PETITIONS.

By Alderman Ferrigan—

Petition of the Lexington Avenue and South Ferry Railroad Company for permission to construct and operate a railroad in certain streets of this city.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of New York:

The petition of the Lexington Avenue and South Ferry Railroad Company respectfully shows: That your petitioner is a corporation duly organized and incorporated under and pursuant to the act of the Legislature of the State of New York, entitled "An act to provide for the construction, maintenance, and operation of street surface railroads and branches thereof in cities, towns and villages," passed May 6, 1884, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining, and operating a street surface railroad for public use in the conveyance of persons and property in cars for compensation, in the City of New York, and that the said railroad is proposed to be constructed, maintained, and operated upon and along the surface of the following streets, avenues, and highways in the City of New York, namely:

I. Beginning on and at the southerly shore of the Harlem river, at the intersection of Lexington avenue and River street; thence running southerly with double tracks across River street; thence southerly through, upon, over, and along Lexington avenue to Twenty-first street; thence westerly through Twenty-first street with a single track to the street on the westerly side of Gramercy Park; thence southerly through said street to Twentieth street; thence easterly through Twentieth street to Irving place; and also from the intersection of Lexington avenue and Twenty-first street easterly through Twenty-first street with single track to the street on the easterly side of Gramercy Park; thence southerly through said street to Twentieth street, and thence westerly to Irving place, and thence with two tracks over, through, upon and along Irving place to Fourteenth street; thence easterly along, over and through Fourteenth street to the Third avenue; thence southerly along, over and through the Third avenue to Tenth street; thence westerly through, along and upon Tenth street to Fourth avenue; thence southerly through, along and upon Fourth avenue to Astor place; thence through, along, over and upon Astor place to Lafayette place; thence through, along, over and upon Lafayette place to Fourth street; thence through Fourth street westerly to Broadway; thence through, along and upon Broadway southerly to Bleeker street; thence easterly through Bleeker street to Mulberry and Mott streets; thence southerly through, along and upon Mott street with a single track, and southerly through, along and upon Mulberry street with a single track to Chatham street; thence through, along and upon Chatham street with a double track to Pearl street; thence through, along and upon Pearl street with a double track to William street; thence through, along and upon William street with a double track to Frankfort street; thence westerly with a single track through Frankfort street to Park Row; thence with a single track southerly through William street and South William street to Broad street, and from Park Row through, to and through Nassau street with a single track to Broad street, and through Broad street to the intersection of South William street; and thence through and along Broad street with double tracks to South street; thence through South street to the foot of Whitehall street.

With a branch with double tracks from said road leading from Lexington avenue at Forty-second street through and along Forty-second street westerly to Park avenue with double tracks; thence through and along Park avenue with double tracks southerly to Thirty-fourth street; thence through and along Thirty-fourth street with double tracks easterly to Lexington avenue.

With a branch with double tracks from said road starting at Lexington avenue at One Hundred and Sixth street, running westerly through, upon and along One Hundred and Sixth street, to Fourth avenue, and thence southerly, through, upon and along Fourth avenue to Ninety-sixth street; and thence easterly upon, through and along Ninety-sixth street to Lexington avenue.

Together with all the connections, turn-outs, turn-tables, sidings, switches, and stands necessary for the convenient working and accommodation of said railway.

The railway proposed to be constructed, maintained and operated is intended to be operated by cable traction similar to that in operation in the cities of San Francisco and Chicago.

Your petitioner therefore makes application to the Common Council of the City of New York, and prays for its consent and permission to construct, operate, maintain and use a street surface railroad for public use in the conveyance of persons and property in cars upon and along the streets, avenues and highways hereinbefore set forth and described.

In case the said company shall acquire, by purchase or otherwise, the right to enter upon and pass over, upon, along or across private property lying or being between Twenty-first and Twentieth streets, on the line of Lexington avenue and Irving place, or private property lying or being between Fourteenth street and Tenth street, on or near the line southward of Irving place, or private property lying or being between Fourth street and Bleeker street, on or near the intersecting lines of Lafayette place and Mott or Mulberry streets, then and in that case the consent of the Common Council is applied for by your petitioner to construct, maintain and operate its railroad upon and along or across the streets, avenues or highways lying and being between any or all of the above-described points or places.

Petition to change the name of Chatham street to Park Row:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

The undersigned, property-owners, residents and storekeepers on Chatham street, in this city, respectfully show to your Honorable Body, as follows:

That many years ago Chatham street, in this city, acquired a reputation notoriously bad.

