer of funds to the City Fund for Salary and Wage Accruals, which communication was ordered placed on file. A letter dated July 26 was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted on July 19, approving (a) issue of special revenue bonds in the deficits and (b) plans and specifications and estimate of cost for furnishing screens for pavilions I, K, L and M, which communication was ordered placed on file. Dr. Brannan presented a tabulation of bids received at the office of the Central Purchase Committee on Tuesday, September 3, for furnishing and delivering milk and cream to Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. After consideration, on the recommendation of the Committee on Supplies, contracts were awarded to the low formal bidders on each class. As no bids were received for milk and cream for delivery at the Neponsit Beach Hospital the Trustees authorized the purchase of these supplies for September for this hospital in the open market. In considering the above mentioned bids for milk and cream the Trustees resolved to request the General Medical Superintendent that they would like to know, if it is possible to find out, why the larger milk dealers do not bid on supplies of milk and cream to the hospitals of the department.

After consideration and discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to instruct the President to send a letter to each Draft Board in the city setting forth the vital necessity for the health of the community to continue the maintenance and operation of the hospitals and exempt from military service the employees required in the hospital.

the installation of screens at Fordham Hospital, was accepted and final payment authorized. A letter, dated August 27, was presented from the American Hospital Association stating that the Twentieth Annual Convention of that association will be held on September 24 to September 28, 1918, and suggesting that the Trustees send a representative from the hospitals of the department. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was requested to represent the hospitals of the department. A letter, dated August 30, was presented from William P. Strain, asking that a yearly salary be awarded to him for his services at the hospital, and suggesting a salary of \$1,500 a year as compensation for the time, effort and service given to the hospital. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, to inform Dr. Strain that the Trustees regret their inability to comply with his suggestion at this time, as no provision was made in the annual appropriation to the hospital for the place, but that an application will be made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to provide a salary for the place in the budget for 1919.

September 9, 1918.

On Thursday, September 5, the Trustees instructed the President to write to the various draft boards in regard to the classification of employees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. As the Chairman of the War Industries Board, as published in the newspapers on Monday, September 9, classified the maintenance and operation of public institutions and buildings, such as hospitals and sanatoriums, in Class I as deferred classification under the terms of the Selective Service Law for men between 18 and 45, which class includes, among other occupations, the production of munitions, air craft, civil employees of the Army and Navy arsenals, etc., and such other essential occupations bearing on the military needs of the nation, the Trustees reconsidered their request of September 5, and, after discussion, instructed the General Medical Superintendent to certify to the various draft boards the need of the individual employees in the hospitals of the department when those employees are required to fill out their questionnaires. The General Medical Superintendent was also authorized to take such steps as may be necessary to retain a sufficient number of employees in the department for the proper maintenance of the hospitals. Reference was made to the need of a salaried Resident Physician for the Neponset Beach Hospital. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to supplement the departmental estimate for 1919 and ask for a salaried place of Resident Physician at \$900 a year. The General Medical Superintendent reported that he had received an estimate of \$600 as the cost for repairs to the furniture in the Nurses' Residence, and the Trustees authorized a request to the Board of Aldermen for an issue of revenue bonds for this purpose.

A letter, dated September 4, was presented from the Corporation Counsel, requesting that all applications for changes in the law be presented to the Law Department on or before October 15. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, to request the President to inform the Corporation Counsel that it would be desirable to amend the Workmen's Compensation Law, whereby the hospitals of the department would be permitted to make a charge for operations, use of X-ray, operating rooms, etc., in accordance with the schedule of rates allowed under the law, and Dr. O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, was instructed to confer with the Law Department on the subject.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was moved, seconded and carried.





NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchman or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on the date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the openings of the main sewer in the street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all openings in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days

from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President of Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five percentum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done or the supplies are to be furnished.
