

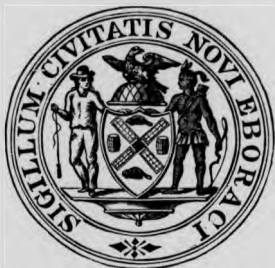

Chapter 364. An act to amend chapter one hundred and eighty of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-four, entitled "An act to amend chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, entitled 'An act to consolidate into one act, and to declare the special and local laws affecting public interests in the City of New York, and to provide a pension fund for the police department of said city.'" Section sixteen of said act amended so as to read as follows :

Sec. 305. The Police Pension Fund shall consist of—
Tenth.—Any and all unexpended balances of appropriations or amounts made, estimated, levied, raised or appropriated for the payment of salaries or compensation of members of the police force remaining unexpended or unapplied, after allowing all claims payable therefrom. And the Board of Police may and it is hereby authorized to pay over to the police pension fund such unexpended balances, or any part thereof, at any time after the expiration of the year for which the same were made and appropriated, and after allowing sufficient to satisfy all claims payable therefrom, as aforesaid.

The unexpended balance remaining to the credit of account of "Police Fund—For salaries of Superintendent, Inspectors, Sergeants, Captains, Sergeants, Patrolmen, Doormen and Detective Sergeants," for the year 1884, amounts to the sum of forty-seven thousand three hundred and nineteen dollars and sixty-one cents; for the year 1885, about sixty-three thousand dollars. After paying all liabilities against said accounts, the unexpended balance will be placed to the credit of the Police Pension Fund, and will appear in the account for the year 1886.

On motion of Commissioner Marshall, the reading of the minutes of the meeting held on January 26, 1886, was dispensed with.

Decision.

Commissioner Lord presented the following decision, viz.:

No. 72. Matter of George Baldwin—Assessment for One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street (Eastern Boulevard), regulating, grading and superstructure, from Avenue A to Sixth avenue; confirmed July 18, 1879.

The work for which this assessment was imposed was done by day's work, commenced in 1875 and completed in 1878, corresponding approximately in time to the work on the other sections of the Eastern Boulevard, which was also done by day's work.

The price fixed in these sections (Seventy-second street, between Avenue A and Fifth avenue; One Hundred and Sixteenth street, between Avenue A and Sixth avenue; and Avenue A between Fifty-seventh and Eighty-sixth streets) for a similar Telford-Macadam pavement, was \$2.35 per square yard (p. 722 of Minutes), or fifty cents per square yard less than the price charged in the assessment list in the present case. The claim of the petitioner is based on this difference, which amounts to about fourteen per cent. of the entire amount assessed, and the only remaining question is whether this overcharge worked a substantial injustice to the property-owners.

After carefully considering this question we have come to the conclusion that the amount assessed on the petitioner's property for this improvement should be reduced fourteen per cent.

The Chairman put the question whether the decision, as presented, shall stand as the decision of the Commissioners.

of the operations and action of the Department of Taxes and Assessments for the quarter ending December 31, 1885:

The assessment of real and personal property in the City of New York for purposes of taxation for the year 1886, which was commenced by the Deputy Tax Commissioners, under the direction of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, on the first Monday of September, 1885, in conformity with the requirements of section 814 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, is substantially completed, and the books of Annual Record of Assessed Valuations of Real and Personal Estate for the year 1886 will be opened for inspection and correction on the second Monday of January (11th instant), as required by law.

Whereas, The ordinance approved February 24, 1866, vesting in the Mayor, the power "to regulate permits for street stands, show-cases, signs, stairways, hoistways and deliveries," and the several amendments thereto; also sections 281, 282, 283, 284, 285, 286, 287, 288, 289, 290 and 291 of article XXX, of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, and all the amendments thereto, including the resolutions approved April 8, 1884, which went into effect May 1, 1884, delegating this power to the Mayor through the Register of Permits, are clearly illegal, and every such permit so granted is null and void, and of no binding effect; be it therefore

Resolved, That the said ordinance approved February 24, 1866, and the several amendments thereto, "to regulate permits for street stands, show-cases, signs, stairways, hoistways and deliveries;" also sections 281 to 291, inclusive, of article XXX, of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, and the several amendments thereto, including the resolutions approved April 8, 1884, which went into effect May 1, 1884, delegating like powers to the Mayor, through the Register of Permits, be and they are hereby severally and respectively annulled, rescinded and repealed, and the said office of Register of Permits be and is hereby abolished.

THE CHIEF ENGINEER OF THE CROTON Aqueduct reports to me to-day that during the past twenty days the water in the city reservoirs has gone down three feet three inches, equal to 28,000,000 gallons, showing that this amount of water was used and wasted over and above the supply received through the Croton Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit. The Department has no means of stopping this enormous waste, which is caused by consumers keeping faucets open day and night to prevent freezing in the service-pipes, and can only make this most urgent appeal to them to stop it, and notify them unless it is stopped the pressures in the water-mains will be so much reduced that in a few days the water will not rise to the basements and cellars in thousands of buildings.