That this was due to the questionable, perhaps unlawful, practices and business then carried on in and on said street.

That the questionable and unlawful practices and business formerly carried on in and on said street have long since ceased and entirely disappeared.

That the notoriously bad reputation which Chatham street acquired has had for many years and still continues to have a very great tendency to affect adversely the opinion of residents of this city as to repute of the present residents and storekeepers on said street.

That by reason of said notoriously bad reputation, strangers in and visitors to this city shun and avoid Chatham street, and the storekeepers on said street are thus deprived of trade that otherwise, in the ordinary course of business, they would have been entitled to and could have obtained.

Your petitioners verily believe that your Honorable Board is aware that respectable property-owners and residents and honest, industrious storekeepers now live and carry on business on said street.

Wherefore, in order that they, the present property-owners, residents and store-keepers on Chatham street, may be relieved of the very injurious effects resulting from the premises and in order that the present residents and storekeepers may not be deprived of at least equal opportunities and advantages with others, the undersigned hereby petition your Honorable Body to change the name of said street and so remove the undeserved, unjust disadvantages that, for many years, your petitioners have been compelled to contend against.

BLEECKER STREET AND FULTON FERRY RAILROAD.

On May 29, 1873, an act was passed by the Legislature in relation to the Bleecker Street and Fulton Ferry Railroad Company providing that it shall, "in lieu of the payment to the Corporation of the City of New York of a license fee of fifty dollars for each and every car used by said company, specified in section 3 of chapter 199 of the Laws of 1873, annually, on the first day of October, pay into the Treasury of the City of New York, one per cent. of the gross receipts of said company, etc."

The company has not paid into the City Treasury any percentage upon its receipts under the provisions of this statute.

The road has been leased to the Twenty-third Street Railroad Company and two actions are now pending against that company to recover license fees and one per cent. of gross receipts from January 1, 1879.

On May 10, 1869, an act was passed by the Legislature of the State of New York (chapter 823), entitled "An act to authorize the construction of a railroad through Twenty-third street in the City of New York."

The first section of this act provides as follows: "The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York are hereby authorized and required, within twenty days after the passage of this act, to advertise for two weeks, in at least two of the daily papers published in said city, that they will, on a certain day, at a certain place to be therein specified, sell at public auction to the highest bidder the right, privilege and franchise, to construct, operate and use a railroad with a double track, and the necessary turn-outs and switches for the proper working of the same through, along and upon Twenty-third street in the City of New York, from the North river to the East river. Such sale shall be conducted in the ordinary manner of sales at auction, and the person or corporation who shall offer to pay into the City Treasury the largest sum of money for such right, privilege or franchise, shall receive from said Commissioners a certificate that he or they are entitled to such grant, and are authorized to construct, operate and use the same in accordance with the provisions of this act. Such certificate to be issued on the payment within ten days into the City Treasury of the amount of the bid, and on the execution of a bond to the said Commissioners in such form, and for such an amount as they shall prescribe, conditioned that the person or corporation receiving such certificate will, within four months, finish and complete said road, and equip the same with the requisite number of cars and horses; but should he or they be restrained or prevented by any legal proceedings from constructing and completing the same, the time during which they are so restrained shall not be deemed or taken to be part of the time within which the same is to be completed."

May 14, 1869. The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorized the advertisement and sale of the franchise of the railroad at public auction, to be held in the "Governor's Room" of the City Hall, on Wednesday, June 2, 1869.

June 2, 1869. The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund attended the sale, held at 12 M., in the "Governor's Room" of the City Hall, as advertised, when the franchise of said railroad was sold and struck down to Sidney A. Yeomans, the highest bidder, for the sum of \$150,000.

June 12, 1869. The bid of Sidney A. Yeomans was rejected by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That the bid of Sidney A. Yeomans be rejected, 1st. Because the bid, in the estimation of the Commissioners, was and is fraudulent and collusive, and 2d. Because of non-compliance with terms of sale, and that the Secretary forthwith serve notice hereof upon said Sidney A. Yeomans.

"The agreement executed by Sidney A. Yeomans, June 2, 1869, in which he covenanted and agreed, among other things, as follows: 'and will, within ten days from the date hereof, pay said sum into the City Treasury to the order of the City Chamberlain of the City of New York,' was canceled in his presence, because of non-performance of the payment clause."

