## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York Held Wednesday, December 19, 1917, at 10:30 A. M.

Present—Benjamin Patterson, President, and Darwin R. James, Jr., Commissioner. The President presided.

A report, dated Dec. 19, was presented from the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation relative to four candidates in the examination for Consultant on City Planning. The Secretary was instructed to mark Herbert S. Swan "not qualified", to mark Frederick V. Z. Lane "not qualified", and to summon him before the Commission; to mark the other two candidates mentioned in the report "qualified" and, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the eligible list for the position of Consultant on City Planning be and the same is hereby promulgated.

After consideration of a report, dated Dec. 13, from the Acting Chief Examiner relative to a communication, dated Dec. 10, from the Secretary of the Department of Health certifying that John Oberwager, a Sanitary Inspector in that department, was performing duties appropriate to his title, the Secretary was instructed to release the payroll of the said employee.

A report, Y-72, dated Dec. 11, was presented from Assistant Chief Examiner Fuld stating that William Mudrack, 136 Lenox ave., Manhattan, an enemy alien, had filed an application, under the provisions of clause 11 of Rule XVIII for the employment as Chief in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and asking for instructions. The application of Mr. Mudrack was rejected, and, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he is hereby instructed to reject the applications of all enemy aliens for positions in the Non-Competitive Class (Rule XVIII, clauses 11 and 12).

Report, dated Dec. 17, recommending that the lateness of Loretta D. Tighe, Stenographer and Typewriter in the office of the Commission, during the periods ending respectively Sept. 30, 1916, Dec. 31, 1916, and April 30, 1917, be excused, and her rating amended as follows: Quarter ending Sept. 30, 1916, from 80 per cent. to 84 per cent. Quarter ending Dec. 31, 1916, from 79 per cent. to 83 per cent. Period ending April 30, 1917, from 79 per cent. to 83 per cent.

Report, dated Dec. 17, recommending that the rating of Rudolph Schaefer, Clerk, Department of Public Charities, for the period ending Aug. 31, 1917, be raised to standard in quantity, quality and personality.

The recommendations were adopted.

A report, dated Dec. 17, was presented from the Chairman of the Board of Review of the Commission recommending that the rules for the excuse of lateness and absence, adopted by the Commission on Feb. 28, 1917, be rescinded, and that the following be substituted therefor:

"1. Exact daily time records shall be required of all employees in the competitive class.

"2. The term 'lateness' as used herein shall have reference not only to the time of reporting to work in the morning, but also to the time of reporting after lunch.

"3. Applications for excuse of lateness and absence shall be made by employees in the various bureaus and divisions as follows: (a). All employees in the Examining Division to the Chief Examiner or Acting Chief Examiner. (b). All employees in the Executive Division to the Secretary or Assistant Secretary. (c). All other employees, including those in the Application Bureau, Certification Bureau, Pay Roll Bureau and Chief Clerk's Office, to the Chief Clerk.

"4. The matter of excusing lateness or absence shall be at the discretion of the Chief Examiner or Acting Chief Examiner, the Secretary or Assistant Secretary and the Chief Clerk respectively regarding the employees who apply to each of them as described in the preceding paragraph (3).

"5. No lateness or absence may be excused unless the offending employee shall make application therefor immediately upon reporting for duty after being late or absent.

"6. Lateness for which application to be excused is not made within 24 hours after its occurrence, or absence for which application is not made for its excuse within 24 hours after its termination, shall be considered as unexcused and demerits will be assessed therefor in accordance with the provisions of Regulation XIII of the General Regulations.

"7. These rules shall take effect as of the 1st of May, 1917, except that applications for the excuse of lateness and absence incurred prior to their adoption may be made at any time within one week thereafter. Otherwise these rules shall be in full effect immediately upon promulgation."

The recommendation was adopted.

