The Plumbing Rules and Regulations for the Borough of Brooklyn are hereby amended by adding the following sections:

#### PART XVI.

##### Gas Piping and Fixtures.

Sec. 161. Hereafter the gas piping and fixtures in all new buildings and all alterations and extensions made to the gas piping or fixtures in old buildings must be done in accordance with the following rules, which are made in accordance with the provisions of section 89 of the Building Code.

For additional requirements of public buildings, theatres and places of assemblage, see Part XXI. of the Building Code.

Sec. 162. Before the construction or alteration of any gas piping in any building or part of any building, a permit must be obtained from the Superintendent of Buildings. This permit will be issued only to a registered plumber and in conjunction with the permit for plumbing and drainage. Application must include all floor plans complete, showing each and every outlet and the number of burners to go on each outlet. Small alterations may be made by notifying the Bureau of Buildings, using the same blank forms provided for alterations and repairs to plumbing.

Sec. 163. Before any fixtures are connected with the gas piping, a permit must be obtained from the Superintendent of Buildings, application for same to be made on forms furnished by the Bureau of Buildings.

Sec. 164. All gas pipe shall be of the best quality wrought iron and of the kind classed as standard pipe and shall weigh according to the following scale:

3/8-inch, 0.56 pounds per foot;
1/2-inch, 0.85 pounds per foot;
5/8-inch, 1.12 pounds per foot;
1-inch, 1.67 pounds per foot;
1 1/4-inch, 2.24 pounds per foot;
2 1/2-inch, 2.68 pounds per foot;
2-inch, 3.61 pounds per foot;
2 1/2-inch, 5.75 pounds per foot;
3-inch, 7.54 pounds per foot;
3 1/2-inch, 9.00 pounds per foot;
4-inch, 10.66 pounds per foot.

No pipe allowed of less than 3/8 inch in diameter.

Sec. 165. All fittings (excepting stop cocks or valves) shall be of malleable iron.

Sec. 166. There shall be a heavy brass straightway cock or valve on the service pipe immediately inside the front foundation wall.

Iron cocks or valves are not permitted.

Sec. 167. Where it is not impracticable so to do, all risers shall be left not more than five feet from front wall.

Sec. 168. No pipe shall be laid so as to support any weight (except fixtures) or be subjected to any strain whatsoever. All pipe shall be properly laid and fastened to prevent becoming trapped, and shall be laid, when practicable, above timbers or beams instead of beneath them. Where running lines or branches cross beams they must do so within thirty-six inches of the end of the beams, and in no case shall the said pipes be let into the beams more than two inches in depth. Any pipe laid in a cold or damp place shall be properly dripped, protected and painted with two coats of red lead and boiled oil or tarred.

Sec. 169. No gas pipe shall be laid in cement or concrete unless the pipe and channel in which it is placed are well covered with tar, nor within six inches of an electric wire, excepting where they immediately join outlets.

Sec. 170. All drops must be set plumb and securely fastened, each one having at least one soldered strap. Drops and outlets less than 3/4 of an inch in diameter shall not be left more than one inch below plastering, centre-pieces or woodwork.

Sec. 171. All outlets and risers shall be left capped until covered by fixtures.

Sec. 172. No unions or running threads shall be permitted. Where necessary to cut out to repair leaks or make extensions, pipe shall be again put together with right and left couplings.

Sec. 173. No gasfitters' cement shall be used, except in putting fixtures together.

Sec. 174. All gas brackets and fixtures shall be placed so that the burners of same are not less than three feet below any ceiling or woodwork, unless the same is properly protected by a shield, in which case the distance shall not be less than eighteen inches.

No swinging or folding gas brackets shall be placed against any stud partition or woodwork.

No gas bracket on any lath and plaster partition or woodwork shall be less than five inches in length, measured from the burner to the plaster surface or woodwork.

Gas lights placed near window curtains or any other combustible material shall be protected by a proper shield.

Sec. 175. Gas outlets for burners shall not be placed under tanks, back of doors or within four feet of any meter.

Sec. 176. All buildings shall be piped according to the following scale:

Pipe 3/8 inch, 26 feet, 3 burners;
Pipe 1/2 inch, 36 feet, 6 burners;
Pipe 5/8 inch, 60 feet, 20 burners;
Pipe 1 inch, 80 feet, 35 burners;
Pipe 1 1/4 inches, 110 feet, 60 burners;
Pipe 1 1/2 inches, 150 feet, 100 burners;
Pipe 2 inches, 200 feet, 200 burners;
Pipe 2 1/2 inches, 300 feet, 300 burners;
Pipe 3 inches, 450 feet, 450 burners;
Pipe 3 1/2 inches, 500 feet, 600 burners;
Pipe 4 inches, 600 feet, 750 burners.