No further action upon the sale appears to have been taken by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. An act was passed May 6, 1872 (chapter 521), confirming the sale made June 2, 1869, and authorizing and directing the Comptroller of the City of New York, "on the payment into the City Treasury by Sidney A. Yeomans, of the sum of \$150,000, that being the amount of his bid which was accepted, and tendered to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, on the 10th [12th] day of June, 1869, or upon the giving of such security for the payment thereof as shall be satisfactory to said Comptroller to issue to said Sidney A. Yeomans, or to whomsoever the said Sidney A. Yeomans shall assign the same, the certificate required to be issued by the said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in and by the provisions of the act of the Legislature of the State of New York, entitled 'An act to authorize the construction of a railroad through Twenty-third street, in the City of New York,' passed May 10, 1869, that he or they or their successors and assigns are entitled to the grant of the rights, privileges and franchises mentioned, described and conferred in and by said act."

June 11, 1872. Sidney A. Yeomans paid into the City Treasury the sum of \$150,000, as provided in the act of the Legislature, and assigned the franchise of the railroad to "The Twenty-third Street Railway Company," to which company the certificate of grant to construct, operate and use the said railroad was issued by the Comptroller.

The Legislature of the State passed an act on April 28, 1870, entitled "An act to authorize the construction of a railroad in One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, and in certain other streets and avenues in the City of New York."

The first section provided that, "The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York are hereby authorized, within twenty days after the passage of this act, to advertise for six weeks in at least five of the daily papers published in said city, that they will, on a certain day and hour, and at a certain place, to be therein specified, sell at public auction to the highest bidder, the right, privilege and franchise to construct, operate by animal power and use a railroad, with a single or double track, as hereinafter provided, and to convey passengers thereon for compensation, through upon and along the following streets or avenues, route or routes, in the City of New York, viz.:

May 13, 1870. The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund directed the Chamberlain to take measures to carry the act of the Legislature into effect; and, at a meeting of the Commissioners,

held on May 31, 1870, the sale of the franchise of the One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Street Railroad was authorized according to the terms and conditions of an advertisement submitted by the Chamberlain.

The franchise was accordingly sold at public auction in the "Governor's Room" of the City Hall, on July 18, 1870, to Robert Squires, the highest bidder, for the sum of \$67,000, which was paid into the City Treasury, July 23, 1870.

SIR—I am in receipt of a copy of a proposed bill amending chapter 522 of the Laws of 1884, in relation to public places, parks and parkways in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards and the adjacent district of Westchester County. Accompanying is a resolution approving the form of bill and instructing the Counsel to the Corporation to transmit the same to the Legislature of this State on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, and to request its passage by the Legislature of this State.

The ordinances provide that the Corporation Counsel shall, when required by the Common Council, "propose the draft of any bill to be presented by the Corporation of the City to the Legislature for passage, with a proper memorial for the passage thereof." (Revised Ordinances, p. 45.)

The language of this section is somewhat obscure. It is not altogether clear whether it is made the duty of the Corporation Counsel to prepare the draft of the bill and the proper memorial and deliver them to the Common Council, or whether he should transmit them to the Legislature. It certainly does not require that officer to do more than to so transmit the bill and memorial.

In compliance with the terms of this ordinance, I am prepared to transmit this bill to the Legislature, together with whatever memorial the Common Council may ask me to draw. I must decline, however, to appear personally or officially before the Legislature or any committee of either branch thereof, to request the passage of the same. I take this course because, in my opinion, the Corporation Counsel will best discharge the duties laid upon him under the act as it now stands, by not interfering in any effort to modify its provisions.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—I am in receipt of a resolution, adopted by your Board on the 9th instant, requesting me to report the cost per annum of heating the City Hall by steam, and the practicability of supplying steam for heating the City Hall from the boilers in the New County Court-house, with the probable cost thereof. In reply I have to state that under a resolution passed by your Board November 10, 1884, a contract was made with the New York Steam Company for heating the City Hall by steam at a cost not to exceed \$1,700 for the winter season of 1884 to 1885, and that the actual cost of the steam heating for that season was \$1,700. In reference to the project of heating the City Hall by steam, supplied from the boilers in the New County Court-house, I have to state that these boilers are now taxed to their full capacity in heating the Court-house, and furnishing steam power for the operation of the passenger elevator. It would, therefore, be impossible to supply steam in the City Hall from these boilers, and to properly heat both buildings.

