Petition of resident and property owners for the lighting of north side of Eighty-first street from First avenue to Avenue A.
Which was referred to the Committee on Lamps and Gas.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By Alderman Finck—
Resolved, That when this Board adjourns, it do so to meet on Monday, the 29th instant, at 12 o'clock, M.
The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative.

By Alderman Grant—
Resolved, That in that portion of Eleventh avenue extending from One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street to the intersection of said Eleventh avenue with Kingsbridge road there shall be laid out parks or centre pieces thirty-two feet in width in the centre of said avenue, and extending in length the distance respectively between the house-line of the intersecting streets, terminating at each end by circular curves with a diameter of thirty-two feet.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized to surround these parks with a granite coping, with beveled edges eight inches in width, and that he be and he is hereby authorized to pave the roadways of the said avenue with Macadam pavement, with Telford foundation, except that the gutter be paved four feet wide with trap-block pavement on all sides of said roadways, and that the space included between the line of the gutter adjoining the sidewalks and the crosswalks of the intersecting streets be also paved with trap-block pavement; also, that the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized to plant elm trees in suitable garden mould, surrounded by suitable iron tree boxes, in such system, and with such spaces as may be necessary to produce the most ornamental effect, and also that crosswalks be laid across the intersecting streets within the lines of the respective sidewalks of the said avenue; the work to be done under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

By Alderman Kenney—
Resolved, That James C. O'Brien be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds for the City and County of New York.

By Alderman Pearson—
Resolved, That hereafter, before the commencement of any action for violation of any of the ordinances of the city by the Corporation Attorney, except the ordinances relating to the removal of snow and ice from the sidewalks, the said Corporation Attorney shall give notice in writing or printed, or partly written and partly printed, at least ten days before entering complaint, to every such delinquent, to remove such cause of complaint, and if obedience is given to such notice, and the cause of complaint removed on or before the expiration of said ten days, then, and in that case, no complaint shall be made for such violation so removed, or remedied; but nothing herein contained shall require more than one notice to be given to the same person or persons for violation of any one Corporation ordinance, or parts thereof. Said notice shall have printed across its face, in large and conspicuous letters, the following words: "If the violation of the Corporation ordinance in this notice referred to be discontinued within ten days no action will be commenced by the Corporation Attorney."

By Alderman Grant—
Resolved, That the roadway of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, from Avenue St. Nicholas to St. Nicholas place, be paved with granite-block pavement, and that crosswalks be laid at the terminating avenues where required, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

By Alderman O'Connor—
Resolved, That William J. Lippman be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York, in place of William J. Lippman, whose term of office expires September 18, 1884.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative, as follows:

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Cleary, De Lacy, Dempsey, Farley, Finck, Fullgraft, Grant, Jaehne, Miller, O'Connor, O'Neil, Pearson, Reilly, Rothman, Sayles, Sheils, and Wendel—18.

By the same—
Resolved, That the consent of this Board to any application under the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, for consent to the construction, maintenance, use, operation or extension of a street surface railroad upon any street, road, avenue, or highway, shall, in accordance with section 7 of said act, direct and provide for the sale at public auction of the franchise, subject to all the provisions of said chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, to so construct, maintain, use, operate or extend such street surface railway.

Alderman O'Neil raised the point of order that inasmuch as a similar resolution was now before the Committee on Railroads, having been referred on the 23d of June last, it was not in order to act on the above resolution.

The President ruled the point of order to be well taken.

Whereupon Alderman O'Connor moved that the Committee on Railroads be discharged from the further consideration of a similar resolution referred on the 23d of June last.

Alderman O'Neil, as an amendment, moved that the Committee on Railroads be directed to report on the subject at the next meeting of the Board.

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed improvement to be necessary. They therefore recommend that the said resolution and ordinance be adopted.

Resolved, That the space lying east of the pavement already laid on the Western Boulevard south of the pavement already laid in Seventy-second street and west of the east curb of Tenth avenue be paved with Macadam pavement, with Telford foundation, except that a crosswalk of two courses of blue stone be laid on the northerly side of the above-described space, and that the gutters for a width of four feet be paved with trap-block pavement on the easterly side of the above-described space, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Dear Sir—In reply to your circular letter of the 25th inst., requesting me to prepare and send to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on or before the 30th inst., estimates, in writing, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business in my office, in and for the fiscal year of 1885, I have the honor to state, that the salaries fixed by law are as follows :

As the members of the Board of Aldermen are annually elected, and take office on the first Monday in January of each year, at noon, and the clerks and other officers of the Board are annually appointed and their compensation fixed by each new Board, it is not possible, in advance of the organization of the Board of Aldermen for the year 1885, "to specify the names of the several persons to be paid such salaries, respectively."

As there is now a pump on the corner of Watts and Greenwich streets, only one block distant, I think in the present condition of our water supply that it would be unnecessary, as well as unwise, to erect the trough proposed in this resolution.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS AGAIN RESUMED.