Sec. 177. Outlets for gas ranges shall have a diameter not less than required for six burners, and all gas ranges and heaters shall have a straightway cock on service pipe.

Sec. 178. When brass piping is used on the outside of plastering or woodwork it shall be classed as fixtures.

Sec. 179. All brass tubing used for arms and stems of fixtures shall be at least No. 18 standard gauge and full size outside, so as to cut a full thread. All threads on brass pipe shall screw in at least 5-16 of an inch. All rope or square tubing shall be brazed or soldered into fittings and distributors, or have a nipple brazed into the tubing.

Sec. 180. All cast fittings, such as cocks, swing joints, double centres, nozzles, etc., shall be extra heavy brass. The plugs of all cocks must be ground to a smooth and true surface for their entire length, be free from sand-holes, have not less than 3/4 of an inch bearing (except in cases of special design), have two flat sides on the end for the washer, and have two nuts instead of a tail screw. All stop pins to keys or cocks shall be screwed into place.

Sec. 181. After all piping is fitted and fastened and all outlets capped up, there must be applied by the plumber, in the presence of an Inspector of the Bureau of Buildings, a test with air to a pressure equal to a column of mercury 6 inches in height, and the same to stand for five minutes; only mercury gauge shall be used. No piping shall be covered up, nor shall any fixture, gas, heater or range, be connected thereto until a card showing the approval of this test has been issued by the Superintendent of Buildings. And, again, when all fixtures are hung, a similar test shall be applied in exactly the same manner, excepting that one burner fixture will be omitted to permit of applying a pump and gauge. On the Inspector's report of this test as above, a final approval card in duplicate will be issued by the Superintendent of Buildings.

Sec. 182. No meter will be set by any gas company until a certificate is filed with them from the Bureau of Buildings certifying that the gas pipes and fixtures comply with the foregoing rules.

Sec. 183. When for any reason, it may be impracticable to comply strictly with the foregoing rules, the Superintendent of Buildings shall have power to modify their provisions so that the spirit and substance thereof shall be complied with. Such modification shall be endorsed upon the permit over the signature of the Superintendent of Buildings.

#### POLICE DEPARTMENT.

New York, September 23, 1903.

The following proceedings were this day directed by Police Commissioner Greene:

Referred to the Chief Inspector—Communication from Carl Marx, relative to using the police instead of the militia at labor strikes. Communication from Thomas L. Reynolds, commanding Officer Isaac Weiner for stopping a runaway; for report. Application of A. Winkopp, for appointment of Thomas Fickett as Special Patrolman.

Approved—Recommendation of Second Deputy Commissioner Piper that one of the three horses now assigned for carriage duty in the park be transferred to Brooklyn for the use of Inspector Druhan and the commanding officer of the 68th Precinct. Recommendation of First Deputy Commissioner Ebstein, that Patrolmen William Pendergast, John W. Mann, William Laubersheimer and George H. Giblin of the 76th Precinct, be re-transferred to the Borough of Manhattan. Recommendation of First Deputy Commissioner Ebstein, that the following transfers be made, viz.: Patrolman Thomas H. McGoey, 50th to 57th Precinct; Patrolman William H. Bosse, 50th to 56th Precinct; Patrolman John Rhatigan, 56th to 50th Precinct, and John Noonan, 57th to 50th Precinct. Application of Captain Martin Handy, 22d Precinct, that Patrolman John J. Giles, 26th Precinct, be transferred to his command for clerical duty and Patrolman David Roche transferred from his command. Recommendation of Second Deputy Commissioner Piper that Patrolman Frederick Trumpf, 3d Precinct, be assigned to crossing at the south side of Barclay and West streets, and Patrolman William Filan, from 2d to the 3d Precinct, and assigned to crossing at south side of Christopher and West streets.

Disapproved—Application of Patrolman Joseph H. Behnk, 59th Precinct, to be reimbursed for summer uniform. Application of Patrolman Ira D. Kinne, 8th Precinct, for transfer. Application of Edw. L. McCarthy, to be reinstated as a licensed engineer.

Special Patrolmen Appointed—Frank Russell, for John F. Hylan, Brooklyn. Julius G. Unger, for New York Turn Verein, Manhattan.