SIR—I am in receipt of a resolution of the Common Council, passed March 23, 1886, as follows:

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby requested to inform this Board, at his earliest convenience, by what authority the carriageway of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street is being torn up and the pavements displaced, in order to admit of the construction and operation of a 'cable railway' by the Third Avenue Railroad Company; also, by what authority the pavement and carriageway of Eighty-sixth street, from Fifth avenue to East river, by the Madison Avenue and Eighty-sixth Street Railroad Company."

By chapter 825 of the Laws of 1872, the New York and Harlem Railroad Company was authorized to make certain extensions of its track through and along Madison avenue to Eighty-sixth street; thence through and along Eighty-sixth street by single and double track to Avenue D; thence through and along Avenue D by single or double track to Ninety-second street; thence through and along Ninety-second street by single track to Astoria Ferry, East river, and also through and along Madison avenue, from Eighty-sixth street as far as said avenue may from time to time be opened.

Commissioners were appointed in accordance with the provisions of section 3 of this act, and they reported in favor of the extension on January 7, 1885, and an order of Court was duly made confirming such report April 2, 1885, and it is in accordance with the act and the action taken thereunder that the work of laying tracks in Eighty-sixth street, from Madison avenue towards the East river, has, as I am informed, been begun. I am not aware that any work of this kind is underway between Fifth and Madison avenues.

With regard to the authority for laying cable railroad on One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, I beg leave to inclose copy of communication received from the counsel to the Third Avenue Railroad, which is doing the work.

Permits to disturb the pavement were given by the Department of Public Works in both cases.

SIR—In answer to your favor of March 24, inquiring as to the authority by which the carriageway of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street has been torn up to admit of the construction of a cable railway by the Third Avenue Railroad Company, we would state as follows:

The One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Street Railroad Company was incorporated in pursuance with chapter 504, Laws of 1870. This act of incorporation was amended by chapter 209 of Laws of 1883, which authorizes the use of cables as a motive power over the routes designated in the original act and expressly provides that "such cables shall be laid under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works of the City of New York."

Under the power conferred by chapter 503 of the Laws of 1879, The Third Avenue Railroad Company, the lessees of the One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Street Railroad Company, has acquired the stock of the said One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Street Railroad Company, and the two companies are now consolidated.

The Third Avenue Railroad Company having determined to lay a cable road in One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street has obtained from the Commissioner of Public Works of this City a permit to tear up the carriageway of said street for the purpose of laying such cable railway, and it is in accordance with this permission the work has been done.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 5,696.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 316.

During the past week 187 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 42 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 3 permits.

There were issued to remove manure from stables in the city, 3 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 56 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy-sinks, 106 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 132 visits were made, and 39 disinfections and 13 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious diseases removed to Riverside Hospital was 8.

The number of vaccinations performed was 866, of which 27 were primary, and 839 revaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 7,475 pounds of meat.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 22, and the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 3, and the number of arrests made was 3.

The certificates of 594 births, 51 still-births, 210 marriages and 758 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, March 20, 1886. This shows a decrease of 4 births, 5 still-births, 105 marriages and 18 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was an increase of 60 births, 34 marriages, and 58 deaths, and a decrease of 6 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; diphtheria, 7; croup, 3; whooping-cough, 1; erysipelas, 1; malarial fevers, 2; puerperal diseases, 2; inanition, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 23; bronchitis, 13; pneumonia, 2; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 21; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; apoplexy, 2; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 8; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; drowning, 3; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 1; typhus fever, 2; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 3; alcoholism, 4; rheumatism and gout, 4; cancer, 15; heart diseases, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 12; convulsions, 7; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 20; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; surgical operations, 2; suicide, 1. The number of deaths from measles and premature and pre-natural births was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 183 were in institutions, 401 in tenement-houses, 161 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 145 on the first, 179 on the second, 126 on the third, 186 on the fourth, 22 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 740 were stated to be residents of New York City and 18 non-residents; 124 were stated to be single, 222 married, 115 widowed, and the condition of 297 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 758; still-births, 51; bodies in transitu, 17; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 86 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 594 births, 223 marriages, 51 still-births, 758 deaths; 17 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 149 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 8 transcripts of the birth record, 11 of marriage and 95 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending March 20, 1886, was 41.2 degrees Fahrenheit, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.922; the mean humidity was 69, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,100, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.30 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 664 deaths and still-births, or 82.08 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 18; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 245; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 97; Greenwood (undenominational), 60; Lutheran (undenominational), 106; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 15; Evergreen (undenominational), 33; Woodlawn (undenominational), 30; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 14; Union (Methodist Protestant), 7; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 7; Machpelah, L. The actual mortality for the week ending March 13, 1886, was 768; this is 5 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1885, and 52.6 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.99 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,426,501.

BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

ARMORY BOARD—CITY OF NEW YORK,  
March 26, 1886.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held at the office of his Honor the Mayor, City Hall, this date.

Present, Mayor Grace, General Shaler.

Also present, Col. J. H. Jones, John Hardy, agent, and J. E. Ware, architect.

The minutes of the previous meetings were read and approved.

His Honor referred to the request of the Commanding Officer of First Battery, N. G. S. N. Y., to be furnished with one hundred feet of rubber hose and one hundred camp stools, and presented an opinion which he had obtained from the Corporation Counsel, to the effect that under the law all supplies for armories must be furnished by the Commissioner of Public Works. Consideration of the matter laid over.

The Secretary read the following report of the Architect of Twelfth Regiment Armory:

NEW YORK, March 19, 1886.

Armory Board, New York City:

GENTLEMEN—The steam work of the new building, Twelfth Regiment Armory, Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets, has progressed to entitle the contractors, Gillis & Geoghegan, to the amount of their first payment, viz.: nineteen hundred and ninety-eight dollars, in accordance with the terms of the articles of agreement, being twenty per cent. of contract price.

The report was received, the certificate signed and the Secretary instructed to forward the same to the Comptroller for payment.

The application of the Commanding Officer of First Battery for renewal of lease of present armory building, which was laid over at last meeting, was then taken up, and Mr. John Hardy, representing the owner of the building, who was present, stated that the owner had decided to accept the offer of the Board for a renewal on the same terms as the present lease.

The following resolution was then presented by the Secretary:

Whereas, The lease of the armory building now occupied by the First Battery, N. G. S. N. Y., Nos. 340-344 West Forty-fourth street, will expire on the 1st of May next, therefore

Resolved, That this Board hereby respectfully recommends and directs, subject to the concurrence of the Sinking Fund Commissioners, that a new lease of the armory building now occupied by the First Battery be executed for three years from May 1, 1886, at an annual rental of \$2,750, with the same conditions as the present lease.

The resolution was passed and the Secretary instructed to forward the same to the Sinking Fund Commissioners, by the following vote:

Mayor Grace—aye; General Shaler—aye.

A letter was read from Messrs. A. R. Whitney & Co., iron contractors, acknowledging the receipt of a notice from this Board declining to fix a date for the completion of contract of Dec. 29, 1884. Filed.

The Secretary reported that he had conferred with the Comptroller, as directed at the last meeting of the Board, with reference to Whitney & Co's bill for \$792, and had furnished him with a copy of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel dated June 3, 1885, showing the authority of this Board, but had not since been informed of the action of the Comptroller.

A communication was read from Col. J. H. Jones, Twelfth Regiment, dated January, 1886, with reference to alterations to the plans for Armory: also a communication from Col. Jones, dated March 22, forwarding proposal from United States Illuminating Company, to furnish electric lights for the Armory. The papers were ordered filed.

The Architect then reported with reference to additional work on the Twelfth Regiment Armory, applied for by the Commanding Officer of Regiment, January 12, 1886. The plans were carefully examined, those of the gas fixtures approved, and the Architect instructed to prepare detailed plans and specifications for all the rest, to be submitted to the Board at the next meeting.

The following resolution was then passed:

Resolved, That the Secretary is hereby instructed to advertise for proposals for gas fixtures in the Twelfth Regiment Armory in accordance with plans and specifications furnished by the Architect.

The vote taken on the above resolution was as follows:

THE CHIEF ENGINEER OF THE CROTON Aqueduct reports to me to-day that during the past twenty days the water in the city reservoirs has gone down three feet three inches, equal to 98,000,000 gallons, showing that this amount of water was used and wasted over and above the supply received through the Croton Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit.

The Department has no means to stop this enormous waste, which is caused by consumers keeping faucets open day and night to prevent freezing in the service-pipes, and can only make this most urgent appeal to them to stop it, and notify them that unless it is stopped the pressures in the water-mains will be so much reduced that in a few days the water will not rise to the basements and cellars in thousands of buildings.
