At the stone shed the prisoners have cut 1,205 feet building stone, 174 feet window jambs, 102 feet cornerstone, 5,350 feet flagging, 30 feet water-table, 55 feet curbing, 26 feet gutter-stone, 276 feet coping, 11 feet platform, 16 feet pier caps, 13 feet coarse lintels.

New York, January 1, 1885. The following improvements and repairs have been made at First, Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth District Prisons, from October 1 to December 31, 1884, by prison labor, and without expense to the Department of Public Charities and Correction, except the cost of the material:

Painted walls and iron railings of first, second and third tiers of male prison.

Wainscoted ends of male prison; built sashes for sky-lights, stairs in kitchen in Magdalen, and partition in female prison; repaired doors, etc.

Plastered and repaired cell windows in male and female prisons; plastered walls first and second tiers of male prison, ceiling in new prison, and walls and ceiling in Magdalen; built one chimney in new prison and repaired three chimneys.