By Alderman Jaehne—

Whereas, The murderous attacks of organized gangs of ruffians on inoffensive and unprotected excursionists, one of which recently resulted in the death of a worthy citizen, should impel the authorities of this city to take the most decided and effective measures to protect respectable persons who embark on "excursion vessels" for amusement or recreation against the lawless rowdism that on almost every such occasion assaults and robs, indiscriminately, men, women and children, on these crowded excursion-boats, and even commits murder, almost with impunity; be it therefore

Resolved, That it is hereby recommended to the Commissioners of Police that they adopt a rule or regulation requiring the captains of the several Police Precincts to report to the Superintendent of Police every instance where "excursions" or "picnics" on steamboats or barges, or other vessels, are advertised or known to be about to depart from any dock or pier, or other place, within any and every such precinct, and requiring the said Superintendent to instruct the Captain of Police of every such precinct to detail at least two police officers, in full police uniform, for each and every vessel used to convey passengers on any and every such excursion or picnic, in order to afford police protection to such excursionists while within the jurisdiction of this city or State; and be it further

Resolved, That it shall not be lawful for any steamboat, or barge or other vessel, engaged to convey passengers on any excursion or picnic, to depart from any wharf, pier or bulkhead, or other place within the corporate limits of this city, unless at least two policemen, in full police uniform, shall accompany every such steamboat, barge, or other vessel as aforesaid, and every owner, master or person in charge of every such steamboat, barge or other vessel, who shall permit either to be used for the purpose of conveying passengers on any such excursion or picnic unaccompanied by two policemen as aforesaid, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction therefor before any police magistrate, shall, severally and respectively, incur a penalty of one hundred dollars, and in default of payment thereof shall be imprisoned in the City Prison for a period of ten days; and be it further

Resolved, That the Commissioners of Police be and are hereby directed strictly to enforce the provisions of the foregoing resolutions.

Alderman Miller moved that the resolution be referred to the Committee on Police and Health Departments.

But he subsequently withdrew the motion.

Whereupon Alderman Jaehne moved that the resolutions be referred to the Committee on Law, with instructions to report at the next meeting.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

The President called up G. O. 388, being a resolution, as follows:

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected and street-lamps placed thereon and lighted in One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, from Avenue St. Nicholas to the Boulevard, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Cleary, De Lacy, Dempsey, Farley, Finck, Fullgraff, Grant, Jaehne, Miller, McCabe, O'Connor, O'Neil, Pearson, Reilly, Rothman, Sayles, Sheils, and Wendel—18.

Alderman Sayles called up G. O. 275, being a resolution and ordinance, as follows:

Resolved, That the Clerk of the Common Council be and he is hereby authorized and directed to cause five hundred copies of all laws relating particularly to the City of New York, passed at the last session of the State Legislature, to be printed in the usual manner in document form, for the use of the offices of the Corporation, and others; the expense, if any, of procuring copies of such laws, not to exceed the usual fees, and to be paid by the Comptroller, from the appropriation for "City Contingencies."

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Cleary, De Lacy, Dempsey, Farley, Finck, Fullgraff, Grant, Jaehne, Miller, McCabe, O'Connor, O'Neil, Pearson, Reilly, Rothman, Sayles, Sheils, and Wendel—19.

Alderman Fullgraff asked unanimous consent to call up eleven General Orders.

Objections being made,

Alderman Grant moved that the Rules be suspended in order to permit Alderman Fullgraff to call up eleven General Orders.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Alderman Fullgraff called up G. O. 378, being a resolution, as follows:

Resolved, That Croton-water pipes be laid in One Hundred and Fiftieth street, from Morris to Railroad (or Fourth) avenue, as provided in chapter 311, Laws of 1879.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the negative by the following vote, three-fourths of all the members not voting in favor thereof:

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Cleary, De Lacy, Dempsey, Finck, Fullgraff, Grant, Jaehne, Miller, O'Connor, O'Neil, Pearson, Reilly, Sayles, Sheils, and Wendel—16.

Alderman Fullgraff moved that the vote by which the above resolution was lost be reconsidered.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

And this paper was again laid over.

Subsequently Alderman Fullgraff again called up the above General Order.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was again decided in the negative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Cleary, De Lacy, Dempsey, Farley, Finck, Fullgraff, Grant, Jaehne, Miller, O'Neil, Pearson, Reilly, Rothman, Sayles, and Wendel—16.

Alderman Fullgraff moved a reconsideration of the above vote.

The President ruled the motion out of order, as a motion to reconsider cannot be taken twice on the same day.

* Chapter 74, Laws of 1884, which provides for the election, by the people, of a President of the Board of Aldermen, and the selection of a Vice-President, by the members of the Board, for the year 1885 and subsequent years, does not refer directly to the question of salary. I have assumed, however, that the President so to be elected will be entitled to the salary provided by section 52, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, and have included it, as payable to him, in the foregoing estimate, and have included the salary of the Vice-President at the same rate as that of the other members of the Board.

itself authorizing them (the Common Council) to delegate this power, and that the case falls within the settled principle that powers of this description cannot be delegated," but must be regarded as "public powers and trusts, devolved by law or charter upon the Common Council, or governing body, to be exercised by it when and in such manner as it shall judge best, and cannot be delegated to others," and that "there is no provision of law authorizing the Mayor, Comptroller, and Commissioner of Public Works to decide the manner or upon what conditions the defendant corporation may open the streets to lay its mains, and any permit founded upon their action in the premises, confers no license, and is void;" and

Whereas, It would be manifestly unjust to the gas companies, who have acted throughout in good faith and have complied with the provisions of the resolution of December 23, 1876, to enforce the principle embraced in the decision, which, in effect, declares them to be trespassers upon the property of the public—as a void permission is no permission—and any disturbance of the relations now existing between these several companies and this City and its inhabitants, would be injurious to both; while the continued existence of the resolution of 1876, which has produced such unsatisfactory results, would be both unwise and inexpedient: in order, therefore, that no injustice may be done the gas companies, or injury inflicted upon the City or its inhabitants, be it
