

MEETING, WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 14, 1877.

Adverse reports upon the claim of Mr. John Hogan, for extra work in connection with his contract for granite work at the Museum of Art, and upon the claim of Mr. John Mahoney, for extra plastering work at the Museum of Natural History, were received from the Superintending Architect, and Mr. C. Vaux, Architect.

The plans and specifications heretofore submitted by Mr. Vaux, Architect, with the addition of the work to the interior of the roof of the Central Hall of the Museum of Art Building, for the following works were approved, viz.:

1. Tiling.
2. Temporary gallery.

The Secretary was directed to prepare and insert the necessary advertisements for proposals for the said works.

A communication was received from Mr. C. Vaux, Architect, inclosing specifications and plans for certain galvanized iron and zinc work in connection with the Museum of Art Building, the estimated cost of which he states to be \$700, and which he recommends to be done. Said work was approved, and the Treasurer authorized to issue an order therefor.

Plans and specifications for the drainage of the district in the Twenty-fourth Ward, lying between Pelham avenue and Kingsbridge road, west of the Southern Boulevard, presented to the Board on the 31st January, 1877, were approved, and the Secretary was directed to prepare and insert the necessary advertisements for proposals for the work.

The following preambles and resolution were adopted, viz.:

Whereas, This Department, on the 20th day of February, 1875, made requisition on the Comptroller of the City of New York to issue bonds to the amount of one hundred thousand (\$100,000) dollars, in putsuance of the provisions of section 3, chapter 534, Laws of 1871; and section 16, chapter 329, Laws of 1874, for the construction of a bridge over Harlem river; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on the 21st day of March, 1876, authorized the said Comptroller to issue said bonds to the amount of ten thousand (\$100,000) dollars; and

Whereas, This Department has completed its plans and specifications for said bridge, which is to be made of iron, and has advertised for proposals for the construction of the same, which proposals are to be received and opened on the 28th day of February, 1877; and Whereas, The estimated cost of said bridge is about \$90,000; Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and hereby is requested to authorize the Comptroller of the city to issue the balance of said bonds for \$100,000 (namely, bonds to the amount of \$90,000), as mentioned in the aforesaid requisition of this Department, of February 20, 1885.

Whereas, It is not only desirable, but indispensably necessary, both in an economical and samtary point of view, that some provision should be made for depositing the ashes and sweepings of the streets of this city other than the present expensive, annoying, and, in winter, impracticable method of transporting them out to sea, and depositing such refuse in the tideway outside the harbor limits; a system which costs more than \$100,000 a year; causes dissatisfaction to residents of adjoining territory, and involves an inexcusable waste of material that can be used to great advantage in extending the area of land owned by the city, by reclaiming from the surrounding waters many acres, which would ultimately be of great value; and

Whereas, Such a desired place of deposit can be secured by taking measures to fill up the estuary that separates Ward's from Randall's Island, known as "Little Hell Gate," and by filling in the marshy land adjoining these islands, including the strait on the east side of Randall's Island which separates Ward's from Randall's Island from the "Sunken Meadow," or "Drowned Marsh," thereby uniting these two islands and the "Drowned Marsh," and reclaiming the low lands adjoining on the east side, which will add more than one hundred acres of land to the real property of the city, and supply a place for depositing the ashes required to be removed for fifty years to come. The estuary known as the "Kills, which separates Randall's Island from the recently annexed Twenty-third Ward, might also, with advantage, be filled in, thus connecting Ward's and Randall's Islands with the mainland, converting them into a promontory, greatly enlarging the water front, and affording an opportunity for the erection of railroad depots, warehouses, and other commercial appliances. The closing of these two estuaries would also greatly improve the navigation of the Harlem river, tas the vast volume of water that now passes through them would be forced into the Harlem river, as the vast volume of water that now passe

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby authorized and directed to prepare a memorial, on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, and cause the same to be presented to the Legislature of this State, now in session, praying for the passage of an act providing for the appointment by the Mayor of a competent person who shall be a taxpayer, to represent the taxable property of this city in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, such appointee to serve without compensation. such appointee to serve without compensation.
