President of the Board of Police Commissioners of the City of New York:

DEAR SIR—As Trustees of the "Riot Relief Fund," we have considered the expediency of devoting a portion of the interest accrued on that fund in aid of some purpose akin to that which it was originally intended to serve.

We regard the Police Pension Fund as a charity, fulfilling the required conditions, and it gives us great pleasure to ask you to add to the Police Pension Fund the proceeds of the inclosed check of the Union Trust Company on the Board of Commerce, for ten thousand dollars (\$10,000).

Permit us to express the hope that the present depleted condition of the Pension Fund may be recognized as an occasion for the exercise of public liberality in so worthy a cause.

It is not creditable to the community that a provision for the relief of policemen who have been disabled in the public service, should be left to depend almost solely on the contributions of the active members of the force. At least, when their contributions have been found to be inadequate for their purpose, it may not be too much to expect that the example set by us will find some imitators.

MESSRS.—The Board of Police are gratified in the opportunity of acknowledging with thanks the receipt of your letter of January 4, instant, transmitting a check of ten thousand dollars, the proceeds to be added to the Police Pension Fund, for the benefit of aged and disabled members of the Police force, no longer competent to perform Police duty.

The contribution is timely and seems to be in accord with the motives which created the Benevolent Fund, of which you are the trustees. Numbers of members of the Police force are now on the disabled lists of the Department, who received injuries which caused their disability in the historic riots of July, 1863, and fall strictly within the intent of the trust of which you are the administrators.

This munificent contribution will be applied by the Board to extend relief to the old, disabled, and unfortunate members of the force, their widows and orphan children, as rapidly as is consistent with the provisions of the law under which the Police Pension Fund is required to be administered.

Large numbers of the Police force are in the disabled condition above described, and are a continual burden upon the Police Fund, which consists of money raised by taxation.

Amendment of the pension laws by legislation is required, to enable the Board to transfer this class of disabled policemen to the category of pensioners, and thus transfer the expense of their support from the Police Pension Fund, to the end that their places be supplied by young men of sound health and physical vigor, competent to endure the exposures and perform the duties of Patrolmen. Application will be made to the Legislature for an amendment of the pension laws as above indicated.

Resolved, That the Superintendent instruct the Police force by general order that the Department of Docks has designated certain piers and bulkheads, situate on the North and East rivers, and Harlem river, which are described in a printed schedule which isherewith furnished to each Precinct having frontage on either of the said rivers, "for the purpose of dumping therefrom clean snow and ice removed from the streets and thoroughfares of the city during the present season;" and also to instruct the members of the force to prevent the dumping into the rivers of any material mentioned, other than clean snow and ice, and to prevent the dumping of any such materials upon any pier or bulkhead.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending December 24, 1881, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending December 17, 1881.

SIR.—There were 762 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, December 24, 1881, which is an increase of 14, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 115 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1880. The actual mortality for the week ending December 17, 1881, was 735, which is 223.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 30.34 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,259,670.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 27th day of December, 1881, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional ordinance of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

§ 206. That no privy vault or cess-pool shall be allowed within thirty feet of any tenement or lodging house, hotel or manufactory in the City of New York, of a greater depth than two feet; nor unless it be connected at the upper end with the Croton-water and at the lower end with the street sewer, and provided with an outlet at the lowest point and on the bottom, so as to admit of the complete discharge of the contents whenever the outlet is opened and the vault or sink is flushed with water. The sides and bottom of every privy vault, cess-pool, or school sink in the City of New York must be impermeable and secured against any saturation of the walls or the ground about the same.
