

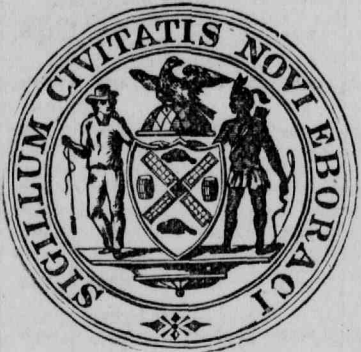

From corner Broome and Willett streets, northerly through Willett to East Houston street to the Thirteenth Precinct Station-house.

From corner Broadway and West Third street, northerly through West Third street to Mercer street; thence northerly through Mercer street to the Fifteenth Precinct Station-house.

Connecting the manhole in front of Jefferson Market Police Court, Sixth avenue, with a pipe extending into said court.

At a meeting of this Board, held July 12, 1888, the Comptroller was authorized to issue stock of the City of New York to the amount of forty thousand dollars, for the purpose of constructing approaches to the Metropolitan Museum of Art, under the authority of chapter 575 of the Laws of 1887.

Of this amount, there now remains unexpended the sum of six thousand four hundred and twenty-nine dollars and twelve cents.

At a meeting of the Board of Parks, held November 10, 1893, a new plan for grading the territory north and west of the Metropolitan Museum of Art was approved, and a resolution was adopted requesting this Board to make the balance now available (\$6,429.12) of the appropriation made upon plans approved at the meeting of this Board, July 12, 1888, applicable to the work shown on this amended plan. This resolution was referred to the Comptroller, at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held November 15, 1893, for examination; but report thereon was delayed, owing to the fact that no estimate of the cost of the work had been submitted by the Department of Public Parks. The Engineer of Construction of the Park Department, under date of January 8, 1894, now submits the following estimate:

The Engineer of the Finance Department reports that these quantities have been carefully estimated by the Engineer of Construction and that the prices are what might be expected on competitive bids. He furthermore states that the work is necessary and that the request of the resolution of the Park Department is a reasonable one.

Although the estimate of the Park Department amounts to \$483 less than the unexpended balance available for this work, I recommend that the Park Department be authorized to expend so much as may be necessary of the entire unexpended balance in order that provision may be made, if necessary, for the execution of this work by day's labor, in which case employment may be given to a number of the unemployed poor without the delay attendant upon the advertising of contracts. I offer for adoption the following resolution.

Herewith I present a resolution adopted by the Board of Parks, January 3, 1894, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to amend the resolution adopted by this Board on May 6, 1892, by which the appropriation for improving the Riverside Drive, authorized by chapter 575 of the Laws of 1887, was made applicable to the construction of the retaining-wall only, so that the sum of \$5,000 may be used for the widening of the roadway on the easterly side of Riverside Drive, between One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street and Claremont place.

It is proposed by the Park Department to carry out this project by means of "day's work," with a view of avoiding the delay attendant upon advertising a proposed contract, and thereby gives employment to a number of the unemployed poor as speedily as possible. In order further to save time and to aid in the consummation of this worthy purpose, I have directed the Engineer of the Finance Department to examine into and report on this request at once and without waiting for the matter to be referred in the usual way.

By a resolution of this Board, adopted May 6, 1892, the sum of \$141,500 was appropriated out of the proceeds of bonds to be issued under the provisions of chapter 575 of the Laws of 1887, for the purpose of constructing retaining-walls on the westerly line of Riverside Park, from One Hundred and Nineteenth street to One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, and from Seventy-ninth street to Ninety-sixth street.

The section between One Hundred and Nineteenth street and One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street is now nearly completed, and the work between Seventy-ninth street and Ninety-sixth street is under contract and well under way. After providing for these contract works, there will remain unexpended a balance of about \$28,000; and it is proposed to utilize \$5,000 of this unexpended balance for the purpose of widening the roadway on the easterly side of Riverside Drive, between One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street and Claremont place.

The contemplated improvement, as shown on the plan herewith submitted by the Department of Parks, is the widening by fourteen feet of the present very narrow and steep roadway leading from the top to the bottom of the hill—a distance of 825 feet. The title to the land required for this widening has been recently acquired by the City. The Engineer of the Finance Department reports that the necessity for this work is so apparent as to make argument thereon unnecessary; and the funds for this purpose being available, I offer for adoption the following resolutions.

SIR—The Department of Public Parks, in communication of the 11th instant, transmits to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the following resolution adopted by the Board, viz.:

The work proposed to be done is as follows:

1. Construction of a roadway thirty feet in width in Moshulu parkway, from Van Cortlandt avenue to Jerome avenue, and from Jerome avenue to the intersection of the Gun Hill road and Van Cortlandt Park, a distance of 3,000 feet, as shown on plan herewith submitted.

2. Widening the existing road in Moshulu parkway, from Webster avenue to the intersection of Van Cortlandt avenue, a distance of 3,000 feet, as shown on the blue print herewith submitted, and resurfacing the same with broken stone.

The letter states the entire work will require an expenditure of about \$7,000 for broken stone and \$13,000 for necessary labor and surveying, being for grading, cutting trees and brush, building culverts, etc., and which it is intended to have done by day's work.

There is no doubt that a road through the parkway is much called for, but there is nothing in the resolution, or in the letter from the Department, showing that the proposed road of thirty feet in width is within the lines or on the grades of the road to be ultimately built, nor could I get any definite information on the subject. At the same time, an examination of the topographical map recently made of the parkway indicates the route laid down to be favorably located for such road. The plan and profile show satisfactory grades, and it is therefore probable that this route will be fixed upon for this ultimate road, at least so far as to include within its limits the thirty-foot road now proposed.

The existing road from Webster avenue to the intersection of Van Cortlandt avenue, which it is proposed to widen, has been heretofore made by the Department and is only twenty feet wide for 2,200 feet of its length, and the intention is to widen it to thirty feet.

If it be decided that these roads are within the limits of the roads ultimately to be built, I think it would be right to build them now, as the work would give employment to a large number of men during the winter season.

Committee representing petitioners.

The Mayor stated that in making the estimate for the Board of Education for 1894, it was specifically provided that provision should be made to maintain a night school at this place.

Commissioner Wehrum, Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Education, being present, stated that calculations had been made for the purpose of maintaining all the night schools now organized and that a sufficient appropriation remained to maintain a night school at this point.

The Mayor announced that inasmuch as the statement of Commissioner Wehrum demonstrated that sufficient appropriation was at the disposal of the Board of Education to maintain this night school, no further action of this Board is necessary, and the matter was referred to Commissioner Wehrum to so present the matter to the Board of Education.

The Mayor called attention to a bill presented to the Legislature authorizing the further issue of \$2,500,000 School-house Bonds, and made inquiry of Commissioner Wehrum as to the originators of this bill, the local authorities having no knowledge of it.

Commissioner Wehrum stated that the bill originated with the Board of Education, and was being looked after by the Committee on Legislation, of which Commissioner Livingston is Chairman.

Debate was had thereon, whereupon the Mayor moved that the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments be requested to prepare and present to this Board, at its next meeting, a resolution expressing the views of this Board relative to the practice of Boards and Departments of the City Government and others presenting to the Legislature, bills for authority for the indiscriminate issue of bonds and appropriations for various purposes, without the knowledge or consent of the local authorities.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.