After consideration of a report, dated Dec. 11, from the Certification Clerk, it was

Resolved, That the name of Martin J. Tahaney, Hoffman's Island, New York, be and the same is hereby removed from the list of persons disqualified for employment in the city service.

After consideration of a report, dated December 13, from the Chief Payroll Clerk, the Secretary was instructed to amend the records by placing the name of John A. Neidlinger on the preferred list of Steam Roller Engineer as of Dec. 14, 1917.

## STATE INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION—DEPARTMENT OF LABOR.

## Resolution Adopted.

WHEREAS, THE DIVISION OF FACTORY

Inspection has submitted to this Commission the following appeals from orders issued by said Division of Factory Inspection, said appeals having been made by the parties named herein against the premises noted, and being from a strict compliance with the law and the Code, and the granting of same involving a variation of law; and

Whereas, the said Division of Factory Inspection having had a reinspection made in each case, and upon the report submitted gives the following conditions and recommends as follows:

(1) Premises affected, Albany, 108 Hudson ave.; appellant, S. L. Munson Co. Properly enclose stairways with fire-resisting partitions. Four and five-story building; nonfireproof; combustibles; sprinkler; unapproved fire alarm signal system; occupancy, 105; above 1st floor, 94; above 2d floor, 84; 5th floor used for live storage and for dressing-room purposes; 1 employee occasionally on 5th floor; 2 fire escapes, nonfireproof openings 2 by 6; two interior stairways in five-story building, one in four-story building; horizontal exits, with hinged and sliding doors on one side only.

Recommendation: Waiver of order to enclose stairways in five-story building in view of fact that sprinkler is installed and occupancy of 5th floor so small; acceptance of horizontal exits with but one door.

(2) Premises affected, Buffalo, 135 Tonawanda st.; appellant, U. S. Hame Co. 5—Additional exit, remote from existing exit. One, two- and three-story nonfireproof building erected before October 1, 1913; divided lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 93; above 1st floor, 19; above 2d floor, 0. Two means of exit from 3d to 2d floors, and one interior and one exterior stairway from 1st to 2d floors, giving two means of exit, but not continuous; exits remote; no safe egress from roof.

Recommendation: Accept present exits while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged.

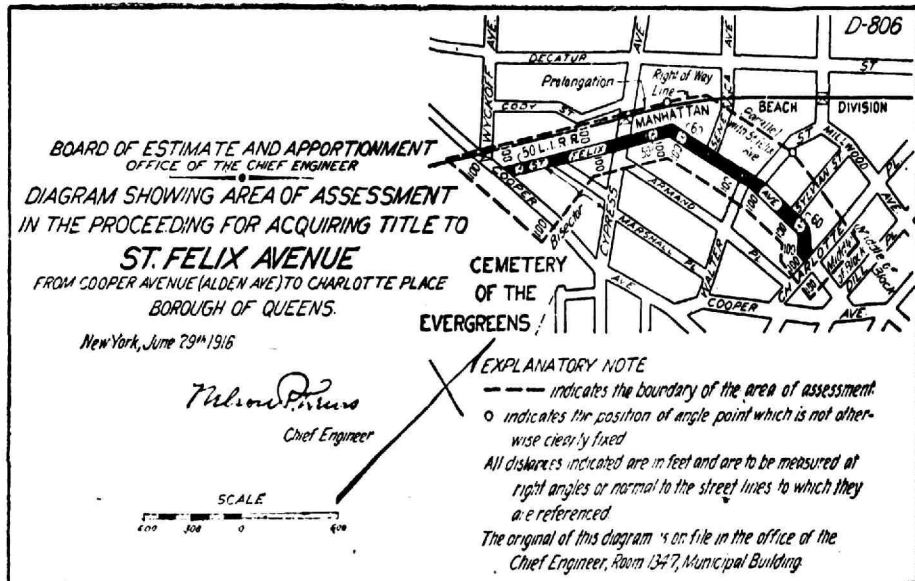

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.