Appointment Revoked—John Butler and Paul Connolly, as Special Patrolmen for Holmes Electric Company.

Full Pay Granted—Patrolman Edward Baldauf, 22d Precinct, August 2 to September 1, 1903.

Granted—Permission to Patrolman Edward J. O'Brien, 8th Precinct, to receive reward of \$20 from Navy Department for arrest of a deserter; with usual deduction; money to be first deposited with the Bookkeeper.

Referred to the First Deputy Commissioner—Communication from Samuel H. Bishop, relative to accidental shooting of George Stark by Patrolman Frank Lvman, 57th Precinct.

Referred to the Second Deputy Commissioner—Application of Patrolman Michael J. Frawley, 21st Precinct, to be detailed to Broadway Squad; for report.

Referred to the Third Deputy Commissioner—Report of Inspector Repairs and Supplies, relative to water leaking through the rear wall of the 11th Precinct Station House Prison from premises in rear thereof; for action.

Chief Clerk to Answer—R. H. Macy & Co., asking for record of John Curran, Hon. Seward Baker, relative to application of Patrolman Frederick Kessler, 24th Precinct, for transfer. Miss K. E. Farrell, relative to condition of Roundsman John Schuessler. Charles Volz, relative to approximate cost of new station house, etc., for 36th Precinct. Dr. Fred A. Hunt, asking if there are any vacancies for Police Surgeon and salary of same. Municipal Civil Service Commission, asking for the records of Clerks for promotion.

On reading and filing report of Acting Captain Charles J. Ryan, 80th Precinct, concurred in by Inspector E. O. Smith, approved by Second Deputy Commissioner A. R. Piper.

Ordered, That "Honorable Mention" be and is hereby made in the records of the Department of the meritorious services of Patrolman James F. McGrath, of the 80th Precinct, for the courage displayed by him in the arrest of a notorious and desperate convict, Henry Keely, on the morning of June 28, 1903, at the corner of Riker and Broad streets, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond. The said Keely was brandishing a loaded revolver and threatened to shoot everybody in sight. Officer McGrath, single-handed, walked up to Keely and placed him under arrest. He was attacked by Keely and shot three times, once in the left shoulder and twice in the left arm, but in spite of the injuries received he held his prisoner until the arrival of another patrolman, and with his assistance then conveyed the prisoner to the station house; and it is further

Ordered, That the "Medal of Honor" of the Department be and is hereby awarded to him.

Ordered, That Patrolmen Thomas K. Hastings and Benjamin V. Austin, whose names appear on eligible list of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated September 22, 1903, be and are hereby promoted to the grade of Roundsman of Police.

Ordered, That requisition be and is hereby made upon the Municipal Civil Service Commission for an eligible list to enable the Police Commissioner to appoint one Assistant Engineer for the steamer Patrol, with compensation at \$900 per annum, and that the Civil Service Commission be respectfully informed that of the names certified on eligible list dated September 18, 1903, John C. Detwiler failed to appear, notice having been sent to his address; that William P. Fortune is now employed and declines appointment in the Police Department, and that Archibald McAuslin declines appointment.

Ordered, That, pursuant to paragraph 2, Rule 7, of the Civil Service Rules, William J. Johnston, of No. 218 Thirty-ninth street, Brooklyn, be and is hereby employed for one week as Assistant Engineer on steamer "Patrol," with compensation at the rate of \$900 per annum.

Approved (additional)—Application of Captain James Campbell, 48th Precinct, for an Acting Roundsman.

On File—Report of Captain William Dean, 42d Precinct, and Inspector E. O. Smith, relative to rescue from drowning by Patrolman William A. Gray, 42d Precinct. Report of Surgeon S. M. Johnson of contagious disease in the family of Patrolman Thomas J. Harrington. Eligible list for Roundsman, dated September 22, 1903. Report of Captain John Becker, 50th Precinct, relative to Patrolman Henry McCarron losing his shield. Demand of Patrolman John J. Daly, 19th Precinct, to be recognized as Detective Sergeant.

On reading and filing opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated September 22, 1903, relative to extra work required in the construction of the 75th Precinct Station House on account of error in plans as to real depth to which the character of the ground requires foundation to be dug and built.

Ordered, That copy of such opinion be referred to R. Thomas Short, architect for said building, and that he be requested to obtain not less than four bids for the work required, and that such estimates be obtained at his very earliest convenience with a view to asking the Board of Aldermen to award the same without competitive bids and at public letting.
